**Two-Day Camp Will Be
Conducted By Pirates

The World Champion Pittsburgh Pirates will conduct a two-day tryout camp at Coffee Field in Florence, Ala., on Tuesday, July 4, and Wednesday, July 5.

Boys in the Northeast Mississippi area, especially those in the area of Corinth area, are invited to participate.

The camp will be under the direction of George Zuraw, Pirates' training supervisor for the Florida and Alabama territory.

The camp will be assisted by Jim Burns, Noto, and Buck Rolman.

Last year, the Pirates had 120 boys attend their Florence camp. The camp was designed by Billy Weaver of Florence who is now playing in the Sophomore League with the leading Hobbs, New Mexico.

Boys attending this year's camp should report ready to go at 8 a.m. and be prepared to work until 2 p.m.

Boys must be 16 years of age to be eligible to attend the camp, and no Junior American League players will be permitted to participate in the camp if such participation would interfere with their league activities. Such participation will only be permitted with the approval of either the league coach or the Commandant of the Legion Post he represents.

Boys are also expected to furnish their own shoes, uniforms, etc., with the Pirates furnishing all other equipment. Play will also be responsible for traveling and living expenses, and with the understanding that all expenses will be reimbursed to those players signed to contracts with the Pittsburgh organization.

Water Safety Will Be Enforced

**Sheriff's Patrol Boat
Will Operate On Lake;
Wardens Will Cooperate**

Water safety regulations will be strictly enforced on the lakes and streams in the county, according to an announcement made by Sheriff C. L. Pace, Jr.

An agreement has been worked out with the Tishomingo county Game and Fish wardens whereby rules of water safety and other regulations regarding use of the lakes and streams will be enforced by both the Game commission and the sheriff's office.

A sheriff's patrol boat will operate on Pickwick lake and tributary streams on the Mississippi side, Mr. Pace stated. The patrol boat will be plainly marked. The primary purpose of the patrol is to see that water safety rules are observed by swimmers, water skiers, fishermen and boaters.

All boats operating on the lake are required to have tags similar to auto inspection tags. The numbers must be displayed in plain sight on the boat.

Everyone who uses the lakes for recreation or for fishing are urged to adhere to rules regulating water sports and boating. "Needless tragedies may be avoided by simply observing safety rules on the water," Sheriff Pace said.

Tombigbee Flood Control Discussed

**Ways And Means To
Raise Funds For Plan
Studied By Group**

Ways and means to raise 14 million dollars for part of the Tombigbee flood control program was the subject of a meeting in Tupelo attended by supervisors from 10 northeast Mississippi counties June 13.

Supervisors from Tishomingo, Alcorn, Prentiss, Lee, Itawamba, Monroe, Pontotoc, Clay, Lowndes and Nuxabee counties were told by the executive vice president of the Miss. Ports and Rivers Commission, Paul Comola, that their counties would have to raise \$1,400,000 before an advance of \$27-million dollars would be made by the Federal Government.

It was pointed out to the group that flood control work must be done before progress can be made toward construction of the Tennessee Tombigbee Canal. This project has been under study for many years following a compact between Tennessee, Mississippi, and Alabama for promotion of the waterway.

Eddie Khyat of Pascagoula, a Jackson County Supervisor was the principal speaker. He told the assembled supervisors, government officials and businessmen at the meeting that if immediate steps were not taken to complete the Tombigbee Waterway, Alabama would take unilateral action to build a canal linking the Warrior river to the Tennessee.

By a standing vote at the conclusion of the meeting, the supervisors voiced approval of the project and asked the Tombigbee Valley Authority to work out an equitable assessment for each county and report its findings at a meeting to be called later.

Those attending the June 13 meeting from Tishomingo county were Supervisors Herbert Biggs, Lunceford Stormont; State Rep. O. L. Wade, Russell Bonds and J. O. (Click) Clark, Carlton Woodley and E. C. Holtzford.

Vehicle Inspection Deadline

**Motorists Warned
Of Penalties Liable
After July 1**

June 30 is an especially important date to remember. It is the deadline for having your car inspected under the new Motor Vehicle Inspection Law. At the present there are about 300,000 Mississippians who still have not had their cars checked. With less than three weeks left in which to get the vehicles inspected there will be a big rush right up until the last day.

R. L. Morgan, director of Motor Vehicle Inspection, stated that the inspection program has been progressing very well but that many people will be without inspection stickers if they don't submit their cars pretty soon.

Beginning the first day of July motorists will begin enforcing the inspection law. Any motorist using the roads of the state who does not have a current valid inspection sticker for his vehicle will be liable for a fine of up to \$50.00 or up to six months in jail or both. The only vehicles not required to have stickers are vehicles that do not normally use the highways and some farm vehicles.

Commissioner of Public Safety T. B. Birdsong, in commenting on the law said, "The law is not designed to put any cars off the roads but to insure that all vehicles using our Mississippi highways are in safe operating condition. This will insure a reduction in accidents and a saving of lives and reduction of property damage from automobile accidents." The Commissioner added, "There will be no extension of the inspection period. There has been ample notification to the public and plenty of time for everyone to have their vehicles inspected," he concluded.

Month; Two Whiskey Stills Destroyed**

Two Stills Destroyed
Two whiskey stills were destroyed within the past two weeks by Sheriff Pace and county law enforcement officers. One was a 500-gallon still and the other a 60-gallon operation. All equipment at the stills was smashed. They were located in the eastern part of the 4th district near the Mississippi line, Mr. Pace reported.

Local Arrests Number 162
Law enforcement in Tishomingo county and in Iuka has kept officers pretty busy during the past 30 days. The sheriff's office, in co-operation with the Mississippi Highway Patrol and the Iuka city police have recorded 162 arrests during the latter part of May and up to the past week end.

Drunkenness and disorderly conduct accounted for 105 of the arrests. Fourteen were arrested on driving-while drunk charges; the next highest number, ten, were arrested for driving with improper tags; eight were arrested and held for another state; six were charged with possession of whiskey and five were arrested on charges of burglary.

Disturbing the peace brought arrest to three and two each were arrested on the following charges: forgery, child desertion, assault and battery, trespassing; one each was arrested on charges of larceny, false pretense, driving while license was revoked.

Sheriff C. L. Pace, Jr., reports the solution of several burglaries of lakeside cabins in recent weeks. The most recent was the burglary of the cabin owned by R. A. Trippier of Memphis.

The cabin, located on the north side of Sandy Creek adjacent to the Tennessee state line was entered and four valuable guns were stolen sometime in May. Sheriff Pace and his deputies arrested three men in connection with the burglary when the guns were recovered in an old outbuilding in McNairy County, Tenn. The men, arrested last week, were Gary Terry and C. A. White of Hamburg, Tenn., and J. L. Torrence of Corinth.

The three men were arraigned in Justice of the Peace Court in Iuka and bond was set at \$5000 each. The men, who admitted the burglary, each posted bond to await action of the Grand Jury in August.

Immediately after posting bond on the charges in Tishomingo county, the men were released to Tennessee law enforcement officials.

Bus Drivers' Schools Scheduled This Week & Next

School bus drivers in Iuka and the county will go to school three days this week and three days next week. The purpose is to bring drivers' cards up to date and otherwise qualify drivers for the coming school year, County School Supt. J. R. Long stated.

The first school opens Thursday (today) at 8:30 a.m. at the Iuka School. Drivers for Iuka and Burnsville schools will attend these sessions which will run through Wednesday.

The second school will be held June 26-28 at Tishomingo school. All drivers for the Belmont and Tishomingo areas will attend that school. Sessions will begin at 8:30 each morning.

All substitute drivers, new drivers, and all old drivers whose cards are not up to date are expected to take the courses. All school bus drivers must hold driver training certificates not more than two years old.

The driver training schools will be taught by Dean E. K. Knight of Northeast Mississippi Junior College.

Dairy Industry In Tishomingo County

Since June is National Dairy month, it is good that we review the history of the dairy industry in Tishomingo County. The Grade A dairy industry was initiated in this county in the early part of 1949. In 1947, grade A plant in Alcorn County began the first Grade A milk could not be found Grade A milk route in this county. Before that date a bottle of Grade A milk could not be found in Tishomingo county.

In the early part of 1949 some of the progressive farmers along with some of the far-sighted businessmen in this county decided that it was high time for a grade A milk program to be started here.

Milk was already known to be the most perfect food, so why not give the people of this county an opportunity to purchase this product from grade A dairies produced in this county. In addition to giving the people of the county a grade A product for the protection of their health, it would also add greatly to the economic progress of the county. This was the reasoning that prompted the beginning of the grade A milk program in this county.

A pasteurization plant was constructed in Iuka which was supplied at first by only two grade A raw dairies. Only about 40 to 50 gallons of milk a day were processed. From this small beginning the grade A industry has steadily grown from year to year until

today 800 to 900 gallons are processed daily. There are now 16 raw-to-plant producers in this county supplying the raw product to the plant.

All of these raw dairies along with the plant are under the close supervision of your local Health Department. Regular inspections are made by the Sanitarian of all raw dairies along with the plant to see that all regulations governing the production and sale of grade A milk is complied with on a day-to-day basis. In addition to the physical inspections of the dairies and plant, samples are taken every month from each producers' supply. Samples are also taken of all processed milk products. These samples are carried to an approved laboratory to be microscopically examined to see that they meet all standards as set up by the Mississippi State Board of Health and the U. S. Public Health Service for Grade A milk products.

In addition to the above controls, every 18 months to 2 years, the U. S. Public Health Service sends their representatives into the county to make a complete in-

spection of all dairies and plants. On these surveys the entire milk shed must make 90 per cent or above to be placed on the honor roll. The Tishomingo county milk shed has never failed to make this honor roll. In fact, this shed has always scored above 95 per cent. All the producers and the plant co-operate 100 per cent with your Health Department to maintain a milk shed that is second to none in the nation.

Yes, we are proud of the dairy industry in Tishomingo County. It has made remarkable progress in the few short years since it was started. I am sure that in the years ahead it will continue to grow and maintain the high standards that has caused it to be recognized as one of the best milk sheds in the nation.

Caution For Babies In The Home

By Helen Pruitt, P.H.N., R.N.

Babies and toddlers will put things in their mouth. It is a way the babies learn about things such as the shape, feel and taste of different articles. Many things around the home could harm the baby if taken by mouth. All of the things such as insecticides, cleaning agents and medicines could mean danger for a baby. They all should be kept out of reach for a young child.

Some of these are labeled, but of course, the children are unable to read the labels, but should be a reminder for adults to put them in a safe place where a child cannot get them. Sometimes we find things that harm children are not labeled such as:

Drugs (particularly extra-large doses of aspirin)
Kerosene
Household disinfectants
Insecticides (including moth balls)
Furniture polishes
Laundry bleaches
Turpentine
Cosmetics (including nail polish, remover and hair lotions)

Check your kitchen, bath room, bedrooms, garage, yard, attic, basement and closets and remove anything harmful off of the floors, low shelves, away from food shelves and see that they are locked.

Fruits of Faith

"I want what you have," the young man said. But this was not a stick-up. The young man was not a bandit, the older man was not rich. One was a brilliant young Brazilian, the other a Christian missionary in that country.

The young man had been the missionary's companion and helper for several months, living under severe conditions in the back country of the Amazon. In that country one does

"front." What a man is, comes out very plainly. So when the young man said "I want what you have," he knew what he meant: it was the missionary's religion, his faith. This kind of thing has been happening for a long, long time. It began with Jesus, didn't it? His friends wanted what he had, or to put it another way, they wanted to be the kind of person he was.

Dead Faith or Living?

What is it that "sells" Christianity? Why is it today the world's leading religion? A great deal of what we might call sales talk is going on all the time. But why do people buy anything? They buy on performance, not talk. The other day one of the big motor companies discontinued the manufacture of a certain automobile. This car had had wonderful sales talk; the commercials for it on TV would make you think that there was no car in its class. But the public didn't buy it. When they went to look at the car itself and try it out, and compare it, they found that if they had that much money to put on a car, they might better buy some other make. The talk was good; the performance was poor.

she was, that Joseph could continue to believe in her. "Saints" are not always old people, they may be very young. Mary deserved the title "Blessed among women" while she was still a girl. A good mother does not start being good only when her first child is born.

The Woman

Think rapidly over some things we know about Mary the woman who grew as her son grew, "in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and man." We are told that Jesus the boy was "subject" to his parents. In simple English, Jesus obeyed his mother as well as Joseph. She was a woman who knew her mind, a mother who knew how to command loyal obedience on a child's part, yet and on the part of an adolescent for Jesus was on the edge of his teens when Luke tells us he was "subject to" or "obedient to" Joseph and Mary. We have no reason to fancy that when Jesus left home to take up his own great life of obedience to God, that he had to unlearn what he had learned at home. Think over the character and attitudes and mind (so far as we can know it) of Jesus the grown Teacher and Healer. What kind of home training lay behind this? Unless we are prepared to say that Jesus' surroundings, his family, his home had no effect on him, we are bound to suppose that in Jesus' life and character we have a reflection of the influence of the mother in whose home he lived for thirty years.

The Worshipper

The last picture we have of Mary in the New Testament is one of an upper room in Jerusalem, where she was one of a great prayer-group. The one quotation we most often hear of Mary is a prayer, the "Magnificat," sung in many churches every Sunday. What people are remembered for is a key to what they are. How many people in this world are remembered, long afterwards, for their prayers? Mary was such a person. Some people can pray beautiful prayers but are not much account when a job is to be done. Others are very practical, but are merely stammerers when they talk to God. Mary the woman must have been a person whose prayers were the flower of a life of wonderful service. Praying and serving, her life was woven, like the garment she made for Jesus, "seamless throughout."

Forestry Bank Set To Help Landowners

Mississippi's Forestry Bank—a new state agency created by the 1960 Legislature—was established to help landowners with funds for treeplanting and timberstand improvement. This is the second column in a five-part series of questions and answers about the Forestry Bank.

- Q. What is a timber management plan?**
A. A management plan is a written plan for the operation of a forest property, using good forestry practices.
- Q. Why is a timber management plan necessary?**
A. Timber, properly managed, produces more income than unmanaged timber. Under proper management, Mississippi's idle acres can provide a continuing source of income for landowners. Mississippi's timber production can achieve its goal of a billion-dollar income source much faster if it develops according to good forestry practices, as set forth in well-defined management plans.
- Q. Who helps the landowner develop a timber management plan?**
A. Assistance in this will be given by a management forester from the Forestry Commission.
- Q. Who approves the timber management plan?**
A. All management plans must be approved by the Forestry Commission.
- Q. Does a landowner have to fence his timberland?**
A. As a general rule, no. Fencing will be required only if livestock graze on adjacent property, and also if fencing is required as a part of the management plan.
- Q. Can a landowner graze livestock on this land?**
A. As a general rule, no. Livestock will destroy young seedlings. Livestock may graze under controlled conditions on land where existing timber is large enough that it will not be damaged.
- Q. If there are some trees already on the land, how does a landowner determine what his land needs?**
A. This will be determined by the timber management plan as it is developed by the landowner and the management forester.
- Q. Will the Forestry Commission build fire lanes around the timber?**
A. Fire lanes will be built only if they are a part of the timber management plan.
- Q. Can a landowner develop a few acres this year in the Forestry Bank program, add a few more acres next year, and perhaps add other acres the following year?**
A. Yes. It is quite possible that the management plan may permit the development of blocks of acreage at staggered intervals. Additional acres may be developed from year to year, as long as development costs do not exceed, at any time, the maximum dollar limits established by law.
- Q. Who estimates how much money will be needed to develop a specific timber tract?**
A. This will be estimated by a management forester at the time a timber management plan is prepared.
- Q. Who does a landowner set first to get money to improve his land?**
A. The landowner must check first with a conventional financial agency in the county where he lives. Under the Forestry Bank program, it is hoped that landowners can secure forest development funds from their local financial institutions. In such instances, the Forestry Bank will insure those loans fully. The Forestry Bank is not in competition with private enterprise, but is an agency established to provide assistance whenever local sources are unable to help.
- Q. What does a landowner do if he is turned down by a conventional financial agency?**
A. In such cases, he first gets a certificate of refusal. Then his next step is to apply directly to the Forestry Bank for assistance in his timber program.
- Q. How does a landowner apply for federal funds?**
A. A landowner must apply to the local ASC County Committee in the county where the land is located and must cooperate fully with a Commission Forester and the county ASC committee to secure tree-planting and TSI assistance.

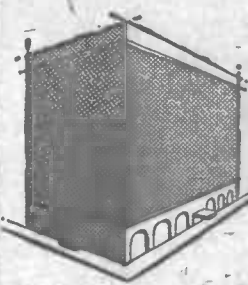

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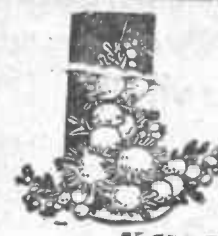

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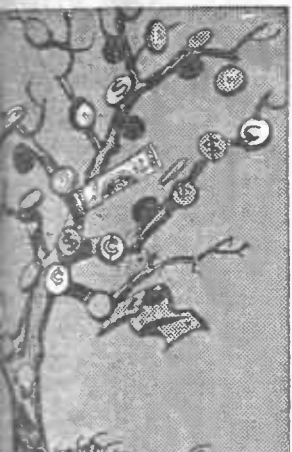

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ton to work. I have had many farmers to tell me the past week that their cotton wasn't worth poisoning. This is one mistake we are making in trying to save our cotton. The first thing we should do is give the cotton two poisonings for thrips no matter if you don't have anything but the stem left. These poisonings should be four days apart.

Scratch or plow your cotton as soon as the soil is dry enough. If you plan to sidedress, this should be done as soon as you have the cotton chopped out and plowed the first time. Put the nitrogen in the run-around furrow for best results on cotton.

You may still replant spots that have drowned out or died from other causes. You should use acid delinted seed for quick germination.

The cotton fields look ragged now, but with a few days sunshine, poisoning, and cultivation, the picture will change very fast.

County Agent's Notes

Cotton

The cotton situation has changed a little over the county the last two or three days, but is still in a poor condition for the time of year.

T. M. Waller, Cotton Specialist from Mississippi State University, spent most of the day Monday in our county inspecting cotton fields along with your local agents. Mr. Waller states that we have three major conditions here in North-east Mississippi that contribute to the poor condition of our cotton.

First, the real cool weather and frost on the night of May 27, caused frost bite on cotton which gave it a weakened condition.

Second, thrips and other cotton insects began eating and sucking on the cotton plants as soon as they came up and especially after the frost had put the plants in a still more weakened condition.

Third, many farmers place their fertilizer very shallow directly under or on the same level as their cotton seed. This practice caused the fertilizer to eat or rot the cotton stem off at the top of the ground, killing the plant.

Latest BAWI Certificate Goes to Nettleton

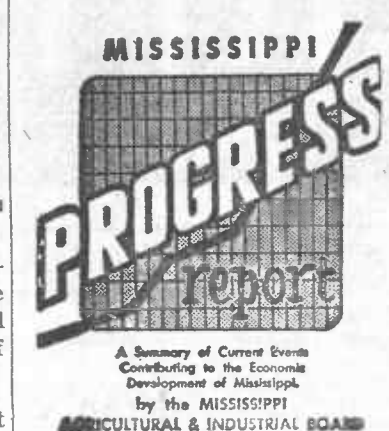

Other Industrial News Items In Brief

Governor Ross Barnett clipped a ribbon to formally open a 3500-home development in DeSoto county. The \$50,000,000 project is known as Southaven and is just south of Memphis. Dillingham Manufacturing Company at Leland will begin training employees for its furniture plant this summer.

Automotive operations in Mississippi generated nearly \$700,000,000 in business activity in 1958, and sales of automotive products and services accounted for 23 per cent of the total sales and service business in the state. The Endicott-Johnson shoe manufacturing plant at Ackerman was formally dedicated June 14. Mississippi Industries, Inc., announces formation of AMID Laboratories, Inc., in Jackson, which will manufacture and distribute prescription drugs.

River port and barge business started up in Yazoo City this month for the first time in nearly two generations when the Athens Grain Company shipped 40,000 bushels of Yazoo wheat to New Orleans from its new elevator and dockage on the Yazoo river. The 1960 pecan crop in Mississippi was estimated at 13,000,000 pounds, with a value of nearly \$4,000,000.

Mississippi To Get First Commercial Feed Lot

The Agricultural and Industrial Board has granted a certificate to the newly-organized Copiah Milling and Livestock Feeding Company for a commercial cattle feed lot — the only enterprise of its kind in the state. This lot, when completed will be a concreted area of approximately 12 acres which will accommodate up to 5,000 head of cattle at one time. The feed lot will be located near Hazlehurst and will be owned by Hazlehurst investors. An election on a \$133,000 BAWI bond issue has been scheduled for July 11. Establishment of the feed lot is the result of a study by a special committee named by Gov. Barnett to look into the feasibility of feed lots in Mississippi. Up to now, Mississippi cattle have been fattened at feed lots in other states, since no commercial lots have ever been established in Mississippi.

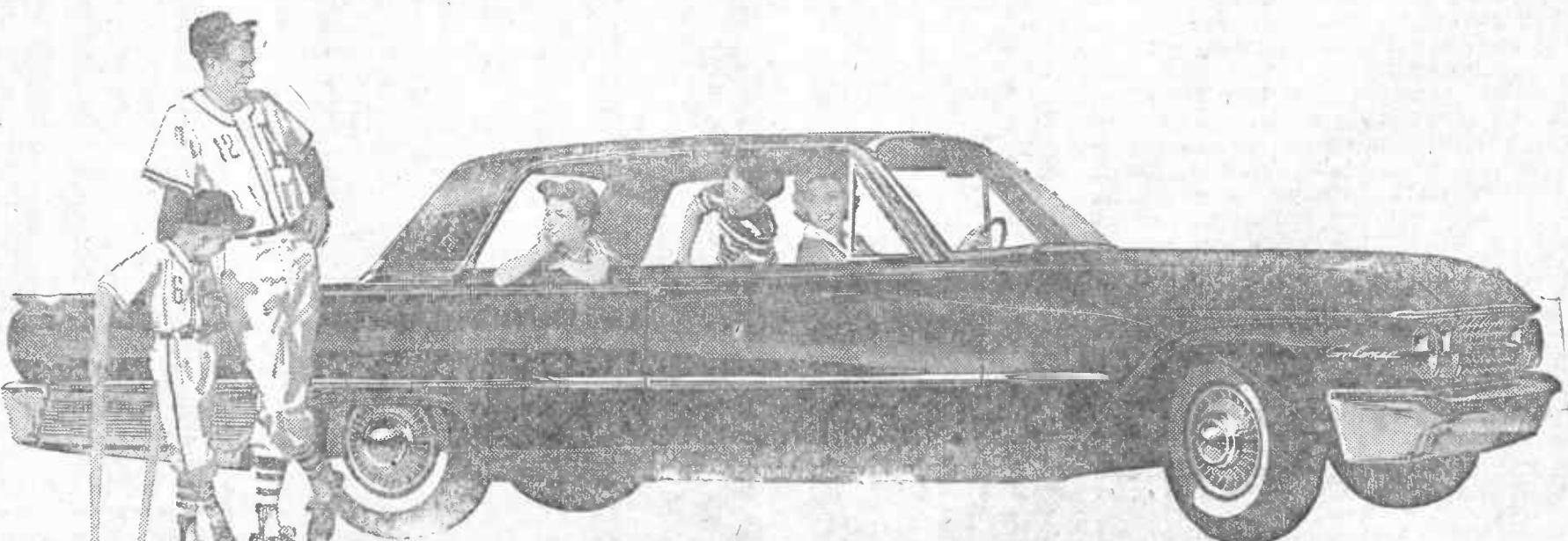

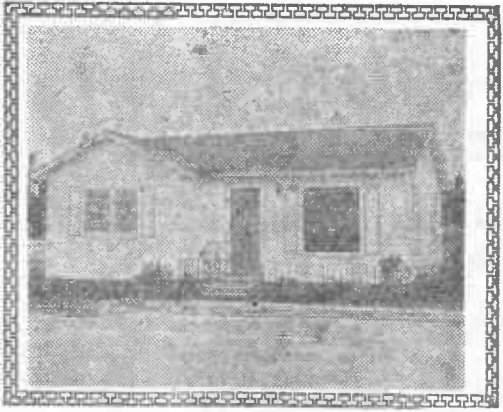

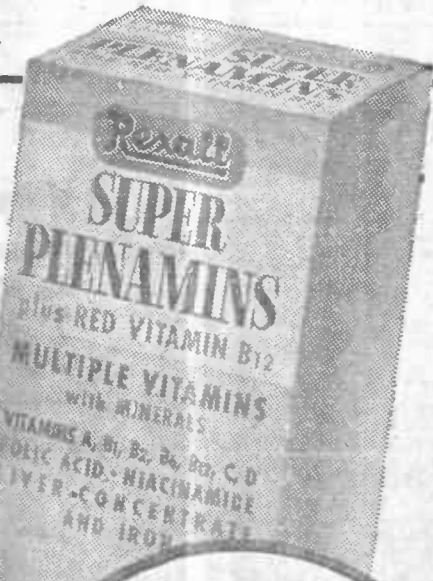
