Changes Announced In Social Security That Affects Many In County

change in the Social Security law for today's article is one that will affect many people in Tishomingo County. This change in the length of time a person has to work under social security to get retirement pay for himself or to qualify for survivor's benefits is the subject of the new law. Under the new law, a man reaching 65 or a woman reaching 62 this year, will need social security credit for only 2 and one-half years under social security, instead of the present requirement of 3 and one-fourth years. The reduction in the amount of work required for benefits also applies in the case where the worker has died. Their survivors may qualify for payments beginning with August. As before, however, no one has become entitled to benefits with less than a year and a half of social security credit.

You may have inquired before and been told you couldn't qualify, but do so again. This new change which lowers the amount of work required for benefits will enable many people in Tishomingo County to get monthly payments for the first time. See your Social Security Representative in the City Hall in Iuka any Monday to file your claim.

Two In Hospitals And Two In Jail; 20-Gauge Shotguns Were Used

Three persons were seriously and painfully wounded in a shooting fracas early Wednesday morning, Sheriff Clarence Pace reports.

Clarence Rast, a sawmill operator, is in a Memphis hospital in an extremely serious condition. He was wounded in the back and lungs. Albert Aldridge is in Colbert County Hospital in Sheffield

with serious head and facial wounds. Jimmy Rast, son of Clarence Rast, was treated in a local clinic and dismissed. He was painfully but not seriously wounded.

The shooting took place about 6:30 Wednesday morning on Crippled Deer Creek in the 3rd District at the sawmill operated by Clarence. It is reported that Clarence Rast and Marshall Aldridge father of Albert Aldridge, had trouble late Tuesday afternoon and when the men arrived at the Rast sawmill Wednesday morning the arguments started again.

Warrants have been issued for Walter Selmon, Albert Aldridge and Marshall Aldridge, the father, are in Tishomingo County jail. Definite charges have not been filed pending the condition of Clarence Rast. If no deaths result from the shooting the charges will be assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill and murder. In the event a death should come because of the shooting the charge will be murder.

Weapons involved in the shooting were two 20-gauge shotguns. Marshall Aldridge and Walter Selmon were arrested Wednesday morning as they returned from the Colbert County Hospital.

Officers investigating the shooting are Sheriff Clarence Pace, Deputy Sheriff Pat Patterson and Iuka Chief of Police H. F. Chambers. The investigation is being continued.

CAPITAL NEWS

Mississippi Calf Crop

The 1961 calf crop in Mississippi is expected to total 923,000 head. This is slightly less than the 925 thousand head born in 1960, but is about 2 per cent more than the 10-year (1950-59) average of 908 thousand head. The number of cows and heifers two years old

and over on January 1, 1961, was 1,214,000 head, compared to 1,233,000 head on hand a year earlier, and the 10-year average of 1,223,000 head. The expected number of calves born or to be born in 1961 expressed as a percentage of cows and heifers 2 years old and over on January 1, 1961, is 76 per cent. This is one per cent more than last year, and two per cent above average.

State Employment

Mississippi employment moved upward for the fourth straight month in June. Although the gain was small and largely seasonal in nature, there were indications of continued improvement in some of the major industries. Manufacturing employment reported a healthy gain during the month. Average weekly hours for Miss. factory production workers moved upward for the fourth straight month. Nonmanufacturing employment changes in June were mainly seasonal, dropped 284,300 in May to current figure of 283,400. June losses were entirely to normal summer cutbacks in school payrolls.

Business Activity

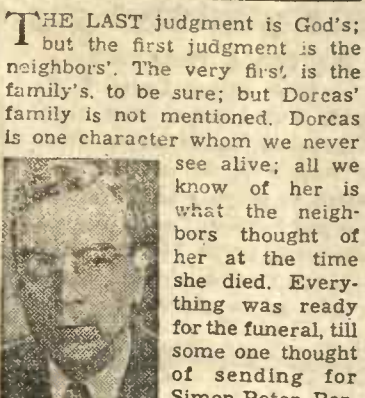
State business activity has achieved a new all-time high level for May and June according to recent reports. Moreover, July business volume will probably be as good. Mississippi bank debits total-

Remembered—For What?

A funeral is a great place for memories. Every one comes early and they sit there thinking about their memories of the one who has died. And after the funeral they talk with one another about the one they all remember. But if people are remembered, it is always because of something in particular. One man is remembered for his funny stories, another for his bad temper, another for his sharpness in business, another because he was the governor. Good, bad or indifferent, we shall all be remembered for something or other. This Dorcas was remembered for clothes—not the clothes she wore but those she had made for others. In those days a widow had no way of earning an income, and life insurance was unheard-of. So Dorcas had with her own hands made many a garment for poor widows—and that was what the women brought to the funeral. Suppose Dorcas had been a dreamer and an intender? Suppose she had thought that making clothing for poor neighbors was somehow beneath her dignity? Suppose she had dreamed of some big thing, like changing the world so there would never be any poor people anywhere? Good intentions

People really want you back only if you are truly indispensable. Dorcas was that rare kind of person. Her needle and thread, her practical skill, all gone now. There was no one to take her place. People wanted her back, just as she was. Even God wanted her back, or Peter's prayer would have been in vain.—How much of a hole would you leave if you died today?

Seven-day Religion

We do not know what creed Dorcas professed. Would she have been a Roman Catholic, a Methodist, a Presbyterian? We are not told. How long every day did she sit reading the Bible? Was she high church or low church? What did she do with her Sabbath days? We do not know,—nothing was said about these items when Peter came to that upper room. The things the women showed him were things that Dorcas made on week-days, no doubt. It was what she did on week-days that made her memorable and beloved. Now we do know one thing about her mind and heart. She is called simply a “disciple.” She was a follower of the Lord Jesus, she believed in him above all. But having said this important thing about Dorcas, Luke (writing Acts) at once says, she was full of good works and charity. Maybe she was full of enthusiasm—of kind words—of true doctrine—of good looks—of education, or what not. That was not the point. That was not the way she was remembered. She was full of good works.

New Bridge Across Mississippi Opens

A new \$14 million bridge spanning the Mississippi River from Friar's Point to Helena, Arkansas, was officially opened July 27. Previously, a ferry provided the only means for automobile crossings between Greenville and Memphis. The new bridge will give the state four Mississippi river crossings, and should greatly increase east-west tourist travel through Miss.

State Sells Port

Development Bonds One and two tenths million in port development bonds have been sold to build a banana terminal at the state port of Gulfport. The bonds were sold to First National City Bank of New York and associates, including Deposit Guaranty Bank and Trust Company of Jackson, at 3.4476 per cent interest. The same firm also bought \$3 million in port development bonds for the city-county port at Pascagoula at 3.471 per cent interest. The \$1.2 million sold for Gulfport will be used to retire \$500,000 in outstanding city port development bonds and to pay for the terminal. The \$3 million sold for Pascagoula will be used to retire \$2 million

in county port development bonds and to complete a 2.1 million bushel grain elevator scheduled for dedication September 15.

Grenada Plant To Open In August

Machinery is now being unloaded by Lyon, Inc. at their new plant in Grenada and applications are being received for employment at the plant. Management of the company announced that it hoped to begin hiring about the 15th of August and to open at that time.

Amory Gets New Plant

Construction will begin immediately on a new 100 by 200 foot building in Amory to be occupied by a waist band manufacturing firm owned by Harry and Herman Copen of New York. The industry will employ about 75.

Electroplating Plant

To Open In Kosciusko Kosciusko's Industrial Development Corporation announced in July the location of the sixth new plant in that city since the IDC began operations in April 1959: Kan-Kote, Inc., an electroplating firm. Plant manager Paul Goree said that final installation would be completed within a month and he expected to employ 12 to 15 workers. The new plant will specialize in nickel, chrome, calcium, brass, copper, tin and silver electroplating, aluminum anodizing and dyeing, lacquering, polishing and buffing.

Construction Started On Poplarville Plant Expansion

Final phases of a contract for the construction of an additional 8,700 square feet of floor space in the Movie Star plant (lingerie) at Poplarville were completed during a July visit to the plant by New York company officials. The new addition increases the avail-

Yocona Area Boy Scouts Return
From Exciting Canadian Canoe Trip

Thirty two scouts and three scoutmasters from the Yocona Area Council have returned from a 17 day canoe trip into the Quetico-Superior National Forest, located in northern Minnesota and the Province of Quebec. Eight days were allowed for travel to and from the Charles L. Sommers Wilderness Base near Ely, Miss., where they abandoned their bus and took to canoes for the next 9 days of Canadian lake travel and wilderness camping.

At the base the group was divided into three crews, with a scoutmaster and guide leading each crew. They charted their routes each day, and upon return nine days later, the three trips ranged from 130 to 139 miles.

The longest trip was made by the crew from Tishomingo and Alcorn counties, advised by Ed Thomas and guided by Jereaux Sharp, a student of engineering from Ashland, Wisconsin. Advisors for the other two crews were Johnny Robbins of Shannon, Miss., and Tour Director Jim Foster of Wayne, Arkansas. Both Mr. Robbins and Mr. Foster are students at the University of Mississippi.

Scouts forming the Tishomingo-Alcorn crew were: Eddie Thomas, Douglas Nixon and Jim Thomas of Iuka; Richard Warriner, Jimmy Huggins, S. H. Dees, Richard Scott, and Jimmy Coffman of Corinth; Frank Nixon of Byhalia and Dee Labarreare of Falkner. Also with this crew was novice guide Bob Vouk, eighteen year old engineering student from Sand Rapids, Minnesota.

The 139 mile canoe trip included 40 portages, the longest being one and one half miles. Over these portages canoes, personal packs and food packs ranging from 75 to 100 pounds, were carried. The terrain was rugged; the lakes mirror smooth and crystal clear. All on different levels, they are joined by swift rapids or deep falls. The scouts "shot" these rapids, walked them or made portage around them. They traveled eight hours a day and one night, however, the night travel was not all done in darkness. There is still daylight in the canoe country at 10 p. m. this time of year.

The scouts saw log jams possibly 100 years old. They discovered a steamship boiler that remains a mystery. How the ship got there or when it was lost is not known. They saw Indian paintings done on rocky cliffs hundreds of years ago, and Jim Thomas found an axe, the type used by pioneer lumber jacks in the north woods. It's age was determined between 75 and 100 years. Jim presented the axe to Charles L. Sommers Museum as a gift from crew 716A, Yocona Council.

The trip by bus, driven by Roy Linebacher of Ripley took the group through St. Louis, Mo., Lancaster, Ill., Duluth, Minn., and on to Ely. The return was made along the Lake Superior drive, across the state of Minnesota to Wisconsin Dells, Chicago, Champaign, Ill., Cairo, and home again in Miss.

New Ditch Will
Pay Cost Of
Construction

"That new ditch you Soil Conservation men surveyed for me, and I had cut, will pay for the entire cost of construction this year", said Zeb B. Osborn of the Boggs Chapel community.

This small dragline ditch drains about 20 acres of good bottom land on Mr. Osborn's farm.

Some of the heaviest rains that have ever occurred in the Boggs Chapel community came this spring. "Those floods would have drowned my crops on most of this 20 acres had it not been for this new ditch", says Mr. Osborn.

"It costs so much to produce a crop these days a man cannot afford to fail if he possibly can avoid it", continued Mr. Osborn.

He also said that this new ditch, one-half mile long, is one of the greatest improvements I have ever made on my farm.

We, of the Soil Conservation Service, are interested in good land use. We are happy that Mr. Osborn is pleased with his new dragline ditch and that it has proved to be so beneficial.

Any landowner who has cropland needing drainage should contact the local Soil Conservation Service technicians. Come by our office in Iuka and discuss your land problems with us. We may be able to help you solve them.

Changes in Farming

You hear a lot about loss in
numbers of farms and farmers.
But maybe this does not give a
true picture of the situation.

It is true that we have fewer
farms and farmers, but here the
decline stops. Farms are larger.
They are more productive. More
farmers own their farms. There
are fewer tenants.

Farm expenditures have increas-
ed tremendously, but so has
farm income.

Here are some examples. The
average size of Mississippi farms
has increased from 82 acres in
1949 to 135 in 1959; value of the
farm increased from \$4,400 in
1949 to \$13,000 in 1959.

Percentage of farms operated
by tenants decreased from 52 per
cent in 1949 to 32 per cent in 1959.
Farms providing incomes of less
than \$2,500 decreased from 85
per cent in 1949 to 45 per cent
in 1959.

Farm production expenses in-
creased from \$366 million in 1949
to \$441 million in 1959, but gross
farm income increased too. From
\$655 million in 1949 to \$748 mil-
lion in 1959.

Farming is big business in Miss-
issippi. The entire economy of
the state is geared to agriculture.
By following recommendations of
the Agricultural Extension Ser-
vice, based on experiment station
research results, you can do much
toward improving the economic
situation in the state.

Pasture Jobs

Clip all pastures that have not
been clipped. Do not clip them
close, but raise the clipper blade
so as to take out only weeds and

Farm Facts

Milk production per cow has
increased from 5,314 pounds in
1950 to 7,004 pounds in 1960.
This is an increase of 31.8%.

An indication of the poten-
tial for future gains is given
by the performance of cows in
herds where the level of man-
agement is above average. In
1959, output of cows in the
Dairy Herd Improvement As-
sociation averaged 10,300 lbs.
of milk per cow.

The U. S. Department of Agri-
culture says that revolution-
ary advances in producing
and marketing milk have re-
sulted in some rapid changes
on dairy farms.

The size of dairy herds has
been increasing and the num-
ber of farms producing milk
has been declining. The re-
markable increase in produc-
tion per cow and relative
stability of the demand for
milk mean that the supply can
be produced by fewer cows on
fewer dairy farms.

The world's milk production
in 1958-59 totaled 238.5 million
metric tons, according to the
Food and Agriculture Organ-
ization of the United Nations.
Milk production in the United
States accounted for an esti-

world output.

287 pounds per person in the
United States in 1960. Wages

not good grass.

Start immediately following
land for early September planting
of oats. Make sure that you plant
only treated oat seed. Don't take
a chance on losing your early oats
grazing due to leaf blotch.

Manage your Sudan or millet so
that not over two hours grazing
is done on an area in any one day.
If you think you will need addi-
tional grazing in September or
October, you can plant millet, Su-
dan or grain sorghum.

If your pastures has not been
limed within the past five years,
put lime on it at the rate of one
ton per acre.

Alternate grazing on all per-
manent pastures. If possible,
graze no area longer than a week
without giving it a rest.

Harvest all hay crops when the
first blooms show up. If one is
available, run the hay through a
hay conditioner.

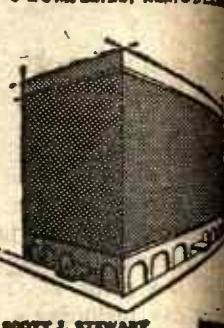

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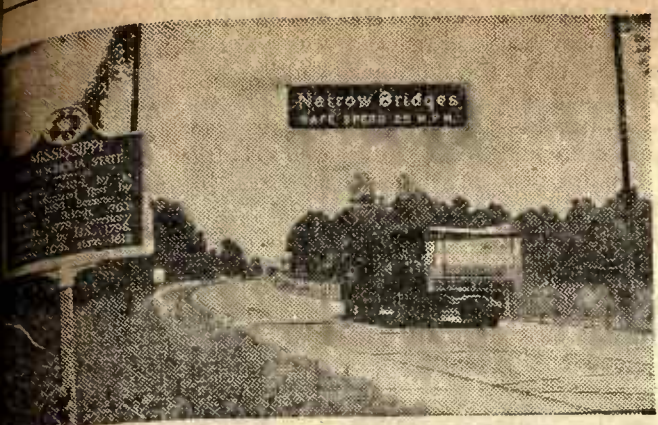

Highways and PROGRESS

Many Problems, Then And Now, Dictate Roadbuilding Program

He heard it said many times. Mississippi. It dictated the type have and the one we need. Crisis in Finances

While money has been a chronic problem since early days of road building, the big crisis for Miss. came in 1928 when the federal roads used a hundred years ago, and today it's the difference be-

tween the highway system we government announced that the state lacked requirements to qualify for federal aid, and that no further allotments would be made after June 30, 1929.

The announcement spelled doom for the future of Mississippi highways, since then, as now, federal aid supported a large share of the cost of new highway construction in the state. Governor Theodore Bilbo quoted a government estimate that the state's 250 thousand automobile owners were losing \$30,000,000 annually as a result of bad roads, and asked for immediate reorganization of the State Highway Department in a session of the legislature.

Legislative Study

The extra session resulted in the creation of a committee which the Legislature directed to make a complete and thorough investigation of highway needs and report back to the 1930 regular session. The five-member committee spent the entire year of 1929 in the investigation.

The Stansel Act of 1930 set up the basic framework for present day highway administration in Mississippi. This act was based on a report furnished by Horace Stansel, head of the special investigative committee that was established by the 1929 legislature. The Stansel Act provided for:

sel Act provided for:

1. A primary road system not to exceed 4,000 miles and to consist of roads previously designated as the federal aid system plus such additional roads which would provide reasonable connection between county seats, principal highways of adjoining states, other places of 500 population or over, and state institutions. The State was made responsible for construction and maintenance.

2. A secondary road system with a maximum limit of 2,000 miles which consisted of all other highways previously designated to be under state maintenance, plus some specified additions.

3. A three-member Highway Commission (one from each supreme court district) with complete control and supervision over the Highway System. The Commission was to appoint a secretary and a director, the director to employ a chief engineer and engineers of construction, maintenance and bridges.

4. Gave the Commission power of eminent domain in securing highway right-of-way.

5. Authorized construction by the counties and cities of links of roads for incorporation into the system with a provision for their reimbursement after they had been absorbed into the network.

More Demands Heard

Along came the early 30's with the depression and growing demand for improved public highways. Tourist sections complained that travelers were by-passing Miss. because of poor highways.

Governor Hugh White, in his

1936 inaugural address, stated: "My sole desire in this matter is to see that we are gotten out of the mud, dust and gravel as quickly as possible". Taking advantage of emergency federal aid legislation to embark on its largest highway construction program, a system of state primary and secondary roads touching all 82 counties was called for.

The program began with an issuance of \$23 million in notes. In 1938, the Legislature authorized issuance of an additional \$60 million set aside for funds on the previous issue and the remainder for new construction another \$32 million bond issue was approved in 1946.

While these bond issues helped overcome an earlier lag in road construction, they failed to provide a long-range approach to needs which mushroomed as the industrial pace quickened, and as changing times brought new emphasis on transportation.

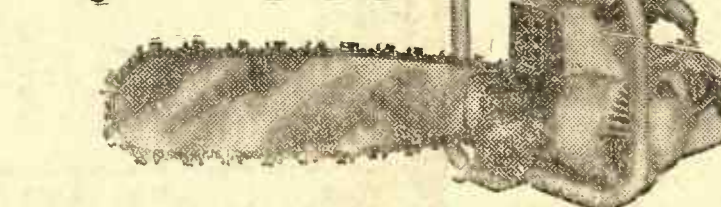

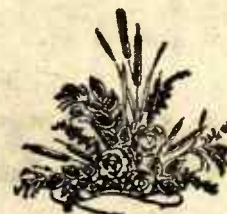
