the need for which seemed ap-
parent to the school administra-
tion due to the broadening cur-
riculum (at least 5 additional un-
its will be offered to high school
pupils next session, making a to-
tal of 27½ units in the sched-
ule), and because of the increas-
ing complexity of social and eco-
nomic problems. They recognized
the invaluable assistance a coun-
selor can give the pupil in find-
ing his abilities and aptitudes, in
ascertaining at least the broad
career field for which he may be
fitted, and in directing him into
the proper courses as he pro-
ceeds through his high school
work.

"A third objective held by the
school administration was the ad-
dition of solid geometry and trig-
onometry to the curriculum, and
a fourth was the inclusion of a
foreign language in the high
school program, all of which are
becoming more and more neces-
sary as prerequisites for certain
college courses, particularly en-
gineering.

"Until very recently, the realiza-
tion of some of these aims seemed
rather remote and uncertain, but
the outlook was sharply changed
when increased average daily at-
tendance last session gave the dis-
trict State funds to employ an ad-
ditional teacher.

"Last week, High School Princi-
pal J. E. Brown selected an Iuka
High School graduate, Carol Ed
Sanders, to fill the new position
of guidance counselor and French
teacher. Mr. Sanders, who has served
as youth counselor in Maine,
holds the Bachelor's degree from
Mississippi Southern College and
will receive the Master's degree
from the University of Mississippi

in Aug., with an extended major
in guidance. Mr. Sanders' joining
the faculty makes possible a re-
arrangement of teaching assign-
ments so that solid geometry and
trigonometry may also be offered.

"At present the position of in-
structor in the vocational subjects
for boys has not been filled, but
school officials believe that this
will be accomplished within a very
short time.

The selection of Mr. Chester Cox
who will serve as band director
will complete the faculty for the
1961-62 session," Mr. Shook con-

A man charged with the bur-

School Building At Baldwin
Is Site For Missile Parts Plant
Metal-Masters Industry of St.
Louis recently located a plant in
Baldwin. The company, which
works closely with the Mobile Air
Command and Redstone Arsenal
in the manufacture of missile
parts, will employ about 40
persons.

Cedar Hill Factory Begins Production

Lee County's newest furniture
industry has begun operations in
the Cedar Hill School building.
Relan-O-Lounger, Inc., a new cor-
poration, has commenced manu-
facturing several types of furni-
ture in the plant on a limited ba-
sis. Products include: recliners,
sofa beds and living room furni-
ture. Currently about 25 persons
are employed and plans are made
for employing a total of 75 in the
future.

Jackson County Leads In Fish Catch

Mississippi fish landings in
1960 totaled a record of 314.2
million pounds. Of this total,
Jackson County's haul was 287,814
210 pounds according to Hermes
C. Hague, fishery marketing spec-
ialist with the Ocean Springs bu-
reau of commercial fisheries.
Industrial fish landings were up

to 25 per cent above 1959 and ac-
counted for 94 per cent of the
1960 landings. Included in the in-
dustrial category was the men-
haden catch of 218,643,800 lbs.
The pokey catch exceeds by 44 mil-
lion pounds the 1959 total.

month in Grenada County to pro-
vide for an expansion of Grenada
Industries passed by a vote of
831 to 38. The expansion will pro-
vide approximately 24,000 more
square feet for the industry.
Chicken Operations
Expanding At Tupelo

Growth of the poultry business
in Mississippi and particularly in
the Tupelo area was highlighted
recently by a Commercial-Appeal
feature in Ray G. Purnell, known
in the Tupelo area as the "Chic-
ken Man". Mississippi now ranks
fifth in the United States in
broiler production and during
1960 processed some 116 million
chickens; Purnell's company pro-
cessed about eight per cent of
this number. Purnell expanded a
1939 investment of about \$15
thousand dollars to his present
\$10-million operations as well as
a feed mixing plant. In addition
about 100 area families grow
birds for the company.

Forestry Notes

Many land owners are afraid
to cut or sell pine timber during
the spring and summer months
because they believe that the
remaining stand will almost cer-
tainly be attacked by beetles or
"worms".

There will be some instances
where this will be true but there
is not enough danger involved to
stop a person from selling his

timber if it is ready to be cut.
The beetles will usually attack
stands of timber under certain
defined conditions. If a timber
grower has some basic knowledge
of the breeding and working ha-
bits of some of the more common
forest insects he will be in a
better position to protect his tim-
ber stand against beetle attacks.

The black turpentine beetle
has caused extensive losses
throughout the pine belt in the
Southern States. All southern
pines are attacked. Usually only
a few trees are attacked but ten
per cent of some stands have
been attacked. Freshly cut
stumps are usually preferred for
breeding, whereas freshly cut logs
are rarely attacked. The turpen-
tine beetle shows a preference
for weakened trees, such as those
damaged by fire, logging opera-
tions, or attacked by other bark
beetles; but it is capable of sever-
ely attacking apparently normal,
healthy trees.

The beetle confines its attacks
to the base of the tree and the
attack is characterized by large
pitch tubes which appear on the
bark surface.

Attacks of the beetle do not
always prove fatal. If the at-
tacked trees are healthy they will
usually survive but if a large part
of the stand consists of weakened
or fire damaged trees the mor-
tality rate will probably be high
unless control measures are taken.

Applied control measures are:
(1) All the attacked trees may be
salvaged and the stumps sprayed
with a solution of 1 per cent Gam-
ma Benzene Hexachloride (BHC)
in diesel oil or No. 2 fuel oil.
However this action may not be
desirable at times because sal-
vage of the scattered trees may be
impractical.

(2) The other choice is to spray
the attacked trees up to the high-
est attack with BHC solution men-
tioned above. Many of the at-
tacked trees will be saved and the
subsequent action of the beetle
reduced.

CAUTION: BHC is poisonous.
In handling this chemical follow
directions and heed precautions
given on the container.

Forestry Bank Set To Help Landowners

Mississippi's Forestry Bank—a new state agency created by
the 1960 Legislature—was established to help landowners
with funds for treeplanting and timberland improvement.
This is the third column in a five-part series of questions
and answers about the Forestry Bank.

- Q. What are development costs?**
A. Development costs are funds spent by the Forestry Commission in the process of planting trees and/or improving timber stands.
- Q. What are service charges?**
A. A service charge is the sum in excess of development costs which will be repaid by the landowner in addition to development costs. The service charge will be used by the Forestry Bank to operate the program and to establish the necessary reserve funds as required by law.
- Q. Does a landowner have to repay funds which the Forestry Commission spends in developing his timber land?**
A. Yes. The Forestry Bank law did not establish a "give-away" program. Under terms of the timber lease agreement which a landowner will sign with the Forestry Commission for proper development and management of the timberland, the landowner will agree to reimburse in full the funds spent in his behalf.
- Q. How does a landowner repay the development costs?**
A. Development costs and service charges will be repaid on a monthly basis, but longer periods of repayment may be authorized in some instances. When longer periods are authorized, service charges must be paid at least annually, however.
- Q. Does the landowner send his repayments to the Forestry Commission?**
A. No. The Forestry Commission is concerned only with timber and timber management; it is not set up to act as a collection agency for the Forestry Bank. In all matters involving funds, and repayment, landowners will deal directly with the Forestry Bank, or with a conventional financial agency whenever a local source provides development costs.
- Q. How long does a landowner have to repay development costs?**
A. Each application will be handled on an individual basis, but the period of repayment cannot be more than 20 years.
- Q. Can a landowner reimburse the development costs at any time?**
A. Yes. Development costs may be reimbursed at any time, in full, without penalty.
- Q. How much are the service charges that must be paid on development costs?**
A. Service charges cannot be more than 5% of the development costs.
- Q. How much will the Forestry Bank authorize for development costs to improve land?**
A. A landowner will be eligible for as much as \$500 assistance money if he uses ASC funds. If he does not use ASC funds, his application may be approved in an amount not to exceed \$1500.
- Q. Does this money come directly to the landowner?**
A. No. If he secures funds from a conventional financial agency and requests that this sum be insured by the Forestry Bank, those funds will be paid to the Forestry Bank instead of to the landowner directly. When the Forestry Bank is used instead of a local source of funds, the Forestry Bank will pay the Forestry Commission directly for expenses incurred in the timber development program.
- Q. Does the Forestry Bank have a reserve fund to guarantee development costs provided by a conventional financial agency?**
A. Yes. When a landowner secures funds from a conventional financial agency on a long-term basis, the Forestry Bank can provide a 100% guarantee to that agency for his participation in the Forestry Bank program.
- Q. If a landowner asks for \$500 and only \$400 is used to develop his land, what happens to the other \$100? Will he have to pay service charges on this \$100 also?**
A. The landowner will repay only the actual expenses incurred, plus service charges.
- Q. What if death should occur before development costs are repaid?**
A. In such cases, the timber lease will remain in force and will be binding upon heirs of the estate.

Buy from growers that keep dif-
ferent age groups separated. Check
the pullet grower's grow-out
program to determine whether the
pullets are completely isolated
from old hens. Isolation breeding
reduces the incidence of disease
problems and is one of the most
important ways to reduce losses
from leucosis.

Obtain contract from grower
specifying starting date, delivery
date, deposit required, strain of
birds, vaccination and feeding.

Pullets should be wormed two
days before moving. This helps
break the life cycle of the round
worm.

Vaccination should be complet-
ed on the growers' farm.

Safety

Insecticides are vital to modern
farming, but must be handled with
care. Mississippi's safety record
with insecticides is good and to
keep it that way, be sure that
you read the labels and follow di-
rections when using any agricul-
tural chemical.

Bug Notes

Bollworms and bollworm eggs
are being found in older cotton in
heavy numbers.

A mid-season dose of recom-
mended insecticide should do the
job on these pests (mid-season
dose is two-thirds a full dose).
Bollworm eggs hatch in around 3
days, then feed on squares etc.,
for 18 to 20 days.

They then pupate in the soil
under cotton and emerge as a
moth in 15 to 20 days and the
cycle begins again.

Thrips, fleahoppers and plant
bugs are general. Where infesta-
tion is heavy lots of damage can

result. It is now easy to find dam-
aged squares.

Remember this: One square saved
for each seven feet of row will
pay the cost of three applications
of insecticides to control these
pests.

Boll weevils are also beginning
to damage cotton, especially in
older fields.

Pastures

Weedy pastures need clipping.
With high speed clippers, you can
clip 18 to 20 acres a day—and
even more with wide clippers. Re-
member clipping pays off:

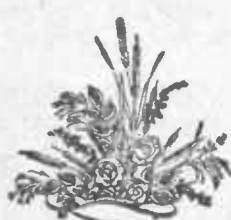

tomers and himself.

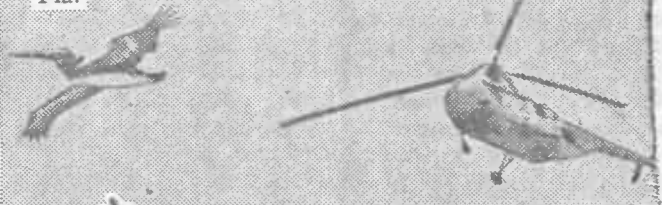
No merchant ever passed on sav-

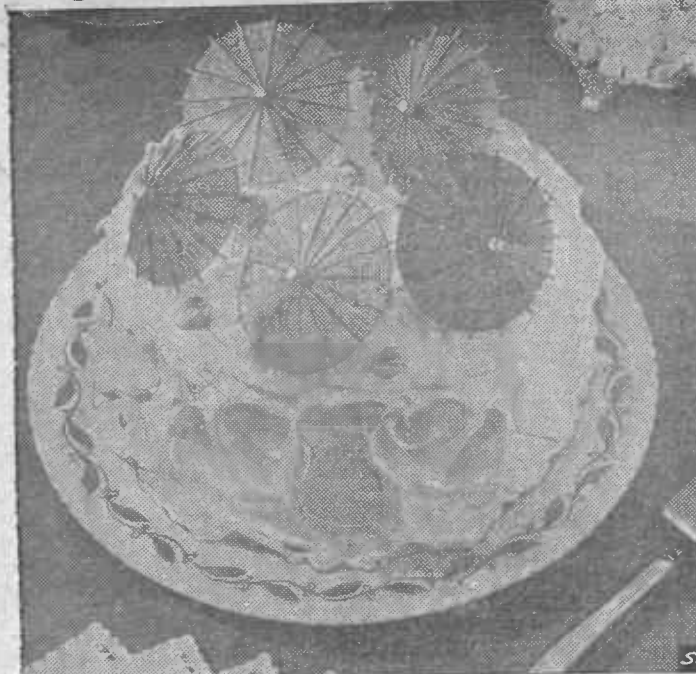

erously over tops and around sides of cake. Decorate top of cake
with tiny paper umbrellas and small candy flowers if desired.

Lemon Seven Minute Frosting
2 egg whites, unbeaten
1-1/2 cups sugar
Dash of salt
1/3 cup water
2 teaspoons light corn syrup
2 tablespoons lemon juice

Combine egg whites, sugar, salt, water, and corn syrup in top of
double boiler. Beat about 1 minute, or until thoroughly mixed. Then
place over boiling water and beat constantly with sturdy egg beater
(or at high speed of electric beater) 7 minutes, or until frosting will
stand in stiff peaks. (Stir frosting up from bottom and sides of pan
occasionally with rubber scraper, spatula, or spoon.)

Remove from boiling water. For a very smooth and satiny frost-
ing, pour at once into a large bowl for final beating. Beat 1 minute,
or until thick enough to spread. Fold in lemon juice. Makes 4-1/2
cups frosting or enough to frost tops and sides of two 8-inch layers
(generously) or two 9-inch layers.

Progress toward better courses of study, teacher training, and a better transportation system is the Office of County Superintendent of Education, Supt. J. Long, outlined today. Outlining general improvements in the system, Mr. Long makes the following statement:

cept for the new negro school, Carter high, at Tishomingo, and the new classroom addition and gymnasium at Belmont which were under construction at that time. Both these classroom additions were equipped throughout last summer, 1960. In addition to the new equipment installed at Carter, extra equipment was added before the fall term, after the school was up-graded from a junior high to a high school. 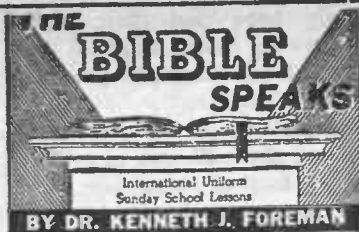

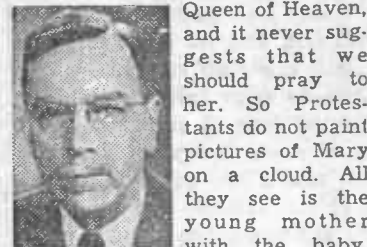

Mother of Jesus

Lesson for July 2, 1961

PICTURES of Jesus' Mother Mary are nearly always of two sorts. One shows her as Queen of Heaven, standing on a cloud perhaps. The other shows her holding the baby Jesus. Now the Bible says nothing at all about her being Queen of Heaven, and it never suggests that we should pray to her. So Protestants do not paint pictures of Mary on a cloud. All they see is the young mother with the baby.



Dr. Foreman This is surely under-rating her. In anxiety not to make an idol of Mary, many rush to the opposite extreme of neglecting her memory and failing to appreciate all she was and did.

Mary The Girl

True motherhood is more than bringing a child into the world and holding it up to be photographed or painted. Motherhood is a lifetime thing. It begins, actually, years before the child is born. Only the right kind of person can be the right kind of mother. Young women in Palestine were betrothed (engaged) at what we would think a very early age. Mary may not have been much over sixteen when Jesus was born. We can see from the story that she was poor. We know that she lived in a village which had never been known for anything good. Yet God chose this particular girl to be the mother of the world's Savior. Already as a girl God looked on her with favor, as the angel said. Already as a girl she was familiar with the Scriptures, as her song testifies. Already as a girl she must have been notably good. Would any ordinary man in Joseph's strange circumstances, have believed the angel of his dream? It was because Mary was the kind of girl

action and behavior, about men of "faith." Christian religion would have died off long ago. "By their fruits you shall know them," said Jesus once, comparing true men with hollow men. And that has been the real test always. Christians are men of faith; but if the "faith" is not matched by what Jesus called "fruits," and what James called "works," it is dead

Fruit of The Word

We can call what we are talking about, fruits of faith, but that is not the whole picture. The whole New Testament teaching bears on this point: that the highest human goodness is not a strictly human product. The highest goodness (and if that word seems weak to you, then say the highest human perfection, or strength of character) is God's product, brought forth in the lives of those who are open and receptive to Him. At Barot von Hugel put it, the Christian virtues, are supernatural virtues. The highest and best that man can attain, he cannot attain by himself, but only as he lives in God. (The deeper truth is that: even the lowest levels of goodness, if they are genuinely good, are also from God. But these of ten are attained without giving God a thought. To live in the heights, it is absolutely necessary to be consciously devoted to God.)

So James speaks of the "implanted Word," meaning the Word of God.

Fruit of The Spirit

Does all this sound cloudy and mystical to some people? It need not. We are fortunate in that three of the most influential persons in the New Testament whose words have come down to us, were plain and outspoken men: Jesus, and Paul, and James. James doesn't speak of "fruits," all the time, he speaks of "works." Put your faith to work, he means in all he says. And he gives some plain and simple examples of what he is driving at, as any one can see by reading his short letter. When messengers came to Jesus from John, asking, Are you the Christ, really the Man of God? Jesus did not reply by giving them an analysis of his mind and feelings. He took them around with him on a busy day, and at evening said, "Go tell John what you have seen and heard." When Paul, in his own way, speaks of "fruits of the spirit," and names them (Gal. 5:22-25) he names such things as love, kindness, self-control. These are never be successfully imitated!

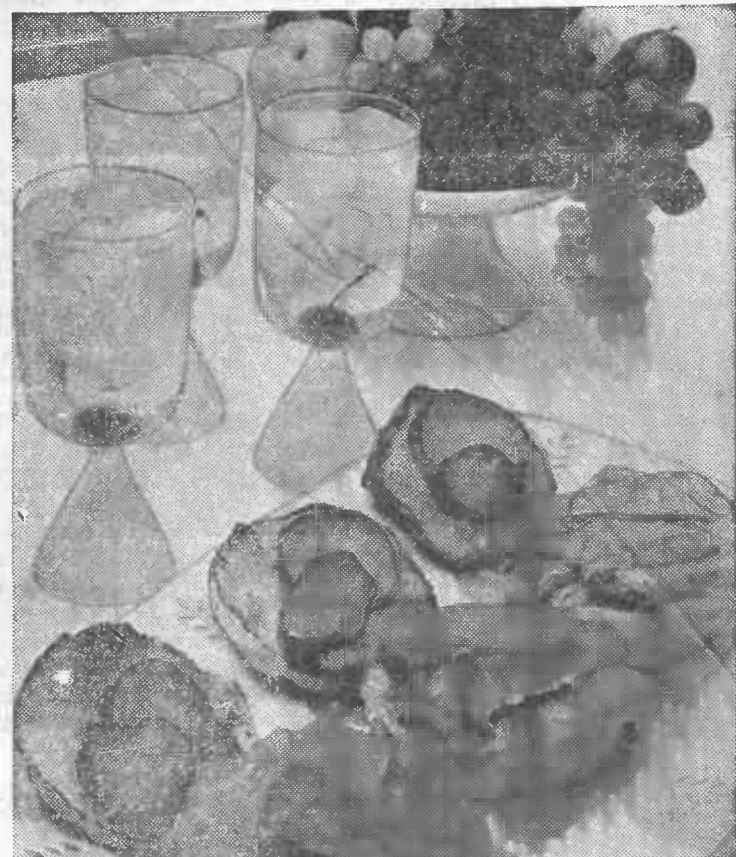
Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District
