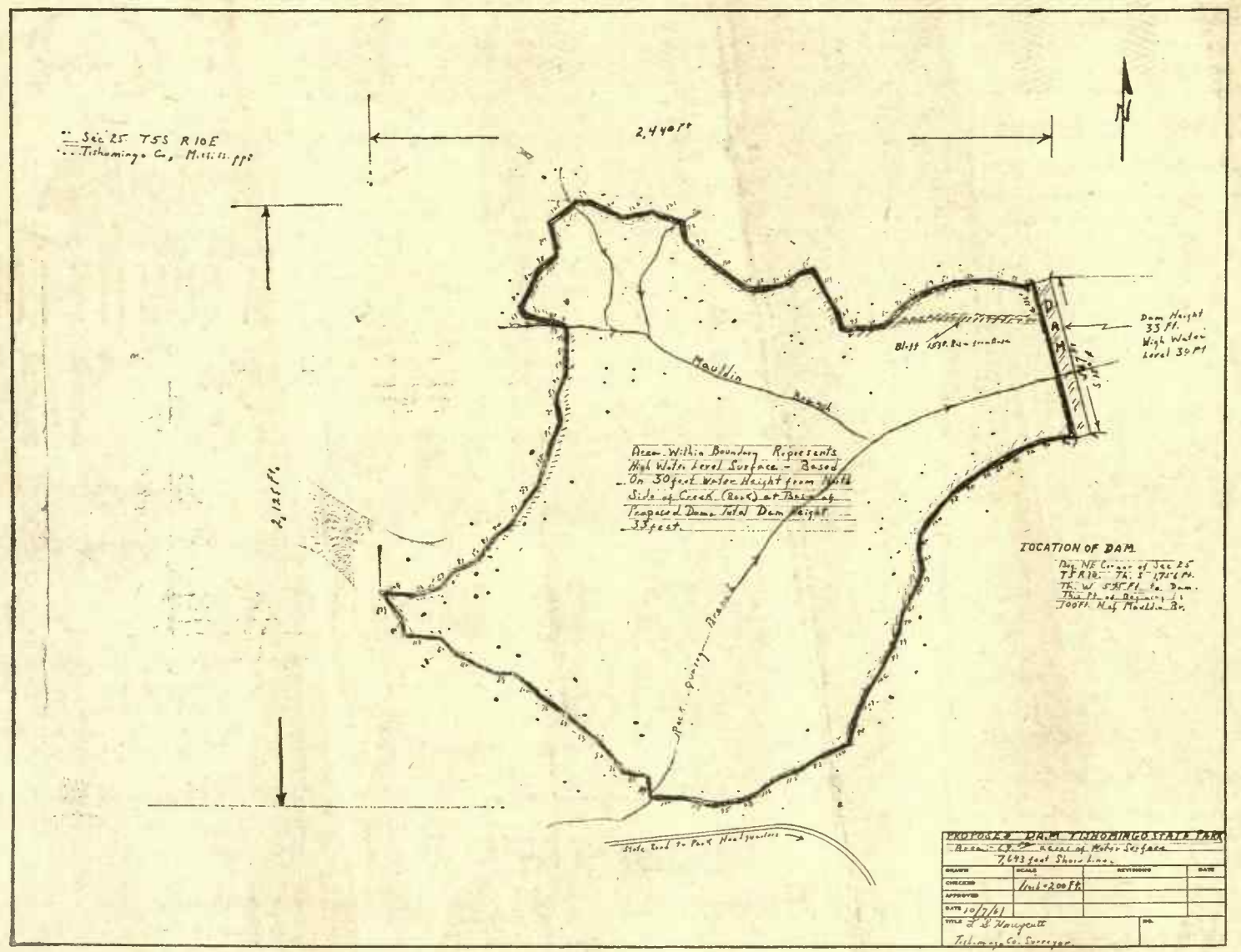
Iuka Post 15 Will Act As Host To Veterans and Friends

WORK BEGUN THIS WEEK ON TISHOMINGO STATE PARK LAKE

Seventy-Acre Recreational Facility Will Add To Attractiveness Of Park

Initial steps toward construction of the lake on Tishomingo State park property got underway this week with the marking of timber to be cut for clearing and sale.

Employees of the State Forestry Commission under the supervision of Area Forester Larry Brewer are doing the marking and clearing service. Fay Burns of Tishomingo, long-time resident of the area, is serving as guide and is assisting in finding the boundary lines and water lines for the lake site.

County Supervisors state that a road will be constructed and graveled to the dam site. The lake, being approximately 600 acres in a particular watershed that flows toward Bear Creek.

Leaders of the area who have been most active in obtaining the lake state that they are very grateful to State Park Director James A. Sides of Jackson and A. V. Lindsey, office manager for the Park Commission. "These two leaders of the state agency have been most helpful and very, very cooperative," a spokesman said, "and without their very able assistance we could not build the lake."

The new recreational facility is being built by the State park commission. Timber from the area will be cut and sold to help pay the cost of construction. The Mississippi Game and Fish Commission will cooperate in an effort to stock the lake with fish.

The lake should be ready for use sometime next summer.

COUNTY DELEGATION ATTENDS TENN.-TOMBIGBEE WATERWAYS COMMISSION MEETING IN JACKSON

Tishomingo countians attended a joint meeting of the Mississippi Rivers and Harbors Association and The Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterways Flood Control Commission in Jackson, Mississippi. The meeting was attended by hundreds of Mississippians who heard the address by Lt. Gen. W. K. Wilcox, Jr., Chief of Engineers, U. S. Army. Attending from this county were Supervisors Russell Bonds, Wade, Lunceford Stormont, Steve South, Paul Edmondson, Counce, Carlton Woodley, Sims and Click Clark from Iuka and Omer J. Bullen of Goldsboro.

Interest in the development and construction of the Tennessee-Tombigbee inland waterway was evident at the meeting. Mr. Wilcox, in his speech said, "You know I was the District Engineer in Mobile when the Tennessee-Tombigbee project (Tombigbee River) was authorized. At the time we were concerned that the requirements for the project were some heavy and afraid that this project might not get underway. It was a great deal of person-to-person contact and satisfaction to the local interests here in the desire to proceed."

"We have an appropriation to start advance engineering on this \$27 million Flood Control project this year. Planning will begin with streams in Itawamba county, since this county has already furnished the required money for cooperation. We are working closely," General Wilson said, with the Soil Conservation service in the area.

Tishomingo Will Vote On 1% Sales Tax

Town Now Collects 1/2%; Election Set For Tuesday, December 12

An election is being called to determine whether or not the Town of Tishomingo will collect a full 1% sales tax. The election is being called by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen in a resolution appearing in this week's issue of The Vidette.

The Town of Tishomingo at the present time collects one-half of one percent sales tax and motion to increase the tax to a full percent was passed in Tuesday night's regular meeting. The tax will be collected on all gross sales done within the corporate limits of Tishomingo excepting farm implements sold to farmers, automobiles, trucks and truck-trailers, which will be taxed at one-half of one percent. Sales of electricity, current, power, steam, coal, natural gas, liquefied petroleum gas or other fuel will be taxed at the rate of 1/4 of one percent when sold for industrial use.

Qualified voters of Tishomingo will have the opportunity to vote for or against the proposed tax levy in an election to be held December 12. Voting will be done at the City Hall between the hours of 8 a. m. and 6 p. m.

Officials of Tishomingo state that the reason for the tax is to carry on the town's business. "Many services are needed," a spokesman said, "but we have no money to pay for them. With additional money, we will be able to improve our streets and make other improvements," he said.

more than maintain our present tuberculosis control activities," stated Mrs. Weekley. "We must expand our efforts to find all the unknown cases of tuberculosis in this country. We must help the ex-tuberculosis patient get back on their feet. We must expand our educational program. We must put more money into medical research."

"We want the people of this county to know what they are paying for when they contribute to the Christmas Seal Campaign. The Christmas Seal letter is the tuberculosis association's only appeal for funds to support its year-round program on local, state and national levels."

Of every dollar contributed, 94c remains in Mississippi and 6c goes to the National Tuberculosis Association.

During the campaign, which will continue through December, the Christmas Seal Committee plans to use every available means to tell the Christmas Seal Story.

More Evidence Shows Cobalt In State Adequate

Research continues to add evidence that livestock in Mississippi do not need supplemental cobalt. The latest series of tests, reported by Dr. H. W. Essig of the Mississippi Experiment Station, involved 182 beef animals.

In the first trial 24 heifers were

tested for 44 days in April and May while on a ryegrass pasture. In three succeeding trials, which began in November and December, the test animals were on winter rations consisting of silage, corn and cottonseed meal. One test involved 48 weanling heifers and continued 111 days, in another 60 steers were fed for 84 days and in

still another 50 steers were fed a similar period.

In each half the animals on test were given 20 gm. cobalt bullets and the remaining animals were not treated. Three of the tests were conducted at Mississippi State University and the fourth was at Prairie, Miss.

No significant beneficial or adverse effects were produced by the cobalt bullets. Thus, Dr. Essig says, it would appear that sufficient quantities of cobalt were present in the ration to meet daily requirements of the young beef cattle. Based on these results, cobalt bullets appear to be of no benefit for cattle fed a Mississippi-produced high-roughage type ration.

The complete report of this research is published in the November issue of Mississippi Farm Research available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

A cobalt study involving mature beef cows was conducted at the Natchez Branch Experiment Station during the winter of 1959-60. Results of this test, published by John A. McGuire in July 1960, showed no indication of cobalt deficiency.

What We Have

Lesson for November 12, 1961

WITH two exceptions, all the columns from now till Christmas in these Bible studies will be concerned with one question and its several answers: By what means does a Christian grow? Up to now we have been



thinking in what parts or activities or attitudes of his life a Christian grows; now we try to see what makes that growth possible, how it is done. We must remember always that it is God who is the Giver of every good and perfect gift, that it is God who works in us "both to will and to do" what is pleasing in his sight. But we must remember also that "Grow" is used in the imperative, as a command, in the New Testament. These next few weeks before the New Year will give us a chance to think how we can obey that command. If you want to keep it, use it!

Some people, reading Jesus' parable of the Talents, are bothered by it. Why was the man's poor little one talent taken away from him, and why, oh why was it given to the man with ten talents already?—Maybe Jesus' parables are not all to be taken literally, but they all mean something. The meaning of this parable is two-fold, positive and negative. Positively: If you want to keep it, use it! Negatively: What you do not use, you may not keep. It is pretty plain that Jesus cannot be taken literally and make sense. It is not true that if you want to keep a skyrocket, set it off. It is not true that if you want to keep a dollar you must spend it. But it is certainly true in the mental and spiritual realm. Do you have a good head for mathematics. If you want to keep it that way, don't give up your math, keep with it right on through school. Do you have a gift for friendship? It will grow in proportion as you make friends. Do you have faith in God? If you want to keep it, use it.

Hindrances
The Christian word for using what you have, in God's service and for the help of your fellowman, is Stewardship. That word has come to have, in many people's minds, the sound of money. A good steward, we are told, is one who tithes his income, is generous with the less fortunate, and so on. But while that is good, it is not the only kind of stewardship. Time, gifts and aptitudes, skills of any good kind, are equally the concern of the good steward of the gifts of God. And of all such things, it is true that what you do not use you may not keep.

Take the Pharisees, for example. They had everything, learning, leisure, the Word of God in the Scriptures of which they thought so highly. They had enough to be what they thought they were, but were not: the spiritual leaders of Israel. They became enemies of the Son of God. His most outright attacks on any class of persons were aimed at the Pharisees. Why, with all their opportunities, did they sink so low? The reader of Matthew 23 will find more answers than one. Hypocrisy, self-righteousness, pride, possessiveness and sanctimoniousness are all there.

Day-by-Day Choices

So—unless we wish to follow the Pharisees' tragic road—if we want to grow as Christians, then we shall have to use, as Christians responsible to our Father in heaven, whatever gifts and opportunities He sends us, in a Christian spirit and for Christian ends. This cannot be done by one great effort of decision. It is rarely in a lifetime that we make tremendous, dramatic, crucial choices. Most of the time we just go from day to day making small decisions all the time. The importance of these day-by-day decisions and choices is greater than some of us think. A minister begins his course as a minister by a great decision to spend his life in God's service through the church. But it has happened sometimes that the man's day-by-day choices were self-centered and self-indulgent, until like the Pharisees the last state of the man was worse than the first. For high and for low, the rule is stern: What you do not use, you may not keep.

ly Springs in the past few years have shown that alfalfa can be grown successfully on soils that are not generally regarded as alfalfa soils.

Agronomist B. L. Arnold reports reasonable applications of lime, phosphate, potash, and borax have produced yields of three to four tons of hay per acre.

In five of the last seven years, alfalfa fields cut for hay have been cut four times. In one dry year hay was cut only twice and in another three times. These fields were on average hill soils. On good, deep, well-drained bottom soils higher yields could be expected.

"Alfalfa as a hay crop has disadvantages," Mr. Arnold said. "The first cutting is ready May 1-15 when hay is hard to cure and when haymaking may interfere with other operations on the farm; it has a high per acre cost of establishment; insects are likely to be a problem some years."

"The advantages outweigh the disadvantages. Being early, the first cutting (May 1-15) and the second cutting (about five weeks later) can be made without dry weather reducing the yields much, even in dry years when other hay crops may be quite short. It is a deep-rooted, perennial legume which makes a hay of excellent quality, high in protein, particularly good for young animals or for producing dairy animals. Alfalfa will produce more good quality legume hay per acre than any other crop."

Top yielding varieties were Williamsburg, Oklahoma Common, Buffalo and Atlantic. The com-

plete report is published in the October issue of Mississippi Farm Research available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

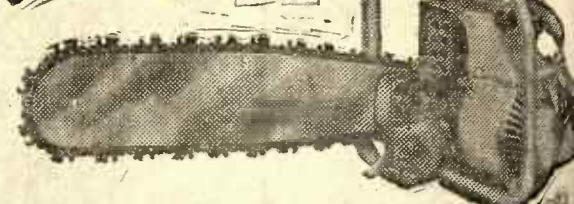

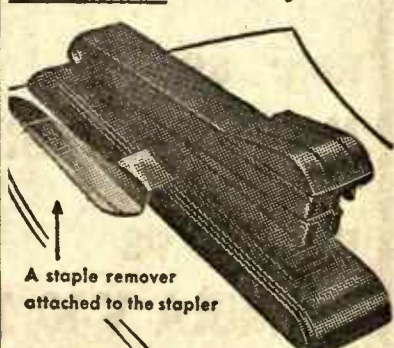

Home Agent Notes

Be careful before you sign that installment contract. Are you sure that the provisions

suit you and your financial situation? After you sign it, you can't change conditions that are unsatisfactory. Of course, you will never sign a contract with any part of it blank.

Be sure to check to be sure all figures are correct before you sign any contract. Each contract should show separately: 1. The cash price of the merchandise and sales tax; 2. The cash down payment; 3. Allowance to be made for any trade-in; 4. The unpaid balance; 5. Cost of insurance, itemized list of other costs as filing or recording; 7. The finance charge stated as a sum in dollars; 8. The amount of the contract balance; and 9. The number, amount and time of payment of the installments.

You will want to know the penalty for the late payment and be sure of fair notice before merchandise can be repossessed for late payment. Steer clear of contracts that contain wage assignments or neglect any safeguards.

If your contract involves a large sum, try to borrow from a source that will refund some of the finance charge for early completion of payments.

Although you will have the use of the goods after you sign a contract, the creditor has a lien on

them until you pay him in full. You must, therefore, agree not to sell, remove or encumber the articles without written consent of the creditor.

The borrower is also responsible for any loss or damage that may happen to the purchase. If the borrower fails to meet payments, the creditor can take the merchandise back or may be able to hold the signer of the contract liable for the unpaid balance in full.

Consider all these facts and be sure you can easily meet payments before you buy on the installment plan.

Skill in Buying
For information to help you buy wisely, ask at your home agent's office for a copy of Extension Publication 431, Skill in Buying. The principles outlined in the bulletin can be applied to big and little things you buy—food, clothing, furniture, home and automobiles.

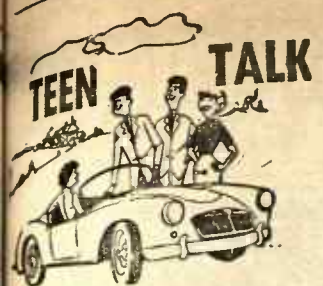

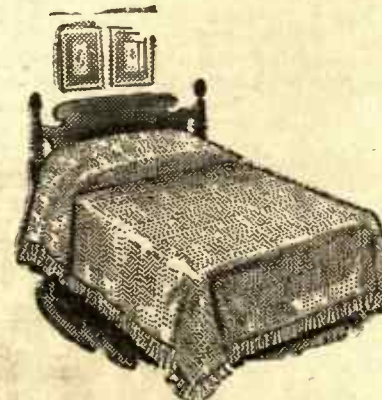

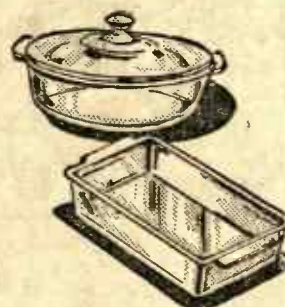

Q—Can a veteran be advised as to his general non-medical benefits while he is a patient at a VA hospital?
A—Yes. Each VA hospital has

a contact representative as a full time member of the hospital staff to serve veterans in just such a capacity.

Q—Are veterans now returning to or entering the service given an opportunity to take out GI life insurance?

A—No, GI insurance policies are no longer being issued.

Q—What was the average number of patients treated in VA hospitals last year?

A—The latest figures are available for Fiscal Year 1961, which ended June 30, 1961. The Veterans Administration treated an average of 111,351 patients daily during this period.

Q—I understand patients in VA hospitals must provide their own personal comfort items. What are "comfort items"?

A—Comfort items are articles an individual normally requires in his everyday needs, such as shaving cream, tooth brushes, razor blades, hair tonic, etc.



Moon Rocket Engines

To Be Tested in Mississippi
The National Aeronautics and Space Administration will test its moon rocket engines in Hancock county before sending them to Cape Canaveral to be fired. Six test towers costing \$35,000,000 each will be built at a 13,300-acre site in Hancock county, each capable of testing booster stages with up to 20,000,000 pounds of thrust. Between 500 and 700 scientists, engineers and technicians will be employed at the site, which will be under the direction of Dr. Werner Braun and the Marshall Space Flight Center at Huntsville, Ala. Construction will begin in mid-1962 and will take two or three years for completion. The engines will be made at the Michoud plant in New Orleans and shipped to the testing grounds by barge up the Pearl river. Some 660 families will have to move out of the test site area and from an additional 123,700 acres of "buffer zone" territory in Hancock and Pearl River counties and in St. Tammany parish across the Pearl river in Louisiana.

Ground Breaking Ceremony for the new Standard Oil (Kentucky) oil refinery at Pascagoula were held Wednesday. Construction will start immediately and is expected to be complete within 18 to 24 months. The construction payroll will be an estimated \$40 million.

The \$125 million refinery will have a capacity of 100,000 barrels a day and will employ approximately 700 workers, with an annual payroll of about \$3.5 million. Announcement of the ground breaking ceremonies followed Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board approval of legal arrangements at a meeting held October 31 in Jackson.

General Tire Buys Columbus Plant Site
General Tire and Rubber Company, Akron, Ohio, has exercised on option to purchase some 80 acres in the Columbus-Lowndes industrial park. The announcement was made with the approval of General Tire and Rubber Company president, M. G. O'Neil, who said the site will be used for "possible future expansion of our plastics operations."

T. E. A. M. Consultants Help State Research

Recently-retired research directors of large industrial corporations are helping Mississippi's program of economic research by serving without pay as consultants to the Mississippi Industrial and Technological Research Commission. A group of these retired experts have organized in New York under the name of "Technically Experienced Associates—Mobilized," and they have visited the state four times over the past year for discussions with M. I. T. R. C. officials. Commission officials say T. E. A. M. members "have suggested many profitable areas of research." Reimbursement of travel expenses is the only cost to the commission.

Ground Broken For Poplarville Plant

Ground was broken late in October for construction of a bulk fertilizer blending plant at Poplarville. The plant will be operated by D. L. Wesley and Sons. Wesley said construction will probably be completed within the next 60 days and that actual operations will start at an early date on blending and selling fertilizer.

A & I Board Meets At Meridian

The Agricultural and Industrial Board met Thursday (Nov. 9) at the Travel Inn motel at Meridian as another in a series of sessions held in various parts of the state. Previous away - from - Jackson meetings have been held this year at Corinth, Brookhaven and Biloxi. Ordinarily, the board meets once a month in Jackson.

Board members toured the new \$60,000,000 U. S. Naval Auxiliary Air Station at Meridian Wednesday afternoon.

Visiting Georgia Senators Praise Mississippi Program

Five Georgia senators studied Mississippi's industrial program recently on a tour to this and other states to compare such programs throughout the South. One of them, Senator E. W. Matthews, told A & I Board director Joe Bullock: "Of all the states we have visited, the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board personnel are by far the most enthusiastic bunch we've yet seen."

Dairying

It is more important than ever that dairymen stop and take stock of their management practices and lower the cost of producing milk. No business can long operate without records of the cost of various operations involved.

Records are just as important to the dairyman. By use of a testing program and a record of past years, dairymen can feed each cow according to her individual production.

He knows which cows to sell, what period of the year he needs more feed and what practices must be changed.

Two record programs available to Mississippi dairymen sponsored by the Agricultural Extension Service through local County Agents include the Weigh-A-Day-A-Month (WADAM), and the Dairy Herd Improvement Association (DHIA).

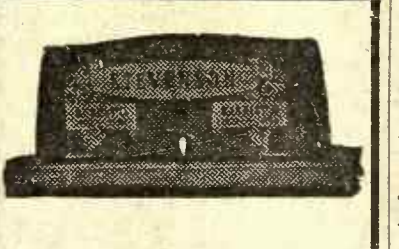
Dairymen participating in such testing programs have records to assist them in managing their herds and to answer such questions as:

Lime increases bacterial action by minor elements like manganese iron and aluminum. Lime makes available other minor elements which the plants need.

Pecan Planting

Pecan tree planting time will soon be here. Recommended planting months are December, January and February.

Order trees early so that you can get the size and variety you want. Recommended varieties include Stuart, Desirable, Lewis, Elliott, Curtis, and Farley. Schley and Success can be successfully grown where a spray program is carried out.

It is desirable to plant more than one variety. Select your soil carefully and make sure that you do not plant the trees too close together. Make planting holes deep and large enough to set trees an inch deeper than they grew in the nursery.

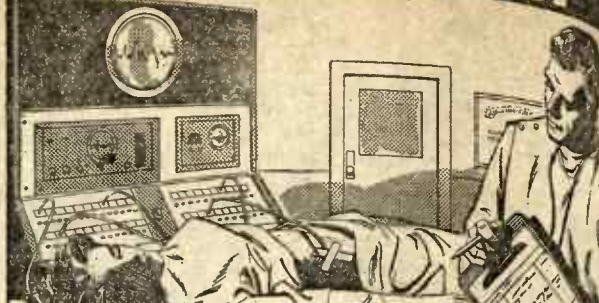

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Pulp & Paper Industry Employment

Reaches All Time-High
Of 86,000 In 1960;
\$463 Million Payroll

Employment in the South's pulp and paper industry reached an all-time high of 86,000 in 1960, and total payroll hit a record \$463 million, was revealed by H. J. Malsberger of Atlanta, general manager of the Southern Pulpwood Association. He said that many other facts about the industry are contained in a new 12-state Economic Analysis compiled by SPCA.

This year's employment total,

Mr. Malsberger explained, was 3.6 per cent higher than the 83,000 workers on the job in 1958, the year covered by the Association's previous analysis. The 1960 total payroll, he added, was 8.5 per cent greater than the \$426 million reported for 1958.

In addition to those employed in pulp and paper mills, the survey revealed an additional 96,000 people were engaged in the independent business of supplying pulpwood to these mills. This was a gain of 17 per cent over the 1958 figure of 82,000.

Pulpwood purchased from landowners in over 90% of the counties of the South totaled \$471 million last year, Mr. Malsberger said. These purchases were 16.1 per cent above the \$404 million recorded in 1958.

The pulp and paper industry also has increased its efforts to give aid to individual landowners concerning good forestry practices, he added. In 1960, help was given to 36,157 landowners, 50 per cent more than the 24,195 owners who

received aid in 1958.

Among other pertinent facts contained in the 1960 study are these: The region's pulp and paper companies (1) spent \$34 million improving their forests; (2) had more than 17 million acres of land open to hunting and fishing; (3) offered 135 scholarships; (4) sponsored 1,087 youths in forest camps and (5) sponsored 170 school forests.

"In meeting the needs of our ever-growing population," Mr. Malsberger noted, "the South may reasonably expect a continued steady and healthy growth in its pulp and paper industry. Too, the constant research aimed at product development indicates that there will be many new and better paper products available for man's use in the near future."

He added that all this provides a sustained market for trees. Important, too, is the fact that good forestry and conservation practices, coupled with the planting each year of seedlings by the hundreds of millions, and natural regrowth, are providing for the South as a whole a favorable forest balance.

Forestry Notes

The Mississippi Forestry Commission is still accepting applications for pine seedlings, announces Area Forester Larry Brewer.

Early orders for spruce, pine, bald cypress, cottonwood, yellow poplar, cherrybark and nuttall oak have depleted supplies of these species. Mr. Brewer emphasized that orders for loblolly and slash pine will be taken until the supply is exhausted.

Area Forester Brewer points out that a special sale was held last year in order to dispose of surplus seedlings. There will be no such sale held this year states Mr. Brewer.

Each landownership may obtain 1,000 seedlings free by paying \$.35 delivery charge. Each additional 1,000 seedlings will cost \$.45 plus the delivery charge.

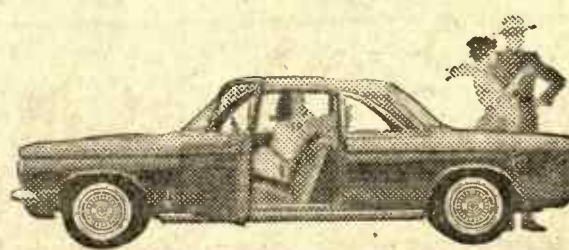

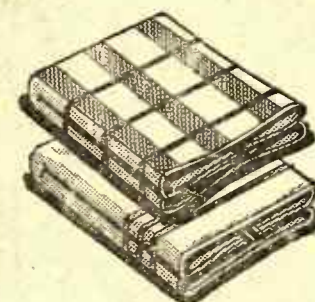

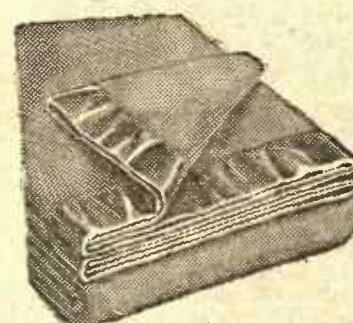

What Is Civil Defense?

In the consideration of the problem of preparing the people of the State of Mississippi to take care of themselves in the event of a nuclear war, it is pertinent that we define the exact meaning of Civil Defense. Civil Defense is more aptly called "Government in Emergency." Fundamentally, Civil Defense is your federal, state, county and municipal governments acting in the interest of the people of their jurisdiction when any disaster or catastrophe threatens lives or property and interrupts normal day to day activities.

The Federal Government has a basic responsibility, pursuant to the 1950 Civil Defense Act, to provide leadership and guidance to the states in the preparation for an enemy attack. The State of Mississippi, acting through Governor Ross Barnett, is responsible for the emergency welfare of the people of the State in any emergency, natural or man-made that overwhelms local facilities. The State Civil Defense Director is charged with the responsibility of planning and developing the Governor's emergency powers in the field of emergency governmental operations. The State Director is joined in this responsibility on the local level with the County and City Civil Defense Directors, who represent the Board of Supervisors and Mayor and Board of Aldermen in their emergency planning within their jurisdictions. In other words, Civil Defense is emergency government on each level, in order to give our country and the several states a capability in providing for the welfare of the people.

In order for any Civil Defense Council or Civil Emergency Planning Unit to be effective, it is absolutely necessary that each person working for the federal, state, county and city be assigned and accept emergency responsibility to provide the leadership that would be required for prompt emergency action.

As an example in this regard, the President has delegated emergency authority to all federal agencies to provide guidance and leadership to the States. As an example of this, the U. S. Public Health Service is charged with the responsibility of emergency health

planning and mobilization and to provide guidance to the several states in this regard.

On the state level, the Governor of Mississippi is preparing a delegation of emergency responsibilities to all of the Mississippi Departments and Commissions in order to develop a comprehensive program of emergency planning on county and city levels. To illustrate this, the Mississippi Health Department has accepted the responsibility of direct liaison with the Public Health Service and to provide guidance and leadership to counties in the mobilization of all health resources of our state. This mobilization will involve the training of cadres to set up and operate the Civil Defense Emergency Hospital stored in Mississippi, and the prompt utilization of medical stockpiles in times of war or disaster.

It is necessary that each person bear in mind that the responsibility of emergency planning lies with officials elected to public office at each level of government and that each Civil Defense Director is acting in and for these legal representatives of the people in planning their Civil Defense Program.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, PROHIBITING THE OPERATION OF A BUSINESS COMMONLY KNOWN AS A ROAD HOUSE, NIGHT CLUB, PUBLIC DANCE HALL, ETC., EXCEPT AS SPONSORED AND DIRECTLY SUPERVISED BY A CHARITABLE CIVIC CLUB OR ORGANIZATION OR BY A PUBLIC SCHOOL.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, in regular session on this 7th day of November, 1961, as follows:

SECTION 1. That from and after the date of the adoption of this Ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any private person, organization, corporation, club or group of persons to operate within the corporate boundaries of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, a place of business commonly known as a road house, night club, public dance hall, or a similar place by whatever name called where the general public is permitted to dance, whether a charge is made or not.

SECTION 2. This Ordinance shall not operate to prohibit a dance sponsored and directly supervised by a charitable civic club or organization or by a public school.

SECTION 3. Any private person, organization, corporation, club or group of persons convicted of violating this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION 4. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any other provision of this Ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF TISHOMINGO, MISSISSIPPI, DECLARING ITS INTENTION TO LEVY A TAX ON RETAIL SALES OR GROSS INCOME OF BUSINESS AT THE RATE OF ONE PER CENT EXCEPT FOR SALES OF CERTAIN PRODUCTS HEREIN SET OUT, AND CALLING FOR AN ELECTION WHEREIN THE PROPOSAL SHALL BE SUBMITTED TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID MUNICIPALITY.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, in regular session on this 7th day of November, 1961, as follows:

SECTION 1. That the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, does by this Ordinance declare its intention to levy for its benefit upon the retail sales or gross income of business in said Town a tax at the rate of one per cent (1%) except that sales of farm tractors and self-propelled or drawn farm implements sold to farmers, automobiles, trucks and truck-tractors shall be taxed at the rate of one half of one per cent (1/2 of 1%) and sales of electricity, current, power, steam, coal, natural gas, liquefied petroleum gas, or other fuel shall be taxed at the rate of one-fourth of one per cent (1/4 of 1%) when sold to a manufacturer or custom processor for industrial purposes, and provided further that the tax herein proposed to be levied shall not apply to gross income from ginning cotton, storing grain in elevators or warehouses, railroad transportation and sales of self-propelled construction equipment.

SECTION 2. An election shall

be held in the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, on December 12, 1961, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A. M. and 6:00 o'clock P. M. wherein the qualified electors of said municipality shall have the choice of voting for or against the above and foregoing proposed tax levy.

SECTION 3. The Town Clerk is hereby ordered to have the within Ordinance published at least once a week for three consecutive weeks in the Vidette, a newspaper having general circulation in said municipality; and said clerk is further ordered to post a copy

of this said Ordinance in at least three public places in said municipality.
