Iuka P. O.'s Biggest Day

Thousands Of Circulars And Letters Swell Tuesday's Take

Possibly the biggest mailing in the history of the Iuka Post office occurred Tuesday of this week when approximately 20,000 pieces were accepted for mailing. The mailings were made by The Vidette for Vail & Baddour Bargain Cen-ter and for the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors. The approxi-mately 18,000 circulars mailed for Vail & Baddour will go to six coun-ties in Mississippi and one in Tennessee and are to advertise Vail & Baddour stores in Iuka, Booneville and Ripley.

The mailing made for the Board of Supervisors was a letter to citi-zens of Districts One, Two, and Three, urging voters to cast bal-lots for the Iuka Shoe Plant Expan-sion Bonds.

Total amount of money taken in by the Iuka Post Office Tuesday was upwards of \$600.00 which in-cluded the day's sales of stamps and other miscellaneous charges. "This is the most money we have taken in in any one day on items that were intended for immediate delivery," Postmaster Harold T. Lomenick said. "We have made larger sales in Post Cards and in filling postage meter machines, but those were not used for one mail-ing. Tuesday's postal receipts for items for immediate delivery is the largest single day in the history of the office," Mr. Lomenick said.

Plans Progressing On Tishomingo State Park Lake

M. P. Haynes of Belmont who has been doing a great amount of the leg work, announces that plans on the Tishomingo State Park lake are progressing nicely.

"The State Forestry Commission will be on the lake site either this week or next to cruise the tim-ber and make an estimate as to the amount that can be sold," Mr. Haynes said. After the cruise is made, advertisement for bids to purchase the timber will be made that will require about three weeks. After sale of the timber clearing of the lake site is expected to get under way. The timber will be sold on sealed bids.

Size of the lake will be much larger than first reported, Mr. Haynes says. It will be over 69 acres and very close to 70, he said. First report was that the lake would be about 26 acres. However, with further investigation and planning a higher dam, the lake size has been increased to about 70 acres.

Construction of the lake on Tishomingo State park grounds will make that recreation area more complete and will add to the attractiveness of the park. Mr. Haynes states that the new lake should be ready for use sometime next season.

IN DISTRICTS 1, 2, AND 3 FOR BOND ISSUE TO EXPAND SHOE MANUFACTURING PLANT

Iuka C. of C Membership Meeting

Tuesday Night; Plans Made To Assist In Bond Issue Election

Main topic of discussion at the semi-annual meeting of the Iuka Chamber of Commerce held Tues-day night was the pending Indus-trial Bond Election to expand the Shoe Plant at Iuka.

The meeting, held at McCune's restaurant, was presided over by Herman Gann, president of the organization. Mr. Gann gave a short synopsis of the current year's activity of the Chamber and opened the meeting for discussion of the Bond Issue election. Ways were discussed in which assistance could be given in getting as many voters as possible to the polls in Friday's election to vote in \$350,000 in bonds to expand the shoe plant. The plan, as announced by Mr. Gann, is for certain ones to be appointed to observe the various precincts and deter-mine whether or not voters are coming to the polls. If they are not then an effort will be made to get everyone possible to his particular precinct so he can cast a ballot. A car pool will be organized to aid voters in getting to the polls.

Strongly endorsing the shoe plant expansion, the Chamber voted to pay cost of advertising the election both in The Vidette and on WVOM Radio.

Among other business conduct-ed at the meeting was the appoint-ment of certain committees.

Guest speakers were Judge Weatherford of Russellville and Mayor David Morrow of Red Bay. These two guests had as a topic for discussion the Bear Creek Watershed Association. Explana-tion of this association was made by the speakers, each pointing out the benefits that will be derived from development of the Bear Creek Watershed. The speakers were introduced by County Agent Percie Strickland.

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\$350,000 To Enlarge Bldg. Is Asked; Will Not Increase Taxes; Voters Will Cast Ballots At Regular Precincts

Friday, October 27, will be an important day in Supervisor's districts 1, 2, and 3, when voters will go to the polls to cast ballots on whether or not the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County will issue bonds in an amount not to exceed \$350,000 to be used in the expansion of the shoe manufacturing plant at Iuka. Tishomingo Shoe company, a division of Genesco (formerly Gen. Shoe Corp.), has been leasing the present building for the past six years and has signed a contract with the Board of Supervisors to lease the enlarged plant. The lease, being for 25 years, guarantees that the company will pay enough rent money to pay off the bonds as they come due and to pay all interest on the bonds. The company also guarantees to pay this obligation as long as it exists whether or not the shoe plant is in operation. In other words, if something should happen that the company would have to quit manufacturing shoes in the plant, the bonds and in-terest would still be paid by the company and there will be no tax levy at any time on property in the three districts to pay off the bonds.

Expansion of the Shoe Plant will insure the em-ployment of at least 200 more workers. Company of-ficials state that an annual payroll in the neigh-borhood of \$1,000,000 has been paid at the present plant and with the expansion, this payroll should in-crease by approximately two-thirds. Interest and enthusiasm for the expansion is running high and both county and shoe company officials hope for a big turn out at the polls.

According to law, 51% of the qualified electors in the three districts must vote in the election and of the 51% casting a ballot, at least two-thirds must vote for the bond issue in order for it to pass. There are 2,704 qualified voters in districts 1, 2, and 3, and 51% of the 2,704 means that 1,380 voters must vote in the election. Of this 1,380, 920 must favor the bond issue in order for it to become law. "It is most important," a spokesman for the county said, "for everyone to go to the polls on Friday and cast a ballot. This election means much to local residents and it would be a shame to lose it simply because enough did not go and vote," he said.

Polls at all precincts will open at 7 o'clock in the morning and shall remain open until 6 o'clock in the evening. There will be two ballot boxes at the three precincts in Iuka. Qualified voters living within the city limits will deposit their ballots in one box, while voters living in the first district outside the city limits will deposit their ballots in a separate box.

Home Agent Notes

Stain Removal is a problem homemakers face these days. It is complicated by many of the new fabrics and finishes. Some fabrics almost refuse to give up stains, and a few of the manmade fibers are particularly fond of grease and oil, such as make-up and body oils.

Don't blame your washer when these stains don't come out. You need to learn new methods of laundering for today's fibers and finishes. The way grandmother did it isn't good enough for the modern garments.

You can come nearer removing greasy stains if you follow a few suggestions:
Follow instructions carefully.
Remove the stain as soon as you find it, the quicker, the better.
Once a greasy stain takes up squatter's rights it is even more difficult to remove.

Use absorbent powders (cornstarch, talcum powder, cornmeal) on fresh grease spatters. Spread powder over stain and as it absorbs the grease, remove with a

brush. Work fresh powder into the stain. Repeat as necessary.
Rub old or stubborn stains on washable articles with detergent. A liquid detergent is easy to use, or you may make a paste of your favorite detergent to use.

Rinse in hot water. It even may be necessary to put the garment through a wash cycle in your machine. Hot water, regular agitation and plenty of detergent will help remove the grease, but you will have a garment with more wrinkles in it.

Use a grease solvent only as a last resort. The fumes are poisonous.
Observe all precautions about these solvents, as none are available that are without hazard to the user. Follow directions to the letter.

Be patient. It often takes extra time and patience to remove greasy stains.
How shall I launder my wash-wear garments for fewest wrinkles and the least amount of ironing? Every homemaker is interested in the answer to this question.

To find an answer, U. S. Department of Agriculture home economists tested several easy-care fabrics, including Arnel, cotton, dacron, nylon, orlon and blends of these fibers.

In general, they found the surest way to avoid ironing is still to drip dry these wash-wear fabrics after washing a small load at a time in lukewarm or even cool water. This method works well whether you wash by machine or by hand.

For best results, avoid squeezing or wringing the fabrics or letting them spin in the washer. You may prefer to take the garments out of the machine after washing and rinse them by hand. You may also take them out of the machine before the spin cycle and put them back for the rinses, but remove

them before the final spin. If your machine will drain without spinning, you could leave the drip dry clothes in and skip the spin cycle.

Perhaps you have no place to hang clothes for drip drying. In this case, the best way to get the fewest wrinkles is to dry the fabrics in an automatic tumbler dryer at a medium-heat setting. After the clothes are dry, it helps to let them tumble for about 10 minutes without heat. Take the garments from the dryer and hang them on hangers as soon as the tumbling is finished, because new wrinkles may be set if you leave clothes in the dryer or in a basket.

If you prefer to hang up machine-washed clothes to dry, you will have to use part of the spin cycle to avoid dripping. To reduce wrinkling in wash-wear fabrics, the home economists suggest using regular agitation on 2-speed machines and a cool rinse, whether the clothes are washed in warm or cool water. Take the clothes from the washer after only a third of the spin cycle.

These tests were with clean swatches of fabric. The home economists are making further studies of laundering soiled wash-wear fabrics. They are using wash-wear blouses laundered after normal wear.

Dr. H. W. Essig of the Animal Husbandry Department has recently reported results of exten-

sive tests at Mississippi State University, at two branch Experiment Stations and on one plantation in the state. From these tests he concluded that while stillbirth increased gains, the cobalt pellets "exhibited no beneficial effect on the weight of the lambs."

By slaughtering some of the lambs at various stages of the test ranging from 3 to 268 days, he measured the weight loss of the pellets in the digestive tract. The theory of the pellet is that after it is administered orally, it remains in the digestive system to provide a constantly available source of cobalt to aid in production of vitamin B12 which in turn is necessary for optimum growth.

He found that the pellets remained in the rumen-reticulum area for at least 103 days, and at 268 days pellets were still being recovered from some of the slaughtered lambs. The pellets appeared to lose weight at the rate of .2 to .3 mgs. per day.

The report, published in the October issue of Mississippi Farm Research, is available on request from the Experiment Station at State College. It covers work done by R. A. Edgar, Bryan Baker, Jr., and S. J. Long at the Central Station; Superintendent John McGuire of het Natchez Station; Superin-

tendent E. G. Morrison of Brown Loom Station; Ely, Jr., of the Peacock Station.

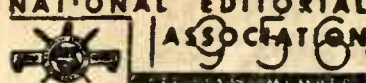

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The Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two, and Three of said County, took up for further consideration the matter of entering upon further industrial development for said Districts, and, after a discussion of the subject, Supervisor H. M. Biggs offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, ACTING FOR AND ON BEHALF OF SUPERVISORS' DISTRICTS NOS. ONE, TWO AND THREE OF SAID COUNTY, TO ENTER UPON FURTHER INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT, TO ISSUE BONDS OF SAID SUPERVISORS' DISTRICTS NOS. ONE, TWO AND THREE IN THE AMOUNT OF THREE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$350,000) FOR SAID PURPOSE, AND DIRECTING THE CALLING AND HOLDING OF AN ELECTION TO DETERMINE WHETHER OR NOT SAID DISTRICTS SHALL ENTER UPON SUCH INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AND ISSUE BONDS IN THE AMOUNT AND FOR THE PURPOSE AFORESAID.

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' District Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, finds and adjudicates that, under the Laws of the State of Mississippi, and particularly under the provisions of Chapter 241, Laws of Mississippi of 1944, as amended, the said Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, subject to the grant of permission and authority by and from the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, and subject further to the approval of the proposition by the qualified electors of said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three at an election held for that purpose, has the lawful power to issue the bonds of said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three for the purpose of expanding and enlarging the present shoe factory building owned by said Districts; provided that the amount of such bonds issued by said Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three shall not exceed twenty per centum (20%) of the assessed value of all taxable property within said Districts; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, has heretofore made application to the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity, as provided in the aforesaid Chapter 241, Laws of Mississippi of 1944, as amended, and other applicable statutes in such cases made and provided; and

WHEREAS, on the 7th day of September, 1961, the said Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, acting by and through its Executive Committee thereunto duly authorized, did order and direct the approval of the aforesaid application of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, and did direct the issuance to the said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of said Districts, of Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity No. 364, which said Certificate is in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE MISSISSIPPI AGRICULTURAL AND INDUSTRIAL BOARD

September 7, 1961

Pursuant to call by the Chairman, Governor Ross R. Barnett, the Executive Committee of the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, met in the office of Mr. Joe Bullock, 1504 State Office Building, City of Jackson, Hinds County, State of Mississippi, at 10 o'clock a. m., Thursday, September 7, 1961, for the purpose of considering such matters as might properly come before the Committee in accordance with the powers conferred upon the Executive Committee by a resolution adopted by the Board of Directors on February 20, 1945, and amended by a resolution adopted by the Board of Directors on February 4, 1960. There were present the following:

Mr. E. E. Laird
Rep. C. B. Newman
Mr. Blaine Eaton

all being members of the Committee.

There were absent the following:

Governor Ross R. Barnett
Mr. Robert C. Cannada

Governor Ross R. Barnett, Chairman, being absent, Mr. E. E. Laird was chosen acting chairman and assumed the duties of the presiding officer.

Upon being called to order by the Chairman, the minutes of the previous meeting of the Executive

Committee were approved as read.

The Committee first took up for consideration the matter of an instrument dated the 24th day of August, 1961, entitled "Cancellation of Contract and Mutual Release," by and between the Board of Supervisors of Chickasaw County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's District No. One, Chickasaw County, Mississippi, and Reliance Manufacturing Company. Said instrument is executed by Mr. Robert B. Atkinson, a member of the Board of Supervisors of Chickasaw County, Mississippi, Mr. Mississip, to the Mr. Ervin A. Popa, President and Assistant Secretary of the Reliance Manufacturing Company, a copy of which "Cancellation of Contract and Mutual Release" is incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof as fully as though copied in length herein. The above described instrument cancels the Assignment dated the 27th day of November, 1956, wherein Rice-Stix of Mississippi assigned all of its rights and interests under the Contract dated the 31st day of May, 1946, by and between the Board of Supervisors of Chickasaw County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's District No. One of said County and Rice-Stix of Mississippi, to the Reliance Manufacturing Company.

Upon motion by Mr. Eaton, seconded by Rep. Newman, the "Cancellation of Contract and Mutual Release" as described above, pursuant to Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity No. 10 was approved and ratified by the Executive Committee of the Board.

The Committee next took up the matter of the application of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity for industrial development. After hearing oral testimony and considering the documentary evidence submitted by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and after a full discussion and due consideration thereof, the following order was presented:

ORDER OF THE MISSISSIPPI AGRICULTURAL AND INDUSTRIAL BOARD DIRECTING ISSUANCE TO SUPERVISOR'S DISTRICTS NOS. ONE, TWO AND THREE, TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI OF CERTIFICATE OF PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY, INVOLVING FULL FAITH AND CREDIT BONDS.

WHEREAS, on the 5th day of September, 1961, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, filed with this Board its resolution dated the 5th day of September, 1961, recorded at Book 18, page 293 of the minutes of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, praying the issuance of a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity authorizing the expansion of the now existing shoe manufacturing type of industry and, in order to finance the same, the issuance by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, of full faith and credit bonds of said Districts in a principal amount not to exceed three hundred and fifty thousand (\$350,000.00) dollars, as authorized by Chapter 2 of Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended; and

WHEREAS, this Board has heard and taken oral and documentary evidence and has made due and full investigation of all matters in connection with said resolution and request, said Board does now find and determine:

(1) That there are sufficient natural resources readily and economically available for the operation of the aforesaid enterprise for at least twenty-five (25) years, but in no event less than the period of time for which any bonds will be issued, for acquiring or constructing said enterprise;

(2) That there is available within the area in a radius of twenty-five (25) miles from the site of the proposed industrial enterprise in Tishomingo County, Mississippi, between the ages of eighteen and fifty for each additional operative job in said enterprise;

(3) That there are adequate property values in said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and that the financial condition of said Supervisor's Districts is suitable so that the total bonded indebtedness of these Supervisor's Districts, solely for the purposes authorized by Chapter 2 of Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended, including the full faith and credit bonds proposed to be issued as aforesaid shall not exceed twenty (20) per cent of the total assessed valuation of all property in said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, as shown by a current financial statement of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, duly certified by the

Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of said County and attached to said resolution as Exhibit "1."

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED that the Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity prayed for by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, be and the same is hereby granted and issued in substantially the following form, to-wit:

CERTIFICATE OF PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY NO. 364

The Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, having made due investigation and determination concerning the expansion of the now existing shoe manufacturing type of industry for Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, does hereby issue to the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of said Supervisor's Districts, this

CERTIFICATE OF PUBLIC CONVENIENCE AND NECESSITY

Authorizing the said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, to acquire, to own, to let, to lease, or to rent, all subject to the limitations hereinafter set out, the industrial enterprise described above.

The Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, acting pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 241, Laws of Mississippi of 1944, as amended, does hereby fix and determine that the rights, powers, and duties conferred by this Certificate shall be exercised in the manner hereinafter set out and subject to the provisions, restrictions, and limitations hereinafter set out.

HEREBY, said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, is authorized and empowered:

(1) To enter upon an expansion of the now existing industrial enterprise for the manufacturing of shoes and in order to do so to call and hold the election provided in Chapter 2, Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended, and upon a favorable vote thereof to issue its full faith and credit industrial bonds pursuant to the provisions of said Chapter 2, Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended, in a principal amount of not to exceed three hundred and fifty thousand (\$350,000.00) dollars.

(2) To acquire for said enterprise for the purpose of expanding and enlarging said factory building and for constructing or otherwise acquiring additions and improvements thereto containing sufficient square feet of floor space to meet the needs of such enlarged enterprise and to expend thereon not to exceed three hundred and fifty thousand (\$350,000.00) dollars, including the land on which said addition is to be located and all necessary plumbing, heating, air-conditioning and necessary fixtures required for said industrial enterprise, but no part of said amount shall be expended for machinery or equipment to be installed for use in the operation of the industry located or to be located in such building.

(3) To own said property; and to let, lease, or rent said property to a person, firm or corporation for the operation of a factory for the manufacturing of shoes in strict compliance with the provisions of Chapter 2, Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended.

(4) To expend in order to acquire said property and said enterprise, such sums out of the proceeds of said bonds as may be required in order to perform the obligations assumed by said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, under the terms of a valid contract entered into by said Supervisor's Districts with any person, firm or corporation providing for the acquisition of such expansion of the now existing industrial enterprise and approved by this Board;

(5) To operate said industrial enterprise by leasing same under the terms of the contract referred to in Paragraph (4) above and such lease as may be executed pursuant to such terms.

(a) That no part of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds authorized by this Certificate shall be used for the purchase of machinery or equipment to be installed in said building for use in the operation of the industry to be located therein. The proceeds from the sale of said bonds shall be used fully for the purchase of and necessary improvements thereto, construction and purchasing expansions or additions to the factory building, together with all usual and necessary fixtures and services as set out in Paragraph (2) above.

(b) That no bonds shall be issued by said Board of Supervisors pursuant hereto until said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of said Supervisor's Districts shall have entered into a valid contract with a person, firm or corporation providing for the acquisition of such property as an expansion or addition to such industrial enterprise by said Supervisor's Districts and the lease thereof to, and operation thereof by, said person, firm or corporation providing for payment as rent by such person, firm or corporation, as lessee, of the entire principal of and interest upon such bonds;

(c) The bonds herein authorized to be issued shall mature over a period of time not to exceed twenty-five (25) years with not less than one-fiftieth (1/50) maturing in each year during the first five (5) years of the life of said bonds, not less than one-twenty-fifth (1/25) in each year during

the next succeeding ten (10) years of the life of said bonds and the remainder in approximately equal payments each year during the remaining life of said bonds; (d) That for the payment of said bonds as and when issued and interest thereon, and for the creation of a sinking fund for the payment of said bonds and interest, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi shall annually levy and collect taxes upon all non-exempt taxable property within said Supervisor's Districts in the amount of not less than the amount of principal and interest due during each year, and shall fix an annual tax levy over said period of years for which said bonds are issued so that said tax levy shall be substantially uniform throughout said period; and to further secure the payment of said bonds the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, in its discretion pledge any and all income derived from said property;

(e) That said Supervisor's Districts may lease, let or rent said industrial enterprise but shall never operate same unless specifically authorized by this Board so to do.

(f) That said Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, shall in every respect in the exercise of the authority and powers hereby granted conform to and comply with the provisions of Chapter 2, Title 33 of the Mississippi Code of 1942, as amended.

(g) That this Certificate shall expire on the 6th day of September, 1962, unless said Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, shall prior thereto, proceed to exercise the authority and powers herein granted.

WITNESS THE SIGNATURE AND SEAL OF THE MISSISSIPPI AGRICULTURAL AND INDUSTRIAL BOARD hereto affixed by its duly authorized officers, this, the 7th day of September, 1961.

Mr. Governor Barnett and Mr. Cannada were absent and not voting. The motion having received the affirmative vote of all members present, the Chairman announced that the motion carried and the order was adopted, this, the 7th day of September, 1961.

The next order of business was consideration of a contract dated the 29th day of August, 1961, by and between the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and The Tishomingo Shoe Company, executed by Mr. O. L. Wade and Mr. Robert D. Sims, President and Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and Mr. H. N. Carmichael and Mr. W. W. Sledge, President and Secretary of The Tishomingo Shoe Company, a copy of which contract is attached hereto and becomes a part of these minutes as though copied herein in full. The contract provides for the issuance of bonds by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, in the amount of three hundred and fifty thousand (\$350,000.00) dollars to be repaid by the Company, both principal and interest, within twenty-five (25) years.

Upon motion by Mr. Eaton, seconded by Rep. Newman, the contract as described above and entered into pursuant to Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity No. 364 was approved by the Executive Committee of the Board.

There being no further business to come before the Executive Committee of the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, lawfully assembled in a called meeting this the 7th day of September, 1961, on motion duly made, seconded, and unanimously carried, the meeting was adjourned.

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, does now affirmatively find and adjudicate that all of the findings of fact as set forth in the aforesaid Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity are true and correct, and that it will be in the best interest of said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three to provide for the expanding and enlarging of the present shoe factory building owned by said District and described in the aforesaid Certificate, and to issue the bonds of said Supervisor's Districts in the amount of Three Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$350,000) for that purpose; and

WHEREAS, Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three

have heretofore issued bonds under the provisions of the aforesaid Chapter 241, Laws of Mississippi of 1944, as amended, of which Three Hundred Fifty Thousand and no/100 (\$315,000.00) now remain outstanding and unpaid; and

WHEREAS, the assessed valuation of all taxable property within said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three, as ascertained by the last completed assessment, is Three Million Four Hundred Seventy One Thousand Three Hundred Seventy Eight (\$3,471,378) and the amount of bonds herein after proposed to be issued by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, when added to the aforesaid outstanding bonds, will not exceed twenty per centum (20%) of said assessed valuation; and

WHEREAS, Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, include the Town of Iuka, which has a population of more than five hundred (500), as well as territory outside the corporate limits of the Town of Iuka, and the proposed enterprise is located within one (1) mile of the corporate limits of said Town of Iuka;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, ACTING FOR AND ON BEHALF OF SUPERVISORS' DISTRICTS NOS. ONE, TWO AND THREE OF SAID COUNTY, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That all of the findings of facts made and set forth in the preamble to this resolution shall be and the same are hereby declared to be true and correct.

SECTION 2. That it is hereby declared to be the intention of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, acting for and on behalf of Supervisors' Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of said County, to issue the bonds of said Supervisors' District Nos. One, Two and Three in the principal amount of Three Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$350,000) for the purpose of providing funds for expanding and enlarging the present shoe factory building owned by said Districts, as described and set forth in Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity No. 364, issued by the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board on the 7th day of September, 1961.

SECTION 3. That a special election shall be and the same is hereby called and ordered to be held within said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, on Friday, the 27th day of October, 1961, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said District the proposition set forth in the form of notice of election as contained in Section 5 of this resolution.

The qualified electors voting at the aforesaid election and residing outside the corporate limits of the Town of Iuka shall vote separately from those residing within the Town of Iuka and the officers holding the election shall make separate returns of the results of the vote of those residing within the Town of Iuka and those residing outside the Town of Iuka.

SECTION 4. That the said special election shall be held at the polling places designated and set forth in the form of notice of election as contained in Section 5 of this resolution. The polling places for said election shall be opened at seven o'clock in the morning and shall be kept open until the hour of six o'clock in the evening on the aforesaid date, and all qualified electors of said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three will be entitled to vote in said election. All qualified electors voting in said election shall vote at their usual voting precincts. The proposition submitted at said election shall be deemed to have been assented to, provided that the total number of votes cast on said proposition within the Town of Iuka shall be at least a majority of the total number of qualified electors residing within said Town and provided, further, that at least two-thirds of those voting on said proposition shall vote in favor thereof, and provided that the total number of votes cast on said proposition by those residing within said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three and outside the Town of Iuka shall be at least a majority of the total number of qualified electors residing in said Supervisor's Districts Nos. One, Two and Three and outside the Town of Iuka, and provided, further, that at least two-thirds of those voting on said proposition shall vote in favor thereof.

SECTION 5. That the Clerk of this Board shall cause notice of said election to be published once a week for at least three (3) consecutive weeks in The Vidette, a newspaper published in the Town of Iuka and qualified under Chapter 427, Laws of Mississippi of 1948. The first publication of said notice shall be made not less than twenty-one (21) days prior to the date fixed for said election and the last publication shall be made not more than seven (7) days prior to said date. Where To Plant

Pine Trees

Now is the time to decide how many pine seedlings you will plant this season and to place your order for them.

There are some questions you should have answered in your own mind before you place your order for pine seedlings. These questions are:

1. Where am I going to set pines this season? 2. How many acres are there in this area or areas? and 3. How many pine seedlings will I need to properly set this many acres?

It is not as simple as it seems to answer, where am I going to set pines this season?

Any land that is idle and will not be used for crops or pasture in the future should be put in trees.

In many instances, all that is needed to get a stand of pines on idle acres is to protect it from fire, pine tree volunteer.

There is always the question of getting labor to set the pine seedlings once they are obtained.

Pine seedlings set under scrub hardwood should be released by removing or deadening the overtopping hardwood within one or

two years. Can this be done? The solution to these and other problems should be in your mind before you order your pine seedlings.

Pines can return you a profit per acre while conserving and water needed for future generations. Place your order for pine seedlings now.

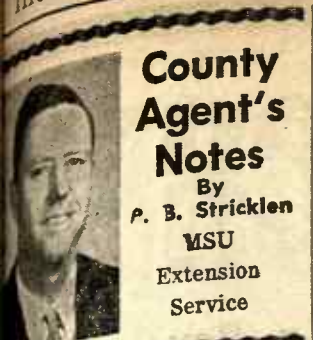

County Agent's Notes

Harvest Jobs This will help break down on insect problems next year. It will also cause the stalks to rot faster, adding organic matter to the soil and getting rid of the stalks that interfere with cultivation next spring.

Break and row up heavy clay This fall so that only minimum tillage will be necessary before planting next spring.

Test all fields and pastures Soil test all fields and pastures for next year. Do this now. The soils testing laboratory can give you the results faster than it can during the year than it can during the year.

Time applied now while lime can get over the fields. Apply lime now will also give it time to become mixed with the soil before you are going to break land. If you are going to break land fall, apply the lime first and

then break the land.

Lime does these things: It furnishes calcium and magnesium for plant growth. It sweetens sour soils. This makes other fertilizer more efficient. One pound of phosphate on well-limed land is worth two pounds of phosphate on acid soils.

Lime increases the bacterial action in the soil. This helps keep soil mellow and improves the physical condition. Lime reduces the poisoning of crops by minor elements like manganese iron and aluminum. Lime makes available other minor elements like boron which the crops need.

Most important lime returns an average of \$6 for each \$1 invested for lime deficient soils.

Sod Seeding October is an ideal month to sod seed in old sods or run-down pastures or on cultivated areas.

Sod seeded oats, wheat, or ryegrass will give earlier spring grazing than permanent pastures or clover areas.

When sod seeding, do not cut down on the rate of fertilizer. Use the same rate as when planting broadcast.

Common Bermuda, Coastal Bermuda, Bahia or carpet sods are good places to use sod seeder. Then sods that need building up are also good places.

Where farmers want lespedeza back next year, use only oats or wheat. Do not use ryegrass. Ryegrass can be seeded in clover areas

to get early grazing and a mixture of grass and clover.

Social Security Your social security card is available. The social security credits mean money to you in the form of monthly old-age, survivors or disability benefits. Follow these simple steps to get the social credits you need:

Get a social security number if you don't already have one. You can get it from your nearest social security office. Write your number on your self-employment tax return when reporting income from social security purposes. Report your net earnings if they are \$400 or more a year.

Even if you don't have to pay any income tax, you can still get social security credits.

Dizzy Dean Enterprises is a subsidiary of Mississippi Industries, Inc. Veterans' Corner

Q—I am about to retire after 20 years of Army service. I received a Purple Heart for combat wounds during World War II. I have heard that veterans get a five-point credit on federal job examinations and that service-connected disabled veterans or those who were awarded the Purple Heart get 10 points additionally. Is that right?

A—No. Veterans get a credit of five points. Combat disabled veterans or those who have received the Purple Heart get a maximum credit of 10 points.

Q—My husband was killed in combat during the Korean Conflict. Am I eligible for a GI loan? If so, has my eligibility been extended by the law which recently extended the GI loan program?

A—Yes, you are eligible for a GI loan. In your case the maximum extension is granted—that is to January 31, 1975.

Q—With regard to VA benefits, what period following the Korean Conflict is considered to be "peacetime" service?

A—Active service beginning February 1, 1955.

Q—I am receiving compensation for a 40 per cent disability incurred in combat. Others I know receive extra compensation allowances for their children under 18. Should I apply for these allowances for my children?

A—No. Additional allowances for dependents are granted only to veterans with disabilities rated at 50 per cent or higher.

Engineer Examinations Being Accepted

The Bureau of Reclamation is accepting applications for a new engineer examination, the U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced. Positions paying yearly salaries of \$5,335 and \$6,435 a year are open in all branches of engineering. In hydraulic, electrical, and safety engineering, jobs are open which pay \$7,560 a year. The positions to be filled are located in 17 Western States and the State of Alaska.

To qualify for these positions, applicants must have completed appropriate college study or have had equivalent technical engineering experience. Additional professional experience or graduate college study is required for the higher paying positions. Applicants who have not completed an acceptable engineering curriculum may be required to take a written test.

Applications will be accepted until further notice and must be filed with the Central Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, Bureau of Reclamation, Denver Federal Center, Denver 25, Colorado.

Further information may be obtained from many post offices throughout the country or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C.

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THE VIDETTE
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Do I Belong?
Lesson for October 29, 1961

THIS column this week is intended for church members, dotted-line members by baptism and personal profession of faith. It makes no difference what kind of church, what name it has, or organization or special variety of Christian doctrine. People may ask you the question, Are you a Christian? and get a little double-talk — well, maybe I am, maybe not. But if they ask you, Are you a member of a church? that calls for a black-and-white answer. It isn't a question at this moment. How good a member are you? but, Are you a member at all? If your name is on any congregation's list even if there's a note after it that reads "Gone, left no address," even if there's "after your name that means 'inactive'—we haven't seen him around in a blue moon—even so, you're some kind of member and maybe the one that most needs some friendly advice.

Ink-members

Anybody is counted a "full" or "regular" member in most Christian churches, who has deliberately and publicly confessed his faith in the Savior and promised allegiance to him and his church. But these members are not always full, not always regular. We can see three levels of "members" in the church; any church at all has these three levels. The point to be made is first that sometimes, at the lowest level, "belonging" does not mean much, but that (in the second place) we are expected to grow as church members all the while as we grow in our personal lives as Christians. The lowest level of belonging is merely to have your name on some church-roll, or cardindex—in their file somewhere. It's hard to see why anybody should call this "belonging" at all. If such a "member" disappeared from the church—that things are important, though not the most important, still less the only kind of real things. But the Christian goes on to say that part of our "love"—that is, concern for our neighbor, which includes his material welfare. That is to say, a Christian will be concerned about wages, housing, education, culture, in his community. He is not content to want a square deal himself, he wants it for all others. Jesus' parable of the sheep and the goats brings out this Christian concern in unforgettable fashion.

If we could get a world at last in which every one would have a job he enjoyed, everybody would receive a decent wage, nobody would go cold or hungry, everybody would have comfortable, safe and beautiful homes in which to live; a world in which there would be no more war but only peace and prosperity,—would that lovely world be one in which there would be no need for Christian concern? You know it wouldn't. To be sure, there would be no beggars, prisoners, sick or helpless people in that world. But alas! there would still be evil in the "brave new world." Paul covers a good deal of territory in his word of counsel: "If any man be overtaken in a fault, you who are 'spiritual' restore such a man..." If every one in the world were as rich or as "lucky" as some people are now, it would just open more people's eyes to a fact that should be well known as it is: the rich and the lucky have their troubles too.

How We Grow in Concern

Our Christian concern for the welfare of others must grow, if it is to be Christ-like, until we are distressed by spiritual need not less than by physical need. A man with a starving soul is an even more tragic sight than a man with a wasted body. But only quite mature Christians can see this. How does Christian concern grow in us? It grows in somewhat the same way as concern grows for pets, or livestock. If a farmer wants to encourage his boy to be a farmer too, he doesn't give him lectures on animal husbandry, he gives him a calf or a pig to look after and perhaps exhibit at the fair. You learn to take an interest in animals by taking responsibility for them. You learn to take interest in people, just by being a Christian friend.
