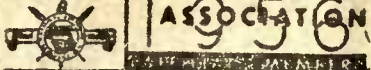

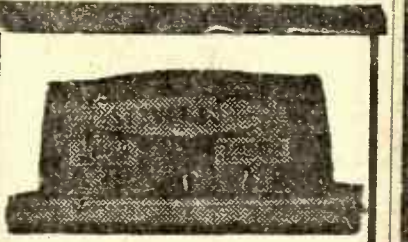
Ernest Dewitt May

District Spring
Livestock Shows
To Begin In March

Mississippi's annual district spring livestock show circuit will get underway in mid-March, according to the Agricultural Extension Service.

The district shows will feature top animals in dairy, beef, hogs, sheep and poultry from county livestock shows.

Strong competition will also be evident among 4-H judging teams in general livestock, poultry and dairy. Estimates from county 4-H agents indicate increased participation in all phases of judging activity.

The district show schedule is Greenwood, March 14-17; Port Gibson, March 15-17; Hattiesburg, March 19-21; Forest, March 21-24; Batesville, March 26-29, and West Point, March 29-31.

A state Round-Up of champion animals will climax the district shows.

The state show will be held at the State Fairgrounds in Jackson April 2-3 and will consist of top placing animals in the dairy division and meat animal divisions from the six district shows.

A sale of meat animals will be a feature of the state show.

"This year especially the district and state shows will serve as a 'show window' of the state's rapidly expanding livestock industry," said H. B. Hedgepeth, assistant animal husbandman of the Agricultural Extension Service.

"Numbers of animals are up and despite the extreme winter weather, quality of animals should show results of advances made in the type of animals now on Mississippi farms."

Estimates of participation show numbers of junior owned steers increased by 43 percent, fat lambs up 37 percent, market hogs up 23 percent and dairy animals up 12 percent.

Social Security Applicants Warned Of People Helping To Obtain Benefits

Hugh Tigrett, Manager of the Tupelo, Mississippi Social Security Administration District Office, announced today that three accountants from Conway, South Carolina, pled guilty February 14 to charging unlawful fees for aiding persons in applying for social security benefits. James R. Holbert, Sr., pled guilty to four counts in an indictment returned by a Federal Grand Jury last May, Alexander S. Holbert pled guilty to three, and Wendell J. Holbert pled guilty to eight. They were sentenced to a year in jail on each count by Judge C. C. Wyche in U. S. District Court in Florence, South Carolina, or payment of a \$500 fine on each count. The Holberts had collected their fees in a number of instances by arranging to have the applicants they assisted pay over to them a large portion of the first social security check received.

Since many of these checks covered several months for which retroactive benefits were due, the fees involved were excessive, Mr. Tigrett cautioned all applicants

Poultry Notes

Prevention of poultry diseases is far better than trying to cure diseases once they get started.

In preventing poultry disease, it is best to start with the chick. Isolate the chicks from the adult stock. Grow them away from adult birds. If practical use different caretakers. Keep visitors out. Do not move from adult birds to chicks; go from chicks to older birds.

Keep everything in the brooder house clean. Keep the chicks comfortable. Supply plenty of good feed and clean water.

Vaccinate for New Castle, Bronchitis, and Fowl Pox. Check for lice, mites and worms.

Sick Pastures

Fertilizer and lime are the best medicines for sick pastures. Pastures covered with broomsedge are sick and need this medicine badly.

Get a soils test. See how much lime is needed and how much fertilizer to use. It will pay off. For details on how to rid pastures of broomsedge, see your local county agent.

Fertilizing Fish Ponds

A well fertilized fish pond will grow 300 pounds of fish a year. Unfertilized, it might grow 50 pounds.

Begin fertilizing in March or early April. Repeat the application once a week until the water looks green or brownish. After this, fertilize only when the water is clear about a foot deep. You may need to fertilize your pond six to twelve times in a year.

Recommended fertilizer to use is 100 pounds per surface acre of 8-8-2 NPK.

Broadcast the fertilizer into the water from the shore or pour it slowly from a moving boat.

Do not fertilize a pond that stays muddy, that has a lot of water running through it all the time. Don't fertilize in winter and don't fail to fish the pond a plenty.

Social Security

As a self-employed farmer, you may still be earning social security credits even if you do not have to pay income tax.

The laws says that if you have a net income of more than \$400 from farming, you must report

your earnings for social security purposes.

You must have these credits to be eligible for benefits when you reach retirement age. Don't deprive yourself or family of social security benefits. Report your earnings accurately.

The Board of Supervisors took up for consideration the matter of issuing bonds of Tishomingo County for road and bridge purposes, and, after a discussion of the subject, Supervisor H. M. Biggs offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, TO ISSUE BONDS OF SAID COUNTY IN THE MAXIMUM PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$100,000) TO RAISE MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSTRUCTING, RECONSTRUCTING, IMPROVING, AND REPAIRING ROADS, HIGHWAYS, AND BRIDGES IN SAID COUNTY, AND DIRECTING PUBLICATION OF NOTICE OF SUCH INTENTION.

WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors does now find and determine that it has become necessary to raise money for the purpose of constructing, reconstructing, and repairing roads, highways, and bridges in Tishomingo County, Mississippi; and

WHEREAS, this Board has made due investigation and does now find and determine that the estimated cost of the aforesaid improvements is One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000); and

WHEREAS, sufficient funds are not now available in the treasury of said County to provide for the aforesaid expenditure; and

(b) That the said County at this time has outstanding bonded indebtedness in the amount of Three Hundred Fifteen Thousand and no/100 (\$315,000.00);

(c) That the amount of bonds

now proposed to be issued, when added to the amount of indebtedness now outstanding, will not exceed ten per centum (10%) of the aforesaid assessed valuation; and

WHEREAS, this Board does now further find and determine that it is necessary that in the public interest that bonds of said County be issued as hereinafter set forth: NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, hereby declares its intention to issue bonds of said County in the maximum principal amount of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) to raise money for the purpose of constructing, reconstructing and repairing roads, highways, and bridges in said County.

No Stealing

Lesson for March 4, 1962

"THIEF" is a bad word. No-body wants to be called one. Even a thief himself will complain about other thieves. "I've been robbed!" is a common complaint uttered by those who habitually rob others. To be sure, there are twisted minds, busy in devising dishonest schemes, and proud of their success when they do work.

Dr. Foreman But then there are twisted minds clever in all ways of crime and sin. What we can call normal people don't like to be called thieves. It is a fatal objection to a man that he is dishonest. Nothing else makes up for the lack of honesty. "He is a generous, hard-working man—but you have to watch him every minute." "He's a pleasant gentleman, but don't have any business dealings with him." Those are not "recommendations" any of us would enjoy over-hearing about ourselves.

But are we honest? Nevertheless, such is the strange nature of the self-deceiving human mind, that it is easy to "kid" ourselves into thinking we are more honest than we really are. One way we deceive ourselves is by taking refuge in what is undeniably a fact: It does make a difference where the money is taken from. It is worse to take money from a child than from a man big enough to fight; it is worse to take money from a poor man than from a rich one.

Of course; but stealing is still stealing; even if not all forms of stealing are equally bad, all forms are bad. It is not true, for example, that if the person from whom we withhold what is their rightful due is rich enough, maybe not a person at all but a corporation or a government, then it's all right to do them for all we can get by with. Jesus on one occasion gave a strong hint to the Pharisees that they were cheating the Roman government by not paying taxes. Saint Paul (Romans 13:7) found it necessary to instruct his fellow-Romans to pay their taxes. One of the commonest forms of theft in America is beating the government out of tax money. Business firms would even make a joke of it; expense accounts were known as "swindle sheets."

Another common form of stealing is to take money from people who are helpless. To be sure, few grown Americans would actually take money from a child; but some Americans have slow and creaky consciences when it comes to taking advantage of their position by charging much too much. Those price-fixing cases we all read about were like that. A city would have to pay enormous sums for electrical equipment, because the bids were "rigged" and not competitive. A landlord will charge exorbitant rent for his property, all because he knows the tenant has nowhere to go. A union will charge its members, or a surgeon his patients, or a plumber his customers, with a bill that is all out of reason; just because the workman or patient or customer has no choice but to pay.

In good cause The incident of the money-changers in the Temple (Mark 11:15-19) illustrates two forms of stealing at once. The temple taxes had to be paid in a special currency. These money-men would exchange (say) Roman money into temple money, charging a very high fee for the service. Now they were cheating the public on sacred premises; but stealing is stealing no matter where it's done. In America uncounted sums are lost every year in gambling devices in certain church "festivals" and "picnics" and the like, not to mention double-priced white elephants at church bazaars. It's all for a good cause, we are told, and even prominent public leaders set a bad example of gambling even if it is for the benefit of a cancer fund or some charitable organization. But it's still stealing, more is lost than won. Or to take a different example: How many churches pay their janitors and other servants even the minimum standard wages? A church has no more right to underpay employees than any individual has. Keeping what belongs to people out of their hands is still stealing.

Refrigerator Cost More To Operate?

If your refrigerator costs more to operate these days there are several good reasons why. Here are some of them.

The "no-frost" operation costs about 2 cents to 4 cents a day depending on the power rate.

Bigger refrigerators use more power; bigger freeze sections—the more cold the more cost. The fan in the No-Frost models that keeps away the frost adds to the cost. The ice-maker uses a bit more power. The refrigerator door is probably opened more often.

Another reason for the higher operation costs is that most of our homes are heated all the time and the warm kitchen air makes the refrigerator run longer.

Cabbage is Good

Cabbage should be plentiful before long. When it is plentiful, it is economical. Here is one more way to make this vegetable taste extra good:

Cabbage With Cheese Sauce
1 medium-size head of green cabbage, 4 tablespoons butter, 2 cups milk. Dash pepper, 1 1/2 cups shredded cheese, 4 tablespoons flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt.

Cut the cabbage in wedges for serving, and place them in briskly boiling salted water. Cook until the cabbage is just tender, about 10 to 15 minutes, lifting the cover two or three times during cooking.

Make a white sauce of butter, flour, milk and seasonings and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Remove from fire, add shredded cheese and stir until cheese melts. Place thoroughly drained cabbage in serving dish and pour the cheese sauce over it immediately before serving. Sprinkle with paprika.

Ever stand the iron up on end and leave it for a while sitting

on the ironing board?

Help Cut Erosion; Fertilize Properly

"Adequate soil fertility helps prevent erosion by producing a heavier, faster developing crop cover," so says Earl Kroth, University of Missouri Soils Researcher.

However, adequate fertility will not take the place of mechanical erosion control measures such as terraces and vegetated outlets.

If seasons are favorable for plant growth, adequate soil fertility will cause a crop of corn, cotton, hay or any other similar crop to develop rapidly and to cover the ground quickly.

Any good ground cover will protect the land from the pounding of rain drops which churn-up the surface soil particles and cause them to float away.

The farmer who gets his soil tested, and who uses the recommended kind and amount of fertilizer per acre is wise.

Not only will he, by proper fertilization, increase his crop yield per acre, which may result in greater profit to him, but he is conserving the land he has by slowing down erosion. His land will become more fertile and more productive because he is gradually building it up.

If you have not done so, get your soil tested. Send samples to State soils laboratory. If you have any questions about this, contact your County Agent Percie Stricklen.

Testing your soil can help you save your soil and make more money.
