ONE MORE BOOST FOR MISSISSIPPI'S GROWING ECONOMY

Oil and Gas are among Mississippi's most valuable resources... not only as energy or fuel, but also as a raw material for the petrochemical, chemical, plastics and other "heavy" industries Mississippi leaders are working so hard to attract.

From an economic standpoint, petroleum and natural gas constitute a major source of wealth, individual income, employment, general economic activity, and revenue to both local and state governments.

UNITIZATION

OF OIL AND GAS FIELDS

To obtain maximum benefit from the oil and gas discovered in Mississippi, scientific conservation methods must be employed to bring to the surface the greatest possible amount of these valuable resources.

Natural pressure in an oil reservoir normally will push to the surface only about 20 per cent of the oil. This means that, unless something is done to maintain underground pressure, as much as 80 per cent of the oil will be left in the ground, wasted.

Methods now are available which can double, and sometimes triple, the amount of oil produced by natural pressure only. These methods entail moving oil from one place to another in the underground reservoir, without regard for property lines on the surface. So, the interests of all the lease and royalty owners must be protected by a unitization agreement before such operations — which will increase substantially the benefits derived by all interests, including the general public — can be begun.

Unitization is a pooling of all the individual ownerships in an oil

or gas field, and the allocation of production so that each owner receives his rightful share of the total production.

Under unit operation, a field is managed and developed as a single entity or "unit"—which nature made it. Maximum efficiency and minimum waste—true conservation—can be achieved only under unit operation.

Few Mississippi fields are unitized at this time because the legal procedure for unitization has not been provided. A strategically-placed minor ownership can thwart the majority interests in their attempt to gain the benefits of unit operation.

What is needed is a law, similar to those in a number of other oil-producing states, under which the state regulatory agency (Mississippi Oil & Gas Board) can order the unitization of an oil or gas field when a substantial majority of interests in the field have agreed to a unit operating plan voluntarily, and after it has determined that unit operation is in the public interest.

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Top Residues Important Feed for Delta Cattle

An economic study of beef cattle production in the Mississippi Delta emphasizes the importance of good management. Only the efficient of the 68 farms studied showed a profit on their beef enterprise.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture economists made the study, which was cooperative with the Mississippi Branch Experiment Station at Stoneville. They are Arthur M. Coker, Fred T. Cooke, and Grady Crowe.

The average of all farms studied showed a loss on beef cattle. The economists selected the farms with the highest net return per acre in an effort to find practices contributed to their success. They reported:

An analysis of the more efficient producers in the study showed that all of these operators used good pasture, crop residue, or both. These farms had land in permanent pasture and shorter winter feeding period. Investment in buildings, equipment, and specialized equipment was lower than for all farms. Twenty percent of the operators used crop residue grazing as a means of reducing permanent pasture and supplemental feed costs.

Calves produced on the 13 more efficient farms were heavier at birth and brought more per head than those produced on the 55 farms studied. These calves averaged \$17.00 per head, more than the average for calves produced on all farms.

The importance of permanent pasture and supplemental feed cannot be over-emphasized. Items made up more than 62 percent of total operating costs on all farms and 62 percent on the efficient units.

A detailed report of the study is available on request from the Experiment Station at Stoneville or the Delta Station at Stoneville.

Growing By Study

Lesson for December 10, 1961

DECEMBER 10th of this year is celebrated all around the world by Christians as Bible Sunday. There are many fine and truthful things to be said about the Bible. The story of how it came down to us is a story of courage, brilliance and heroism. But people do not read it enough. Not even Christians, whose book it chiefly is, spend enough time on it. What conceivable good could you get out of any book if you read only from one to six inches of it a day?

Books are like foods. You expect to see half-starved people in certain oriental countries, where most people never see a square meal. But sometimes you see half-starved people in America, in the midst of abundance. This may be for several reasons. This scrawny person may eat a good deal of the wrong kind of food, or of only one kind. He may fill up on trash and not have an appetite for solid nourishment. Or he may have something wrong with his insides, so that no matter what he eats, his system does not assimilate it.

Books are something like foods. They nourish their readers—that is to say, good books do. Some books are like trash, they fill the mind and starve it at the same time. Some books may be good, but not good by themselves; as a steady diet they lack some important vitamins—like cornmeal, and lettuce, for instance. And sometimes a man or boy may read a perfectly good book and get nothing out of it, because the mind just won't take it in, or the heart rejects it. Christians, even some who read the Bible, may have scrawny souls for any of these reasons.

Growing in Mind
A person who did nothing but read the Bible day and night would not be a good Christian, just as a person who sat at the table eating, day and night, would be a mighty poor specimen physically. The Bible, however, is like corn-flakes in one respect; a few flakes a day are hardly enough. Reading it wisely and regularly, with all the help you can get, will surely nourish you.—Your mind, to begin with. A book which appealed to your emotions alone would not be a good book—it would be like the cotton candy they sell at county fairs. The Bible introduces you to great thoughts, great truths, great people. Consider Jesus; if he were the only character in the Bible, it would still be the greatest book in the world because he is the greatest person in the world. A man said of a great lady, "to love her is a liberal education." This could be said more truly about Jesus; one who comes to love Him through study of the Bible, in which He is the central figure, will find—to use Paul's words—that he is being transformed through the renewing of his mind.

Growing in Spirit
But the Bible will especially nourish the soul of the reader. The Christian grows in spirit not less than in mind. What this means can be seen from that famous passage in 1 Timothy 3:15-16. The sacred writings, Paul says, are "able to instruct you,"—not guaranteed to do so, for if you don't want to be instructed you won't be!—"to instruct you for salvation through faith." Inspired Scripture, Paul goes on to say, is profitable (among other ways) for training in righteousness. This does not mean learning some code of conduct or any set of rules. It means becoming an expert in the kind of living that Christ shows us. It means not merely doing more right things, it means becoming a more right person.

Two things are necessary for growth: food and exercise. Without the Bible, the Christian's life may be active but it is not healthy, it is the nervous activity of those who lack solid foods. On the other hand, reading the Bible or even studying it, without ever practicing it, produces spiritual indigestion, not growth. Righteousness—goodness, straightness—as the old Hebrews called it—comes by faith; but faith calls for works just as food calls for exercise, if we are to grow in strength.

a summary of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Program in the state thus far this year.

There were 676,724 cars inspected under the program. There were only 2072 vehicles rejected out of the total. Of the cars requiring repairs before being approved, 30% needed repairs or adjustment on headlights, 12% adjustment on brakes, 8% adjustment or repair to steering mechanism or alignment, 1% adjustment or replacement of tires, and 1% required adjustment to windshield wipers. The most encouraging disclosure was that 46% of the cars inspected did not require any adjustments or repairs to qualify. The average cost of repairs per car amounted to \$2.75.

A total of 1087 stations are licensed to inspect cars in the state. 900 of these are public stations that inspect in commercial locations. The remaining 187 are fleet stations that are licensed to examine only the vehicles owned or operated by the fleet owner. The distribution of the public stations is state-wide.

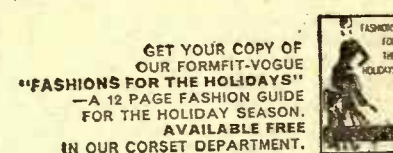
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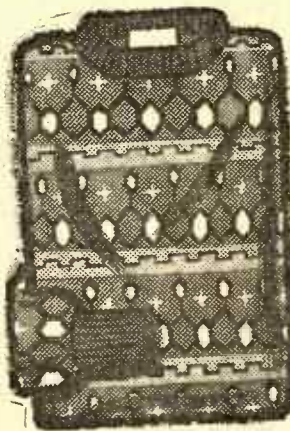
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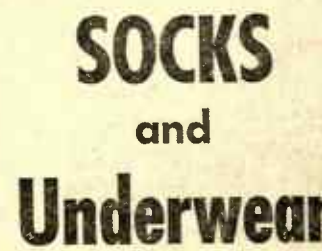
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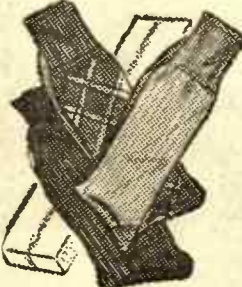
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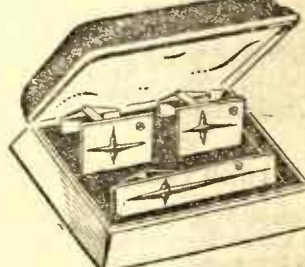
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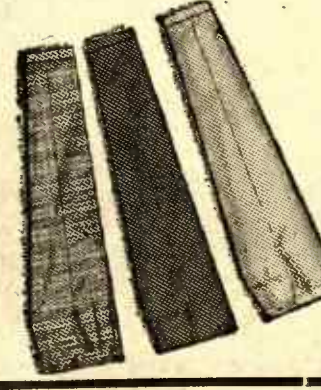
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Christmas Seals Are A Bargain

Funds Derived From Sale Promotes Year-Round Program

"The gaily colored Christmas Seals mailed to Tishomingo County residents are one of the best 'bargains' you can buy," stated Mrs. Paul Weekly, president, of the Tishomingo County Tuberculosis Association.

In an appeal to Tishomingo County residents to buy Christmas Seals, Mrs. Weekly pointed out the fact that the local tuberculosis association conducts a year-round program of tuberculosis control. Money derived from the Christmas Seal Campaign has made this possible.

Christmas Seal funds are used to discover cases of tuberculosis through X-ray examinations, to develop new and better methods of treatment, to provide rehabilitation and patient services for tuberculosis victims and their families, and to expand medical research.

"Early diagnosis and better treatment have markedly reduced the death rate of this dread disease. However, with tuberculosis striking one American every seven minutes, it is plain that we need intensive research to find the means to eradicate this disease from our nation," Mrs. Weekly said. "A portion of every dollar contributed is spent to finance research."

The only means of obtaining funds with which to carry on the extensive research program is through the sale of Christmas Seals. Each year the Seal Sale

Campaign in Tishomingo County is sponsored by the Lucy Rowe Study Club.

In checking over the contributions returned during the past few weeks, it was noted that contributions this year are falling short of those received at this same time last year. The total received to date being, \$406.50.

Citizens of the county are urged to be extra careful at this particular time of year as we approach the Yule season not to misplace their seal letters and to return them as soon as possible with a generous contribution. Each letter contained an extra sheet of seals this year, but that doesn't determine your contribution. Give what you can, but at the same time give as generous as you possibly can.

Home Agent Notes

Christmas decorations are going up all around us. People are beginning to take on the excitement, hurry and bustle of preparing for Christmas — shopping, wrapping packages, making candies, cookies and other goodies. Along with all this goes selecting and decorating the Christmas tree.

Christmas Tree Safety
Yes, you want a beautifully decorated Christmas tree, but you also want one that is safe from fire and electrical hazards.

The first step is to cut a growing tree or be sure the one you buy has not dried out. When you get it home, stand it in water until you are ready to put it in the house. Rather than keep it in the house for a long time before Christmas, why not bring it indoors just before Christmas. Then for safety's sake remove it as soon as it has served its purpose.

Remember, the larger the tree, the greater the hazard, so don't get one any larger than you need. Just before you set up the tree,

saw off the trunk at an angle at least an inch above the original cut. Put the freshly cut tree trunk in water and keep water above the cut the entire time you have the tree in your house.

Keep the tree away from fireplaces, radiators and other sources of heat. Be sure it doesn't block passageways in case of fire.

Use only electric lighting sets that have the UL label. Check lighting sets from past years for frayed wires, loose connections and broken sockets before using. Make sure the fuse in the electric circuit serving the tree is not over 15 amperes.

Make sure all tree lighting is turned off before you go to bed or leave the house.

Select Toys for Safety
Stop a minute, Daddy, Don't buy that electric train for 4-year-old Jim.

In their enthusiasm for toy buying, a lot of parents forget that a safe toy for an 8-year-old may be deadly for a 4-year-old.

Most toy accidents are caused by misuse of toys, the toy manufacturers and safety folks tell us. The two of them are working together to make toys safe.

Parents have the responsibility of joining this safety team by gauging the type toy to their child's age, making certain that toys are well built and then guiding the child in the proper use of the toy.

In well made safe toys, you won't find eyes from stuffed animals for baby to swallow (the eyes are secured to a bar inside the head). You won't find lead paint to be chewed off. You will find the UL label on electrical toys.

In safe toys corners and edges are rounded and they are built substantially enough to withstand investigation by the child of how they are made, key winding toys have a strong spring enclosed in cylinder and keys that do not revolve when the toy is in action.

Forestry Notes

By Larry Brewer
Area Forester

Landowners in Tishomingo County have been planting more than 1,000,000 seedlings each year for the past 20 years. This is a good indication that landowners in this county are carrying out definite plans for improving their timberlands. Some of these far-sighted individuals are now receiving cash benefits from the trees that they planted some 15 to 20 years ago as thinnings are being made on some of the stands.

Now that we have presented a part of the bright side of the picture, let us examine the situation still further. There are approximately 50,000 acres of land in Tishomingo County in need of planting

at the present time. There is very little chance of this area ever having any natural reproduction because there were very few, if any, seed trees left during past cutting operations. Practically all of this area is now occupied by cull hardwoods with no commercial value.

In order for this land to be put back into production, the present landowner will be out a great deal of hard labor and or considerable expense involved in planting and releasing the seedlings.

It will require approximately 50,000,000 seedlings to put these idle acres back into production. If we continue to plant only 1,000,000 trees each year, then how many years will it take to achieve our goal? It seems that we should accomplish this in less than 50 years, but we will have to proceed at a faster rate than the last 20 years if we do so.

H Savings Bond Limit Increased

To \$20,000 After Jan. 1, 1962; Limit Lowered in 1957

R. A. McRee, Jr., County Chairman of the Tishomingo County Savings Bond Committee, today hailed the Treasury's decision to raise the annual purchase limit on Series H Savings Bonds back to \$20,000 after January 1, 1962.

The limit was lowered to \$10,000 four and a half years ago. No change is being made in \$10,000

annual limit on Series E Bonds. "Since the limit was lowered to \$10,000 in 1957," Mr. McRee said, "the purchase of E and H Bonds has been opened to all types of investors except commercial banks since 1958. There has been a growing demand by smaller institutional investors for permission to buy larger amounts of H Bonds, and this was instrumental in the Treasury's decision."

To Direct March of Dimes Campaign

"Moving forward from the successful fight against polio, the 1962 New March of Dimes will support one of the most potent medical programs ever launched against chronic crippling diseases," Cecil Brown, Tishomingo County campaign director, said.

Mr. Brown's statement was made as he accepted appointment to direct the March of Dimes campaign in Tishomingo County for the 3rd successive year. The campaign will be conducted January 2 through 31.

Mr. Brown, Power Advisor and Office Manager for the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association, pointed out that the March of Dimes organization, while continuing its 24-year successful fight against polio, is also attacking crippling arthritis and birth de-

fects. "Funds are needed to support research which offers real hope of discovering preventives and cures for these diseases. This is the program that developed first the Salk Vaccine and then the Sabin vaccine — exclusively with March of Dimes funds. And we must continue our program of training vitally needed medical and scientific personnel through National Foundation fellowships and health scholarships.

"Perhaps even more important at the moment, we must aid those already stricken by these crippling. March of Dimes funds are being used now by chapters in many parts of the Nation to establish or support special treatment centers where specialized treatment and diagnosis can be given," Mr. Brown declared.

"Of course, The National Foundation is still meeting its responsibilities to aid past and present victims of paralytic polio," the fund director said. "We are faced with a big job, but you can be sure your dime will do it again if during this coming January you say 'yes' to the March of Dimes," Brown concluded. Community chairman for each town and community in the county will be announced later.

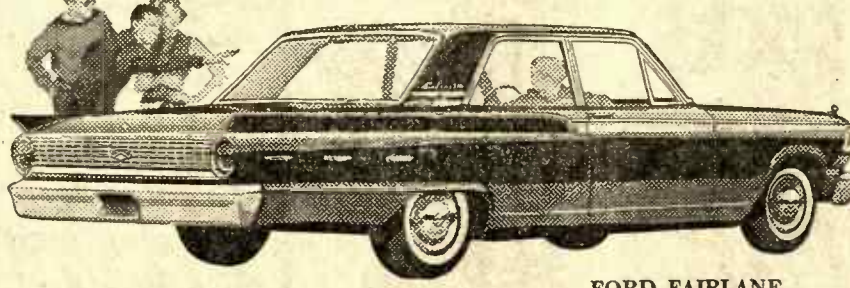

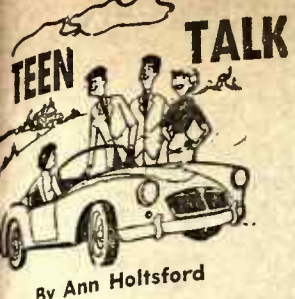

Hogs
Production can be highly profitable. That is if a farmer will follow the basic principles of feed management of hogs and raise his own grain.
A farmer raises his own grain around 700 pounds of corn and 150 pounds of good protein supplement to grow a 200 to 250 pound market hog. This is the amount of grain eaten by the hog that raises the pigs.
Now that hogs are selling at 17 cents a pound, the farmer will get a hundred pounds for his hog. At 18 cents hogs, he will get 114 pounds and at 19 cents hogs, he will get 130 pounds.
An average size family farm can take care of 10 hogs and 15 acres of corn that yields 40 acres of corn that will be needed to the acre for the 10-sow supply grain for the 160 hogs. This figure is based on two lit-
tered and sold from each sow.
Interested farmers can get in-
formation on hog layouts, water-
systems, feeding floors and
management recommenda-
tions by contacting local county

Pasture Planning
There is some pasture planning
needed to be done before 1961
and time is getting short!
Should be "Pasture Fertiliz-
ing Year." Well fertilized pas-
ture means more income.
For additional income from
pasture, it will really pay to
use those pastures.
Does not take any more labor
to manage well fertilized pasture
than the unfertilized kind.
Spring clover and legume
have not already been fer-
tilized and don't put out phos-
phorus and potash on young clovers
they are damp.
Pelleted fertilizer will help
some of the burning that
occurs.
Member, poor land will not
grow good clover. Nor will it grow
mixture of clovers and
legumes.
Help keep down voltage re-
ments to lessen the load on
batteries.
Cut off lights, radio and other
accessories before at-
tempting to start the engine. Then
the starter for short periods.
Don't grind away on it as this
cause the starter motor to be-
come overheated and put ex-
cess strain on the battery.

presidency of Northeast Mississippi

Junior College in April, 1960. He
served in that post until his re-
turn this fall to the University of
Chicago.

After graduation from State
Teachers College in Alabama in
1949, Hargett earned the M. A.
degree at George Peabody College
Nashville, Tenn. From 1954 to
1956 he took advanced work at the
University of Tennessee where he
was admitted to candidacy for the
Doctor of Education degree.

As a research assistant in 1959
to Cyril O. Houle, professor of
education at the University of Chi-
cago, Hargett conducted research
on the nature of the self-educating
adult, a project which resulted in
Houle's newly-published book, *The
Inquiring Mind* (University of Wis-

Fescue Pastures Worthwhile For Tishomingo County

Fescue pastures have proved to
be valuable to Messers W. N. (Bust-
er) Honeycutt, John Watson, Tem-
ple James, W. T. Akers and Lyle
Dean Messer.

These Soil Conservation District
Cooperators have old establish-
ed Fescue pastures that give them
grazing during the winter months.

Last winter W. N. Honeycutt
grazed eleven head of beef cattle
on five acres of well fertilized Fes-
cue. He fed some hay but much
less than half as much as he would
have had to feed had he not had
the Fescue pasture.

Farmers who planted Fescue this
fall to be grazed during the winter
of 1962 are: Clayton Dean, J. A.
Sanders, L. C. Sparks, W. J. Brink-
ley and Harmon Davis.

John Watson planted an addi-
tional 15 acres this fall.

Cattle should be taken off Fes-
cue by May 15th and kept off until
the following October or Novem-
ber.

Apply a heavy application of a
balanced fertilizer (one that has
Nitrogen, Phosphorous and Potash
in it) in May after the cattle have
been taken off. Fescue will grow
through May, June and maybe July,
where there is sufficient moisture.

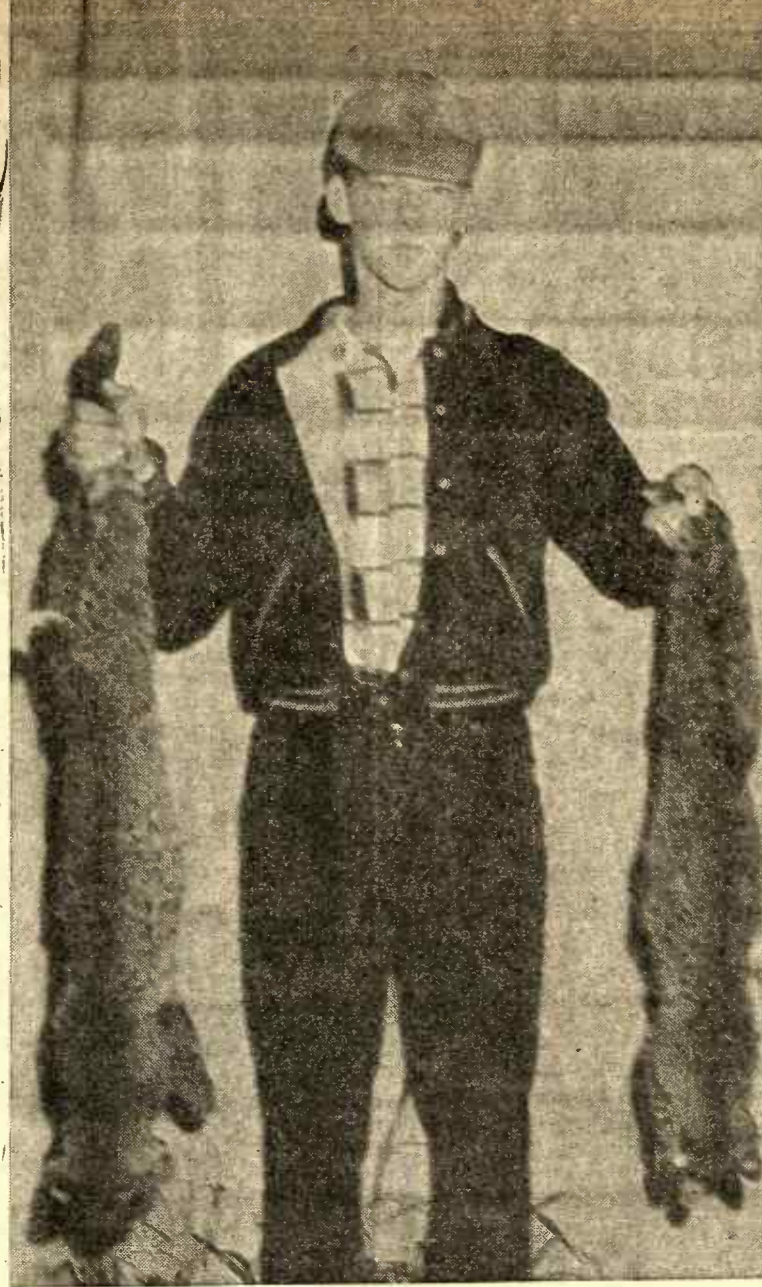
In early September, apply addi-
tional nitrogen. By managing Fes-
cue in this way, it should furnish
good grazing from October 15th to
May 15th of the following year.

Fescue pasture fertilized prop-
erly and managed right can prove to
be of great value for Tishomingo
County farmers with beef cattle.

Servi-Soft Company, has announc-
ed that he has purchased a plant
location in Verona for his com-
pany's fourth Mississippi operation.
The company installs mechanical
purifying devices for rural water
people will be employed.

Clarksdale Firm Announces Expansion

An expanded production pro-
gram to be undertaken next year
at the Clarksdale branch plant
of the American Hardware Corp.,
will provide 50 new jobs and an
additional annual payroll of
\$200,000, according to plant man-

Veterans Corner

Q—Is it too late for a disabled
World War II veteran to receive

vocational rehabilitation?

A—Disabled World War II vete-
rans must have completed their
vocational rehabilitation by July
25, 1960, except in cases (a) where
the veteran was too seriously dis-
abled to have begun earlier, (b)
in cases where the veteran received
an original discharge barring him
from training, but whose dis-
charge later was changed to make
him eligible, or (c) in certain cases
where the veteran was late in estab-
lishing his service-connected dis-
ability.

Q—What is considered wartime
service during World War I?

A—Service between April 6,
1917, through November 11, 1918.
For those who served with the U.
S. Military Forces in Russia, the
period is from April 6, 1917,
through April 1, 1920.

Q—I have a GI loan. Can I get
an amortization table from the VA
so I can keep track of my interest,
balance, etc., to facilitate my fi-
nancial planning?

A—No, the VA does not have
these tables. You might consult
your lender.

Q—How many U. S. troops were
killed in World War I as compared
with World War II?

A—There were 131,000 deaths
in service during World War I.
Deaths in service in World War II
totaled 409,000.

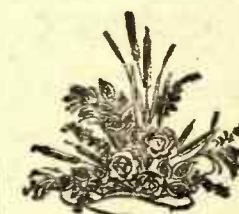
