HEAVY SNOW CURTAILS ACTIVITIES

An almost record snowfall Tuesday brought normal activity to a standstill with residents performing only those jobs that were absolutely necessary. Approximately seven inches of snow fell during the hours from early Tuesday morning until late Tuesday night.

Temperatures ranged from zero early Wednesday to below freezing all day Tuesday with only a slight rise indicated for Wednesday and Thursday. Predicted temperatures for Thursday were 18 to 25 with Friday to remain about the same. In other words, according to the weatherman, snow and continued cold will be with us for several days to come.

Schools in the area closed Tuesday morning and will remain closed until road conditions permit safe travel by school buses. A number of manufacturing plants have closed due to the extremely cold weather; they include Blue Bell plants at Tishomingo, Belmont, Red Bay and Fulton, and the Iuka Shirt Co. plant. Delivery of mail has also been curtailed.

Tishomingo County Circuit Court that has been in session recessed early Tuesday morning to reconvene when conditions will permit. The Iuka Library will remain closed during the severe weather and the Miss. Employment Security representatives that came to the county courthouse each Wednesday were unable to get there this week.

The highway patrol says traveling conditions are extremely hazardous throughout the area with most highways being closed by drifting snow and traffic pileups.

Tuesday's snowfall was one of the heaviest in the history of the state of Mississippi with the capital city of Jackson receiving a near record amount. In Jackson, hundreds of cars stalled on the main thoroughfares late Tuesday. No snow fell along the Gulf coast but freezing rain covered highways with a sheet of ice. However, snow did fall as far south as McComb.

Dr. A. L. Gray, Mississippi's health officer, said Tuesday night that radio activity in the present snowfall was "much higher than expected". But, he said, there is "little cause for alarm". He says there will be no after affects from playing in the snow, but warned against eating excessive amounts.

ORVILLE E. BOSTICK NAMED STATE CHAIRMAN OF ASCS COMMITTEE

**Tishomingo County Civic Leader Is
Elevated In Important Committee
By Secretary Of Agriculture Freeman**

Orville E. Bostick of Golden has been appointed as Chairman of the State ASCS Committee. The appointment was made by National Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman and was effective beginning with January 1, 1962.

Mr. Bostick has become well known for his leadership in farm programs. In 1943 he was elected by farmers in his community to serve on the County ASCS committee. He held this position until 1958 when he was appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture to the State ASCS committee with offices in Jackson, Mississippi.

Mr. Bostick's responsibilities on the County ASCS Committee was to work with other committeemen and the ASCS office manager Ellett N. Allen in the formation of policies and the approval of work in the several programs carried on by the ASCS agency. Among them were the ACP program; the Marketing Quota program; Price Support; Commodity Loan Program; Farm Storage Facility Loan Program; and the Feed Grain Program.

In 1958, when Mr. Bostick was appointed to the State ASCS committee, his duties were primarily the same except on an expanded scale. He received the appointment in 1958 over a number of other names that had been turned in for possible appointment.

Mr. Bostick's reputation as a farmer and his interest in farm problems has prompted Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman to appoint Mr. Bostick as chairman of the State ASCS committee.

Citizens of Tishomingo County take great pride in Mr. Bostick's appointment to this important post in agriculture in the state. Mr. Bostick has demonstrated his ability as a leader in his field and it is gratifying to know that a man of his high calibre will be at the head of the state's most powerful agricultural agency.

County Board Of Education

**Approved 3% Cut On
Grades For Each
Un-Excused Absence**

The Tishomingo County Board of Education met in regular session December 13 and approved the following policy relative to student absences in County Unit Attendance Centers.

Beginning with the 1962 second semester, students grades will be cut 3% of each six weeks average for each un-excused absence; acceptable excused absences being only for sickness. Written proof from parents, or from a doctor, will be required.

The action was taken to prevent the possible loss of teacher units due to excessive absences of students; thereby impairing the efficiency of school operations.

Shelly Wood Fatally Injured In Ala. Wreck Sat. Night

**Tragedy Occurred On Buzzard Roost
Bridge Near Cherokee On Icy Road**

Shelly Walter Wood, 61, of Burnsville was killed in a two-car collision Saturday night. His brother, Jourdan Wood, was carried to a Memphis hospital with crushed arm and leg and other injuries.

The tragedy occurred on Buzzard Roost Creek bridge about four miles west of Cherokee on U. S. 72. The bridge, it is reported, was iced over and driving was hazardous. Jourdan Wood was driver of the car in which his brother was a passenger.

The Richard Harris family of Decatur was occupants of the other car involved in the wreck. Members of that family were given first aid in Colbert county hospital and three were later transferred to Decatur. None of them was seriously injured.

First aid was given Jourdan Wood in Tishomingo County Hospital at Iuka before he was carried to the hospital in Memphis.

Funeral services for Shelly Walter Wood were held Monday afternoon at Prospect Baptist Church at 2 o'clock with the Rev. W. C. Hamilton and the Rev. Marvin Grubbs officiating.

In addition to his brother, Jourdan Wood, survivors include 4 sisters, Mrs. Davie Turner of Tishomingo, Mrs. Etta Yow of Iuka, Mrs. Lola McKee of Sheffield, and Mrs. Ivy Daily of Burnsville.

Postal authorities state that these booklets cannot be mailed but can be obtained at public counters in all post offices. Officials state that if you would like to get one of these booklets and not to please ask for them.

Booklet is designed to "give the people the facts they need to know about the dangers of atomic attack and what to do to protect themselves." Actual information in the booklet has been verified by independent scientific authorities, and it is the best census of the community that can be obtained.

Booklet also describes the civil defense program. It tells what are prudent things to do in the light of the knowledge of what might happen and proper evaluation of the scientific facts.

Booklet contains description of atomic bombs and fallout. It tells various types of shelters that can be constructed for families, churches, and communities. It gives instructions for householders in fallout shelters, giving instructions concerning food, first aid, radiation, sick and other items. 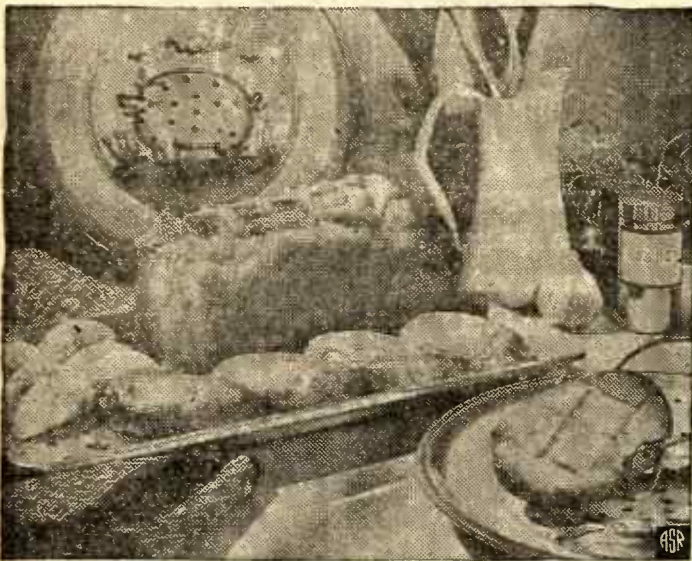

Good Eating From Idaho



Halved Idaho Russet potatoes and Sweet Spanish onions baked in the drippings of the roast loin of pork make a mighty good, as well as obliging, all-in-the-oven meal. Serve it with coleslaw or Waldorf salad, hot rolls, beverage, a light or no dessert. Here is a menu you'll repeat many times.

These two famous Idaho-grown vegetables, such good buys in our markets now, may be served in so many ways that they may well become the backbone of many a meal, sometimes a meal in themselves. Couldn't you make a meal of a big "Baked Idaho" or a Ham-and-Rice Stuffed Onion? M-m-m!

Roast Loin of Pork with Dripping-Baked Potatoes and Onions

(for 6 servings)

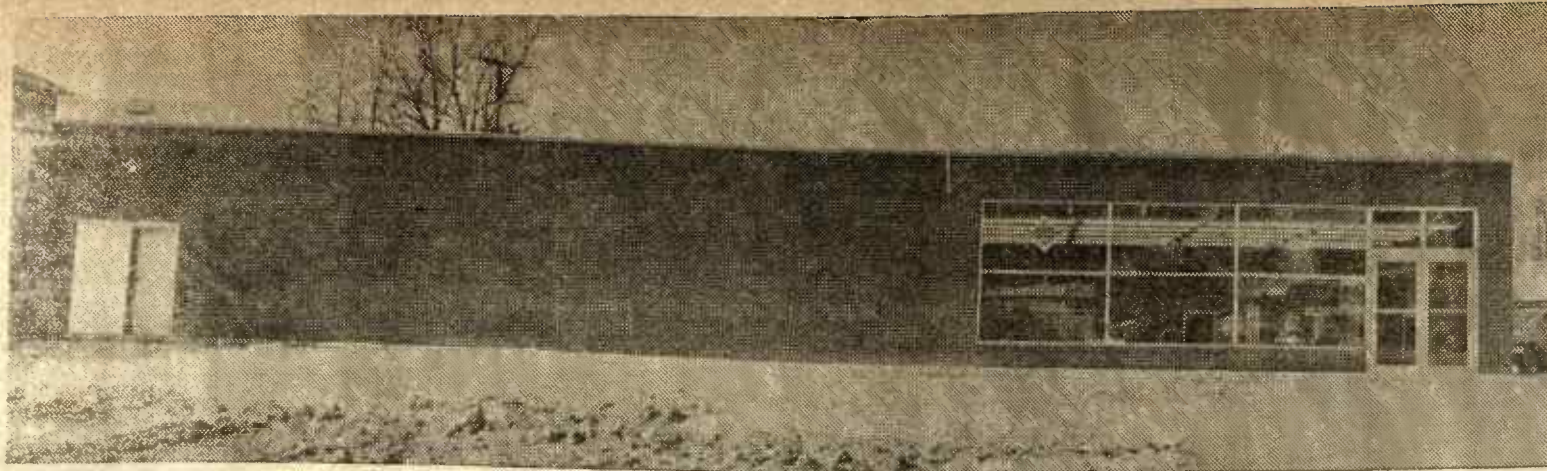
4-pound pork loin roast powdered sage
 3 or 4 large Idaho potatoes salt and pepper
 3 large Idaho Sweet Spanish onions

Pre-heat oven to 325 degrees F. (slightly under moderate). Allow 2 hours for total cooking time. Place pork in shallow pan with room enough to put vegetables around meat. Rub with salt and coarse-grind black pepper. Place in oven while preparing vegetables which should be around 15 minutes.

Peel onions, cut in quarters lengthwise. Scrub potatoes thoroughly. Do not peel. Cut in halves lengthwise. On cut side make diamond shapes by uniformly cutting crisscross just the slightest bit with a sharp knife. Sprinkle cut side lightly with salt.

Take pork from oven. Place onion quarters and potato halves, skin side up, around pork. Sprinkle onion lightly with salt and powdered sage. Return pan to oven. After a half hour, baste vegetables with drippings from meat. Repeat twice. The whole meal will be ready 2 hours after pork is placed in the oven. Vegetables should be fork-tender and a meat thermometer in pork should read 185 degrees F. Always serve fresh pork well-done. It should be gray with no tinge of pink.

Remove pork and vegetables to warm platter, placing potatoes cut side up. The roast pork drippings will have cooked into the potatoes and onions giving them a fine flavor. Gravy may be made with remaining drippings.

Huntsville Boom Of Interest To Hancock

A recent report from Huntsville, Ala., home of the Redstone Arsenal, indicates what Hancock County might have to look forward to as the site of a Saturn moon rocket test facility, since the test center in Mississippi will operate under the Alabama unit, both under the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The annual payroll of the Redstone Arsenal was estimated at \$170,000,000 in a recent Associated Press story from Huntsville. Another estimate in the story was that the operation pours \$350,000,000 a year into the economy of Alabama. Location of the arsenal some ten years ago jumped Huntsville's population from 18,000 in 1950 to 72,000 today.

Although the Redstone Arsenal is Huntsville's major means of economic support, a Huntsville Industrial Expansion Committee is active on behalf of the city and Madison county, in which it is located. The committee recently hired a Mississippi industrialization expert, Guy E. Nerren, to attract new industry. Nerren until recently was assistant director of the industrial development department of the Delta Council, with headquarters at Stoneville, Miss.

1961 Set New Records For Industrial Growth

The year 1961 was a record year for capital investment in Mississippi (according to a tabulation by the Agricultural and Industrial Board based upon estimates made on the local level. Capital investment totaled \$179,160,000, including \$154,890,000 for 83 new industries plus \$24,270,000 invested in the expansion of 68 existing industries in the state.

The capital investment total for 1961 included the largest single initial investment in Mississippi history—the \$125,000,000 refinery at Pascagoula to be built by Standard Oil of Kentucky.

When they reach full production, the new industries will provide an estimated 7018 new jobs and the expansions another 3305, for a total of 10,323 new jobs created by 1961 announcements.

The 1960 totals were 81 new plants with 7715 new jobs (\$54,522,000 invested) and 45 expansions with 2293 new jobs (\$8,876,000 invested), or a total of 10,008 new jobs and \$63,298,000 in capital investment.

In port development, a huge new grain elevator was dedicated at Pascagoula and plans were in the making for a banana terminal at Gulfport. Both projects were expected to boost Mississippi's world trade.

Tourist inquiries in 1961 will hit a new all-time high of about 100,000, as compared to 65,438 in 1960.

Surveys made for the A&I Board by A. D. Little, Inc., Cambridge, Mass., resulted in establishment at Jackson of a cold-storage warehouse.

house. This and additional surveys will determine the feasibility of new manufacturing and processing plants using the state's agricultural products.

The state's new Revenue Bond Act, passed in 1960, was used for the first time in 1961 for expansions by Sardin Luggage Co., at Sardin and by Pennsylvania Tire and Rubber Co. at Tupelo.

Also used for the first time was the 1960 law providing funds for industrial park studies. An industrial park bond issue was passed at Eupora, and two other studies were authorized for Aberdeen and Canton.

Industrial development in the state during the year and Governor Barnett's personal interest in this development, including his industrial trips, won for him the United Press International "Man of the Year" for 1961 in Mississippi.

Wurlitzer In Corinth Announces Expansion

The Wurlitzer Company in Corinth has announced a \$750,000 expansion which will provide 250 new jobs. Wurlitzer will construct a 68,000-square-foot addition to the existing plant, and a bond issue election will be called for \$750,000.

Jackson Plans Development Of Industrial Park

With the Jackson city council's approval, the Jackson Chamber of Commerce plans to proceed with the development of 21 acres in the southwest corner of the Hawkins Field airport property as an industrial park. The project is expected to cost about \$100,000 and will include street, gutter and other improvements.

Aberdeen BAWI Election Scheduled For January 12

Aberdeen voters will go to the polls January 12 to vote on a \$90,000 bond issue to finance a plant for Carondelet Mfg. Company of St. Louis for the manufacture of institutional furniture. The proposed plant is a 30,000-square-foot, all steel structure to be built on a five-acre site in Aberdeen.

American Potash Plant Nearing Completion

American Potash & Chemical Corporation will enter the manganese metal field with the completion of electrolytic facilities at the company's Hamilton plant

(near Aberdeen) early in 1962, it was announced recently by company officials. Initial capacity of the new plant will be 10,000,000 pounds a year. The new facility is adjacent to the corporation's sodium chlorate plant at a 1,600-acre site on the Tombigbee river.

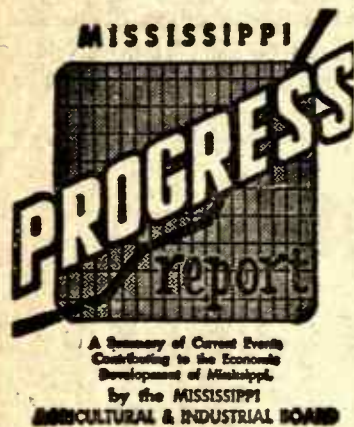

Fat Cats Fight Back

Little doubt remains that America's youths are becoming fat cats. That they are not as fit as they could be is borne out by these scientific studies of the last decade: British children excelled Iowans in physical tests... British girls, 10 to 12 years old, beat American boys in leg-power tests for endurance... Italian and Austrian youths surpassed Americans in physical fitness. The clincher for these studies was America's disappointing performance in the Olympics.

Teen-age delegates at the recent National Youthpower Congress fought a fat-cat status. In asking for help to achieve fitness, they took note of a king-sized obstacle in many schools: Physical education facilities oriented to team needs. Those not on the team often are neglected.

To be a fit cat calls for a personal fitness program, experts say, not elaborate gym equipment. Daily exercise and physical activity make up one phase of the fight. Nutrition is another.

If nutrition is inadequate, the basis for performance is affected. A thiamine deficiency, short but severe, seriously disturbs coordination. Vitamin A deficiency handicaps anyone whose eyes have to adapt to darkness. A calorie deficiency drops endurance to low levels and loss of strength is dramatic. To build your nutrition, eat from a variety of foods each day. A teen should include at least:

- 4 servings of enriched or whole grain bread or cereal
- 4 servings of fruit and vegetables
- 4 servings of milk or cheese
- 4 ounces of meat, fish, poultry, or dried peas or beans

Fat cats can become fit. Start with well-chosen food and exercise.

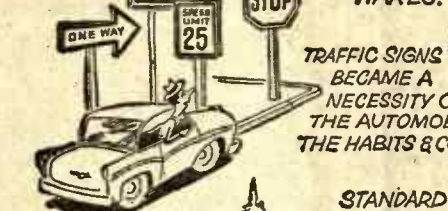

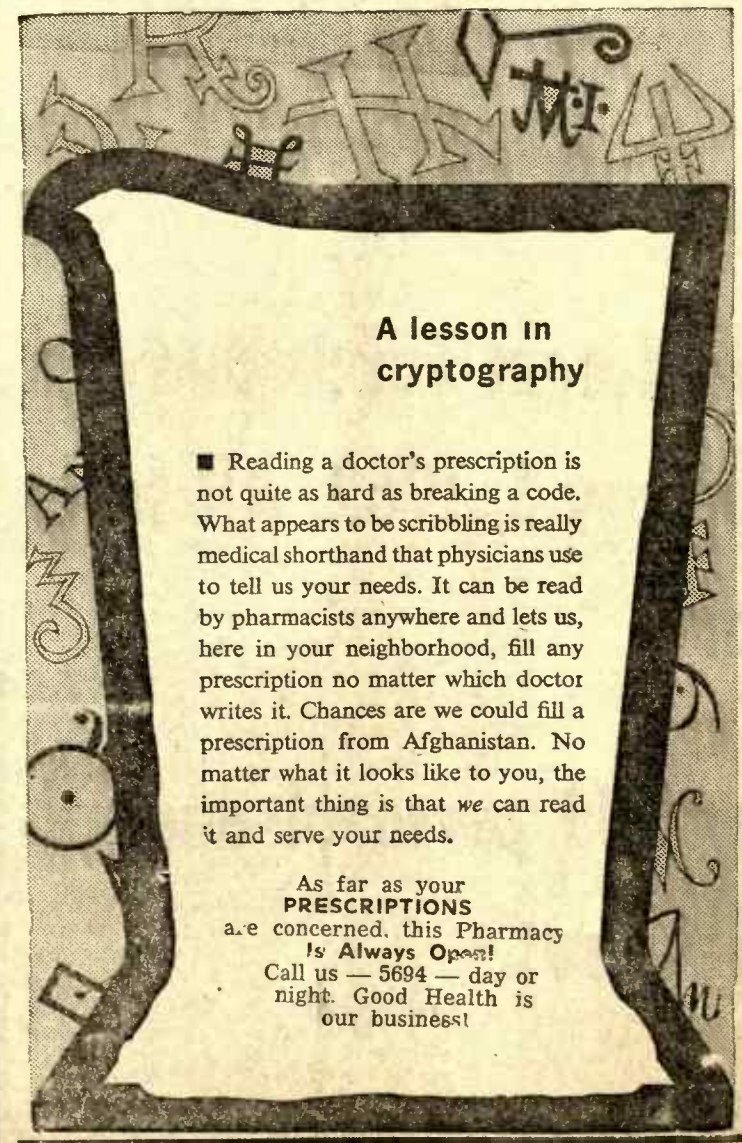

Legislation To Aid Flood Control On Tombigbee Will Be Introduced

Rivers and Harbors Association of Mississippi, who has assisted in developing water resources throughout the State, will push for legislation which will empower those counties within the Tombigbee River Basin to take advantage of \$26,916,000 in federal money which is authorized for flood control improvements within the basin.

Under the Presidency of James F. Hooper, of Columbus, in 1960, the Association began holding local meetings throughout the basin to discuss the federal flood control program with the local people. After a period of several months, the Governor, upon the recommendation of the Association, reactivated the Tombigbee Valley Authority, naming J. V. Turnage, of Aberdeen, as Chairman. Thus the nucleus for a basin wide program was begun.

Working with Rep. Pound, Chairman of the Steering Committee of the Tombigbee Valley Authority, the Rivers and Harbors Association, drew up legislation, which was presented to the Tombigbee Valley Authority, for their consideration. This legislation, was to create the Tombigbee River Val-

ley Water Management District, and was patterned after the recently enacted Pearl River Valley Water Supply District Act.

Rep. Thompson Pound, of Pontotoc, recently elected to the Board of Directors of the Rivers and Harbors Association, is handling the bill in the legislature, which will be introduced in the next few days.

Local participation made it virtually impossible for the federal program to begin, and due to the magnitude of the project and the tremendous benefits accruable to the basin, the Tombigbee Valley Authority and the Association through the proposed legislation will ask the same support from the State Legislature as was given to the Pearl River Supply District.

Paul Comola, Executive Vice President, of the Rivers and Harbors Association, said, "The estimated benefits by the Corps was \$2.04 to 1, (\$2.04 in benefits for each dollar expended), this includes only agricultural benefits. The loss of real and personal property experienced by the recent flooding in the area are not included in the benefits. The proposed plan consists of channel improvements on 22 separate streams in seven tributary groups, and involves about 466 miles of streams throughout the basin. It is inconceivable that a program of development for such a large portion of our State would not receive the full support of the Legislature."

Continuing, Comola said, "It was gratifying to us, that Governor Barnett saw fit to include this proposed legislation in his recent address to the Legislature."

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF TISHOMINGO, MISSISSIPPI, LEVYING A TAX ON RETAIL SALES OR GROSS INCOME OF BUSINESS AT THE RATE OF ONE PER CENT EXCEPT FOR SALES OF CERTAIN PRODUCTS HEREIN SET OUT, AND FIXING THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF SAID LEVY.

WHEREAS the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, on the 7th day of November, 1961, adopted an Ordinance declaring its intention to levy the tax herein set out and calling for an election on the 12th day of December, 1961, wherein said proposal would be submitted to the qualified electors of said municipality, and

WHEREAS said election was held in said municipality on the 12th day of December, 1961, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock A. M. and 6:00 o'clock P. M. wherein a majority of the qualified electors of said municipality participating in said election voted in favor of said proposal.

IT IS, THEREFORE, ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, in regular session on, this 2nd day of January, 1962, as follows:

SECTION 1. That the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, does by this Ordinance levy for its benefit upon the retail sales or gross income of business in said Town a tax at the rate of one per cent (1%) except that sales of farm tractors and self-propelled or drawn farm implements sold to farmers, automobiles, trucks and truck-trailers shall be taxed at the rate of one half of one per cent (1/2 of 1%) and sales of electricity, current, power, steam, coal, natural gas, liquefied petroleum gas, or other fuel shall be taxed at the rate of one-fourth of one per cent (1/4 of 1%) when sold to a manufacturer or custom processor for industrial purposes, and provided further that the tax herein levied shall not apply to gross income from ginning cotton, storing grain in elevators or warehouses, railroad transportation and sales of self-propelled construction equipment.

SECTION 2. That the effective date of the levy of said tax shall be the 1st day of February, 1962.

SECTION 3. That the Town Clerk of said municipality is hereby ordered to have the within Ordinance published at least once in the Vidette, a newspaper having general circulation in said municipality; and said Town Clerk is further ordered to send a certified copy of the within Ordinance together with the results of the election herein mentioned to the Chairman of the Mississippi State Tax Commission.

Veterans' Corner

Q—How many veterans are still in schools and colleges under GI education and training programs? Is this program still open to World War II veterans?

A—There were about 135,000 veterans still in educational programs under the Korea GI Bill as of October 31, 1961. This program has ended for World War II veterans.

Q—I understand that pensions are paid to some "Indian War" veterans. Does this go back to Colonial days?

A—The Indian Wars concerned in the administration of veterans' pensions are those subsequent to 1860 and before 1898: briefly those Indian troubles concerned with the opening up of the West and Far West. About 160,000 troops participated in these encounters at various times and about 1,000 died as the result of combat. There are still 29 veterans of these Indian Wars living today.

Q—Is government life insurance still available to the young men entering service today?

A—GI life insurance is not being issued today.

Q—Why do statistics show more Korean Conflict veterans each month and less veterans of all other wars?

A—Because people are still becoming veterans—that is, leaving active service and a great number of them served in the Korean Conflict. (If they served in World War II also they are considered Korea veterans for benefit purposes.) They are not considered veterans until they leave military service.

County Agent's Notes

Social Security Administration
I was talking with Hugh Tigrett, Manager of the Tupelo Social Security District Office, the other day and he advised me that the Social Security Administration now considers both the activities of an agent for a landlord and the activities of the land owner in deciding whether the owner's farm rental income is covered by the Social Security law.

According to Mr. Tigrett, previously only the activities of the farm landlord counted in deciding whether the wage-earner materially participated on his farm. He gave me the following example for this change:

"A farm owner who lives in town, and under an agreement with a tenant, has an agent supervising the work of the tenant. The agent makes all the important decisions effecting the production of the crop. Now, through the agent, the landlord can materially participate and can receive social security credits."

He pointed out that this not only means more farm owners can qualify for social security, but more important some farm landlords whose claims for social security benefits have been denied because the agent, rather than the owner was supervising the tenant, now can qualify.

I would like to encourage any farmer who thinks that this change may effect his status under social security to contact the social security office for further information. The social security representative is at the City Hall at 9:30 each Monday morning in Iuka.

Soil Samples
Many farmers in Tishomingo County are letting a very valuable free service go unused. This service is the free soil analysis that is given at the Soils Testing Laboratory at Mississippi State University.

I am sure that we are all aware of the small margin of profit the farmer makes between the cost of production of crops and the price he receives when the products are sold.

MAGAZINE SEES POSSIBILITY OF RECORD YEAR IN 1962

1962 will be a good year — possibly a record year — with more jobs, higher pay and increased production, according to Changing Times, the Kiplinger Magazine. An article in the current issue of the magazine takes a look at the year ahead, and finds the economic picture especially bright.

The editors of the magazine predict that more jobs will be available with the total number of people working in the 70 million range. "But joblessness will still be a serious problem," they note. "Unemployment will average out to about 4 million or a little more. The unemployment rate will drop about 7 per cent to not much higher than 5 percent."

"Production will soar — industry will operate at 90 per cent of capacity or better, compared with a bit over 80 percent in 1961. That means more of everything, from steel and aluminum to buttons and safety pins, will pour out of the factories. Gross National Product will rise to a rate of at least 570 billion dollars by the end of 1962 — an impressive 6 percent increase."

Pay will go higher, too, the magazine predicts. "But how much is a question. With profits rising and industry prosperous, unions will agitate for more money. Many employers will go along rather than risk interruption of output. But some may not — notably the steel industry." And a major steel strike, the article cautions, could trigger a business drop.

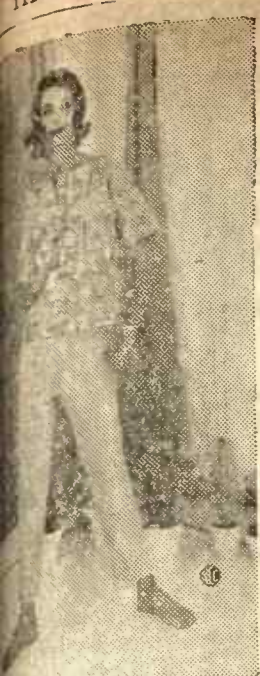

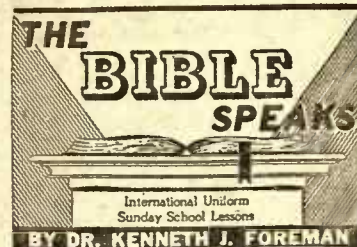

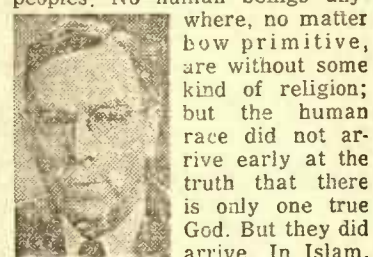

One God

Lesson for January 14, 1962

IT is easier to believe in many gods than in one. If you don't think that is true, take a look through the religions of primitive peoples. No human beings anywhere, no matter how primitive, are without some kind of religion; but the human race did not arrive early at the truth that there is only one true God. But they did arrive, in Islam,



Dr. Foreman in Judaism, and in Christianity, men have stood for their faith that God is One, and beside him there is no other. Nothing the Christian church believes about the Trinity abolishes this basic truth, that there is one God only. Father, Son and Spirit are not three Gods. The Holy Trinity is not a celestial committee. Christians believe that there are different ways by which we meet God, different ways of His revealing himself; but the High God, the Creator of all, and Christ our Savior, the "Word made flesh," and the Spirit of God in our hearts, are all the same God.

One God of time and space
Theologians seeking ways of expressing the majesty of God sometimes use the expression, the God of time and space. That expresses a tremendously important truth about God, a two-sided truth. One is that no matter how far back or forward you may go in time, God is always God. He does not become God, or cease to be God, or become (so to speak) a part-time or retired God. Sometimes human beings' thoughts of God are dim; but He is ever the eternal flame. The other side of the truth is that wherever you go in space, you are always in the domain of the one, the only God, who is always the same. This not only means that God is sovereign over this earth and whatever creatures live here; to the remotest star He is the same, the only God. The idea that we could take a spaceship and sail beyond the reach of God is just as absurd as it always was.

One God of the world and you
Think about the world around you—steel and asphalt, grass and trees, stars, germs and atoms. Does it seem hard to believe that the God who made these things made you? That the God who is concerned for the mighty suns and vast whirlpools of stars millions of light-years away,—that He can be interested also in you? Even some Christians have felt as if there must be a difference between the God of nature and the God of grace, the God of nature and the God Jesus revealed to us. But there is no difference. Neither the God of grace nor the God of nature is greater than the other; for they are one and the same God. The same divine Mind that devised this universe also devised you. It serves his purposes,—the stormy wind fulfills God's will, as the Hebrew psalmist wrote, "God made the earth and seas for a reason. He made the stars for a reason. He made you for a reason. What all His reasons are is His own secret. That a comet's return may be predicted, is a pointer to God. That in the midst of grief there comes a healing peace, is a pointer to God. That a man feels in his heart of hearts, 'I ought, is a pointer to God. Not to three Gods but to the same, the only God, but to birth to death.

As we live and grow, our ideas about God may greatly change. Perhaps at first we think of Him as a kind of family God, we think of Him as the God of our church. He may be in early days a God we think about only when we say "Now I lay me . . ." at bed-time; then later—for some great souls this is true—God looms so large that He is our constant companion, and the thought of Him is back of every thought. But He does not grow, it is we who grow. The road of mankind is strewn with the bodies of dead gods, someone has said. Not at all; the true God never perishes. The dead bodies are ideas, notions, images in the mind; they are not gods. Now each man's personal road of life ought to pass on beyond the graves of the idols He has made in His mind. The God who would not let us get hurt, the God who let us do as we please, the God bent on revenge, the God of our nation against the world—these Gods do not exist except in people's minds. The one true God is the one revealed by his Son, who from the Beginning was with God, and was God.

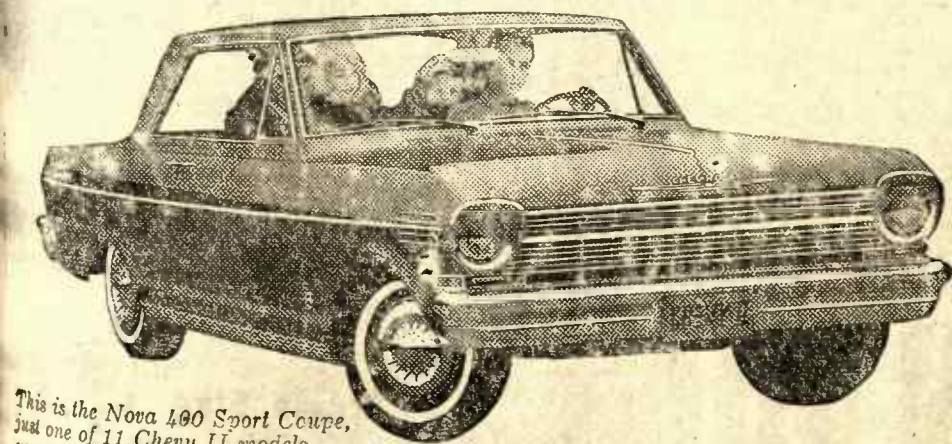

New Blackberry Yields Big Crop Of Fine Fruit

A new blackberry, which has produced fruit at the rate of about two tons per acre, is being released by plant breeders. It is available in such limited supplies that, for the present, distribution is restricted to nurserymen who will agree to propagate it.

Dr. J. B. Overcash, Experiment Station horticulturist, says plants should be available to growers in the fall of 1962 or later. The blackberry originated from a cross made in 1939, and it has been tested extensively in North Carolina and in Mississippi.

Williams ripens in late June, producing glossy blackberries of good size and firmness. The flavor is acid with good dessert quality. Plants are vigorous; new primary canes are often 8 to 10 feet long by mid-June. They are disease resistant and may be grown on a trellis or in hedge-rows.

At State College, the ripening season extended from June 12 to July 12, 1961. Yields were calculated at 3,930 quarts per acre, which was higher than any other variety in the test.

The Department of Horticulture at Mississippi State University will have a limited stock of plants available about February 1 for distribution to cooperating nurserymen for propagation purposes. The new variety is expected to be good for use in home gardens or for local berry markets.
