Charter Of Incorporation Issued To Tri-State Savings & Loan Association

Iuka Firm Designed To Do Business In Miss., Ala. And Tenn.; Will Construct Office Bldg. On Eastport

Legal notice of Charter of Incorporation for the Tri-State Savings and Loan Association is published this week; thus completing the process of forming a new business in Iuka.
Incorporators of the Tri-State Savings and Loan Association are Elmo D. Davis and Carlton Woodley with Mr. Davis being designated as president and Mr. Woodley, vice-president of the firm. V. L. Adams will serve as secretary for the association. Directors from Tishomingo county will be J. L. Odum, Sam Traylor, and H. S. Massey. Ray Allen of Corinth will also be a director.
The savings and loan association will have directors and members in Tishomingo, Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah, and Itawamba counties in Mississippi and will eventually acquire permission to do business in Alabama and Tennessee, Mr. Davis said.
Stock in the association will be offered for sale for the first time next week. Officials of the new firm state that shares will be offered for \$2.50 per share with a minimum of ten shares to be sold to any one person.
Mr. Davis states that the Tri-State Savings and Loan Association will begin construction of an office building by January 15. The new building will be located on Eastport alongside Iuka Building Supply and directly across the street from the post office. Size of the new structure will be 33 feet by 100 feet and will be designed to accommodate the new business in all its activities. Completion of the building is expected to be sometime in the early spring.

Corinth Negro Robs, Attacks Local County White Woman

Criminal Assault Attempted Sunday When Victim And Baby Were Alone

A Corinth negro is being sought for robbing and attempting to criminally assault a Tishomingo county white woman. The attack and robbery occurred at the woman's home when the negro went there apparently looking for work. When he found the woman alone with her baby, he robbed her of \$17.00 and attempted to molest her. The 20-year-old victim lives on Highway 72 not far from the Alcorn-Tishomingo county line.

Tishomingo county sheriff Clarence Pace reports that an extensive search has been underway since the incident occurred but that the nearest anyone has come to catching the offender was when some teenage boys saw him late Sunday. The negro's coat was recovered late that afternoon. A Tishomingo county owned bloodhound has been used in the chase but to no avail. Officers state that it is believed the negro made his way into Corinth and is hiding in that area.

The negro's name is George Crawford, who is the same one that has been charged with raping a negro woman in Corinth about six weeks ago.

Will Vote On Union Representation

Within thirty days from November 28, an election will be held in The Tishomingo Shoe Manufacturing plant in Iuka. The election will be held under the auspices of the National Labor Relations Board to determine whether or not employees of the plant will be represented by the Boot & Shoe Workers Union AFL-CIO.
Managers of Tishomingo Shoe Company were notified by certified mail that the election should be held within thirty days from the date of the notification. The notice was dated November 28 and was signed by John J. A. Reynolds, Jr., Regional Director of the National Labor Relations Board with headquarters in Memphis.
All production and maintenance employees of the shoe plant will be eligible to vote.

12 Deer Killed In County; Duck Season Opens

Tishomingo county game wardens report that 12 deer were killed during the three-day open season last week. The wardens further report that fine sportsmanship was demonstrated generally throughout the county with hunters in the south end being extremely cooperative. "But," the wardens said, "three doe deer were killed in the north end of the county."

The wardens indicated that unless hunters obey the laws more closely and refrain from killing the doe deer in the northern part of the county, then the Game and Fish Commission would, in all probability, close that area to hunters. "We ask that you be very careful in the coming hunts that this does not happen again," the wardens said.

175 Shoe Employees Will Benefit

\$44,003 Will Be Paid Participants In Christmas Savings Program

Tishomingo shoe employees in the Iuka Shoe manufacturing plant will receive \$44,003 Friday, December 1, from their own Christmas Savings program. There were 175 local employees participating in the plan this year.
The 175 people in the Iuka plant were a part of a total group of 5,518 Genesco employees in the Company's Southern shoe manufacturing plants, who voluntarily saved \$1,613,801 through this plan of payroll deductions. Every cent was the individual's own investment. The Company acted as administrator for the employees.
"The general feeling among those who invest in this program each year seems to be that it is an easy way of saving money for use at Christmas time, or for depositing in a lump sum to their own savings accounts," H. Nelson Carmichael, vice president of the company, said.

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Fallout Shelters In Mississippi Discussed; Construction Explained

Major Alexander P. de Seversky, noted air-power expert, in his book "America: Too Young to Die," among other things, death with two of the major fallacies concerning Civil Defense in this manner: "Many people feel that atomic war is 'unthinkable'; it will mean the end of civilization and consequently no nation would dare embark upon it. Nuclear stalemate will last forever."

"THE TRUTH: Barring the instantaneous collapse of the Russian government, a contingency I do not foresee under present circumstances, war is inevitable. When the leaders in the Kremlin are convinced that their superiority in nuclear weapons and the means to deliver them are superior to ours by a proportion sufficient to enable Russia to destroy America with acceptable damage in retaliation, they will not hesitate to use them. Although the carnage will be horrible, civilization will not be wiped out—Russian civilization, that is."

"There can be no defense against atomic weapons; we are doomed to destruction and can only despair. THE TRUTH: We can defend ourselves. The very science which makes missile delivery possible provides us with the means of stopping oncoming planes and missiles. Further, precautionary civilian defense measures can save millions of lives."

Major de Seversky's learned dissertation on Civil Defense, coupled with the scientific finding of a special study group in the Rand Corporation, Rockefeller Report, Special Committee on Civil Defense of the National Academy of Sciences, and others, makes it absolutely mandatory that those of us in Civil Defense develop three comprehensive programs for the maximum survival of the people of our State and Nation. These programs are the development of a system of fallout shelters in Mississippi (family and community), an effective method of detecting and measuring radiation, and a comprehensive public information program dealing with survival techniques.

It is the recommendation of all

Civil Defense authorities, federal and state, that the priority program in Civil Defense today is fallout shelter construction. Realizing that by and large, most people in our State are gravely concerned about the world situation and are keenly aware that protective measures must be taken to provide for the security of their families. The chief problem in assisting interested individuals has been the failure to make fallout construction "respectable" for our citizens. The many people who have constructed fallout shelters have done so without advising their neighbors and friends and thereby the fallout shelter movement has not spread with the uniformity that it merits.

Let us take a hard look at the facts on fallout shelter construction. In an atomic war, blast, heat and initial radiation would kill most people close to the center of a nuclear detonation. Millions of other people, virtually everyone else, would be threatened by radioactive fallout, but most of these outside of the target area could be saved. Mississippi enjoys a unique position in relation to potential target areas in that we have very few industrial-military complexes that would invite an enemy missile attack, however, our State is immediately downwind from many possible target areas which would result in most parts being covered with radiation intensities which would be harmful to the inhabitants of our State. For this reason, it is imperative that there be a State-wide system of fallout shelter construction community and family—in order that our people will have every opportunity to survive an attack.

The United States Corps of Engineers, working with local engineering firms, will begin in the near future an engineering survey to determine the protective capabilities for community fallout shelter purposes of all existing public and private building large enough to shelter a minimum of twenty-five persons within our State.

The survey engineers working with local Civil Defense directors, will determine the safety factor of these buildings and make recom-

Harold D. Walker Participates In Training Exercise

wain's mate, USN, son of Mr. Ted L. Walker of Route 4, Iuka, while serving with Landing Craft Utility Division 11, participated in a large-scale Navy and Marine Corps training exercise observed by Admiral George W. Anderson, chief of naval operations, on Nov. 18, off the coast of Southern California.

More than 40 Navy ships and aircraft squadrons, and elements of the First Marine Division and Third Marine Aircraft Wing took part in the operation, which featured anti-submarine warfare operations, missile firing, carrier operations and an amphibious assault.

The admiral observed the at-sea phase of the exercise from the attack aircraft carrier USS Kitty Hawk and went ashore by helicopter to watch the amphibious landing in the Camp Pendleton area near Oceanside, Calif. It was his first opportunity to see the Pacific Fleet in action since assuming the Navy's top post last August.

Although this community shelter survey is very vital in the survival preparations of our State it complements and necessitates an extensive program of family fallout shelter construction. There is no federal or state program in existence that can meet the shelter needs of all the people on a community basis, therefore, local and private preparation is essential.

Municipal officials in our State need to finance and construct a prototype or example fallout shelter in a prominent place within their jurisdiction. The purpose of this prototype example shelter would be to place the endorsement of local government on family fallout shelter construction and to provide an actual fallout shelter for people to inspect and utilize in the construction of their own home shelter.

As was pointed out earlier, leadership in Civil Emergency Planning is the responsibility of elected officials at the city and county level. This leadership and guidance must be forthcoming if the Fallout Shelter Program is to succeed.

A Home Workshop

That's what a number of homemakers are adding to their homes. They may call it a utility room, the laundry room or even a putter or mud room.

But what they're talking about is a room in which they and members of their family find a place to do things no other room is equipped or has space to handle.

It may be a place to sew, to iron, to arrange flowers, to keep Junior's toys, and a place for a lot of other activities. The homemaker and her family will need to sit down together and plan the things they want to do in the space in this room.

As you study, think, look and plan, you will see a number of things that other folks do in their home workshop. Don't try to include all of them — just plan for those that meet the needs of your family.

Several families in Tishomingo County are taking part in a Home Workshop contest. Eligible to participate are those in Extension sponsored organizations as home demonstration clubs, balanced farm and home planning program or community development clubs.

oil, peanuts and peanut products and in some areas, dry beans.

For an interesting centerpiece or display on your coffee table, combine apples and nuts in a big ceramic bowl. Almost all of the nuts crops are big this year. The pecan harvest is the largest on record and the almond crop is the second largest on record. There's a big supply of peanuts, too.

1.

The corporate title of the company is:

TRI-STATE SAVINGS AND LOAN ASSOCIATION

II.

The names and addresses of the incorporators are:

The corporation is domiciled

in Iuka, Tishomingo County, Mississippi

The amount of capital stock is without limit and may be issued in such classes and on such conditions, not contrary to the provisions of Chapter 3, Title 21 of the Mississippi Code of 1942 Annotated, as the Directors may determine, provided, however, that the par value thereof shall not in any case be greater than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00). Such stock may be paid for in advance, either wholly or in part, or may be paid in monthly installments.

All shareholders and account-holders of record and all borrowers from this association and all persons obligated to this association upon loans, shall be members of the association and shall be entitled as such borrowers and obligors to one vote upon all questions at all meetings of the stockholders of the association.

Dividends shall be payable as and when declared by the Directors of the association.

Each stockholder shall have the right to withdraw his unpledged stock at any time, under due notice as provided by the by-laws of the association.

V.

The corporation shall exist for a period of ninety-nine (99) years.

VI.

The purposes for which this corporation is created and its rights and powers are:

(a) To conduct a building and loan association under the laws relating thereto as enacted by the State of Mississippi; and to the extent permitted by law to conduct said business in other states of the United States, its territories, and in foreign countries.

(b) To promote thrift by providing a convenient and safe method for people to save and invest money and to provide for the sound and economical financing of homes.

(c) To enable its members and borrowers to acquire real estate, make improvements thereon, remove encumbrances therefrom, and to lend money to be repaid in

monthly installments and otherwise as may be permitted by law.

(d) To make loans to holders of share accounts on the sole security of their savings account, upon regulations to be prescribed by the stockholders and the board of directors.

(e) To lend its funds on the security of liens upon homes or combinations of homes and business property, and upon business property.

(f) To contract loans and to make, hold, and sell loans, upon real property, or otherwise, and, in general, to do all things authorized and permitted to be done by building and loan associations by and under the provisions of Chapter III,

Volume IV, of the Mississippi Code of 1942 and the Acts amendatory thereof.

(g) To own, buy, sell, discount, assign, transfer and hypothecate any and all kinds of choses in action, notes, evidences of debt, certificates of indebtedness, participating certificates, deeds of trust, and bonds, to borrow money for any and all of its legitimate purposes; to dispose of its collateral or security when necessary to the proper operation of its business, and to own, dispose of, hold and encumber any and all kinds of real and personal property not prohibited by law.

(h) To act as agent for others in the placing or procuring of loans or as a broker thereof.

(i) To act as fiscal agent for the United States and for the State of Mississippi, when legally designated for that purpose, to the extent authorized or hereafter authorized by law, and to perform all such reasonable duties in said capacity as may be required of it.

(j) To adopt all necessary by-laws, not inconsistent with the laws of the United States, the State of Mississippi and the provisions of this charter, providing for the management of its property, the regulation and government of its affairs, the types and classes of savings accounts and conditions on which same shall be issued and, in general, for the carrying

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, DECLARING ITS INTENTION TO LEVY A TAX ON RETAIL SALES OF GROSS INCOME OF BUSINESS, AT THE RATE OF ONE PER CENT (1%), EXCEPT FOR SALES OF CERTAIN PRODUCTS HEREIN SET OUT AND CALLING FOR AN ELECTION WHEREIN THE PROPOSAL SHALL BE SUBMITTED TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID MUNICIPALITY.

BE IT ORDAINED By the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, in special session on this the 8th day of November, 1961, as follows:

SECTION 1. That the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, does by this ordinance declare its intention to levy for its benefit upon the retail sales, or gross income of business in said town a tax at the rate of one per cent (1%), except that sales of farm tractors and self-propelled, or drawn farm implements sold to farmers, automobiles, trucks and truck-tractors, shall be taxed at the rate of one half of one per cent, and sales of electricity, current, power, steam, coal, natural gas, liquefied petroleum gas, or other fuel, shall be taxed at the rate of one fourth of one per cent (¼ of 1%) when sold to a manufacturer or custom processor for industrial purposes, and provided further that the tax herein proposed to be levied shall not apply to gross income from ginning cotton, storing grain in elevators or warehouses, or railroad transportation and sales of self-propelled construction equipment.

SECTION 2. An election shall be held in the town of Iuka, Mississippi, at the Town Hall, on December 12th, 1961, between the hours of 8 o'clock A. M. and six o'clock P. M. wherein the qualified electors of said municipality shall have the choice of voting for or against the above and foregoing proposed tax levy.

SECTION 3. The Town Clerk is hereby ordered to have the within ordinance published at least once a week for three consecutive weeks in THE VIDETTE, a newspaper published in said municipality, and she is further ordered to post a copy hereof in at least 3 public places in said municipality.

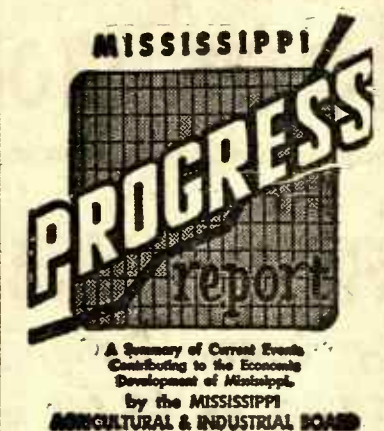

New Plant Slated For Greenville

United States Gypsum Company will begin construction of a multi-million dollar acoustical plant at Greenville late this year, according to U. S. Gypsum president Graham J. Morgan. Commerce Department Opens New Information Center

The U. S. Department of Commerce has inaugurated a new service for business—a "one-stop" information center at which visitors to the Nation's Capital can get answers to their queries on the functions and activities of the U. S. Government relating to business.

The new Business Service Center is located on the first floor of the main Commerce Building Fourteenth Street, N. W., in Washington.

"The need for a facility of this sort, in a central location in Washington, has long been recognized," Secretary of Commerce Luther Hodges said in announcing the opening of the office. "We expect this information office to speed up the businessman's contacts with his government and to save him lost motion," added the Secretary.

Hattiesburg Firm Ships To Germany

Forrest Farms poultry concern, Hattiesburg, shipped 30,000 pounds of frozen chickens to Hamburg, Germany, this month. The chickens were packed 12 per box and blast frozen at 30 degrees below zero.

New Scott County Plant Begins Operations

A new Scott County industry, the Morton Manufacturing Company, began production of pellets and crates this month. The company is a subsidiary of Mississippi Industries, Inc. A. B. Farris, president, said the company is employing about 59 persons and is supplying a market for oak, hickory and gum logs. The plant is gearing up to produce 400 to 1000 pellets a day and has orders from Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company, International Paper Company, Vickers, Inc., and Packing Material Company. Recent shipments have been made to Michigan, Ohio and Pascagoula, Mississippi.

State's Petroleum Industry Worth \$176 Million To Economy

The petroleum industry is a major contributor to Mississippi's economy. In 1960, crude oil production totaled 51,819,000 barrels with an "at well" value of \$146,648,000. About 700 wells were completed last year. Total value of all petroleum products produced in Mississippi during 1960 was \$176,383,000, and the state now ranks 10th nationally in oil production and 11th in natural gas output. Thirty-four of our 82 counties produce either oil or gas or both. Today, Mississippi's petroleum account for nearly 90 per cent of our entire mineral wealth.

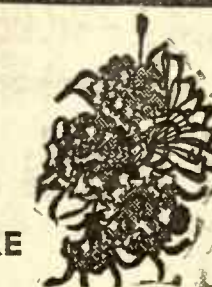

What About Agriculture?
Did you know that the farmer is America's biggest customer? He is!

Every year farmers buy more petroleum than any other industry. They buy six and a half million tons of finished steel. They buy enough rubber each year to equal the amount used in tires on all new automobiles.

They use 50 million tons of chemicals each year and more electricity than is used in the cities.

of Chicago, Detroit, Houston, Baltimore, and Boston!

The farmer also creates a lot of jobs for other people. Six to seven million persons are engaged in manufacturing and selling farm production supplies.

Seven and a half million work on farms. Ten to eleven million process and distribute farm products.

All of these equal two out of five persons employed in the United States.

With all of this, food is cheap! It has been getting cheaper for years based on the part of your income that goes for food.

In 1933-39, the consumer spent 23 percent of his income for food. In 1959, he spent only 21 percent.

And if he ate the same as he did 20 years ago, he would be spending only 16 percent of his income for food. Today's consumer is eating better for less money!

Dock and Thistle Control
It won't be long before time to spray for dock and thistle control will be here.

These come up in the fall and infest pastures. They take up plant food and space needed by good grass and legumes.

If you have pasture areas infested with these two weeds, you can get rid of them by spraying with 2,4-D. Use one pound per acre.

If the pasture has crimson clover, red clover, winter peas or vetch growing in it, do not spray with 2,4-D. The chemical will kill or badly damage these legumes.

If your pastures do not have dock and thistle except in spots, then do not spray the whole pasture. Only treat the spots where the weeds are growing.

Social Security
Do you have paid hands working for you? Remember, the wages paid most farmers are covered by social security.

Be sure your records include the name, social security number, and the hours worked by each employee. You should make your report of wages paid at the end of the year to the internal revenue service.

Girdle Blackjacks; Let Pines Grow

Now is the season for girdling blackjacks, so as to give the young pines beneath them a chance to grow.

If you don't want to girdle the blackjacks, cut them and use for fuel or whatever purpose you wish. The main idea is to remove or deaden them so sunlight can reach the young pine seedlings. What you want is for pines to grow.

An instrument called the tree injector that cuts through the outer bark and inner layers of the tree and at the same time injects a tree killer (2-4-5-T) is very effective in killing undesirable trees.

If you are interested in these

instruments, go by the Hiwassee Land Co. office and talk to Mr. Weekly, or you may be able to learn what you want to know from Leon Phillips of Phillips Hardware Store in Iuka.

Mr. Phillips has used tree injectors to deaden blackjack on areas of his woodland.
