SALES TAX ELECTIONS

TISHOMINGO LEVY PASSES BY WIDE
MARGIN; IUKA EFFORT IS BEATEN DOWN

The elections held Tuesday in Iuka and Tishomingo on the 1% sales tax levy were split down the middle with the proposal in Tishomingo being carried by a wide margin and the effort in Iuka being beaten down by a big majority.

In Tishomingo, 50 ballots were cast with 44 being in favor of the tax and 6 opposed. In Iuka 212 ballots were cast with 90 being for the tax and 122 against.

Tishomingo getting one. In Iuka, the sales tax will remain its 3 1/2% with the state getting its three percent and the City of Iuka getting one-half percent.

A spokesman for the Tishomingo government said the new tax would go into the general fund and would be used for the general operating expenses of the Town of Tishomingo.

Andy Ward is now serving as Mayor Pro Tem of Tishomingo since the death of Charlie Trimm who was, for many years, mayor of that municipality. It is expected that an election will be called to elect a mayor to fill out the unexpired term of the late Mr. Trimm.

Farmers Approve Marketing Quotas

E. N. Allen, office manager of the Tishomingo County ASC office, reports that county farmers strongly favored marketing quotas in a referendum held Tuesday of this week.

"Farmers who grow cotton cannot afford to vote out marketing quotas," Mr. Allen said. "When they vote for the controls they are assured of 30c or better for their 1962 crop of cotton," he said.

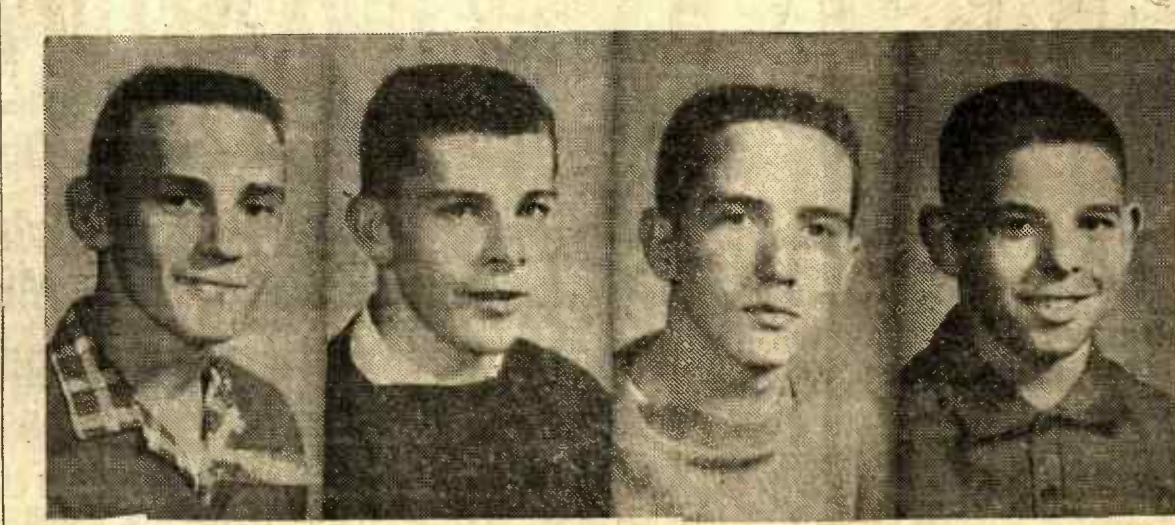

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors extends an invitation to contractors for bids to construct the addition to the Tishomingo Shoe Manufacturing plant at Iuka. The sealed proposals will be opened and publicly read at 10 a. m. on Friday, January 5.

Plans and specifications for the new construction and alterations to the plant are on file in the Chancery Clerk's office in the court house in Iuka.

Action of the board in asking for the bids is another step toward enlarging the shoe manufacturing plant that is operated by Tishomingo Shoe company which is a subsidiary of Genesco (formerly General Shoe Corp.).

An election was held on Friday, October 27, when voters in Supervisors Districts 1, 2, and 3, voted in favor of issuing up to \$350,000.00 in bonds to pay for the expansion of the plant.

According to H. Nelson Carmichael, vice president of Genesco, expansion of the plant at Iuka will increase the working space from 20,000 to 30,000 more square floor ft. The original building, constructed in 1955, contains approximately 50,000 square floor feet. After the new addition is completed and the enlarged plant is in full production, employment will be from 50 to 60 percent greater and the total number of employees should exceed six hundred.

In addition to expanding the plant, the existing building will be completely air conditioned along with the new addition.

Work on the building should be well underway by early spring.

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TISHOMINGO Migration Cost Is Heavy Drain On Mississippi

Migration cost Mississippi over 400,000 persons during the past decade, according to computations of Experiment Station sociologists. This loss, large enough to populate three cities about the size of Jackson, has turned a normally growing state population into a declining one.

Ellen S. Bryant and Dr. G. L. Wilber have recently released results of their population study at Mississippi State University. Their figures take into account the natural increase of births over deaths in the state. The net migration figure represents people who left Mississippi and their loss was not offset by other people moving in.

Their report states, in part: "When the home community cannot provide new incomes, migration becomes a necessity and can be considered a desirable method of balancing available workers to available jobs in a progressive economy."

"On the other hand the loss of investment and manpower ensuing from out-migration is a heavy financial incumbrance to residents of the state."

"If the cost of rearing and educating a child in Mississippi to age 18 is assumed to be \$12,000 per white child and \$5,000 per non-white child, the lost investment in migrating youth to Mississippi people can be estimated at somewhat over \$1 billion during the decade."

"If we assume conservatively that each white migrant would have earned \$2400 a year and each nonwhite \$1200 a year had they remained in Mississippi, migration is costing the state an additional \$600 million a year in earned wealth. When this figure is multiplied by the number of remaining working years in each migrant's lifetime, the figure becomes astronomical. If investment and production losses are added together, Mississippi's migration loss during the 1950's cost the state an average of \$700 million a year."

Pastures
Planning to set out some Coastal Bermuda this winter? If so, it will pay you to get your land ready and let rains settle it. This usually gives far better results than preparing land and setting the Coastal before the land has a chance to settle.

If you are going to plant Dallis, Bermuda or lespedeza next spring, better prepare the land now. It has been proved that you won't get a good stand of Dallis planted on a loose seedbed.

Now is also a good time to take soil samples. If you do this now you will avoid the last minute rush and get your recommendations back in plenty of time to buy needed fertilizer.

Control Roaches
Do you sometimes wonder if you can control roaches and waterbugs? The answer is definitely yes! But some of the roaches seem to have a built in resistance to some of the insecticides we have been using. Then, too, no matter what poison you use, you have to put it out right.

For resistant roaches use diazinon, malathion or Ronnel. Chlor-dane and dieldrin are also recommended if the roaches are not resistant.

Here is how to apply the insecticides: Remove all foods, dishes, pots, pans and other stuff from the kitchen cabinets. Clean shelves in cabinets, bedroom closets and bathrooms. Wash all these places with soap and water.

Brush or spray poison inside cabinets. Be sure to get poison into cracks, corners, crevices; the bottom sides of drawers and top and bottom of base boards.

Do not wipe poison off. It will continue to kill for several weeks. Poison again in around four weeks.

Care of Combine
When you finish your season's work, check the condition of your combine, or other farm machinery. Find out just what repairs are needed. Make a list of any indications of trouble.

Clean the machine thoroughly—inside and out. Run it idle long enough to work out all straw, dirt and chaff. If you leave such residues in, they hold moisture in and cause rust. Or they may freeze and cause damage. Open the doors and inspection covers so you have good light when doing the checking.

Remember, a thorough cleaning removes accumulations of weed seed.

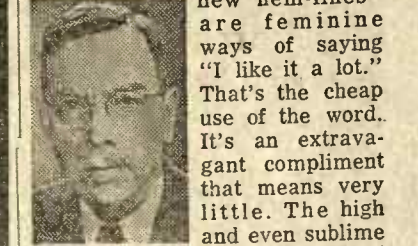

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Union Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN
Bible Material: Luke 1:26-30.
Devotional Reading: Luke 1:26-38.

Adoration

Lesson for December 17, 1961

"ADORATION" is a cheap word and a word of high dignity too, depending on who is using it, and for what. "I adore chipped beef" or "I adore these new hem-lines" are feminine ways of saying "I like it a lot."



That's the cheap use of the word. It's an extravagant compliment that means very little. The high and even sublime means worship. It comes from two Latin words meaning "pray to." To adore God is to pray to Him and worship Him. In all the high use of "adore" and "adoration" it is implied that what you adore is above you, superior to you. It is the high use of this word that we should look into.

Adoring Nothing
There are persons, as there have always been, who bow to no one and nothing. They acknowledge no superior on earth or anywhere else. They may be compelled to admit there are forces they cannot control, personal or impersonal. But they do not bow to them except of necessity, as a lawyer may yield to the judge's ruling even when he despises it. Such people regard adoration as a sign of weakness, of willingness to be trampled on. Now this attitude is good up to a point. Some things there are which we should not adore. There are powers of wickedness to whom it is wicked to bow. But that is not the point. The people of whom we speak just here are not bowing to anybody or anything, they respect nothing and no one. This means that they do not even adore what is adorable; respect what ought to be respected, or worship One who ought to be worshipped.

Adoring what is mean
Which is worse, to adore nothing or to adore what should never be adored? Among the various out-cast religions of the world are found devil-worshippers, bowing to idols which not only look fierce, frightening and ugly, but which stand for crimes such as murder and fornication. But you would not have to look far, even in America, before you would find people who, while not signed up as devil-worshippers, nevertheless admire bad things and bad men. Such people will, of course, oppose what is good. Incidentally it is hard for "nice" people who have perhaps lived among Christians all their lives, to believe that there are 100% scoundrels in the world. It is a popular notion that everybody, no matter how bad he is, has good intentions. This is not true. Some people intend no good. When that man out west picked up a bag with \$240,000 in it and returned it to the owners, he got stacks of mail condemning him for being a fool. Those letters came from people who could not understand honesty and did not admire it. What did they admire?

Adoring the Highest
In absolute contrast are those people who adore what is adorable, who bow only to the Most High. This is what we do, or wish or intend to do, in public worship. It is an interesting question what would happen if it were suddenly discovered that the all-powerful God is wicked. That will not happen; it is not true; but if it could be true that the Maker of heaven and earth is a devil, perhaps some would keep on adoring him just as men of a certain type look up to a known killer. But others, we hope most others, would refuse to bow to a devil no matter what throne might be under him. In the famous Song of Mary she praises God not alone for his greatness but for his goodness. Mary worshipping a devil would be grotesque and horrible. Mary praising the God who shows mercy is sweetly right. Worship in itself is neither good nor bad. It is good only when the One who is worshipped is good above all.

Adoring can be dangerous
We grow more and more like what we adore. If we adore nothing, we ourselves become empty and cold. If we admire people who "get away with murder" because they are smart, we shall try to get away with all we can, ourselves. But if we admire what is admirable, adore what deserves adoration, we shall come to have some likeness to the object of our prayers. To adore the God of love is to begin to live as one of his children.

Many Indications Motor Vehicles Be Inspected Twice

A year-end upsurge in traffic fatalities has given support to the Mississippi Safety Council's position that motor vehicles should be inspected twice annually—in- stead of once-a-year as now provided.

And the fact that 60 per cent of the fatalities resulted from one-car accidents is another indication checked more than just once a year.

Council President Otho Smith of Meridian, said both are factors which should be considered by the legislature when it meets in January.

"The death rate dropped im-

mediately after inspection was made earlier this year. It remained that way until October," President Smith said. "Since then, there has been an alarming increase."

Earlier this year, when the law went into effect, a lot of the cars were 'marginal' vehicles and passed the approving standards. Smith said. "They are now no way to check them up sub-marginal, yet one year period is up."

Indicative of the condition of many cars, a council official noted 70 one headlight on a car from Jackson to Hattiesburg, about 90 miles.

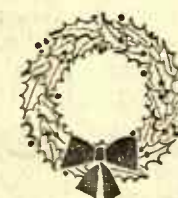

Forestry Inventory In 12 Counties Begun This Week; 2.5 Million Acres Involved

Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company have announced that they will cooperate in a forestry inventory of 12 counties in Tennessee, Mississippi, and Alabama. According to Robert D. Nelson, TVA forestry representative, the survey was started December 1 and covers approximately 2.5 million acres in Colbert, Franklin, Lauderdale, and Marion counties, Alabama; Alcorn, Itawamba, and Tishomingo counties, Mississippi; and Chester, McNairy, and Wayne counties, Tennessee. Nelson estimated that collecting the field data would require about seven months.

can be collected on exactly the same area. A. K. Dexter, manager of Tennessee River's Wood & Land Division, said his company would supply four foresters and four assistants to work under the supervision of W. B. Buckley, a TVA forester with long experience in forest inventory work. In addition, the company will supply the necessary aerial photographs and share in the cost of preparing a report, which will be available late in 1962. Dexter said the inventory data will be of great value to Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company, which at present uses about 300,000 cords of wood a year. "Right now," he said, "we have a general idea about the wood available in the vicinity of our plant. When we know exactly how much timber is on the stump, how fast it is growing, and how fast it is being used, the chance of overcutting or undercutting is eliminated. This benefits the company and the forest resource of the region." Nelson said that TVA welcomes the cooperation of industry because it helps speed up establishment of the continuous forest inventory plots throughout the Tennessee Valley. The resulting data will be valuable to all wood-using industries, resource and industrial development group, state forestry agencies, the U. S. Forest Service, and public agencies interested in forest development and water protection.

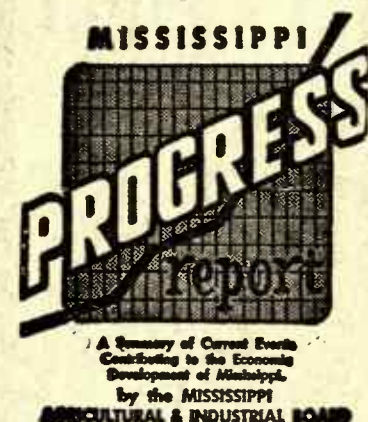

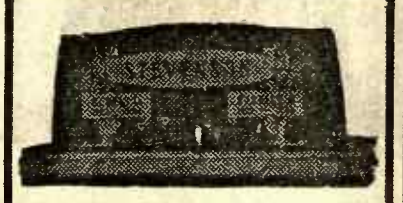
Hernando Getting New Industry

Veterans Corner

Q—My father, no longer living, had a total of 30 days of military service, all during World War I,

and he had no service-connected disability. My mother has no income of her own. Is she eligible for a pension from the VA?

A—No, thirty days of service is not long enough to meet the requirement for such a pension.

Q—Can wives and children of veterans be treated in VA hospitals?

A—Not unless they are also veterans in their own right. However, VA hospitals may furnish emergency treatment to anyone, to save a life, but payment must be made to cover the cost of the care.

Q—When will training under the GI bill end for Korea veterans?

A—No education or training under the Korea GI Bill will be furnished beyond eight years after a veteran's discharge or release from active service, or the end of his basic service period, whichever is earlier. In no event will education

and training be furnished after January 31, 1965.

Q—Do eligible incompetent veterans personally receive checks from the VA?

A—No, the VA Guardianship Service administers the financial

affairs of eligible incompetent veterans, including aid to dependents.

Stalk Fields Are Valuable For Grazing

A fairly good thumb-rule to follow in grazing stalk-land is to calculate a cow and calf from November until March 1st.

This is not as good as it sounds because, fields should not be grazed during wet weather. For this reason, the amount of grazing stalk-fields can furnish depends on how dry it is during the winter months.

Where properly managed, stalk-fields can be profitably grazed with little or no damage to the land.

A patch of Fescue to be grazed during wet weather and stalk fields to graze during dry periods will more nearly furnish all-winter grazing on the farms in Tishomingo County.

The Key to such a program is to have about 1/2 acre of Fescue planted on moist land for each cow and each cow. Remember, Fescue must be kept highly fertilized and should not be grazed or cut for hay during period, May 15 to October 1.

It is both good business and good land-use to graze stalk fields during dry periods during the winter.

The rule is: For each cow and calf, have 1/2 acre of Fescue to graze during wet weather and 3 1/2 acres of stalk fields to graze during dry periods in the winter.
