Iuka School Opens With Increased Attendance And Expanded Curriculum

533 Elementary, 458 High Students Enrolled; Vocational Training, French, Geometry, Trig, Offered

Attendance figures at the end of the first month of school indicate an increase of 20 over the enrollment at the close of the first session 1960-61. The present enrollment by grades is as follows: first grade, 87; second grade, 107; third grade, 102; fourth grade, 90; fifth grade, 76; and sixth grade, 71. This makes an enrollment of 533 students in the elementary grades. In the high school, grade seven has 95; eighth grade, 98; ninth grade, 60; and tenth grade, 42. This makes a total of 458 high school students. The average daily attendance for the first month this year was 521 in the elementary school and 450 in the high school, a total average of 485.

The present session opens with only an increased attendance and a greatly expanded high school curriculum. For some time, the school board has recognized the need of vocational training for its students. This session, that need has been met with the construction of a vocational building, and the introduction of courses in trades and in-

4-H'ers Score High In Record Contest

Tishomingo County 4-H Club members scored high in State 4-H Record Contest competition. Out of nine boys' records recently sent to Mississippi State University to be judged in State competition, Tishomingo County had five winners.

Earl Walker won first place in the State with his Corn record. Jim Carson was district winner in Forestry, Bobby Glover was district winner in Soil and Water Conservation and Billy Middleton was district winner in Boys Agriculture. These four boys get a two-day expense paid trip to Jackson to 4-H Club Round-Up where they will tour the city and special points of interest.

W. T. Carson was a Junior winner in the gardening project and will receive \$12.50. Glenn Bugg and Mike Elledge both have already won district honors on their pig and poultry records, and could only enter the State competition. Larry Bonds placed third in the district with his tractor record and Billy Joe Moss placed third in the District with his dairy record.

Earl Walker, State winner in the Corn project, will get a five day expense paid trip to National 4-H Club Congress, which will be held in Chicago.

The service of a counselor, now recognized as basic need in the modern school program, has also been added since last session. Carol Ed Sanders, who received the Master's degree in guidance from the University of Mississippi, besides teaching science and French, is functioning as counselor. As this program develops, he will use his specialized training to aid principals and teachers in assisting pupils to find where their abilities and limitations lie and to choose such elective courses as will best suit individual needs, and to provide other services within the scope of the school counselor.

With these additions, the high school in Iuka approaches the curricular offerings of the larger schools over the state, and will seek this year accreditation with the Southern Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges.

Ample Funds, State Official Says

W. D. Neal, State Auditor of Public Accounts, says that there is ample funds in the state's treasury to pay Mississippi school teachers for all of this school session.

This statement was made to Professor H. L. Shook of the Iuka school in a telephone conversation Monday morning. The information is passed on to teachers of the area to refute claims printed in other newspapers and partially circulated in this section. The erroneous claims in other papers said that funds were exhausted, and failed to say when more monies would be coming in. Mr. Neal says that more tax monies will be deposited in the state's department of education treasury by the end of October.

Boy Scout Finance Campaigns To Kick Off Next Week; Meetings Set For Mon. And Wed.

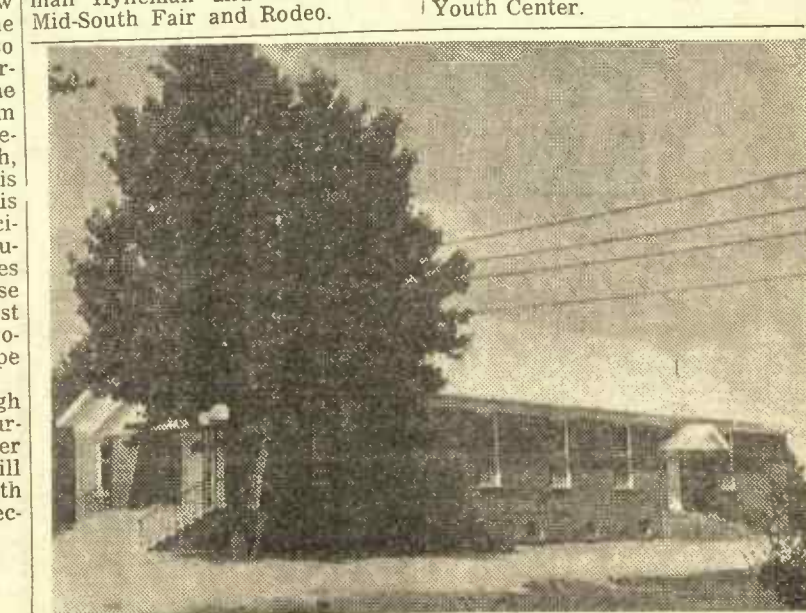

Tickets are now on sale and may be purchased from any member of the Rotary Club. Funds derived from this activity will be used to help defray the expenses of the Youth Center.



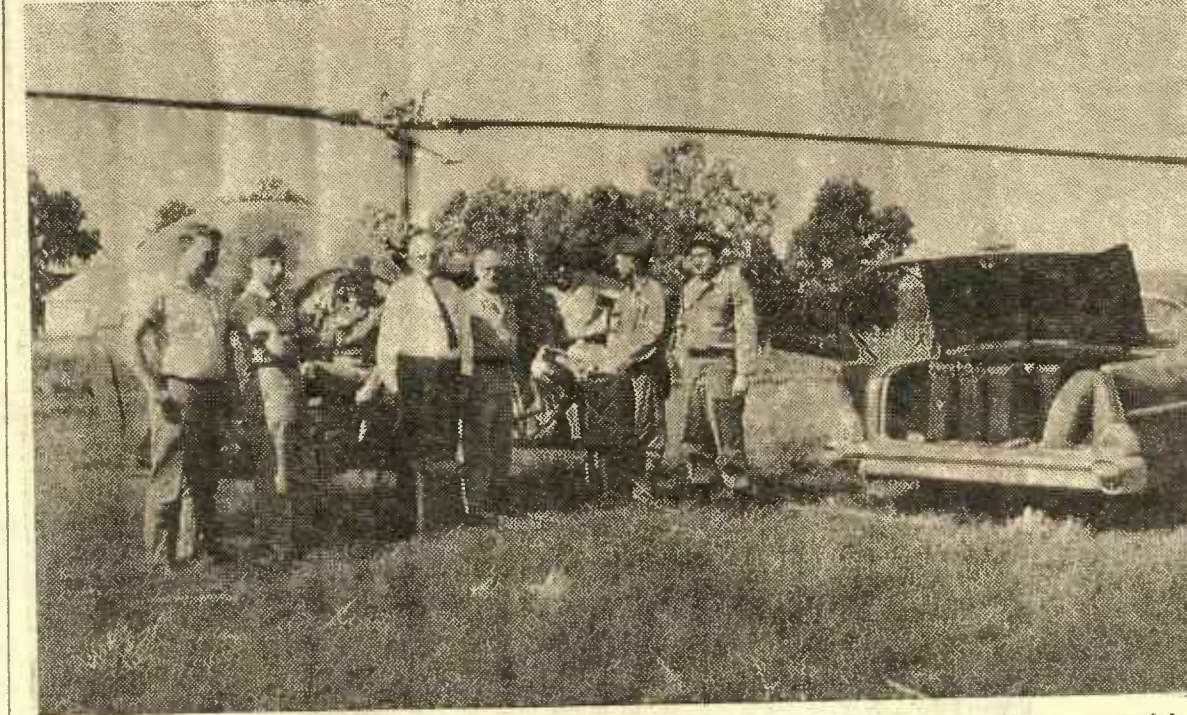

Mrs. Jennie Ethel Johnson Was Missing Ninety-Six Hours

Mrs. Jennie Ethel Johnson, missing from her home since early Saturday morning, was found Wednesday about 8:30 a. m., after having been wandering in the woods for approximately 96 hours. 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The Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two, and Three of said County, took up for further consideration the matter of entering upon further industrial development for said Districts, and after a discussion of the subject, Supervisor H. M. Biggs offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, ACTING FOR AND ON BEHALF OF SUPERVISORS' DISTRICTS NOS. ONE, TWO AND THREE OF SAID COUNTY, TO ENTER UPON FURTHER INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT; TO ISSUE BONDS OF SAID SUPERVISORS' DISTRICTS NOS. ONE, TWO AND THREE IN THE AMOUNT OF THREE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$350,000) FOR SAID PURPOSE; AND DIRECTING THE CALLING AND HOLDING OF AN ELECTION TO DETERMINE WHETHER OR NOT SAID DISTRICTS SHALL ENTER UPON SUCH INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AND ISSUE BONDS IN THE AMOUNT AND FOR THE PURPOSE AFORESAID.

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' District Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, finds and adjudicates that, under the Laws of the State of Mississippi, and particularly under the provisions of Chapter 241, Laws of Mississippi of 1944, as amended, the said Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, subject to the grant of permission and authority by and from the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, and subject further to the approval of the proposition by the qualified electors of said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three at an election held for that purpose, has the lawful power to issue the bonds of said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three for the purpose of expanding and enlarging the present shoe factory building owned by said Districts; provided that the amount of such bonds issued by said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three shall not exceed twenty per centum (20%) of the assessed value of all taxable property within said Districts; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County has heretofore made application to the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity, as provided in the aforesaid Chapter 241, Laws of Mississippi of 1944, as amended, and other applicable statutes in such cases made and provided; and

WHEREAS, on the 7th day of September, 1961, the said Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, acting by and through its Executive Committee thereunto duly authorized, did order and direct the approval of the aforesaid application of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, and did direct the issuance to the said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of said Districts, of Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity No. 364, which said Certificate is in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE MISSISSIPPI AGRICULTURAL AND INDUSTRIAL BOARD

Pursuant to call by the Chairman, Governor Ross R. Barnett, the Executive Committee of the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, met in the office of Mr. Joe Bullock, 1504 State Office Building, City of Jackson, Hinds County, State of Mississippi, at 10 o'clock a. m., Thursday, September 7, 1961, for the purpose of considering such matters as might properly come before the committee in accordance with the powers conferred upon the Executive Committee by a resolution adopted by the Board of Directors on February 20, 1945, and amended by a resolution adopted by the Board of Directors on February 4, 1960. There were present the following:

all being members of the Committee.

Governor Ross R. Barnett, Chairman, being absent, Mr. E. E. Laird was chosen acting chairman and assumed the duties of the presiding officer.

Upon being called to order by the Chairman, the minutes of the previous meeting of the Executive

Committee were approved as read.

The Committee first took up for consideration the matter of an instrument dated the 24th day of August, 1961, entitled "Cancellation of Contract and Mutual Release," by and between the Board of Supervisors of Chickasaw County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's District No. One, Chickasaw County, Mississippi, and Reliance Manufacturing Company. Said instrument is executed by Mr. Robert B. Atkinson, a member of the Board of Supervisors of Chickasaw County, Mississippi, Mr. Miles L. Rubin and Mr. Ervin A. Popa, President and Assistant Secretary of the Reliance Manufacturing Company, a copy of which "Cancellation of Contract and Mutual Release" is incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof as fully as though copied in length herein. The above described instrument cancels the Assignment dated the 27th day of November, 1956, wherein Rice-Stix of Mississippi assigned all of its rights and interests under the Contract dated the 31st day of May, 1946, by and between the Board of Supervisors of Chickasaw County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's District No. One of said County and to the Rice-Stix of Mississippi, to the Reliance Manufacturing Company.

Upon motion by Mr. Eaton, seconded by Rep. Newman, the "Cancellation of Contract and Mutual Release" as described above, pursuant to Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity No. 10 was approved and ratified by the Executive Committee of the Board.

The Committee next took up the matter of the application of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, subject to the grant of permission and authority by and from the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, and subject further to the approval of the proposition by the qualified electors of said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three at an election held for that purpose, has the lawful power to issue the bonds of said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three for the purpose of expanding and enlarging the present shoe factory building owned by said Districts; provided that the amount of such bonds issued by said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three shall not exceed twenty per centum (20%) of the assessed value of all taxable property within said Districts; and

ORDER OF THE MISSISSIPPI AGRICULTURAL AND INDUSTRIAL BOARD DIRECTING ISSUANCE TO SUPERVISOR'S DISTRICTS NOS. ONE, TWO AND THREE, TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI OF CERTIFICATE OF PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY, INVOLVING FULL FAITH AND CREDIT BONDS.

WHEREAS, on the 5th day of September, 1961, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi filed with this Board its resolution dated the 5th day of September, 1961, recorded at Book 18, page 293 of the minutes of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi praying the issuance of a certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity authorizing the expansion of the now existing shoe manufacturing type of industry and, in order to finance the same, the issuance by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, of full faith and credit bonds of said Districts in a principal amount not to exceed three hundred and fifty thousand (\$350,000.00) dollars, as authorized by Chapter 2 of Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended; and

WHEREAS, this Board has heard and taken oral and documentary evidence and has made due and full investigation of all matters in connection with said resolution and request, said Board does now find and determine:

(1) That there are sufficient natural resources readily and economically available for the operation of the aforesaid enterprise for at least twenty-five (25) years, but in no event less than the period of time for which any bonds will be issued, for acquiring or constructing said enterprise;

(2) That there is available within the area in a radius of twenty-five (25) miles from the site of the proposed industrial enterprise in Tishomingo County, Mississippi, between the ages of eighteen and fifty for each additional operative job in said enterprise;

(3) That there are adequate property values in said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi and that the financial condition of said Supervisor's Districts is suitable so that the total bonded indebtedness of these Supervisor's Districts, solely for the purposes authorized by Chapter 2 of Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended, including the full faith and credit bonds proposed to be issued as aforesaid shall not exceed twenty (20) per cent of the total assessed valuation of all property in said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, as shown by a current financial statement of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi duly certified by the

Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of said County and attached to said resolution as Exhibit "1." IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED that the Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity prayed for by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, be and the same is hereby granted and issued in substantially the following form, to-wit:

CERTIFICATE OF PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY NO. 364

The Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, having made due investigation and determination concerning the expansion of the now existing shoe manufacturing type of industry for Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, does hereby issue to the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of said Supervisor's Districts, this

CERTIFICATE OF PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY Authorizing the said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi to acquire, to own, to let, to lease, or to rent, all subject to the limitations hereinafter set out, the industrial enterprise described above.

The Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, acting pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 241, Laws of Mississippi of 1944, as amended, does hereby fix and determine that the rights, powers, and duties conferred by this Certificate shall be exercised in the manner hereinafter set out and subject to the provisions, restrictions, and limitations hereinafter set out.

HEREBY, said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, is authorized and empowered:

(1) To enter upon an expansion of the now existing industrial enterprise for the manufacturing of shoes and in order to do so to call and hold the election provided in Chapter 2, Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended, and upon a favorable vote thereat to issue its full faith and credit industrial bonds pursuant to the provisions of said Chapter 2, Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended, in a principal amount of not to exceed three hundred and fifty thousand (\$350,000.00) dollars.

(2) To acquire for said enterprise for the purpose of expanding and enlarging said factory building and for constructing or otherwise acquiring additions and improvements thereto containing sufficient square feet of floor space to meet the needs of such enlarged enterprise and to expend therefor not to exceed three hundred and fifty thousand (\$350,000.00) dollars, including the land on which said addition is to be located and all necessary plumbing, heating, air-conditioning and necessary fixtures required for said industrial enterprise, but no part of said amount shall be expended for machinery or equipment to be installed for use in the operation of the industry located or to be located in such building.

(3) To own said property; and to let, lease, or rent said property to a person, firm or corporation for the operation of a factory for the manufacturing of shoes in strict compliance with the provisions of Chapter 2, Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended;

(4) To expend in order to acquire said property and said enterprise, such sums out of the proceeds of said bonds as may be required in order to perform the obligations assumed by said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi under the terms of a valid contract entered into by said Supervisor's Districts with any person, firm or corporation providing for the acquisition of such expansion of the now existing industrial enterprise and approved by this Board;

(5) To operate said industrial enterprise by leasing same under the terms of the contract referred to in Paragraph (4) above and such lease as may be executed pursuant to such terms.

(a) That no part of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds authorized by this Certificate shall be used for the purchase of machinery or equipment to be installed in said building for use in the operation of the industry to be located therein. The proceeds from the sale of said bonds shall be used fully for the purchase of land, necessary improvements thereto, construction and purchasing expansions or additions to the factory building, together with all usual and necessary fixtures and services as set out in Paragraph (2) above.

(b) That no bonds shall be issued by said Board of Supervisors pursuant hereto until said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of said Supervisor's Districts shall have entered into a valid contract with a person, firm or corporation providing for the acquisition of such property as an expansion or addition to such industrial enterprise by said Supervisor's Districts and the lease thereof to, and operation thereof by, said person, firm or corporation providing for payment as rent by such person, firm or corporation, as lessee, of the entire principal of and interest upon such bonds;

(c) The bonds herein authorized to be issued shall mature over a period of time not to exceed twenty-five (25) years with not less than one-fifth (1/5) maturing in each year during the first five (5) years of the life of said bonds, not less than one-twenty-fifth (1/25) in each year during

the next succeeding ten (10) years of the life of said bonds and the remainder in approximately equal payments each year during the remaining life of said bonds;

(d) That for the payment of said bonds as and when issued and interest thereon, and for the creation of a sinking fund for the payment of said bonds and interest, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, shall annually levy and collect taxes upon all non-exempt taxable property within said Supervisor's Districts in the amount of not less than the amount of principal and interest due during each year, and shall fix an annual tax levy over said period of years for which said bonds are issued so that said tax levy shall be substantially uniform throughout said period; and to further secure the payment of said bonds the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, in its discretion, pledge any and all income derived from said property;

(e) That said Supervisor's Districts may lease Board or rent said industrial enterprise but shall never operate same unless specifically authorized by this Board so to do.

(f) That said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, shall in every respect in the exercise of the authority and powers hereby granted conform to and comply with the provisions of Chapter 2, Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended.

(g) That this Certificate shall expire on the 6th day of September, 1962, unless said Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, shall, prior thereto, proceed to exercise the authority and powers herein granted.

Sims, President and Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and Mr. H. N. Carnichael and Mr. W. W. Sledge, President and Secretary of The Tishomingo Shoe Company, a copy of which contract is attached hereto and becomes a part of these minutes as though copied herein in full. The contract provides for the issuance of bonds by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, in the amount of three hundred and fifty thousand (\$350,000.00) dollars to be repaid by the Company, both principal and interest, within twenty-five (25) years.

Upon motion by Mr. Eaton, seconded by Rep. Newman, the contract as described above and entered into pursuant to Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity No. 364 was approved by the Executive Committee of the Board.

There being no further business to come before the Executive Committee of the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, lawfully assembled in a called meeting this the 7th day of September, 1961, on motion duly made, seconded, and unanimously carried, the meeting was adjourned.

One, Two and Three of said County, does now affirmatively find and adjudicate that all of the findings of fact as set forth in the aforesaid Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity are true and correct, and that it will be in the best interest of said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three to provide for the expanding and enlarging of the present shoe factory building owned by said District and described in the aforesaid Certificate, and to issue the bonds of said Supervisor's Districts in the amount of Three Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$350,000) for that purpose; and

WHEREAS, Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three

have heretofore issued bonds under the provisions of the aforesaid Chapter 241, Laws of Mississippi of 1944, as amended, of which Three Hundred Fifty Thousand and no/100 (\$315,000.00) now remain outstanding and unpaid; and

County Agent's Notes

Safeguard Your Home and Farm from Fire

This week has been designated as National Fire Prevention Week. Farm fire losses in 1960 were estimated at \$165 million by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. This is 5 percent less than the loss in 1959, the highest on record. The USDA estimate is based on actual loss rates of more than 200 representative farmers mutual fire insurance companies selected from more than 1600 firms.

Four-fifths of the losses were from fire and one-fifth from lightning damage. Building losses account for about 65 per cent of the total. Almost three-fourths of the building losses were on dwellings and barns. Personal property losses cost more than any other personal property item, and were mostly due to lightning.

Loss of life from farm fires was estimated at about 850 last year by the National Safety Council.

A study by the National Fire Protection Association shows that in 1959 about half of the dwelling fires in which six or more lives were lost occurred in rural homes.

Misused, overheated, and defective heating or cooking equipment, flues, and chimneys caused 48 per cent of these dwelling fires; smoking or matches, 15 per cent; explosions, 11 per cent; rubbish, incendiary (deliberate) and electrical nearly 4 per cent each; and undetermined 15 per cent.

A similar study by this association for the year 1960 shows that of the 54 residential fires in which five or more lives were lost, 46 were dwelling fires.

National Fire Prevention Week is the best time to alert farm families to stop such fires. November

was the peak month for these fires and loss of life. Four-fifths of the fires occurred and 84 per cent of the lives were lost in the 6 months from October through March.

Nine-tenths of the fires and the deaths reported in these two studies occurred between 8 p. m. and 8 a. m. Most of the residence fires causing five or more deaths occurred between 10 p. m. and 5 a. m., when people were asleep. Four out of every five persons who died were under 15 years of age, and two of every five were under four.

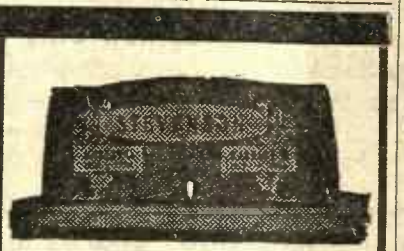
Most of the people were trapped by fire. Installation of a complete system of approved fire detectors and alarms, along with fire safety training, can save lives.

Farm families particularly must rely on their own fire safety training, fire prevention checkups, and private fire protection measures to safeguard their lives, income, and property.

Fire Safety Training Plan at least two escape routes from every room in the house, and go over plans with every member of the family. Anticipate halls and stairs being blocked by fire. Train everyone in use of escape routes until even younger children understand clearly what to do. Keep exits clear. Plan to use garage and porch roofs, ladders, and even trees to escape from upper floors. Know the phone number of the fire department serving your district; be sure firemen know how to reach your farm.

Get everyone out of the house immediately the minute you discover fire or smoke. Don't stop to dress children or save valuables. Always have a flashlight handy. Don't open hot doors. Feel doors first; if they're hot, keep them closed and get out another way or wait for help. Closed wooden doors can keep fire and smoke out of a room for several minutes.

Never leave children alone in your house. Instruct your babysitter in your escape plans; see that she knows how to get in touch with fire departments, parents,

Beware of re-entering burning house; even the smallest, most harmless-looking fire can give off deadly smoke and fire gases.

Fire Prevention Keep your home free of all fire hazards by regular inspections. Avoid carelessness with smoking or matches.

Do not allow trash or oily rags to accumulate in homes or farm buildings. A clean house seldom burns. Keep attics, lofts, cellars, and other storage places clear of trash and accessible for firefighting.

Remove grass, weeds and dry vegetation from around buildings

and along fence rows.

Burn trash regularly, in small quantities, in a safe place, and at a safe distance from buildings, preferably in a good receptacle. Check local regulations.

Replace damaged or worn lighting rods or wires. Be sure ground connections are secure.

Install lightning surge arresters on load side of meter to reduce interior damage to the home and to protect meter service, wiring, and electrical appliances.

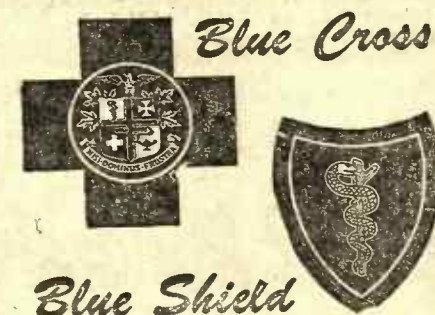

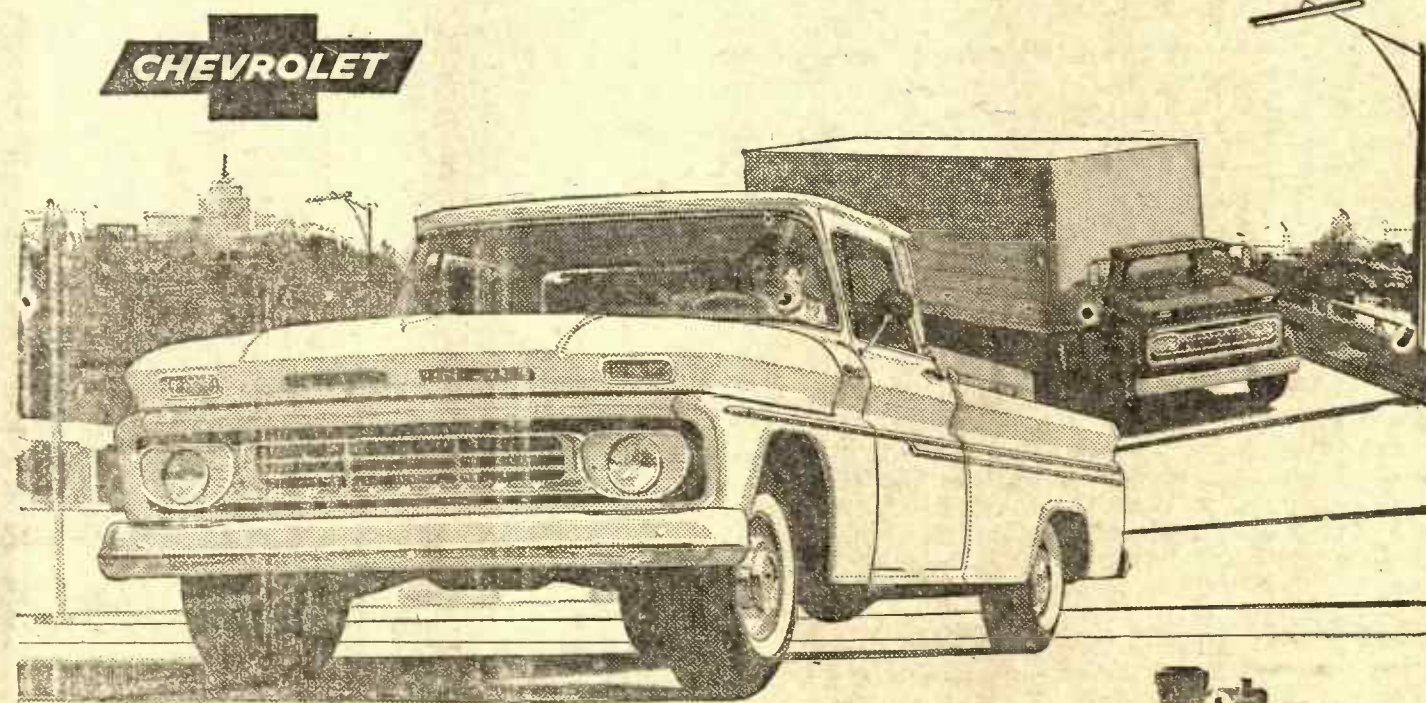

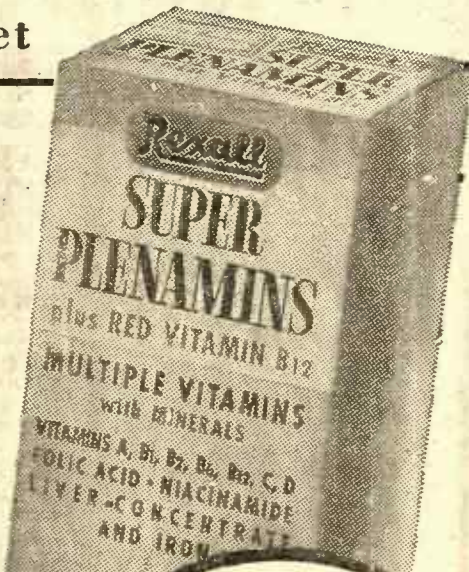

Turf Grass Study Helps Home Owner Get Better Lawns

New home owners trying to get lawns established in the fall have some difficult decisions to make. Should they sow the area to winter grass alone or include some

permanent summer grasses also in the hope that they will save another planting job in the spring?

Research on turf grasses, a relatively new undertaking at Mississippi State University, is beginning to provide some answers to these problems.

The Experiment Station began a test in 1959 in an effort to learn if summer and winter grasses could be planted together. Bermuda, Bahia, centepede and ryegrass were among the grasses included in the test which continued through the 1960-61 season.

Results of this work indicate that if cover and protection are needed on a new turf area in the winter, it is best to seed a cool season grass in the fall and wait until spring to plant the permanent summer grass. Unsatisfactory stands of summer turf resulted

from efforts to plant these grasses in the fall along with the winter cover.

Mulching steep slopes was found advantageous after seeding the cool season grasses.

The complete report, including tables of data, is published in the September issue of Mississippi Farm Research, available on request from the Experiment Station at State College. The paper reports work done by Assistant Agronomist W. R. Thompson, Jr., and Dr. C. M. Johnson who is now engaged in research work in California.

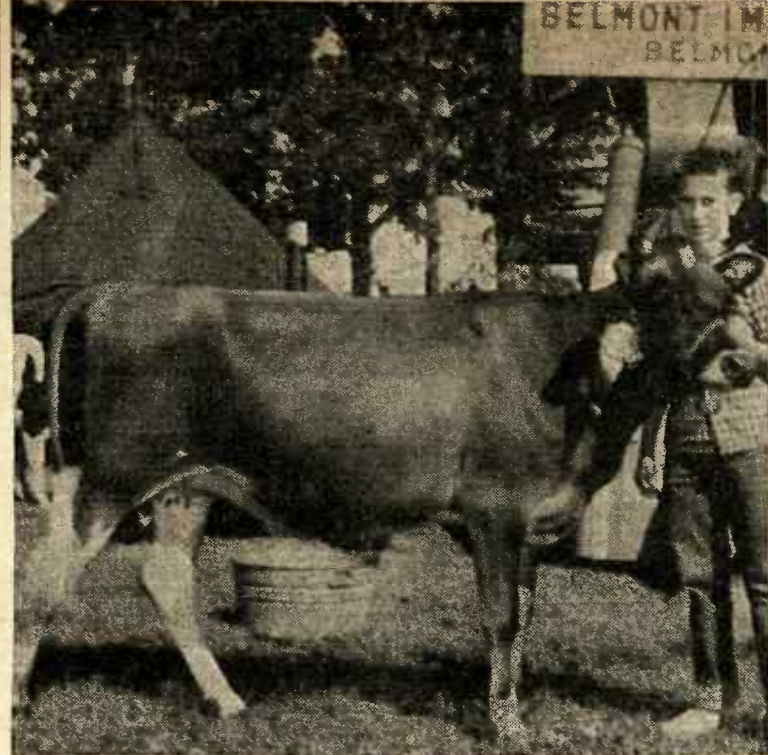
