Iuka Sales Tax Collections Show Big Jump In May

Sales tax collections in Iuka for the month of May was \$2,374.71, as reported by the State Tax Commission.

Sales tax collections for May 1960 was \$1,324.94. May 1961 shows an increase of over \$1,000.00 compared to May of 1960.

Sales tax collections in Iuka for May 1959 was \$1,379.81.

Iuka's share of the sales tax collected is one-half of one per cent.

The Town of Belmont showed a collection of \$1,074.30 for May; Tishomingo's share for May was \$266.88; Fulton's collections for May were \$1,838.09. Tishomingo, Belmont and Fulton are also on the one-half per cent rate.

Corinth, Booneville and Baldwin each collect one percent for their city governments. Corinth's collections for May were \$17,283.77; Booneville's collections for May were \$7,857.40, and Baldwin's collections were \$2,978.52. It should be emphasized here that Baldwin, Booneville and Corinth all collect a whole percent for their governments whereas Iuka, Belmont, Tishomingo and Fulton are on the one-half of one percent rate.

Only Small Wrecks Mar July Four Holiday In This County

Injuries Are Slight To Occupants
Of The Four Vehicles Involved

With a national record report of highway fatalities amounting to over 500 during the July 4 week end, a report from Sheriff Clarence Pace proves that Tishomingo county was by far the safest place for holidays motorists.

Only two wrecks of any significance were reported during the long holiday week end, along with a few minor run-ins.

On Saturday, July 1, two fish market trucks collided at the intersection of highway 25 north and the J. P. Coleman Park road. A 1959 Chevrolet truck, owned by L. R. Lewis, Jr., and driven by Forrest L. Nunnley, was traveling

north on 25 when it hit a 1957 Chevrolet truck owned by E. B. Timbes of Booneville and driven by Oscar D. Kelton which was entering onto highway 25 off J. P. Coleman road. Lewis' truck turned over. The Timbes truck was not badly damaged.

Patrolman Ira Pace, investigating officer, estimated damages to the Timbes truck at approximately \$300.00. Damages to the Lewis truck were estimated at \$1200.00.

Nunnley was carried to Tishomingo County hospital where he was treated for a broken rib and cuts and bruises.

On July 4, about 1:40 p.m., on highway 72 west, directly in front of J. A. Tucker's furniture store at Burnsville, an accident occurred which involved a 1960 Buick, driven by William E. Chandler, Jr., of Greenville, S. C., and a 1961 Ford Falcon driven by Lavonne Billy Smith of Iuka.

Smith was traveling east and started to make a left-turn into Tucker's parking area and was hit in the side by the Buick which was traveling west.

Riding with Chandler was his wife and 3 children who received only minor cuts and bruises. One child was sent to Tishomingo County hospital with a bad cut on one knee.

Riding with Smith in the Ford Falcon were his wife and a daughter. Mrs. Smith received a number of broken ribs, cuts and bruises and the little girl was cut on the head.

Damages of up to \$500.00 to the Buick was estimated by Patrolman Ira Pace, the investigating officer. The Smith car was a total loss.

County Agent's Notes

Johnson grass is ready for second cutting. Alfalfa is too. Many are asking about putting phosphate and potash follow the second cutting. It is better to put out the minerals after the first cutting because sometimes in dry weather the plants don't use much of the late applied phosphate and potash.

Right now is also a good time to apply lime where needed to clover alfalfa and other pasture areas. For heavy growth of clover or alfalfa most areas will need two tons of lime to the acre. For lespedeza and pasture grasses, you can use one ton to the acre.

It is time now to begin thinking about the fall garden. Start sprouting your fall Irish potatoes three weeks before the August planting date. It is time now to set tomato plants in the garden for a fall crop. If moisture is available now is a good time to make another planting of corn, pole lima beans,

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Forestry Bank Set To Help Landowners

Mississippi's Forestry Bank—a new state agency created by the 1960 Legislature—was established to help landowners with funds for reforestation and timberland improvement. This is the fourth column in a five-part series of questions and answers about the Forestry Bank.

- Q. Does the Forestry Bank manage the timber?**
A. No. Management of the timber will be done by the Forestry Commission, under terms of a timber lease which must be signed before any development work can be done on the timber or on the land.
- Q. What is a timber lease?**
A. A timber lease is a written agreement between the landowner and the Forestry Commission covering the terms under which the Commission agrees to manage and develop for the period of the timber lease.
- Q. For how long must a landowner lease his timber?**
A. Each lease must be for at least 10 years, but may be for a period of up to 20 years.
- Q. Why must a landowner lease his timber to the Forestry Commission?**
A. The Forestry Commission is staffed with people who are trained in forest management. Commission personnel are in position to give the best advice and technical help in the management and development of timber on the millions of acres in Mississippi.
- Q. Can a landowner lease the mineral rights to his land if there is a lease on the timber?**
A. Yes, a landowner has timber to sell now, can it be cut? Yes, provided the cutting is carried out according to the timber management plan and in accordance with terms of the lease agreement.
- Q. Can the landowner sell his land at any time?**
A. Yes, he may sell his land at any time. However, if he should sell his land, the purchaser should bear in mind that he is bound to the timber lease agreement, which has already been signed. By law, the timber lease with the Commission is not subordinate to any transfer of title, and will remain in effect regardless of who owns the land.
- Q. Can a landowner cancel the lease?**
A. Yes, the landowner wants to do so, he may cancel the timber lease any time after 10 years, providing all development costs and service charges are repaid in full.
- Q. What must a landowner show to prove he owns the land?**
A. He must obtain a 31-year title certificate from a licensed attorney in Mississippi.
- Q. Does he have to live on the land?**
A. No, it is not necessary to live on the land in order to receive assistance from the Forestry Bank.

Farm Facts

Average yield of honey per colony of bees in the U. S. for the years 1950 through 1960 was 44.8 pounds. The colony in 1960 was 47.2 pounds, as compared with 30.4 pounds in 1950.

The honey crop last year, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, was the third largest on record. More than 260 million pounds were produced by 5.4 million colonies. In 1962, production of honey totaled a record 272 million pounds.

The average consumption of honey averages about 20 pounds a year. Thousands of pounds are used in making breads and cookies and in ice cream.

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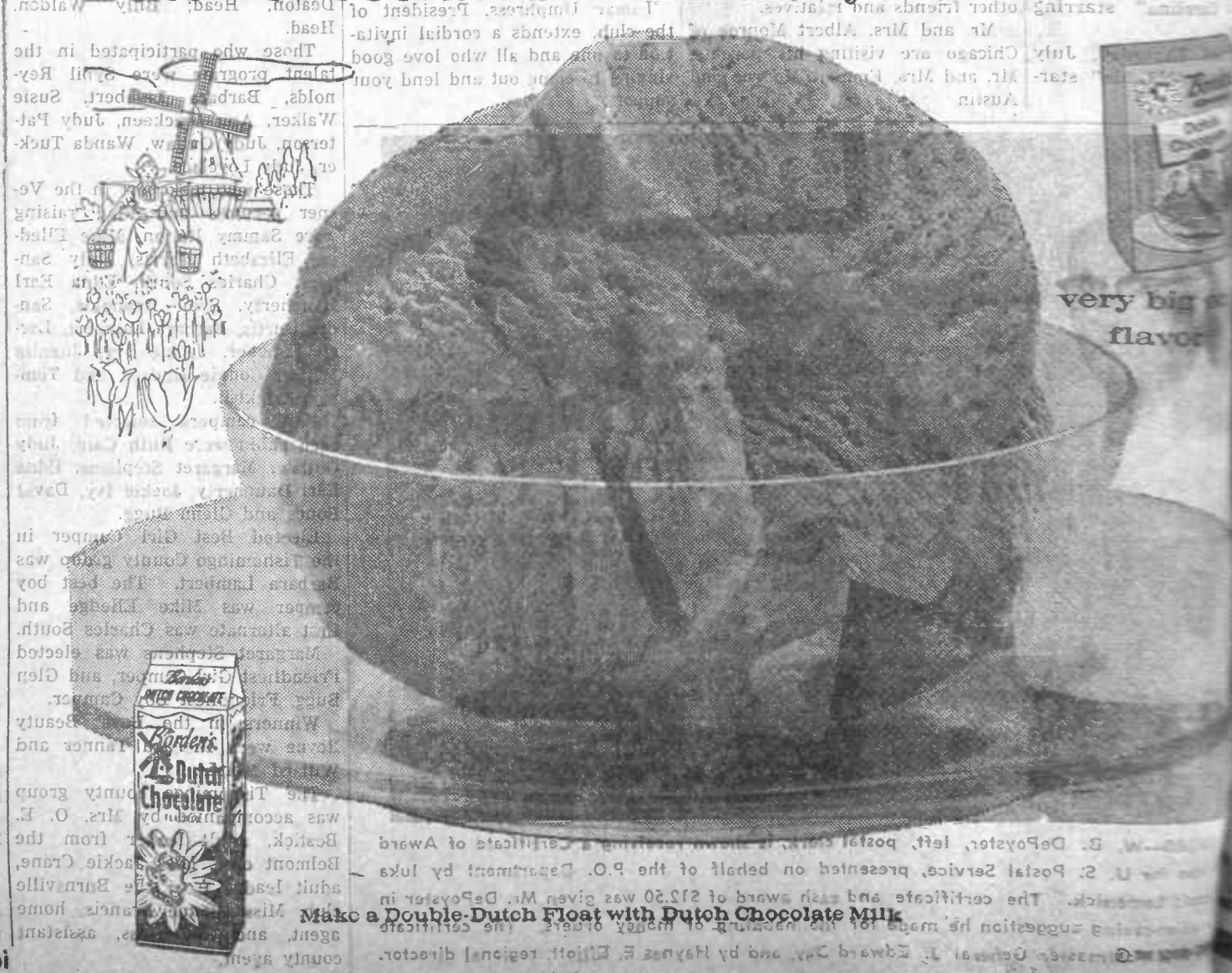

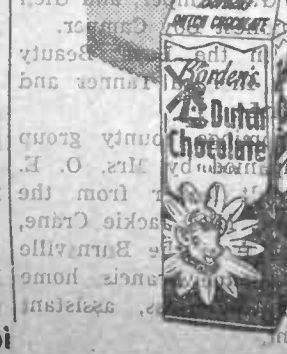

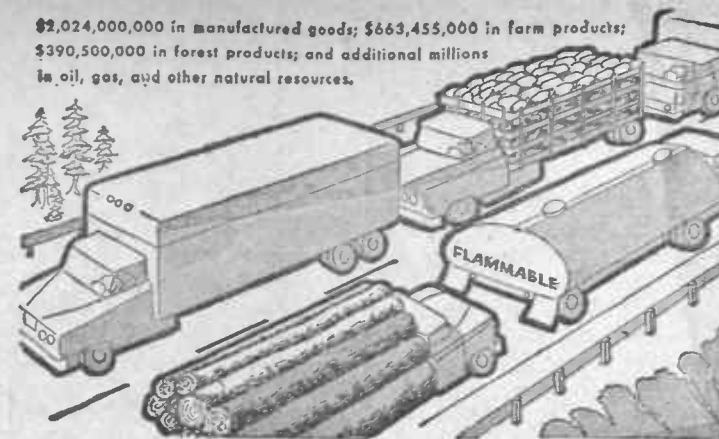

HIGHWAYS AND PROGRESS

Good Roads Vital To Economic Strength Of Mississippi People

Part One—Mississippi's Economy
Mississippi has an investment of over half a billion dollars in highways, a state system of over 9,200 miles.

This system sustains an economy which produces annually \$2,024,000,000 in manufactured goods; \$663,455,000 in farm products; \$390,500,000 in forest products; and additional millions in oil, gas and other natural resources.

ished goods over the highways. Nearly 300,000 children ride school buses daily over these highways. The average automobile owner travels almost thirty miles a day to fulfill the countless missions necessary to present day living.

Transportation in History

Though the pattern of living has put new emphasis on highways, transportation has been the key to growth and development since pioneers hacked their way into the wilderness two centuries or more ago. Early settlement of Mississippi took place along the rivers and coastal areas where boats were the chief mode of movement for people and goods. Old Biloxi, the first white settlement in the Mississippi valley, was established because of a natural harbor, while Natchez, Port Gibson, Vicksburg, and other towns had origins linked directly to this transportation potential.

Inland Transportation

Water, however, did not prove the answer to all transportation problems. Overland routes were necessary in many areas where rivers and streams were not available or were not deep enough to accommodate boats. Inland colonization grew as paths were cut through the wilderness.

From these early overland routes came such famous roads as the Natchez Trace, stretching 500

miles from what was used first by the Spaniards, then by the New Orleans traders, settlers, and

The National which in 1934 Natchez Trace as the nation's most famous converting it into a parkway.

First Public Road

The Territorial provided for the first man-made road in Mississippi in an act approved April 1820. The road was 20 feet. County law summoned any man of 16 to work a day a year on the road. Men desiring to be allowed to furnish to labour in their

Students May Borrow Federal Funds

**\$7,000 Grant Extended
NEMJC By National
Defense Loan Program**

Northeast Mississippi Junior College, Booneville, this week received approval for a \$27,000 grant from the Federal Capital Contribution for the National Defense Loan Program.

The National Defense Student Loan Act of 1958.

grant provides for the creation of a loan fund at Northeast which needy students may borrow on reasonable terms for the purpose of completing their education.

consideration for loans is made to students who have an academic background and express a desire to teach in

elementary or secondary schools or who indicate a superior capacity or preparation in science, modern foreign language.

The student may borrow for his college expense in one year not to exceed \$1000 and during his entire course in higher education, a sum not to exceed \$5000. The borrower must sign a note for his loan and the repayment period begins one year after he completes his full-time course work and extends over a 10 year period. Interest at three per cent per year begins to accrue at the beginning of the repayment period. No interest will accrue while the student is fulfilling military obligation or while he is a student at another institution of higher learning. The loan is cancelled in the event of the student's death or permanent and total disability.

One of the outstanding features of the loan fund is that students who become full time teachers in public elementary or secondary schools will have their loan canceled at the rate of ten per cent for each year of teaching up to a maximum of five years.

Students who wish to make application for this loan to attend Northeast may request application

blanks from the office of the dean after August 1.

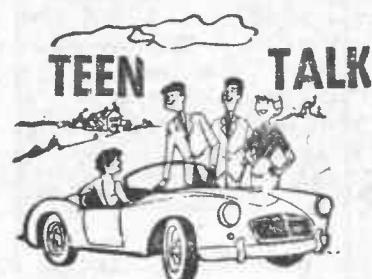

Veterans' Corner

Veteran's Administration

Q — I had active service from January 1, 1920, to March 12, 1922. I hold an honorable discharge. Can I consider myself a veteran?

A — Yes, you are a veteran by virtue of your military service. However, you are not a veteran of a "war period". World War I eligibility for benefits is considered as starting April 6, 1917, and ending on November 11, 1918, except for those veterans who served with the United States Military Forces in Russia, in which case the war period starts April 6, 1917, and ends April 1, 1920.

Q — My World War II veteran husband deserted me and the children through no fault of mine. He died recently. Am I eligible for pension?

A — You are a veteran's widow despite desertion and are eligible for pension if you can qualify under the income and estate limitations.

Q — My father, a World War II veteran and my mother never actually married. After her death his mother brought me up. Now he has died. My birth certificate shows his name as my father. He always supported me. I am now going to school and am not married. Am I entitled to pension until I am of age?

A — Yes. Make application immediately with your nearest VA office.

Time to Plant Seed
For Own Plants

When biennials and perennials are grown from seed, summer is the best time to plant them. The seedbed should be located, if possible, in a partially shady spot; if not, a frame with alternately spaced slats will provide just the amount of shade needed. When these two groups of flowers are planted too late, they season. Perennials are at their best in two or three years when good, strong clumps have been formed.

Trees in Mississippi
