"Alcorn County was signally honored this morning in a ceremony at the White House participated in by President Kennedy, Senators and Congressmen from TVA area including myself and members of TVA Board.

"President Kennedy and TVA Board programmed the ceremony in observance of the one-hundredth anniversary of the birth of the late Senator George W. Norris and as a tribute to him for his leadership in the establishment of TVA.

"During the ceremony the TVA announced a new low rate, designated as the 'Norris Centennial Rate' which may be placed into effect by any of the 155 locally owned electric distribution systems serving the Tennessee Valley and 1.5 million customers in TVA area.

"It was announced during the ceremony that the Alcorn County Electric Power Association, the first electric rural cooperative in the nation, and the Municipal system of Decatur, Alabama, had been the first in the Tennessee Valley to adopt the new low rates. This will mean the saving of many thousands of dollars to Alcorn County customers.

"Of course, savings will be made by customers of other systems as they adopt the new rates.

"I was tremendously pleased to have been especially invited by President Kennedy to participate in the ceremony on behalf of the people of our congressional district and particularly Alcorn county.

SOCIAL SECURITY CHANGES TO AID MANY IN TISHOMINGO COUNTY

On June 30, 1961, President Kennedy signed into law the 1961 amendments to the Social Security Act. These changes will directly affect about 4,770,000 age 62 or over, giving them social security benefits for the first time, or increasing the benefits already payable to them.

First, men now have the choice of retiring at age 62 with lower benefits or waiting until 65 and receiving full benefits. Women have had this choice since 1956. The sooner a man takes his social security after age 62, the greater the reduction in his benefits will be. The reduction is figured so that, on the average, a man will receive the same total amount of benefits whether he takes full benefits at 65 or reduced benefits at 62.

Payments to widows, dependent widowers and dependent parents of workers who have died, will be raised about 10 per cent. However, where more than one dependent parent receives parent's benefits, there will be no increase. This increase will be made automatically before the checks for August are mailed early in September.

The new changes also reduced

the amount of work credits needed to qualify for payments. Under the new law, a man reaching age 65 or a woman reaching 62 this year will only need social security credit for 2-1/2 years. Before these changes they would have needed 3 years of social security credit. There has been no change, however, in the rule that no one can receive benefits with less than a year and a half of work covered by social security.

An increase of up to \$7. in the minimum old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits is due beginning with the social security check for the month of Aug. The present minimum benefit is \$33, and the new minimum will be \$40. About 2,175,000 people will receive higher payments because of this change.

Another change affects people who are entitled to benefits and who are working. These people earn up to \$1700. and receive more in total earnings and benefits than under the old law.

The rule that a person can earn \$1200. or less and receive all of his monthly benefits has not been changed. For earnings of more than \$1200 the following applies: \$1. is withheld for each \$2. earned from \$1200. to \$1700. For earnings of more than \$1700., then \$1. in benefits is withheld for each \$1 in earnings.

In my article today I have briefly covered the important changes made by the 1961 Amendments to the Social Security Act. In my future articles I will cover the changes separately and explain the change in more detail.

Guest speaker will be Bro. Bob Hunt, B. S. U. director at Northeast Junior College in Booneville, Mississippi.

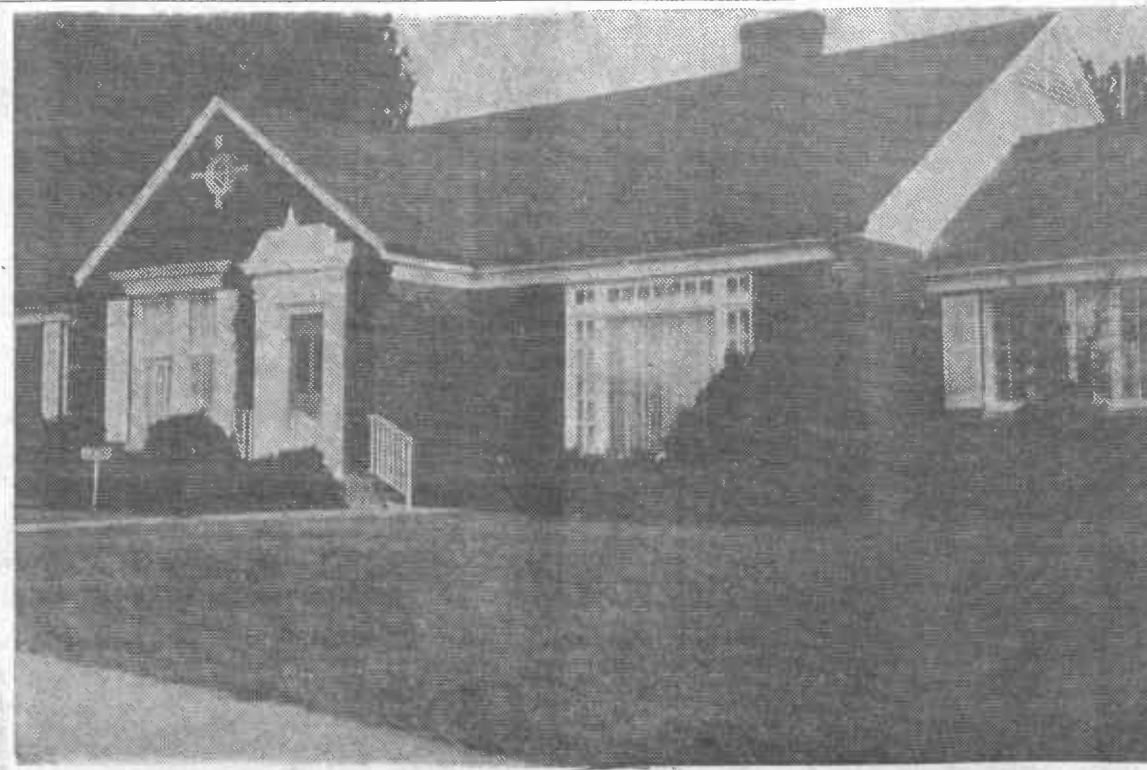
Services will begin each night, Wednesday through Saturday, at 7:30 p. m. Jerry McAnally, youth president, cordially invites everyone to attend these services.

MOST COUNTY SCHOOLS WILL OPEN MONDAY

Burnsville, Tishomingo, And Carter
Attendance Centers Included

Belmont School Will
Open Monday, July 31

Supt. of Education Julian R. Long announces today that most schools in the county will open on Monday, July 17. Included in Monday's opening are Burnsville and Tishomingo white attendance centers, and Carter's Colored school.

Mr. Long stated that the Belmont attendance center will not open until Monday, July 31.

When all schools in the county are in operation approximately 2500 students and 77 teachers are involved in white attendance centers. Burnsville attendance center will employ 26 teachers, Tishomingo will employ 23 and 28 will be employed at Belmont. Carter colored school will have approximately 180 students with 7 teachers being employed.

The daily schedule at Burnsville school will commence at 7:30, Glenn Williams, the school's principal, announces. The cafeteria will be open and will serve meals the first day of school, he said.

B. L. Mercer, principal at Tishomingo, announces that a faculty meeting will be held at his school Friday morning at 8 o'clock and that schedules will be arranged on Monday, the first opening day. Tishomingo cafeteria will not open until Tuesday, July 18.

W. L. Wilson is the new principal at the Belmont school. Mr. Wilson is formerly from Mathiston in Webster County, Mississippi. A schedule of the opening at the Belmont school will be announced later.

E. S. Horton has been employed as principal of the Carter colored high school. He was formerly principal at the Fulton colored high school.

Beginner's Requirements

Supt. Long further stated that all beginners in all county schools will be required to furnish birth certificates and health record cards. "It is absolutely mandatory that the teacher be furnished these records before a child may be properly entered in school", Mr. Long said.

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Kellogg Company Moves To New Plant

Kellogg Manufacturing Company, Corinth, a major producer of telephones for independent exchanges, has completed a move from rented quarters to a modern 82,000-square foot plant located in the Corinth industrial park. Kellogg will now begin to manufacture plastic housings and other telephone parts locally, rather than have them shipped in from other plants. Approximately 30 new employees will be hired. Kellogg currently employs 250.

First Shipment Leaves Natchez-Adams County Port

Late in June, the first barge to move from the new Natchez-Adams county port was loaded with scrap metal bound, ultimately, for Japan. Krouse and Company, Inc., shipped the metal—via the Natchez port and barges—to New Orleans, where it will be reloaded on ocean freighters. The shipment weighed 1,444,000 pounds.

The quilting factory, which makes materials for the apparel, furniture, and luggage industries, will employ 28 persons, according to the announcement. The company, which started in 1959, presently employs 14.

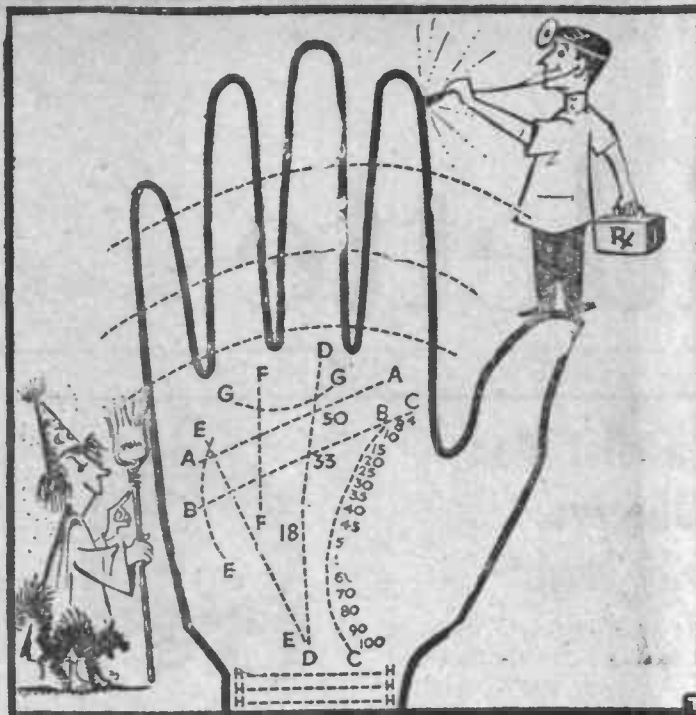
Louisville Purchases Industrial Site

Turnaround

Lesson for July 16, 1961

THE names of Christ's Twelve Apostles are given several times in the New Testament, but never twice quite the same list. There is one name, among others, which turns up on all the lists, namely Matthew. The first time we hear of this man is in an incident which is told by Luke just as it is in the gospel by Matthew, with one interesting difference; Luke says the man's name was Levi. This curious difference of name has been explained in different ways, but the simplest explanation is the traditional one: Levi was the man's name in his earlier days, but Matthew was his name after he became a member of Jesus' inner circle, the "Twelve." If this is the case (as we shall assume it is) then the change of name may suggest a total change in the man himself. Knowing Jesus made such a difference in his life that his old name no longer would do; he had to have a new name to go with the new man.

The Man Nobody Loved

Nobody loves a bureaucrat, though the civilized world has never been able to get along without them. They are the people who run the machinery and do the paper-work of government. If you sometimes think your state or national capital is in a mess, take out all the bureaucrats and then see how much worse the mess is. Back in Levi-Matthew's day, in the Roman Empire, one class of bureaucrats were universally hated: the tax-collectors. Remember Palestine was a conquered country, Rome held it down with an army of occupation. The tax-collectors were working for Rome, and so were hated even more than native Romans were, if possible. They

Forestry Notes

Area Forester

The Tree Farm Program is attracting widespread interest and is being widely accepted among timber growers everywhere.

A tree farm is an area of privately-owned, tax-paying forest land dedicated to the growing of forest crops for commercial purposes. To win certification as a tree farmer, the owner must demonstrate both the desire and the ability to protect his forestland, and manage it for the continuous production of useful forest products.

Tree farmers are landowners who manage their woodlands for maximum production and returns. The words Tree Farm, when applied to a piece of privately-owned forestland, mean that the landowner has been publicly recognized for doing an outstanding job in managing his woodlands for the continuing growth of forest crops for commercial purposes.

Woodlands are certified as Tree

were not only unpatriotic, they were usually dishonest. There were no fixed tax rates; whatever the collector could take over and above a certain amount, he could keep for himself. Only the chief collectors got rich; and Levi-Matthew was not a chief collector. His office was probably just a table on the road, perhaps by the city gate. Wherever it was, anybody carrying anything, or leading a mule or camel carrying a load, had to stop and pay up before going on his way.

Man Of Decision

It has always been a puzzle: Why did this man leave his business all at once? He just stood up and walked off, leaving the table and the money-bag and the soldier right there by the road. He did not stop to balance his books, he did not write a letter of resignation, he did not take time to think. He just got up and went with Jesus, when Jesus said "Follow me." One explanation of this is that maybe this man Levi, or Matthew, hated his job and had hated it for a long time. But he couldn't see how he could leave it. "A man must live," he may have said to himself. But one day the great moment came. He didn't have to live! When Jesus said, "He that loseth life for my sake shall find it," Matthew didn't have to wonder what that meant. He lost his living, he found a life, when he went out with Jesus. That one decision changed the man, changed his job, changed his name, changed his life.

Man Of No Distinction

Matthew is never mentioned in the "Acts of the Apostles." He was not, like Paul and Peter, a man of distinction. But when you look it up, you find that most of the Twelve were also men of no distinction. Nothing is said in Acts about more than a few of them. We can take heart from this. Jesus deliberately chose a man like Matthew, and this can mean a great deal to most of us. There are hundreds of people of no distinction to every man of real distinction. ("Men of distinction," in the ads, are generally pictured holding in their hands what can wipe out their distinction in a hurry.) Yet this man Matthew, obscure as he was and remained, had two distinctions that every Christian, even the humblest, may have. For one thing, he remembered and treasured and passed on the teachings of Jesus.

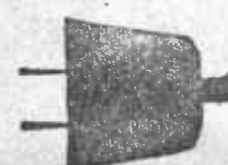

Annual field day at the Pontotoc Experiment Station will be held at the station on Tuesday, July 18, at 10 a. m.

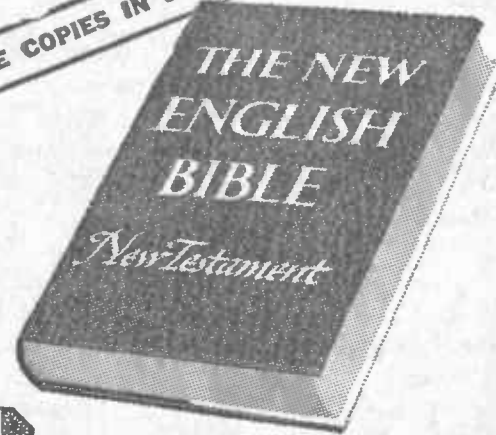
The program will consist of a summary of the work that is being done at the Experiment Station and other agricultural information. A tour of the station will also be made during the day.

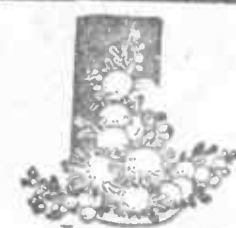

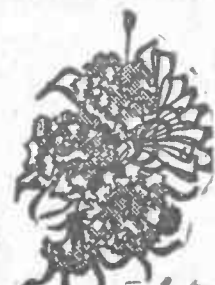

soil, much of it is sick, all is not

small plants and animals, which
are a part of the soil. need min-
eral plant food, water and air
to live, grow and do their work.
Soils breathe, some scientists
measure the health of the soil by
the amount of gas, carbon dioxide,
escaping from it.

This carbon dioxide is formed
when vegetable matter decays; it

orous, nutritious plants will grow
on it, we need all the organic mat-
ter, and humus we can keep in it
by sound practical farming meth-
ods.

Plowing the soil burns out the
organic matter, and erosion car-
ries it away. The less we have to
plow the land to produce a crop,
the better it will be for the soil.
Today many farmers are growing
100 bushels of corn per acre by
preparing a seed bed, using large
amounts of fertilizer and culti-
vating the corn twice. This is con-
siderably less plowing than was
formerly needed. The more pro-
ductive the land, the less cultiva-
tion is needed.

Erosion is one of soils worst
enemies, it is on the slopes that
plowing and erosion work hand
in hand to sap the very life out
of the soil. Poorly fed hens and
cows do not produce an abun-
dant crop of eggs and milk. Neither will
crops. Mineral fertilizers are im-
portant and should be judiciously
used, but by far the most impor-
tant soil food is the decaying vege-
table matter in it.

HOUSEHOLD HINT XCHANGE



WHAT has two legs and is a com-
munity worker, gardener, dic-
tician, cook, laundress, chauffeur,
hostess and teacher? The answer,
of course, is the average American
housewife, circa 1961.

But if there is one thing the
American housewife needs—more
than two more hands and six more
hours a day—it's an ever-growing
supply of time-saving, tension-sav-
ing, money-saving hints on how to
make her day easier.

With that in mind, here are 6
useful hints that should be of inter-
est to all housewives, whether they
be brides or homemaking veterans:

1. Before painting or varnishing
woodwork, rub Vaseline petroleum
jelly on the hinges of all doors. Any
paint which gets on the hinges may
be easily wiped off.

2. Did you know that ice-cube
trays filled with hot water and put
in the freezing compartment of the
refrigerator will do a quick job of

defrosting? Try it.
3. To renew artificial fruits,
wash carefully and quickly with
lukewarm mild soapsuds, rinse and
dry well. Then rub a small amount
of Vaseline petroleum jelly on the
hands and gently coat the fruit
with a thin film by rolling between
the fingers. This will give the fruit
a natural and beautiful appearance.

4. To keep out insects and elim-
inate odor, drop three or four moth
balls in your garbage can every few
days and solve both problems at
once.

5. Ironing is easier if a sheet of
aluminum foil is used under the
ironing board cover—it will hold
the heat and make it possible to
iron both sides at once.

6. Keep fine sandpaper in the kit-
chen. Rub lightly over dirty ovens
or wire racks and the brown,
burned-on dirt will disappear. This
eliminates one of the messiest kit-
chen chores.

land will grow strong again, and
will return to you yields beyond
your fondest hope.

his pension be stopped then?

A—No. Since he is unable to
become self-supporting his pen-
sion will be continued.

Wind Symphony to Tour Thames



NEW YORK — England soon will learn first-hand about a
unique American cultural institution, the American Wind Sym-
phony Orchestra. This unusual musical organization, famous for
its free riverbank concerts to audiences on the Allegheny, Mon-
ongahela, Kanawha, Ohio and Mississippi Rivers, will leave
June 30 for an unprecedented
month-long concert tour of the
Thames River in England.

Robert Austin Boudreau, who
founded the sixty-piece or-
chestra four years ago in Pitts-
burgh, says the English visit
will be the first of a series of
river tours over the next few
years. These rivers include the
Nile, Niger, Euphrates, Tigris,
Ganges and Irrawaddy, which
will be visited on later concert
trips.

Mr. Boudreau is shown above
with H. J. Heinz II, Board
Chairman of the H. J. Heinz
Company, looking over a scale
model of the barge now being
built in England for the Thames
tour, which opens July 4 at
London. The cost of the tour,
including transportation and
the design and construction of
the barge on which the group
will play, are being paid by
the Heinz Foundations, of Pitts-

burgh, and the H. J. Heinz
Company, Ltd., of London.
When it returns, the Wind
Symphony will resume its
American concerts in Pitts-
burgh July 30. Last year, the
group played to an estimated
200,000 people in eighteen cities
on five rivers.

The orchestra — the only one
of its kind in the world — con-
sists of a conventional sym-
phony orchestra percussion sec-
tion plus double-size sym-
phony brass and woodwind sec-
tions. The group has commis-
sioned thirty-four original com-
positions during its brief life-
time, a number of which will
be performed during the En-
glish tour. Fifteen original works
will be heard for the first time
during the current season.

Next month's tour has the
blessing of the State Depart-
ment and the American Nation-
al Theater and Academy.

Cotton Reminders

Even though our cotton is late, we should keep in mind some practices we can follow to harvest good quality cotton this fall.

First make sure the field is clean at harvest time. Do this by spot treating Johnson Grass, hand hoeing large weeds and vines in the cotton fields. Use flame burners to hold down grass and weeds in the drill. Use lay-by chemicals to keep down grass and weeds in the middles.

Where no lay-by chemicals are used, cultivate shallow as needed. Get rid of grass and weeds at the ends of the rows. Do it by disking and spraying with lay-by chemical. If necessary use a cultipacker to firm the soil. Leave turnrow firm. Use rotary clippers to get rid of any grass or weeds that might grow large enough to interfere with the turning of the cotton picker.

When you lay-by your cotton, make sure all drainage ditches are open so that fields will drain and dry out quickly after a rain. Mills want quality cotton. Grassy cotton is not quality and grassy cotton brings a lower price.

Remember, no weeds and grass in the cotton field not only helps in mechanical picking, but also makes for more efficient hand picking. It helps add up to quality cotton!

Boll Weevils

Boll weevil infestations are in-

creasing. So are numbers of punctured squares. Do not let them puncture the first squares you have.

The number of weevils that emerge from these punctured squares (first hatch out) and are allowed to re-infest the fields spell real trouble in early Aug.

Generally the first hatch out occurs about the second week of blooming. Keep a close watch on your fields and when the hatch out begins, poison every four or five days to reduce the number of weevils.

Dairy Notes

Help prevent the annual summer slump in milk production. Check your permanent pastures, grazing crops like Sudan or millet to help the permanent pastures take care of the extra summer load.

Try turning cows onto grazing at night. They will graze more than they will during the hot day time.
