FATE HARRIS IS AREA'S OLDEST HUNTER AT 97

Has Made Every Deer Hunt Each Year
Since Game Laws Were Established

Fate (Lafayette) Harris' holds
the enviable record of being the
oldest hunter in these parts. Mr.
Harris is 97 years old going on 98.
He is not just the oldest hunter
but is also the oldest deer hunter.

Game Warden Sixty Yarbber re-
ports that Mr. Harris has made all
the deer hunts that have been held
in this part of Mississippi since
the Game and Fish Commission
was put into law to protect the
deer. He also reports that Mr. Har-
ris made the last hunt just recent-
ly ended in December.

Mr. Harris says that he has
killed a total of thirty deer in his
lifetime, and that he has bagged

uncountable numbers of wild tur-
keys. Proof of Mr. Harris' prowess
as a hunter is the fact that out of
the last five turkey hunts he made
he got four gobblers out of the
five hunts.

Being an ardent sportsman,
Mr. Harris has followed the sport
of hunting practically all over
the country, he having been hunt-
ing in Alabama, Florida, Arkansas,
Louisiana, Tennessee, Georgia, and
Mississippi.

And, believe it or not, he does
not wear glasses to this day—97
years old and can see exceedingly
well without eyeglasses.

Fate Harris was born on Little
Bear Creek south of Pogo in
Franklin County, Alabama. At an
early age, he was married to the
late Parthenia Davis, a daughter
of the late Dr. Davis of Belmont.
They had 2 boys and 2 girls, three
of whom are still living. They are:
Mrs. W. Cleveland of Belmont,
Charlie Harris with whom he
makes his home, and Marie Perry
in Memphis. Curtis Harris, the oth-
er son, died about 25 years ago.

Mr. Harris followed the dental
profession most of his life. He
has lived in Belmont and traveled
from there as a peddling dentist.
He carried all his dental equip-
ment on the wagon with him and
went from house to house and
from community to community
mending and pulling teeth. He was
the only dentist for a number of
years in the Belmont, Golden and
Red Bay areas. He had a foot pow-
ered drill with which he cleaned
and prepared teeth for filling.

Mr. Harris was living in Belmont
when the Illinois Central Railroad
was built.

In addition to being a dentist,
Mr. Harris was also a farmer, and
one of his projects was the rais-
ing of hogs. He has been known
to have several hundred head of
hogs at one time roaming the bot-
tom lands of Bear Creek. Back in
the old days, Mr. Harris says, to
move hogs you had to tote them.
This is done by dropping corn or
other feed along the way the hogs
are supposed to go. They follow
along eating the corn and in this
way the hogs can be moved from
place to place. Mr. Harris holds
the distinction of being the only
man ever known to have toled a
hog across a foot bridge. Another
outstanding feat was when he toled
a herd of dogs from Allsboro, Ala.,
to his home in Belmont, a distance
of approximately 18 miles.

Game Warden Yarbber states that
Mr. Harris has high praise for the
Mississippi Game and Fish Com-
mission for their efforts to pro-
tect and preserve the game that
we now have.

Home Burns In Midway Community

The Robert Parson, Jr., home
located in the Midway Community
was destroyed by fire early Sun-
day morning. The Parson family
was away from home at the time,
being enroute to Indiana to visit
with her mother.

The six room brick and drop
siding house and its entire con-
tents were lost. Cause of the fire
was undetermined.

The Parsons have three children,
two boys, Mikie, age 7 and Jeffrey,
age 3; and a daughter, Pam, age
6.

162 MARRIAGE LICENSE APPLICATIONS IN 1961; 33 DIVORCES GRANTED

A check of records at the Tish-
omingo county courthouse re-
veals that 162 applications for
marriage licenses were made at
the Circuit clerk's office during
1961. This compares very favor-
able with the number applied
for in 1960 which was 165.

Also in 1961, a total of thirty-
three divorces was granted in
Chancery court. A search of re-
cords reveals that 57 divorce
cases were filed in '61 but only
33 were carried to completion
that year, some of the cases be-
ing still in court and others settl-
ing by reconciliation.

Percentage-wise, divorces equal
to 20% of the marriage applica-
tions during the past year.

Approximately 60 Cases In January Term Of Court

Extremely Cold Weather Causes
Continuation Of Some Cases

The January term of Circuit
Court in Tishomingo county saw
approximately 60 cases come be-
fore the court in both civil and
criminal divisions. Unfortunately,

many of the cases were continued
to future courts due to the ex-
tremely cold weather during the
second week of court.

The 60 cases that came up for
hearing or other disposition were
in addition to action of the Grand
Jury which included the investiga-
tion of a number of cases in which
indictments were sought. Thirty-
four true bills were returned by
the grand jury. Judge Raymond
T. Jarvis presided.

Among cases which came up for
trial were two that involved child
neglect. Charged of this crime were
Matilda Boyd and Mae Bell Mit-
chell, both colored, and each a
different case. Each of the defend-
ants drew a sentence of six months
in the county jail with the last
five being held up on good behav-
ior.

In the case of The State vs.
Gary Hardin, the defendant plead
guilty to a charge of breaking and
entering a number of places in
the Belmont area and stealing val-
uable merchandise. Hardin was
sentenced to 4 years in the state
penitentiary with the first three
years being suspended on certain
conditions. The defendant was
placed under the supervision of
the State Probations and Parole
Board which will receive reports
at stated intervals as to the defend-
ant's conduct.

A large number of both civil
and criminal cases that were doc-
ketted for this term of court were
continued to future courts due to
the extremely cold weather dur-
ing most of the second week of
court.

Among other cases to come be-
fore the court were that of the
State vs. Jackie Wallace McDuffy.
McDuffy was charged with steal-
ing a shot gun belonging to his
brother, J. W. McDuffy. Jackie
McDuffy, the defendant, drew a
sentence of two years with the
sentence being suspended and the
defendant being placed under the
supervision of the State Probation
and Parole Board, the Board to
receive periodical reports on Jack-
ie McDuffy's conduct.

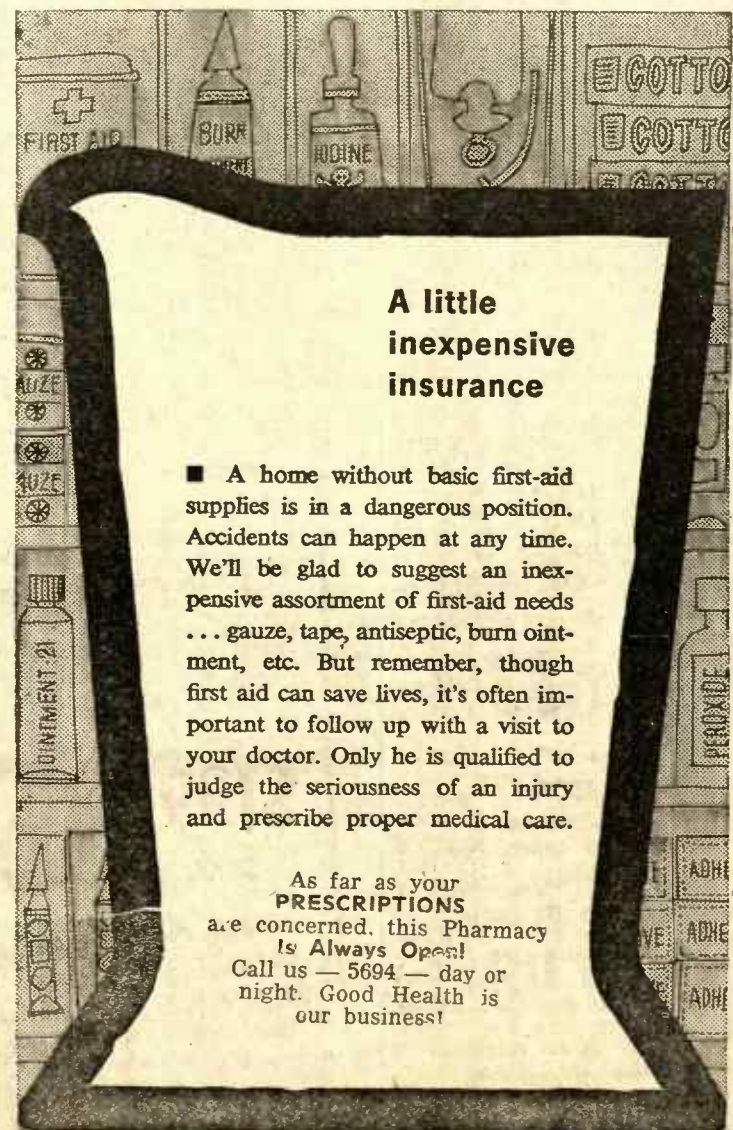

Veterans' Corner

Q—How many veterans of the
U. S. Armed Forces are women?
A—There are about 416,000 wo-
men veterans of wartime service
and some 34,000 women veterans
with peacetime service only.

Q—As a Spanish-American War
veteran with 87 days of active duty
I draw the service pension based
on 70-days service. I think the new
law adding travel time home to
the service time will qualify me
for the 90-day service pension. How
do I apply for this?

A—The VA is now reviewing all
cases where Spanish-American War
veterans on the rolls for the 70-
day service pension may now qual-
ify for the 90-day pension. After
a reasonable time, if you do not
hear from the VA, write the Vet-
erans Benefits Office, Munitions
Building Washington 25, D. C. Be
sure to give your claim number.

Your branch of the service will
certify where you were separated
and how much travel time it should
have taken you to reach your home
by the most direct route.

Q—How much I report the in-
terest on U. S. Savings Bonds as
part of my income?
A—You may refrain from re-
porting the interest until you cash
in the bonds or you may report the
interest annually.

Q—I would be entitled to go to
vocational school under the War
Orphans Education Act but I have
married. Does that bar me?
A—Marriage does not bar an
eligible orphan from taking ad-
vantage of this Federal benefit.

Electric Safety
Your home wiring system may
be as out of date as the Model T.

of modern electrical equipment.

Overloaded wiring may be cost-
ing you money every day. These
wires may be fire hazards. Electric-
al circuit wires that get hotter
than 140 degrees F are definitely
overloaded.

The electricity used in produc-
ing this heat is wasted and often
means a bigger power bill.

Limiting the total load on a
number 12 wire household circuit
to 1800 watts will assure adequate
wire capacity. The load on a num-
ber 14 wire should not exceed
1350 watts.

pressure. But they found some
tiling works better than others in
resisting dents.

As a rule, the thinner the floor
covering, the better it withstands
denting.

The best flooring, however, is
one that depresses readily but
snaps back when the load is re-
moved. A tiling of this type offers
a comfortable walking surface and
still looks and wears well.

Of those the Texas folks tested,
vinyl proved the best. It both in-
dented readily and recovered well.
Cork and linoleum also depressed
easily but did not snap back so
readily or completely. And as-
phalt, which resisted the initial
dent, also showed slight recovery.

If a tile is going to spring back,
it will do so in the first 30 minutes
after the load is removed. After
that, there is no further recovery,
and the dent will be just as obvious
and just as deep next week, next
month or next year.

Here in the South, where the
temperature and humidity are
high, floors dent easier than those
in more moderate climates. Tem-
perature and humidity affect all
tile coverings. Humidity is espe-
cially hard on cork and linoleum. It
increases denting, and also causes
linoleum to warp.

Since no flooring is perfect, the
best thing to do is try to avoid
dents in the first place. All floor
coverings tested were able to re-
sist permanent indentation of a
load of 300 pounds per square
inch.

To prevent heavier pressure—
and dents—put flat gliders on the
legs of the furniture. The shade of
those little buttons, which go on
the bottom of chairs and table legs
can make a big difference in the
amount of weight exerted on the
tiles.

A 125-pound woman sitting in a
25-pound chair equipped with curv-
ed gliders puts 1,359 pounds of
pressure per square inch on the
flooring under each chair leg. An
equal size glider with a flat sur-
face reduces this pressure to only
122 pounds.

Distributing the weight of your
furniture is probably the best way
to prevent dented tiled floors.
Casters will help. So will broad
legs without gliders.

As for women's heels . . . As
long as stiletto heels are fash-
ionable, it's going to be hard to keep
your tiling smooth and dent-free.
