in the authorization.

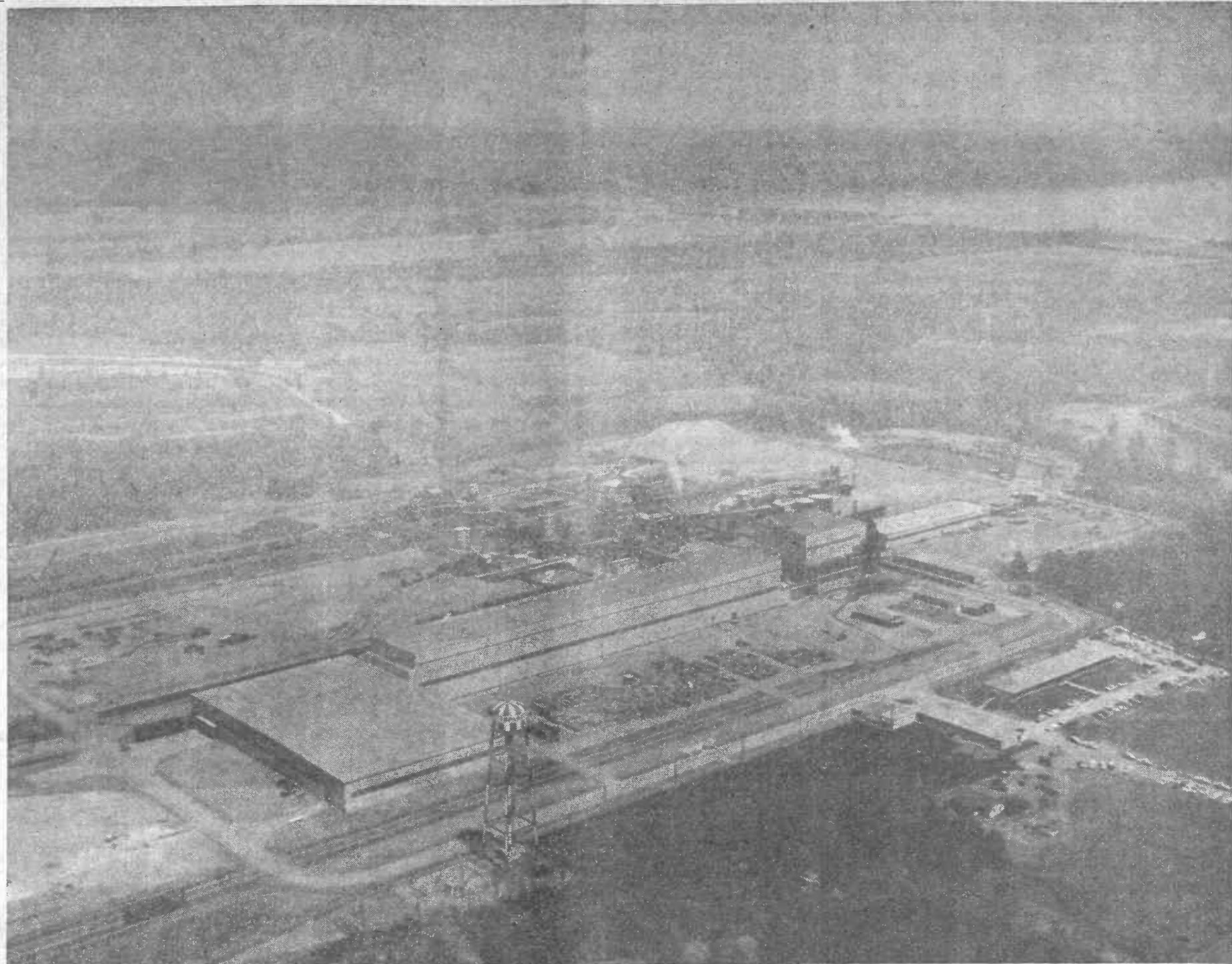
The charter sets forth that 100

corporation begins operation.

Shares are listed at \$50 par
value per share.

Life of the Iuka Country Club
corporation is for 99 years. The
other two corporations were cre-
ated for the same length of time.

Mill officials were hosts to more than three hundred persons at a barbecue luncheon and tour of the plant as part of the dedication program. Among these were top TVA officials, chief of whom was Gen. Herbert Vogel,

chairman of the TVA board; community leaders from North Mississippi, Alabama, and from Tennessee; newspaper, radio and TV representatives, and business leaders from the area. The huge industry will furnish an eight-million dollar annual economic boost to the Tri-state area. In addition it will spend seven-million dollars for chemicals and transportation services. The plant employs 350 persons and will have an annual payroll of two-million dollars. Citizens of Mississippi are invited to tour this huge plant on Wednesday, June 21.

Retired Farmer Of Paden Hospitalized With Injuries

Charlie Paden, retired farmer
of Paden, was injured in an acci-
dent involving his pick up truck
and a gravel truck driven by Hoyt
Wade, about 21, Saturday morning
at 10:45 near the Paden intersec-
tion on highway 25-S. Mr. Paden
about 70, was taken to Tupelo hos-
pital where his condition was list-
ed as fair. The driver of the gravel
truck was not injured.

The accident occurred when the
truck driven by Wade was at-
tempting to pass the pick up truck
driven by Mr. Paden. The Paden
truck, attempting a left turn, was
struck by the loaded gravel truck
and both vehicles left the road,
landing in a field with the gravel
truck on top of the pick up. Mr.
Paden was pinned in the cab of his
truck about 45 minutes before be-
ing rescued. Wreckers were called
to the scene to lift the gravel
truck off the pick up.

Mr. Wade was driving the truck
for Worsham Bros. Construction
Co. of Corinth. The truck was
privately owned. The accident was
investigated by Deputy Sheriff
Aubrey Patterson of Tishomingo
county and State Highway Patrol-
man "Zeke" Clark of Belmont.

Iuka Man Drowns In Farm Pond

John C. Noble Loses Life While Swimming With Children

John Clinton Nobles, age 45, of
route 3, Iuka, drowned while swim-
ming in a farm pond near his
home Sunday afternoon. With him
at the time of the tragedy were
one of his sons, Robert, 12, and
two neighbor boys, Melvin Pound-
ers, about 15, and another Pound-
ers boy about 13. Mr. Nobles
was reportedly going to teach his
son, Robert, to swim. The boy,
however, had not gone into the

water when his father went down
a short distance from the pond's
edge. The older Pounders boy,
Melvin, was reportedly swimming
in the pond at the time.

A coroner's inquest Monday
night ruled the tragedy accidental
death by drowning.

Mr. Nobles was a life-long resi-
dent of Iuka. He was a veteran of
World War II.

Funeral services were con-
ducted Tuesday afternoon at Mt. Ever-
green with Bro. J. D. Joslin and
Bro. Elbert Kenaum officiating.
Burial was in Toe Nail cemetery.
Cutshall of Iuka was in charge of
arrangements.

**Public Invited To
Inspect TRP&CO
Plant At Counce**

The new Tennessee River Pulp
and Paper Company kraft liner-
board mill located at Counce, Ten-
nessee, will be open to the public
from 12:30 p.m. until 4:00 p.m.
on June 20, 21 and 22, according
to E. M. Leavitt, vice president
and resident manager.

"We are looking forward to hav-
ing our neighbors in this area
tour the new mill," he said. "To
more evenly distribute the crowds
attending the Open House pro-
grams, we are requesting that
guests from particular areas come
on specified days:

Citizens of Hardin County, Ten-
nessee, are asked to come on June
20;

Citizens of Mississippi are ask-
ed to come on June 21;
and citizens of other Tennessee
counties, from Alabama and other
areas desiring to tour the mill
are asked to come on June 22.

Mr. Leavitt said that for rea-
sons of safety, only children ten
years of age and older will be per-
mitted to tour the mill.

The mill is located on highway
57 near Pickwick Dam at Counce.
Markers will be displayed to aid
visitors in reaching the plant.

TVA, state officials, legislators
and community officials and lead-
ers from Tennessee, Northeast
Mississippi and Western Alabama,
toured the plant on Tuesday, June
13, and were guests of the mill of-
ficials at a barbecue luncheon pre-
ceding the tour. Mr. Leavitt told
the group that "with an annual
payroll of \$2 million and a pulp-
wood purchasing program of \$6
million, we believe this new plant
will add markedly to the growth
and economy of this area."

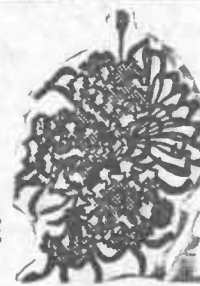

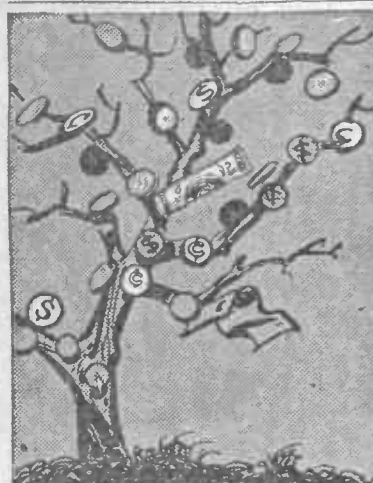

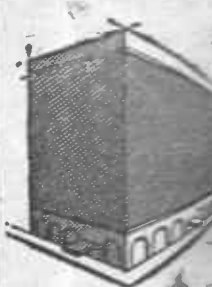

Rutledge-Salem Church Nears Completion By Volunteer Workers

Rutledge-Salem Methodist church, which has been under construction for several months by volunteer help of members and friends of the church and community, is nearing completion.

The church goes back to the days of Tishomingo when at least three buildings were built one time or another on the site of the church. From time to time the church has been burned and from time to time rebuilt.

The first church here in the 1860's. This log building, was replaced in 1880 by the building which is the background for the picture. This in turn is being replaced by the new church building of stone and concrete. The interior will be finished. Work on the exterior is to be done.

The Battle of Iuka, which is the Corinth campaign, a skirmish between Union and Confederate forces took place on the present site of the church.

Money and materials for the new building have been donated by those who are pictured in the photograph above.

The late C. R. Stephens, who was a member of the school at the time the church was made.

Stephens' death last year, Rev. John Stephens, who was a member of the church, turned over the building fund, which was Mr. Stephens' money.

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from working have not applied for social security benefits, according to High Tigrett, district manager. Workers who have been disabled for a long period and who do not apply for their disability benefits before June 30, 1961, may lose their right to this benefit, old-age benefits for themselves and their dependents, and benefits for survivors in the event of their death.

Disability benefits were first payable in July, 1957. Since then about 700,000 people have begun receiving payments of approximately fifty million dollars monthly. In Tishomingo county about 75 people receive approximately \$5,000.00 monthly. It is very significant that people are taking advantage of their rights to receive their social security disability payments. However, Mr. Tigrett states that there are people in this county who have not yet taken advantage of this program. These people should do so immediately by contacting the representative of the Social Security Office at the City Hall in Iuka. The dates the representative will be in Iuka for June are June 12th, 19th, and 26th.

There is no age requirement for disability benefits. The change made in 1960 removing age 50 as a requirement leaves only 2 requirements. These are (1) Five years social security credits in the ten year period before becoming disabled, and (2) The disability must be one that keeps a person from doing any substantial amount of work. If you meet these requirements, be sure to contact the social security representative before June 30th.

State Traffic Study Made By Highway Dept.

Almost one of three automobiles traveling highways and city streets of Mississippi last year were from out of state, according to a traffic analysis just compiled by the State Highway Department.

Total traffic for the year amounted to 7.2 billion vehicle miles, 73.5 per cent of which was accounted for by passenger cars. Total traffic was up 2-million miles over the previous year.

The Highway Department maintains a constant study of traffic for use by Department engineers and the Bureau of Public Roads in planning future highway improvements. Mechanical counters,

supplemented by mobile crews, record information on numbers of vehicles, types, weights and speeds.

Some interesting facts disclosed by the 1960 report include:

Out of state cars, 32.34 per cent; compacts, 3.63 per cent; foreign, 2.15 per cent; average number of passengers, rural 2.2; urban 1.8; Average automobile speeds, rural 49.7 miles per hour; urban 41.1 miles per hour.

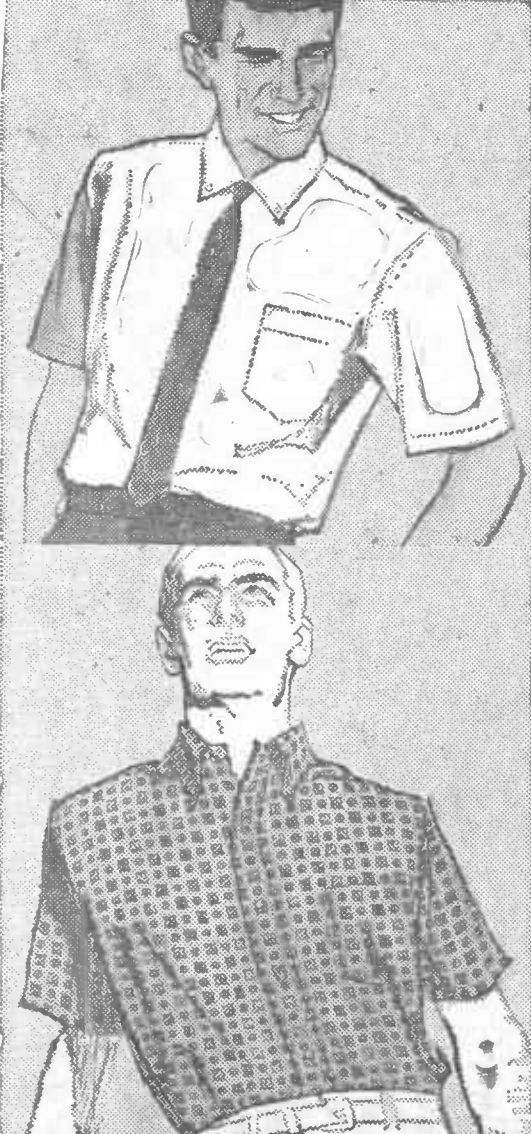

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Forestry Bank Set To Help Landowners

Mississippi's Forestry Bank—a new state agency created by the 1960 Legislature—was established to help landowners with funds for treeplanting and timberland improvement. This is the first column in a five-part series of questions and answers about the Forestry Bank.

- THE FORESTRY BANK**
- 1. What is the Forestry Bank?**
The Forestry Bank was created by the 1960 Legislature to give long-term financial assistance to landowners who desire to grow trees or improve existing timberlands.
- 2. Where is the Forestry Bank office located?**
The Forestry Bank is located in Room 209 of the Southern Farm Bureau Life Insurance Company Building, corner of Amite and President streets in Jackson.
- 3. Who is the Executive Director?**
The executive director is Russell E. Hobgood, who was appointed by the Trustees to actively manage the Forestry Bank program.
- 4. Who are the Trustees?**
Governor Ross Barnett is chairman of the Board of Trustees; Jim Files of Jackson is vice chairman. Other trustees include Mims Berry, New Hebron; Bobby Burress, Booneville; Tom Campbell, Yazoo City; James R. Clark, Crosby; Lamont Griffith, Prentiss; Ross Ingram, Water Valley; Cliff Marlin, State Forester; and C. C. Williams, Quitman.
- 5. Why was the Forestry Bank established?**
There are approximately 6-million acres of idle land in Mississippi, which could be put to use in growing trees. At present, Mississippi people receive approximately \$350-million each year in personal income from the sale of timber and timber products. Yet, we have the potential for making our timber industry produce \$1-billion a year in personal income—three times what it is today. It is hoped that the Forestry Bank will stimulate this growth of Mississippi's economic development by providing long-term financing opportunities to landowners.
- 6. Who will benefit from the Forestry Bank program?**
Everyone in Mississippi will benefit. The Forestry Bank will remove other barriers from timber sales—plus having the opportunity to learn from firsthand experience how to apply good forestry practices to his land while it is managed by the Forestry Commission. More timber resources will produce raw material for industry.

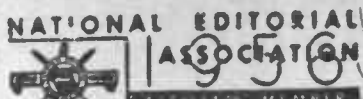

Forestry Notes

There are many farmers and small land owners in Tishomingo county whose timberland acres are not producing to their full potential. These people realize that their

timberlands should be managed in a different manner in order to insure the owner a continuous income. Seedlings should be planted on idle acres and control measures need to be taken on undesirable competing hardwoods. The main obstacle preventing landowners from carrying out these necessary practices is usually a lack

of money or credit.

The Forestry Bank Act of 1960 was passed for the purpose of helping land owners in every part of Mississippi expand timber resources and develop this resource to its full potential. It is believed that this can be accomplished under this program of financial help plus good timber management.

Under the Forestry Bank program the land owner will lease his timber (not his land) to the Forestry Commission for a period of not less than 10 years nor more than 20 years. A forest management plan will be made for the area and all work will be carried out by the Commission or under its supervision according to the provisions of the plan of management.

A land owner may obtain \$500 for development costs in ACP cost-sharing assistance if used or up to \$1500 without using ACP assistance.

This money can be repaid on a monthly or yearly basis or the landowner can make arrangements to have the money repaid from timber sales. There will be a service charge on the money used not to exceed 5 per cent.

The land owner may receive personal income from the sale of his timber as soon as all development costs and service charges are repaid.

County Agent's Notes

Cotton

The weather we have experienced the past few weeks has made out cotton get off to a slow start. We have received many calls the last few days about cotton dying.

The real cool weather with a little frost the last few days of May did most of the damage. The frost bite didn't show up too much until the rain and hot sunshine came. I believe that in most fields the stand will not be effected enough to cut down on the yield this fall.

All fields that have not been poisoned have a very heavy infestation of thrips which is holding back the growth. Two applications of an insecticide should be applied for thrip control.

Livestock Notes

Livestock is big business in Mississippi. Last year the income from livestock and livestock products for the entire state was an estimated \$252 million. Beef

cattle alone brought in an estimated \$120 million. . . . second only to cotton as a cash enterprise.

The livestock business in Mississippi is a growing part of the state's economy, but it needs improving.

The first step is to improve quality of animal. The value per head of Mississippi cattle at the first of the year was \$89. For the nation as a whole, the value per head was \$136. Mississippi cattle were low for the southeastern region.

We also need a better calf crop. The state's calf crop percentage is estimated at 72 per cent compared with 86 per cent for the nation as a whole.

If these two items were only increased to the national average, income would be increased tremendously.

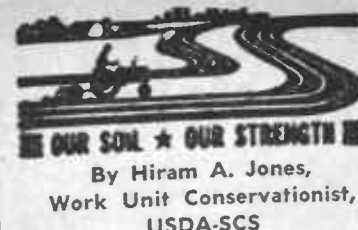
Lay-By Treatment for Corn

Late weeds cause a lot of trouble in corn. One half pound of amine 2,4-D per acre will control most of the late weeds. This is one pint of 4-pound-per-gallon 2,4-D to the acre. Use at least 10 gallons of water.

At lay-by time use drop nozzles or flooding type nozzles to avoid damage to the corn.

If broadleaf weeds are a problem before corn is 12 inches high, spray broadcast over the corn with one-half pound of 2,4-D.

Avoid injury to nearby cotton by: Don't spray when wind is blowing. Use low pressure, just enough to break the spray into droplets that give uniform coverage. Leave several border rows where corn field joins cotton field. Use quick cutoff in turning near cotton. Use at least 10 gallons of water per acre.



How Dry I Am ... Nobody Seems To Give ...

Someone does care how dry you are. Plants must have water along with the other elements to produce and grow as they should.

If your crops are not suffering from drought now, there have been years and seasons when they did. The Commissioners of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District stress the importance of conserving all our natural resources. The best place to conserve and store water is in the soil. By increasing the amount of plant residue (humus) in the soil you increase its water holding capacity.

A thick stand of loblolly pines will trap and hold an enormous amount of water per acre. Our forests are our best reservoirs of soil water. Next in efficiency are heavy grass sods. The trees and the grass break the force of falling raindrops and hold them on the land until they are soaked up. Stalks and vegetative litter turned into the top inches of soil in the spring absorbs and holds ground water.

Have you ever dropped a hot biscuit into a plate of brown ham gravy? Try it and see how fast the biscuit soaks up the gravy. The gravy is in the biscuit and you can eat it as fast or as slowly as you wish. So it is with plants

and soil water. Plants need soil water to use as fast or as slowly as required.

Man cannot control nature, but the man who works with nature may have the most water when it is needed. How dry you are may depend on you!

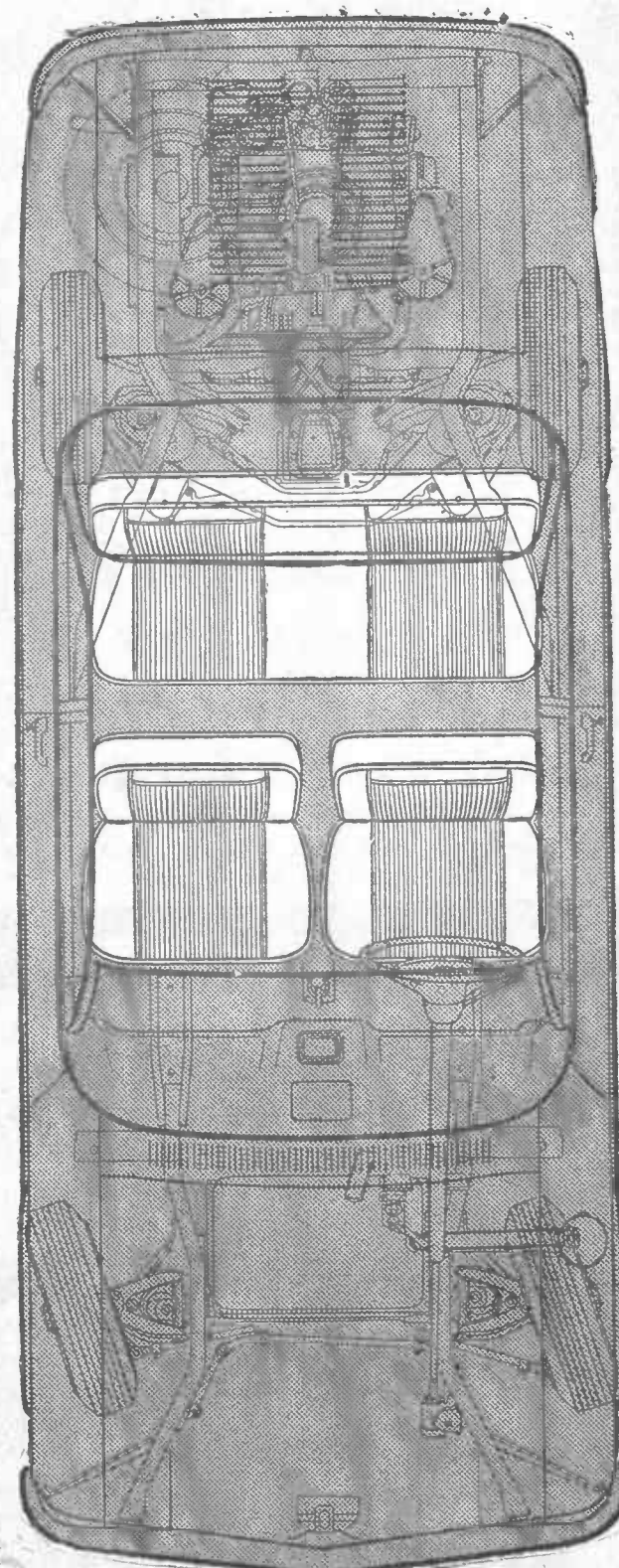
