Circuit Court Will Convene Monday With 27 Civil Cases

15 Criminal Cases Will Be Placed Before Grand Jury For Indictments

January term of Tishomingo County Circuit court will get started Monday with Judge Raymond T. Jarvis presiding. Circuit Clerk Gene Robinson reports that twenty-seven civil cases will come up for hearing the first week, in addition to a number of cases that have been continued from previous sessions of court.

In addition to civil cases, fifteen new criminal cases will be turned over to the Grand Jury for possible indictment, Sheriff Clarence Pace states.

Shoe Plant Employees Reject Union

233 Vote Against Representation, 122 Vote For on Dec. 21

Employees of Tishomingo Shoe Co. in Iuka rejected union representation in an election held Thursday, December 21. Of the 371 employees voting, 233 voted against the union, 122 voted for.

A ballot was voted and 15 were challenged. The election was held in the plant under the direction of the National Labor Relations board. Seeking to represent the workers in the Iuka plant was the Boot and Shoe Workers Union, AFL-CIO, whose headquarters is located in Boston, Mass.

Thursday's contest was the first election held in the Iuka plant in over five years of operation. During the 5-year period, employment in the shoe plant has grown to over 350 employees. Further expansion of the plant is now underway with work expected to be started soon on enlarging the building. Voters in Districts One, Two, and Three, passed a bond issue recently to expand the plant. When the shoe plant reaches full capacity under expanded conditions, upwards of 600 people will be employed.

Clyde Miller, superintendent of the shoe plant, in commenting on the election said, "I am grateful that the vote turned out the way it did. I felt confident that our employees would make the decision the way they did. We have worked together in the plant to build up our production, make quality products, and to provide steady employment. I am pleased that we will be able to continue the kind of friendly and cooperative relationships we have had in the past. All of the supervisors in the plant join me in expressing our appreciation for the fine support as expressed in the way our employees voted in the election," Mr. Miller said.

The same union that sought to represent the shoe plant employees in Iuka was recently defeated for the third time at a shoe plant in Booneville.

Cotton Ginnings Up In County, Down In State

According to figures released by the U. S. Department of Commerce, cotton ginnings for 1961 were up in Tishomingo County but down in the State as a whole when compared with 1960 ginnings.

Cotton ginned in Tishomingo county prior to December 1, 1961 was 6,465 bales; for the same period in 1960 there were 6,425 bales—a difference of 40 bales. Ginnings in Mississippi as a whole up to December 1, 1961, were 1,433,783, compared to 1,447,846 for 1960.

Total number of bales ginned in the nation from the 1961 crop up to December 1, was 11,696,600.

Social Security Increase On January 1

Social Security tax rates go up again Jan. 1, with the increased revenues helping meet the cost of benefit changes which became effective under amendments signed into law June 30.

The hike amounts to one-eighth of 1 per cent for employees and employers, and to two-tenths of 1 per cent for the self-employed.

This makes the new rate 3 1/8 per cent for employee and employer, or a total payroll tax of 6 1/4 per cent for each employee, and 4.7 per cent for self-employed workers.

The tax applies to the first \$4800 of annual earnings by employees. So, the maximum annual amount of payroll tax will be \$300 instead of the present \$288, or \$150 each on employee and employer instead of \$144.

Self-employed have to earn \$400 a year before they are taxed, with the tax then being applied to all earnings up to \$4800. The new maximum tax for self-employed will be \$225.60 instead of \$216 a year.

Vehicle Inspection Jan. 1-Mar. 31

Yellow Stickers Will Be Good Until March 31, 1963

The now familiar blue and white motor vehicle inspection sticker will soon be supplanted by an entirely new and different one. The 700,000 Mississippi motorists that must have their cars inspected starting January 1, will receive black-on-yellow stickers denoting their cars have passed.

The inspection period runs from January 1, 1962 through March 31, 1962, and the stickers are valid through March 31, 1963. Director of Motor Vehicle Inspection R. L. Morgan of the Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol points out:

The inspection procedure is the same as last year. Inspection stations have been set up throughout the state to make them convenient to all drivers. The stations are under private ownership and any vehicle owner may have his vehicle inspected at any official inspection station. We encourage you to have your vehicle inspected early to avoid the last minute rush that we are sure to experience during the last two weeks of March.

First inspection of motor vehicles in Mississippi was completed by July 1 of this year. Accordingly, the motor vehicle inspection law, inspections shall be compulsory each year, however, some safety leaders state that in all probability 2 inspections will be held each year in the future.

Minor Wreck On Highway 25-S

A two-car collision on highway 25 south Wednesday at noon sent one person to the hospital. No serious injuries resulted, however, one person went to the hospital for x-ray and examination.

Involved were Louis Shoffner and Miss Grace Hester. Shoffner was traveling south and attempted to make a left-hand turn off the highway about a mile from Iuka. He was driving a '55 Chevrolet. Miss Grace Hester, driving a '60 Chevrolet, hit Shoffner's Chevrolet in the left side. Miss Hester was not injured.

Tragedy Occurred At Center Crossing In Iuka 10:30 Wednesday Morning

1961-62 Christmas and New Year holidays were marred in Tishomingo county Wednesday when a young lady was seriously injured in a car-train collision in Iuka.

In serious condition in Baptist hospital in Memphis is Miss Mimi Gaines, driver of the car. Miss Gaines received a fractured skull, a broken neck, a severed ear, and other serious lacerations and bruises.

Late reports from the Memphis hospital are that head surgery has been completed and Mimi is holding her own. Doctors report that it will be several hours before the crisis is past. A minor operation, a tracheotomy, was performed to aid her in breathing.

The collision occurred at the center railroad crossing in Iuka between a 1960 Ford Galaxie driven by Miss Gaines, and a Southern Railway freight. Miss Gaines, alone, was traveling north toward Front street and the train was traveling west. The car was knocked 105 feet by the impact. Engineer at the controls of the train was E. O. Manush, Jr., of Sheffield.

Miss Gaines was rushed by Cutshall ambulance to Tishomingo county hospital where first aid was administered before she was carried on to the Baptist hospital in Memphis.

The tragedy was investigated by Deputy Sheriff Pat Patterson who states that no cause for the collision has been determined. Investigation will continue, he said.

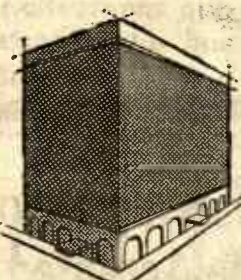

Cotton

Something wrong with your cotton in 1961? It may be a boron deficiency. Several fields throughout the hills and delta foothills showed signs of boron deficiency last year.

Some common symptoms of boron deficiency are:

Cotton plants appear stunted with short inner-nodes; rosetted type plant in upper part. Squares shed. Plants do not set much fruit. Bolls are small and knotty and do not open properly.

Stalks tend to hold leaves until late in season. Dark areas are inside at base of bolls. If these conditions describe your 1961 cotton, don't jump to conclusions. It may be boron deficiency. But it may not.

Check with your county agent. If a boron deficiency is indicated insurance is cheap. Just use fertilizer with boron in it. 3/10ths of a pound of boron to the acre will correct the problem and this should cost only 20 to 30 cents an acre.

Do not try to add boron yourself. Buy fertilizer that already contains the boron. If you try to add it yourself, you might get too much and this could injure your crop!
