Field On Stolen Auto Charge

Orderly Conduct Investigation Uncover Theft

Phelps, alias Larry Lew, alias Lawrence Phillips, held in Tishomingo County for investigation of charges for an automobile and for stolen property according to state line.

Clarence Pace reports deputies, along with high patrolmen and Iuka City police, answered a call Friday night for an investigation of a drunkenness and disorderly conduct in the part of Phelps. Sheriff reports that Phelps was arrested on the Eastport Road and time of his arrest was driving a 1961 Ford Galaxie that had license plates.

An investigation of the automobile, the sheriff reported it to be stolen from a company in El Paso, Texas, and is being held for Federal authorities. Transporting stolen across state lines is a violation of the Dyer Act and in most cases a penitentiary offense, the sheriff said.

Other activities reported by the sheriff was the release to county authorities of Wilbert Hughes, Troy Lee Rogers, Crane and Gary Hardin, prosecution of burglaries in county. These teen-age youths admitted to burglarizing a number of places in that area and being tried in court now in

youths were being held in Tishomingo County jail after being charged with burglarizing a grocery, Sartin's Grocery, Service Station, and R. Q. S. Grocery, all in Belmont. A disposition is made of the youths in Lee county, the offenders will be brought back to Tishomingo county and tried for the burglaries.

COMMITTEE TO NAME NOMINEES FOR BOARD POSITION

They represent Area 3, composed of the counties of Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah and Tishomingo. Nominees are to come from the area at large this year.

Each of the 20 areas has three elected directors, with the senior director going off the board each year. Elected directors serve three-year terms.

Motorist Warned

Of Two Coming Requirements

There are two events coming up at the end of this year that demand the attention of every motorist in the state. They are the license renewals due December 31st and the Motor Vehicle Inspection beginning January 1st.

Approximately 117,000 licenses expire on the 31st of December. This is the largest single group of licenses to expire during the year. It behooves everyone to examine his license, and if it expires at the end of next month, to renew it promptly. Because of the large number involved drivers are encouraged to renew early. This will allow licenses to be mailed out earlier and with less delay. You may renew at any Sheriff's Office, City Clerk's Office or at Highway Patrol Headquarters in Jackson.

Motor Vehicle Inspection will be carried out during the first three months of 1962. It is necessary to have your car inspected during this period and the approved inspection sticker displayed on your car's windshield by the first day of April. Failure to comply can result in a fine. Inspection stations are set up at convenient points around the state just as they were last year. The fee for inspection is \$1.25. You are encouraged to comply early and avoid the last minute rush to have your vehicle inspected.

In Accident Occurring 11 Miles East Of Iuka

Jimmy Roy Smith, 15 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Smith of Glen, Route 1, was killed instantly Sunday afternoon when the truck in which he was a passenger overturned on a country road and landed on top of him.

Four other youths, a girl and three boys, were treated for minor injuries suffered in the mishap. Sheriff Hillie Coleman said the truck, driven by Johnny Franklin Smith, brother of the victim, went out of control on a country road about 11 miles west of Iuka. He said the vehicle hit an embankment, turned over and rolled back into the road, pinning the youngster underneath.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday at Liberty Hill Baptist Church with the Rev. Spurgeon Mullikin officiating. Burial was in Liberty Hill Cemetery.

RESIDENTS WARNED CONCERNING OUT-OF-STATE AUTOMOBILE TAGS

Sheriff Orders Owners With Improper Tags Cited Into Court

Tishomingo County Sheriff Clarence Pace, in an official warning to auto owners, states that all persons who own an auto vehicle of any description and reside in Tishomingo county must purchase a tag in this county.

The warning states that deputy sheriffs, highway patrolmen and other law enforcing officers have been ordered to cite anyone to court who are found operating a vehicle without proper tags.

Sheriff Pace's warning says:

"If you reside in Tishomingo county and own an automobile, truck, motorcycle, or any other type of motor vehicle operated on the roads and highways of Tishomingo County, you are required by law to purchase a Tishomingo County, Mississippi, tag.

"You have a moral obligation," the warning states, "to buy your tags in Tishomingo County as all taxes collected from the sale of automobile tags are used to finance the schools, hospitals, county home, and for the upkeep of the county road system. Your friends and neighbors in your community expect you to do your part in helping to finance these institutions by purchasing a Mississippi license plate for your motor vehicle.

"All Deputy Sheriffs, Highway Patrolmen, and other officers patrolling the roads and highways of this county have orders to cite anyone into court found operating a motor vehicle with improper tags and the court will decide whether or not you are entitled to operate a motor vehicle in Tishomingo County with out-of-state license tags.

"Mississippi has a reciprocal agreement with adjoining states for automobile owners to purchase their license tags in the state where they live regardless of where they work. Therefore this law shall be rigidly enforced.

"You are expected to take this notice as a warning as the officers have orders to issue a citation for your appearance in court the first time you are stopped and checked with improper tags," the warning concludes.

December 5 Will Be Election Day In Ala.; Cherokee Mayor Discusses Amendment

Voters in the State of Alabama will go to the polls on Tuesday, December 5, to decide the fate of a constitutional amendment that is designed to insure the continuity of government in the event a national disaster should occur.

R. E. Pate, Mayor of Cherokee, in commenting on the constitutional amendment, said,

"Continuity of government must be clearly defined and authorized in order that civil government may continue to function in the event

of nuclear attack. Although our area might not be considered a target, in the event of war, we still must plan for the many emergencies that would occur if our nation is ever attacked. We could, along with most other areas, be affected by the fallout from the target areas. Therefore, we must take action now to assure the continuance of governmental functions.

Proposed amendment No. 4, which will appear on Alabama's ballot December 5, provides for this. It says that all voters approve this amendment to our State Constitution so that continuity of legal authority in such an emergency can be assured," Mayor Pate said.

He continued: "Proposed constitutional Amendment No. 4 will authorize legislation to establish automatic lines of succession for our public officials, provide protection for essential records, establish control centers and alternate sites for government emergency operations, and insure the protection and maximum use of government personnel, resources and equipment, during Civil Defense emergency periods only," the Cherokee mayor concluded.

Report On Tuberculosis In County

Dr. Totten, Health Director, Gives Number Of Cases

Dr. J. C. Totten, Director of the Tishomingo County Health Department, announced today that there are 42 known cases of tuberculosis under supervision in Tishomingo County. "Tuberculosis remains a public health problem in Tishomingo County. The problem is not confined to the known cases, but includes those persons who have tuberculosis and do not realize it," Dr. Totten said.

"Of the known cases, 20 are active, 16 are receiving home treatment, and 7 are in the Sanatorium. X-raying must continue in order that the unknown cases may be discovered," the Doctor said.

ATTENTION, PARENTS

Law enforcement officials in the area report that it has been brought to their attention that a number of children under age, or have been, driving cars. Patrolmen state that any person driving a car, a motor scooter, or any kind of motor vehicle on a public thoroughfare must have a driver's license or a learner's permit. A person must be at least 15 years of age to obtain a license or a learner's permit. When a child under the age limit and without proper license is allowed to drive, then the parent as well as the child is in violation of the law. Patrolmen state that parents should heed the law and thus avoid possible embarrassment.

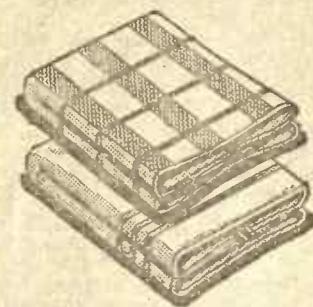

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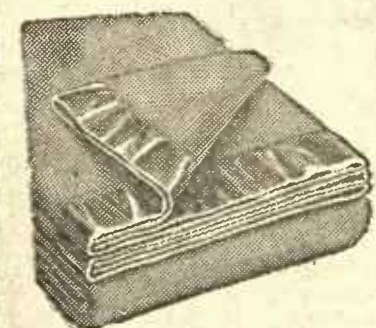

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All Sylvania Television Sets Going At
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Changes In Food Patterns Caused By Working Wives

Wives working outside the home have brought about many changes in family food habits, according to Dr. Dorothy Dickins, Head of the Experiment Station Home Economics Department. A study of 540 urban & rural families in Mississippi shows some of the effects of the wife's employment on the choice and use of food.

Dr. Dickins found the main meal has shifted from noon to evening. Husbands assist more in food preparation. There is less baking and less home production. More meals are being purchased in lunchrooms or cafes. Some implications in these changes, as seen by Dr. Dickins, follow:

"Producers and processors can gain in three ways from changes brought on by more homemakers having gainful work away from home: (1) From increases in urban white population of the state, which group uses a greater variety of purchased foods and more processed foods; (2) From less home production for family consumption on the part of rural families in which the wife is gainfully employed; (3) From an increased market for food from institutions such as cafes, restaurants and lunchrooms."

"It would seem important that producers and processors plan and work to provide foods in kinds and amounts needed not only for the changing family but also for lunchrooms, restaurants and cafes."

Dr. Dickins' report is published in the November issue of Mississippi Farm Research available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

Home Agent Notes

How well your nonstick greaseless fry pan works, depends on the care you give it. Whether you follow the manufacturers instructions. The Teflon coating on the fry pan — the coating that makes it suitable for non-stick greaseless cooking, scratches easily. Use only mild detergents, soft clothes or plastic mesh balls to clean. Use only wooden or rubber spatulas — or one of the new coated turners — as cooking tools.

Only moderate top-range temperatures should be used, to prevent discoloration or even deterioration of the resin coating.

Turkey-Broccoli Casserole
Arrange cooked and drained broccoli in a shallow baking dish. Top the broccoli with four generous slices of cooked turkey. Blend together a can of undiluted cream of mushroom soup and 1/3 cup milk. Pour this mixture over the turkey slices.

Sprinkle generously with grated, sharp cheddar cheese. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees) about 10 to 15 minutes or until well heated and nicely browned.

Turkey Open-face Sandwiches
Cook 1/2 cup minced onion in 2 tablespoons butter until tender. Blend in 1 can of undiluted cream of celery soup with 1/4 cup milk. Add 2 cups diced turkey—a combination of white and dark meat is especially flavorful. Season to taste with black pepper.

Heat to serving temperature and

portion onto hot buttered toast, broiled English muffin halves, hot biscuits or cornbread. Garnish with a colorful cranberry relish.

Turkey Green Pea Salad

Combine grated onion, curry powder, salt and lemon juice with mayonnaise. Measure equal portions of diced cooked turkey meat, drained canned peas and celery.

Toss turkey, peas and celery together gently with mayonnaise until blended. Serve in crisp lettuce cups with bread and butter sandwiches.

Care of Wood Floors

Wax is a wood floor's best friend. Whatever your wood floors, new or old, they need the protection of wax.

Water, on the other hand, is the natural enemy of wood. It can ruin the appearance of a wood floor. It may raise the grain and make it warp and crack.

Properly waxed floors are time savers themselves. They stay clean longer since spots can be wiped up easily from the waxed surface.

Urban Planning Grants

Since January 1, the Agricultural and Industrial Board has received federal approval for seven urban planning projects totalling \$205,260. The projects involve 21 municipalities and one county. They include \$126,001 in federal grants and \$82,259 in municipal and county funds. The initial program called for federal and local funds on a 50-50 matching basis. But revisions effective last July 1 permit federal financing of two-thirds the cost. Applications for two-thirds planning assistance grants are now pending for Brandon, Flowood, Pelahatchie, Puckett and Supervisor's District Number Two, Rankin county, according to the A&I Board's City Planning Department.

Emphasize Outdoors In Travel Advertising

Mississippi's travel advertising will zero in on the current national boom in outdoor recreation, according to Ned O'Brien, manager of the Agricultural and Industrial Board Travel Department. Upcoming advertisements will stress the state's fourteen managed public hunting areas totalling 1,150,000 acres, fourteen state parks and 84 roadside parks, 170,000 acres of fishing lakes and long summers for sailing, powerboating, water skiing and swimming, both along the Gulf coast and on inland lakes. A new fullcolor twenty-page brochure will carry the same emphasis. Meanwhile, Pilgrimage and Civil War Centennial attractions also will be featured.

Magazine Features Mississippi

The "Wyandotte Chief," published by the Wyandotte Chemical Corporation, featured a five-page story on Mississippi in this month's issue. Titled "The Land of the Bright Outlook," the story highlights the company's J. B. Ford Division's Zorball plant at Blue Mountain. The magazine cited the state's "tremendous industrial growth," cattle and oil production, fishing, lumbering and celebrities.

State Business Activity Reflects Substantial Progress

The current report of the Business Research Station at Mississippi State University points out that state business activity reached an all-time high in September, topping previous records set this year. The report also pointed out that October's level should be even higher than September's. New peaks were attained in various key indicators during September, including bank deposits, federal home bank loans, sales of ordinary life insurance, crude petroleum production and non-farm wages.

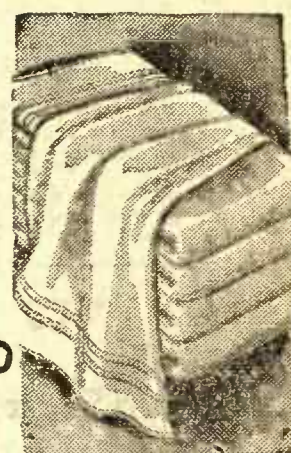

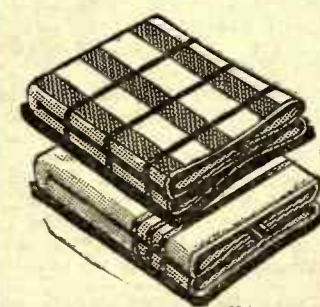

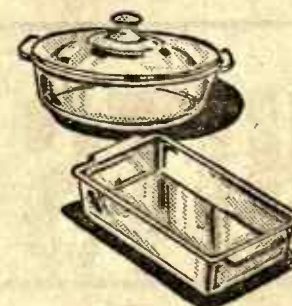

The honoree was presented a lazy Susan, a very lovely gift.

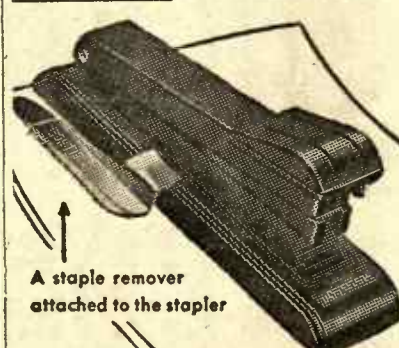

WARNING

TO ALL AUTOMOBILE OWNERS

If you reside in Tishomingo county and own an automobile, truck, motorcycle, or any other type of motor vehicle operated on the roads and highways of Tishomingo County you are required by law to purchase a Tishomingo County, Mississippi, tag.

You have a moral obligation to buy your tags in Tishomingo County as all taxes collected from the sale of Automobile tags are used to finance the schools, hospitals, county home, and for upkeep of the county road system. Your friends and neighbors in your community expect you to do your part in helping to finance these institutions by purchasing a Mississippi license plate for your motor vehicle.

All Deputy Sheriffs, Highway Patrolmen and other officers patrolling the roads and highways of this county have orders cite anyone into court found operating motor vehicle with improper tags and the court will decide whether or not you are entitled to operate a motor vehicle in Tishomingo County with an out-of-state license tag.

Mississippi has a reciprocal agreement with adjoining states for automobile owners to purchase their license tags in the state where they live regardless of where they work, so therefore this law will be rigidly enforced.

You are expected to take this notice as a warning as the officers have orders issue a citation for your appearance in court the first time you are stopped and checked with improper tags.

That the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, does by this ordinance declare its intention to levy for its benefit upon the retail sales, or gross income of business in said town a tax at the rate of one per cent (1%), except that sales of farm tractors and self-propelled, or drawn farm implements sold to farmers, automobiles, trucks and truck-tractors shall be taxed at the rate of one half of one per cent, and sales of electricity, current, power, steam, coal, natural gas, liquefied petroleum gas, or other fuel, shall be taxed at the rate of one fourth of one per cent (¼ of 1%) when sold to a manufacturer or custom processor for industrial purposes, and provided further that the tax herein proposed to be levied shall not apply to gross income from ginning cotton, storing grain in elevators or warehouses, or railroad transportation and sales of self-propelled construction equipment.

SECTION 2. An election shall

be held in the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, on December 12, 1961, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A. M. and 6:00 o'clock P. M. wherein the qualified electors of said municipality shall have the choice of voting for or against the above and foregoing proposed tax levy.

SECTION 3. The Town Clerk is hereby ordered to have the within Ordinance published at least once a week for three consecutive weeks in the Vidette, a newspaper having general circulation in said municipality; and said clerk is further ordered to post a copy of this said Ordinance in at least three public places in said municipality.

Forestry Notes

By Larry Brewer
Area Forester

Landowners in Tishomingo County have shown a great deal of interest in forestry. This is evident by the large number of seedlings that have been planted throughout the county.

Landowners in the county have been planting well over 1,000,000 seedlings each year for the last 20 years. This is a good indication that landowners throughout this area realize the benefits that can

be obtained by carrying out good forestry practices on their timberlands.

Even though there has been a deal of progress made in forestry throughout Northeast Mississippi, we are still behind other parts of the state in our general forestry program. Here are a few points that we need to consider in future development of our timber lands:

1. Underplant in cull hardwood area. Most of the past planting has been done in old abandoned fields. We need to concentrate future plantings in areas occupied by cull hardwoods.

2. Hardwood Control—This work needs to be carried out in areas that have been underplanted and also in areas with adequate natural reproduction.

3. Proper Harvesting Methods—More timber needs to be selectively marked in Tishomingo County for harvest. Landowners should select the lower grade of trees for harvest and leave the best trees for future growth.

ory of every American citizen, generation after generation. It was the beginning of our economic system based on private ownership of property and individual responsibility.

In the beginning at Plymouth Colony, parcels of land were assigned each colonist in the name of King James of England. All the produce went into the central storehouse. And from this storehouse equal shares were doled out.

For about a year the rugged communal life provided the bare needs. But some of the less industrious colonists began to shirk when they found that, no matter how little they worked and produced on their land, they still got an equal share.

In time the hard-working colonists rebelled at supporting these lazy ones; they, too, began to lean on their plows and sit in the tree shade at the edge of the field. When Plymouth Colony was two years old, starvation threatened. No man could benefit by his own produce or feed his own family. It all had to go to the central storehouse; and when divided up equally, it would not sustain the Colony's life as too many were shirk-

ing. The Colony leaders suggested that the parcels of land be given to each family, and that each family have full ownership rights to all it produced. The lazy ones opposed this arrangement, but common sense and the strong impulse for individual freedom prevailed. Private ownership of property became the fundamental base of the new world's economic system. And with it came freedom.

The fields of Plymouth Colony blossomed. At the autumn harvest of 1623, Governor Bradford of Plymouth Colony proclaimed "Thanksgiving unto God."

Q—Who handles the financial affairs of incompetent veterans?

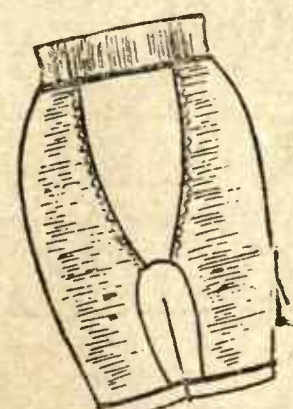

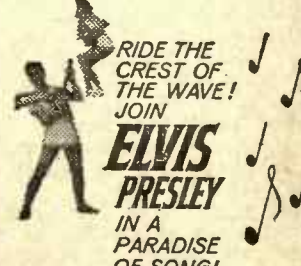

Proclamation Proclaims "Tree Planting Month"

All Mississippians Called Upon To Join In Carrying Out Campaign

Governor Ross R. Barnett signed a proclamation proclaiming January, 1962, as "Tree Planting Month" in Mississippi and called upon all Mississippians to join in carrying out a tree planting campaign to assure stocking of the

State's idle acres "to grow and produce for the benefit of all." The proclamation points out the products from Mississippi forests contribute over one-half billion dollars annually to the State economy but calls attention to the fact that the contribution could be twice this amount with all forest land in production.

It is estimated that 57 percent of the total State area is classified as timberland and more than six million acres of this are in need of planting to trees.

The Governor's proclamation states that, "to fully realize the magnitude and importance of the State's timber resources, we need to plant these idle acres."

The Mississippi Forestry Commission has produced 75 million tree seedlings to be distributed to Mississippi landowners for placing at least 75,000 burdensome idle acres of this State in production to help assure the citizens of Mississippi a sound and secure future economy. Many of these seedlings have already been sold and landowners desiring to obtain seedlings should submit their application at the earliest possible time.

The occasion marked the first time in the history of the Mississippi Forestry Commission that a specific month has been designated to emphasize reforestation in our State.

WHEREAS the economy of our State is dependent to a great degree upon its timber resources; and

WHEREAS products from Mississippi forests contribute over one-half billion dollars annually to the economy, but in full production could contribute more than twice that amount; and

WHEREAS productive forests provide us with additional benefits of recreation, forage, wildlife habitat and erosion control; and

WHEREAS, at the present time, fifty-seven percent of the total State area is classified as timberland; and

WHEREAS more than six million acres of this land are in need of planting to trees; and

WHEREAS every citizen of Mississippi benefits in one way or another from trees; and

WHEREAS the Mississippi Forestry Commission has produced seventy-five million tree seedlings to be distributed to Mississippi landowners for placing at least 75,000 burdensome idle acres of this State in production to help insure the citizens of Mississippi of a sound and secure future economy; and

WHEREAS to fully realize the magnitude and importance of the State's timber resources we need to plant these idle acres; now

THEREFORE, I, Ross R. Barnett, Governor of the State of Mississippi, realizing the importance of planning for the future do hereby proclaim the month of January, 1962, as

TREE PLANTING MONTH and call upon all Mississippians to join in carrying out a tree planting campaign to assure stocking these idle acres to trees, to grow and produce for the benefit of all."
