Iuka School To Open Thurs. And Friday, Aug. 31-Sept. 1

Additional Courses Offered This
Year; Guidance Program Started

Opening activities for the 1961-62 session of the Iuka First District Schools will begin Wednesday, August 30, at 2:00 o'clock, when the faculty will meet for a discussion of objectives for the year and for making plans for the necessary procedures of school opening.

School officials feel that more time than heretofore taken should be devoted to the individual pupil as he enrolls and chooses his courses; two days have therefore been designated for this purpose.

Juniors and seniors will report for registration on Thursday morning, August 31, at 8:00 o'clock and will remain as long as necessary, probably no later than noon. All school busses will make their runs on this day; this will not only provide transportation for the two classes registering, but will give bus drivers an opportunity while

lightly loaded to gain familiarity with their routes. All juniors and seniors are urged to be present, since no schedule adjustment involving them can be promised after this time.

On Friday, September 1, beginning at 8:00 o'clock, the elementary school and the remainder of the high school, grades 7, 8, 9, and 10, will go through the process of enrolling. It is expected that this will be completed by noon. All busses will be on their routes and all pupils in these grades are earnestly requested to be present.

On Monday September 4, 7:30 to 12:30, the daily schedule will be run for grades 10, 11, and 12, with issue of textbooks and lesson assignments by the high school faculty. Grades 1 through 9 will not report for work, but the elementary school faculty will meet and prepare textbooks and cards for issue.

On Tuesday, September 5, 7:30 to 12:00, the same procedure will be followed for grades 7, 8, and 9, and the entire elementary school will assemble to receive their textbooks and first assignments.

On Wednesday, September 6, both the elementary school and the high school will proceed through the complete schedule from 8:00 to 3:00, and the first lunch of the session will be served in the cafeteria. Rev. R. L. Long, pastor of the Iuka Methodist Church, will appear before the high school session for a devotional period beginning at 8 o'clock on that day.

School officials find great satisfaction in being able to announce a significant expansion of the school program. The number of teachers has been increased from 31 to 33 and the curriculum has

been extended to include a total of 31 units now available to high school students.

Financed with State School Building Funds, a vocational shop is being constructed for use this session; four units in "type B" shop will be offered. Two years of French are being added to the course of study, and for the prospective engineer or mathematician, solid geometry and trigonometry will be given. And to aid the teenager to find his proper way through this extended program and to emerge from it with the basic training needed for his venture into higher education or an immediate vocation, a guidance program with the service of a counselor has been established.

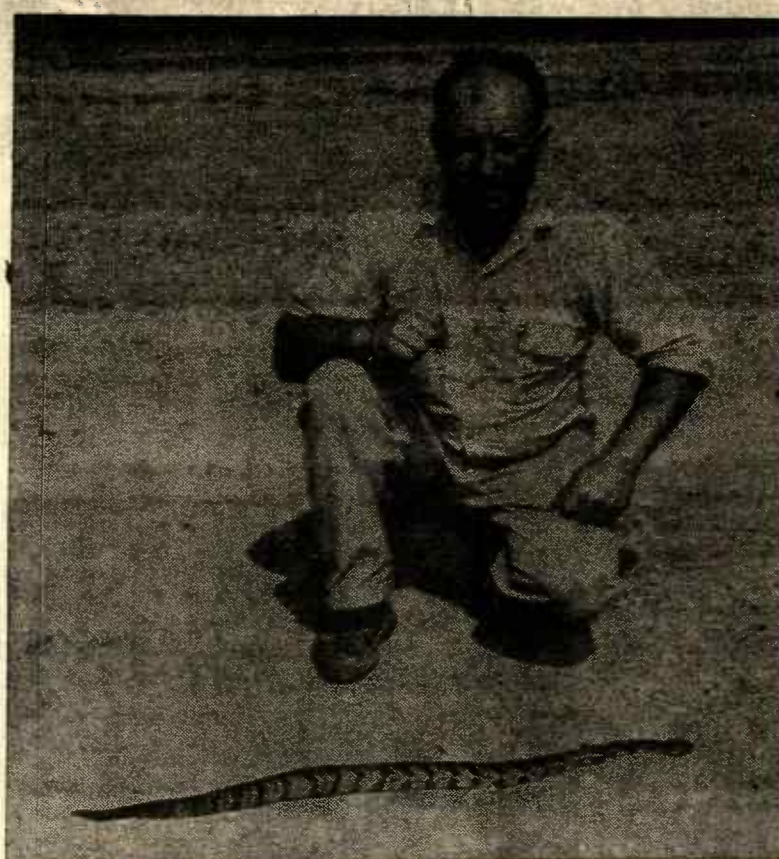
Two Iuka Boys Praised By Corinth Coach

Grand Jury Returns 44 True Bills; Civil Court In Session

Generally Good Report Of Conditions
In County Is Made By Group

In fast action, the Grand Jury of Tishomingo County Circuit Court in session this week returned 44 true bills or indictments into open court. The indictments were obtained in only a few hours with only 42 witnesses being examined to obtain the indictments.

True bills were returned for manslaughter, burglary, grand larceny, assault with intent to kill, forgery, bad checks, and desertion of minor children.

Following is text of the report made by the Grand Jury to the Court:

"NOW comes your grand jury for the Aug. 1961 term of Circuit Court of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and begs leave to submit its final report.

"We have been in session two days, have examined forty-two (42) witnesses, and have returned into open court forty-four (44) true bills.

"We have examined by committee the county home, county jail, all the factories of the county, the movie theatres, the hotels of more than two stories, the tax collector's books and the county auditor's books.

"We find the county home to be in good condition and its inmates properly provided for and looked after.

"We find the county jail to be in good condition, and the prisoners properly supervised.

"We find all the factories of the county to be in good, safe condition, equipped properly with exit doors opening outwardly as required by law and properly marked.

"We find that the tax collector's books and the county auditor's books appear to be neat, well-kept and in balance.

"The grand jury finds that the

courthouse and grounds are in a much neater and improved condition and wishes to compliment the county officials for these improvements.

"The grand jury wishes to commend Sheriff Clarence Pace for his very excellent preparation and presentation of criminal cases to the grand jury.

"AND NOW having concluded our labors, we respectfully request to be finally discharged."

Judge Raymond T. Jarvis is presiding during this session of court and J. L. Sims served as foreman of the Grand Jury.

Aug. 25 Thru Sept. 9 Will Be Sign-Up For ACP Program

Farmers Invited To Take Advantage
Of Government Aid Offered For 1962

The Local ASCS County office announces today the opening of the sign-up period for the 1962 ACP Program. The sign-up period will begin August 25, 1961, and will continue through September 9, 1961. This was announced in a letter to all farmers in the County on August 16.

A large number of farmers in the county are now making plans to sow winter cover crops or supplemental grazing such as oats, rye grass and crimson clover. The local ASCS Office is ready to take your request for this material. There is a small amount of 1961 program funds left that farmers can use if they hurry to the ASCS Office and get their request in. ASC personnel will check with you on your needs and if all funds

are exhausted you can make your request from the 1962 ACP Program. Just remember the sign up dates beginning August 25 through September 9, 1961.

The farmers attention is called to some of the conservation practices that can be used this fall:

1. Sowing fall pasture - combination of Fescue and White Dutch Clover.

2. Application of agricultural limestone on pasture and legumes.

3. Sowing winter cover crops - vetch, Austrian winter peas, rye grass, crimson clover, and oats.

If you rented some of your corn land why not begin plowing this land up and sowing it in oats and etc., for grazing beginning January 1, 1962.

4. Do you need a livestock pond? Now is the time to get it built so the fall rains will fill it.

5. What about drainage ditches, v-ditches and w-ditches? Now is the time to drain the wet fields.

At the present time all requests for a title will be taken at the ASCS Office in Iuka, until you are notified of the dates we will be at Belmont and Tishomingo. Again let me call your attention to the importance of getting your request in for any of these practices on your farm before the money is taken up.

Jackson, Miss. (Special)—Three legislative committees gave quick unanimous approval Wednesday afternoon to constitutional changes proposed by Governor Barnett for luring a \$125 million oil refinery to the Gulf Coast. Barnett called the legislature into special session yesterday to extend tax exemptions for industry and to make changes in handling of 16th Section school land in order to lure a Standard Oil refinery to the Pascagoula area.

Less than three hours after Barnett convened the special session, the constitution committees of the House and Senate and the Senate Finance Committee approved the measures for a vote by the full legislature today. Speedy approval is expected.

One resolution will amend the constitution to permit the legislature to provide for sale or 99-year leasing of 16th Section school land for industries outside the state. The other will extend the county ad valorem tax exemption for industry from five to 10 years for areas outside of a municipality. Both resolutions are designed to clear the way for construction of the Standard Oil refinery at Pascagoula.

Governor Barnett said yesterday in a speech before the legislature that these resolutions will "make all industry, both large and small, seek Mississippi sites as a place to locate."

Dr. Montgomery To Be Honored

Dr. A. H. Montgomery of Burnsville, who received his Doctor of Medicine degree in 1911, is one of 49 physicians who will be honored by the University of Tennessee Medical Units at 3:30 Sunday afternoon, Sept. 24, at the Municipal Auditorium in Memphis.

The University is recognizing the services which Dr. Montgom-

ery has rendered to his community during the half-century since his graduation. The physician will be presented with a Golden "T" certificate at commencement exercises.

Dr. Montgomery received his Doctor of Medicine degree from the old Memphis Hospital Medical College, which was consolidated with the University of Tennessee College of Medicine in 1913.

Pace Named CD Director For County

Will Coordinate Efforts
Of Citizenry In
Nuclear Safety

Sheriff Clarence Pace has been named director of Civil Defense for Tishomingo County. Mr. Pace was named to this position by State CD Director Bob Crook of Jackson with the County Board of Supervisors and the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka concurring in the action.

Mr. Pace states that all municipal governments in the county and the Board of Supervisors have agreed to cooperate fully in this most worthy effort that could mean the saving of untold thousands of lives. All the necessary equipment for testing fall-out intensity will be placed in proper hands, Mr. Pace said.

The civil defense director further stated that anyone planning to build a fall-out shelter should contact him at the sheriff's office. A recent study of a national scientific organization found that "Adequate shielding is the only effective means of preventing radiation casualties," Mr. Pace said. An information booklet is available in the sheriff's office and it is strongly urged that all residents go by and get one of the booklets that gives basic plans for the construction of fall-out shelters.

New State Enterprise

Now In Operation To Provide Development Credit For Business

A new state enterprise sponsored by the Mississippi Economic Council to provide development credit for small industries and business is now in operation, it was announced in Jackson this week.

The Mississippi Business and Industrial Development Corporation, which has been organized by a large group of Mississippi financial and business leaders, announced through its president, Minor C. Summers, Jackson, the employment of James P. (Jack) Dale as Executive Assistant and office manager.

Mr. Summers, who like the officers and directors of the new corporation, serve without pay, is president of the Mississippi Valley Gas Company.

Mr. Summers explained that a million dollars in capital stock of the new corporation is being subscribed by public utility companies, banks and other financial

institutions, and by business and professional people. He said over half the capital stock has been paid in.

The corporation's primary source of funds for business and industrial loans will come from a credit pool expected to reach \$5,000,000 in the next six months. By special act of the 1960 legislature, banks may lend the corporation up to 3% of their capital stock and surplus for use in the credit pool to aid local industry. Capital funds of the Small Business Administration of the federal government will also be made available to the new agency.

"With state-wide participation of the lending agencies in furnishing development capital, the risks are divided, the benefits multiplied and the profits shared," Summers said.

Summers said the new executive assistant, Jack Dale, has had extensive experience in the mortgage loan and public relations field.

Other officers of the corporation are R. Baxter Wilson, president of the Mississippi Power & Light Company, vice president; R. D. Morrow, Sr., president of the First Security Life Insurance Company, secretary-treasurer.

"SMALL BUSINESS"

In the recent survey of independent business sentiment on the President's proposed 10 point tax reform program conducted by the National Federation of Independent Business among its district chairmen, the one point they were overwhelmingly in favor of, by a whopping 93.4% was the recommendation to place cooperatives under same tax laws as private business with which they compete.

Under today's system when money is power, and money represents the power to modernize a business to continue to compete, or to expand to also survive, a private business can only retain that part of its earnings remaining after taxes to make any necessary improvements. First earnings must be diverted for taxes before anything else.

But cooperatives who are competing with private independent business are permitted to retain even 100% of the earnings in the business. Members are given I.O.U.'s on which they pay no personal tax until such time as the paper is picked up for cash.

Thus, it is no problem for cooperatives to continue to expand, while their privately operated competitors, unable to escape taxes in this fashion, are greatly handicapped.

Commenting on this measure, one district chairman, a leading businessman in northwest, claims over 40% of nation's business now moves through tax-free cooperatives.

To many businessmen, with the widespread growth of business enterprises under the guise of cooperatives, there is a strong drive toward socialism in the country.

As one district chairman commented, "Am definitely for taxing cooperatives the same as every other business. These co-ops are a form of socialism and socialism has about ruined Sweden and every other country where it exists."

Others commented unless cooperatives are put under the same regulations as independent business, there will not be employment producing enterprise. The survey showed quite a concern among businessmen on the question of providing more jobs for Americans.

On the president's proposal to tax undistributed income U. S. corporations derive from foreign plants, 71.9% voted in favor of this reform.

As one of the businessmen—district chairman commented, "If labor costs keep driving industry into foreign locations, there eventually won't be any source of taxes here."

Another commented "American plants in foreign countries are there for two reasons. First, to exploit cheap labor; and second, to avoid taxation."

Or as another substantial businessman—district chairman commented "I have checked on the number of American owned plants abroad, and it looks like more to come. No wonder there is so much unemployment here." In the 240 page survey report there is ample evidence everywhere, thinking citizens are asking "There may be problems in Timbuctoo, but what about us American folks at home?"

Game and Fish Commission Announces 1961-62 Waterfowl Hunting Seasons

The 1961-62 migratory waterfowl hunting seasons were announced today by John P. Camp, Jr., executive director of the Mississippi Game and Fish Commission.

Dates were selected by the Game and Fish Commission within framework of regulations fixed recently by the Fish and Wildlife Service.

Duck and coot seasons are as follows:

December 1 through December 30, 1961, both dates inclusive. Hunting will be allowed from sunrise to sunset with the exception of opening day when hunting will begin at 12 noon and continue to sunset.

The season on canvasback ducks and Redheads is closed.

Bag limits for ducks are two per day and four in possession with the exception of Wood Duck and Hooded Merganser, both having a one per day bag and possession limit.

Coot limit is six per day and six in possession.

November 10 through January 8, 1962 (both dates inclusive) are the dates for the goose hunting season. This 60-day season carries

a bag limit of five Geese per day and five in possession and not to include more than two Canadian Geese and two White Fronted Geese or one of each.

Camp said that the reduced season and bag limit on ducks and coots and the closed season on canvasbacks and redheads was necessitated by poor reproduction on breeding grounds because of extreme drought conditions.

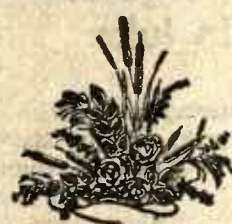

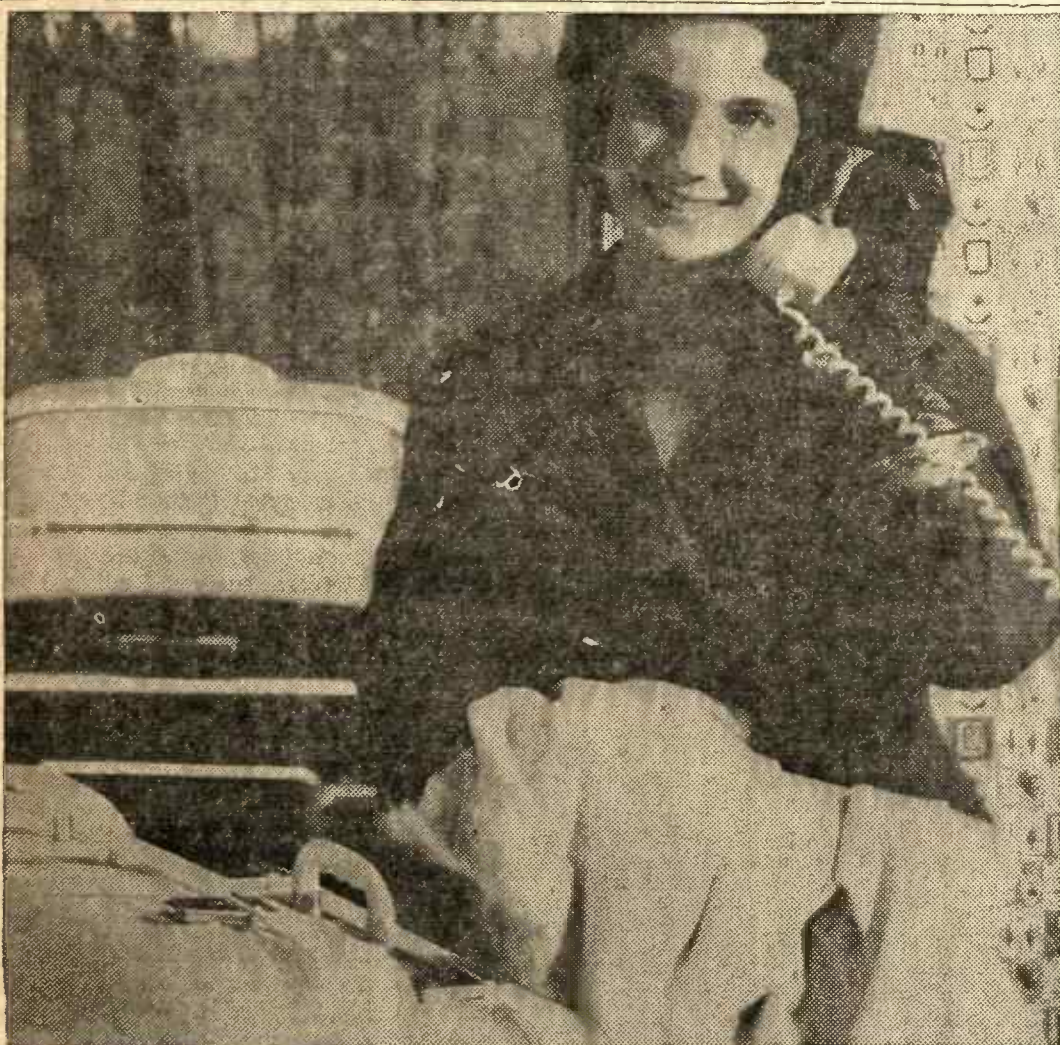

J. R. Adams Plants 5 Acres Of Coastal Bermuda

Mr. Roy Adams, who lives between Iuka and Burnsville, has established five acres of Coastal Bermuda grass just east of his house and south along highway 72.

There are people who live in glass houses and Roy has himself way out on a limb now!

People will be watching this five

acres of Coastal Bermuda he has so confidently established beside highway 72.

Most farmers have heard of Coastal Bermuda and how it can be made to produce up to 8 or 10 tons of hay per acre when heavily fertilized and with plenty of moisture. They have heard that one acre of Coastal Bermuda can, under the best conditions, furnish grazing for as many as 4 cows per acre. Because they have heard this they will be observing this 5 acres of Coastal.

In my book if a farmer can produce 4 tons of hay per acre, or if he can establish a pasture of any kind, that is permanent, that will graze 2 cows per acre he is doing an outstanding job. A pasture that will graze one cow per acre is good.

Mr. Adams is a member of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District Board of Commissioners who direct the work of Soil Conservation Service personnel in the district.

We of the Soil Conservation Service believe in Coastal Bermuda as a hay and pasture plant. We confidently believe that Roy will succeed in developing an outstanding pasture on this five acres, a pasture that he will be proud of and one that will encourage his neighbors to use Coastal Bermuda as a pasture and hay plant.

By the way, Coastal Bermuda will produce seed but they won't come up, they will not germinate.

So don't be afraid to use this plant for hay for fear it will scatter Bermuda over your cropland. There is no danger of this.

Mr. Adams is to be commended for demonstrating the use of this fine pasture and hay plant beside the highway for everyone to see.



County Agent's Notes

Mid-Year Outlook

Total crop output for the nation is likely to be down around seven percent from 1961 records highs. This is due largely to a 17-million acre cut in planted acreage.

Major cuts are in grains. Corn and sorghum are down due to acreage cuts, with corn dropping 18 percent and grain sorghum 26 percent. Oats and barley production are lower. Wheat took a 7 percent drop in production.

Soybean acreage is up 15 percent from last year for a record high. Prices are expected to remain above last year. Soybeans are in short supply. The demand is good; and carryover is only five million bushels, compared with 23 million a year ago.

Cotton disappearance in the na-

tion for the 1961-62 marketing year is estimated at 14.8 million bales—the same as last year. Domestic mill consumption is up while exports will be down slightly. The carry-over is down slightly, the lowest since 1953.

Hog production is increasing. Spring pig crop was up around seven percent. Hog prices this summer should average close to last summer, but a slight decline is expected this fall and winter.

Beef cattle number are going up. Slaughter is also up but not enough to reduce numbers. Fed cattle prices are expected to hold steady, but a little below last year.

Milk output is expected to be at higher levels than a year ago. Prices for manufacturing milk reflect higher supports. Class I prices have not reached the expected increase as larger supplies of Class I milk in relation to demand offset the price increase possibility.

Egg prices this fall compared with last fall are likely to average somewhat lower.

Broiler prices have recovered from the all-time low of late May and June. Demand for processed broilers for Labor Day may create a nationwide price increase at that

time.

Feed Grain Program

Farmers who participated in the Feed Grain program this year are asking what they can do with the land rented to the Government this year.

If you had a natural cover on this land (weeds, grass etc.) or any other type of cover this summer, you may plow this cover under any time you wish. I would recommend plowing this land right away and sowing it in a winter cover crop or either a winter and spring grazing crop. For a cover

crop, you could sow vetch or Austrian winter peas. You may sow any type of winter grazing you wish such as oats, wheat, barley etc. However, you cannot graze this land until January 1, 1962. But you can graze this land from Jan. 1, until you rent it again next year. I think this a good opportunity to build up our soils with cover crops or have extra winter grazing which many of the farmers throughout the County needs.

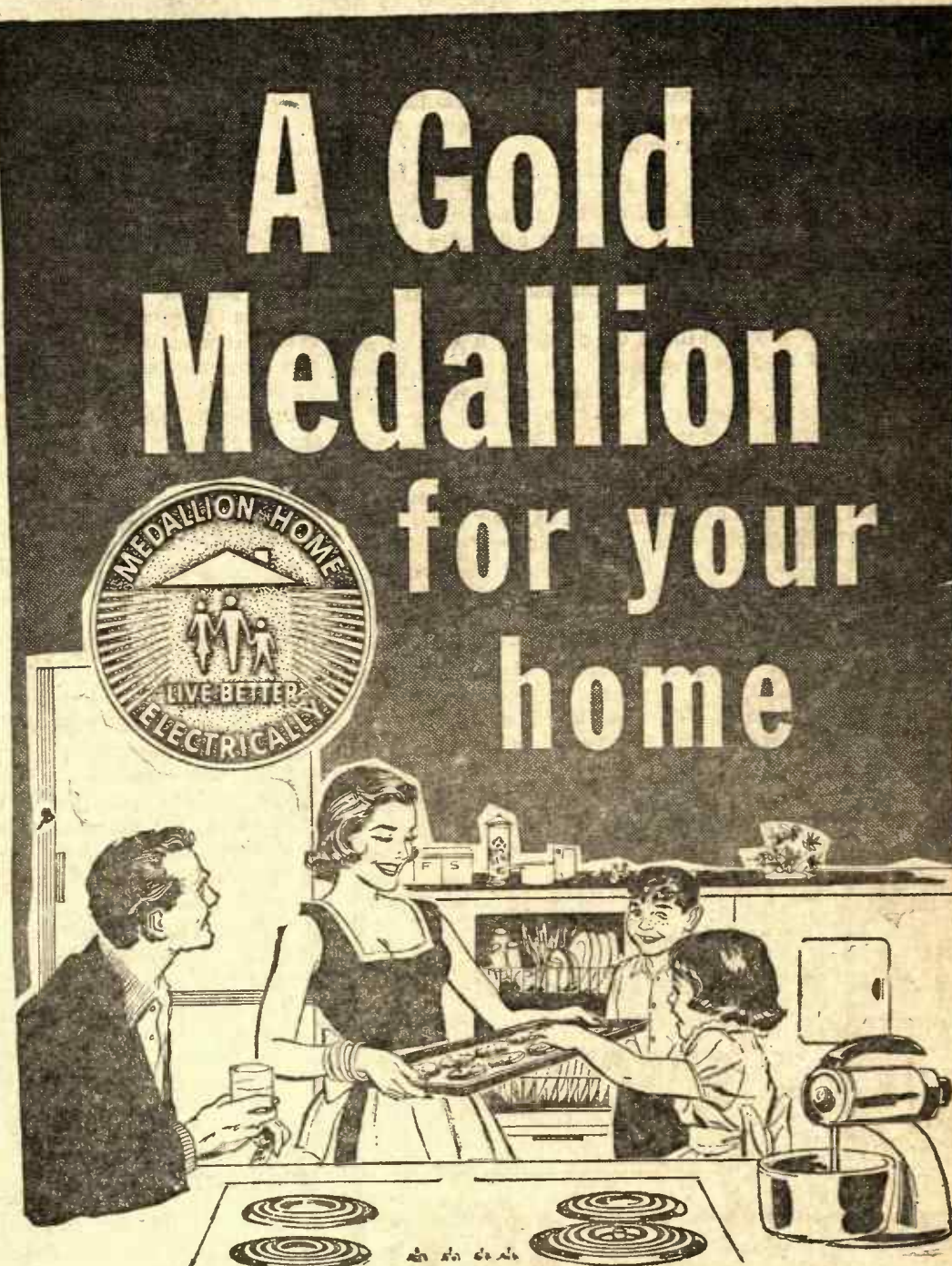

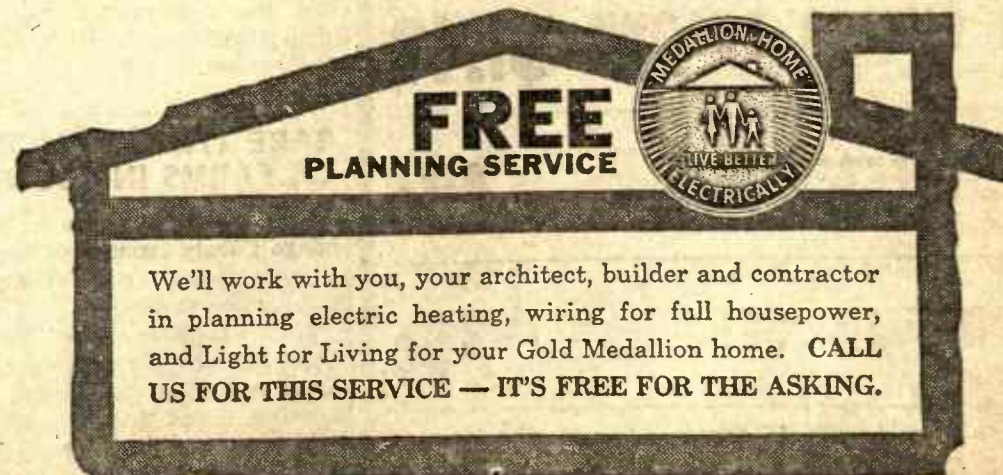

A card holder is someone who has given or offered to give blood through the Red Cross during the current year. A Red Cross blood donor is given a card which entitles the donor and his immediate family (husband or wife, minor children, parents, parents-in-law) to receive blood without obligation to replace or pay for blood.

Home Agent Notes

Window curtains on the sunny side of the house are likely to last longer if they are kept clean, according to California Experiment Station research. Most homemakers know that long exposure to sun can weaken and rot fabric. But this study shows that sunshine is more damaging to soiled than clean fabric.

Woodwork Cleaning

Regular care of the woodwork in your home should include lightly brushing and vacuuming the loose dirt.

When you need a more thorough cleaning, you may use mild suds to wash finishes that are not waxed. Be sure to rinse thoroughly and wipe dry.

Work in small areas. Water raises the grain of the wood if there is a break in the finish or if you use too much water. Work from the bottom of the woodwork to prevent streaking. Streaks caused from dripping water, if allowed to remain for any length of time, are hard to remove.

Change the water before it gets too dirty. A soft paper towel is excellent for rinsing and drying.

You can clean varnished, shell-lacked or lacquered woodwork with a solution of one tablespoon boiled linseed oil, three tablespoon turpentine and one quart of hot water. Cool, then wipe the woodwork with a soft cloth wrung from this solution. Do not use this on white finishes.

Wash waxed surfaces with mild suds. Then rinse and wipe dry and re-wax. Or you may use a liquid cleaning wax, which cleans and leaves a thin coat of wax on the surface.

Work carefully so you will not splash the walls with the cleaner. Store any cleaning material containing turpentine in a tight fitting container to avoid danger of fire.

Test Paint Color

Remember, paint is darker after it dries. Testing will help you get the color you want.

When selecting the color paint you will use, remember very light, warm colors give a neutral background for furniture and help keep the home bright and cheery. Woodwork and walls painted the same color add space to the appearance of a small room.

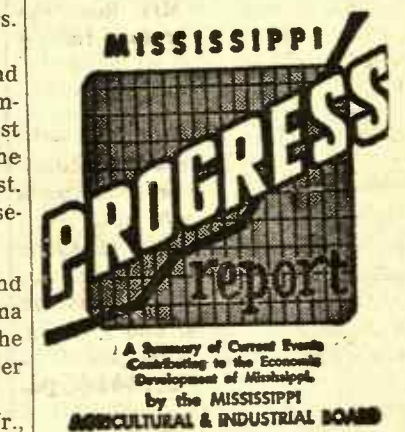

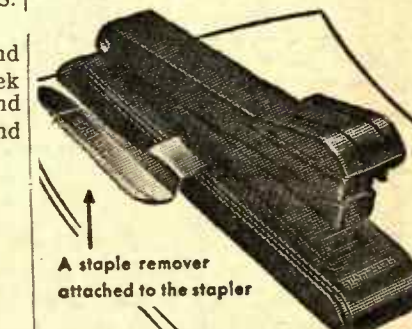

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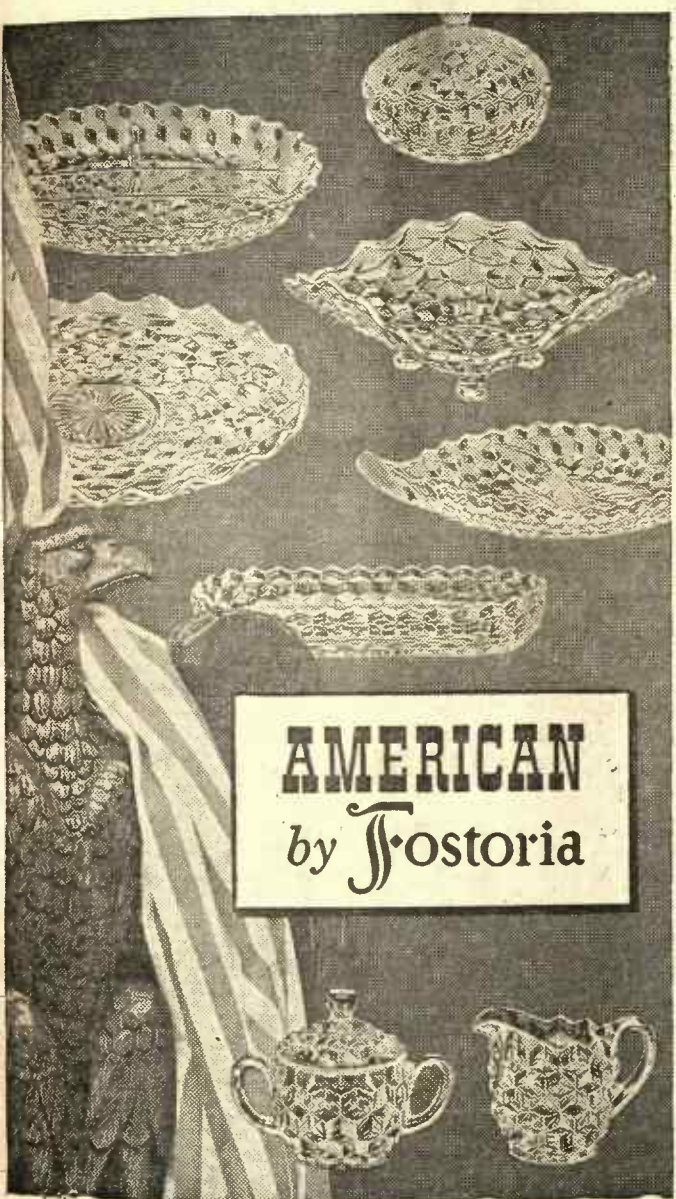

Veterans' Corner

Q—Will the Veterans Administration reimburse me, or the undertaker involved, in connection with the burial of my son in 1956? He was a war veteran.

A—Although payment not to exceed \$250 is made by the VA toward the expense of the permanent burial or cremation of a veteran, the claim must be filed within two years after the burial or cremation. It would appear that the time limit for this claim has expired in your case.

Q—Is it necessary that I finish

obtained through a direct GI loan, and since the house I am buying by this method will only cost \$13,500, can I get an improvement loan for the remaining \$2,000 at the same time?

A—You can file for a direct loan to cover the cost of the house and for an improvement loan at the same time, if the total will not exceed \$15,000.

Q—It is necessary that I finish high school in order to enter training under the War Orphans program?

A—Certain vocational programs can be entered upon under War Orphans Act provisions without a high school diploma. Consult the nearest VA office for more complete details.

Q—Has Congress granted any special benefits to peacetime veterans yet?

A—Although several proposals of peacetime benefits have been discussed in Congress, none has been enacted into law thus far.

Soybean Study Made

Survey Shows Practices That Boost Yields On Many Delta Farms

Factors that affect soybean yields on Delta farms have been studied in a survey by USDA and Delta Branch Experiment Station ecologists. They found according to a report published in the August issue of Mississippi Farm Research that planned rotations, proper planting dates, and recommended varieties were most important in producing high yields.

Fifty-two percent of farmers reporting high yields followed planned rotations and 21% more had rotations of some sort. On the other hand, only 17% of farmers with low yields followed definite rotations, with 7% more using rotations on a limited basis.

Of the farmers reporting high yields, 90% planted within 10

days of May 10 (the recommended planting date.) Only 53% reporting low yields planted during this period. As a general rule, farmers having low yields tended to plant earlier than the dates which research has shown to be best.

Recommended varieties were used by 85% of the farmers with high yields and 75% of those with low yields. New varieties developed by the USDA and the Experiment Station have increased yields materially.

Over the years, little difference was noted in average yields on clay, loam or sandy soils. Yield variability among seasons, however, was much higher on sandy soils than on clay. One farmer reported a low of 8 bushels per acre on sandy soils during a dry year and 42 bushels per acre on the same soils for a wet year.

No single operation or combination of operations involved in a seedbed preparation, planting and cultivation seemed to have any relationship to yield in results reported from this study.

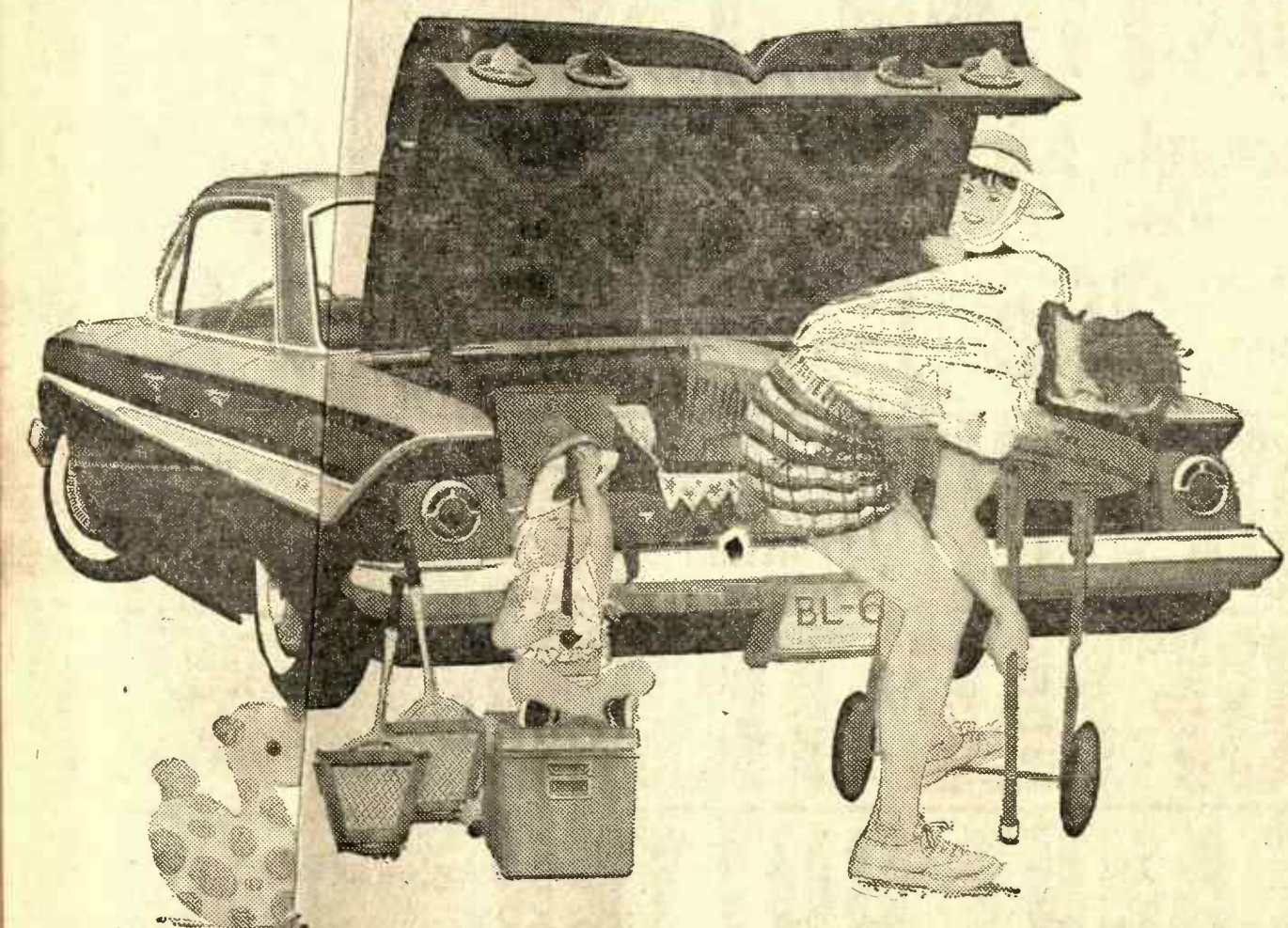
