Circuit Court In Session This Week; Thirty-Four True Bills Returned

Grand Jury Inspects Public Buildings,
Recommends Increase In Juror Pay

Tishomingo County Circuit Court January term is in session this week with Judge Raymond T. Jarvis presiding.

Jurors were selected Monday morning, New Year's Day, for the 1st week of the court. C. A. Crowe of Tishomingo was named foreman of the Grand Jury that held session for two days, examining witnesses, inspecting public buildings and county offices.

From the witnesses examined, the Grand Jury returned 34 true bills. True bills were returned on some of the cases from records presented as evidence from the Sheriff's office.

Among other action of the Grand Jury was a recommendation that juror's pay be increased above

the \$5.00 per day now allowed for serving and that mileage be paid jurors who live distances from the court house.

Text of the report given by the Grand Jury follows:

"In the January 1962 Term of Circuit Court of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, final Grand Jury report:

"NOW comes your grand jury for the January 1962 term of Circuit Court of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and begs leave to submit its final report.

"We have been in session two days, have examined 18 witnesses, and have returned into open court 34 true bills.

"We have examined by committee the county home, county jail, all the factories of the county, the movie theatres, the hotel of more than two stories, the tax collector's books and the county auditor's books.

"We find the county home to be in good condition and its inmates properly provided for and looked after except that one inmate is living alone in an old frame building separate from the main building, and the grand jury recommends that no inmates be quartered in the said old frame building.

"We find the county jail to be in good condition, and the prisoners properly supervised.

"We find all the factories of the county to be in good, safe condition, equipped properly with exit doors opening outwardly as required by law and properly marked, except that at the Iuka Shirt Company the door on the west side of the building was found to be latched, and this constitutes a hazard, and also the grand jury found that the said door when unlatched was difficult to open, which condition the grand jury also finds hazardous, and the grand jury recommends that this situation be called to the attention of the management of the company along with the recommendation that the situation be immediately corrected.

"The grand jury recommends that the present compensation for jurors of \$5.00 per day be increased, and that mileage be paid each way for each days attendance in court.

"We find that the tax collector's books and the county auditor's books appear to be neat, well-kept and in balance.

"We find that the hotels are in safe condition.

"And NOW having concluded our labors, we respectfully request to be finally discharged.

Iuka City Board Moves To Stop Parking Permits

Other Parking Practices Affected By
Motion Of Aldermen At Jan. Meeting

Among other business transacted by the Iuka mayor and Board of Aldermen at the regular monthly meeting held Tuesday night was the motion to discontinue all parking permits as of the First of 1962. It has been the practice of the city to sell parking permits for \$1.00 per month that would allow the owner of the permit to park his vehicle anywhere in the city without paying further parking meter charges. The vehicle for which the permit was purchased was identified with a sticker. According to action of the Board Tuesday night, these stickers will not be available any longer and the permits will not be allowed.

Among other action affecting

parking practices in the city of Iuka was the motion to move all taxi stands that occupy parking meter spaces to the south side of Front Street. This motion was made and carried to be put in effect for a period of thirty days.

Reason for action pertaining to parking meters is that parking permits and taxi stands occupy a good portion of the parking spaces on the north side of Front Street, spaces adjacent to retail merchant establishments. Complaints to members of the Board were that customers could not park close to the stores in which they wanted to do business.

Among other important business conducted by the Board was a motion to advertise for bids to drill an additional water well for the city. Officials, realizing that each summer a shortage of water always occurs, expressed a determination to increase the water supply and thus possibly avoid further water shortages in the future. Bids for drilling the water well are to be opened at the next regular meeting of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen.

And among other business discussed was the drainage along the north side of Eastport street east of the Iuka post office. In the discussion, it was pointed out that approximately 150 feet of 18 inch concrete tile had become stopped to the extent that no water could pass through. As a result, several of the lawns in the Meadowbrook subdivision have become flooded with black motor oil and other debris that has floated down from higher areas of the city. Officials voted Tuesday night to remove all the tile on the north side of Eastport east of the post office, except that which is used for driveways and streets. The reasoning was that shorter distances of the tile can be kept clean, thereby letting water and debris drain into Indian Creek as intended.

Bills presented to the city were paid out of general fund and the water and gas accounts.

Tuesday night's meeting adjourned after discussing a social plan for the benefit of the officials, and their wives, date and place to be named.

Heart Fund Planning Session

To Convene
In Tupelo

Heart volunteers from six counties are expected in Tupelo on Thursday, January 11, to attend a February Heart Fund planning session in the Rex Plaza Motel.

"The Heart Future," and how it can be influenced by Mississippi Heart Association programs of research, education, and community service will be the challenging topic for the annual kick-off.

James L. Ballard of Tupelo, district 14 chairman, will preside at the 7:00 p. m. dinner when Dr. Eugene Murphey, III, of Tupelo, will review the magnitude of the heart disease problem, noting that 10,216 Mississippians died of heart disease last year. Dr. Murphey is a former heart association board member.

Gen. A. G. Paxton of Greenville, Mississippi Heart Association president, will point out the urgent need for more money to support research into the cause and cure of heart disease and to step up the benefits of education and community services. According to Gen. Paxton, generous citizens in district 14 invested \$11,740 in heart disease relief through last year's Heart Fund. Some \$5,700 of that sum is currently allocated to research and training, he states.

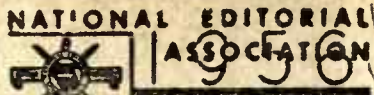

CAPITAL NEWS

Farm Cash Receipts For 1961

Increased agricultural income for Mississippi is reflected in that the total cash receipts from farm marketings in the first three quarters of 1961 exceeded \$279,980,000. This income was a gain over the same period last year. Cotton income and other marketings during the last quarter of 1961 will substantially boost Mississippi's agricultural "take" for the current year, which has earmarks of being one of the best to date in spite of numerous problems.

State's Job and Income Picture

Non-farm payrolls set a new employment record for the month of October — 1,800 jobs above the previous high of 417,600, and 11,000 over a year ago. The new

total included 121,900 in manufacturing, 94,000 in government, 84,000 in trade, 34,000 in services, 27,800 in construction, communication and public utilities, 14,000 in finance, insurance and real estate, and 6,400 in mining. Manufacturing, finance, and construction registered increases. Total personal income for the first nine months was \$1,894,900,000.

Good Farm Management

The Mississippi farmer and the businessman in town have much more in common than is generally realized. Both must operate on sound management practices. Agricultural leaders are stressing that while good management has always been a key to greater farm prosperity, it has never been more essential than now. In modern agriculture as in business and industry, sound management is more important today than ever before.

Pasture Work Time

There is a lot to be done pasture-wise right now for management of winter grazing is important. Even if there is plenty of growth for grazing, livestock should be moved off land if it is too wet. More damage will be done by grazing fire lanes around pastures is also a good idea. Now is also an ideal time to take soil samples for fertilizer analysis.

Public Health Program

This is a good time to point with pride at the efficient programs carried out by public health leaders and workers in the state. The strides the Magnolia State is making in economic growth, as well as in other lines, would have been impossible without strong public health programs through the years. These programs conserved the human resources of the state. The elimination of pellagra, hookworm, malaria and a few other diseases were the essential public health problems which had to be solved before a human working force could be established. The elimination of these health problems made possible, first, development in agriculture, and then the growth of an industrial economy. The dividends of sound public health work can be paid back.

Squirrel Hunting

Squirrels are still the favorite target of more sportsmen than any other species of game in Mississippi, but the commanding lead once held by this species has been cut to a thin edge the last few years as the state's hardwood for-

ests are cut out and the squirrel population declines. In 1948, 80 per cent of the hunters squirrel hunted at least once during the year; 60 per cent quail hunted; 37 per cent rabbit hunted; 37 per cent dove hunted; 13 per cent duck hunted, and 12 per cent deer hunted. In 1960, the squirrel hunters still held a majority but only by the narrowest of margins. Running a close second were quail hunters.

More State Families

Have Life Insurance

Mississippi families have an impressive record in the matter of life insurance protection, owning \$3.4 billion worth at the beginning of 1961. Purchases of new ordinary life insurance by Mississippi families in 1960 totaled \$367,000—over three and one-half times the amount purchased a decade ago. Aggregate ordinary insurance ownership in the state was \$1,900,000,000 at the beginning of 1961, under 442,000 individual policies.

Mississippi's Development

The immediate future holds promise of even greater economic development for Mississippi. There is an abundant natural resource supply, ample labor, favorable climate, a positive attitude, and many other strategic advantages. Sound planning and intelligent effort can be the key to making the most of these economic opportunities.

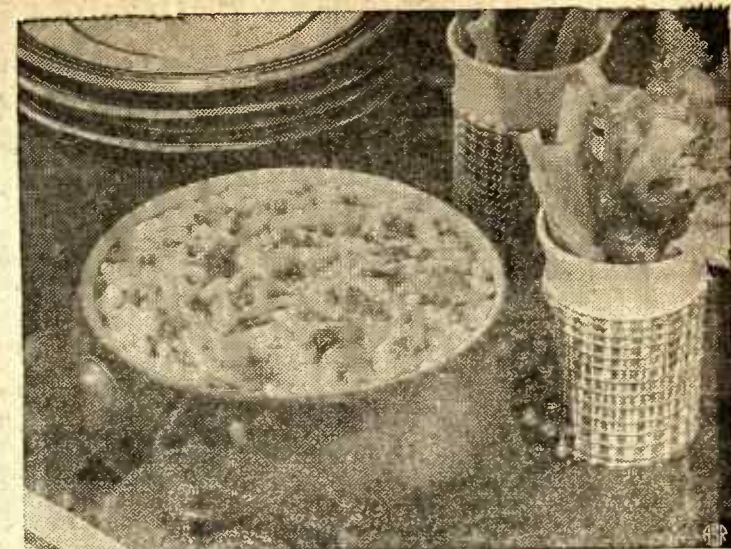

Here's how to figure your cost:



To figure the monthly cost of using any electric appliance you must know three things:

1. The number of kilowatt-hours that the appliance will use.
2. How much electricity costs.
3. The number of kilowatt-hours that you now use in one month.

From the table above, you found the number of kilowatt-hours that an appliance will use in one month. The chart on the right shows how much you pay for electricity. You can get the number of kilowatt-hours that you now use from an old bill. (This can also be estimated from the chart on the right.)

How to use this information...

Let's say you now use around 150 kwh a month. Your bill runs around \$3.50 a month. And you'd like to know how much it will cost to operate an electric range. From the figures at the top of the page, you see that an electric range uses about 150 kwh a month. Add this to the number of kwh you now use. The new total is 300 kwh. From the chart on the right, you find that you'd pay \$5.50 for 300 kwh. That

means your bill would go up about \$2.00 a month—less than 7¢ a day — when you add an electric range. (If you now use more than 150 kwh a month, it would be even less!) Notice that although the amount of electricity used exactly doubled, the size of the bill went up only \$2.00 — from \$3.50 to \$5.50. Agriculture Is Healthy

Everyone knows that the nation is blessed with an abundance variety and high quality of food. But what about the cost? The average American spends only around 20 percent of his free-to-spend income for food. That is more than two per cent less than he spent in 1939!

The Russians people spend an average of 56 percent of their income for food.

The surplus of some agricultural products may be a blessing in disguise. Think how it would be if we had that much of a shortage of the same items.

Russia and her satellites have serious agricultural shortage. Nations short on food hesitate to make war on a nation with an abundance of food.

Only around nine percent of our people grow food and fiber for the rest of us. This releases manpower for the armed forces and other necessary activities. Most other countries are not doing nearly so well in proportion to their total populations.

Cottonseed 1962
Don't wait. Now is the time to check your cotton planting seed source.

If you are planning to save your own seed, better get a germination test made. Store the seed at least two weeks before taking a sample and sending the sample off to be tested.

Take a uniform sample. Get a small handful of seed from several places throughout the stored seed. Each sample should contain around one quart of seed.

Send the sample to the Mississippi Seed Testing Laboratory at Mississippi State University for a free germination test.

If you do not have enough seed of your own to plant your 1962 acreage, now is a good time to locate some good, high germination planting seed.

Entomology Meeting
The eighth annual Mississippi Insect Control Conference will be held at Mississippi State University January 4-5.

The conference will feature research reports on insect control for row crops and livestock. The 1962 cotton insect control recommendations will be released at the close of the conference.

Veterans' Corner

A—Yes

holds re-employment rights in a Federal agency, but the agency refuses to re-employ him, to whom does he appeal his case?

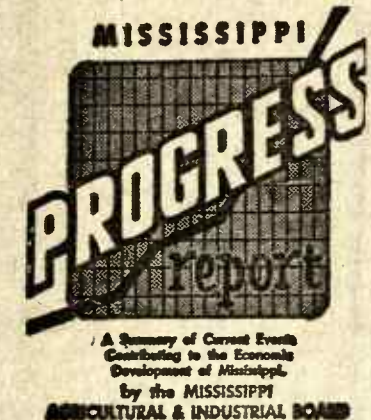
A—In the case of a field service position, appeal should be made to the Civil Service Regional Office having jurisdiction over the area; in case of a departmental service job or central office position, appeal should be made to the Central Office of the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

Q—I am a World War I disabled veteran drawing service-connected disability compensation from the VA. In the event of my death, what benefits (if any) would my wife be entitled to?

A—If your death resulted from your service-connected disability, your wife would be entitled to compensation. If your death resulted from a non-service-connected cause, your wife would be entitled to a pension depending upon her annual income.

Q—I know one widow of a Spanish-American War veteran who receives \$65 a month. Another one gets \$75 a month. Would you explain the difference?

A—The \$75 check goes to the widow of a Spanish-American War veteran who was married to the veteran during all or part of that war. The widow who married such a veteran after the war will receive the \$65 check.



Cold Storage Warehouse

To Be Built In Jackson

Surveys by the research firm of A. D. Little, Inc., of Cambridge, Mass., authorized by the Agricultural and Industrial Board to determine the feasibility of new industries utilizing natural resources of the state, have borne fruit in the announcement of the largest cold-storage warehouse in the Southeast—to be located in Jackson. The Little firm is making 15 feasibility studies for the A & I Board, and the first such study completed by Little indicated the feasibility of such a warehouse operation.

Officials of a new Mississippi corporation, the Gulf States Cold Storage Warehouse Company, said construction of a \$1,200,000 building will begin in Jackson as soon as weather permits. The 100,000-square-foot building will be located on Highway 51 South. It will have blast freezing facilities for 100,000 pounds of frozen foods per day and will contain holding facilities for over 20,000,000 pounds at one time. The warehouse will employ 25.

Board officials said establishment of the centrally-located warehouse will facilitate the establishment of additional food processing plants throughout the state, resulting in more income for farmers as well as employment in the plants. The A. D. Little surveys were made possible by a special legislative appropriation to encourage more "home-grown" industry.

Ingalls Starts Work

On 6th Cargo Vessel

Shipway construction started this month on the 572-ton cargo liner SS African Neptune, the fourth in a series of six vessels being built by the Ingalls Shipbuilding Corporation, Pascagoula, for Farrell Lines, Inc., New York. The new vessel will be a steam-turbine, single screw ship with a total cargo capacity of 11,400 tons. Already under construction at the Pascagoula yards are the Farrell ships Comet, Meteor and Mercury. Construction of the remaining two will begin early next year.

Steel Unloaded

At Natchez Port

A shipment of between two and three tons of new steel was unloaded recently at the Natchez-Adams County port, according to port director Larry Barry. The steel was consigned to the Natchez Scrap Material Company and was shipped from the South Chicago Works of United Steel.

State's Oil Production

May Set New Record

Mississippi's oil production for 1961 may exceed last year's record high of 51,606,261 barrels. Through November, the state had produced a total of 45,223,659 barrels. The increase in production is due largely to the great number of wells during the year in proven areas.

Importance Of Central Mississippi

As Growing Livestock Center Cited

Jackson and central Mississippi seem to be well on the way to becoming the cattle center of the South. Livestock sales in the area, many of which are sponsored by the Mississippi Livestock Producers Association, bring millions of dollars to this area each year. The sale of cattle alone brings an average of \$1 million a month to local banks. The association, which began operations in 1955, has two sales yards in Jackson and serves 23 central Mississippi counties. Some 15,000 livestock growers and farmers are served by the co-operative association. Sales figures for 1961 show that the MLPA will handle more than 136,000 cattle. This is an increase of nearly 13,000 over 1960 totals, association officials said. Other sales in 1961 will include some 14,000 hogs, nearly 8,000 sheep and more than 2,000 horses.

Test Compares Two Systems Of Handling Steers

When winter grazing crops get so short that steers need other feed, cattlemen wonder if they should give the steers additional feed on pasture or move them to dry lot feeding while waiting for

the pasture to recover.

In a recent Mississippi Experiment Station test, Animal Husbandman Leon Williams found little difference in the two systems of management.

Mr. Williams left one group of steers on winter pasture for 219 days, from October 24 to May 22. When grazing became short during this time, he provided sorghum silage, corn and cottonseed meal for the steers on pasture, discontinuing the feed when grass became available. Feed was required for a 30-day period. Another group of steers was moved to dry lot and fed the same ration during the 30-day period of grass shortage.

There was practically no difference in the performance of the two groups, Mr. Williams said. One group gained 1.57 pounds daily and the other 1.54. Gains per steer in one group were 329 pounds compared to 323 in the other. It was observed, however, that steers gained more slowly while in dry lot but they gained more rapidly when returned to grass.

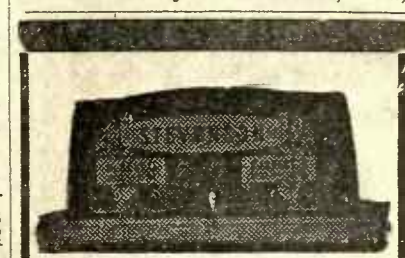
Selling price for the two groups was almost equal, with a slight advantage for the steers that remained on pasture. No damage was done to the sod by constant grazing, but Mr. Williams says under extreme weather conditions removal of all or part of the cattle may be necessary to prevent sod damage.

The complete report is published in the December issue of Mississippi Farm Research available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

grading have been accomplished. The State Aid System, Moore explained, is composed of 11,655 miles of principal County roads. "These State Aid roads in the various Counties are not a part of the State Highway System, but are County primary roads which are more important to the overall traffic pattern than less-traveled parts of the County System."

About \$10.2 million is available each year under the State Aid program for the construction of these roads, Moore explained. These funds include half of Mississippi's Federal Aid Secondary Fund allocation, which amounts to about \$2.7 million, and \$7.5 million which is set aside from a percentage of the State Sales Tax.

Although the State Aid Division administers the program at the State level, State Aid contracts are awarded by the County Boards of Supervisors. Moore said the Counties provide engineering and rights of way, with Engineers of the State Aid Division coordinating the program by approving plans, specifications, contracts and construction.

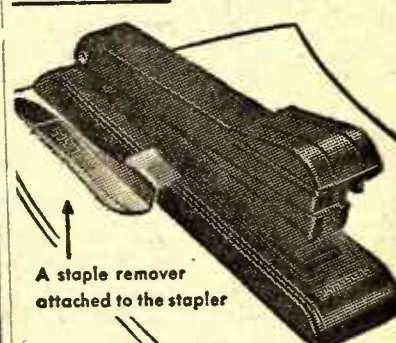

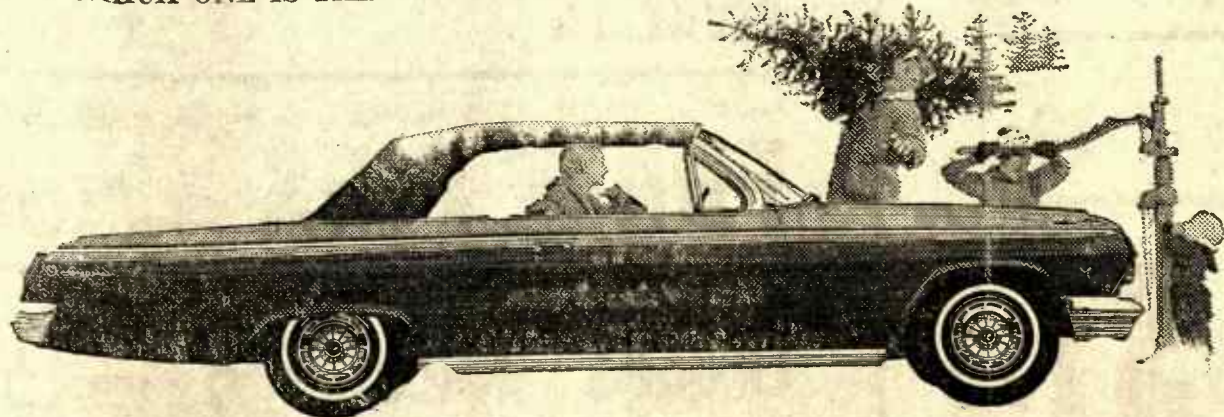

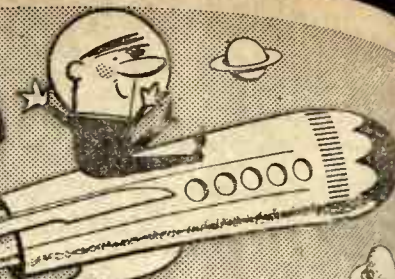
