Sunday Hunting & Fishing Will Be Made Legal By Bill

A bill has been introduced in both houses of the Mississippi Legislature to make it legal to hunt and fish on Sundays. There is a law on record that prohibits hunting and fishing on Sundays but it hasn't been strictly enforced for a long time. Nevertheless, it's on the books and as has been pointed out, "could cause sportsmen embarrassment."

Representative Frank Shanahan of Vicksburg introduced new legislation in the House to get rid of the old Blue Law and Senator E. K. Collins of Laurel is guiding a similar bill in the Senate. The proposal would make it lawful for persons to engage not only in hunting and fishing, but also all other participating sports activities including golf, tennis, bowling, boating, swimming and horseback riding.

SICKNESS IN AREA IS AT HIGH PROPORTIONS

Flu And Measles Cause Many
To Be Absent From Schools

Medical doctors in the area report that sickness due to measles and flu has been at almost epidemic proportions. On Tuesday of this week, Tishomingo County hospital had 29 patients registered in the 20-bed hospital and doctors were unable to get rooms for others who needed hospital care, they reported. The 29 patients did not include the newborn babies.

Construction on the new wing for the county hospital got underway Tuesday with excavation of foundation areas. The new wing will add approximately 14 beds and other service facilities to the local institution.

Attendance at the Iuka school was drastically reduced because of the flu, measles and other winter-time ailments. On Friday, January 26, the Iuka school had 150 absent, on Monday 140 were absent, and on Tuesday, 100 were absent. No reports were available from other attendance centers in the county. However, doctors state that a decline in the sickness rate is indicated and absenteeism at the Iuka school bears this out.

Officials state that schools will not be closed unless a health hazard is declared by health department authorities.

Motor Vehicle Inspection

Must Be Made By
March 31 And Sticker
Placed On Windshield

There are approximately 1100 locations in Mississippi where drivers may have their cars inspected under the Motor Vehicle Inspection program. The deadline for 1962 is March 31. Everyone must have their cars inspected before that time and have the inspection sticker displayed on the vehicle's windshield.

The new sticker replaces the blue and white 1961 sticker. The 1962 edition is black on yellow. All other details of the inspection program remain the same:

Each vehicle will be inspected for five things: lights, brakes, windshield wiper on the driver's side, tires, and steering.

The inspection fee is \$1.25; and all personal vehicles must have the inspection made before March 31 this year.

Director of Motor Vehicle Inspection R. L. Morgan has stressed the value of the inspection program. "It is a very valuable adjunct to our motorists. The program was designed for the protection of the individual driver. We believe it has had a noticeable effect on the reduction of traffic deaths in the state. Public cooperation has been very good and we appreciate it."

Ludlam Speaks To Rotarians At Meeting Wed., Jan. 17

Informative Outline Of Achievements Of State Of Mississippi Given

The Iuka Rotary Club, which met Wednesday, January 17, at the Methodist Church, was privileged to have William E. Ludlam as their speaker. The Iuka citizen was introduced by Bro. J. H. Holder, program chairman.

The following talk was given by Mr. Ludlam:

"Mississippi is a great State as we are all aware. We live in it, we enjoy it and make it our home. Sometimes we take some mighty fine things in it for granted, not realizing our State has made so many notable contributions to our National way of life.

So today with your permission we'd like to step behind the scenes

and bring out some of the worthwhile and notable achievements of your State and mine.

Many of our clubs, as you know, are urging that we talk more about Mississippi. People from Texas are not the only ones that are proud of their State's achievements!

No doubt most of you are well aware of many of these things as they are mentioned but they are so worthwhile and interesting they will certainly bear repeating!

If some of these statements appear a little off, think nothing of it, because some of them sound pretty good. But on the other hand, so far as I know they are fairly accurate.

1. Mississippi State College for Women was the first State supported College for women.

2. Mississippi was the first state to establish an A & M College for Negroes. It is the only college in the nation composed of an all negro student body and an all colored teaching staff including a negro president.

3. Gail Borden conceived the idea of canning fresh milk at Liberty, Mississippi.

4. Memorial Day was organized at Columbus, Mississippi.

5. More congressional Medals of Honor were awarded to Mississippi boys during the Korean War than those of any other state regardless of population.

6. The first 4-H Club was organized at Lexington, Miss., by Corn Club Smith. Today 4-H Clubs are found throughout our nation.

7. The Order of the Eastern Star was first organized at Richland, Miss.

8. The largest fiber board plant is located near Lumberton, Miss.

9. For every \$1,000.00 of personal income in Mississippi, we spend \$50.00 or more for public education. Twenty five per cent above the National average.

10. Enrollment in the Mississippi nine senior supported state educational institutions is 18,000, an increase of 8% over last year.

11. Twenty years ago the average salary for Mississippi public school teachers, both white and black was \$494.00. Ten years ago it was \$1,534.00. Today it is over \$3,000.00. This is the largest increase on a per cent basis in the nation.

12. In 1930 the entire state had only 37 miles of paved roads. Today there are close to 8,000 miles of paved roads.

13. The total value of milk produced in Miss., in 1959 is over 70 million dollars. The payroll of dairy plants in Miss., exceeds \$1/2 million dollars.

14. In a space of 5 years Miss., climbed from 27th place to 6th place in the production of broilers.

15. Tung Oil is produced only in 6 states. Sixty per cent of that total is produced in Mississippi.

16. A U. S. Department of Commerce report released in December stated that Mississippi led all states in the nation in gain in per capita bank deposits in the last ten years.

17. Mississippi school construction netted the largest proportionate increase in class rooms in the nation in recent years. Over 5,000 rooms were added during the past 4 years.

18. At present commercial slaughter plants in the state are processing over 1,085,900 head of livestock annually. An increase of

22% over two years.

20. Soybean production is over 20 million bushels. The production of honey increased 17% over last year. An all time state record.

21. Mississippi is number one in the nation wide tree farm program. Today there are over 2700 certified tree farms.

22. Mississippi is the second largest producer of cattle in the south-east with 2,017,000 on Jan. 1st. A few thousand less than Ky. Here are a few firsts for Mississippi:

—The first cotton seed crushing plant was established in Natchez, by Sir Walter Dunbar.

—The first state to pass a law for a uniform system of public schools in 1846.

—The first to establish a commercial college at Bay St. Louis in 1885.

—The first to abolish the system or leasing state convicts in 1890.

—The first to enforce state quarantine law in 1841 at Natchez.

—First to abolish imprisonment for debt.

—First to give women property rights equal to men.

—The first Home and Foreign Mission Board was organized by Baptists in 1856.

There are many other notable accomplishments of our state.

Roger Hull, native of Starkville, is President of the Mutual Life Insurance of New York.

Turner Catledge, native of Winston County, is the Managing Editor of The New York Times.

Dr. G. D. Humphrey, native of Tippah County, is President of the University of Wyoming.

William Faulkner, Oxford, is a Writer of fame.

Boyd Campbell, Jackson, is past president of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce.

John Satterfield, Yazoo City, is President of American Bar Association.

Allen Thompson, Jackson, is President of American Municipal Association.

Bryant Horn, Jackson, is President of the Mens Garden Clubs of America.

Only ten higher colleges and universities in our entire nation have had as many Rhodes Scholars as "Ole Miss."

While the Ohio River joins the Mississippi River at Cairo, Ill. at present, the U. S. Engineers estimate 2500 to 3000 years ago the Ohio River joined the Mississippi River midway between Vicksburg and Natchez. The Yazoo River today is part of this old Ohio River bed.

Most of you remember in the summer of '58 the Ole Miss Band was one of two bands in our entire nation that represented American Good Will Presentation at the World's Fair in Brussels and competed with bands from all nations and won First prizes in both Concert Competition and Marching Band competition as well as the award given by the President of France for Excellency in performance!

The World's champion Corn grower is one of our own neighbors, living in Baldwin, Miss., Lamar Ratchiff. Lamar has produced over 304 bushels of corn per acre.

Mississippi is the only State on our nation that for 4 out of 5 years have had one of the two County Extension Agricultural Service Staffs to receive the Superior Service Award of the Department of Agriculture. This is one of the highest awards given by the Dept. of Agriculture to its employees.

It is based on outstanding success in planning county agricultural and rural living programs, then putting the plans into action. This is based on the Extensions, principle of "Helping people help themselves."

Mississippi ranks 9th in Petroleum and minerals, producing over 40 million barrels of oil per year from over 2500 oil wells in 33 of

our 82 counties.

The world's largest broiler processing plant in the world is located at Forest, Mississippi. They have a capacity for dressing over 9000 chickens per hour.

Brown-Miller Co. of Wiggins, Mississippi operates the largest pickle processing plant in the world, shipping out over 400 train carloads of pickle products each year.

The bald cypress, an unusual tree of mystery, unique in all the world, is today making a final bid for survival along our Mississippi Gulf Coast. This tree of longevity in ages past once blanketed large areas of Europe, Asia and North America but is today like our carrier pigeon and buffalo, almost extinct.

There are six salt domes in Warren County, Mississippi that are over 6000 feet deep, being one to two miles in diameter.

The World's Record Superior quality Baby Beef has been won by Ben Walker of Clay County, Mississippi.

The first cotton crop in the world to be produced entirely by machinery was produced in 1944 on Hopson Plantation at Clarksdale. The soil was prepared by machine, seeded and cultivated by machine, weeds eradicated by flame, cotton crop harvested by a mechanical picker.

Mississippi is the first state in the nation to have a planned system of Junior Colleges. Today there are 17 publicly supported Junior Colleges within reach of every section of Mississippi making it possible for every one of our boys and girls to get their first two years of college at a minimum cost.

The first Nuclear submarine built in the South was produced at Ingalls Ship Building Corp., at Pascagoula about one year ago. This same firm had the distinction of building the last of the diesel, electric subs for the Navy, the USS BLUEBACK.

While Mississippi did want to and was the first State to provide a Governors Mansion for its chief executive, Shm Woodley did not really intend for his friend Ross Barnett to have the most publicized, price tagged bath-tub in the U. S. But he has!

Mississippi has more churches per person than any state in the Nation. There is one church for every 289 people in Mississippi. The national average is one church for every 814 in the United States.

The world's largest cotton plantation, The Delta & Pine Land Co., located at Scott, Mississippi contains 38,000 acres.

For 18 years the Worlds Prize Champion Herd of Polled Herefords have been at Senatobia, Miss., owned by "Hot" Moore. At public auction his herefords have sold at an 18 year average of over \$2,200.00 each. For an 18 year average his bulls have brought \$5,500 each.

Mississippi was the first state in the Union to adopt "Homestead Exemption Laws." They went into effect in 1938. Hugh White was governor at the time.

The world's first farmer-owned Nitrogen fertilizer plant is at Yazoo City. Today it supplies over 10,000 farmer owners with: Anhydrous Ammonia, Urea, and ammonium nitrate at cost.

The first Electrical contract by a city for TV & power was signed by Tupelo, Nov. 11, 1933. Iuka's contract was signed the later part of 1934, and took over 1st by Mississippi Power Company Association organized and incorporated in 1935.

The dental certificate used throughout the nation was originated by the Mississippi State Board of Health in 1920. Soon Mississippi's Slogan "Send your Child to School with a Dental Certificate" was adopted by other states, until today it is in NATION-WIDE USE.

We all know Major General William T. Sherman made the famous utterance known throughout the world, "WAR IS HELL." What some of us don't know was the situation that caused him to make the statement. It was in July of 1863, when fighting was at its bloodiest! The Union force of engineers were attempting to construct a series of pontoon bridges over Pearl River just outside of Jackson, Mississippi. The steady rifle fire of Confederates, mowing down the Union soldiers, caused Sherman upon observing their desperate difficulties, to turn to his STAFF uttering his famous statement, "WAR IS HELL."

Veterans' Corner

Q—Is an insurance dividend now being paid by the VA to holders of Korea GI policies designated "RS"?

A—Yes, provided that the policies with the letters "RS" preceding the policy number are exchanged for permanent policies or lower-cost term policies bearing the latter "W" before the policy number. Policyholders have until September 13, 1963, to make this change and still qualify for the dividends. The nearest VA office can supply more details.

Q—Isn't the War Orphan Education program aimed at education at college level?

A—Not necessarily. While actual high school courses are not allowed those eligible children of deceased veterans may take vocational subjects and other subjects of above high school standards that may help them in their vocational field.

Q—I have remarried and my present husband has adopted my daughter. Thus she is not an orphan. Since her father died from injuries sustained in World War II, is she entitled to training under the War Orphans Assistance program?

gram?

A—Yes. Her eligibility is based on the fact that her parent died from service-connected causes. Subsequent adoption does not affect this original eligibility.

Q—I am a veteran who was discharged for a service-connected disability. Because of that, am I entitled to a special deadline date for a GI home loan?

A—Yes. Veterans discharged for service-connected disabilities are eligible for home loans until the maximum deadline, regardless of the time they left the service. This date is July 25, 1967, for World War II veterans and January 31, 1975, for Korea veterans.

Forestry Notes

Landowners in Tishomingo County have planted millions of pine seedlings on abandoned fields and cut-over tracts of land during the past 20 years. On the face of this statement, it appears that Tishomingo County is covered with thousands of acres of well managed, adequately stocked stands of timber.

We do have many landowners in this county that are managing their timber in such a manner that they may be assured of a continuous crop to be harvested at regular intervals. But on the other hand, there are many landowners who seem to have no thought for the future concerning their timber. A landowner will cut all merchantable timber on his land without leaving a single seed tree to assure him of some semblance of a future crop of timber. If by some chance a stand of seedlings happens to follow the cutting, they will promptly be cut as soon as they reach merchantable size. Eventually, the land will be producing no timber of commercial value.

Landowners such as this one do all the good that has been accomplished in the last two decades. During some years more acres may be taken out of production than is planted in seedlings. Something will have to be done about this if Tishomingo County is ever to produce its share of forest products. These landowners that are indifferent about either improving the quality of their existing timber or else establishing stands of merchantable timber where needed are the people that we will have to look to in the future to a large extent for growing the additional timber that will be needed for a rapidly expanding population.

There are over 5,000 uses for wood at the present time and additional ways to use wood are being developed every day. We are growing only enough wood to supply our needs in the future.

Every person in Tishomingo County who owns timberland should constantly strive to have every acre producing its maximum. It will pay you in dollars and cents and this is what we usually want to know when we start to work on anything.

Mrs. Homemaker, are you paying for extra features on your range and never using them? If so, you are wasting money.

When selecting a range, investigate all models and features. Next evaluate your family's needs.

If you are active outside the home, you and your family may benefit from the automatic oven clock. If you entertain frequently or stagger meals to fit varying family hours, the new low-temperature control that keeps foods warm for hours without further cooking is the greatest thing since the coal stove. Without such demands, it counts little.

Be Careful With Credit

Many families, especially young families, use credit these days. They use it to increase earnings and pay for houses, cars and other things they need.

Wise use of credit can contribute to a high standard of living. On the other hand, misuse and over-use of credit can lead to worries and financial difficulties.

Using credit wisely calls for reliable information about it plus thinking and intelligent decisions. Credit costs money, and you want to be sure that the costs are worth the benefits you receive.

First of all, even before you figure costs and compare benefits, be sure your financial situation justifies use of credit. To use credit wisely, you must be able to plan how you are going to make payments.

A reliable lender doesn't let you have credit unless he knows that your financial situation justifies it. Beware of those lending agencies that are not interested in how much you make or already owe. Their interest rates are generally very high.

High interest rates add to your purchases and can lead to money worries. Paying high interest rates keeps you from buying as many other things as you could otherwise.

If you are not able to make payments when due, you will usually have to extend the payment period of the loan and so have to pay interest over a longer time. You also build up a poor credit rating that may allow you for years and keep you from borrowing for a new house or something else really important in the future.

A Good Breakfast to Begin Day

Breakfast — just as the name implies — breaks the long fast of the night and comes at a time when your body needs some of all the essential nutrients.

A good breakfast supplies a third to a fourth of the foods we need every day. If you skip or skimp on this first meal of the day, you lose nutrients that you need and that are not supplied in other meals of the day.

The pattern for a breakfast that fills the food needs for most people includes these five foods: fruit, a protein food, bread, butter or margarine and a beverage.

Warning Against Use Of Charcoal Grills Inside Home

"Certain facts have been brought to my attention concerning the use of any kind of charcoal burning grills inside the house. The use of such grills is an extremely dangerous practice and can cause death," said Dr. A. L. Gray, Executive Officer of the Mississippi State Board of Health.

"Burning charcoal gives off almost pure carbon monoxide, and when burned indoors or in improperly vented grills will cause carbon monoxide poisoning," continued Dr. Gray.

A recent tragic case illustrates the point: A couple were having a party and steaks were cooked indoors on a charcoal grill. There was no noticeable effect on anyone since the carbon monoxide had risen to the ceiling in the house. After the guests had left and the couple retired, the air in the rooms began to cool. As it did, the carbon monoxide near the ceilings began to descend and engulfed the sleeping couple. Since carbon monoxide is odorless, they received no warning. They were discovered the next day—dead of monoxide poisoning.

Dr. Gray warns: Don't barbecue indoors unless it is done in a fireplace or near an exhaust fan. A concentration of 0.015% of carbon monoxide is fatal in slightly more than 60 minutes. For shorter

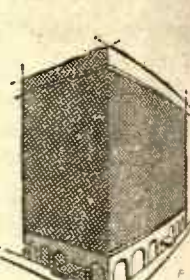

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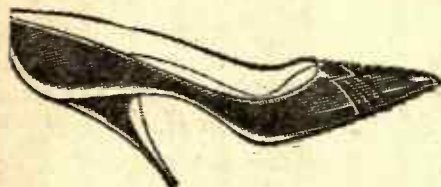
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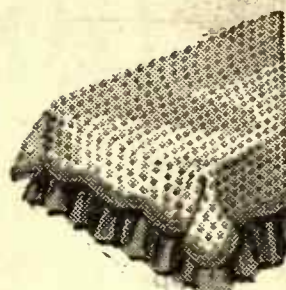

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Sen. Stennis Issues Blast Against Proposed Voting Qualification Change

Senator John Stennis, a leader of Southern opposition to Administration civil rights proposals, has issued a stinging blast against proposals that Congress enact legislation changing voting qualifications.

Stennis, one of the three team Captains of the 18-member Southern bloc in the U. S. Senate, said, "Our teams are ready to fight a last-ditch battle on this vital issue."

Stennis leveled his biggest legal artillery at the proposal by Administration leaders that a sixth grade education would qualify a person to vote.

Senate Majority leader Mike Mansfield of Montana introduced a bill calling for the lowering of voting qualifications, especially as to literacy tests. The plan was outlined earlier by President Kennedy in his State of the Union message on January 11.

Senator Stennis said, "So far as voter qualifications are concerned, if they are changed at all they should, in many areas, be changed upward and not downward."

Stennis said, "The qualification of electors is clearly within the power of the States, under the Constitution. The Congress has no business in this field at all. Interference through Federal legislation in voter qualification is clearly unconstitutional, whether on educational or other grounds."
