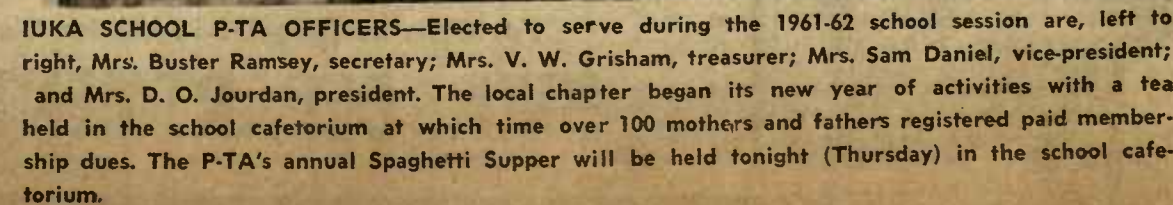

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Why Civil Defense?

In an earlier article the exact meaning of Civil Defense was discussed in order to make clear that government, local, state, and federal, has the authority and responsibility to provide planning and preparation to secure civil emergency protection for our state.

The motivating factor in the passage of federal and state Civil Defense legislation was that the Soviet Union possessed a capability for attacking this Country. This capability has steadily increased year by year until at the present time it is an acknowledged fact that America's major cities and military installations could be under attack by Soviet Russia at this moment. For this reason, and others, it is absolutely necessary that this country, and, in particular, the State of Mississippi take certain protection measures which prudence dictates.

The Mississippi Civil Defense Council subscribes to those principles on Civil Defense advanced by unimpeachable authorities on the subject. These authorities include the Rand Corporation Report on Civil Defense; the Rockefeller Report, and others, as well as the repeated assertions of Dr. Edward Teller, commonly termed the Father of the Hydrogen Bomb. Dr. Teller, in particular, has urged that we begin at once to develop a comprehensive program of fallout shelters to protect our people against nuclear detonation that would occur in the event of war. His profound recommendation was that the federal and state governments, as well as our political subdivisions should start stockpiling surplus food, machinery, large tools, generators and building materials. These items being the essentials required to generate power, develop factories, build more machines, transport people and goods and assure communications. He further advocated the planning of organized efforts at each level of our government beginning with the county and city to take our people through the early stages of an attack on the country and the hard cooperative work that would be required to rebuild the wonderful civilization that we now possess in this country.

Each of Dr. Teller's recommendations will be discussed in future articles in this newspaper. The State of Mississippi enjoys the unique position, in relation to most states, in that it does not possess large military-industrial complexes which would be prime target areas in the event of war. However, we are immediately downwind from potential target areas which will result in our state being covered with radioactive fallout. This fallout necessitates a system of fallout shelters in all areas of the state. It is strongly urged that each family construct a fallout shelter adequate to take care of their requirements. Community

shelters must be constructed to complement the family shelters for those who are transients, indigents, others, and those who must be supported by society. These community shelters should be sponsored and financed by county and city governmental authorities by utilizing existing equipment, resources and engineering talents. This community and family fallout shelter program, coupled with the building surveys currently being carried on by the Corps of Engineers which will identify for fallout protective purposes the larger buildings of our state, will provide for the survival of our people on a maximum basis.

Civil Defense should be the most vital facet of county and city government and should receive strong support from the Board of Supervisors and Mayor and Boards of Aldermen, in order that the people of our state can receive proper leadership in doing what is prudent, reasonable and necessary in meeting the threat of these perilous times.



County Agent's Notes

Fire Lanes. Every permanent pasture with any growth of grass on it should have a fire lane disked or plowed around it. This is especially true on pastures where clovers are expected to come up. If fire burns over permanent pastures, it kills young clovers and makes spring grazing late.

Handing fescue. Save your fescue for later in winter. You will need it more in late December, January, and February.

Sod Seeding. There is still time to sod seed ryegrass, oats or wheat in Bermuda grass. Wheat does better planted late than any of the other cereals. Although you do sod seeding in November, still make sure to apply fertilizer at time of planting.

Coastal Bermuda. Prepare land this month where you intend to set Coastal during the winter. This grass does better when planted on prepared land than when it is set on unprepared land.

Grazing frosted sorghum. Watch out for prussic acid on second growth and volunteer sorghum in fields. If prussic acid is present, one cow turned in will generally find it. Better yet, wait until the sorghum has dried out following

frost. Then it is safe to graze.

Orchard Notes

It is time to plant peaches, apples, pears, and pecan trees. Best planting times are November and December.

Early planting lets you get the best choice of varieties and sizes of trees from the nursery. Trees set in early winter will have the



International Union Sunday School Lessons

Self-Control

Lesson for November 19, 1961

A YOUNG man was about to be dismissed from college, not for any particular rule that he had broken, but for general worthlessness. His mother could not understand it. She wrote letters, she sent telegrams, she tied the



dean up in her telephone monologues. So finally the dean invited her up for a conference with all concerned. There they all sat, the boy himself and his mother, several of his teachers, the cream of his fraternity brothers, the athletic coach, even the president of the college. Everybody told about what they had done for the boy, how they had tried to urge him on, stimulate his ambition, see that he studied, and so forth. Everybody seemed to be steamed up over the case except the boy himself, who sat through it all like a lump of putty. Finally the president had to ask him: "Well, you have heard what every one else has done. Isn't it about time you did something for yourself?"

Imperatives

That is a true story, but it is also a parable of the Christian life. God will not do everything for you. He does a great deal. He has gone to infinite pains for your benefit. His Spirit comes to make a home in you. Yet the Holy Spirit will never do for you what you might do for yourself.—the Holy Spirit is not a substitute for your own will-power. The New Testament is filled with joyful testimony to what God has done for us, but it also very often gives us commands. The Holy Spirit will no more take our tests for us than a poor indulgent mother could pass her shiftless son's examinations for him. "Make every effort," Peter says (2 Peter 1:5) to build up all the elements of a strong Christian character.

Self-Control Needed

No part of the New Testament suffers more from awkward expressions in the 1611 translation (the "King James") than this great passage in 2 Peter. Among other things, one of the key-words is tucked out of sight by a wrong translation. In verse six it is not "temperance" Peter means; the Greek word means literally, self-control, a stronger word by far than temperance. It means holding yourself in, not living like a child that sags and does whatever suits him at the moment. It means not getting angry when you feel anger (if you catch the difference). It means keeping on with a job if it has to be done, no matter whether you feel like it or not. It means, in short, not letting yourself get away from yourself. A car that goes "out of control" cannot be steered. A life out of control is not going to listen to reason, there is no steering it.

A life of faith, virtue and knowledge would be a good life, would it not? Yes, but Saint Peter sees something else needed. Faith, virtue and knowledge need to be supplemented by self-control. A life without this is like a fine car without a driver.

Completion

On the other hand, in this description of the ideal Christian life, the last word is not self-control. We may have met people who were long on self-control but short on influence, because they were so intent (so to speak) on holding themselves in, holding themselves down, that they forgot to shine. Steadfastness (dogged persistence), godliness (Peter's word means reverence, a sense of the Presence of God), brotherly affection and love, all are needed to complete self-control. The good life, you see, is not one single good quality off by itself. People will pick out some one's virtue and they will rate other people as "good" or "bad" depending on how they stack up against this one single yardstick of comparison. Well, history is filled with warnings at this point. Don't rate somebody high just because he has one outstanding good trait. The emperor Nero was generous with his friends and he loved music. Genghis Khan, who laid his world waste, was a man who knew no fear. Adolf Hitler was (by intention, many think) a patriotic man. Stalin was very persistent. Satan himself is an untiring worker. One virtue alone is like a lone cornstalk in a big field.

Fall Application of Fertilizer

Many farmers want to know about applying row crop fertilizer in the fall.

On heavy clay soils, loss of potash and phosphate is not too heavy. On sandy loamy soils it is pretty heavy. Nitrogen loss is too great on all soils to apply it in the fall and expect results in the spring.

In general, it will not pay to apply mixed fertilizer or nitrogen to row crop land in the fall.

Forestry Notes

Mississippi Forestry Commission equipment and personnel are available for contract fireland construction work.

No limitation is set on the number of miles of firelanes that can be plowed for any landowner, but it is the policy to plow firelanes for as many timberowners as possible. In cases where requests for this service exceeds the capacity of

personnel and equipment, the smaller jobs will receive priority. This will permit the service to continue to be available to the greatest possible number of landowners.

A written contract between the Area Forester and the landowner must be signed before any work is performed. A joint agreement will be made in advance that the fire land construction work will be done on an actual cost basis or a firm contract price per mile. The landowner will be held responsible for furnishing boundary line information to Commission employees.

The Commission equipment will continue to be available for firelane plowing so long as it does not interfere with the primary function of suppressing wild woods fires. Funds received from this activity will be credited to the Forestry Commission Budget in Tishomingo County for the purpose of maintaining and advancing the county forestry program.

Tishomingo County landowners interested in this fire protection service should contact the Area Forester for further details.

I want to point out that this service for which cost compensation is received is not one of the benefits included in basic fire protection for which landowners pay two cents per acre on all timbered and uncultivable land.

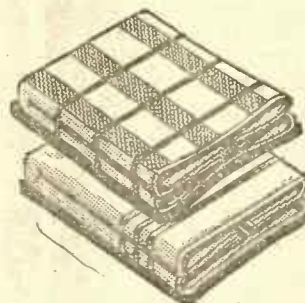
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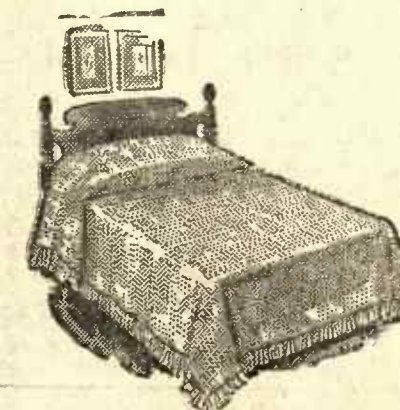
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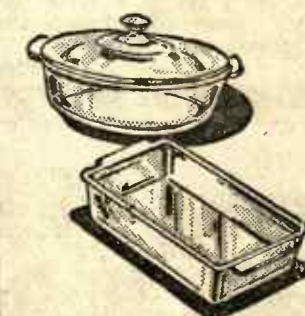

Home Agent Notes

Whatever the size of your family, there's a turkey just the size for Thanksgiving dinner. If your family is small, look for a "fryer-roaster." It's a turkey about 3 to 4 months old and weighs about 3 to 8 pounds. You can fry it, broil it, or stuff and roast it. Whatever your family preference, the bigger the bird, the cheaper the price per pound. If you want to take advantage of economy prices for large

birds, have one split. Cook half of it now and freeze the other half for use later. A half turkey roast of 7 to 12 pounds will give you 15 to 25 servings at the dinner table.

Roast your turkey in a 325 degree F. oven. Allow 20 to 25 minutes a pound for a 6 to 10 pound turkey, 18 to 20 minutes a pound for a 10 to 16 pound turkey and 16 to 18 minutes a pound for an 18 to 25 pound stuffed turkey.

Cream Dressing for Fruit Salad.
1 cup creamed cottage cheese, 1/2 cup dairy sour cream, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon almond extract, 1/4 cup toasted almonds.

Beat cheese until creamy. Stir in remaining ingredients. Arrange fruit on salad greens and spoon dressing over fruit.

Cranberry Bread
2 cups sifted all-purpose flour,

1 cup sugar, 1 1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons melted shortening, 1 egg, well beaten, 1/2 cup chopped nuts, 1/2 cup (1/2 pound) fresh cranberries cut in half.

Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder, soda and salt. Combine orange juice, grated rind, melted shortening and enough water to make 3/4 cup juice; then stir in beaten egg. Pour this mixture into the dry ingredients, mixing just enough to dampen. Fold in cranberries and nuts. Spoon into greased loaf pan (9 x 5 x 3 inches) spreading evenly and making corners and sides slightly higher than center. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F) 50 to 60 minutes.

Remove from pan. Cool. Store overnight for easy slicing.

May be made and frozen for Thanksgiving, Christmas or other occasion.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, DECLARING ITS INTENTION TO LEVY A TAX ON RETAIL SALES OF GROSS INCOME OF BUSINESS, AT THE RATE OF ONE PER CENT (1%), EXCEPT FOR SALES OF CERTAIN PRODUCTS HEREIN SET OUT, AND CALLING FOR AN ELECTION WHEREIN THE PROPOSAL SHALL BE SUBMITTED TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID MUNICIPALITY.

BE IT ORDAINED By the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, in special session on this 8th day of November, 1961, as follows:

SECTION 1. That the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, does by this ordinance declare its intention to

levy for its benefit upon the retail sales, or gross income of business in said town a tax at the rate of one per cent (1%), except that sales of farm tractors and self-propelled, or drawn farm implements sold to farmers, automobiles, trucks and truck-tractors, shall be taxed at the rate of one half of one per cent, and sales of electricity, current, power, steam, coal, natural gas, liquefied petroleum gas, or other fuel, shall be taxed at the rate of one fourth of one per cent (¼ of 1%) when sold to a manufacturer or custom processor for industrial purposes, and provided further that the tax herein proposed to be levied shall not apply to gross income from ginning cotton, storing grain in elevators or warehouses, or railroad transportation and sales of self-propelled construction equipment.

SECTION 2. An election shall be held in the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, on December 12, 1961, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A. M. and 6:00 o'clock P. M. wherein the qualified electors of said municipality shall have the choice of voting for or against the above and foregoing proposed tax levy.

SECTION 3. The Town Clerk is hereby ordered to have the within Ordinance published at least once a week for three consecutive weeks in the Vidette, a newspaper having general circulation in said municipality, and said clerk is further ordered to post a copy of this said Ordinance in at least three public places in said municipality.
