Community ASCS Committeemen Will Be Voted On In Election, October 17

Monday, October 17, is the date for the election of Community ASCS Committeemen for 1962. The ASCS Committeemen in Tishomingo County are urged to take part in this election. Community Committeemen are:

Shoe Plant Votes Against Labor Union
Employees of Genesco's shoe manufacturing plant in Hohenwald, Tenn., have just voted against representation by a labor union.

In an election held at the plant, sponsored by the National Labor Relations Board, the employees voted 169 to 72 against affiliation with the Boot & Shoe Workers Union. The Union's headquarters is in Boston.

This was the first election concerning union representation in Hohenwald plant during its years of existence. This was the 28th time in 15 years that Southern employees voted for "no union." There are no union contracts in effect at Genesco's Southern plant.

September 30 was the expiration date for approximately 96,000 licenses. You can do yourself a favor and lend a helping hand to your Patrolman by checking your license now. Check its expiration date. If it expired September 30, then renew now.

Licenses may be renewed for either one or two years. Renewal of licenses may be made at the County Sheriff's Office, or by mail to the Driver's License Division, Department of Public Safety in Jackson.

Iuka came back and scored again when Donnie Brown ran over from the two yard line. Jimmy Ramsey took a pass for an extra point.

Neither team scored during the second quarter. At half time, the score stood 13-0 in the favor of Iuka. However, Adamsville didn't give up and jumped back in the game in the third quarter. Fullback Larry Grant ran from the 7 yard line. Iuka held them for the extra point try.

In the fourth quarter, Adamsville took the ball and moved down the field and scored. Left halfback Bishop scored from the two yard line. Iuka held them on the extra point, which turned out to be the ball game for Iuka.

Adamsville again moved deep in Iuka territory but the line led by Junior Rhodes, Jimmy Ramsey, Jerry McCulloch, Lloyd Davis, John Kent, Dale Moore and Larry Brown and also defensive backs Donnie Brown, David McBee, Eddie Carson, and Donnie Carson held them. At the final whistle, Iuka stood 13-12 over Adamsville.

Iuka had more passing yardage than ground yardage. Iuka completed 8 out of 12 pass attempts. Adamsville completed 6 out of 15 pass attempts. Iuka got only 6 first downs while Adamsville got 12. Iuka was hurt in penalties with 90 yards. Adamsville was penalized only 50 yards.

The Iuka School Band under the direction of Chester Cox, presented a good half time show. Iuka will be host to Baldwin tomorrow night, Friday. Iuka will be looking for their second win of the season. Everybody come out and boost the team.

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The Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two, and Three of said County, took up for further consideration the matter of entering upon further industrial development for said Districts, and, after a discussion of the subject, Supervisor H. M. Biggs offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, ACTING FOR AND ON BEHALF OF SUPERVISORS' DISTRICTS NOS. ONE, TWO AND THREE OF SAID COUNTY, TO ENTER UPON FURTHER INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT; TO ISSUE BONDS OF SAID SUPERVISORS' DISTRICTS NOS. ONE, TWO AND THREE IN THE AMOUNT OF THREE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$350,000) FOR SAID PURPOSE, AND DIRECTING THE CALLING AND HOLDING OF AN ELECTION TO DETERMINE WHETHER OR NOT SAID DISTRICTS SHALL ENTER UPON SUCH INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AND ISSUE BONDS IN THE AMOUNT AFORESAID.

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' District Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, finds and adjudicates that, under the Laws of the State of Mississippi, and particularly under the provisions of Chapter 241, Laws of Mississippi of 1944, as amended, the said Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, subject to the grant of permission and authority by and from the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, and subject further to the approval of the proposition by the qualified electors of said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three at an election held for that purpose, has the lawful power to issue the bonds of said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three for the purpose of expanding and enlarging the present shoe factory building owned by said Districts; provided that the amount of such bonds issued by said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three shall not exceed twenty per centum (20%) of the assessed value of all taxable property within said Districts; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County has heretofore made application to the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity, as provided in the aforesaid Chapter 241, Laws of Mississippi of 1944, as amended, and other applicable statutes in such cases made and provided; and

WHEREAS, on the 7th day of September, 1961, the said Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, acting by and through its Executive Committee thereunto duly authorized, did order and direct the approval of the aforesaid application of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, and did direct the issuance to the said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of said Districts, of Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity No. 364, which said Certificate is in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE MISSISSIPPI AGRICULTURAL AND INDUSTRIAL BOARD

September 7, 1961

Pursuant to call by the Chairman, Governor Ross R. Barnett, the Executive Committee of the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, met in the office of Mr. Joe Bullock, 1504 State Office Building, City of Jackson, Hinds County, State of Mississippi, at 10 o'clock a. m., Thursday, September 7, 1961, for the purpose of considering such matters as might properly come before the Committee in accordance with the powers conferred upon the Executive Committee by a resolution adopted by the Board of Directors on February 20, 1945, and amended by a resolution adopted by the Board of Directors on February 4, 1960.

There were present the following: Mr. Joe Bullock, Chairman; Mr. E. E. Laird, Secretary; Mr. B. Newman, Mr. Blaine Eaton, all being members of the Committee.

There were absent the following: Governor Ross R. Barnett, Mr. Robert C. Cannada.

Governor Ross R. Barnett, Chairman, being absent, Mr. E. E. Laird was chosen acting chairman and assumed the duties of the presiding officer.

Upon being called to order by the Chairman, the minutes of the previous meeting of the Executive

Committee were approved as read.

The Committee first took up for consideration the matter of an instrument dated the 24th day of August, 1961, entitled "Cancellation of Contract and Mutual Release," by and between the Board of Supervisors of Chickasaw County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's District No. One, Chickasaw County, Mississippi, and Reliance Manufacturing Company, said instrument is executed by Mr. Robert B. Atkinson, a member of the Board of Supervisors of Chickasaw County, Mississippi, Mr. Miles L. Rubin and Mr. Ervin A. Pope, President and Assistant Secretary of the Reliance Manufacturing Company, a copy of which "Cancellation of Contract and Mutual Release" is incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof as fully as though copied in length herein. The above described instrument cancels the Assignment dated the 27th day of November, 1956, wherein Rice-Stix of Mississippi assigned all of its rights and interests under the Contract dated the 31st day of May, 1946, by and between the Board of Supervisors of Chickasaw County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's District No. One of said County and Rice-Stix of Mississippi, to the Reliance Manufacturing Company.

Upon motion by Mr. Eaton, seconded by Rep. Newman, the "Cancellation of Contract and Mutual Release" as described above, pursuant to Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity No. 10 was approved and ratified by the Executive Committee of the Board.

The Committee next took up the matter of the application of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity for industrial development. After hearing oral testimony and considering the documentary evidence submitted by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi and after a full discussion and due consideration thereof, the following order was presented:

ORDER OF THE MISSISSIPPI AGRICULTURAL AND INDUSTRIAL BOARD DIRECTING ISSUANCE TO SUPERVISOR'S DISTRICTS NOS. ONE, TWO AND THREE, TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI OF CERTIFICATE OF PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY, INVOLVING FULL FAITH AND CREDIT BONDS.

WHEREAS, on the 5th day of September, 1961, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, filed with this Board its resolution, dated the 5th day of September, 1961, recorded at Book 18, page 293, of the minutes of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, praying the issuance of a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity authorizing the expansion of the now existing shoe manufacturing type of industry and, in order to finance the same, the issuance by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, of full faith and credit bonds of said Districts in a principal amount not to exceed three hundred and fifty thousand (\$350,000.00) dollars, as authorized by Chapter 2 of Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended; and

WHEREAS, this Board has heard and taken oral and documentary evidence and has made due and full investigation of all matters in connection with said resolution and request, said Board does now find and determine:

(1) That there are sufficient natural resources readily and economically available for the operation of the aforesaid enterprise for at least twenty-five (25) years, but in no event less than the period of time for which any bonds will be issued, for acquiring or constructing said enterprise;

(2) That there is available within the area in a radius of twenty-five (25) miles from the site of the proposed industrial enterprise in Tishomingo County, Mississippi, between the ages of eighteen and fifty for each additional operative job in said enterprise;

(3) That there are adequate property values in said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and that the financial condition of said Supervisor's Districts is suitable so that the total bonded indebtedness of these Supervisor's Districts, solely for the purposes authorized by Chapter 2 of Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended, including the full faith and credit bonds proposed to be issued as aforesaid shall not exceed twenty (20) per cent of the total assessed valuation of all property in said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, as shown by a current financial statement of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, duly certified by the

Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of said County and attached to said resolution as Exhibit "1."

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED that the Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity prayed for by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, be and the same is hereby granted and issued in substantially the following form, to-wit:

CERTIFICATE OF PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY NO. 364

The Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, having made due investigation and determination concerning the expansion of the now existing shoe manufacturing type of industry for Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, does hereby issue to the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of said Supervisor's Districts, this

CERTIFICATE OF PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY Authorizing the said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, to acquire, own, to let, to lease, or to rent, all subject to the limitations hereinafter set out, the industrial enterprise described above.

The Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, acting pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 241, Laws of Mississippi of 1944, as amended, does hereby fix and determine that the rights, powers, and duties conferred by this Certificate shall be exercised in the manner hereinafter set out and subject to the provisions, restrictions, and limitations hereinafter set out.

HEREBY, said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, is authorized and empowered:

(1) To enter upon an expansion of the now existing industrial enterprise for the manufacturing of shoes and in order to do so to call and hold the election provided in Chapter 2, Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended, and upon a favorable vote thereat to issue its full faith and credit industrial bonds pursuant to the provisions of said Chapter 2, Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended, in a principal amount of not to exceed three hundred and fifty thousand (\$350,000.00) dollars.

(2) To acquire for said enterprise for the purpose of expanding and enlarging said factory building and for constructing or otherwise acquiring additions and improvements thereto containing sufficient square feet of floor space to meet the needs of such enlarged enterprise and to expend therefor not to exceed three hundred and fifty thousand (\$350,000.00) dollars, including the land on which said addition is to be located and all necessary plumbing, heating, air-conditioning and necessary fixtures required for said industrial enterprise, but no part of said amount shall be expended for machinery or equipment to be installed for use in the operation of the industry located or to be located in such building.

(3) To own said property; and to let, lease, or rent said property to a person, firm or corporation for the operation of a factory for the manufacturing of shoes in strict compliance with the provisions of Chapter 2, Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended;

(4) To expend in order to acquire said property and said enterprise, such sums out of the proceeds of said bonds as may be required in order to perform the obligations assumed by said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, under the terms of a valid contract entered into by said Supervisor's Districts with any person, firm or corporation providing for the acquisition of such expansion of the now existing industrial enterprise and approved by this Board;

(5) To operate said industrial enterprise by leasing same under the terms of the contract referred to in Paragraph (4) above and such lease as may be executed pursuant to such terms.

(a) That no part of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds authorized by this Certificate shall be used for the purchase of machinery or equipment to be installed in said building for use in the operation of the industry to be located therein. The proceeds from the sale of said bonds shall be used fully for the purchase of land, necessary improvements thereto, construction and purchasing expansions or additions to the factory building, together with all usual and necessary fixtures and services as set out in Paragraph (2) above.

(b) That no bonds shall be issued by said Board of Supervisors pursuant hereto until said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of said Supervisor's Districts shall have entered into a valid contract with a person, firm or corporation providing for the acquisition of such property as an expansion or addition to such industrial enterprise by said Supervisor's Districts and the lease thereof to, and operation thereof by, said person, firm or corporation providing for payment as rent by such person, firm or corporation, as lessee, of the entire principal of and interest upon such bonds;

(c) The bonds herein authorized to be issued shall mature over a period of time not to exceed twenty-five (25) years with not less than one-fifth (1/5) maturing in each year during the first five (5) years of the life of said bonds, not less than one-twenty-fifth (1/25) in each year during

the next succeeding ten (10) years of the life of said bonds and the remainder in approximately equal payments each year during the remaining life of said bonds; and that for the payment of said bonds, as and when issued and interest thereon, and for the creation of a sinking fund for the payment of said bonds and interest, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi shall annually levy and collect taxes upon all non-exempt taxable property within said Supervisor's Districts in the amount of not less than the amount of principal and interest due during each year, and shall fix an annual tax levy over said period of years for which said bonds are issued so that said tax levy shall be substantially uniform throughout said period; and to further secure the payment of said bonds the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, in its discretion, pledge any and all income derived from said property;

(e) That said Supervisor's Districts may lease, let or rent said industrial enterprise but shall never operate same unless specifically authorized by this Board so to do.

(f) That said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, shall in every respect in the exercise of the authority and powers hereby granted conform to and comply with the provisions of Chapter 2, Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended.

(g) That this Certificate shall expire on the 6th day of September, 1962, unless said Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, shall, prior thereto, proceed to exercise the authority and powers herein granted.

Sims, President and Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and Mr. H. N. Carmichael and Mr. W. W. Sledge, President and Secretary of The Tishomingo Shoe Company, a copy of which contract is attached hereto and becomes a part of these minutes as though copied herein in full. The contract provides for the issuance of bonds by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, in the amount of three hundred and fifty thousand (\$350,000.00) dollars to be repaid by the Company, both principal and interest, within twenty-five (25) years.

Upon motion by Mr. Eaton, seconded by Rep. Newman, the contract as described above and entered into pursuant to Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity No. 364 was approved by the Executive Committee of the Board. There being no further business to come before the Executive Committee of the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, lawfully assembled in a called meeting this 7th day of September, 1961, on motion duly made, seconded, and unanimously carried, the meeting was adjourned.

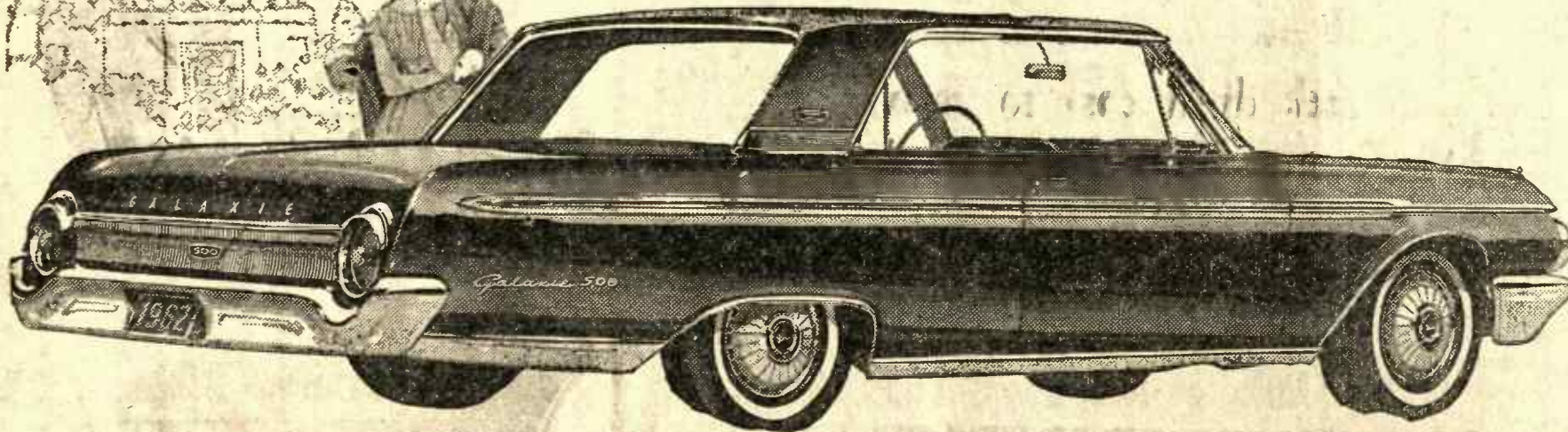

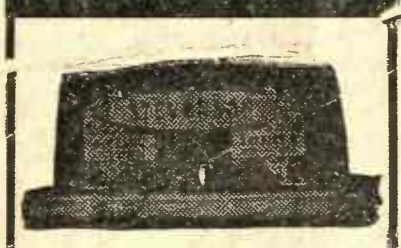

After harvest is a good time to lime corn fields and turn stock in to graze out the fields and salvage wasted grain. Cattle often get a month's grazing and a lot of grain from harvested corn fields.

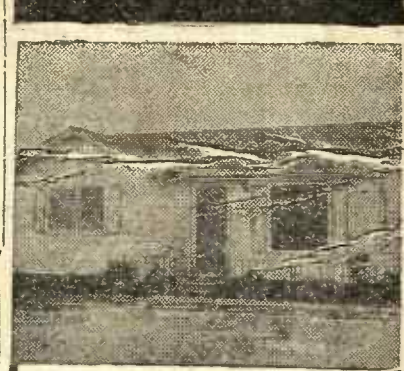
Weeds in soybeans make for difficult combining. Combining is slowed down, a lot of beans are left in fields and the grade is lowered when weeds are a big problem.

To help get rid of weeds, disk around ends of rows and turnrows to make turning easier. Slow the combine down.

Do not use desiccants or defoliant until just before harvest. Early use of defoliant or desiccants will reduce yields. Make sure that any desiccant or defoliant that you use has an approved label for soybeans.

Remember, soybeans require a high lime (PH) soil to make high yields. After harvesting is a good time to apply the needed lime.

If you use thiodan, dieldrin, DDT, or parathion in August and September to control peach tree borers, now is the time to make

Armyworms
Keep a close watch for armyworm damage, especially in young oats. Some moth flight is beginning as indicated by light trap catches at the Delta Experiment Station.

Wild Winter Peas
Lots of Bermuda areas need to have wild winter peas planted in them.

Either plant them out on top of the ground in the grass or use a sod seeder to put them in the ground.

With a sod seeder you can use 35 pounds of seed to the acre and get a better stand than you can

with 75 pounds sown on top of the ground.

Cotton Picking
Pick that cotton for the best quality you can get. It means more money in your pocket.

Ginning wet cotton or trashy cotton costs you money. Let your cotton dry from rain or dew before picking. Keep it free from leaves, grass, bark or any foreign material.

Keep in contact with your ginner and cotton classes so that you will know the quality you are getting.

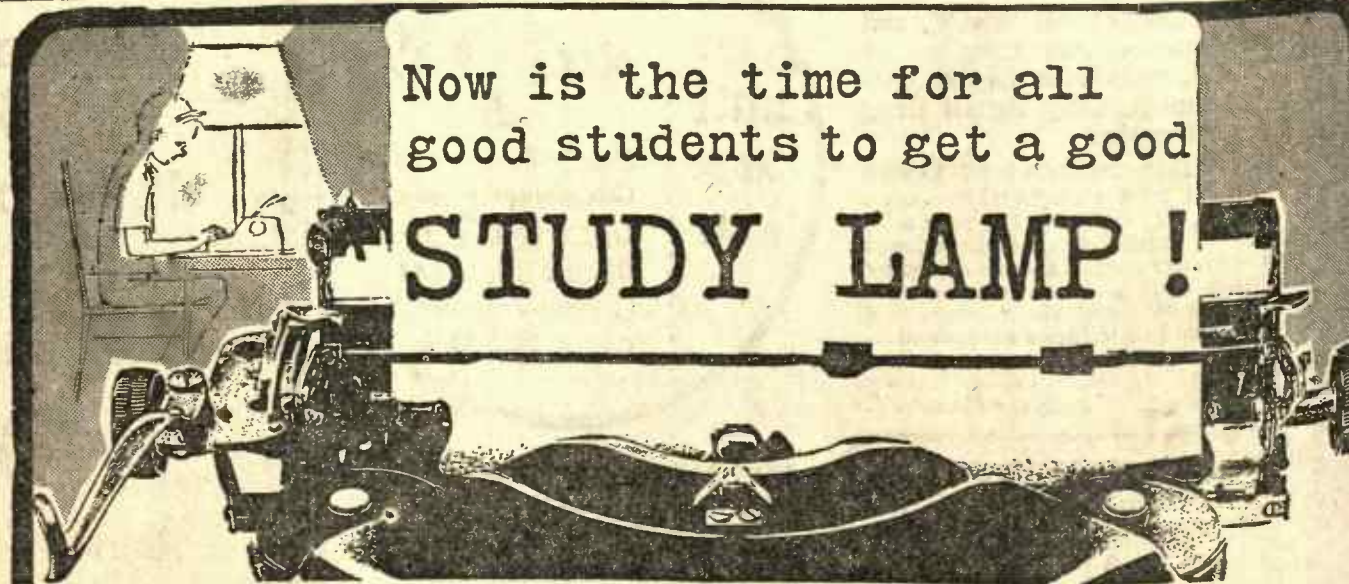

Constant Grazing Best For Steers Winter Pasture

Constant grazing with no additional feed proved to be the most profitable method of managing winter pasture in a recent test at the Brown Loom Experiment Station near Iuka, Miss.

Research available on results from the Experiment Station showed that winter grazing with increased stocking rates and no additional feed produced greater gains per acre but lower gains per animal. This resulted in lower production.

These results were reported by Morrison, Superintendent of Brown Loom Station. His report is published in the November issue of Mississippi Research available on request from the Experiment Station. Lightweight steer calves were profitable than heavy ones. They weighed 267 pounds stock at a rate of 1.75 animals per acre compared to one 475-pound calf per acre. Light calves produced 491 pounds and a profit of \$47.88 per acre. Heavy calves produced 351 pounds and \$14.52 per acre.

Another test under way at station, feeding cottonseed to steers on late summer pasture is producing good gains. One of meal per day failed to produce gains, but two pounds of meal per day produced gains. In this test the supplemental feeding begins on July 1.

**Apply Lime On
Your Land Before
Winter Rains Begin**

The best time to apply agricultural lime on your pasture and land is when the land is dry. The lime truck can run without bogging. Apply one ton of lime per acre more if the soil test shows a need for more than one ton per acre. Caution should be used not

to overlime. Lime, or calcium, is a plant food, but lime does more than furnish nutrients to plants. Lime conditions the soils and makes phosphorus and some other plant nutrients more available. Grass on limed pastures is stronger and better for livestock grazing. It has been proved that lime will aid cotton farmers in maintaining a stand of cotton. This is especially true in cold wet springs like we had in 1961. If you have land that needs lime, make your plans to apply it before the winter rains set in.

State Fair Mirrors Advances Of Progress-Minded Mississippi

Autumn's arrival is also ushering in the season of fairs and the 1961 Mississippi State Fair promises to be one of the best and biggest on record. Mississippians of all ages are in for six fun-filled days beginning Monday, October 9 and continuing through Saturday the 14th. Agricultural and industrial exhibits from every part of Mississippi will be on display, as will prize-winning livestock, poultry, arts and crafts, food preservations and all the other traditional features. The fair will be a show case for talents, skills and constructive energies—ranging from homemaking to industry, arts and diversified agriculture.

State Tree Farm Program

Co-operating in Mississippi's tree farm program are all agencies whose work touches upon forestry. The state program includes more than 2,900 tree farms with over 2.7 million acres of private woodlands. In addition to forest products, tree farms are supplying important benefits to recreation, food and cover for wildlife, and soil and water conservation. Mississippi's national leadership in this activity is eloquent proof that the tree farm program is paying handsome dividend on an increasingly substantial scale.

State Bank Debits

August bank debits reported by 83 Mississippi banks totaled \$858,738,393, or 2.6 per cent above the corresponding total of a year ago. August bank debits registered 37 percent above the monthly average of the three-year base period, 1956-58. This figure is the highest ever recorded for Mississippi bank deposits in August, and less than one per cent below the all-time high set in May, 1961.

Merit Community Program

The Merit Community Program offers a measuring stick and guide to localities wishing to develop. To date, Mississippi has more than 60 cities and towns entered in the Merit Community Program. Another 36 towns have official entry kits and most are in the process of scoring themselves in the ten basic categories preparatory to entering the program. The goal of Mississippi's Merit Community Program is to encourage local development and growth through local self-analysis and teamwork.
