The Army has announced that it is putting 113
National Guard and Reserve units on alert for possi-
ble call up later.

The alert takes units in 22 States which
will cover more than 23,000 men at full strength. The
Army also announced other moves for strengthening
its forces including extension of duty periods for
various classes of officers and men.

The only Mississippi units involved in the alert
are the 114th Military Police Company at Jackson.
The draft will call 25,000 men in September and
an estimated 20,000 in October.

Six months' enlistments will be restricted to
youths under 20 from September first until next De-
cember.

Selected individual and officer reservists not
now in units will be recalled to active duty for not
more than 12 months unless there are enough vol-
unteers to fill the need.

Doctors, dentists, and other medical specialists
will be inducted if there are not sufficient volunteers.

The Army said its program will bring American
forces in Europe, including the Seventh Army, to
full strength and will double the number of combat
ready divisions in the strategic reserve from three
to six.

Several Cases Will Be Presented To
Grand Jury For Investigation

Paden School Buildings Rented By Adams Brothers

Adams Brothers Manufacturing

made. The company has plants in
Booneville, Miss., McKenzie, Tenn.,
and in Ohio.

A spokesman for the plant stated
that the contract had been
signed and that work would begin
immediately. The company is ex-
pected to employ some 100 men
in the very near future.

The Paden school buildings
were rented for a term of years
at \$1.00 per year. Some remodel-
ing of the building is expected to
be done by the company later on.

A. Sides, executive direc-
tor of the Mississippi State Park
Commission, announces that a
lake will be constructed at Tish-
omingo State Park. The lake will
be approximately 70 acres in size
and will afford water sports for
the park. Mr. Sides in-
tends that with the construction
of the Tishomingo State Park
then be equipped to afford
rounded recreational pro-
gram.

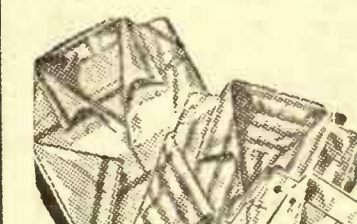

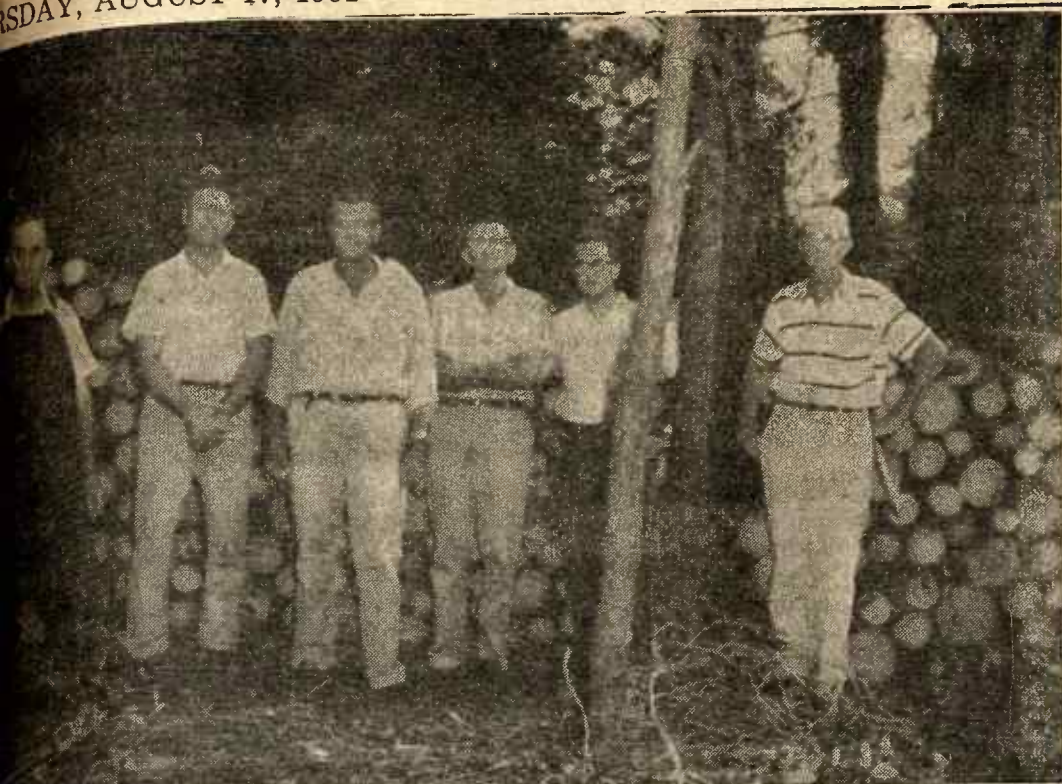

HIGHWAYS and PROGRESS

Study Made, New Interstate Ads, 1961 Report Coming

ART FOUR—The Highway Program Grows

Legislature named a Highway Study Committee, employed the Automotive Safety Foundation of Washington, D. C., to analyze needs and recommend a solution. A program growing out of this study was adopted in the session of 1950. The Automotive Safety Foundation had recommended a state system of 5,900 miles, a state aid system of 13,500 miles. The study also set up the framework for financing and constructing this system.

The Legislature adopted an 8,600-mile state highway system; assigned over 11,000 miles of county roads to the State Aid System and created the State Aid Division to work with county boards of supervisors in building these roads. To finance the program, the gasoline tax was raised from six to seven cents, and a portion of the state sales tax was channeled into State Aid funds.

Gasoline Tax Divided

The 1950 law set up a new division of the gasoline tax—2½ cents

to the counties, 4½ cents to the State Highway Department, after deductions for bond service, refunds, motor vehicle comptroller, coast counties and others.

The most significant aspect of this legislation was a provision setting aside 1½ cents of the Highway Department's share of the gasoline tax to match federal aid for new construction. While falling far short of annual needs, this source of construction funds has made possible a sustained program far more effective than earlier crash programs.

Interstate System Begun

The federal government took a far-reaching step in 1956 when Congress approved the Interstate Highway Program, which included four of Mississippi's principal trunk highways. This federal system of highways, deemed vital to national defense as well as civilian traffic, covers 41,000 miles in the United States, including 675 miles in Mississippi. They parallel present U. S. Routes 51, 80, 11 and 90.

Design standards on these highways are the highest ever practiced in Mississippi. They are being built to a minimum of four lanes, all divided, with fully-controlled access and separation structures for all crossing traffic.

Due to their importance nationally, the federal government is paying 90 per cent of the cost, as compared with the 50-50 matching ratio on remaining federal aid highways. Construction is moving forward on Interstate highways in Mississippi, and more and more their impact is being felt as new links are opened. When completed, they are expected to take over 20 per cent of all vehicular traffic in the state.

From the early trails, Mississippi has developed a system of 9,250 miles of state highways. Stretched end to end, they would reach more than a third of the way around the world. They serve every county, and reach into most of the organized communities. The Highway Commission says unpaved mileage on the secondary system is still a problem that will take years to accomplish. Old primary roads, in many places are failing under present-day traffic, and congestion is a problem in growing urban areas.

Today, Mississippians own 800,000 motor vehicles. By 1975, this number is expected to exceed 1,000,000. With this growth will come new demands for highways.

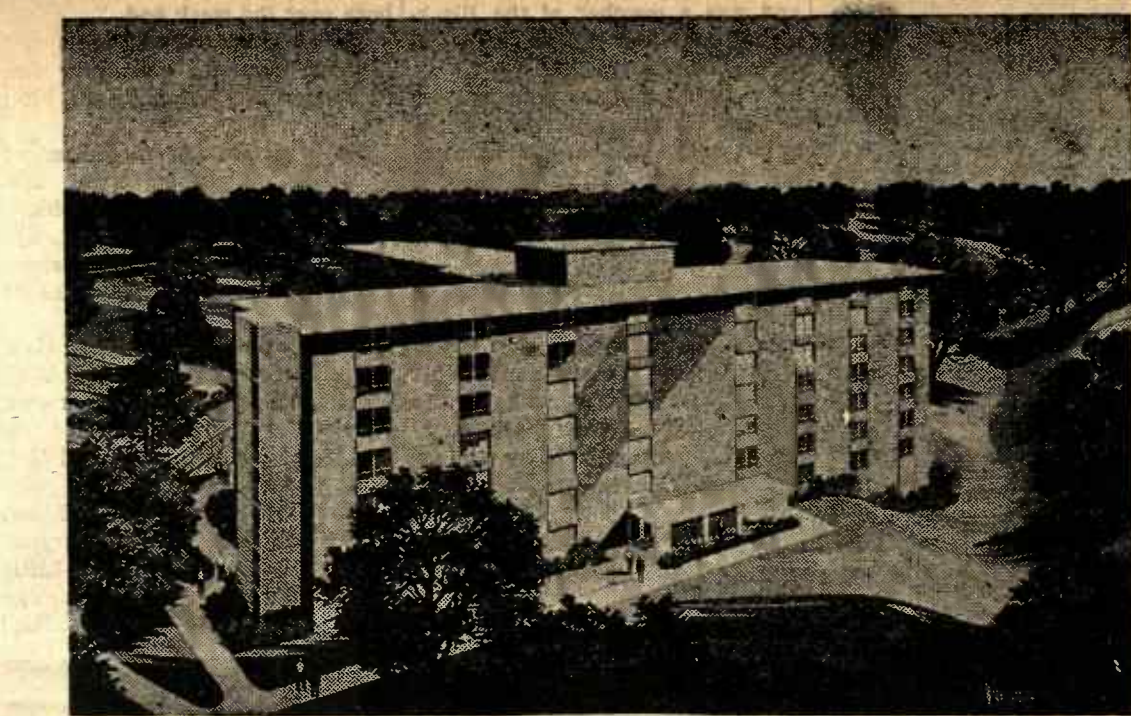
Another legislative study is now being made of highway needs in Mississippi. The Automotive Safety Foundation is again blueprinting a plan to keep the state's highways abreast. A report is expected in the late fall for consideration by legislators who begin their next regular session in January.

The action taken there will have a far-reaching on Mississippi's future growth.

Women Have Better Vision When It Comes to Color

Women in general have a better color awareness than men, says Rita Long, New York color stylist. That's why Miss Long believes that a woman's role in selecting exterior colors for a new or existing home should be a major one.

Here are some of her suggestions:

The color scheme of a house should always be related closely to its natural surroundings. "But that doesn't mean you can't use lively colors," Miss Long says.

"For a desert house, for instance, I might choose sand beige siding, a cactus yellow door, sage green trim, and a roof of white asphalt shingles," she explains, "an especially good choice in hot climates because they keep the house cooler by reflecting the sun's rays without glare."

For a house on a rocky hillside, Miss Long suggests white siding, a barn red panel door and shutters, medium green asphalt shingles to blend with sur-

rounding trees, and a long, low planter of natural stone to tie the house into the landscape.

It's best to choose the roof color first, then plan the other exterior colors around it, Miss Long advises. Asphalt shingles will last for many years, whereas the siding and trim can be painted every few years.

In selecting the color for siding, be sure it's appreciably darker or lighter than the roof. Miss Long warns, "For instance, if you choose a light gray roof and want blue siding, pick a dark blue. 'You need contrast in value as well as in hue,' she explains.

"Don't be afraid of color," says Miss Long. "Look how lavishly nature uses it! But be guided by the natural colors in your area. With asphalt shingles available in many colors, ranging from light to deep tones, and the wide palette of exterior paints now being sold, your house can be completely individual yet look as though it belongs in its surroundings."



Lime Your Land; It Makes A Difference

If you haven't noticed the difference lime makes in plant growth, just take a look.

No doubt you or your neighbor applied some lime on pasture or cropland during the past three years. Take a look at the limed area, see if you can discern a difference between the limed area and the unlimed part of the field.

Lime helps pasture and crop plants in three ways. It neutralizes soil acidity, supplies calcium and sometimes magnesium (if it is dolomite lime), and increases availability of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium in the soil.

It has also been found by research at Auburn, Alabama Experiment Station that "cotton seedlings on limed soil will be more vigorous and survive better during early spring than will cotton on more acid soil. Plants often do not fully recover from a poor start and yield is reduced." This is a direct quotation from a technical paper published by R. D. Rouse and Fred Adams, Department of Agronomy and Soils, Auburn, Ala.

Tishomingo County farmers have been plagued with poor stands and slow growth of cotton this year. Soil acidity or lack of lime may be partly the cause of this.

All cotton farmers of Tishomingo County will be benefitted by having their soil tested and applying the lime and fertilizer needed as shown by these soil tests.

A good rule to follow is if you haven't applied any lime or basic slag to your land, you need to lime it. Use one ton of lime per acre.

Lime is cheap but it could increase your yield of cotton far more than you could ever imagine. There are instances where the yield has been doubled by liming the land.

A half stand of cotton gives little protection to the soil, and the farmer very little profit.

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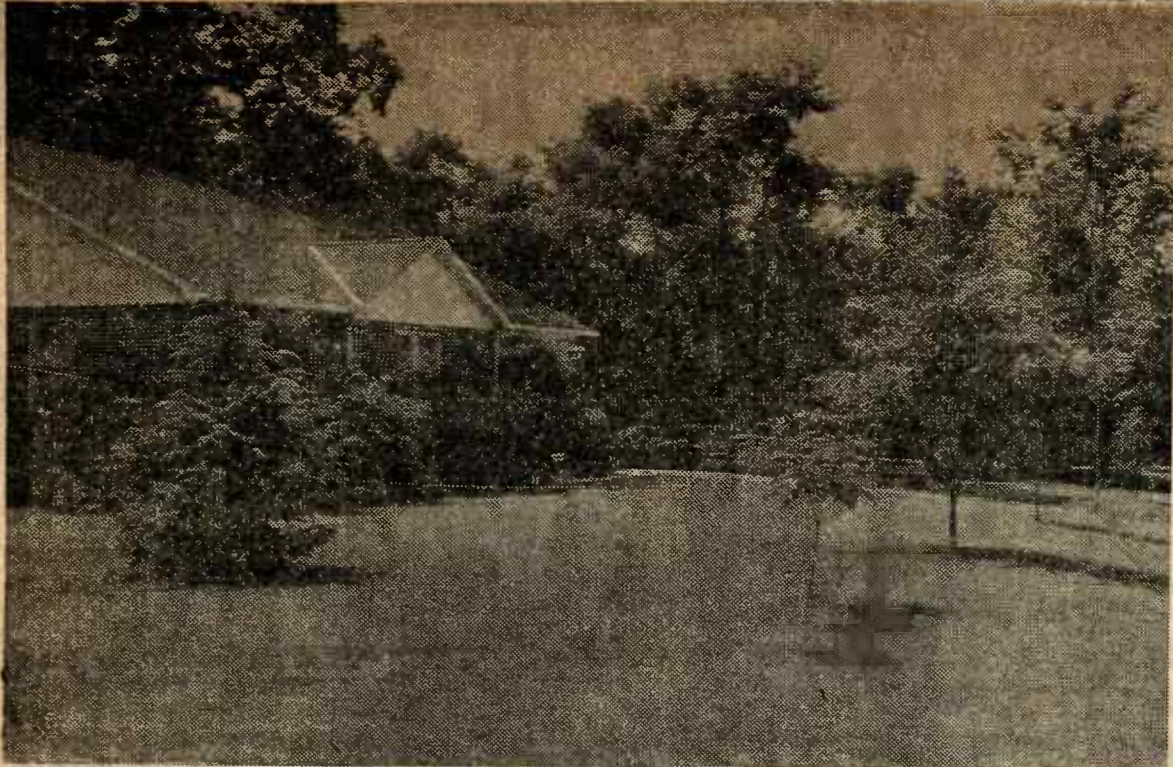

At the recent meeting of the Board of Directors of the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association, a resolution was adopted honoring the memory of the late James Clinton Jourdan, Jr. The Resolution stated:

WHEREAS: Monday, June 5, 1961 marked the passing of James

Clinton Jourdan, Jr., one of the area's most valuable and influential citizens.

Mr. Jourdan was born in Iuka and educated here, at Mississippi Heights Academy and at the University of Mississippi, graduating in law. His studies were interrupted by World War I, and he vol-

unteered for naval service. At war's end he returned to the University and completed his legal education. While there he served as president of his law class, the Masonic Club and the Gob's Club and was a member of the Blackstone and AEF Clubs and Phi Sigma Fraternity.

On graduation he entered politics and served two terms as county attorney. During this time he married Miss Gladys Carmichael to which union a daughter, Mrs. R. L. Brown, Jr., was born. There are two grand-children.

Mr. Jourdan served 16 years as chancery clerk, retiring from politics in 1952.

WHEREAS: In addition to his political career he was one of the area's most successful businessmen, his interests being timber and lumber, hardware and building.

He was a lifelong member of the Iuka Methodist Church, serving half his life as a member of the Official Board and for a time as chairman of that body. He was a charter member of the Iuka Rotary Club and a director for 26 years of Tishomingo County Electric Power Association.

The Ole Miss Yearbook of 1921 described J. C. Jourdan, Jr. as one who "gained little fame as an orator, but his advice was worth listening to. Few there are in this county and far beyond who have not gone to him for advice and benefitted thereby. His humor never failed and he had an appropriate story for every occasion."

WHEREAS: Looking back on the life of J. C. Jourdan, Jr. we see remarkable success in every field of endeavor; in business, politics, in religious and family life, but his greatest success was in service to his fellow man. Only a few of his intimates knew of the hundreds of loans, or more properly, donations, to the needy from whom there was never a thought of collecting. Few knew of the mill workers and others so often waiting in the store "to see Mr. Little for a little money" which was never denied. Few have there been who gave so much to the least of their brethren.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the directors of Tishomingo County Electric Power Association express to the family of James Clinton Jourdan, Jr. sincere appreciation for his life of service, devotion to duty and good influence upon them and the people of this area.
