Mississippi automobile license
tags for 1962 will go on sale
today, October 2. Mississippians
this year will dress up their auto-
mobiles with an entirely different
tag than what has been the custom.
The tag will begin with the color of the
tag changed, the color this year
will be white background with mar-
numerals and letters. Per-
the greatest change is in the
of numbering and the addi-
of letters of the alphabet to
the classes.

The first number on the tags
this year will indicate county
being numbered according to the
alphabet. In other words, counties
beginning with the letter "A" like
"Adams" or "Albany" will have low
numbers, and counties that begin
with letters toward the last of the
alphabet will have higher numbers.
Tishomingo County's number is 71.
Classes will be noted and in-
cluded with alphabetical letters.
Class "A" for small compact
foreign make cars; "B" class
for older model autos and cer-
tain sizes of compact; "C" class
for mostly Fords, Chevs, Ply-
mouths, etc.; "D" class will be
for heavier autos.

For example, if you live in Tish-
omingo county and own a small
compact auto, your tag number
will start with "A-71-1" if you
buy the first tag in that class
this year. Or, if you live in
Tishomingo county and own an older
auto and if you should buy the
first tag in that group, your
number would be "B-71-1", or, if
you own a comparatively late
model Ford, Chevy, Plymouth,
etc., and should happen to pur-
chase the first tag, your number
would be "C-71-1", or, if you own
an older Cadillac, etc., and should
happen to get the first tag in
your number would be "D-71-1".
The last number on the tag in-
dicates the class to which the
tag belongs.

Panel Discussion On Constitutional Amendments Will Be Heard On WVOM

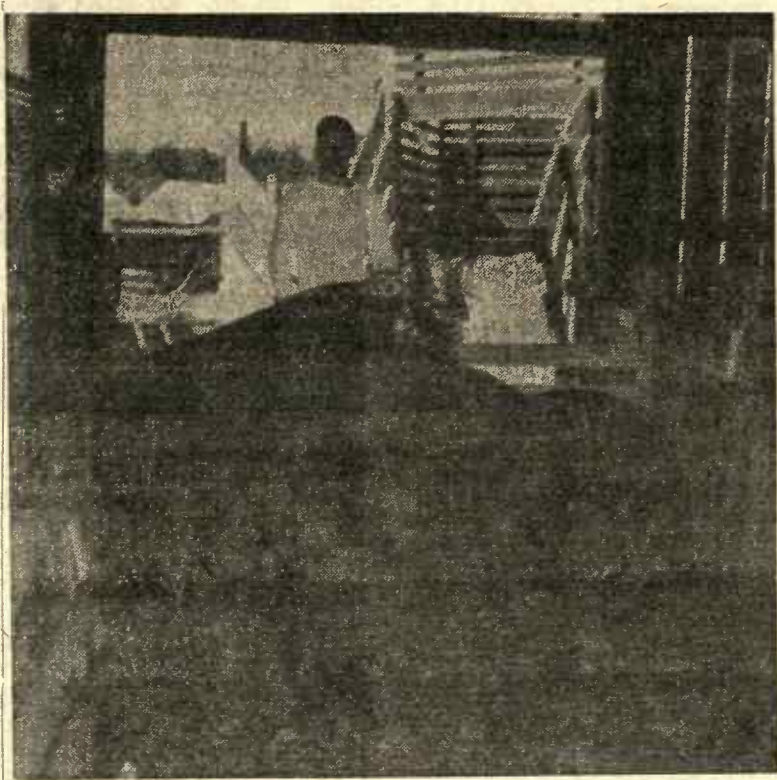
A panel discussion on the

Tuesday Is Very Important Date In State Of Miss.

Voters Will Decide On Constitutional
Amendments To Aid Industry In State

Governor Ross R. Barnett re-
minded Mississippi voters today
that "the future progress of this
great state can be substantially
enhanced by your approval of two
constitutional amendments at the
polls next Tuesday, October 3."

"On next Tuesday," Governor
Barnett declared, "Mississippi is
given the opportunity to decide
whether it will stand still or move
forward to greater economic
heights. I have no fear but that
Mississippians, as usual, will show
the desire and courage to cast
their votes overwhelmingly in
favor of the amendments and in
favor of progress."

The two amendments, designed
to stimulate the state's industrial
development and thereby the over-
all economy, are submitted to the
people with the near-unanimous
recommendation of the legislature.
They were drawn not only to make
possible the securing of Standard
Oil's \$125 million refinery but so
as to make every county and sec-
tion of the state competitive with
neighboring states in their efforts
to secure new jobs and payrolls
for their people.

Governor Barnett, who only a
few weeks ago announced the ac-
quisition of a \$125 million oil re-
finery for the state, contingent
upon approval of the amendments,
has since advised that a number
of other major industries have
shown serious interest in locating
in Mississippi.

"My conferences with industrial
leaders in the North and East,"
the Governor said, "have been
most encouraging. They are great-
ly impressed with the attitude of
Mississippi people and all other
factors important to the success-
ful operation of big industry. Sev-
eral have indicated that the refi-
nery location in this state makes
them more interested than ever
in coming to Mississippi."

"I want to emphasize just as
strongly as I possibly can," the
Governor added, "that next Tues-
day could prove to be the most
important date in the state's his-
tory. Certainly, all Mississippi
voters should want to do their
part in building a greater state
by voting in favor of 'opportunity'
by voting for the two amend-
ments."

Home Agent Notes

The season for dark or winter cottons is here. In deciding on care of your dark cottons, you will be interested in recent tests made at the New York State Experiment Station.

The tests were to find the effect of home laundering and commercial dry cleaning on the fabrics. The fabrics used in the tests varied in color, texture, weight and thread count. They ranged from a fairly smooth striped twill to a rather rough red-brown check and a grey tweed with black flecks on

the surface.

Each of the eight fabrics in the tests received 20 laundings and dry cleanings. Those making the tests bought enough of the material to test it by hand laundering, machine laundering and dry cleaning.

Dry cleaning proved most satisfactory in preventing shrinkage and stretching and in keeping color, strength and crease resistance. Hand washing showed less shrinkage, fading and loss of body than machine washing. Crease resistance was lost at about the same rate by both methods of laundering.

Finish for Stone Floors

A way to make slate, flagstone or brick floors easy to clean and bring out their natural beauty is to give them a finish of penetrating sealer that contains tung oil.

Any shade of slate—gray, black, green or blue—may be dulled by wear and weather. To brighten it and also help it resist moisture, finish it with a thin type of penetrating floor sealer with a tung oil base. The finish is moisture-resistant, forms a tough coating and helps keep the mortar between the slate pieces from sanding off.

This same finish can be used successfully for indoor flagstone or brick floors.

For a screened-in porch or outdoor patio with slate or flagstone floors, use a penetrating floor sealer designed for exterior use.

Scrub the sealer into the slate or flagstone with a flat scrubbing brush. Wipe in and off any surplus finish with cloths that leave no lint.

This easy finish quickly changes the surface of the stone or brick from dullness to a luster with add-

ed beauty of color. Such surface don't have to be waxed, and you can wash them with a soap or detergent and water.

Rye Grass Returns High Income; Conserves Soil

An experiment on grazing 250 to 280 pound beef calves on a thick stand of heavily fertilized rye grass at the Holly Springs Branch Experiment Station has resulted in a very high profit per acre grazed.

With very little grain, these calves doubled in weight on land

that was protected from erosion by the heavy rye grass sod.

Some Soil Conservation District cooperators living in Tishomingo County are showing interest in this project.

This is another way a landowner may conserve his soil while using it to earn a high income per acre.

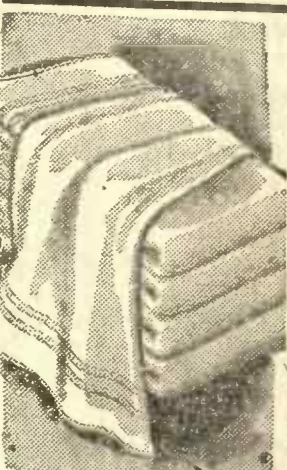

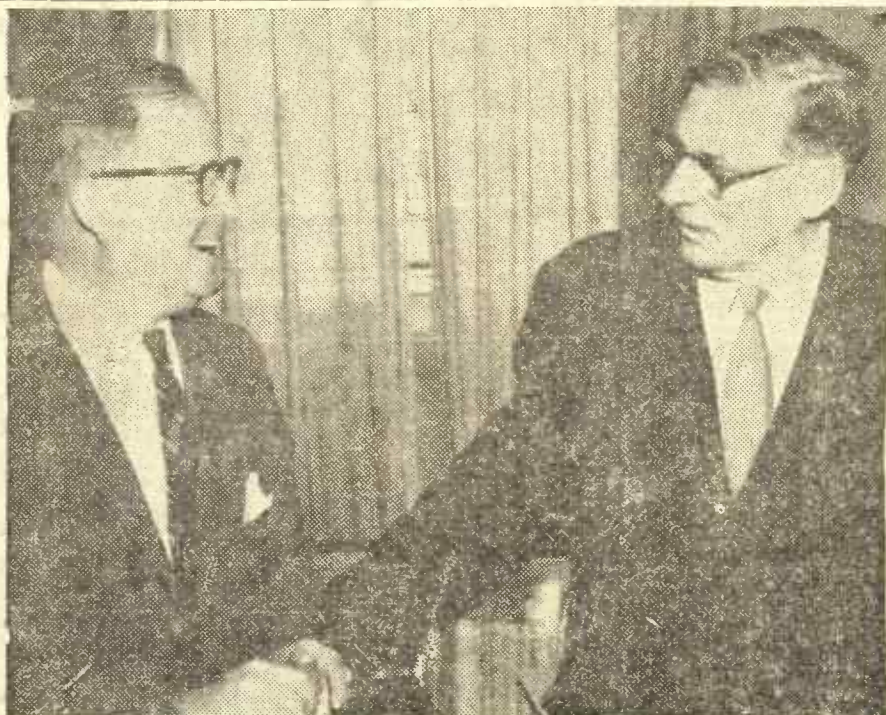

2. 4 acres. Improving Permanent Pasture (already established in Dallas, Bermuda, Fescue, or Bahia grass) using 60 pounds of Rye Grass seed, 4 sacks of 60% Potash, 4 sacks 20% superphosphate and 4 sacks of Ammonia Nitrate. Total cost to farmer only \$5.35. (That's only \$1.34 per acre.)

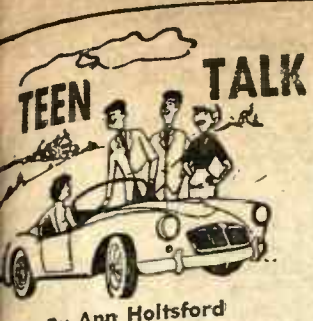

County Agent's Notes

Corn Insects
Southwestern corn borers have been found in 30 counties, including all delta counties and most others north of highway 82, with the exception of the far northeastern portion of the state.
Damage from this pest includes girdling of the stalk near the ground (feeding inside stalk). Lodging of stalk, beginning around this time of year. Holes in stalk, usually found from ground level up to about two feet. The worm, an inch to an inch and a half long with black spots on each segment will be found at this time boring down into base of stalk.
If you find this pest in your corn, report it so that entomologists can determine how far it has spread.
Some suggestions for control include stalk destruction and plowing up the root system to expose the worms to winter weather. This should help reduce field population next year.
Fall Armyworms
Keep close watch for fall armyworms, especially in young oats. Some moth flight is beginning as indicated by light trap catches at the Delta Branch Experiment Station.
Make the Most from Cotton
Here is a list of jobs that need to be done for you to make the top dollar from your 1961 crop:
Defoliate when needed to remove leaves. This lets sunshine and air in to help dry out damp cotton. It helps hand pickers do a faster job. It lets mechanical picker operators see the drill and keep the picker from barking cotton stalks.
Do not pick cotton that is wet from rain or dew. You lose \$2.50 to \$15 a bale if you harvest wet seed cotton.
Keep trailers of seed cotton covered with a tarpaulin while enroute to gin.
Hand pick ends of rows 10 to 15 feet to prevent waste in turning mechanical pickers and trailers.
Do not hand pick in tar bottom sacks.
Do not tramp trashy seed cotton into trailers.
Clean up and repair mechanical pickers each morning while dew

Veterans Corner
Q—I am a widow of a deceased World War II veteran, and have been told I may be eligible for death pension, but not death compensation. What is the difference?
A—Dependent survivors may be eligible for death, or dependency and indemnity, compensation if the veteran's death is the result of a service-incurred disability. Death pension is paid if the death was from causes not connected with the veteran's service. There is a difference in rates of payment.
Q—What happens to a veteran's National Service Life Insurance if he neglects to name a beneficiary to collect the proceeds after his death? Do the funds remain in the Treasury?
A—If no beneficiary has been designated, or none is alive at the time of the insured's death, the proceeds are payable in one lump sum to his estate.
Q—How does the VA define "child" for the purpose of death pension?
A—The term "child" means a person unmarried and under 18 years of age, or under 21 years of age if pursuing a course of instruction approved by the VA, or of any age if the VA determines that the child became permanently incapacitated before April 25, 1956, has entitled a dependent woman to government service pension. However, those from active service with connected disability may VA for special "RIF" insurance contract based on current military
