## Election In 1962 Politics Gets Started With Announcement Of Circuit Judge Candidate Other Offices To Be Voted On In County Will Include Chancery Judge, Congressman, Board Of Education

In 1962 politics in Tishomingo County got a start this week with the announcement of a candidate for Circuit Judge for the First Judicial District of Mississippi. The district includes Tishomingo, Alcorn, Itawamba, Lee, Pontotoc, and Prentiss. Officially announcing as a candidate for this office this week is the Hon. Cason Rankin, of Tupelo.

Rankin has made Nettleton his home. I was educated in the public schools and received a Bachelor of Laws degree at the University of Mississippi. I have been engaged in the active practice of law in Tupelo since 1951.

"I am married and we have one son, Robert, who is nine years old. I am a member of the Presbyterian Church, where for several years I have alternated with other members in teaching the Mens Bible Class in our Sunday School.

"I served for a short interim as Mayor of Nettleton; a full term as Town Clerk and have served as City Attorney since 1951. I am an active member and a past president of the Nettleton Lions Club.

"I am a Veteran of World War II and a member of the Lee County Post of the American Legion. I am also a member of the Community Development Foundation, American Bar Association, Lee County Bar Association, and the Mississippi State Bar and for two years I represented the First Judicial District as a Commissioner of the Mississippi State Bar.

"I am presently serving as County Attorney of Lee County and in that capacity I have attempted to serve the good people of Lee County with zeal and vigor, remembering at all times that every person charged with the commission of a criminal offense is guaranteed a fair trial by the Constitution of the State of Mississippi and the moral precepts upon which our system of jurisprudence is based.

"In my service as Youth Court Counselor I have been greatly rewarded with the satisfaction that comes from being able to contribute to the rehabilitation of many young people who had become delinquent. However, I have taken the position that I would not recommend continued leniency for those charged with further offenses, nor for those who had histories that indicated that they had become habitual or hardened offenders prior to their apprehension.

"Due to the fact that I have received excellent legal training in school and have had eleven years of continuous active practice in the courts of this State, I feel that I am in a position to render the good people of the First Judicial District the service which they so richly deserve at the hands of the Judge of the Circuit Court.

"I have always believed and shall forever hold fast to the firm conviction that the financial or social position of any person shall not entitle that person to special privileges or consideration. Our concept of justice is, and it must always be, founded upon the principle that every person is entitled to fair and just treatment at the hands of our Courts without fear or favor, and most certainly without consideration of political expediency.

"Our courts are the last refuge for the protection of the law-abiding citizens of our State and I sincerely promise that I will never lose sight of that fact.

"There are several characteristics that are essential in qualifications of a good judge, among which are kindness, patience and dignity. These characteristics properly displayed by an energetic judge create an atmosphere that instills in all the people the feeling that the courts are affording them the justice and protection which they claim as a matter of inherent right.

"I realize that all cases are important, to the parties of interest in civil cases and to all the people in criminal cases. With the energetic application of proper procedure, common sense and human understanding, I submit that we can have efficient and economically operated courts that will guarantee to the people justice and protection and thereby perpetuate the greatest system of jurisprudence ever devised by any nation in all history.

To these principles I pledge my untiring devotion and effort, and I wish to assure you that as your Circuit Judge my conduct will at all times be such that it will never reflect unfavorably upon the office involved or the system of justice which we all cherish.

"I respectfully and sincerely solicit your support in my campaign for election as your Circuit Judge."

### 1962 Feed Grain Program Offers Many Advantages

Farmers of Tishomingo County are urged to check on the 1962 Feed Grain Program. If you are interested in renting all or part of your corn acreage be sure to come to the ASCS Office and sign up. Interest in this program is being demonstrated each day as 371 farmers have already rented some of their corn land.

Cash money has been paid to these 371 farmers in the amount of \$35,700.00. This represents approximately one half of the payment. The second payment will be made after the land is measured this summer.

Just remember the advantages in renting your corn land, (1) you take out the risk of crop failure by drought, (2) if you want to, you can sow this land in cover crop and build up the land, (3) you might want to sow some pasture and get additional help through the ACP Program in establishing this pasture, and (4) have some ready cash right now.

Have you taken inventory of your farming operation? If not, check on this, you might be interested in renting some corn land before the dead line date which is MARCH 30, 1962.

## BUYERS ASKED TO BID ON TIMBER ON 70-ACRE LAKE SITE ON STATE PARK

In a legal publication appearing in this issue of this newspaper, the State Park Commission asks timber buyers to make bids on the timber that will be removed from the 70-acre lake site on Tishomingo State Park. The bids will be opened on April 2 at 11 a. m., in the Commission's offices in Jackson. Estimated amounts of various types of timber are 45,585 board feet of pine, 29,289 board feet of mixed hardwood, 44 cords of pine pulpwood and 5 cords of hardwood pulpwood.

The lake is in the process of being built with some of the underbrush already having been removed by citizens who have volunteered their labor and equipment. Prim Haynes who has been spearheading the movement for the recreational lake on the park, states that another work day will be held today, but that, after today, no further manual work will be done until all the timber is cut and removed. Mr. Haynes says that the next general public working day on the lake site will probably be near the middle of April. "Watch for our announcement," he said.

Workers have partially cleared the underbrush from a portion of the area that will be covered by water. Two Thursdays have been devoted to this work. During the work day on March 8, James Sides, executive director of the State Park Commission, and Paul Edmondson, member of the Commission, were present at the noon hour. During the next few weeks, Mr. Haynes said, some work will be done with bush hogs.

## Residents Planting Seedlings

### In Tishomingo And Alcorn Counties For Hiwassee Land Company

Fourteen Tishomingo and Alcorn County residents are planting loblolly pine seedlings in Tishomingo County for Hiwassee Land Company this winter, District Forester Paul A. Weekley of Iuka, announced this week.

"We are pleased to be able to provide employment on our tree farms for this many persons," Mr. Weekley said. "We will plant approximately 200,000 seedlings in Tishomingo County during the present planting season ending about March 30."

Hiwassee tree planting provides off-season employment for agricultural workers, Mr. Weekley pointed out, as the tree planting season comes during the winter months when row crops and most other agricultural work is at a standstill.

Mr. Weekley heads Hiwassee forestry operations in the ten-county, District 5, wood procurement area. He said that a total of thirty-eight persons from four counties are working on Hiwassee planting crews in his district this winter.

Hiwassee Land Company is the woods organization of Bowaters Southern Paper Corporation. The Calhoun, Tennessee, newsprint mill is the largest in the United States.

The Bowaters seedlings are grown at a company nursery which is located on an island in the Little Tennessee River near Vonore. The 1962 crop will total about 20,000,000 seedlings. The seedlings are shipped here by refrigerated truck.

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## Home Agent Notes

You can plant a number of your favorite summer flowers during March. Some of them are petunia, pink, snapdragon, feverfew, phlox, salvia, larkspur, African Golden daisy and forget-me-nots.

Start the plants indoors in seed flats or pots and transplant them after our bluest, coldest weather

is replaced by warmer springs days. Or, you can broadcast the seed in good soil outdoors, then dig and transplant to the flower garden.

Seeds need moisture for germination since they won't sprout if they are dry. If you have any doubt about how deep to plant seed, it is better to undercover rather than overcover.

Just press small seed as alysum and petunia into the soil so they are in contact with the moisture. Cover larger seed as marigold and zinnia about one-fourth

inch deep.

Plant seed the size of nasturtium and morning glories three-fourths inch deep where they are to grow with no transplanting.

## Imported Meat Marked

Federal meat grading regulations now require that all imported meat be marked as such. Beginning March 1 most of the major retail cuts of the imported meats must bear an approved mark identifying the country of origin.

**Parboiled Rice? Converted Rice?**  
Have you seen these terms on rice packages and wondered just what they mean?

Parboiled rice is produced by soaking rough rice, steaming or cooking it and drying and hulling and milling. This keeps much more of the food value. But parboiled rice may also be enriched.

Fewer kernels are broken in milling parboiled rice. Parboiled rice has more of a creamy color than regular rice, but about the same whiteness when cooked.

The parboiling does not shorten the time you need to cook the rice. It tends to stay fluffy, making it easy to reheat.

One cup of parboiled rice yields 4 cups of cooked rice. It takes about 25 minutes to cook parboiled rice. Follow the package directions.

The word "converted" is another term used to designate parboiled rice.

**Fish for each Serving**  
If you are planning to serve fillets, steaks or fish sticks, allow one-third pound for each person. Allow one-half pound for each serving of dressed fish and a full pound for whole fish.

## What Is Fallout?

Question Is Answered  
By Extension Service  
For Rural Mississippi

These are questions that the Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with civil defense authorities are answering for rural Mississippians.

"Fallout is created when a nuclear bomb explodes close to the ground. The explosion lifts earth and other materials into the air where it becomes contaminated or radioactive. It settles back to earth as fallout," according to Johnnie Sartor, associate economist of the Agricultural Extension Service.

Two most important types of radiation in fallout are "Gamma" and "Beta" radiation.

"Beta radiation clings to the fallout particles of dust and sand. It only does harm when in contact with the body for several hours, or is taken internally. Ordinary clothes give pretty good protection from this type radiation," he said.

"We can even brush off Beta particles, but it is best to take off contaminated clothing and bathe." "Gamma" radiation is quite different. It is given off from fallout particles much like heat and light. It is very penetrating. Best protection comes from distance or shielding from some dense material.

Good protection from "Gamma" radiation can be had with shielding made of two and a half inches of lead, seven inches of steel, 24 inches of concrete, 36 inches of earth or 90 inches of wood.

"Anyone interested in building a fallout shelter could use one similar to the old style storm shelter," Mr. Sartor said. "Keep in mind that the door should be at right angles in order to keep out

"Gamma" radiation. Use a 36-inch dirt fill on top."

Even a frame home gives some protection, he pointed out. Inside such a home, radiation is only one-half of what it is outside. Brick buildings reduce hazard even further. A basement will cut radiation to about one-tenth of the outside radiation.

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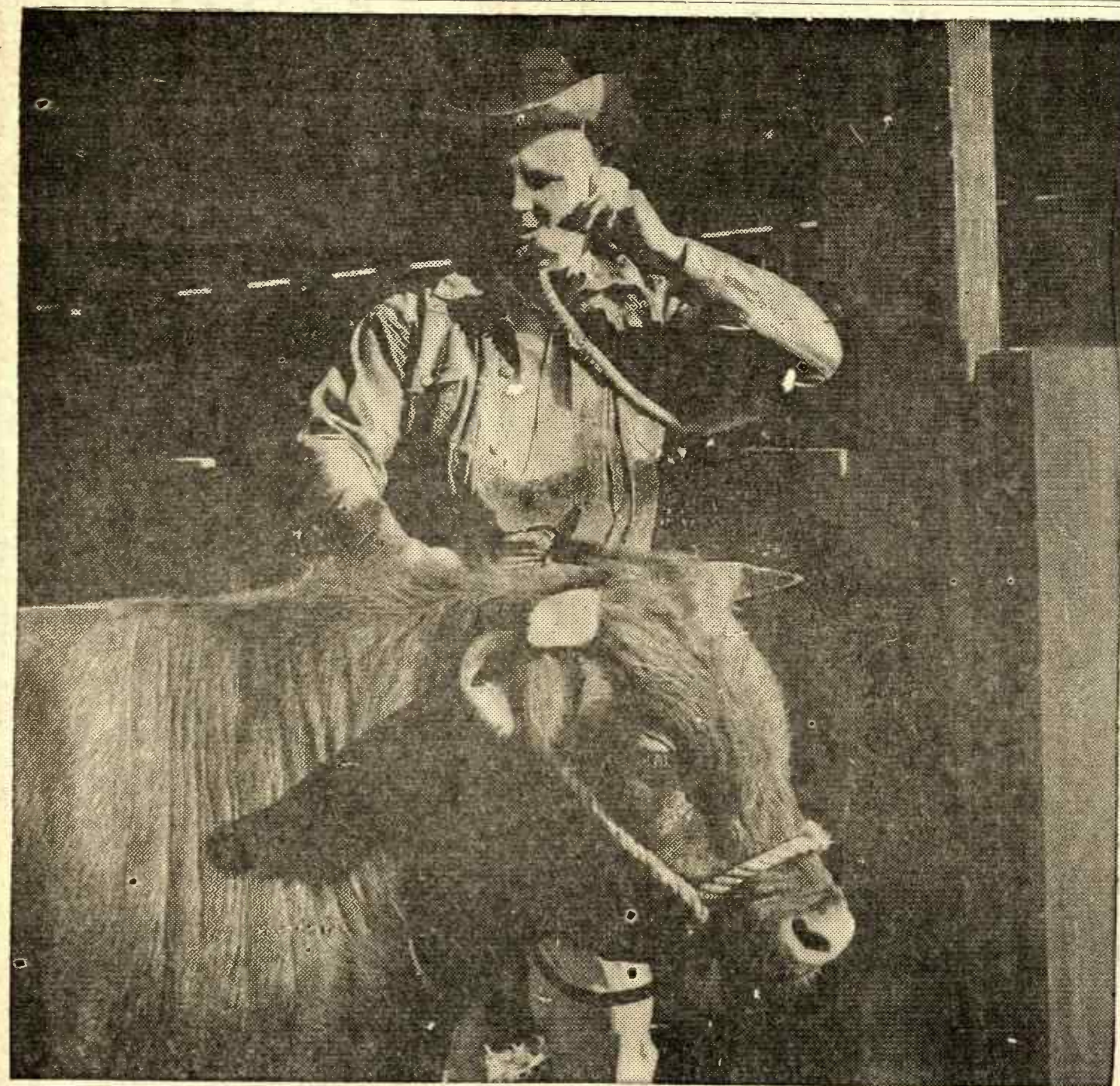

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## Astronaut John Glenn Appears As Witness Before Sen. Space Committee

Astronaut John Glenn appeared as a witness this week before the Senate Space Committee to answer questions about his historic earth-orbiting flight.

Senator John Stennis, one of the Congressional leaders and chief sponsors of America's man-in-space program, is a veteran member of that important Senate committee.

In reply to a question asked by Senator Stennis, Colonel Glenn said, "I think the space program is so worthwhile and has such a tremendous potential for helping us understand the environment in which we live. The program is worthwhile even if there were no such country as Russia to compete with us."

The successful flight of Glenn and his appearance in Washington this week emphasizes the major role which Senator Stennis has played in this far-reaching endeavor.

Senator Stennis served as chairman of the Authorizations Subcommittee of the Senate Space Committee which conducted the hearings in the Senate on the Mercury Man in Space program. This was three years ago, and following the extensive hearings, the Stennis

Subcommittee recommended that the program be authorized. The Senate approved the Stennis recommendation without a single dissenting vote. The result was the February 29 triumphal flight by Glenn, the dynamic Marine officer from Arlington, Virginia.

In those hearings, Stennis made this prophetic comment when another committee member suggested knocking \$200 million dollars off the suggested space budget:

Stennis said, "No one knows where we are or what it is going to mean. This 'man' in the moon is pure drama. This is not the objective at stake. 'The whole concept is the advancement of these instruments (space vehicles), and it is something we just can't stay out of. I have no doubt that this has the utmost military significance.'"

Glenn echoed that Stennis warning of the military significance of space exploration at the committee this week. The astronaut said, "Look at all the different things that can be done and all the different areas that need investigation, and all of the by-products that can come from this."

## CAPITAL NEWS

Noxubee county is blending a historic past into a promising present with high hopes for a fabulous future. Generally speaking, the Western third of the county is both recreation and income. The central third can be termed Noxubee's industrial strip, since the great majority of its industry is concentrated in its three municipalities—Brooksville, Macon and Shuqualak—all on U.S. highway 45 on the north-south line down the center of the county. Briefly summarized, the 4-H objective is to "Learn by Doing." Through various projects, Mississippi boys and girls are learning to live and serve with others in the home and community. Above all, Mississippi's 4-H program is building sound character and wholesome qualities in youngsters who will be tomorrow's leaders and citizens.

**March Industrial Activity**

March winds blew in a flurry of industrial activity for Mississippi. All economic indices were up, and statisticians scrutinized 1961 from all angles and came up smiling. Local chambers of commerce held their annual meetings and reported more activity than ever before. Manufacturing employment was at an all-time high. On all industrial fronts, Mississippi pushed ahead as 1962 got underway. More industries have been announced. Once more, the statisticians are at the machines, busily hitting the addition keys, chalking up new gains for 1962.

**Strange Craft In Mississippi Waters**

At Pascagoula, on Mississippi's Gulf Coast, a giant nuclear-powered Navy submarine slides into service as top Navy brass look on and trumpets blare ceremonial martial music. At Vicksburg, a tiny stern-wheeler trimmed in lacy grillwork reminiscent of Old South steamboats skims along the mighty Mississippi with tourists from all parts of the country as passengers. Both these symbolize today's Mississippi—graceful in leisure, efficient at work. Also, they are a contrast of yesterday and today in the state.

Stennis has said that space exploration will develop and furnish civilization with communication weather satellites in addition to military launching platforms from which space vehicles could be directed against earth targets.

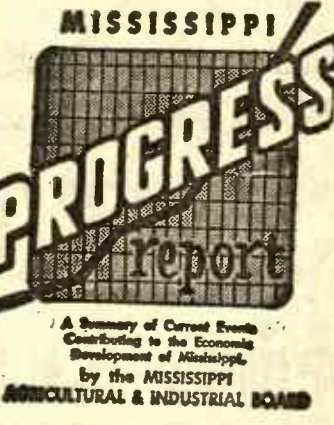
When Stennis presented the special report on his hearings to the Senate three years ago, it drew immediate praise for Vice President Lyndon Johnson and other members of the Senate.

Johnson said, "I wish to express to the very able and distinguished Senator from Mississippi, Mr. Stennis, the thanks and understanding of the Senate and of a grateful nation for the outstanding and patriotic service he has performed throughout the long road which these hearings on this bill for space funds has traveled."

Having surmounted the financial hurdles of that struggle three years ago, Stennis was particularly elated to see the results of his Subcommittee's work reflected in the successful flight of Glenn.

Last October the National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced plans to spend \$500 million in Hancock and Pearl River counties in South Mississippi to build a missile testing center. Senator Stennis played a major role in the location of this facility in Mississippi.

Rocket engines which will propel the successors to Friendship 7 into future space flights will be tested at the Mississippi site.



### Two Industries Slated For Mendenhall

Two new industries are making preparations to locate in Mendenhall, according to W. M. Buckles, secretary-manager of the Mendenhall area Chamber of Commerce. A building is now under construction for an egg processing plant which is being moved to Mendenhall from Zachary, La. The plant will wash, grade and package eggs; approximately 18 will be employed. A new building to house Anderson Box Company is also planned. This plant will make boxes and egg crates and will employ 20.

### Kosciusko Company To Build New Product

President J. H. Shields of Superior Coach Corporation has announced that the company's Kosciusko plant will begin production of a new nine passenger limousine. The vehicle will be used by airlines, schools, military and other personnel transportation contractors and line operators. The announcement was made at the annual first-of-year meeting of Superior Coach officials from the Lima, Ohio office of the company and Southern Division (Kosciusko) management personnel. The meeting was held at the Kosciusko Golf Club. President Shields also said that during 1961, the Southern Division experienced the best volume year since locating in Kosciusko in 1951 and for his first time matched its parent plant in Ohio in sales volume.

### More Pine Shipped From Greenville

More than 1 million board feet of top grade Southern pine from a three state area was loaded for barge shipment from Greenville to Chicago this month. The shipment was purchased by the Edward Hines Lumber Company of Chicago. The same company launched a trial shipment 10 weeks ago and announced that if builders in the midwest area showed enthusiasm for Southern pine, others would follow. "The fact that the company has scheduled a second shipment in such a short time means that the venture was successful," commented Col. Milton Barschdorf, Greenville port director.

**Third Atomic Sub Launched By Ingalls**

The Navy's newest atomic submarine, the USS Barb, was launched at Pascagoula February 12. Built by the Ingalls Shipbuilding Corporation, (recently purchased by Litton Industries of Beverly Hills,

California) the Barb is the third nuclear sub to be launched at the Pascagoula yards. The two other nuclear submarines launched by Ingalls are the Sculpin and the Snook, now operating in the Pacific. The Barb, with the ability to operate faster and deeper as well as more silently than her predecessors, will be the first to be launched in a series of four Thresher class submarines being built by Ingalls for the Navy. Ingalls employs over 4,000 people at its 157 acre plant at Pascagoula.

### Meat Packing Plant To Open In Hattiesburg

Hattiesburg's new \$1.5 million Pine Burr Packing Company plant officially opened February 22 with a day-long opening celebration. Following a special Ribbon Cutting ceremony at 10 a. m., the public was invited to tour the plant. One of the most modern packing plants in the nation, the operation has a capacity for handling 30 head of beef and 150 hogs per hour. The company is a division of the Merchants Company; other divisions include Valley Mills, a feed mill at Vicksburg; Forrest Farms, a complete poultry operation at Hattiesburg; and the Vicksburg Terminal Elevator and Vicksburg Transshippers as well as wholesale grocery operation.

## Forestry Notes

By Larry Brewer  
Area Forester

Landowners in Tishomingo County have planted millions of seedlings on abandoned fields and over lands during the past 20 years. On the face of this statement, it appears that Tishomingo County is covered with thousands of acres of well managed, adequately stocked stands of timber.

We do have many landowners in this county that are managing their timber in such a manner that they will be assured of a continuous crop to be harvested at regular intervals. But on the other hand, there are many landowners who seem to have no thought for the future when they cut their timber. Many landowners cut or sell all merchantable timber without leaving a single seed tree to assure themselves of some semblance of a future crop of timber. During some years, more acres may be taken out of production than are planted in seedlings.

These landowners that are indifferent about either improving the quality of their existing timber

stands or establishing stands of merchantable timber where needed, are the people that we will have to look to in the future, to a large extent, for growing the additional timber that will be needed for a rapidly expanding population.

There are over 5,000 uses for wood at the present time and additional uses are being developed almost every day. We are only growing enough wood at the present time for our own use. We will have to have more acres producing wood to supply our future needs and the needs of future generations.

The stranger on the fence drawled, "I can't see much difference in what I'm doing and what you are doing. I sit on the fence and watch the cars go by and you sit in your car and watch the fences go by."

Most of us are rushing here and there in a great hurry to do nothing in particular. We just let things happen. It would be much better to plan our work and work our plans. During the past month, D. Paul Adams, Whitney Edwards, Billy Worrell and David Andrews have made application for Conservation Farm Plans to be made for their land.

The Tennessee River SCD Commission urge all landowners of the District to have a soil map made of their land and get a Conservation Farm Plan on it.

Let's do more than sit in our car and watch the fences go by. Let's plan the use of our land and work our plan. If you don't have a Farm Plan, come by and talk to us about one.

## Veterans' Corner

Q—What educational benefits have been provided for peacetime veterans?

A—Although Congress has considered several types of educational benefits for peacetime veterans, none have passed into legislation as yet.

Q—Are peacetime disability compensation payments the same as those received by wartime veterans?

A—Peacetime disability compensation rates are paid at 80 percent of the corresponding wartime rates.

Q—As a World War II veteran with GI term insurance, can I convert part of my \$10,000 term insurance to a permanent plan?

A—You may convert as little as \$1,000 or more in multiples of \$500 . . . such as \$1,500 or \$2,500, at one time.

Q—I am the widow of a World War I veteran. In January, 1960, I was told I was not eligible for VA pension because my husband did not have a compensable service-connected injury when he died. I have heard that requirement has been changed. Is that true?

A—Yes. Since July 1, 1960, you are eligible for pension if your husband had 90 days of active service in World War I, and was discharged under other than dishonorable conditions.

Q—How long must a woman have been married to a World War I veteran before the VA will consider her a widow if he dies?

A—She must have been married to him for 5 years unless (a) a child was born to them, in which case there is no time factor needed or (b) unless she married him before December 14, 1944. The similar date for World War II veterans is January 1, 1957, and for veterans of the Korean Conflict, it will be February 1, 1965.

Q—If a veteran names his mother as the beneficiary of his GI insurance policy and then marries, is his wife protected?

A—The veteran will have to notify the VA if he wishes to name his wife as his beneficiary. Full details may be obtained at any VA office.

Q—How many hospitals does the VA maintain outside continental United States?

A—The VA has hospitals in each State in the Union, except Alaska and Hawaii, and in the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico. In other existing hospitals to place veterans should the need arise.

Q—Are the widows of Confederate veterans eligible for pension from the United States government?

A—Since July, 1958, widows of Confederate veterans have been eligible for pensions.

## Human Hogs

Lesson for March 18, 1962

"COVET" is a word that doesn't sound sinful. It is often used in perfectly respectable connections, as when the King James translation of I Cor. 12:31 has Paul saying "Covet earnestly the best gifts."

Coveting in the Tenth Commandment, however, does not mean simply to desire. It is not itself a sin to desire to have something. All human effort, indeed human life itself, would grind to a stop if nobody ever wanted anything. It is not a sin to want what someone else has, if he is willing to let you own it and if you pay him a fair price.

What is greed? Nevertheless greed is a sin, and greed is a simple one-syllable word that means covetousness but sounds ugly too, like what it stands for. If you have ever fed pigs, you must have noticed how they act at the trough. All the hog needs is just get his mouth into it, but that's not enough for him. He wants to put both feet and most of his face into it. He doesn't care what the other hogs do, he's strictly out for his own appetite.

It may be unfair to hogs (for this writer has seen cats which were just as greedy as any hog) but the words hog and hogishness are used of human beings sometimes, but never as a compliment! Now, what is to be greedy? As was said just now, merely wanting something is not necessarily greedy. Greed is wanting more than my share, more than I need. Getting more than one's share, more than one needs, is not greed. The greed comes first; it is wanting gone wild, it is wanting without a particle of love.

"... and I intend to squeeze it" A distinguished critic, being asked some years ago to give his philosophy of life, responded, "The world is my orange, and I intend to squeeze it." The man has been converted since then, it is said, but as he was then, he was making as frank a profession of greed as a man could make. He revealed in that one sentence two facts: 1. The greedy man thinks he has a claim to everything in sight, and if he sets his sights high enough he can even think the whole world is his orange.

2. The greedy man lets nothing stand in his way. Police departments all over the world know the connection between greed and murder. More people are killed from motives of greed than from hatred. Greed unchecked runs up like a poison-plant into every kind of crime.

Two kinds of human hog The human hog comes in two main varieties. One is the plain or backlot variety. What he wants are things, and he can go on piling up things to the day of his death, like the farmer in Jesus' story without giving proper thought to what he can do with what he has, in short with no real reason except to make the pile bigger. Men who get out their money boxes every night and count the coins used to be called misers. It would be hard to find men like that today; but the miser is still with us. Every time there is an election to raise taxes for schools, there are people who will vote NO simply because they have no children and don't want to be taxed to help other peoples' children. Some people collect money, some collect trash; but if you've no plan to spend the money wisely and generously, you might as well collect junk.

Hogs of all sorts The other main variety of this kind of man is the kind that hogs something besides money. Some people hog the limelight, they want to be the center of every scene and they don't relish "scene-stealers;" some hog notice in the newspapers, and will die in bed holding an old album of press notices. Some are gluttons for power; James and John were men of this sort before association with Jesus finally changed them. They wanted to share the authority of Christ; they have their counterpart in every church, men and sometimes women who must "run" the church or they are not satisfied. Other people hog attention, others want the largest share of the credit for any good change even if they actually fought it when first it was suggested. Whatever it may be, if any person wants something so much that he doesn't care what he does to get it, he is not only ridiculous, he is a danger to all the rest of us.

### Kenneth C. Poole Completes Training At Ft. Sill, Okla.

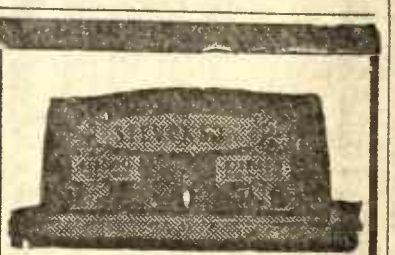

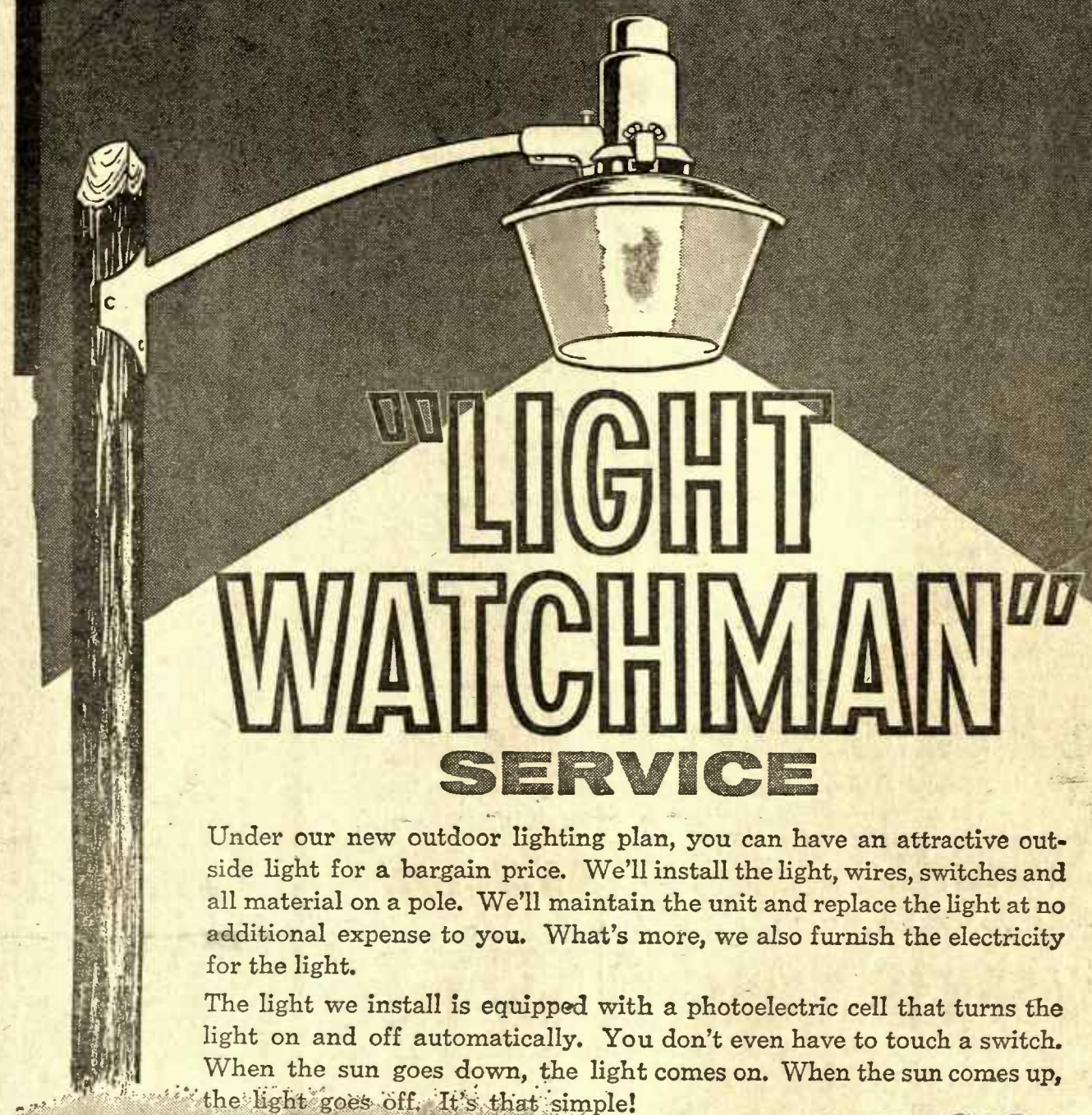
