County's Share Of Proposed Federal Budget For 1963

Tishomingo County's share of the President's proposed \$92.5 billion federal budget for fiscal 1963 is \$1,702,000, the Mississippi State Chamber of Commerce-MEC estimates.

The organization said it bases the figure on the fact that an established economic index, the one used by the State Department of Education in administering the school program, shows the county to bear 40 per cent of the total tax burden in Mississippi. The State, according to an index accepted nationally, is estimated to pay 0.46 per cent of the total federal tax bill. This means Mississippi's share of the proposed \$92.5 billion federal spending program would be \$425.5 million.

"Mississippi's total income, figured at \$1,173 per capita, is \$2.5 billion annually," the State Chamber said. "When you add local and state government taxes levied upon citizens, \$283,300,000, to the cost of the proposed federal budget, you get a total cost of \$708.8 million. The state and local tax figure is for the year 1960, the latest available.

"This \$708.8 million represents almost one-third of Mississippi's total income, and some historians and economists claim when any government takes over one-third of its citizens income, the nation is beyond the point-of-no-return on the road to socialism. If this be true, we are certainly on the borderline."

The State Chamber said it breaks the cost of the proposed budget down to the state and county level in order that citizens will have a better idea of what federal spending costs them.

different civil defense services—medical, shelter, decontamination, and son on, headed by the mayor and a civil defense staff. This organization is duplicated on the district level and in large industrial installations. On the lowest level, in apartment houses and farms, there are the so-called volunteer self-defense groups, each containing eight specialized teams—medical, shelter, fire fighting, and other duties. A group of about forty-eight persons is organized for every 500 residents or more. A group of about forty-eight persons is organized for every 500 residents or more. The units in urban centers are to be supplemented by special rural formations or military or militarized units which come to the assistance of the cities following an attack.

According to a West German writer, Soviet Premier Khrushchev has claimed that twenty-two million persons, or ten percent of the entire population, now serve in civil defense groups. This could be a goal rather than an actuality.

Training
The Soviet authorities have been insisting on the importance of training the entire population in civil defense. Since 1955, three compulsory training programs for all persons over 16 years of age have been completed. In 1955 there was a 10-hour program, from 1956 to 1958, a 22-hour program and in 1959, a 14-hour program which stressed practical civil defense work. A new 18-hour course program has now gone into effect to stress practical work in post-attack operations. The training programs familiarize the population with the nature of modern weapons and their effects, teach them to use individual means of protection and how to behave in shelters, and instruct them in first aid, firefighting, decontamination and, in rural areas, veterinary assistance to farm animals.

Sam Rayburn is no longer here. What a difference that makes! Mr. Sam's busy mind, cunning smile, magnetic personality, organized talent and downright straight talk shadowed every room, corridor, crevice and conference on the Hill. He dominated the House wing of the Capitol as have few men in all history. In his day there were some "big shots" around here, but on the appearance of Mr. Sam their noise was often reduced to the effectiveness of a cap pistol. He was no "Boss" Joe Cannon. Yet, when it came to "runnin' things" he certainly never would have had to apologize to Joe. His favorite piece of advice, inevitably offered at the beginning of every Congress to new Members, was: "Those who go along the most get along the best." Many a new Member fell in line, seldom to defect.

There is new leadership now. It does not begin its service with the dominant influence that Rayburn had over many Members of the House. The new Speaker, John McCormack, is a man of ability as well as love of political life. Coming from a State noted for its hard nosed, two-party politics and having been reared in Boston's ever boiling political arena, he is moved to play his politics on the open stage, in rough and tumble debate from the House floor, and impulsively at any place or time on any subject. He enjoys and is quite effective in running debate. Mr. Sam seldom spoke from the House floor. But he knew how to speak and did speak rather persuasively and firmly in the privacy of his

office. From behind his desk he again and again closed conferences with his favorite admonition: "Those who go along the most get along the best."

Carl Albert, new majority leader from Oklahoma, is untried in this position of tremendous responsibility. But he is capable, also, likeable and popular. He is not overly partisan nor sectional. Albert was a good middle-of-the-road choice. No extremist from either faction could have been elected.

It is the responsibility of this new team to press for the President's program. What a job! Not only is the program highly controversial, but the leadership will be confronted with more independence on the part of the Members than has been evident in recent years.

The program outlined in the President's State of the Union message is a double first cousin to a party platform—something for everyone. The President is strongly for everything recommended in his social and economic programs. He will press for their passage. Opinion prevails that not even the powerful Mr. Sam could shove this bundle through.

Congress will not surrender its legislative power to the President to either raise or lower taxes. Taxes cannot be lowered now, or soon anyhow, unless spending is reduced. Regrettably, there is no evidence of that, certainly none in the State of the Union message.

Congress will not authorize millions to purchase United Nations bonds—bonds that will never be paid unless paid by Uncle Sam. Defaulting U. N. nations ought to be given the choice of paying their assessments or getting out. Refusal to pay evidences their desire that the U. N. fail in its program for peace. Anyway, we "ain't gonna" buy the bonds.

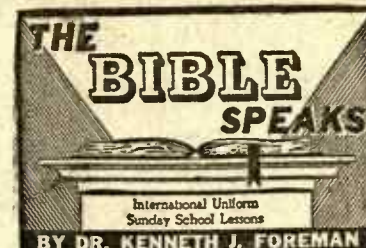
Congress will be reluctant to buy any part, if any at all, of a program to further choke our local market with certain cheap labor goods from abroad. For instance, our garment and textile mills and workers are now struggling to survive the avalanche of foreign goods manufactured with less than a dollar-a-day labor.

Even the yankee states would be, or at least ought to be, loathe to wipe out all literacy tests as a prerequisite to voting. No man should be permitted to vote who is unable to read and write something to simple as "Mary Had a Little Lamb."

There is more, but not room for it here. Indeed, the new House leadership has its work cut out. Who would envy them their task! It will be a long, hard year.

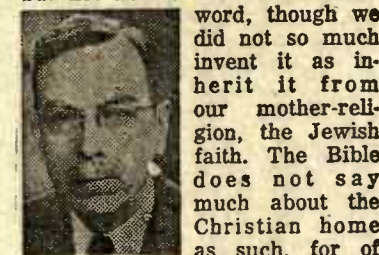

To Make A Home

Lesson for February 11, 1962

THE English language is one of very few that have a word for home. Other languages have words meaning family, or house, but not home. It is a Christian word, though we did not so much invent it as inherit it from our mother-tongue, the Jewish faith. The Bible does not say much about the Christian home as such, for of



Dr. Foreman course in Old Testament times there were no Christians, and in New Testament times no writer of those books had been born into a Christian home. It was something quite new. Nevertheless, as was just said, we inherit the home, as an institution, from the Jews. We may well be grateful, for no other one thing is so fraught with blessing as a true home.

Father and Mother

What does it take to make a home? A modern popular poet wrote and truly, that "it takes a heap of livin' to make a house a home." Another poet retorted that it takes a heap of plumbin' and a heap o' mortgage, and a heap of repairin', and who knows what, to make a home. Indeed this is all true. But before the living and the mortgage and all the rest of it, two people must love each other and want a home together. Homes do not spring up by magic. They are planned. So the Old Testament Scriptures seldom if ever speak of a home (indeed they didn't have the word in the Hebrew language); but they do speak often of Father and Mother. Now a father and a mother do not by themselves make a home. They may both travel and live in suitcases, be may be away so much he seems almost like a stranger when he does come home. Father and mother may achieve nothing but a madhouse, and a divorce as the result of it. But where there is true lasting determined hopeful Christian love, there you have the right foundation for a home.

This does not mean that only with a father-mother combination and partnership, can there be a true home. A mother can carry on—heavy though the burden be—when her husband is taken from her; and a father can carry on (though not so well as a mother) if he has to be father and mother both. Indeed there are homes where there are no children, and where those who live there are not even related to one another. For example, we have the well-known story of how Jesus said from the cross, "Son, behold thy Mother!" and "Mother, behold thy son!" And how John took Jesus' mother Mary into his own home. John and Mary were no relation that we know of; yet we can be sure that their home was a real one. We do not know what John's wife said to this; but it is not likely that Jesus, who must have known John's home situation well, would have said what he did if he thought for a moment that John's wife was a selfish woman. At the very threshold of Christian history, then, we see already what has been multiplied many times over and over—the making of homes by, and for, those whose own homes have been broken by death and disaster.

One of Jesus' puzzling sayings is that one about Corban. The reader may wonder what that has to do with a home. Well, our Lord is speaking of a situation where a man who should be contributing to the home where his father and mother live, makes excuse for not helping them by claiming that he gave the money to the church (as we would say). One point is certainly clear. The home has first claim among all our creditors. For it takes money to support a home. This doesn't mean we all have to be rich. What it does mean—among other things—is that such matters as income, minimum wages, and so forth, are not just "economic" matters. They affect people's ability to make homes at all. A bus broke down in Louisville, Kentucky, last summer. It was filled with migrant workers headed for the cherry orchards of Michigan. Those hard-working people had no money at all, and only the clothes on their backs. They are not covered by minimum wage laws. How much of a home can you have on a migrant's wages? To deny people a decent living is deny them life's greatest blessing, a home.

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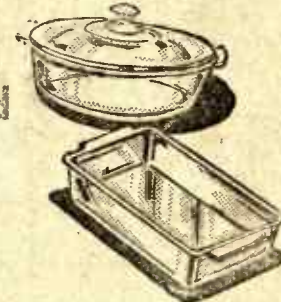
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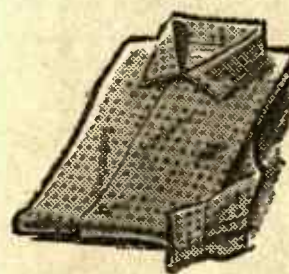

Julian Long Guest Speaker At Meeting Of Lucy Rowe Study Club Held Thursday

Julian R. Long, County Superintendent of Education, was guest speaker at a meeting of the Lucy Rowe Study Club held Thursday night in the home of Mrs. E. C. Holtsford. Assisting Mrs. Holtsford as co-hostess was Mrs. Frank Hardin.

Mr. Long was introduced by his wife, Yvonne, program chairman on Education, also vice-president substituting in the absence of the president, Mrs. Paul Weekley who was unable to attend the meeting.

Mr. Long gave a most informative discussion on Education from the local, state and national levels. On the local level, he pointed out the vast strides that had been made in both the county school system and the Iuka Separate Municipal School District. He stated that in 1943 there were 48 school units in operation in county and passed around pictures of some of those still in operation during the 1953-54 school session. In this group were Bernet's Chapel, Barnes Chapel, Boggs Chapel, Mulberry, Popular Springs, Lamb's Chapel, Center Point, Bluff Springs, Clements, Bethel, and Carversville (Col.) school, Paden, Pleasant Ridge and Holloway Units were in operation through the 1958-59 session and Golden, Midway, and Dennis, the 1959-60 term. A reorganization program has consolidated these units into the following five: Tishomingo, Burnsville, Belmont, the Iuka Special Municipal School District and Carter's Colored School.

New schools, gymnasiums, school buses increase in teacher's salaries, Vocational Agricultural school building added at the Iuka School, plus foreign languages being added to various school curriculums were brought out in discussing improvements and evaluation of the school systems.

Concern was noted in the remarks on Federal connected students. Under Public Law 874 school units may receive up to \$80.00 for each federally connected child in attendance. "A survey is presently being conducted to see if the county school system and the Iuka Separate Municipal School District are eligible," stated Mr. Long. A three percent ADA requirement has to be met.

On the State level, MEA proposals in the 1962 Legislative Program regarding beginner students being six years of age by September 1st instead of January 1st, and the County Superintendent of Education being appointed by a County School Board elected county-wide drew many questions from the club woman. The measure states no qualifications of board members.

Mr. Long concluded his discussion with a few remarks of comparison on the National level, mentioning the fact that Math and Science were emphasized as being highly important subjects particularly while the atomic and space age are being explored.

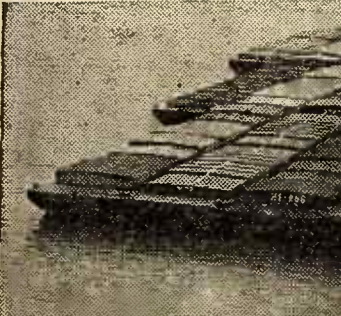

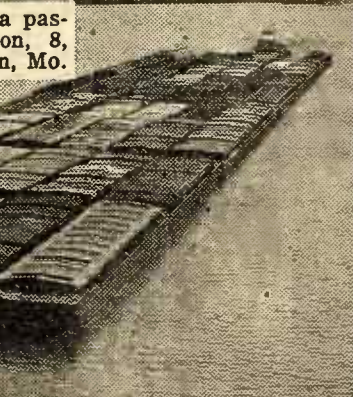

Hospital Visiting Rules Exist For Benefit Of Patient

Beneath a banner bearing the sage advice, "Visits Should Be Enjoyed — Not Endured," the hospitals of Mississippi are moving into concerted action against their common enemy — the bad hospital visitor. Hospital Administrators, long plagued with this problem, agree that only a small percentage of visitors are involved, but they also agree that this ag-

gravating minority have a nuisance value out of all proportion to their numbers.

Previous attempts to convince the thoughtless few that visiting rules exist for the benefit of the patients have not been conspicuously successful. Now, backed by their State Association, Mississippi Hospitals are on the warpath and they hope that an eye-catching combination of humor and horse sense will do the trick.

The opening shots are being fired with ammunition supplied by The Mississippi Hospital Association — A series of colorful posters aimed at wiping out four choice targets: "Two Sides To Every Story" lampoons the character who insists upon sharing his smoking pleasure with his ailing host, and others under fire are the folk who turn a bedside visit into a neighborhood reunion, the chummy "Bed-Sitter" who carries together to far, and the "Happy Wanderer" who tries every private room before the right one.

H. Dean Andrews, president of The Mississippi Hospital Association, emphasizes that although hospitals are using humor as their weapon, this in no way lessens the seriousness of the problem. "Hospitals are deeply concerned about the visiting situation," says Andrews, "because of its very real effect on the provision of good patient care. Visiting hours and regulations may vary from hospital to hospital, but in every case they are designed to suit the facilities of the hospital concerned and the best interests of its patients."

Andrews, on the other hand, makes it clear that hospitals have no wish to discourage hospital visiting as such. "Most visitors," says Andrews, "are considerate and well-behaved, and from experience we know that a good visit acts as a tonic to the patient. Even those who do not always follow

the rules probably mean we hope that if they themselves in these ways."

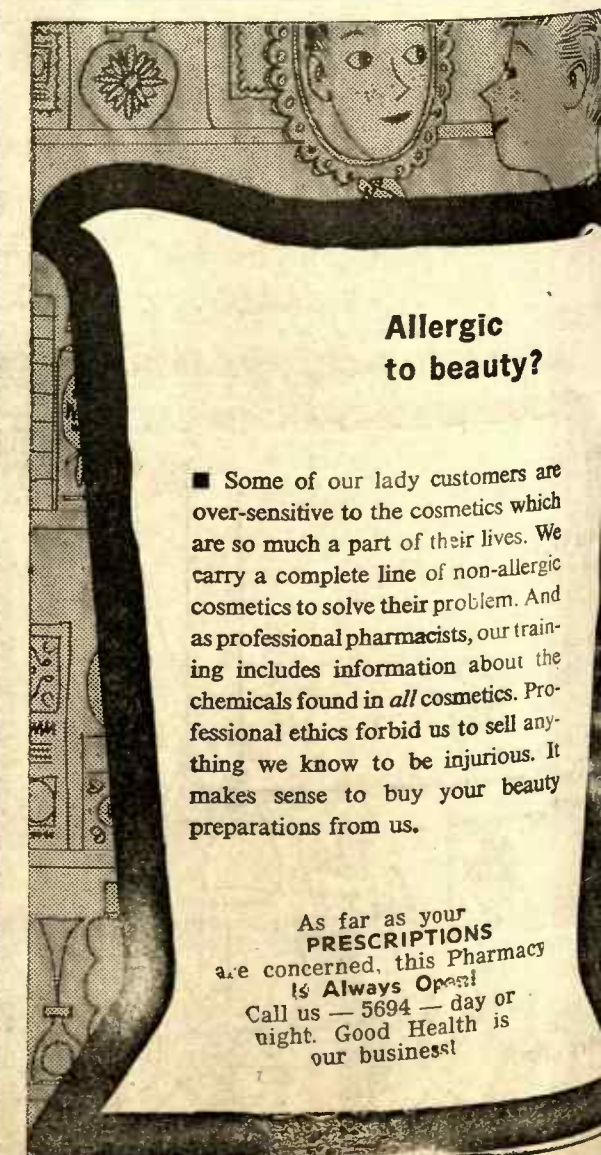

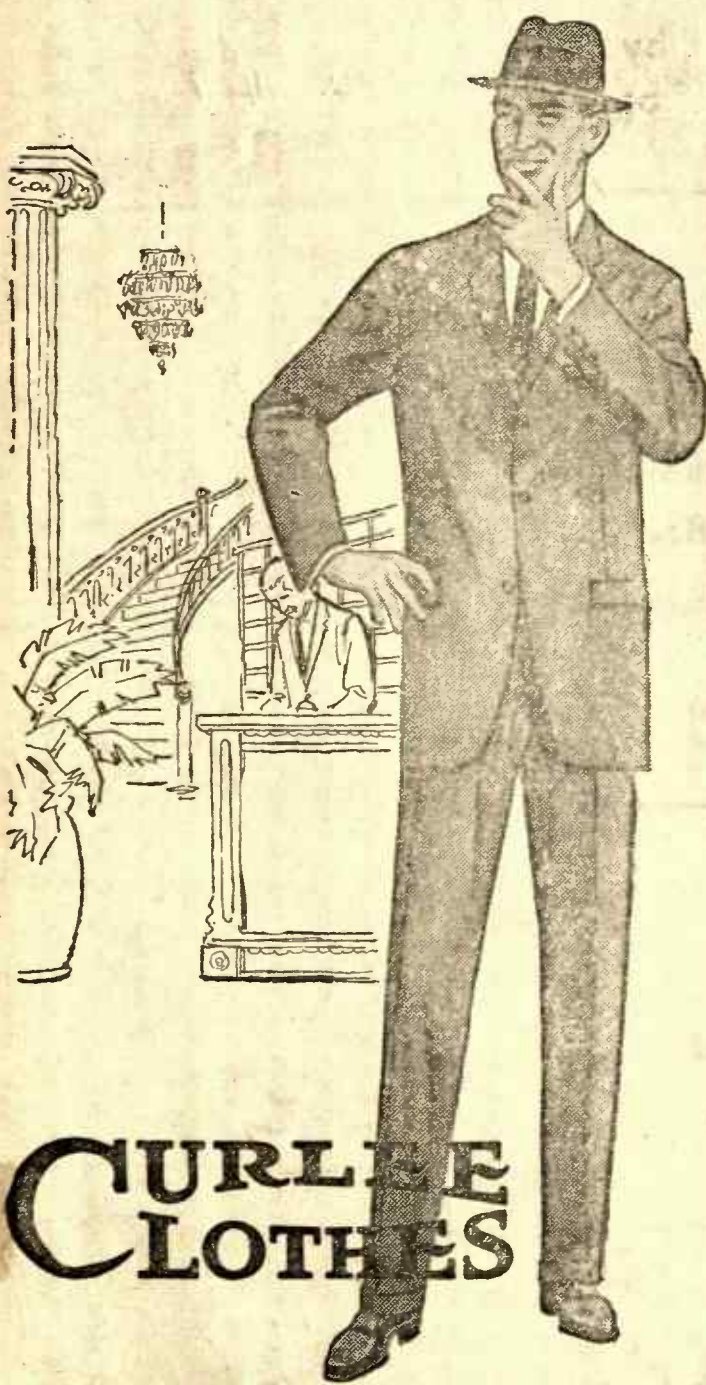

A promising asset in Mississippi's farm economy is the soybean whose importance is increasingly recognized. Soybeans as a protein source outrank in volume all the other oil seeds. Mississippi's soybean production in 1961 set an all-time state record. The crop was estimated at 23,490,000 bushels — or 17 per cent above 1960's crop of soybeans and almost two million bushels above the previous high in 1959. Mississippi's 1961 production was two and one-fifth times larger than the 1950-59 average of 10,704,000 bushels. As a ranking producer, Mississippi has a big stake in the long range potential that soybeans have.

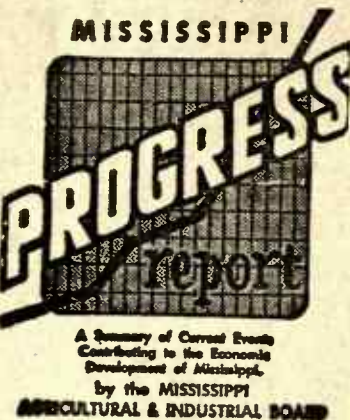

U. S. Electrical Motors Selects Philadelphia

Plans for a new industry in Philadelphia expected to provide several hundred jobs were disclosed by Mayor A. D. Harbort, who expressed appreciation to the Agricultural and Industrial Board, North Mississippi Industrial Development Association and a number of Philadelphians involved in negotiations with the company dating back to March of 1960. The new industry — U. S. Electrical Motors, Inc., a nationally known manufacturer with headquarters in California and Connecticut — will occupy on 80,000-square-foot plant to be built just north of Philadelphia. Target date for the plant opening is October 1. The company is a leader in the manufacture and sale of industrial electrical motors, gear motors and variable speed drives, and the \$1,500,000 plant will produce standard motors in fractional and integral sizes. A&I Board director Joe Bullock cited the new plant as an example of the heavier industry moving into the state.

Business Activity Hits All-Time High

Business activity in Mississippi during November 1961 set an all-time record, according to the Bureau of Business and Economic Research at Mississippi State University. The bureau further stated that December business reports will surpass November's when completed. Business indices, according to the report, indicated that business was 45 per cent above the monthly average of the three-year base period (1956-58) and was 11 points above the November 1960 level. Mississippi Ranks 12th In Exports To Japan

Mississippi's sales of \$31 million, composed chiefly of cotton

made it the twelfth leading state in exports to Japan in 1960. Exports to Japan provided employment for some 11,600 Mississippians, including direct production workers, suppliers and service personnel. These conclusions were reached by an exhaustive survey just released by the U. S. — Japan Trade Council. Principal commodities shipped by Mississippi to Japan in 1960 included cotton (\$24 million), soybeans (\$3 million) and chemicals (\$2 million).

Pascagoula Grain Elevator Off To Good Start

The Jackson County Terminal Elevator at Pascagoula operated by the Standard Milling Company, got off to a flying start during its first three months of operation. Fourteen vessels cleared the elevator during the October-December period with a total tonnage of 145,000 tons. During the same period, the elevator handled a total of 12,088,643 bushels. In addition to the elevator tonnage, the port handled 2,000 tons of flour, 3,000 tons of chemical fertilizer, and 2,000 tons of sugar. The amount of tonnage moving through the port far exceeds all estimates in a feasibility report made when Jackson county applied for state assistance for port development.

General Tire Initiating Activity In Columbus

General Tire and Rubber Co. is planning to start a training course in Columbus for the purpose of training future employees of a plastics plant to be built by the company at Columbus in the near future, according to a report made by Columbus mayor William J. Propst. General Tire has exercised an option to purchase a tract of land at Columbus. No specific announcement of the plant, its products, size and employment prospects has been officially made as yet.

Cattle-Brands Must Be Registered With Safety Department

Cattle-branding usually brings to mind the Old West but it is just as much a part of modern, industrial Mississippi as it was then. It's a matter of vital concern to all livestock owners because it is the only definite proof of ownership.

Capt. B. F. Rodgers, Brands Supervisor for the Livestock Theft Bureau of the Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol, is the man that handles all brands registration for the state. He still is receiving complaints that many owners are using old brands or unrecorded brands. In many cases these are the same brands that are recorded in someone else's name. The law concerning brands states that no one may use a brand unless it is registered with the Department of Public Safety.

Brands are recorded every five years, and every brand must be re-recorded each five year period to remain valid. The current five-year period ends June 30, 1962. Beginning in March of this year notices will be mailed to all grand holders that their brands must be re-registered for the '62-'67 period. Owners wishing to record or renew a brand can contact Capt. Rodgers at the Livestock Theft Office for details.

Veterans' Corner

Q—How can the orphan child of a dead peacetime veteran qualify for educational benefits under the War Orphans Educational Assistance program?

A—If a serviceman dies as the result of illness or injuries incurred in extra-hazardous duty during his peacetime service, his children become eligible for all the provisions of the War Orphans Educational Assistance Act.

Q—Will Social Security officials credit me with my time in military service when I am about to retire?

A—Yes. Veterans with 90 days

active service between September 16, 1940, and December 31, 1956, whose discharge was other than dishonorable, may receive gratuity Social Security wage credits of \$130 for each such month of active duty. These credits are not actually listed on your Social Security earnings record until you apply for benefits. At that time they will be added to your military service record.

Q—Can I receive either electronic or mechanical aid as a blind veteran, is it necessary that my blindness be service-connected?

A—No. But you must be blind in both eyes and be entitled to compensation for some other service-connected disability.

Q—Will the Veterans Administration naturalize an alien who

served in the Armed Forces? A—Naturalization of aliens is in the Department of Justice. However, the Veterans Administration may help the applicant by certifying his service during World War I or World War II and eliminating the waiting periods, etc. Since there are certain conditions which must be met, individuals should check first with the nearest VA office.

Pine Stands Will Thin Themselves

A fully stocked stand of pine will thin itself, but there is no profit from the trees which die.

If 1000 pine seedlings are set on an acre and left alone, they will thin themselves.

For maximum growth, pine trees need plenty of space and plenty of sunlight.

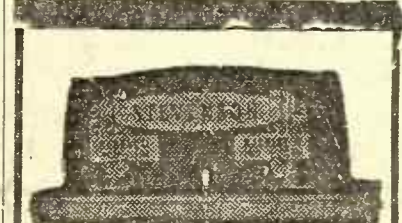
As the more vigorous pines grow taller and larger, they crowd and shade out the smaller pines. The overtopped smaller pines become stunted, cease to grow and finally die.

What actually happens in pine woodland varies with conditions as they exist. However, a fairly accurate idea of what takes place is as follows:

A landowner sets 1000 loblolly pines per acre on an area. By the time they reach 6 inches in diameter, breast high, 320 pines have died, leaving a fully stocked stand of 680 pines. When they are 10 inches in diameter, breast high, 700 have died leaving only 300. When they are 14 inches in diameter, breast high, 830 have died, leaving 170. When they finally reach 18 inches in diameter, breast high, 890 pines have died, leaving only a fully stocked stand of 110.

In the illustration above, figures show that 890 of the 1000 pine seedlings set per acre died before the fully stocked stand of 110 pines reached a diameter of 18 inches at about four feet above the ground.

Nearly nine-tenths of all the pines set on the acre died and the landowner received no profit from

Scholarship Program To Aid Area Students; Summer Employment Offered

E. Nicholson, President of Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company, announced the company's encouragement of area students to secure a college education. The company will award a scholarship each year to the National Merit Scholarship Program. The dollar amount of the scholarship is \$1,500. The need of the student can be as high as \$1,500 or up to a total of \$5,000 for four college years. Within the Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company, four college students are selected for the National Merit Scholarship.

The National Merit Scholarship tests, which are available to high schools, will be administered in March of this year. Students interested in taking the test—the first step in qualifying for a scholarship—should contact their principal as soon as possible.

Students designated finalists may qualify for other scholarships in addition to the one sponsored by Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company.

The scholarship holder may arrange to attend any accredited college of his choice, but must be planning for a career in accounting, business, education, personnel administration, chemistry, physics or engineering.

In addition to the above program the Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company has joined the Pulp and Paper Foundation, Incorporated. This foundation provides yearly scholarships of \$800, \$600, and \$1,000 to selected students who will major in Pulp and Paper Technology at North Carolina State College. These students are selected by a Scholarship Committee composed of mill representatives who review applications for the scholarships. One requirement is the completion of College Entrance Board Examinations that can be taken through several area high schools.

In both of the above programs, the Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company will offer summer employment to scholarship holders.

There will be no strings attached to the scholarships so that the students and company will have

no employment obligations at the time of the student's graduation. The company does have hopes that many graduates of this scholarship program will be interested in employment with Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company and that positions will be available.

Students interested in the scholarships outlined above are requested to contact their High School Principals. Additional information may be obtained from the Industrial Relations Division of Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company at Counce, Tennessee.

Vehicle Inspection Lagging; Motorists Reminded Of Rush

Motorists are urged to have their vehicles inspected as soon as possible to comply with Mississippi's Motor Vehicle Inspection Law. Director of Motor Vehicle Inspection R. L. He stresses the importance of having the inspections made as soon as possible to avoid a rush at the last minute.

There are approximately 1100 official approved inspection stations in the state. There are stations located in almost every town in Mississippi. With the number of approved locations no one is very far from an inspection facility. The inspection fee is only \$1.25. One dollar of the inspection fee goes to the inspecting station and 25 cents goes to the Highway Patrol.

"For safety's sake and your own protection, have your vehicle inspected as soon as possible," Mr. Morgan concluded.

Freedom Bond Drive
Mississippians will be asked during May and June to join in the most intensive nationwide U. S. Savings Bonds campaign since World War II. The campaign, to be called the Freedom Bond Drive, was announced recently by Rex I. Brown of Jackson, chairman of the State Savings Bonds Committee, following his return from a conference in Washington.

"The Freedom Bond Drive will give Americans an opportunity to share in the important job of keeping America strong and free through the purchase of Savings Bonds—truly Bonds of Freedom," he declared.

"Freedom is in danger all over the world. The struggle to preserve that Freedom will require courage, patience, and strength," Mr. Brown said. "In this critical period of history, the buyer of Savings Bonds puts his dollars to

my strong enough to back up that power."

Active support of this campaign will be expressed through payroll savings campaigns in large and small companies, in special efforts by banks to increase bond sales and by participation in the drive by many community leaders and organizations.

Boron On Cotton
The Agricultural Experiment Station is recommending boron on cotton throughout the hills section of the state.

Boron drilled at the rate of one half pound per acre gave an average yield increase of 406 pounds of seed cotton to the acre. The recommended rate is three-tenths pound of boron to the acre. No more than one-half pound should be applied.

Apply the boron in borated fertilizer at planting time, directly to the soil as a spray, or as a foliage application. If the boron is applied as foliage spray with phosphate insecticides, the effective life of the insecticide may be reduced. Complete research data are in the January issue of Mississippi Farm Research.

Cotton Seed Testing
Do not wait until planting time to check your cotton planting seed supplies.

If you saved your own planting seed, send a sample now to the State Seed Testing Laboratory for a germination test. Send about a half pound of seed or one quart per sample.

Student nurses will dramatize their activities by way of closed circuit television. During the afternoon the high school students will see the new ultra-modern nurse dormitory and get a chance to model the becoming blue and white striped student nurse uniforms.

Mrs. Marion Bassett of Jackson, former faculty member and president of the nursing alumni chapter, will preside.

CAPITAL NEWS

Soybean Production

A promising asset in Mississippi's farm economy is the soybean whose importance is increasingly recognized. Soybeans as a protein source outrank in volume all the other oil seeds. Mississippi's soybean production in 1961 set an all-time state record. The crop was estimated at 23,490,000 bushels or 17 per cent above 1960's crop of soybeans and almost two million bushels above the previous high in 1959. Mississippi's 1961 production was two and one-fifth times larger than the 1950-59 average of 10,704,000 bushels. As a ranking producer, Mississippi has a big stake in the long range potential that soybeans have.

Farm Income and Fertilizer

There is a definite relationship between farm income and fertilizer. The farmer that uses more fertilizer usually has the larger income. Using the right ration and amount of fertilizer, along with other sound management practices, can certainly mean higher yields and lower cost per bushel, bale, or pound produced. Also, fertilizers are a lot better than they used to be.

More Good Economic Growth

Mississippi's industrial economy continues at a steady and healthy growth. This is a pleasing prospect and should be gratifying to the many groups and local areas who work so hard to attain and then keep their payroll producers. Significantly, a wide variety of industries find the state receptive to needs and the ready and willing market of workers.

First Barge of Aluminum Made

The first aluminum barge to be built in this country was completed and launched at Pascagoula. It has the largest ship's hull ever made of aluminum. The barge is designed to carry sensitive liquid chemicals, and is part of a commercial testing program.

1961 Farm Income Nearly Record High For Mississippi

Last year's farm income will be nearly record high for Mississippi, according to M. S. Shaw, director of the Agricultural Extension Service.

The 1961 income from crops and livestock alone is estimated at \$661 million. This is second to the all-time high of \$671 million in 1953. Livestock and livestock products account for 41 per cent of this

\$661 million.

In figuring the 1961 gross income, economists added to the income from crops and livestock the \$107 million value of products used at home, farm dwelling rental values and government payments.

Gross farm income for Mississippi in 1961 is estimated at \$667 million, compared with \$709 million in 1960 and \$683 million for the five-year average, 1955-59. Cotton accounts for about 40 per cent of the 1961 total.

Gross farm income per farm for 1961 in Mississippi is estimated at \$5,724. This compares to \$5,253 in 1960 and \$3,249 for the five-year average, 1955-59.

This 1961 income per farm is nine per cent over the 1960 income and 76 per cent over the five-year average, 1955-59.

"These estimates just completed by our Extension Service agricultural economists are conservative. Final figures could be somewhat higher," Mr. Shaw stated.

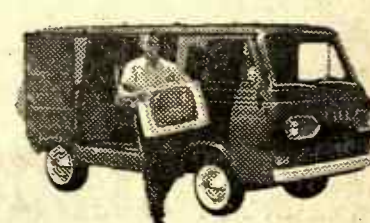
