can get dependents' benefits if the worker retires at 62 the same as if he retires at 65.

A man 62 to 65 years of age can start receiving benefits with the month of August 1961. But if he retires before he reaches age 65, the monthly amount of benefit paid him will be reduced. He will continue to be paid the reduced amount even after he reaches 65. The amount of the reduction depends on the number of months for which he will receive benefits while still under 65. A worker who retires and claims his benefits as soon as he reaches 62 will qualify for 80 per cent of the amount that would be payable to him at age 65. If he waits until he is 63, he will get 86 and two-thirds per cent of his full benefit; and if he waits until 64, the amount will be 96 and one-third per cent.

The reductions are expected that a person may expect to receive, on the average, about the same amount if he takes reduced benefits beginning before he is 65, or waits until 65.

Dependent widowers and the dependent fathers of workers who have died also can get benefits at age 62. Their benefits, like those of widows and dependent mothers, are not reduced.

Men 62 to 65 years old who want to take their social security benefits now rather than waiting can see the Social Security representative in the City Hall in Iuka any Monday morning and file a claim.

Include Forestry,
Wildlife, Soil

Representing Tishomingo County at the Boys Conservation School held at Roosevelt State Park next week are Jim Carson, Billy Middleton, W. T. Carson, and Donnie Brown.

These boys were selected by the Area Forester, Larry Brewer, and County Extension personnel.

While at Conservation School, these boys will study three major phases of conservation. (1) FORESTRY. Under forestry they will study such things as tree identification, timber cruising, tree planting, and fire control. (2) SOIL. Included in this area will be terracing and methods of taking soil profiles. (3) WILDLIFE. Emphasis will be placed on game laws, demonstrations of re-stocking areas with game animals and proper management of farm ponds and streams.

The \$20.00 per delegate fee to cover expenses of this school was donated by the Iuka Sportsman's Club, The Lucy Rowe Study Club, Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company, and Hiwassee Land Co.

County Boys Stationed At Ft. Jackson

Privates James M. Barnette, Refus C. and Ernest E. Hughes have been assigned to Company B, 1st Battalion, 1st Training Regiment at Fort Jackson, S. C., for eight weeks of basic combat training.

James is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert M. Barnette and Ernest and Refus are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest C. Hughes, all of Tishomingo.

This is their first phase of six months active duty training with the U. S. Army and a part of the enlistment in the Army National

Guard.

James' National Guard Unit is Co. C, 2nd Bn., 155 Inf., Iuka. Ernest and Refus belong to Guard Unit at Belmont, Trp. A, 1st Rs., 108th Ac.

They will be taught rifle marksmanship under the U. S. Army's TRAINFIRE program which enables the modern soldier to become a better rifleman in less time than previous methods. In this program, most of his training consists of firing his rifle at pop-up targets at unknown distances on terrain which duplicates the combat areas. Other highlights

of his intensive training include squad tactics, bayonet, and hand-to-hand combat, and crawling the infiltration course while machine gun fire is popping overhead. Many of their instructors are combat veterans of World War II and the Korean War.

As a climax to this first phase of training, they will march with their battalions in a review before the commanding general of Fort Jackson. This ceremony is witnessed by relatives and friends of the trainees who attend the "Open House" held by each company on graduation day.

Bear Creek watershed contains an estimated 605,600 acres—84 per cent in Alabama and 16 per cent in Mississippi. It takes in parts of seven counties—Colbert, Franklin, Lawrence, Marion, and Winston, Alabama, and Itawamba and Tishomingo, Mississippi. The first survey in 1950 showed 390 thousand acres of forest land.

Tva foresters who are working on the survey are F. J. Holemo, W. B. Buckley, R. J. Carden, Norman Allgood, J. P. Cline and Robert Rochelle. In Colbert and Franklin counties they will take additional sample plots outside the watershed so that county inventory data can be completed. Data from some of the watershed sample plots will also be used in a forest inventory of the State of Alabama now being made by the U. S. Forest Service.

Hinton said that TVA foresters have inventoried the forests of eight other tributary watersheds and 76 counties in the Tennessee Valley. This is part of TVA's continuing program of forest resource development and watershed protection.

Supervisors Offer \$600,000 Road Bonds For Sale

In a legal notice this week, the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors is offering for sale \$600,000 in bonds. The bonds will be used "to raise money for the purpose of constructing state-aid roads in Tishomingo county as now or hereafter designated by law." Offering of the bonds comes as a result of negotiations that have been underway for the past several months.

In May of this year, the Board published its intentions of issuing the bonds. A petition objecting to the issue and calling for an election to determine the matter was circulated but failed to gain the necessary 20 per cent of qualified electors as signers. Therefore, the Board is now carrying out its declared intentions of issuing and offering the bonds for sale.

Sealed proposals for purchase of the bonds will be opened on Thursday, August 10, at 11 o'clock a. m., in the Chancery Clerk's office.

The bonds will be repaid out of money received by the county from the state for state-aid roads. No additional tax is to be levied to retire the bonds, repayment of which will begin in 1962 and will terminate in 1981.

General improvement of state-aid roads in the county is expected to result from the sale of the bonds, with some of the more important roads being in line for blacktopping.

McRee, Russell Bonds, and William J. Pyle, as directors at large. Members will vote for two directors from each district and three directors at large.

Members who cannot attend next Thursday's meeting are asked to sign and return a proxy which they will receive from the power cooperative within the next few days.

Phone Subscribers Get Refunds

Hal Phillips, chairman of the Mississippi Public Service Commission, announces that the telephone subscribers of the Tishomingo, Rienzi, and Guntown areas are being refunded four thousand and eighty-eight dollars. These refunds represent overcharges collected by independent companies and Southern Bell on long distance calls.

As a result of the sale of Tishomingo, Rienzi, and Guntown exchanges, the Public Service Commission has been made trustee for the refund accounts. The Commission issued checks to the individual subscribers Wednesday.

These are final payments involving the Southern Bell case in which more than twelve million dollars were refunded to some three hundred and forty thousand telephone subscribers in Mississippi.

Mr. Phillips stated that this brought to a close the largest rate matter in the history of the state.

Gulfport Port Handles 29,944 Tons

Cargoes totaling 22,944 tons were handled through the state port of Gulfport during June by 14 ships, bringing the total for the year to 171,806 tons and 72 ships. Since the late fall of last year, banana ships have arrived at Gulfport on a regularly-scheduled basis of one ship per week. Although bananas are not a high-tonnage cargo, banana ships do provide a substantial amount of longshoreman employment and are considered high revenue traffic.

State Business Activities Hit All-Time High In May

A new all-time high in Mississippi business activity is reported for May, and June appears as good or better, according to the

current issue of the Mississippi Business Review, monthly publication of the Business Research Station at Mississippi State University. May business activity registered 139 per cent of the 1956-58 monthly average. This reading indicates that the level of May '61 business was 39 per cent above the average level of the base period.

Vicksburg Grain Elevator To Be Completed This Month

The new Gooch Food Products Company grain elevator currently under construction in Vicksburg is nearing completion, and construction should be finished by the end of July. The elevator is expected to be ready for use early in September, according to production manager W. J. Hauserman, of the Gooch Company. The elevator will consist of 25 bins with a total capacity of 367,955 bushels of corn and 11 bins with a capacity of 36,121 hundred-weight of flour. It will be 90 feet tall, 128 feet long and 51 feet wide. The Gooch Company makes corn meal and variety of livestock feeds and is engaged in flourblending operations.

New Macon Industry To Open

A new industry employing approximately 60 men will begin operations in Macon in the very near future. Huell Dendy, former manager of the General Box Co. at Macon, said that the Nuxbee Veneer Co., owned by O. E. Howell of Meridian, will manufacture veneers for plywood.

BAWI Bond Issue Passes

At Hazlehurst, 853-102

Copiah county voters have voted 853-102 in favor of a \$133,000 B. A. W. I. bond issue for the Copiah Milling and Livestock Feeding Company. The newly-organized firm will build a commercial cattle feed lot with a capacity of 4800 cattle. The A&I Board also has granted certificates for BAWI elections for \$50,000 for the expansion of Polaron Products in Batesville and for \$300,000 for a porcelain enameling plant at Bay St. Louis for Industrial Electric, Inc.

The Realist

Lesson for July 30, 1961.

THOSE who are converted to faith in Christ bring their temperaments with them. Some people are temperamentally optimistic, others are by nature pessimists, and they stay that way after conversion. It is like two aircraft on the same course, one a transport, the other a light plane. A storm shows up ahead: both planes make a 45-degree turn to the right, or perhaps they turn clear around with a 180-degree turn. After the turn they are still transport and light plane, not two of either, not something else like helicopters. That's what "conversion" means, just turning around.

In Presence Of Danger

Thomas, one of the "Twelve," was a man set apart from the other eleven by his dark mind. Not that he was stupid; on the contrary he was pretty bright. He had a very logical mind, but it was easier for him to believe unpleasant facts than to believe what would have suited him better. Some call him a pessimist. Perhaps he was; but we may think of him as a realist. The optimist has lovely stained glass windows in his house of life, and so the world always looks gay and bright to him. The pessimist paints over his windows, can scarcely see at all, and says, "What a dismal world this is!" The realist has clear plate glass windows and keeps them polished. When it's raining outside the realist says so. The optimist says, "Go on, you're a pessimist! See how lovely the world looks from my window! I never see it rain at all. But the man is not a pessimist, really."

Thomas, like others of his sort, sometimes slips over into pessimism, but (again like all Christian realists) even when he takes the darkest view possible, he does not lose his faith. On the occasion when Jesus went to Bethany just after his friend Lazarus died, it was a well-known fact that the authorities wanted to have him arrested. Thomas thought it would come to worse than arrest. "Let us go too, that we may die with him," he said. He did not think Jesus was riding the road to success.

In Bewilderment

At the Last Supper we hear the voice of Thomas only once. "Lord, we do not know where you are going, how can we know the way?" He was evidently completely bewildered. But he did not leave the table, as Judas did, to go out into the night. He was at a low point. He as good as admits he does not understand Jesus at all. "We don't know where you are headed" sounds very much like what the English call a vote of no-confidence. But Thomas stayed on. Where was Jesus headed? He did not know. But he was sure Jesus knew. That's faith.

No Second-hand Faith

Thomas is best known for his refusing to believe that the resurrection of Jesus was an actual fact. To be more exact, he refused to believe on the evidence of his friends. Thomas never said, "The thing's impossible, I'll never believe it." What he said, in effect, was, "It may be possible but I can't take it at second-hand. I must see for myself. If I believe, it will be only if Jesus himself proves the story you are telling."

Now the Eleven (or Ten, to be exact) may have been offended. When one of your friends tell you he doesn't believe you, doesn't believe the lot of you, it gets under the skin. But they did not put Thomas out, and he did not put himself out. The next time they met, he was there too.

Thomas is called the Doubter. Is this fair to him? Should a man be called a doubter who is willing to die with Jesus? Should a man be called a doubter when it is not doubt but ignorance that rides him? Should a man be called a doubter when he seeks the company of those who believe? Some men are skeptics who don't want to believe. But those skeptics who want to believe, can find faith best within the community of the faithful.

Nettleton OK's BAWI Bond Issue

A BAWI bond issue for \$135,000 to expand the Nettleton Garment Company was passed by a vote of 225 to 20. The bond issue will finance construction of another building for the sportswear plant which will enable it to employ an additional 100 workers; the company presently employs approximately 400.

NMIDA To Build New Headquarters

The board of directors of the North Mississippi Industrial Development Association has voted to construct a \$20,000 headquarters for the 23-county organization in West Point. The organization also named a budget committee to complete plans for next year's financial program of some \$62,000.

Naval Air Station Opens At Meridian

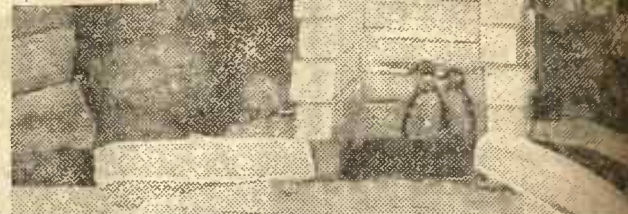
The new \$50,000 Meridian Naval Auxiliary Air Station was commissioned July 14 as a memorial to the late Adm. John S. McCain of Mississippi, hero of Pacific naval strategy during World War II. The first class of 500 student aviators to take basic jet training at the 8,000-acre facility will be enrolled in September. Construction was begun 4 years ago, and there is still much to be done. 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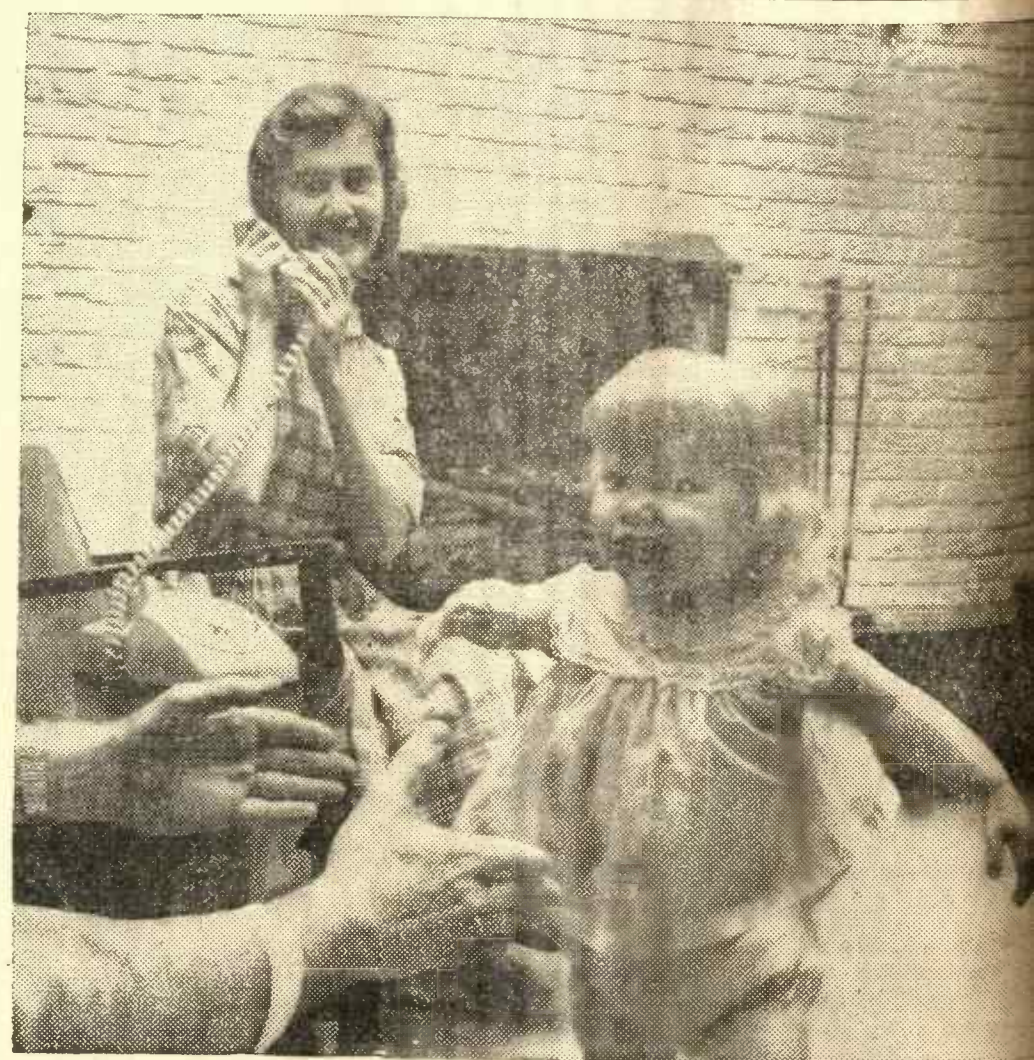

Insecticides, Pesticides Are Dangerous; Caution Is Urged In Handling

Some insecticides and pesticides are dangerous and should be handled with extreme care, advises Dr. N. C. Knight, Director of the Accident Prevention Program of the State Board of Health.

If you plan to spray your home or garden, Dr. Knight urges the following suggestions to avoid accidents:

—Study the directions on the container. The manufacturer has gone to great effort to determine the optimum dosages and safety precautions.

—If protective clothing, respirator, goggles, or rubber gloves are needed leave this chemical alone unless you are fully experienced.

—Always store in container with original label. Never give away part in another package.

—Store chemicals, protective clothing, and equipment in a locked compartment to keep away from children and pets.

—Destroy empty containers im-

mediately. Some child fatalities have occurred from playing with discarded insecticide containers.

—Apply downwind. Avoid inhaling sprays and dusts. Never stand in path of mist or dust, and don't walk through freshly sprayed or dusted areas.

—Never smoke while spraying or dusting. Many of the chemicals are flammable.

—If chemicals are spilled on skin, wash thoroughly and immediately.

—Cover bird baths, dog dishes, fish pools, etc. while spraying. Never leave, not even for "a minute," a pail of pesticide open to children.

—Pour left-over spray into a gravel drive, down a drain, or over soil.

—REMEMBER: If accidents occur, follow the first aid instructions usually found on the container. Call a physician if you are in doubt, or seriously ill.

The State Board of Health began an educational program aimed at eliminating home accident hazards about two years ago when accidental injuries and deaths in the home and on the home premises almost equalled those from all other types of accidents.

Since initiating the program a slight decrease in home accidental deaths has been noted, according to Dr. L. A. Gray, State Health Officer.

He calls on the people of the state to eliminate accident hazards and avoid accident-producing habits.

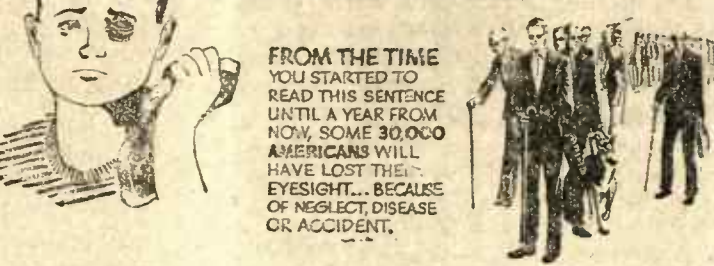

Watermelon Production

Production prospects for Mississippi's watermelon crop improved during June, and production is now forecast at 73.5 million lbs. The dry conditions prevailing around June 1st were relieved by general rains during June, and prospects improved considerably although a few areas reported heavy rains knocked off some young melons.

Green Pepper Production

Green pepper production is estimated at 14,000 hundredweight to be harvested from about 600 acres, mostly in the Copiah county area. The yield as of July 1st is forecast at 23 hundredweight per acre, the same as the previous year. Harvest of the pepper crop started about July 1st, and supplies are expected to be available into August.

Cotton Acreage

Cotton acreage planted in Miss. in 1961 is estimated at 1,675,000 acres planted in 1960, but less than ten year average. During the ten-year period, Miss. cotton acreage planted ranged from 1,185,000 acres in 1958 to 2,670,000 acres in 1953.

World's Largest Picture Frame Plant Is In State

The world's largest picture frame plant is located at Winona, Mississippi and is in its 12th year as a Winona industry. The manufacturer makes picture frames and framed pictures inclusively. Over 90 per cent of the wood used—popular, cottonwood, walnut, oak and wormy chestnut—is secured and bought in Mississippi. The plant has a daily capacity of 3,000 units of all items manufactured and ships around a half million units a year, of which about 50 per cent are empty frames and the other 50 per cent framed pictures, clocks, curios, plaques and mirrors.

National Farm Safety Week Is July 23 to 29

Farming is one of the most dangerous occupations in America today, says M. S. Shaw, director of the Agricultural Extension Service at State College.

"More people are killed on the farm than in any other industry," he points out. "But in deaths per 100,000 workers it ranks third—behind mining and construction."

The Mississippi Agricultural Extension Service is cooperating with the National Safety Council in urging all farm families to observe National Farm Safety Week, July 23-29.

Some ideas for farm families to carry out during the week include: making a close check for every possible accident hazard and removing these hazards, giving each member of the family an area to check, discussing safety and accident prevention among the family.

Mr. Shaw urges Mississippi farm people to make the week a starting place for a year-round accident prevention program.

Special daily emphasis during safety week includes: Sunday—Reverence for Life; Monday—Safety Begins at Home; Tuesday

—Agricultural Chemicals—Prevent Falls; Highway Safety; Farm Machinery; Saturday—Safety.

County Extension organizations and groups are combining efforts to make the 1961 Farm Safety Week most successful ever on Shaw states.

Cotton Market Applications

Cotton improvement officers are urged to file immediately for cotton classification and market news according to Howard C. who is in charge of the Cotton Classing Office, U. S. Department of Agriculture. The deadline date for applications in Mississippi is August 1.

Any group of producers organized to promote the marketing of cotton, which files an application, is eligible for the service.

Applicants, who will be urged to submit bonds to classifying offices as possible. This will enable farmers to take advantage of the classing service as the new ginning season opens.

Application forms and information about the service may be obtained from local USDA agents or local USDA classing offices.

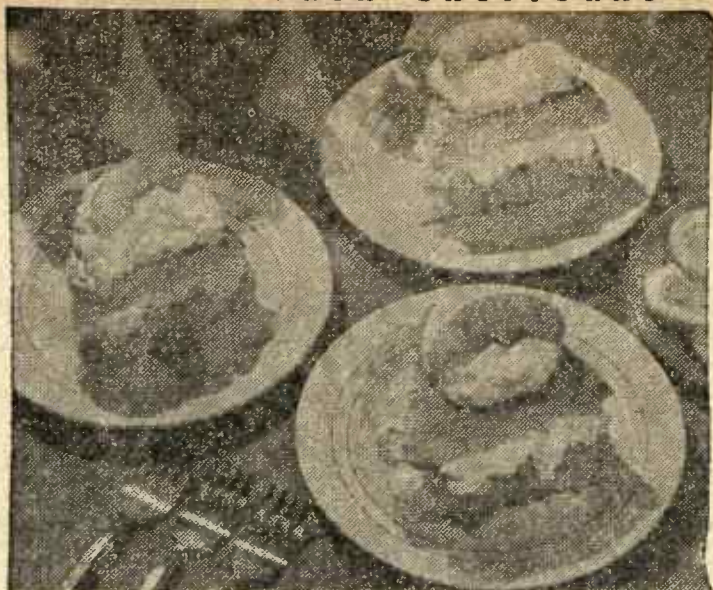
WMU Meeting Devoted To Royal Service Program

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THE COTTON LEAFWORM

Winter weather eliminates this cotton pest in the United States each year, according to entomologists.

But every spring, hordes of migrating moths fly into our country from tropical areas. These unwelcome visitors deposit billions of egg clusters on cotton plants. Hungry leafworms soon emerge to virtually eat their way across most of the cotton belt.

Their collective appetites are fantastic. Leafworms can strip cotton plants so badly that fields may appear to have been scorched by fire. The worms themselves are discriminating; they eat only cotton plants.

First signs of cotton damage may be tiny worms eating beneath the leaves. Larger worms in mass attacks often devour leaves completely, and eat into squares, bolls and bark. On ragged plants brown pupae are often found attached by silken threads to stems and leaf ribs.

Growers have found that early control is most economical. Young, tender worms are more easily killed and population buildups are prevented.

A new insecticide was widely adopted for leafworm control during 1960. This new material, called Sevin, is a carbamate. It introduces an entirely new and safer-to-use chemical to the cotton pesticide field. Growers have used Sevin in both dust and spray formulations for long-lasting protection against leafworm attacks.

Entomologists give these tips for effective leafworm control. Check cotton fields regularly and often. Spray or dust early to prevent buildups. For economy, use a broad-range pesticide to control many pests in fewer applications. And plow down cotton stalks right after harvest to deny insects a food supply.
