The above figures are not to be construed to be the exact volume marked. Each bidder is expected to make his own cruise and to bid accordingly. Before bids are submitted, full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale and the submission of bids should be obtained from the State Park Director, Jackson, Mississippi, or the District Forester, Mississippi Forestry Commission, Tupelo, Mississippi. Area Feeder Pig Sale

The Area Feeder Pig Sale was held at Booneville last Thursday. The price was good, but the number of pigs consigned to the sale was smaller than any sale since the beginning in July, 1960.

When the first Area Feeder Pig Sale was held in July, 1960, pigs were selling on the farms in northeast Mississippi for \$2.50, \$5.00, and \$7.50 per head. After a couple of Feeder Pig Sales were held, the price of pigs on the farm jumped to \$10.00, \$12.00 and even \$15.00 per head. They remained at this price all during 1961.

I would like to pass on to you a summary of the seven quarterly Feeder Pig Sales held at Booneville beginning July, 1960. A total of 5163 head of pigs were sold. The average weight of all pigs sold in all sales was 52.8 pounds. The average price of all sales for all pigs was \$25.30 per CWT. The average

price per head was \$13.36.

We have sold a total of \$68,977.69 worth of pigs. Tishomingo County has been consigning from 75 to 200 pigs per sale. Last Thursday Tishomingo County had 6 pigs consigned to the sale. I feel like we in Tishomingo County let the sale down last week.

This sale was organized by the Extension Service in eight Northeast Mississippi counties. It is a non profit sale and was organized to provide a market for feeder pigs that farmers didn't want to feed out and at the same time provide a source of good quality, vaccinated, and castrated pigs ready to feed for buyers wanting feeder pigs.

I know we have farmers in Tishomingo County that would profit by keeping a small sow herd and taking advantage of the Area Feeder Pig Sale.

Cold Damage to Landscape Plants
Perhaps the best general recommendation for pruning ornamental landscape plants is to wait until you are certain of the extent of damage, then prune back to live wood. In some cases, this may be a matter of several weeks after the freeze. When it is evident that extension damage has been done, the plant should be cut back to live wood. Water all plants thoroughly as soon as pipes thaw. This prevents drying which causes more damage than the cold.

A knife or the thumbnail can be used to scratch and determine if the shrub has been killed all the way down the main trunk or main stems. Often the damage is in the outside twigs and branches, and the plant will need only a light clipping back.

If the cambium layer, just beneath the bark of the stem or trunk, shows discoloration, this is a sign that the plant needs cutting back below such damage. Any bark which has split or cracked should be removed by cutting below the damage. Crape myrtle, Anthony Water Spirea, Althea, Butterfly Bush and Highbush Cranberry are among the shrubs which bloom on this year's growth of wood. It is possible to prune this group after a heavy freeze and still have flowers from this in the summer. Tea roses, many of which were in bud, should be pruned to remove dead wood after it is evident. If the rose is of a vigorous variety, it will make sufficient growth during the summer even if it is killed back to the ground.

Evergreen plants as holly, pine, spruce, and laurel usually are injured by sudden changes in temperature. In the earliest stages, freeze injury is evident as "scorching" of the leaves at the tips. On narrow-leaf evergreens the needles are browned entirely. The twigs

are brittle and snap when bent.

If there is any doubt that twigs and branches have been killed, it is best to wait a few weeks until such damage will be easily seen. At that time, prune the plant back to live wood.

Annual and perennial flowers which have suffered cold or frost damage will undergo a dwarfing or crippled stage of growth. Some of them may remain permanently stunted. Such plants should be cut back at the tops as soon as the extent of cold damage is recognizable. Any bulbs which were in bloom at the time of the freeze should be left alone until the entire top growth has died to the ground. Then, dig and cure before replanting.

The first Thursday night in each month is the regular meeting date for the club.

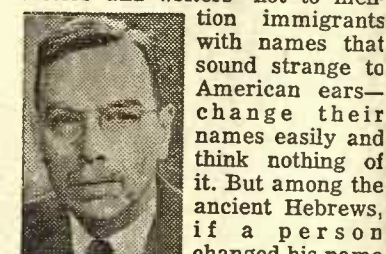

God's Holy Name

Lesson for January 28, 1962

IN ancient times, and among primitive people to this day, the name of a person was closely connected with the person himself. Actors and writers—not to mention immigrants with names that sound strange to American ears—change their names easily and think nothing of it. But among the ancient Hebrews, if a person changed his name



Dr. Foreman it was supposed to be only if some radical change had come over the man himself.

So when the Bible speaks of reverence for God's "name," what is chiefly in mind is not a sound in the air or marks on paper, but reverence for what the name stands for—God himself.

Irreverence
Americans are notoriously irreverent. At least, such is our reputation in Europe, and to some extent we deserve it. Our trouble is that it is a kind of tradition in this country that everybody is as good as everybody else if not a little better. Reverence seems like kow-towing, groveling, being an "Uncle Tom," boot-licking—we have all sorts of contemptuous words for the attitude of humility. We feel (even if we do not come out and say so) that to be reverent is sissified, it's a sign of weakness, an admission of inferiority.

What we forget is that God is not only not a man, He is infinitely higher than man. He is our Creator. To show reverence in the presence of another human being may well be uncalled for and demeaning [sic]; but reverence in the presence of Almighty God is—at the very least—a simple honest admission of the fact that the one God is infinitely higher and holier than any of us or all of us together. To treat God lightly, with indifference or contempt, is irreverence, in any form. Profanity, dragging in God's sacred name either casually or in anger, is irreverence.

Jesus on Irreverence
Our Lord never used the words "irreverence" or "irreverent," but he spoke of certain acts which he described or referred to in a way that leaves us in no doubt what he was driving at. He spoke (Matt. 5) about "harmless" oaths of that time—swearing by heaven, or by Jerusalem, and condemned them all. What good would an oath do even if it were not irreverent? If a man cannot be trusted when he says "Yes" or "No," putting him under oath will not make him more truthful, (Jesus himself did not refuse to testify when the High Priest "adjured" him by the living God.) That was a case where refusal to speak at all would have been considerably worse than speaking out. Jesus poured a drop or two of scorn on people who pray long prayers, even repeating themselves over and over, fancying that God approves our prayers according to their length. He also warned against praying for show. You would hardly think anybody would be so foolish as to pray in order to make an impression on anybody but God,—and yet people will sometimes do it. Did you yourself ever pray in public and wonder, then or afterward, what So-and-So thought of your effort?!

The worst offenders

The worst offenders against reverence are sometimes religious people. They are worse because they should know better. Now there were people in Galilee who had no use for Jesus, and they did not treat him with decent respect. Indeed, some of them actually plotted his death. But they were open and aboveboard, or some of them were. Jesus raises a question with his intimate friends who had such a high regard for him that they called him "Lord." But —said—Jesus—"Why do you call me Lord, Lord, and do not do what I tell you?" (Luke 6:46) You see it is not a question of words. The word "Lord" is a good word, it was no doubt used respectfully, but it was a hollow word as some people used it, because they did not mean it. The man who goes to church and sings "Jesus, I my cross have taken—" and drops into the collection plate only half of what his Sunday dinner is going to cost him, the pew-sitters who cannot be told from pagans except for that occasional hour in the pew,—are all irreverent. For the essence of irreverence is treating God as if He didn't really count.

Farm Practices
For 1962 Discussed

Skip-Row Cotton Planting in 1962

Cotton farmers will be permitted to plant their acreage to suit the adaptation of their equipment. A recent ruling by the Secretary of Agriculture made this practice of skip row planting possible. Go see your local ASC Officer for instructions on how this applies to farms in your county. The Delta Experiment Station obtained increases in cotton yields from 4 rows skip 4 plantings ranging from 25 percent to 125 percent over planting every row.

1962 Cotton Acreage Allotment

Now is the time for farmers, with small cotton acreage allotments, to decide to plant or release unwanted acres in 1962. The 494 pound state average yield of lint cotton an acre in 1961 plus seed sold for \$175 to \$180. Those farmers who made an average of 1 1/2 to 2 bales per acre received higher income per acre. Plan now to plant your cotton acreage in 1962.

Proper Placement Of Fertilizer in 1962

When you plant cotton where do you place your fertilizer? For best results high rates of fertilizer per acre should be placed 3 to 5 inches to the side of drill and 6 to 8 inches deep. This placement applies to cotton, corn and soybeans. Do you have equipment on hand to

Unless you pay your Poll Tax this year YOU will not allowed to vote in the 1963 General Elections when all county and State officers are elected.

The law requires that, in order to be eligible to cast ballot, each person must have in his possession two Poll Tax Receipts one each for the two years immediately preceeding the election. Deadline for paying poll taxes is Thursday, February 1.

Also, Deadline for paying all 1961 Personal and Ad Valorem Taxes is Thursday, February 1. After that date, unpaid Personal and ad valorem taxes will be delinquent.

New Year Brings Increase In Social Security Taxes

January 1, 1962 brought about an increase in social security taxes, stated Hugh Tigrett, District Manager of the Tupelo Social Security Office. This increase maintains the financial soundness of the Social Security Trust Fund and helps

pay for the recent increase in social security payments.

Employers began deducting one-eighth of one percent more from their employees' wages January 1, 1962. The employers also pay one-eighth of one percent more. Now employers and employees each pay three and one-eighth percent of the employee's salary in social security taxes.

The tax rate for the self-employed was increased two-tenths of one percent for 1962. This means that a self-employed person will pay social security taxes of four and seven-tenths per cent of his earnings at the time he files his tax return for 1962, which is due early in 1963.

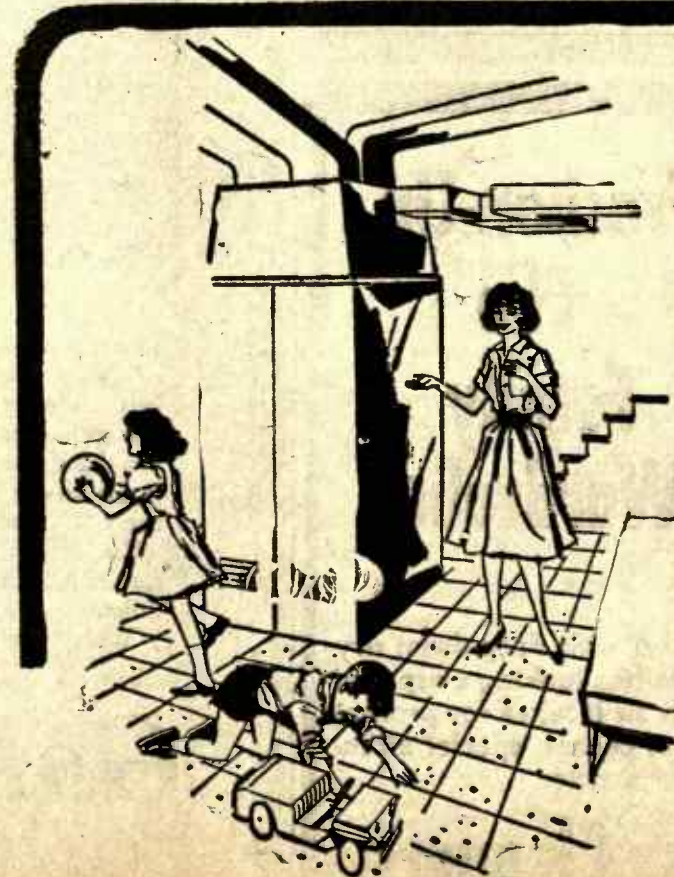

Farm Efficiency, Soil And Water Conservation

Agricultural experts claim that the effective solution to our current farm problem is a combination of production adjustment, expanding consumption, and even greater farm efficiency.

These people point out that today one farm worker produces food and clothing for 26 people.

Milk production per dairy cow averaged 7,004 pounds in 1960, as compared with 4,003 pounds of milk per cow in 1934. Cows in the Dairy Herd Improvement Association averaged 10,300 pounds of

milk per cow per year.

It now takes 10 pounds of feed to produce 1 pound of gain in beef cattle. By using the best methods and rations presently available, one pound of beef cattle gain can be produced with 8 1/2 pounds of feed.

Corn fields of 100 bushels per acre are common and two bales of cotton per acre are not uncommon yields.

The increases in pasture, forage and small grain crops per acre are keeping pace with row crop production.

What does all this mean? It can mean better and more efficient use of our land.

Less land is needed for the production of row crops. Cultivated crops can now be planted on the more level land. The steeper land, more subject to erosion, can be put in pasture or set to pine trees.

Future generations are assured of plenty of food and clothing because of efficient soil and water conservation farming today.

Veterans Corner

Q—What type of insurance may I arrange to pay through allotment of my Army retired pay?

A—You may arrange to pay either GI insurance or commercial insurance premiums from your re-

tried pay if the commercial insurance is on your own life, or is a family group-type policy where primary coverage is on your life.

Q—I am a World War II veteran who has filed an application for social security disability payments. I've been told that there is a six-month waiting period before I will receive my first check. Will that first check include back payments for the six months?

A—The social security law specifies that the first month for which payment can be made is the month after the waiting period.

Q—Has the VA District office in Philadelphia, which handled millions of GI ins. accounts, been closed? I cannot find it in a recent listing?

A—The former district office has merely been renamed. It is now called the VA Insurance Center and is still located at 5000 Wisconsin Avenue.

Q—Which VA hospital annually attracts thousands of visitors because of the program staged on Hospital Day?

A—The VA Hospital at Chillicothe, Ohio, for more than a decade now has attracted large throngs on Hospital Day. In recent years the number has been as great as 35,000. Various organizations in the area join with hospital officials in staging the day-long program.

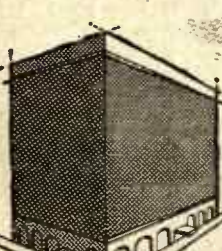

Research On Corn Shows Opportunity For Higher Yields

Record corn yields were made in Mississippi in 1961, but research shows opportunities for producing much more.

The average yield for the state was 37 bushels per acre, but in the main hybrid tests of the Experiment Station it was more than 90 bushels. Dr. C. O. Grogan, USDA agronomist who heads the state's corn breeding program, says this fact indicates Mississippi is not approaching the full potential for corn yield.

In order to get information meaningful to all parts of the state, corn tests are planted at seven north Mississippi locations, six in central Mississippi and two in the Southern part of the state. Branch Experiment Stations provide most of the locations. Hybrids are checked not only for yield, but also for such factors as lodging, resistance to weevil, height of ear, number of ears per

plant, etc. A number of experimental hybrids are included in the tests and their performance gives promise of better corn in the years ahead.

Detailed results, including 1961 yields and three-year averages, are published in the February issue of Mississippi Farm Research available on request from the Experiment Station at State College.

Suggested varieties, based on results of these tests, are as follows: For North Mississippi: White Dixie 55, Dixie 29, Dixie 77, Pfister (P. A. G.) 653 W; Yellow: Pioneer 309B, Dixie 22, Funk G711AA.

Use of Seat Belts Will Prevent Many Auto Fatalities

While all news media are announcing the death of Ernie Kovacs, perhaps this tragedy can be used as a means to underline for your readers the fact that approximately 50 per cent of automobile fatalities can be prevented by the use of seat belts.

Very wisely the coroner's office

for the Greater Los Angeles area released a detailed bulletin in which it was emphasized that the body of Mr. Kovacs had no external injuries of any kind, neither was there evidence of internal injuries, fractures or contusions. The cause of death was fracture of the base of the skull.

Studying the details of the accident, as released by the press, one can readily understand that it was obviously due to the body being thrown against the roof of the automobile with great force. It is therefore beyond the realm of

speculation that the death of Kovacs was fully preventable. Perhaps you can make use of this information to motivate citizens to install and use seat belts.

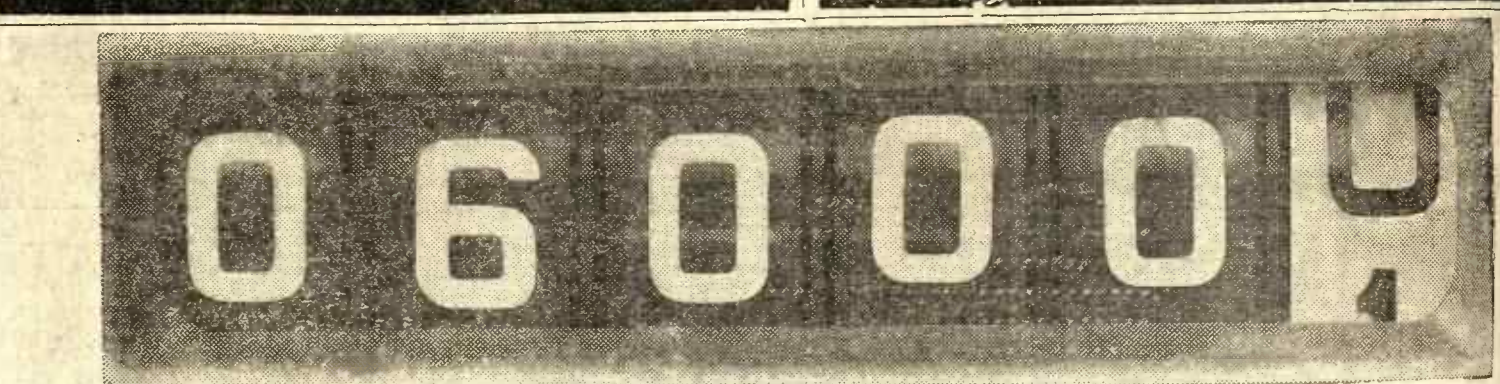

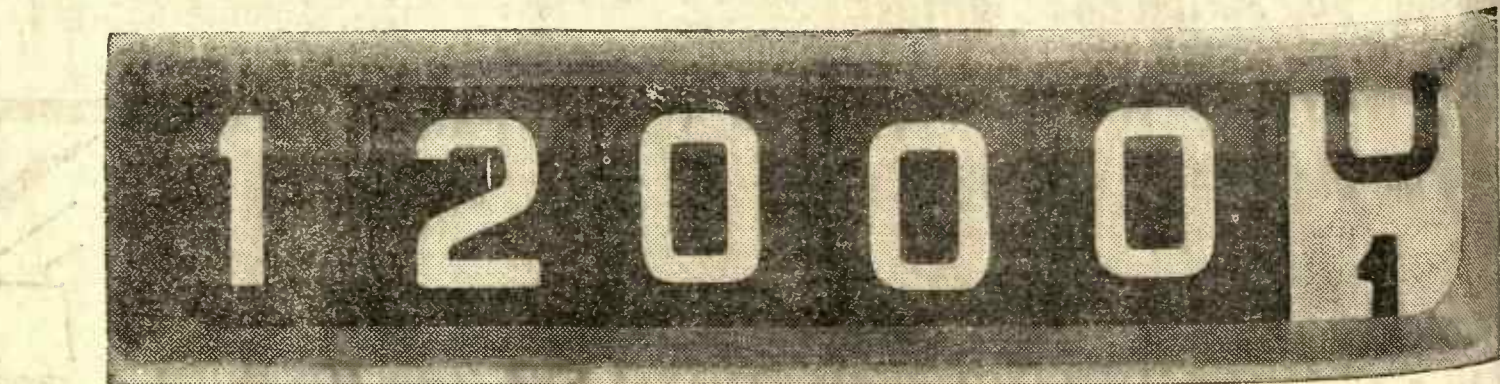

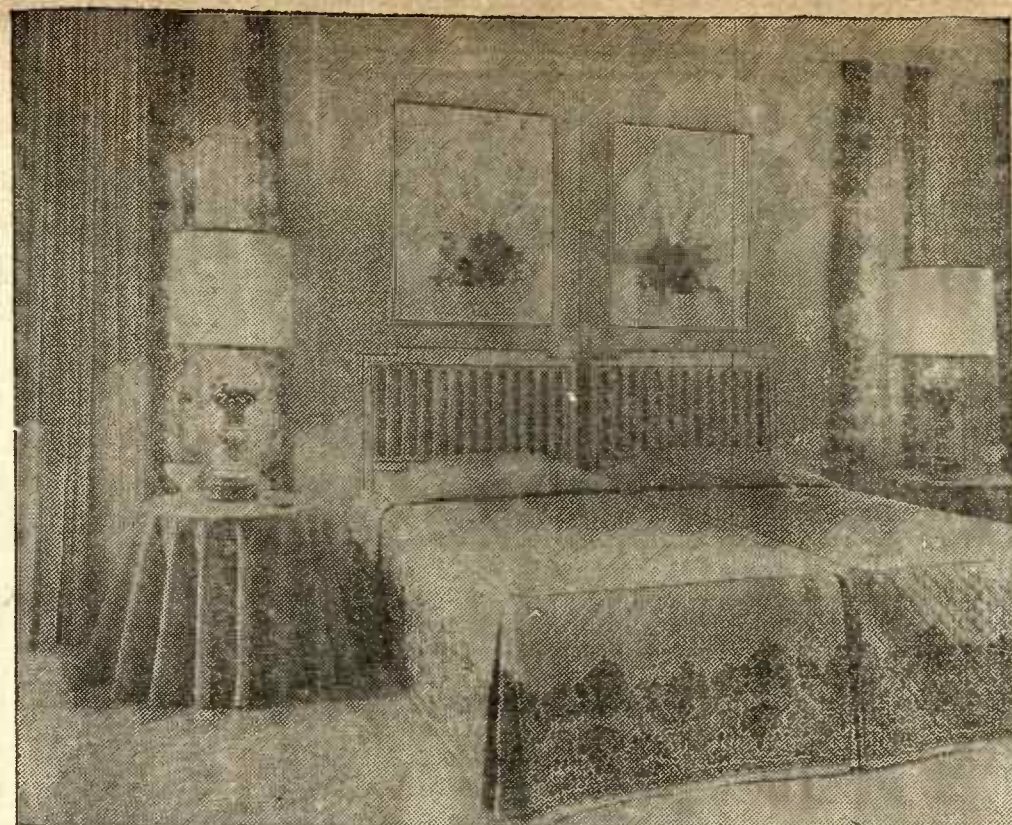
