Strong Support Urged For Amendments In Election Voter Has Important Part In State's Economic Future, Governor Says

Governor Ross R. Barnett said today every Mississippi voter has an important part in the state's economic future by going to the polls on October 3rd and voting in favor of two constitutional amendments.

The job of bringing a \$125 million refinery to Mississippi and opening the gateway to industrial millions in industrial income in all parts of the state is only partly done," Governor Barnett observed.

"The legislature," the governor said, "acted quickly and with one dissenting vote to recommend to our people that they approve two constitutional changes necessary to insure the location of an industrial giant in Mississippi. Overwhelming support of the proposals by the people at the polls on October 3rd would be the strongest evidence possible that Mississippi means what it says and wants to improve its economic position."

The governor called attention to the fact that the Mississippi Association of Supervisors, which represents every corner of the state, approved the proposals by unanimous action and that the state's daily and weekly newspapers have given overwhelming endorsement.

The proposals would give county authority to sell or lease for years 16th Section school lands extend ad valorem tax exemptions for industrial purposes from ten years. Municipalities already have authority to lease school lands for 99 years and grant ten year exemptions.

"Mississippi," Governor Barnett said, "is in the midst of a struggle with other states for the job opportunities and payrolls that are being won by new industry, and it is

imperative that we make ourselves competitive if we are to have this chance to move ahead and thus give our people an economic boost. That is why it is so important that the people give strong support on October 3rd to the amendments recommended by the legislature."

Cotton Harvesting Still Lagging This Week

Harvesting of the cotton crop failed to gain momentum this week and ginnings remained small in volume. Frequent rains hindered picking operations in much of the Memphis Office territory. Poisoning programs were being discontinued in many sections where cotton had begun to open, but farmers in late planted localities continued to poison on schedule.

First use of mechanical pickers was reported in the territory this week. Prices paid labor for hand picking ranged from \$2.00 to \$3.00 per hundred pounds. A total of 2,314 Smith-Doxey samples have been classed by the Memphis Office through September 15. This compares with 57,056 classed to the corresponding date a year ago.

Demand for spot cotton in early producing sections was strong, consequently loan entries were light. Prices offered farmers in country markets were firm and above loan levels in most instances. Offerings on central markets were rather large in volume for this season of the year but very little new crop cotton was received in most markets. Domestic and foreign mill purchases increased from a week earlier and covered a wide range of qualities.

Middling 1-1/16" cotton was quoted on the Memphis, Little Rock, Greenwood and New Orleans markets at 34.50, 34.65, 34.50 and 34.75 cents per pound respectively on September 18.

Civil Defense Discussed

Fall-Out Shelters And
Methods Of Survival
Outlined Before Lions

Ronnie Davis of Corinth was guest speaker at the Iuka Lions Club regular meeting held Monday night in the educational building of the Methodist Church. He was invited to appear before the club by Lion Bob Lambert, program leader.

Topic discussed by Mr. Davis was Civil Defense. Mr. Davis stressed the importance of preparing now for disaster that could happen at any time. Even minutes from now. He pointed out and explained the need for fall-out protection. In his remarks, he stated that fall-out shelters should be constructed for every home, church, school, factory, and that each community or municipality should construct shelters at properly spaced locations so as to give maximum protection to all citizens. In his discussion he told the amount of radiation that was necessary to cause instant death, the amount that would cause sickness and death at various lengths of time.

Members were told that pamphlets were available to all who are interested and may be obtained from your Civil Defense Director, Sheriff Clarence Pace.

The Lions Club moved to work jointly with Mr. Pace in obtaining materials and other information concerning the defense program that would be beneficial to the citizens of the area in case of disaster.

Law Offenders Apprehended

Gene O. Blevins who was arrested by Sheriff Clarence Pace recently on a charge of uttering a forged check (passing a forged check) has been turned over to law enforcement officers in New Orleans, La. Fingerprints made by the sheriff's office proved Blevins to be wanted by New Orleans on a number of violations.

Blevins was released Tuesday by the local sheriff after he signed papers of extradition. Sheriff Pace said that charges in this county will be pursued and a conviction sought after the defendant was disposed of in the New Orleans courts. A detainer has been placed against the prisoner for future prosecution here.

Other recent activity in the Tishomingo County Sheriff's office was the arrest of Bill Bolton for the possession of moonshine whiskey. Bolton was caught with 12 one-half gallons of moonshine and was turned over to Federal ATU officials for prosecution. He is being held in jail at Aberdeen in default of bond.

Making the arrest were Sheriff Pace and Deputies Pat Patterson of Iuka and Henry Holcomb of Belmont. Bolton lives on highway 30 between Tishomingo and Paden. He was arrested at his home.

Other grandstand events that drew good crowds at the fair were the Town and Country Jamboree and the Gospel Sing.

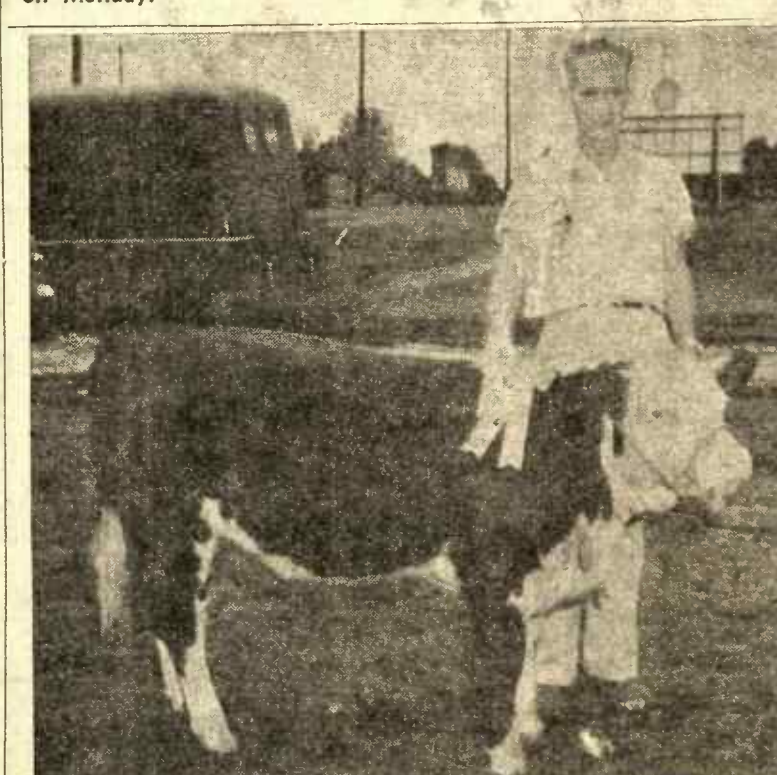

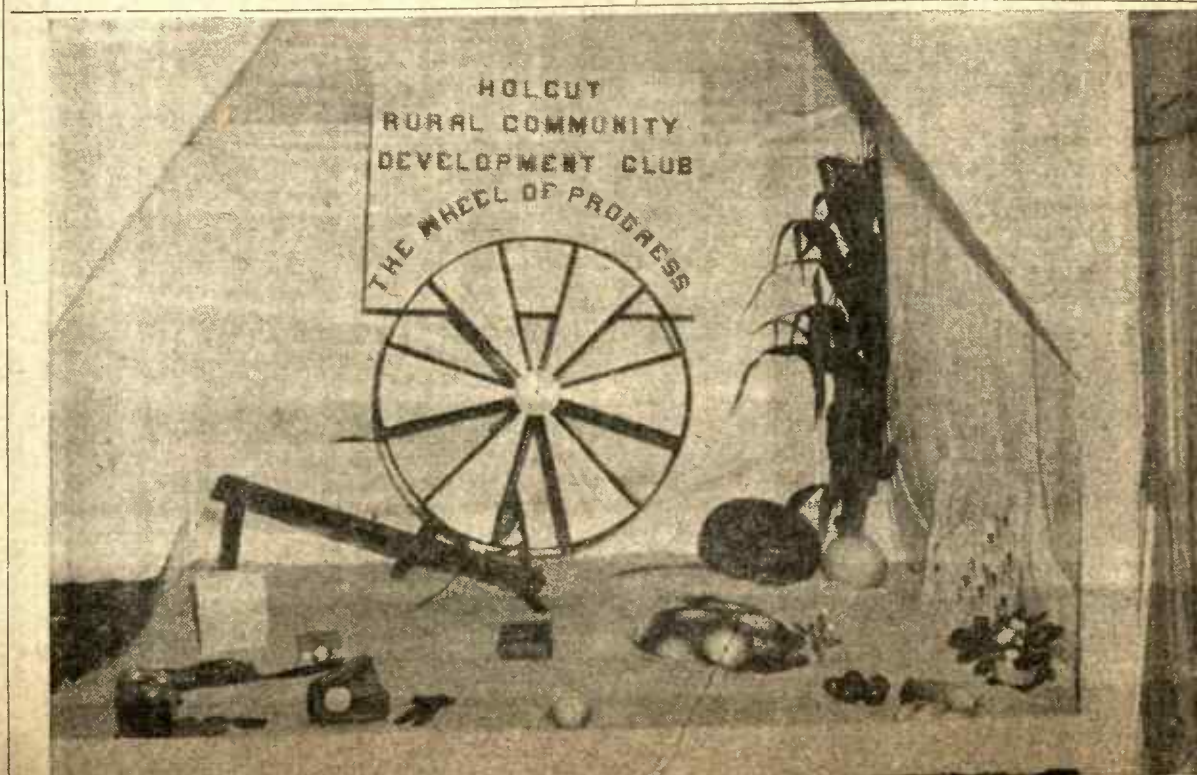

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Former Enlistees Of Army

Being Sought Under Program Announced By Dept. Of Army

Former enlisted members of the Regular Army who have been out of the Army for over 90 days are being sought under a special program announced this week by the Department of the Army.

As an aid to the current military build-up, the new program offers former soldiers who hold certain Military Occupational Specialties (MOS) the opportunity to reenlist in the grade held at the time of

their last separation from active duty. They must have been out of the Army between 90 days and 24 months, otherwise qualified for enlistment, not members of a reserve component and meet the approval of the Department of the Army.

Those men who have been out of the Army between 24 and 36 months may reenlist one grade below that which they held at the time of their last discharge from the Army if they meet the same requirements.

Local Army Recruiters have been provided with complete details of the new program and lists of those Military Occupational Specialties which are urgently needed to increase the Army's strength.

Men who have been separated from the Army for more than 90 days are urged to contact their local Army Recruiters today. He will rapidly determine those who are qualified for reenlistment under the provisions of this special

program. The Army Recruiter for this area is Sergeant Earl Laird who can be contacted at Post Office Bldg., Corinth, Miss. or by calling AT 6-6674.

Members of reserve components should contact their Personnel Officers for details of a special program offered them by the Department of the Army.

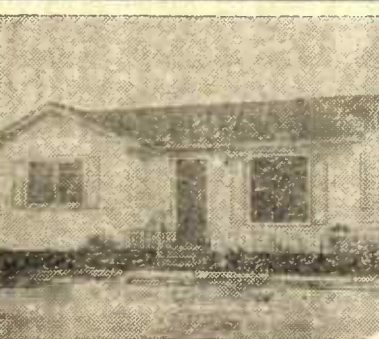
The Iuka School Band, under the direction of Chester Cox, performed beautifully at half-time.

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Proof Is in the Eating, Says 4-H'er



The pretty Pennsylvania 4-H miss pictured here is typical of her 4-H sisters throughout the land who can bake a mouth-watering loaf of bread or pan of golden rolls. She is like some half-million 4-H'ers enrolled in a baked foods project, reports the National 4-H Service Committee.

It was just 10 years ago that 4-H Club girls took up baking as a serious project governed by rules and certain well-defined objectives spelled out by the Cooperative Extension Service. It was then that the demonstration aspect of good baking practices was launched as a national awards program, according to a 4-H Service Committee spokesman.

The awards were made possible by Standard Brands, Incorporated, and as the years went by, they were increased considerably. Today, six national scholarships of \$400 each are given to the highest ranking girls. An even dozen will qualify for expense paid trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago the last week in November.

For the best two-girl team demonstrators in the state and for the individual 4-H demonstrator as well, Standard Brands provides a \$50 U. S. savings bond for each. Medals are expected to be given to an estimated 2,500 girls this year who win county recognition.

Participation in the 4-H bread demonstration program last year increased by 23 per cent over 1959, according to the National 4-H Service Committee. This seems to indicate that "homemade" bread is not a lost art.

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Home Agent Notes

As cooler weather comes, we begin taking blankets and clothing out of plastic film storage bags. Be careful what you do with the plastic bag. Follow the safety rules.

Remember plastic film wrappings should not be made into improvised playthings. It shouldn't be used for makeshift mattress coverings, neither should you let children play with it. You have seen and read of children being asphyxiated by getting plastic film over their faces!

When you take a garment from a plastic bag, tear off the film covering and discard it. Tie it in knots and dispose of it in a refuse container.

Food, Water for Emergency
In case of a nuclear attack, many survivors would have to rely on their own supplies of food and water for up to two weeks. Families are urged to either store and maintain a special emergency food stockpile in their homes or fall-out shelter, or to build up their regular food stocks so there is a 2-week supply on hand at all times.

Stockpile foods should be in cans, jars or tightly sealed paper containers, preferable in sizes that will supply just enough for one meal. Foods should be chosen that will last for months without refrigeration and that can be eaten with little or no cooking.

A new USDA publication "Family Food Stockpile for Survival," gives other information on food and water supplies, sample menus, equipment for emergency cooking. You should allow a minimum of seven gallons of drinking water for each person for two weeks.

Detergents No Answer to Whiteness
Don't expect the detergents to keep all white fabrics from graying and yellowing, according to recent studies of laundering. Even if the detergent has fluorescent whitening agents and some coloring material, which many do, these ingredients will not keep all white fabrics snow white.

These added ingredients help in varying degrees, depending on the fiber and finish. White cotton with no finishes and cotton-dacron polyester garments benefited considerably from the use of detergents with the additions. Resin-finished cottons, which include our easy care garments, do not benefit as much as cottons without a finish, so don't be surprised when your white easy-care garments get gray.

The extra ingredients have little or no effect on helping to keep most nylon and dacron white.

and uses of these instruments from the dawn of civilization to the present day.

Mrs. Cosby noted that the first "eating tool" was the spoon. Shells served as the first spoon and the concave shape of the spoon of today shows the influence of the shell-shape from many thousands of years ago. The first knives were made of stone. They were used primarily as an instrument for killing animals and not as an eating tool. Later, iron, bronze and silver was used and the same knife that killed the animal was also used in eating the meat. The design of the fork goes back to about 600 A. D., Mrs. Cosby stated, but was not used to eat with until much later. It was a useful tool, sometimes used as a weapon for spearing food, fish, frogs, etc., and for holding the food over the fire to cook. In the early 16th century the fork came into wide use in Italy as a piece of tableware in wealthy homes. It was not used by the common people who considered it feminine and the clergy even opposed the use of the fork in eating, branding it a substitute for "God-given fingers."

Mrs. Curtis told the story of sterling silver, how to select, care for and use it. She noted that following the introduction of silver tableware as a mark of status and affluence, many complete services for twelve sometimes contained as many as 300 pieces. Mrs. Nixon discussed the process of manufacturing silver. This is one of the largest and most important industries in the world. In the United States, the annual manufacture of silver amounts to about \$42-million, almost one-third of the total world silver manufacture. At the conclusion of the program, Mrs. Cosby presented a sterling bowl to Mrs. Little, Iuka librarian, to be placed in the Library and suitably displayed. The bowl was a gift to the club from Oneida Silversmith, Oneida, N. Y.

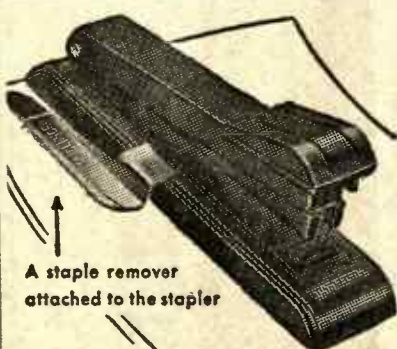

CAPITAL NEWS**Date Of Planting Is Major Factor In Winter Grass**

Date of planting is one of the most important factors in getting good stands from winter grasses in home lawns. If the winter grass is overseeded to early, competition from summer grasses will decrease stands. If it is planted too late, cool temperatures will decrease germination of the seed. Recommended planting dates are for North Mississippi, October 10-20, and for the southern part of the state, October 20 until November 1.

Vast Amount Of Tung Information Available

More is known about the growing of tung trees than is known about many crops which have been growing in this country for a much longer time. This has come about because of a very hard working and efficient staff of tung investigators. There has been outstanding co-operation from tung growers and a willingness on their part to accept recommendations. Growers and researchers get together on latest findings from tung production research.

Hog production could offer promising long range opportunities in Mississippi agriculture. Packing plants in the state had to import some 400,000 hogs during the past twelve months, which means that dollars had to be spent beyond the borders of the state to meet demands. Many agricultural leaders see promising long range opportunities for Mississippi in

hog production.

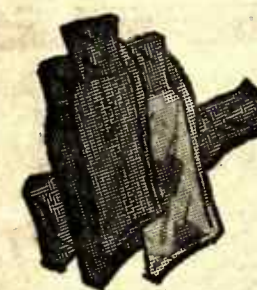

Veterans Corner

Q—Because of my late husband's military service, I received some \$3,600 in death gratuity payment. Is this money subject to federal income tax?

A—No.
Q—My husband is a war veteran and since his discharge from active duty, he has worked under social security. In planning our insurance program, we would like to know what burial allowances would be payable.

A—It appears that a burial allowance in your case may be payable by either the VA, the Social Security Administration, or both. The VA pays up to \$250 to the funeral director, if he has not been paid, or to the person who

pays the burial expenses. The Social Security lump sum payment equals three times the worker's benefit, but not more than \$255.

Q—My father, a World War II veteran, died recently from causes not connected with his military service. In order for me to be eligible for VA pension, since I am unmarried and not yet 18, what service requirements must my deceased father have fulfilled?

A—Your father must have had at least 90 days service, part of which was during wartime. During World War II the wartime service dates are December 7, 1941, to December 31, 1946. He must have been discharged under conditions other than dishonorable.

Q—Has the GI loan guaranty re-use provision been extended for World War II veterans, and if so, how long?

A—Yes, Public Law 84 by the 87th Congress extended the restoration privilege until July 25, 1967, for World War II veterans, and until January 31, 1975, for Korea veterans. The VA must have been completely relieved of liability and no claim may have been made against it for the previous loan, if restoration is to be granted.

TEN MAJOR STEPS FOR CLOSING SUMMER HOME



If you're in the process of getting your summer house ready for winter, you'll find it a lot easier if you start with a checklist of things-to-do-before-you-leave. 1. Notify the telephone, light and gas companies so that they can discontinue your service before you lock up.
2. Notify the water company to shut off service; then drain all plumbing so the pipes are empty.
3. Pour one gallon of kerosene into toilet bowl, to prevent it from rusting or freezing.
4. Cover all chrome fixtures in kitchen and bathroom, as well as the burner-unit of the kitchen stove, with a coat of Vaseline

petroleum jelly as a protection against rust.

5. Pack linens and bed-covers away in closets and bureau.
6. Cover all furniture.
7. Close and lock all windows and shutters.
8. Coat lawn mower blades and other garden and household tools with Vaseline petroleum jelly to prevent rusting. Also, apply a thin layer of petroleum jelly to tennis racket gut (to prevent it from becoming brittle); and to guns, fishing tackle and other sporting equipment that is susceptible to rust.
9. Notify police that you will be closing; or hire someone in the neighborhood to check your grounds about once a week and let you know if anything out-of-the-ordinary takes place.
10. Notify post office of your new address so your mail can be forwarded without delay.

Experiment Stations Find Ryegrass and Oat Forage To Be Economical Feed

Winter grazing is economical for dairy calves, according to recent tests on two experimental stations in Mississippi.

Superintendent Louie Walton used his test at the Black Branch Station at Brooksville. Five 7-day-old Jersey heifers were fed and compared performance to a similar group of five calves fed in the

When the calves were four months old, there was little difference in weights or daily gains between the two groups. Pasture averaged 157 pounds each and barn calves 159. Feed costs for the barn group averaged \$7 compared to \$5 for the pasture group. These costs do not include the 380 pounds of milk supplied to each group.

last year's grain—from underneath and around the sides of the bins too.

Sweep down the walls. Then spray the inside of the bins with either methoxychlor or malathion. After you take care of this situation, you are ready to store the grain.

But if you plan to fumigate the grain, better take it a step further. Make sure that the bin is airtight. Fumigants are heavier than air and will flow out a crack almost like water.

Put in your vegetated waterways this fall on land that you want to terrace next spring.

Apply for financial assistance through the local ASC office (Mr. E. N. Allen's office) in Iuka. Then come by the Soil Conservation Service Office in Iuka, for technical assistance in getting vegetated waterways established on the land.

It is most desirable to have a heavy sod of permanent grass in the waterways before terrace and row water is turned into them in the spring.

When properly established and cared for, hay can be harvested from vegetated waterways each year.

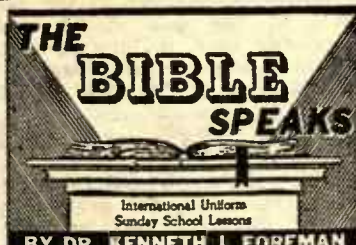

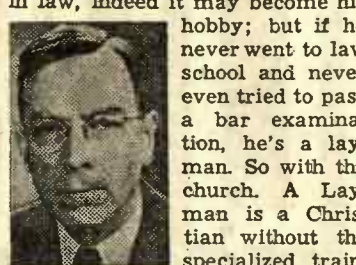

Laymen Needed

Lesson for September 24, 1961

"LAYMAN" does not mean "clod" as some people think. A layman in anything—farming, medicine, law, the church—is simply a non-specialist. A layman in law may take a great interest in law, indeed it may become his



hobby; but if he never went to law school and never even tried to pass a bar examination, he's a layman. So with the church. A Layman is a Christian without the specialized training that the minister (pastor, preacher or priest) has had. Most Protestants believe that a minister's training does not make a different kind of man out of him (except as all education changes any student). His studies, which the church requires of him before he can be called a minister in full standing, simply equip him for the special kinds of work he has to do. The layman has not taken these studies, and does not preach, and is no pastor.

"The truth of your life"

For all that, if ever there is a church where the laymen all become "dead wood," where all the work is left to the pastor, that church dies and doesn't take long at it either. Laymen are even more necessary to the church than ministers are. Laymen can be a church without a minister; but a minister without laymen can't possibly be a church.

What is a good layman? There is nothing mysterious about it. In the church, a good layman is simply a Christian who lives his religion—and has, to be sure, a faith he can live by. The third letter of Saint John, in the New Testament, was written to a good layman named Gaius. All we know about him is in this one-page letter. John speaks first of all of the truth of Gaius' life. No doubt his ideas were good and his beliefs were true; but for John that was not what he praised Gaius for. It was the truth of his life that impressed people most.

"Any service to the brethren"

Many people think of church work as anything done inside the church walls, on church property. Now where Gaius lived, there was no church building (the New Testament was completed before Christians began to build churches) and no organization in the modern sense of that word. And yet Gaius was a loyal worker.

"Any service" to other Christians (the "brethren") is called a "loyal thing" to do. Gaius' particular specialty seems to have been hospitality. In a time when hotels did not exist, men like Gaius would help the church by taking into their homes traveling preachers and bishops and missionaries.

A supporting player on the stage or the athletic field, a supporting regiment in a battle, are very important. So it is in the church. The far-flung work of the church, which is wider than most members realize, would fall to nothing overnight without support. The 20th century Gaius may not find any wandering missionaries at the bus station to take home to dinner; but the money he leaves in the church offering plates goes a long long way. The intelligent layman will want to know, and will find out, where his "benevolence dollar" goes, and why.

"The friends"

There's no special difficult technique about being a good layman. Much of it is cultivating the simple arts of friendship. There are boys and girls in the church needing an older friend's word of guidance (not dictation!); there are parents pretty hard pressed who could use a little help and encouragement from others; there are grieving hearts, in need of sympathy, in need of a strong arm to lift them and set them on the highroad again... If you can look around you and see nobody who needs a friend, send us your name and address. You must live in Paradise. But if you still live on this planet, you live among people who need friends... better friends too. Some people tear others down; what is needed is people who are friendly in the name, and for the sake, of the Friend of us all.

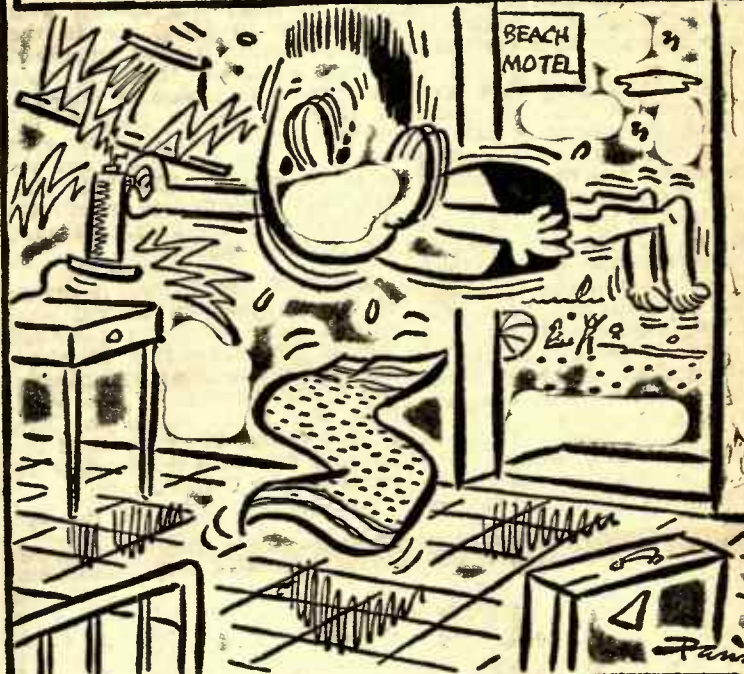
