County Agent's Notes

Cotton
Although our cotton is late, it will make our plans now to press. Apply enough additional nitrogen to make a total of 80 pounds of nitrogen in the soil. For example, if you placed 500 pounds of mixed fertilizer on the seedbed, you would need to add 30 pounds of nitrogen to the cotton. Sidedress with more pounds as soon as possible.

Place the fertilizer applicator 6 to eight inches from the drill of cotton, and not more than 10 inches from the cotton. Place the fertilizer six to eight inches deep. The nitrogen should be below the regular depth of cultivation and next to moist soil.

What about lay-by chemicals? It should pay off big! You save three to five cultivations. You should not have grassy seed cotton.

where you plan to plant legumes, small grains, or winter grazing crops.

Pasture Management

The best management aid to summer pastures is to have at least four pasture areas. In this way an area can be grazed a week then rested for three weeks before grazing it again.

Watch out for overgrazing. If pastures are seriously overgrazed this month and a drought comes, the grass will not come back until it rains a lot.

Weed Control

There are three weeds that should be controlled on pastures by either clipping or spraying in June. They are bitter weed, goat weed and cypress weed. All three can be controlled with 2,4-D. For bitter weed and goat weed control, spray with one pound of 2,4-D per acre. Use 1½ pounds of 2,4-D on cypress weed. The main precaution farmers have to take when using 2,4-D on pastures is spraying near cotton or soybeans. Tell your farmers to use a low pressure when the wind is blowing much and don't spray right up to the edge of a cotton or soybean field. Many farmers are asking if livestock have to be moved when spraying a pasture with 2,4-D. No, 2,4-D is a hormone—not a poison.

Grain Sorghum for Silage or Grain

Grain sorghum for either grain or silage can be planted all through June and get good results. Apply all fertilizer at planting rather than putting part and holding the rest for side dressing. It is getting late to plant corn. Grain sorghum will normally do better than corn planted late.

Safety

School is out! This means added dangers. Swimming season is here. Make sure that your farm pond does not add to the ever present danger of summertime.

Make sure that your farm pond swim, that they never swim alone, and that lifesaving equipment is on hand at the pond at all times.

Countians Receive \$54,105 Monthly In SS Payments

Tishomingo County residents are receiving \$54,105 each month in social security payments, according to Hugh Tigrett, Manager of the Tupelo Social Security District Office. This amounts to an annual payment of \$649,260 and is approximately 19% more than was being paid 12 months ago. Mr. Tigrett pointed out that there are 15 million people in the United States receiving social security benefits each month. In the State of Mississippi there are 159,103 persons receiving annual payments totaling \$86,608,116. While the increase in payments in Tishomingo County during the past 12 months was substantial,

Tigrett said that there are people living in this county who could qualify for benefits if they applied for them. For the convenience of the residents of this county, a representative from the Tupelo District Office visits the City Hall in Iuka each Monday afternoon.

Miss. Assists Veterans In Purchasing Farms And Homes With Low-Cost Loans

Dr. S. K. Ward, Executive Director, stated that the Mississippi Veterans' Farm and Home Board, established in 1946, has assisted more than 6800 eligible Mississippi veterans to become home owners.

The program was established in 1946 to help veterans, if local financing was not available, to purchase modest farms and homes. A total of ten million dollars was appropriated by the State, and this constitutes a revolving fund for new loans. Approximately thirty-one million dollars has been lent for the purchases since the inception of the program.

Dr. Ward stated that there is no limit on the cost of the property to be financed by the Board, but the loan is limited to seven thousand dollars. To be eligible for this loan, a veteran must have served at least ninety days in the war-time periods of World War I, World War II, or the Korean War. If he or she served less than ninety days, he must have been discharged because of physical reasons. The veteran also must have been a resident of Mississippi at least two years immediately preceding the date of his application.

World War I veterans are required to pay at least twenty-five per cent of the approved purchase price of an eligible property in cash. World War II and Korean veterans are required to use their Veterans Administration Government Issue Loan Guaranty, and if guaranty is available, down payments are reduced materially by the Board, ranging from a minimum of five per cent of the purchase.

The mortgage bears interest at whatever rate is established by the Veterans Administration for G.I. Loans. At this time the rate is five and one-fourth percent. The term of the loan ranges from a maximum of twenty years.

Information regarding the program may be obtained from the local veterans' service officer, county agricultural agent, or by contacting the State office in Jackson, Miss.

LET'S TALK MISSISSIPPI

The first warship to be by an electrically driven mine was the ironclad Cairo.

During the autumn of the Confederate naval ties operating on the River had planted a mine of torpedoes (mines) in the lower reaches. On Dec. 12 a Union naval force commanded by Commander Thomas Yazoo, Selfridge's mission to clear the torpedoes from the river, and shell the Confederate defenses at Drum Bluff.

A short distance below son Blake's lower place (about two miles below Highway #61 bridge) struck two torpedoes in about 15 minutes. Cairo was partially raised in September, 1900.

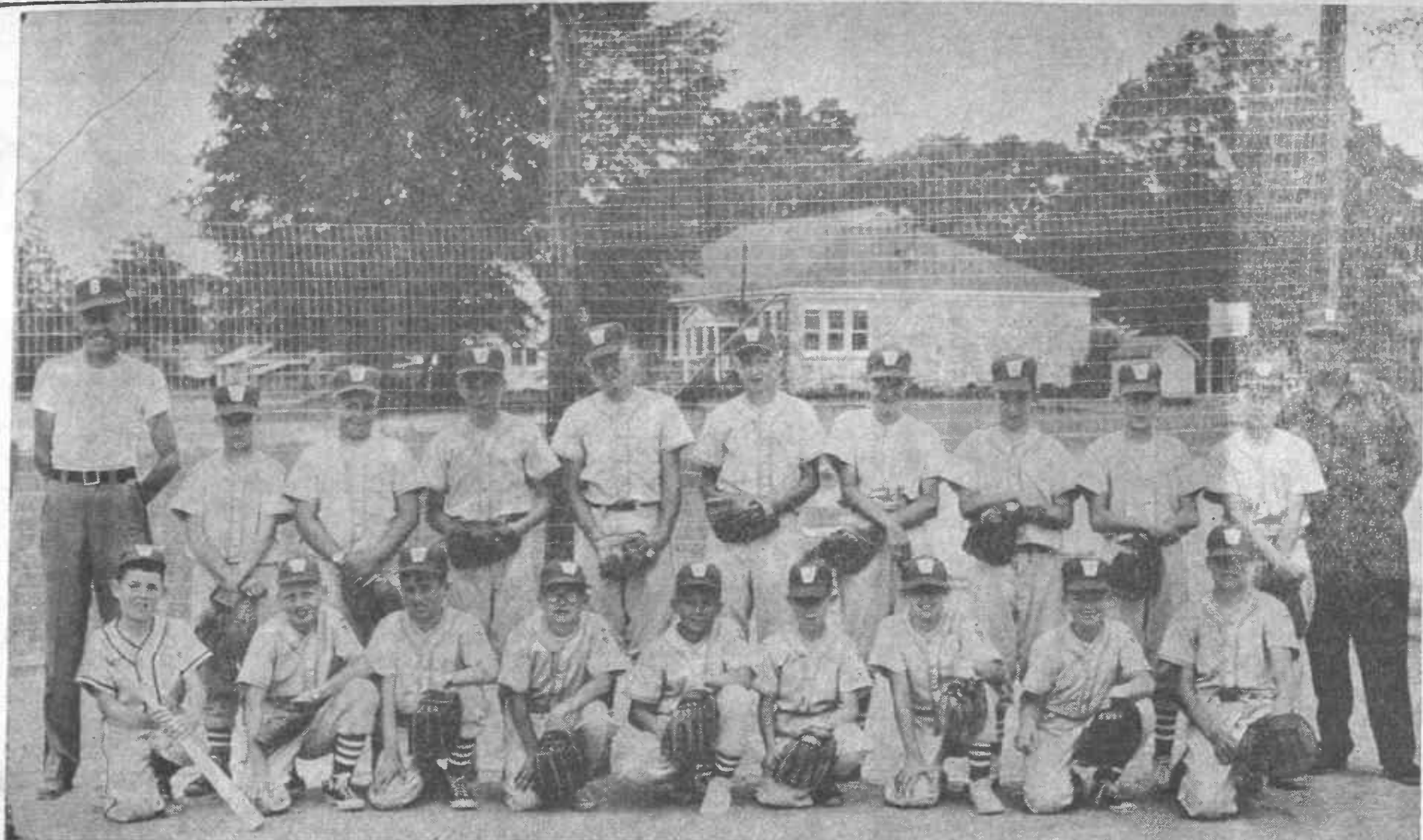

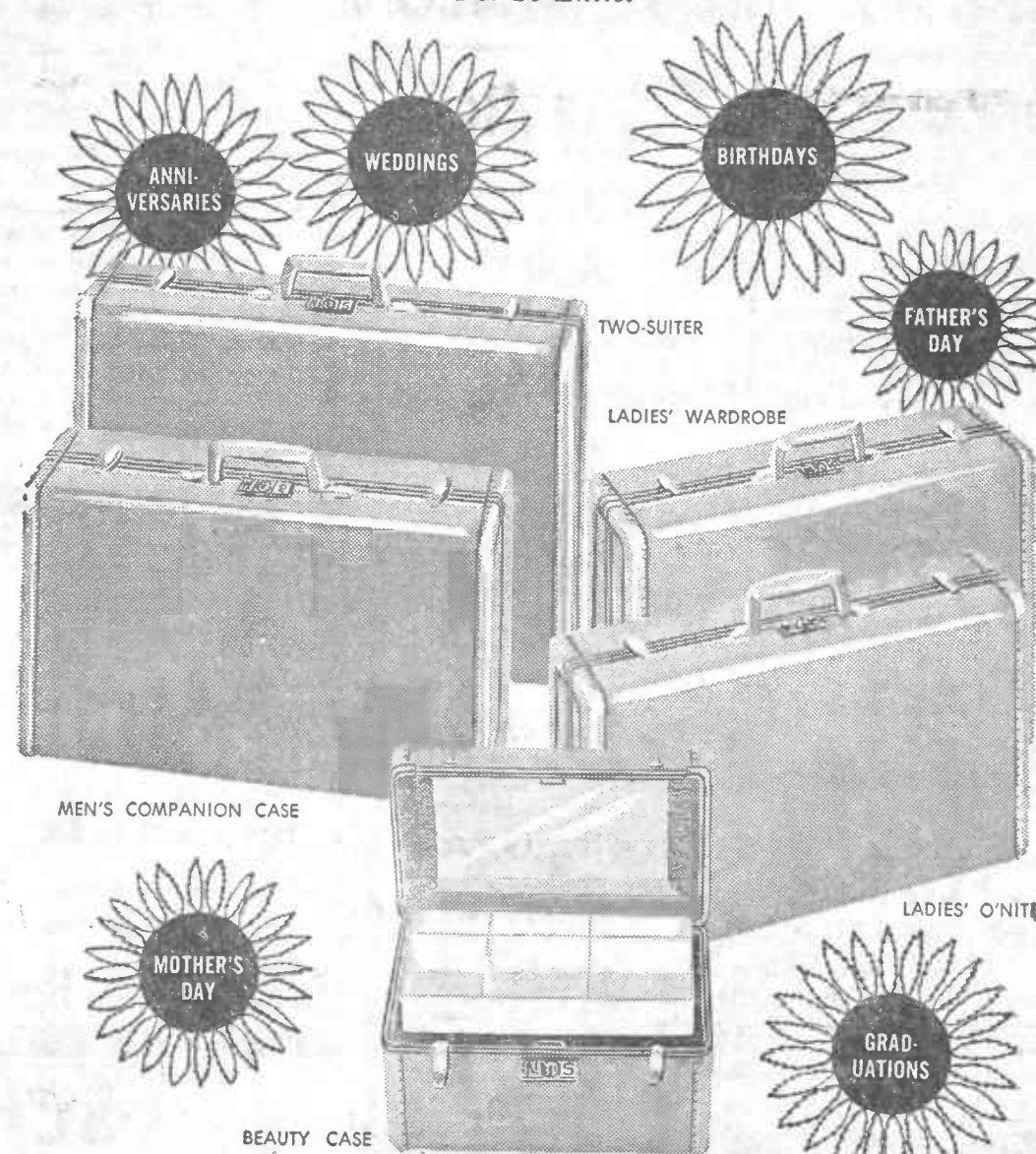

Longer Day Scheduled For Classes At NEMJC Beginning In September

The Board of Trustees of the Northeast Mississippi Junior College, Booneville, has authorized the extension of the college day classes by approximately two hours.

The college has operated on a nine o'clock to two o'clock schedule since the college was organized in 1948 and was the only junior college in Mississippi to operate on a short day schedule. The new schedule, to be placed in effect for the 1961-62 school year, beginning in September, will run from 8:30 to approximately 3:00 o'clock.

Need for the change to a longer class day has been made imminent by the steady increase in enrollment at Northeast over the past few years and the continued growth of the number of activities desired by the student body of the college.

An added move made necessary by the longer school day was the authorization of a transportation system to be independent of the county public school transportation facilities. Effective in September, there will be twelve buses assigned to transport students to the college. Alcorn Tippah, Tishomingo and Union counties will each be served by three buses and these buses, will, in turn, pick up and transport the Prentiss county transported into the college.

The present private bus contracts now in effect will not be affected by this change and one additional bus was assigned to each of the four counties surrounding Prentiss County. There are no private contract drivers employed in Prentiss county at the present.

Additional buses will be furnished by the college and operated on a cost basis. Many advantages will be gained by the students with the longer class day and allow the students to spend more time on the campus.

The longer class day will allow the students to have more availability to the library, a much better schedule from which to choose their classes and will provide them with additional time in which to participate in extra-curricular activities.

Earl F. Hargett, president of the Northeast Miss. Junior College, stated that he believed the extension of the day schedule will contribute to the steady growth and advancement of Northeast as an institution of higher education. He complimented the members of the Board of Trustees in extending the daily schedule so that additional valuable educational opportunities may be provided to the college students from the Northeast Miss. area.
