Board Votes To Accept Contract For New Well

The board of Alder-men of the city of Iuka in regular Tuesday night session voted to accept the contract for the drilling of a new well to increase the water supply for the city. The contract was awarded to the Rogers-Drilling Company of Rogers, Ark. The proposal being made by the company was to drill a well at a cost of \$4,000 per foot, the casing to be installed at \$1.00 per foot. The well is to be drilled to a depth of 100 feet. The city will be the sole owner of the well and the water produced therefrom will be sold at \$350.00 per million gallons. The well is to be started on drilling as soon as weather permits.

National 4-H Club Week Observed By Local Clubs

Accomplishments Of '61
To Highlight Programs

Highlights of Mississippi 4-H Club Work during 1961 and plans for the future will be outlined to the public during National 4-H Club Week, March 3-10. The state's nearly 108,000 4-H boys and girls and their leaders will use newspapers, radio and television stations, window displays and meetings to tell of their accomplishments, said C. I. Smith, state 4-H leader of the Agricultural Extension Service.

The purpose of National 4-H Club Week is to: Offer a special time for members to evaluate past achievements and plan for the year ahead; inform other youth about the program and invite them to participate; Acquaint more parents with 4-H and seek their cooperation; Encourage more able men and women to become volunteer club leaders; Increase public understanding of 4-H aims, and gain support for year round activities; and Express appreciation to friends of 4-H, locally and nationally, and recognize the important part they play.

How 4-H Week will be observed: The continuing theme will be "Learn - Live - Serve. 4-H alumni, and leaders, will be guests and speakers. Civic and service clubs, schools and churches, farm organization, and other groups will arrange for talks by 4-H'ers and former 4-H'ers, and programs shared by parents, leaders, extension agents, and others who help with club work. Newspapers, radio and television stations will carry 4-H news and features. Exhibits illustrating typical activities will be prepared and displayed in store windows and other prominent places. 4-H'ers carry a wide variety of educational projects in farming, homemaking, community service, and other activities. They raise livestock and poultry, grow gardens and field crops, conserve the soil, sew, learn good nutrition, practice safety, and improve their homes. They apply the latest research in home economics, agriculture, and other fields—and learn the "why's" as well as "how's" of what they do.

"Our boys and girls have a lot to tell about 1961," Mr. Smith pointed out. "Mississippi had 14 national record winners which was the second largest group in the country. In numbers of boy national winners, the state ranked first for the second straight year." Mississippi 4-H Club members were awarded 63 college scholarships valued at \$14,250 during the past year. The scholarships were made available by national and local sponsors for outstanding work in the 4-H program. A highlight of National 4-H Week will be a report to the Nation by a group of 4-H members. David Smith, of Rankin County, national winner in 4-H achievement, is one of six from throughout the United States to be selected for the "Report to the Nation" and trip to Washington, D. C.

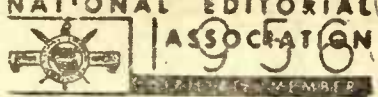
National honors in 4-H judging, demonstration and exhibit contests went to 26 Mississippi 4-H members during 1961," Mr. Smith pointed out. "A large measure of credit for the successful 4-H year should go to the volunteer 4-H adult leaders who are the backbone of club work," he added. A breakdown on Mississippi 4-H Club membership shows that 71,569 members come from farm homes; 21,989 from rural non-farm homes and 14,187 from urban homes. "4-H has projects available that are attractive to all boys and girls, whether they be from the smallest farm or the largest city," the state leader said. "Training in such activities as citizenship, health, leadership, automotive and recreation are just a few of the programs available to all 4-H'ers."

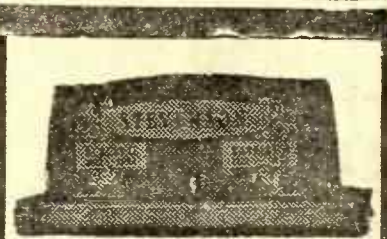

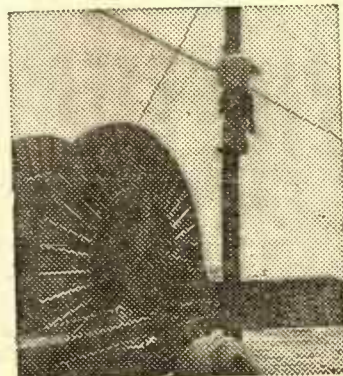

Home Agent Notes

DID YOU KNOW? Where the ice cream cone originated? It was at the St. Louis World's Fair in 1904. One hot afternoon an ice cream stand ran out of ice cream dishes. They asked the folks in a nearby stand that had a specialty of penny waffles to roll the waffles into a cone-shape to fill them with ice cream.

Pruning Early Shrubs
The time to prune early bloomers, as lilac, bridal wreath and flowering quince, is right after they bloom.

You want to prune shrubs to reduce their size, yet maintain the natural form of the plant. The exceptions to the rules are hedges or closely sheared plants in a modern-style planting.

Add Narrow Shelves
Here's an idea to add storage

space to your cabinets. Place a narrow shelf between shelves spaced 8 to 10 inches apart. Or, if there are 12 or more inches between shelves, add 2 narrow ones.

You might also add narrow shelves between the counter top and the upper cabinets. If two are built, the upper shelf may be wider than the lower.

March Plentiful Foods
At the head of the food list for March are eggs. Along with them are listed grapefruit, potatoes, peanuts and peanut products, milk and dairy products and dry beans.

Potatoes, one of the foods on the list, have a false reputation for being fattening. A medium size potato has about 100 calories, the same as a banana or an apple. Add 2 tablespoons of gravy or a tablespoon of butter or margarine and that's another 100 calories. Calorie watchers can enjoy potatoes with less added fat.

Potatoes: Baked in Electric Fry Pan
Try using your electric fry pan to bake potatoes. It's easy and inexpensive for it takes less electricity than an oven.

Place the desired number of scrubbed, slit, baking potatoes of uniform size on a rack in a preheated (420 degrees) fry pan. Place the lid on the pan with the vent closed. Bake from 45 to 60 minutes, depending on size of potatoes. For crispy skins open the vent the last 15 minutes. Remove potatoes, serve from bottom to open slit. Serve with butter, or sour cream seasoned to taste.

Profit With Silage
Feed is the biggest expense in producing milk. Since good roughage is the backbone of a feeding program, more dairymen are looking at silage for their roughage. Some advantages of silage are: More high quality feed can be stored as silage than in any other way.

With silage, you can produce and store more feed from an acre of land than in any other way. One acre of corn put up as silage produces 20 to 40 percent more feed than if harvested for grain.

It is easier to make good quality silage than hay, particularly from earlier crops.

By using grass silage in the spring and heavier tonnage crops like corn and sorghum in the fall the same storage place can be used twice during the year.

Some keys to good silage are: Air tight silo walls. Crop cut at right stage of maturity. Cutter set for 1/4 to 1/2 inch cut. Silo filled fast and packed well.

Corn and sorghums need no preservatives. Direct cut, high moisture silage like grass need a preservative that absorbs part of the seepage. Ground ear corn is an example of such a preservative.

Legume silages because of odors should have a chemical preservative added. Sodium meta-bisulfate will help reduce odors. Silage is a good feed for beef cattle as well as dairy cattle.

Coastal Bermuda
Care of stolons before setting is mighty important in assuring a good survival and stand of Coastal.

Some times stolons dry out, freeze or go through a heat when piled up. This causes failure! Coastal sprigs should be set the same day they are dug. If they cannot be set the same day, spread them out and keep them wet. Set within a few days. Keep them damp during the setting.

We have a place for Coastal in our pastures in Tishomingo County. If you are interested in securing Coastal stolons and establishing Coastal on your farm, come by the county agent's office for more information.

Why Be Truthful?

Lesson for March 11, 1962

SOME people can't "see" Christianity at all. Others can see some parts of it. But arguments go on among the experts: Is the Christian religion something so special and different that a non-Christian cannot understand it at all, or is there some point of contact, something which doesn't call for a special revelation before a man can see it?

Probably the Ten Commandments appeal to more "non-religious" persons than some other parts of Christianity. One of them we have for consideration this week: "Thou shalt not bear false witness. Or—turning it around as we can and must—Thou shalt be truthful. Who cannot understand this? Who wants to do business with a man who can't be trusted? Who wants to marry a person whose word means nothing?"

Nothing that is not true

The main difference between the ordinary understanding of truth and the Christian understanding of it, is in the very thoroughgoing understanding of what truth means, which high-grade Christians have. We shall look at only a few points. First, we believe that truth is not truth when it is mixed with falsehood. It's like passing a glass of mixed water and telling him, "Have a glass of water." It is water, true enough; but not all of it. The word "water" is a true word for half of what is in the glass, a fatally false word for the rest of it. Perhaps the most dangerous form of untruth is a mixture of truth and falsehood; for the part-truth makes people think the whole thing is truth. They will take the lie-and-truth much more easily than a lie alone.

Not everything that is true

Second, while it is not ever right to tell a lie (unless, some would say, there is no other way to save a life), it is not by any means always right to tell all the truth. At a funeral, if some kind words are being said about the deceased, it would be the height of ungraciousness to dredge up all the sins and failings on his record. If you have to write a recommendation it is only right to be perfectly truthful in giving your opinion of the applicant for the job. To recommend a person (however kind your motive) about whom you have some serious doubt, is no real help to any one. On the other hand if you know of some discreditable incident which has nothing whatever to do with Mr. X's fitness for this particular job, it is hardly right to tell it just because it happens to be the truth.

Not just because it's true

If it's true, then tell it, is a poor rule. That's what is wrong with gossip even when the gossip is factually true. Truth can be told with bad intentions, with malice and resentment. There is an "eleventh commandment" alongside the famous ten: Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. "Is it true?" is by all means one question to ask about anything you want to say. If it isn't true, don't by any means tell it. But if it is true, there are other tests: Is it kind? Is it helpful? Is it the kind of thing you would want others to say and spread around about yourself?

In the Image of God

The Christian motive for truthfulness is unique. Not that other motives are wrong. It is good to tell the truth because people depend on you if you do. It is good to tell the truth for its own sake. It is good to tell the truth because that way you never get caught in a network of lies it is hard to wriggle out of. Yes, yes. But the high Christian reason for being truthful is that we are sons and daughters of the God of truth. Two things we should always remember. One is that when God forgives sins, he "remembers them no more;" and when we forgive others, we should do the same, never dragging out of the past what we claim to have forgiven. The other thing is that we simply cannot deceive God. We can put on a false front for other people, but never for God. The God of

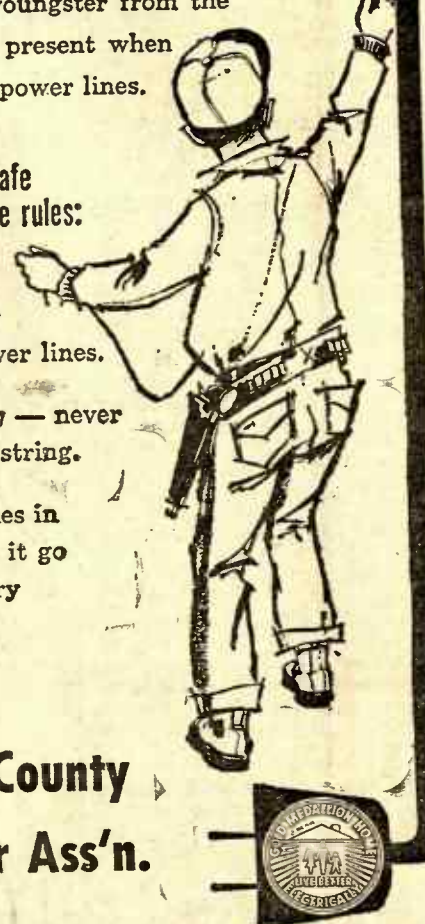

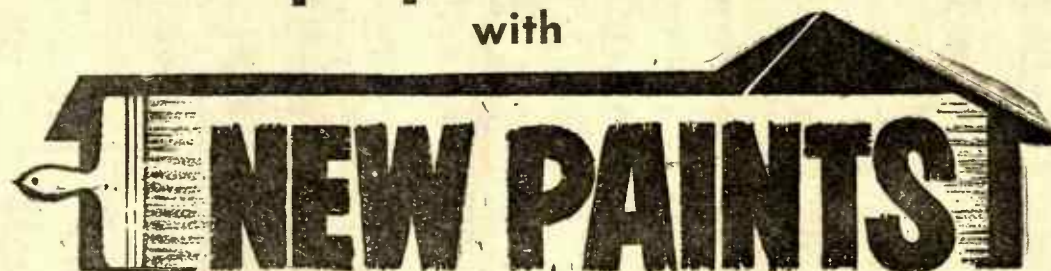

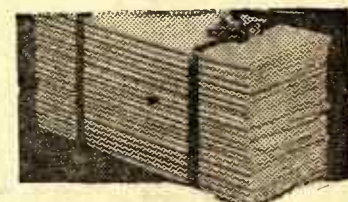

Lime Is Fertilizer

Lime does sweeten the soil and makes other plant food elements more available, but it is also a fertilizer. Plants need the calcium found in lime to grow and develop as they should.

Don't let this season go by without having your soil tested to see what kind and what amount of fertilizer you should use under your crops.

In almost every case where soils are tested in this county, lime is found to be needed. If you do have your soil tested and the test shows that you need to lime your land and apply certain other fertilizers, it might be wise to apply the lime needed first, after the lime has been applied and put the other recommended fertilizer on the land. Don't make the mistake of putting all the fertilizers recommended on the land and leaving off the lime.

For higher yields and bigger profits, apply the amount of lime per acre your land needs. If you don't know how much lime your land needs per acre, have your soil tested and find out.

See your County Agent about soil testing. He will tell you how to take the samples of soil and where to send them.

Remember lime is a fertilizer as well as a soil conditioner. Use it properly and it will pay off.
