Municipal Elections Will Be Held Tuesday, June 6th

**City Officials Will Be Named In Iuka,
Burnsville, Tishomingo, And Belmont**

Five municipalities in Tishomingo county will elect city officials in the Municipal General elections Tuesday, June 6. These officials will serve for the next four years.

In Iuka and Belmont, voters will choose a mayor, five aldermen, and a city marshal-tax collector. Burnsville and Tishomingo will each choose a mayor and five aldermen. The marshal-tax collector is ap-

pointed by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen in these last two named towns.

The slate of candidates in Burnsville is made up of all women, the same city officials who have served the town the past four years. They are all unopposed. Burnsville candidates are Mrs. A. H. Montgomery for mayor; Mrs. J. C. Foote, Mrs. Harry Rhine, Jr., Mrs. A. H. Tackett, Mrs. Allen Floyd and Mrs. John Marlar, candidates for aldermen.

In Iuka there are three seeking the post of mayor. They are Alver Belue, E. D. Davis, and Sam Traylor. Candidates for aldermen are W. H. Jones, R. K. (Diddler) Thorne, E. E. Murrah, Nolan C. Pruitt, Claude Curtis, C. A. Daugherty, Vernon Pate and Joe W. Thompson. Mr. Jones and Mr. Thorne are seeking re-election as aldermen. Mr. Traylor is now alderman but is seeking to be mayor.

Candidates for Iuka City Marshal-tax collector are H. F. (Chuncky) Chambers, the present marshal, and George L. Curtin, who is making his first bid for the office.

In Belmont the candidates for city offices are N. C. Deaton, the present mayor, is seeking re-election; Lyman McAnally, Houston Ivy and B. E. Wright, Jr., present aldermen who are seeking re-election; Dewey Reed and Arch Mitchell, also candidates for aldermen. Running for the post of town marshal and tax collector in Belmont is J. T. Ozbirn.

The Tishomingo slate of candidates is made up of E. E. Bunting and C. L. Trimm seeking the mayor's job; W. R. Nettles, Carlos Ingram, H. C. Nichols, H. R. Bickelstaff, B. M. Hill, O. R. Tittle, A. F. Ward and A. W. Dean, all seeking the posts of aldermen. The candidate for Tishomingo town marshal and tax collector is W. W. Flurry.

A list of candidates for the town of Paden has not been available.

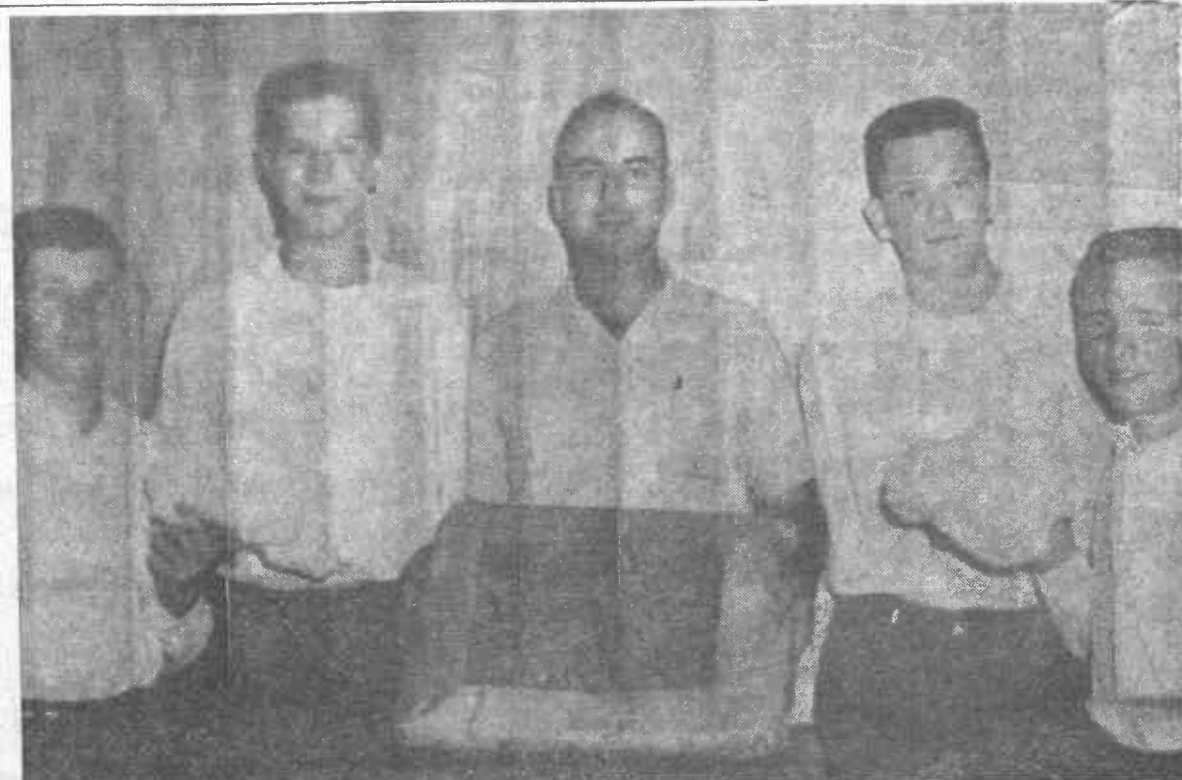
CADET JAMES F. OAKS

What's It About?

Lesson for June 4, 1961

WHAT'S it all about? Once in a while we sit down and ask ourselves that question. It's the biggest question there is—or it can be, depending on what you mean by the little word "it." A football stadium with 22 men running this way and that, in the middle of it, and with 100,000 plainly crazy people filling all the seats—you can explain the game and you can maybe explain why the viewers act crazy.

Dr. Foreman: A supermarket, a school, a hospital, and so forth, you can understand them after a fashion. They fit in, they make sense.

But does life make sense? Bits and pieces of it do. But what's life all about? Does life, my life, your life, the life of mankind, fit into any conceivable pattern, or is it a meaningless madness in the midst of an empty universe?

A Strange Book

The strangest book in the Bible was written by a man who was haunted by this question. Does life make sense, and if so, what? The book called Ecclesiastes tells of this man's search for the meaning of life, and of his conclusions. What makes the book strange is not the question. It is the answers that are strange, or rather the answer. For his main conclusion is that we don't know. The writer of Ecclesiastes is what might be called a tired cynic. He had tasted the cup of life and found it bitter, or rather he had tried to drink and found the cup empty. One mournful refrain comes over and over—"all is vanity and a striving after wind." Vanity—not meaning to say pride, but emptiness. Life is like a man trying to catch the wind. He can't do it and even if he could, he would still have—nothing. The wheel of life goes around and around, till "all things are full of weariness."

A Few Certainties

And yet life, even for this strange old man, is not entirely a swamp. As it is in a real swamp, so it is with life, here and there in the bog are small solid islands. Some of these islands of certainty he names. (At least for him they are certain.) One is the fact, which he feels he has to accept, that this life, for all its good, has evil to match. Light and dark—good and evil—cause for rejoicing and cause for mourning—seem to have their settled places. There is a time for everything, he says, and then he lines up good-and-bad pairs, such as weeping and laughing, killing and healing, losing and seeking, hate and love, war and peace. This is one of the certainties of life, that not all of it is good. Ecclesiastes more than hints that we might as well admit this and make the best of it. Man cannot figure out what God has done; so the thing for men to do is to enjoy themselves as long as they live. If sorrow is real, so is joy. Furthermore, it is possible to work at something, and to enjoy what one has done. In short, this tired old cynic is not altogether a cynic, because he does believe in a few things. One bit of wisdom we can take from him at this point is that there are unpleasant features of life that cannot be changed. Waste no time quarreling with life; accept it!

One of the strange features about Ecclesiastes is that the author, who believed so little that was good, still did believe in God. It was not a high faith that he had. It was nothing like the faith (for example) of a Saint Paul. God for Ecclesiastes is not a Companion, he knows nothing of God's love. "God is in heaven and you upon earth," he says, "therefore let your words be few," that is, God is so far away that you'd better not say too much about him, he lives in a different world. Nevertheless, though God cannot (this man thought) be known or loved, he can be feared. You can make vows to him, you can do some service for him. God has no pleasure in fools; so don't be one. Empty words grow many; don't pour out more talk. Just live the best you can in the world as it is. If this seems too dark a world, remember Ecclesiastes hasn't the last word in the Bible!

County Agent's Notes

Cotton

We have had several inquiries about cultivating cotton that was pre-emerged at the time of planting. The pre-emerge will last from four to six weeks and may be longer if the 12 inch band is not disturbed.

You may cultivate the middle up to the treated land without any damage to the pre-emerge provided you do not throw dirt up on the treated area. If dirt is thrown up on the treated area, you will get grass in your cotton and lose the effect of the pre-emerge.

A rotary hoe may be used lightly on the row without affecting the pre-emerge. When grass starts to come up in the drill the chemical has played out and it is time to start plowing.

Thrips are attacking cotton as soon as it comes through the ground this year. The cool, wet weather is adding to the infestation of thrips. Two or three poisonings for trips will hasten the maturity of your cotton two to three weeks next fall.

Insecticides to use for thrips are: 2½% Methyl Parathion and 5% DDT dust; 3-0 dust and Sevin.

Liquids to use are: Combination of Methyl Parathion and DDT; BHC and Malathion. You should consider the cost of materials when poisoning for thrips. Most any cotton insecticide will control thrips, so use the ones that are the most economical and does a good job of control.

Lawn Care

Proper mowing is one of the best ways to keep a good lawn. It must be properly mowed to prevent weeds and diseases.

The first step toward proper mowing is to have a sharp blade. A dull mower leaves a ragged appearance, is injurious to the grass and is a hazard to the mower. Cut the grass at a height. For finer texture never cut more than one-third at any time; for coarse never take more than one-third at a time.

Insect Notes

Chinch bugs have been attacking young corn. One-fourth pound per acre of aphene at two pounds per acre is recommended.

Heavy populations of grasshoppers have been observed in some areas. These could move into cotton and be on hand when those young squares show up.

Thrips and cutworms are problems. Your county agent has information on killing them. Other insect pests. See him. The telephone number is 6483.

Keep Up Firelanes, Protect Woodlands

Fire is the greatest enemy of the tree farmer.

Fires can, in a few hours time, destroy thousands of young pine seedlings that it may have taken weeks of hard work to set.

For this reason it is necessary to protect woodland from fire by constructing firelanes, or, as some people call them, fire-breaks.

Properly constructed and maintained firelanes can be used as roadways into woods as well as places to backfire if needed to stop an oncoming hot fire.

Firelanes will stop a slow burning fire but not a fast burning, hot fire. However, they are good insurance against loss of all the woodland.

A great many soil conservation district co-operators have constructed firelanes in their woodlands and are doing a good job of maintaining them.

Now is the time to run a disk over your firelanes to keep down

the grass and other vegetation. A few hours of work spent in disk-ing up your firelanes now may save thousands of valuable young pine trees later.

Chromcraft To Build
Plant At Senatobia

Chromcraft, Inc., with a national

market, will build a 240,000-square foot plant at Senatobia for the manufacture of dinette furniture. The company will move part of its dinette operation from St. Louis. The new plant will call for a \$1,500,000 BAWI bond issue. Some 400 people will be employed, and annual payroll will be about \$1,000,000. Announcement of the new industry was made by Chromcraft president Andrew L. Stone. Chromcraft employs a complete operation — converting lumber into dimension stock, fabricating plastic tops, producing tubing for table legs and chairs, and assembling component parts.

"Encyclopedia" Lists State Manufacturers

The Mississippi Industrial and Technological Research Commission has published an "Encyclopedia of Mississippi Manufacturers," listing all manufacturing establishments in the state by product, by location and alphabetically. The 194-page book, which sells for five dollars, serves as a buyer's guide and marketing guide as well as a general reference and is available at commission offices or at the Agricultural and Industrial Board office, both in Jackson.

Aberdeen Gets Grant For Industrial Park

The City of Aberdeen has received the first A&I Board grant, under the Industrial Park Act of 1960, for the development of a feasibility study for a proposed industrial park. The board will pay \$2,000 of the total \$9,080 cost. Site of the proposed park is at the old Gulf Ordinance Plant near Prairie. The U. S. General Services Administration has assured Aberdeen of a first opportunity to purchase when the federal government disposes of the property. The feasibility study will get underway immediately and will take about four

BAWI Program Upheld By Federal Judge

Mississippi's BAWI program won a victory in federal court when U. S. District Judge Claude Clayton, in Oxford, ruled that BAWI factory rents paid to municipalities are deductible for income tax purposes. The Internal Revenue Service claimed that BAWI rent payments must be pro-rated over the normal life of the building. The ruling came on a test case by Gem, Inc., Byhalia, which manufactures dust mops and ironing board covers.

First Quarter Industries To Provide 2475 New Jobs

The Agricultural and Industrial Board listing of new industries for the first quarter of 1961 shows 17 new industries with 1790 jobs, plus eight expansions providing another 685 jobs — a total for the quarter of 2475 new job opportunities and two of the expansions will involve BAWI bond issues.

A Quick Look Around On The Economic Front

Over 11,000 tons of soybeans were shipped from Greenwood and Belzoni to New Orleans and Baton Rouge via the Yazoo River in late March and early April. Mississippi Industries will establish a wood-products plant at Morton. Mississippi Industries for the Blind provides about ten percent of all blind-made products bought by the federal government. R. H. Massey, manager of the Mississippi Livestock Producers Association, heads a special committee appointed by Gov. Barnett to study the feasibility of state aid in the establishment of feed lots for cattle.

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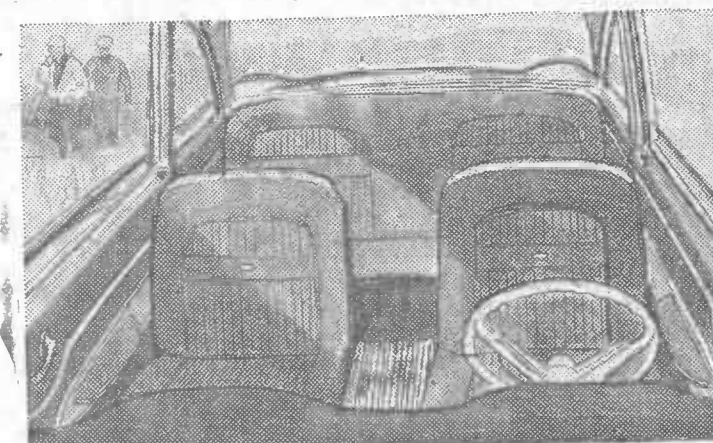

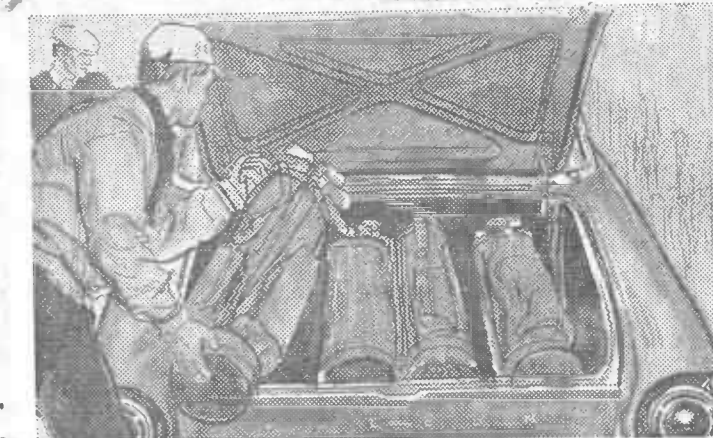

Forestry Notes

By Larry Brewer
Area Forester

Many landowners in Tishomingo county are taking advantage of suitable weather and available markets to harvest some of their timber products and convert it into ready cash. Extra income is something all farmers can use.

Most landowners now realize the value and importance of timber to our economy. One dollar out of every four in Mississippi comes from growing, harvesting and manufacturing of timber and timber products. Yes, one-fourth of our total income comes from forestry. There are other values received from our forest lands such as prevention of soil erosion, scenic beauty, wild life habitats, protection of watersheds and reservoirs, and many other benefits.

Landowners have not always realized the importance of wise management of forest lands. In fact, at one time our timber resources were becoming so depleted that the Mississippi Legislature found it necessary to pass a law governing the removal of timber products in order to insure a continuous supply of products from our forest lands. This law is known as the "Forest Harvesting Act".

I want to urge every landowner and timber cutter to become familiar with the Forest Harvesting Act. A section of the law states that no one shall cut, authorize, direct or assist in the cutting for commercial purposes any pine trees under ten inches in diameter unless there is left standing on each acre of forest land being harvested, one hundred or more well distributed pine trees four inches or more in diameter, or at least four pine seed trees of ten inches diameter. A landowner who wishes to clear cut and plant

form of management is required to submit to the Mississippi Forestry Commission an acceptable plan of management which will assure continued productivity of the to be harvest in lieu of the above provisions.

The Mississippi Forestry Commission is designated as the enforcing agency and Commission employees are authorized to enter upon any forest lands to inspect the area for compliance with the law.

The Forest Harvesting Act does

not apply to the clearing of land for cultivation of pasture or for other purposes such as building sites.

A RESOLUTION

The Board of Supervisors took up for consideration the matter of issuing bonds of Tishomingo County to raise money for the purpose of constructing state-aid roads, therein as now or hereafter designated by law. After a discussion of the subject, Supervisor H. M. Biggs offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution: Resolution declaring the intention of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, to issue bonds of said county in the maximum principal amount of Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$600,000.00) to raise money for the purpose of constructing state-aid roads in said county as now or hereafter designated by law, as provided and authorized by chapter 196, Laws of Mississippi of 1960, and directing publication of notice of such intention.

WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors does now find and determine that it has become and is necessary to raise money for the purpose of constructing state-aid roads in Tishomingo County, Mississippi, as now or hereafter designated by law; and

WHEREAS, this Board has made due investigation and does now find and determine that the estimated cost of constructing the aforesaid state-aid roads is Six Hundred Thousand (\$600,000.00); and

WHEREAS, sufficient funds are not now available in the treasury of said County to provide for the aforesaid expenditure; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors is authorized by the provisions of Chapter 196, Laws of Mississippi of 1960, to issue negotiable bonds of the aforesaid County for the aforesaid purpose, provided that the amount of bonds so issued shall be in an amount which can be retired, principal and interest in annual installments over a term of not exceeding twenty (20) years from date of issue out of sixty-five per centum (65%) of the funds allocated to said County during the preceding fiscal year under the provisions of Section 10127, Mississippi Code, Annotated; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors, having made due investigation, now finds and determines: (a) That the funds allocated to Tishomingo County, Mississippi, during the preceding fiscal year under the provisions of Section 10127, Mississippi Code, Annotated, was Seventy Four Thousand Four Hundred Sixty One Dollars and Eighty Five cents (\$74,461.85); (b) That sixty-five per centum (65%) of the aforesaid amount is Forty Eight Thousand Four Hundred Dollars and Twenty cents (\$48,400.20); (c) That the amount required to retire the bonds hereinafter proposed to be issued, principal and interest, in annual installments over a term of 20 yrs. (20) years from date of issue is estimated to be Forty Seven Thousand Dollars (\$47,000.00), and does not exceed sixty-five per centum (65%) of the funds allocated to said County during the preceding fiscal year, as aforesaid; and

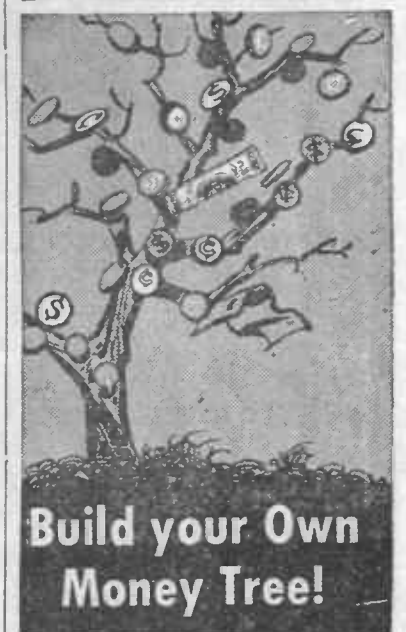

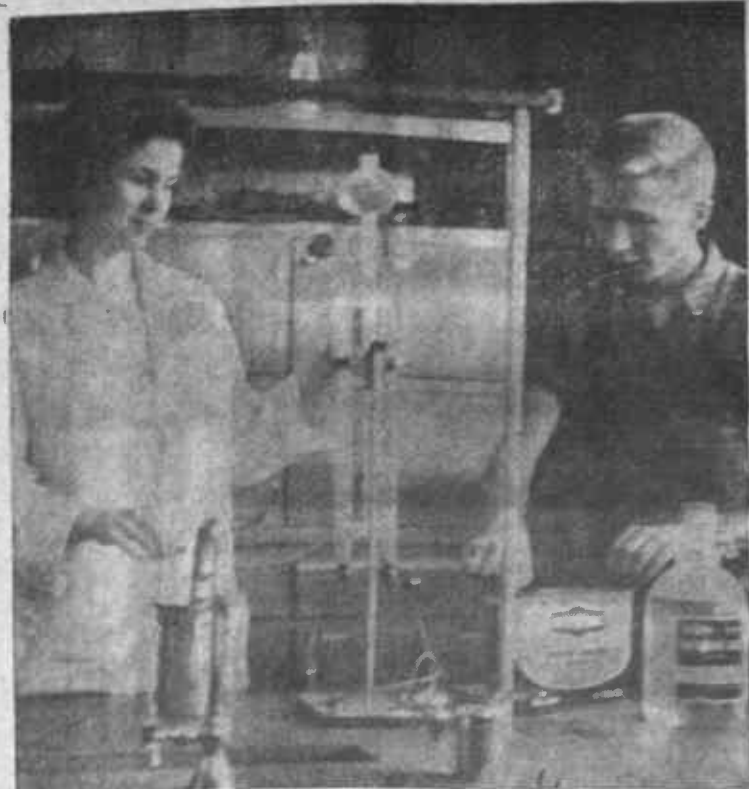

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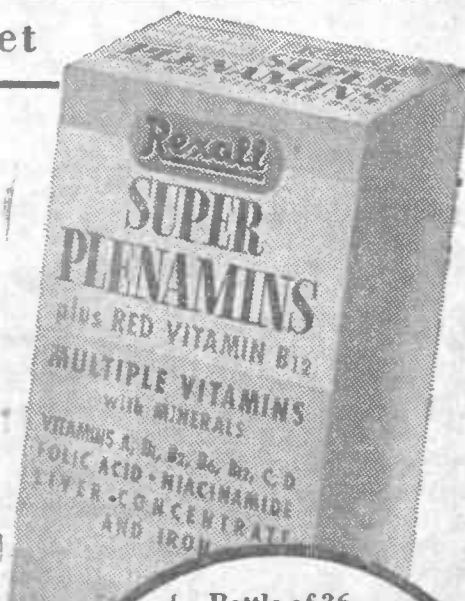
