A meeting of special interest to citizens of the area will be held in Howard Auditorium at Iuka High School on Friday night, September 1, beginning at 7:30. Purpose of this meeting is to give recognition to five outstanding young people of this area for their work in resource conservation. Recognition will be made in the form of gold certificates and gold medals furnished by the Sears Roebuck Foundation. Resource Conservation is conducted and directed in Mississippi by the Mississippi Wildlife Federation which is a statewide group of some 40,000 members made up of sportsmen and conservation clubs.

The award program in this area will be under the supervision of Leslie C. Moser, a director of the Wildlife Federation, and J. W. Howell, inactive secretary of the Federation. Others cooperating in the program will be Glenn Williams, superintendent of the Burnsville school; H. L. Shook, superintendent of the Iuka school; Area Forester Larry Brewer, County Agent P. B. Iuka School Registration In Progress, Aug. 31-Sept. 1

New Courses Being Offered This
Year; Guidance Program Added

Opening activities for the 1961-62 session of the Iuka First District School got underway Wednesday afternoon, when the faculty met for a discussion of objectives for the year and for making plans for the necessary procedures of school operation.

Today (Thursday), August 31, at 8:00 o'clock a. m., the juniors and seniors will be registered. They will remain as long as necessary. School buses will make their runs. "All juniors and seniors are urged to be present, since no schedule adjustments involving them can be promised after this time," stated Superintendent H. L. Shook.

On Friday, September 1, beginning at 8:00 o'clock, the elementary school and the remainder of the high school, grades 7, 8, 9 and 10 will be enrolled. It is expected that this will be completed by noon. All buses will make their routes on this day.

On Monday, September 4, 7:30 to 12:30, the daily schedule will be run for grades 10, 11 and 12. Textbooks will be issued and lesson assignments made by the high school faculty. Grades 1 through 9 will not report for work, but the elementary school faculty will meet and prepare textbooks and cards for issue.

On Tuesday, September 5, 7:30 to 12:00, the same procedure will be followed for grades 7, 8, and 9.

1961 Feed Grain Program Payments Due Farmers Beginning First Of September

\$48,000. Will Be Disbursed Among
Approximately 450 County Farms

Ellett N. Allen, office manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office, announces that approximately \$48,000.00 will be paid out to about 450 farmers in the county who are participating in the Feed Grain Program. Payment will be started this Friday, Sept. 1, and will continue until all the farmers have been paid. "We should be through within a week," Mr. Allen said.

Each farmer has been notified as to the exact date his check will be ready for him. Therefore, all are asked to follow this schedule given them so that the office force can take care of the farmers as they come in. "This will save time for everyone," Mr. Allen said.

The office manager further stated that it is most imperative that each farmer call in person for his check as no checks will be sent by mail.

The County ASC office will be closed Monday, Sept. 4, in observance of Labor Day.

Farmers who are participating in one or more of the national farm programs administered locally by Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation farmer-committees were reminded today that Community Elections will soon be taking place.

Such participation is required in order to be eligible to cast a ballot for the men a farmer wants to represent him on the committee. Eligible voters must also (1) have an interest in a farm as owner, tenant, or sharecropper if they are of legal voting age, or (2) be in charge of the supervision and conduct of the farming operations on an entire farm if they are not of legal voting age.

Programs administered by Mississippi A. S. C. County and Community Committees include acreage allotments, marketing quotas, commodity loans, the Feed Grain Program, the National Wool Program, the Agricultural Conservation Program, the Conservation Reserve Program, Farm Storage Facility Loans, the Wheat Stabilization Program, and others as assigned by the Secretary of Agriculture.

Throughout Tishomingo County, local elections will be held on October 17, 1961.

The elections will choose three Community Committeemen and 2 Alternates. The Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the elected A. S. C. S. Community Committee will also serve as delegate and alternate delegate to the County Convention to be held soon thereafter, where the A. S. C. S. County Committee will be chosen.

Heavy Docket Of Criminal Cases Disposed Of In 2nd Week Of Court

Most Cases Of Minor Nature; Sheriff Pleased With Pleas

A record number of criminal cases are being disposed of in this term of Judge Raymond Jarvis' Tishomingo County Circuit Court. Over 20 cases involving a variety of offenses have come before the court. Some have been disposed of and some will have sentences met out Thursday and Friday.

Sheriff Clarence Pace stated that he is well pleased with the number of prisoners who have pled guilty. "However," he said, "We usually have the goods against them and they don't have any way to fight our charges. Most of the people in this term of court who have been charged with a crime have been guilty and the way we have placed the facts before the court has necessarily brought a conviction," the sheriff said.

Among those who have been charged, their crimes, and the disposition of the cases are: Artman Luster (colored) indicted for manslaughter, entered plea of guilty as charged. This man will be sentenced Thursday (today).

Luster was operator of a light boat which capsized, drowning 3 negroes near the Tennessee-Mississippi state line earlier this year. Eight people were in the boat causing an overload. Complications were further increased and the charge was made more serious because none of the occupants of the boat had life preservers. "This man violated all the safety laws of the land," Sheriff Pace said. "It is a definite law of the civil courts that life preservers shall be provided for each passenger of a boat. Further, the U. S. Coast Guard is very strict concerning water safety, and so is the TVA. It is a sad fact that three people are now dead because of carelessness," the sheriff said.

Other cases include J. W. Broadway, indicted on three counts, 2 for burglary and one for grand larceny. Broadway has pled guilty and will be sentenced today.

Charles A. White, indicted for burglary and larceny, entered plea of guilty. He will also be sentenced today.

Lyonel Torrence entered a plea of guilty to charges of burglary and larceny. Will be sentenced today.

Gary Terry, entered a plea of guilty to charges of burglary and larceny. Will be sentenced today.

Charles E. Bullen, entered a plea of guilty to charges of petty larceny. He has been sentenced to three months in the county jail and fined \$500.00 and all costs. Jail sentence suspended on his good behavior.

Mae Newby Wright entered a plea of guilty to a charge of child desertion; was sentenced to serve 2 years in the state penitentiary with one year being held up pending his good behavior.

Minnie Sue Dooley, pled guilty to a charge of illegal trespassing by breaking into and entering a home. Sentenced to serve term of 6 months in county jail and to pay all court costs. Jail sentence was suspended on the defendant's good behavior.

Tony Wright pled guilty to a charge of child desertion. Sentenced to serve 2 years in the state penitentiary with the last year being suspended depending on his behavior.

Edward Adams entered a plea of guilty to a charge of assault with intent to kill and murder an officer. He will be sentenced today.

Wilbur Lee Parrish, entered a plea of guilty to a charge of assault with intent to kill an officer. Will be sentenced today.

Jimmy Lee Caldwell entered a plea of guilty to a charge of bur-

glary and larceny. Will be sentenced today.

Frank Rice entered a plea of guilty to a charge of burglary and larceny. He was sentenced to serve a term of 8 years in the state penitentiary with the last three years being held up pending his good behavior.

Leonard Lambert entered a plea of guilty to a charge of burglary and larceny. He was sentenced to serve a term of 5 years with the last 4 being held up on his good behavior.

Harry Davis entered a plea of guilty to charges of assault and battery. He was sentenced to serve a term of 6 months in the county jail with the last three months being held up pending his good behavior.

Jimmy Culwell entered a plea of guilty to a charge of pointing a gun at a human being. He was sentenced to 6 months in the county jail with the last three to be held up pending his good behavior.

Leroy King entered a plea of guilty to a charge of pointing, aiming and firing a gun at a human being. He was sentenced to 12 months in the county jail with the last 6 to be held up pending his good behavior.

Clester Harris entered a plea of guilty to a charge of drunk driving. He was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100.00 and 90 days in jail. The jail sentence is being held up pending his good behavior.

Leonard Wood entered a plea of guilty to a charge of forgery. He was sentenced to serve a term of 3 years in the state penitentiary, the last two years to be held up pending his good behavior.

The case of Gene Blevins on a charge of forgery was continued until the next term of court.

A number of appeal cases from the lower courts were referred back to those courts.

County School Bldgs. Improved

County Superintendent of Education Julian R. Long announces that two of the school buildings in the county have received badly needed repair jobs.

Three thousand, four hundred and ninety-three dollars and twenty-five cents was paid to the Charles Payne Sheet Metal Company of Corinth for installing a new roof on the old main building at Tishomingo school. The same company was paid \$1,953.75 for repairing the roof and removing six block flues and adding metal vents to the Burnsville old main building. These areas at both schools are used for classrooms and auditoriums.

The county school board paid a total of \$5,447.00 for the combined two jobs, Mr. Long said.

Two constitutional amendments were adopted at a three day session of the Mississippi Legislature last week. The special session was called by Gov. Barnett for the express purpose of passing legislation favorable to a huge Standard Oil refinery locating in Mississippi.

A state-wide special election will be held October 3rd in which the two amendments will be placed before the voters. Governor Barnett says that all-out voter ratification of the two constitutional amendments will convince industrialists that the people of Mississippi stand ready and anxious to co-operate in every way.

Wage-Hour Changes Effective Sept. 3

Employers Reminded Of Provisions Concerning Regular, Overtime Pay

Employers in Mississippi were reminded today that amendments to the Fair Labor Standards Act, generally known as the Federal Wage-Hour Law, become effective on September 3, 1961. The reminder came from Sterling B. Williams, Regional Director of the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions.

Forestry Notes

There are several things that a landowner should take into consideration when making a timber sale.

First, the landowner should know the volume and quality or grade of the timber that he has for sale. Also, every effort should be made to improve the quality of the remaining stand. The landowner should have the timber selectively marked by a professional forester.

Bids should be obtained on the timber to be sold. If a very large amount of timber is to be sold, advertise in local and neighboring newspapers. Sell to specialty markets when practical.

When making a timber sale, it is very important to have a written sales contract between the parties involved in the transaction. You can obtain help on this matter from a forester. In many cases, it will pay to consult a lawyer.

Many times a farmer can realize additional income by selling during slack farming season and harvesting the timber himself. There is no need to have your equipment setting up and stand idly by and pay someone else to do the work that you could be doing.

When harvesting timber, every effort should be made to keep from damaging the remaining stand. You are inviting an insect attack when you leave a damage stand of trees.

Feel free to call on your Area Forester for assistance with any problem concerning your woodlands.

Williams said that employees who are now covered by provisions of the law will be entitled to a minimum wage of at least \$1.15 an hour. The law continues to apply to employees engaged in interstate commerce or the production of goods for interstate commerce, unless specifically exempt.

Coverage of the Act has also been extended to employees of large enterprises engaged in commerce or the production of goods for commerce, Williams pointed out. These newly covered employees, mostly in the retail and service trades, will be due a minimum wage of at least \$1.00 an hour. Also covered are employees of some large gasoline service stations, local or interurban transit system and construction enterprises.

Williams said that the Act's overtime provisions will continue to apply to workers who are already covered. They require time and one half for all hours worked over 40 in a workweek. For employees who are newly covered under the Act, overtime pay will not be required until 1963. Exemptions continue to apply to such establishments as hotels, motels, restaurants, hospitals, movies, and a few other service establishments. Williams added that the retail or service establishments exemption now in effect will continue to apply to establishments which are not in a \$1 million enterprise, or if in such an enterprise, have less than \$250,000 in annual gross sales.

If employers or employees have any questions on how the amended Act applies to them, Williams urged them to contact the nearest Wage-Hour office of the U. S. Department of Labor. Field offices serving Mississippi are located at Room 902, Milner Building, Jackson; and Room 406, 951 Government Street Building, Mobile, Ala.

Record Enrollment Expected At Florence State

Florence, Ala.—Aug. 29—Florence State College is expecting a record enrollment in excess of 2000 students when it opens its doors for the fall semester on Friday, September 8. Last fall's 1868 is the previous high.

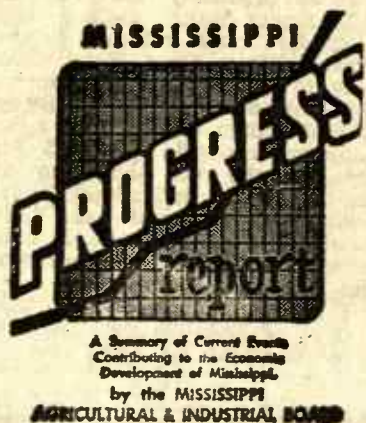
The orientation and registration period for beginning freshmen will start on opening day. Dormitories for them will be open at 1:00 p.m. on September 8.

All other students, including transfers, will begin registration on Wednesday, September 13. Dormitories for them will open at 1:00 p.m. on Tuesday, September 12.

Regular classes for all students will begin on Friday, September 15.

Ready for use for the first time this fall will be the new men's dormitory for 224 students, and the new air-conditioned Student Union. The new women's dormitory was initially occupied during the summer term. It accommodates 60 women.

Under construction are two other buildings in the 3 1/4 million dollar building program at the college - the four-story Science and Home Economics Building and the Collier Library expansion.



\$125,000,000 Oil Refinery To Be Built At Pascagoula

The biggest capital investment ever made in Mississippi by American industry was announced this month with the disclosure that Standard Oil of Kentucky and Standard Oil of California will build a \$125,000,000 oil refinery at Pascagoula's Bayou Casteo industrial district on the Gulf coast.

Construction is expected to begin in October, and operation is likely to get under way within 18 to 24 months. The refinery will have a processing capacity of 100,000 barrels of oil a day, will employ 700, will occupy a 3500-acre site and will have an annual payroll of approximately \$3,500,000.

was made by Governor Ross Barnett and by W. C. Smith, president of Standard Oil of Kentucky and T. S. Petersen, president of Standard Oil of California, whose two companies have announced plans to merge October 1 following stockholder approval of the merger in meetings set September 7.

Meanwhile, Governor Barnett called a special session of the legislature to clear up two matters which would clear the way for construction of the refinery. The legislature quickly approved both resolutions by overwhelming vote. Both items will now be submitted to the voters on October 3 as proposed constitutional amendments.

One would permit counties to grant industry ten-year exemption from ad valorem taxes instead of the five-year exemption now permitted. The other would permit the counties, with appropriate safeguards, to sell 16th section lands in areas involving industrial development, or to authorize their lease for periods up to 99 years.

Chronology Of Events Briefly Summarized

On June 14, the presidents of the two oil companies called upon Governor Barnett at the governor's mansion in Jackson and discussed the possibility of locating an oil refinery at Pascagoula. Negotiations began on that date and continued for two months.

On August 16, Governor Barnett announced the decision of the two oil companies to locate at Bayou Casteo, just east of Pascagoula, provided that the state legislature make necessary revisions to the state constitution which would pave the way for such a step.

On August 17, news wires still carried reports that sites in Louisiana and possibly Alabama were still being considered as possible location for the refinery.

On August 18, Smith, president of Standard Oil of Kentucky, met the press in Governor Barnett's office and confirmed the governor's announcement that the refinery would be located at Pascagoula.

On Sunday, August 20, the resolutions committee of the Mississippi Association of Supervisors, meeting in Jackson for the association's 32nd annual convention, endorsed the requested legislation, and the following day, the full membership approved the resolution.

Newspapers meanwhile were giving their editorial endorsement to the necessary legislation, and former governor Hugh White, known nationally as the "father" of Mississippi's industrialization program, added his approval with the words, "I am wholeheartedly in favor of it."

At noon on Wednesday, August 23, legislators assembled at the state capitol from all parts of the state. That afternoon, in a speech to a joint session of the Senate and House, Governor Barnett urged passage of resolutions calling for two amendments to the state constitution.

On Thursday, August 24, the legislature approved the two resolutions. The vote was unanimous on the resolution on tax exemptions, and only one dissenting vote was cast against the resolution on sixteenth section land.

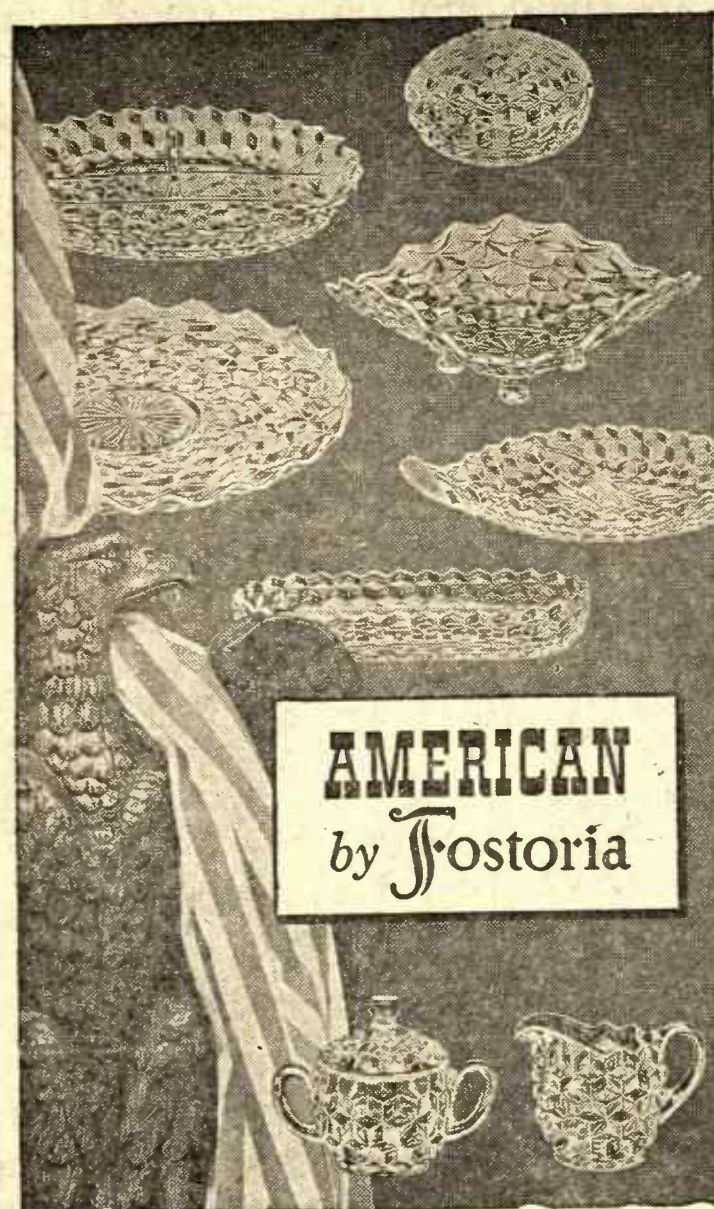

Veterans' Corner

Q—I'm a Korean veteran interested in writing. How may I enter the writing contest conducted for veterans?

A—The Hospitalized Veterans Writing Project is sponsored by Theta Sigma Phi national fraternity for women in journalism, only for veterans who are patients in Veterans Administration hospitals. Although the hospitals, service, civic, welfare organizations, newspaper and magazine editors, and columnists cooperate in the project, it is not open to the general public.

Q—I am retired with spare time for some useful purpose. I have heard about volunteers at Veterans Administration hospitals. Where can I find out about the VA program for volunteers?

A—If you belong to a veterans, fraternal or patriotic organization in your community which cooperates with the VA Voluntary Service, you can get the information and enroll in the program through that group. Or you may as an individual contact the director of voluntary service at the nearest VA hospital.

Q—The VA hospital where I was treated years ago wants me to return for a checkup, in connection with a medical research project. Will this affect my compensation?

A—No. A research project has nothing to do with compensation. You can make a valuable contribution to medical science by returning to the hospital for re-examination.

Q—Can I get transportation to and from a VA hospital? I'm a World War II nonservice-connected veteran.

A—Nonservice-connected veterans are eligible for transportation to and from VA hospitals, if they cannot afford to pay for it and if they get prior authorization from VA; there is no provision for payment for travel by ambulance or otherwise unless the travel is authorized in advance.

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Letter To The Editor Iuka Couple Tells Of Trip To European Countries Visits Daughter and Family In Frankfurt Germany

Editor:
We are back in Mississippi traveling over 10,000 miles visiting 8 countries. We left Tri-Cities Airport aboard a Tri-Cities Airline Plane for Atlanta. Here we changed to a Delta for New York. We did not get sick. There is no sensation of height. We were just as comfortable as we would have been at home in our own living room. We had maid service and served a delicious lunch of steak, cream potatoes, English peas, green salad, fruit salad, and coffee. We also received mail pack of cigarettes. On arriving in New York we discovered our luggage was missing. Since we were to fly Et Al to London, we went to the Israel Terminal by bus. A little Jew there called to find our luggage. He made several calls and said he had located it and would put it aboard a direct to Frankfurt. We discovered that on our way to London, those aboard were Jews or Christians, the crew was Jewish. In fact, we were the only Americans aboard. It was almost dark when we left the airport, but when we were off at 2700 ft., the sun was high in the sky. We were served other good meal and at 9:45 it was dark, at 11:45 it was daylight,

and breakfast was served at one o'clock. We arrived in London 30 mins. late and our Luftausa had just left. It took nine hours from New York to London. The English were very helpful as they directed us from one official to another until we had our seats on another plane two hours later. We had to call our daughter to tell her we would be late. Who gave us the idea we could speak English? I finally got a call through and was free to look at all the people from all corners of the globe. There were people from India in their native dress, Jews with skull caps and flowing beards but most everyone dressed as we were, looking much the same but speaking a different language.

We boarded the German plane, a prop jet Luftausa for an hour and 45 minute flight to Frankfurt. We were served our first German meal as soon as we leveled off. The meat must have been goat, the potatoes were cooked with it, so you can imagine the flavor, a brochen, which is a German bread and tough as shoe leather. If you have false teeth don't try it. There was a glass of amber liquid and we decided we were being served our first liquor, but it was apple cider. The tomato and cucumber in the green salad had an American flavor but nothing else did. When we arrived in Frankfurt our luggage was not there. We had a terrible time trying to make people understand what we were saying. Finally, we found a girl who filled out papers for lost luggage. We are still wondering how you say "brown and tan Amelia Earhart Luggage in German." I had my purse and camera in both hands. Paul had our tickets and passports in his pocket and carried his shaving kit with toilet articles and our citizenship papers and shot records in it. He laid it down to sign some papers and it disappeared. The children were just outside the glass partition waving to us but we were an hour filing papers before we could get out.

The children live in base housing on Sembach Missile Base, 80 miles from Frankfurt. Traveling is very dangerous on the Autobahn, a German Turnpike. There is no speed limit most of the time and where it is enforced it is 80 K.M. Bicycles, motorcycles and foreign cars make traveling dangerous. The lesser highways are crooked and very narrow with trees planted close and overlapping over the highways to camouflage it from the air. The houses are in towns or communities, none out as our farm homes are. All the land is saved for cultivation or timber. You have to have permission to cut trees and when you do they must be replaced with seedlings. They grow sugar beets, potatoes, wheat, rye, grapes, flax and hay. Nowhere do you see erosion, even though the ground is rocky, it is all productive.

The farm houses are built around a courtyard. You enter through an iron gate that is locked at night. The farm house and barn and all out houses are arranged in a square and are under the same roof. The courtyard is cobble stones and in the center there is a huge pit like a septic tank. It has a screen over it and all the manure and straw is piled here. It rains often and as the water seeps through into the tank it is pumped out into a Fonk wagon and sprayed on the crops. The G. I.'s call the Fonk's honey wagons. You can imagine the odor as you drive along the country side. Our paper mill smells like French perfume in comparison.

The German people are friendly and like to have you visit. They want to serve you wine as we would coffee or cakes. The standard wage is a mark an hour which is now about 24c American money. Hair cuts are 40, shampoo, trim and set 75c or 3 marks. They have both men and women operators in their beauty parlors. They eat more bread, potatoes, milk and butter than anything else and everyone drinks beer, even the children. They drink it hot. Water on the bases is purified but the German water does not agree with the G. I.'s. It causes a disenteria and some have to stay in the hospital for weeks. The same water doesn't hurt the German people. There are no negroes except American G. I.'s in Germany and many of them date and marry German girls. Nearly all the negro girls who are there with their husbands on the base have full time German maids. We found the American dollar good in every country we visited.

After 4 days and 4 phone calls we located our luggage and shaving kit. Not having a change of cloths, we missed church the first Sunday but attended Base Chapel 3 Sundays. One Sunday the Baptist Chaplain Bro. McDaniels, born in Itabena, Miss., preached and the next Sunday Bro. Housman, a Methodist preached. The Catholics and Protestants each have 2 services every Sunday morning so you don't have to worry about long winded preachers. One has to get out of the way for the next.

We visited Garmish in Bavaria. It is a recreation center for American G. I.'s, located at the foot of the Alps Mountains. We had reservations at the Sheridan Plaza, a beautiful hotel with mountains 9 and 10 thousand feet high on 3 sides. It snowed on top of these mountains both nights we were there. The rooms were only \$2 with two and three single beds in every room. There were three dining rooms, one served Chinese food, one Italian, one German and one American food. There was a ball room and a game room. There was a miniature golf and play ground for children outside. Horse back riding, fishing, hunting, bicycle and boat riding, swimming and tennis were available and mountain climbing if you like. The Olympic Ski Stadium is here. We walked about 3 miles around town and then took a bus tour to Linderhoff Castle and Oberammergau. The bus winds around up the mountain side with the first stop being Eital, a 600 year old Mon-

astery founded by Emperor Ludwig of Bavaria in 1330. There are life size statues of the apostles along the front of the building. The sanctuary is square, but huge marble pillars give the impression that it is round. Two hundred feet up in the dome are beautiful paintings of saints, nuns and priests ascending to heaven. The dome is about 40 feet in diameter. In the center there is a higher dome, 20 feet high, 10 feet across and the artist painted Christ and Angels waiting with open arms to receive the Saints in the lower dome. It took 14 years to paint these. There are other paintings and marble statues around the walls. There are 4 bodies of dead Saints in glass caskets with an altar before each with candles burning continually. There were 2 confessional booths, one on each side as you enter. The pews were rough and very straight. This church and school is 2600 feet above Garmish in the Alps.

Leaving Eital, we traveled several miles along the mountain road to Linderhoff Castle built by King Ludwig II. We left the bus and climbed up the mountain about a mile. The castle is marble with huge iron gates and is now owned by the German government. Every room is beautiful, the walls and ceilings painted by famous French, German and Italian artists. The woodwork is all hand carved and overlaid with 24 karat gold. The furniture is all gold plated with beautiful tapestry. An exquisite chandelier holding 170 candles was indeed lovely to look at. There was a gold piano on which Richard Wagner played. The marble of the castle is black, red, gray and white brought from France, Russia, Italy and Germany. Tables are topped with marble or jade and huge mirrors from floor to ceiling extending 20 ft. or more. This is a real fairy land castle. Farther up the mountain is the King's tea house. He saw it at the World's Fair in 1887 and bought it. It is all metal and was moved piece by piece to its present location. A fountain in the center of the room keeps it cool. The windows look like beautiful stained glass windows of a church. Couches, chairs and a pearl top table are the only furniture, but at the front of the room is 3 huge peacocks with tails spread made of Bohemian glass and pearls. The garden is filled with flowers of every color and planted to form beautiful designs. Statues of marble and bronze are everywhere. In the center of a pool, a fountain sends water 100 feet into the air and falls back on a bronze statue of a woman and 2 children. Far back in the mountain was a large room built by the King as a theatre. There was a beautiful lake and floating on it was the King's gold plated boat. The entire theatre was illuminated by hidden blue lights.

From Linderhoff we went to Oberammergau to the theatre where the world famous Passion Play is produced every 10 years. It seats 5000 people. We visited the dressing rooms and saw all the costumes. We then visited a wood carvers shop. We saw all kinds of plaques and crucifixes, the Lord's Supper carved, even to the loaves and fishes in the plates. Returning back down the mountain, we reached Garmish late in the evening. Coming down the street were dozens of fat Jersey cows. No one was herding them. The bus stopped and as each cow reached her home she turned in to the door and someone opened it from inside. The cows are pastured up on the mountains and return at night. If one is run over, you must pay for the cow, all the milk she would have given and the calves she might have had.

Leaving Garmish, we crossed the Bavarian Alps into Austria. Here the mountains are still beautiful and snow capped, the lakes blue and the streams, crystal clear. Next we visited Switzerland, a land of mountains and lakes. The cities have wide streets and beautiful homes with spacious landscaped gardens. Many movie stars live here because they pay no tax. Next, came Zurich. We asked at the Information Center about the Southern Baptist International Seminary. They knew nothing about it. We then went to Basel, a city on the border of France, from there to St. Louis, France, where we were welcomed and were presented souvenirs by the border patrol. We returned to Sembach and started making plans to visit Holland, a land of windmills, canals and dairy farms.

At the express office I bought \$20.00 worth of Holland money, 70 Gulder (bills). It looked like a lot of money, but when we stopped for lunch and it cost 6 Gulders for each plate my money didn't look so big. There were three words on

the menu we could read, "milch," "kalf," and "kaffee," so we ordered these. Soon a huge platter of veal with a spicy gravy, English peas, potatoes, rice, butter and a basket of bread was served. Kaffee was good coffee and the milch was still warm from the cow.

We next visited Amsterdam. There are 1 million people in Amsterdam and 3 million tourists each year. Most of them were in town on bicycles that day. At the Mary Anne Hotel we found the manager able to speak English. Our room was very comfortable with a balcony as all houses in Amsterdam have. After a short rest, we started walking down the cobble streets passing a Museum where many world famous paintings are exhibited.

At the canal we bought tickets on a boat tour. This group included 102 passengers, French, German, Dutch, Jews and Americans. We passed through canals dug by hand in the 17th century, saw old Amsterdam as the 17th century fishermen saw it returning from the sea. We saw an American warship sold to the Dutch during the last world war so that they might fight the Germans. We returned by the way of Merchant Street where the wealthiest Merchants of the world live. Each house is worth 3 million dollars. All homes and hotels are 3 or 4 stories high, built of brick or stone against the next building, not even an alley between. It is only 2 feet down to water then 30 feet of sand, so all buildings have to have 40 or 50 feet of piling on which to lay a foundation. Above the upper most balcony, there is a hook with a pulley attached. The guide told us they were for moving heavy furniture to upper floors as all the stairways are winding and steep. Our hotel bill for 4 was 32 Gulders and this included a Dutch breakfast. A slice of cheese, ham, soft boiled egg, milk and coffee, 4 different kinds of bread, 1/4 lb. butter and Jelly per person. That was \$10.60 U. S. Money. The people really wear wooden shoes in bright colors, other wise their clothes look as if they might have come from Iuka.

Next we visited Brussels where the World's Fair was held in '59. We made films of some of the exhibition buildings which were too modernistic to describe. We visited Belgium and Luxembourg where we spent the night at a beautiful new Reno Hotel. Here we found something unusual. No bath tub. All Europe seemed to have showers but here in our room beside the lavatory was a basin resembling a commode, hot and cold water and a drain at the lower end. We learned it was a foot bath. Very nice for tired aching feet. In Luxembourg City is an American Military Cemetery. Here a U. S. General is buried. We did very little sightseeing as it was raining.

We spent the rest of our vacation with the grandchildren. If you are planning a trip to Europe call and I will be glad to help you contact travel agencies. We will be happy to show you the films, folders, post cards and souvenirs we have.
