Soggy has been a popular figure in this area since 1953 when he was elected Alcorn County Attorney. In 1955 he was elected District Attorney for the First District and continued to this job in 1959.

"Soggy," as N. S. Sweat, Jr., is generally known, has a long list of accomplishments for his 40 years. Born in 1922 in Corinth, Soggy was graduated from the Corinth High School in 1939. He served for three and one-half years in the U. S. Air Force during World War II, attaining the rank of first lieutenant and being a navigator of a B-29 long range bomber. He flew 35 combat missions and was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross.

After WWII Soggy was graduated in 1946 from the University of Mississippi School of Business Administration, having served as president of the Business School Student Body. In 1947, Soggy was elected to the Mississippi Legislature to represent Alcorn County and while serving in the legislature, authored the state's Anti-Communist Law that is in force today.

From 1950 to 1952, Soggy was assistant to U. S. Congressman John Rankin in Washington, D. C.

Further his professional training, Soggy Sweat studied law at the George Washington University in Washington and received his Master of Laws Degree from that institution in 1952. He also attended the Academy of International Law at the Hague, Holland, and the University of Paris Law School at Paris, France, in 1952-53.

In addition to his other honors, Soggy is currently serving as vice-president of the Mississippi States Attorneys Association.

Funeral services will be held today (Thursday) afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Belmont Methodist Church for Smith Pharr. The Rev. S. J. Hull of Coffeeville, Miss., assisted by H. G. Wallace and C. L. Ivy of Belmont, will conduct the service. Interment will be in the Belmont Cemetery under the direction of Deaton Funeral Home.

Mr. Pharr died Wednesday morning, March 28, at the home of his son, Esau Pharr in Belmont. He was a retired farmer. He was 74.

## Farmers Reminded To File Federal Income Tax Returns

Farmers who had \$400 or more profit in 1961 have until April 15 to file a Federal tax return. These earnings should be reported for social security purposes even though no income tax may be due.

This reminder came today from Hugh Tiggrett, District Manager of the Tupelo office of the Social Security Administration.

"Like other self-employed people, farmers get social security credit for their earnings through the reports filed as part of their Federal income tax returns. Farmers who have gross earnings of \$600 or more in the year have an optional method of figuring their net earnings for social security. The profit figured by the optional method is not used in figuring income tax," Mr. Tiggrett said.

April 15 also represents the last chance for farmers to file a return and get social security credit for 1958 earnings, where such earnings were not previously reported.

Additional information is available from the social security representative who visits the City Hall in Iuka each Monday morning.

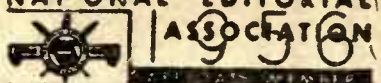


A LONG OVER DUE MERGER

## Home Agent Notes

On farms especially, but in all homes with flowers and shrubs, lawns and gardens and household bug problems, care must be taken to handle insecticides and fertilizers carefully.

Read labels carefully and follow precautions. Store the chemicals in their original containers. Dispose of empty containers safely.

## Cleaning and Storing

## Electric Blankets

The time to take blankets off the beds and store them isn't far away.

Before you clean and store your electric blankets, be sure to check the instructions that came with the blanket. Follow them exactly.

Most manufacturers recommend washing rather than dry-cleaning.

If washing is recommended for your blanket, follow the blanket laundering instructions given for your washer. Some manufacturers recommend a soaking procedure for blankets and all recommended the minimum amount of agitation and the use of warm water.

Before you begin to wash, measure the blanket so you can block it back as nearly as possible to its original size, if necessary.

If the binding is extra soiled, brush it first with a soft brush moistened with warm water and

the same detergent you will use in the washing.

Be sure the controls have been disconnected. Launder only one blanket at a time.

You may want to add one of the fabric softeners during the final rinse to give the blanket a luxurious softness.

When line drying, place the blanket across two lines. When drying in an automatic dryer, add 6 or 7 dry, clean towels to act as buffers. Since many blankets are not fast color, choose the towels with this in mind.

Air dry for awhile before storing or returning to the bed. Gently brush the dry blanket with a stiff brush to bring up the nap and help relieve some shrinkage.

You may moisten the binding and iron with a warm iron or with a steam iron to help give the blanket a new look again.

If your blanket needs servicing, be sure to take it to an authorized service shop. Don't try to repair it yourself.

Avoid bunching or sharply folding to avoid breaking the wires.

Apples and Boiled Ham. Place unpeeled apple rings dusted with cinnamon and sugar alongside partially broiled ham. Continue broiling under a low heat until apples are brown.

Plenty of Towel Rods. Allow 21 inches of towel rod space for each person who uses a bathroom. If you're short of space, install rods on the bathroom door. Or, if there is no shower, you can put them over the tub.

## Fertilize Your Pastures Properly

Make more money from your pastures by fertilizing them. Good cattle on good pastures will return a profit if properly managed.

Good cattle on poor pastures or scrub cattle on good pastures could hardly be expected to return much profit.

If you haven't applied lime on your pasture during the past three years, you should lime it. By all means, go by your local ASC office and talk to E. N. Allen. You may be able to get government assistance on your pasture work.

Regardless of whether you can get help from the government in fertilizing your pastures, you should go ahead and fertilize them with nitrogen, phosphorus, and potash. They need it!

You wouldn't think of growing a crop of cotton without fertilizing it, would you? Of course you would not! It is possible that you will make more money from fertilizing your pasture than from fertilizing your cotton.

Wait until the weather turns warm to apply fertilizer on your pasture. Wait until it is warm enough for the grass and clover to grow, otherwise the fertilizer you apply may partly leach out of the soil.

Not only will you have more good pasture plants for your livestock by fertilizing your pasture, but you will be saving your soil

too. The thicker the sod, the greater the protection to the land.

**Cotton Release**  
Saturday is the final day for release of any unwanted cotton acres.

If you do not want to plant cotton this year, by all means release the unwanted cotton acres to the ASC so they can be reallocated to those who do want to plant cotton. If you have a cotton allotment and do not plant it, or release it, you are not the only one who loses. Everyone does. The main street merchants, seed dealers, fertilizer dealer, ginners, feed millers, bankers—the entire economy.

If you have not already decided whether or not to plant or release your cotton acres, the time is short. You must make the decision by Saturday, March 31.

March 31 is also the deadline for requesting additional cotton acres. Examine your own situation. Then if you want more acres, go by the ASC Office and request them. But by all means, plant your total allotment, including any additional acres that may be reallocated to you!

## All Purpose Fruit Tree Sprays

If you plan to spray your apple, pear, peach and plum trees, plus your grape vines, wouldn't it be a lot easier if you could use the same spray on all the different fruit trees? Of course, it would be and if you will give me a minute of your time, I will give you a choice of two all-purpose fruit sprays. These are very effective if used as recommended. Follow the steps listed below to a successful insect and disease free program and a bountiful harvest of fruit.

I. How to use an all-purpose fruit tree spray: Mix the insecticide and fungicide together as recommended and apply to the trees. Wet the trees until they start to drip. Spray from all sides of the tree for good coverage.

II. When to use: Sprays should be first applied when 3/4 of the petals have fallen from the blossoms. Continue applications at regular 10-day intervals until fruit is ripening. See restrictions below as to when you should stop spraying. If you failed to start on time, start now and stay on schedule, you can still make a good crop of fruit.

III. What to use for all-purpose fruit spray: All purpose fruit sprays can be purchased ready-mixed. Most of these combinations are effective if used as suggested on the label.

Here are two combinations we recommend for you to try. They are Choice A and B.

The materials and amount to use in 1 gal. of water in Choice A are: 51% methoxychlor (wetttable powder), 1 tablespoonful; 2 tablespoonfuls of 37% malathion emulsifiable concentrate; and 1 1/2 tablespoonfuls of 50% captan (wetttable powder). Pre-mix all three materials together at the recommended rate and dump into water and stir well. Shake hand sprayers every few minutes so mixture will stay in suspension.

Choice B: 3 tablespoonfuls of 50 per cent sevin (wetttable powder) and 1 and one-half tablespoonfuls of 50 per cent captan (wetttable

powder). Pre-mix both materials as described in Choice A.

Dust: Use sevin and sulphur as dusts. Be sure to check label as to limitations on the use of these materials.

LAST LINE: A habit is like a soft bed—easy to get into but hard to get out of.

## In The News

By Congressman Abernethy

Northeast Mississippi can rightfully boast that it has the best balance between industry and agriculture of any section of the State. Whereas a few years ago it was almost entirely agricultural with a low per capita income, new industry has turned our economy sharply upward. There is more to come.

This does not suggest we should neglect agriculture. It is still our greatest resource. It provides more "turnover" money than any other segment of our economy. There are various means by which we may improve the farm economy and one of the best is through research. A broad step has been taken in that direction by establishment of the new Boll Weevil Research Laboratory, just dedicated, at Mississippi State University. If we can rid ourselves of that pesky diving-bombing insect, the cost of producing cotton will be reduced tremendously.

For years, cotton fiber had the market to itself. Then came the substitutes and synthetics in ever-increasing numbers—nylon, orlon, dacron, acrilon, etc. Many of these, available at lower cost, made deep inroads on cotton's historic market. If cotton is to survive in the textile market it must be able to compete realistically with synthetics in quality and price. Eradication of the boll weevil will lower the cost of producing cotton an average of six cents per pound. Reducing production cost six cents per pound means a larger market and more profit for our farmers; and more profit for our farmers means more business for our merchants. The only losers will be the boll weevil and insecticide manufacturer.

The weevil was first recognized in this country in 1892. Since that date he has bored his wiry snout into and destroyed \$10-billion of cotton. That is Ten Thousand Million Dollars! Loss to Mississippi alone has been almost \$1-billion. Consider for a moment what that One Thousand Million Dollars could have done for our State.

But this is not all. Other millions have been expended by farmers in their attempt to control the weevil. Cotton cannot be profitably grown in most of the belt, including our own, without adequate weevil control measures. These measures are costly and, mind you, they are merely to reduce losses, not to eliminate them. In some areas farmers are forced to make as many as 15 to 20 applications of insecticides during a single season. Insecticide applications are so costly that in many instances the insecticide manufacturers make more money out of a cotton crop than the farmer.

After using the most adequate control measures, there is even another loss—damage to quality of the fiber. This, too, runs into millions.

So, there are three staggering losses which this pest has brought to our farmers—a complete loss of a part of the crop, the cost of applying the insecticides, and loss in fiber quality. The aggregate cost is staggering and it all comes out of the farmer's pocket.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Congress have been well aware of the severity of the boll weevil problem for a long time. Except for the development of arsenicals to poison the little rascal, which in many instances has done no more than to put him on a joyful "Saturday Night" binge, very little has been done to put him away forever.

In 1896 Congress appropriated the small sum of \$2,000 for study of the insect. From that time to the present, 66 years, only \$6-million had been provided for research to cope with it. Compare that to the \$10-billion worth of cotton this insect has destroyed, plus cost of applying poisons and loss in fiber quality.

At long last the Congress has provided an appropriate laboratory with the design of forever ridding us of this menace. There are a few pessimists who say it cannot be done. The answer is that through research we have rid agriculture

of many blights, diseases and pests. We can get rid of the boll weevil, too. Conceding that it presents a difficult problem, it can be done through a crash program of research. The laboratory, which has been erected for this purpose, could not be located at a better place than Mississippi State University and in Mississippi where cotton is still a way of life.

Mr. Boll Weevil, look out! For you, execution day is just around the corner.

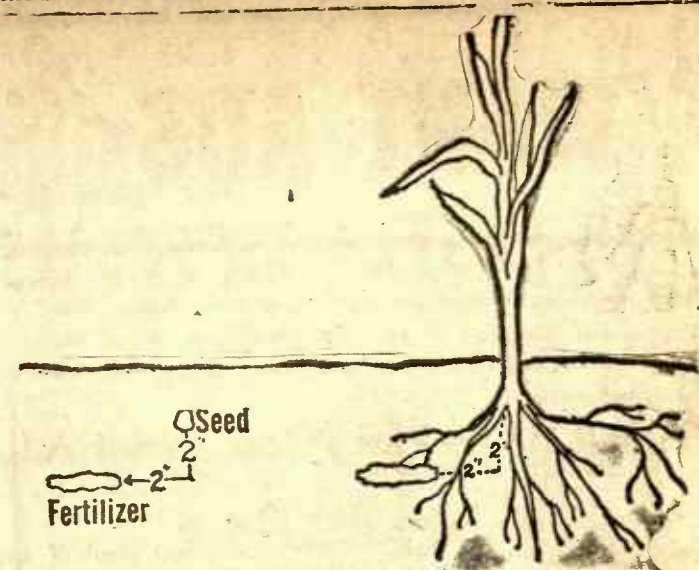
like to stay near cover. Bluegill are school fish and when one is hooked, look for more around that section.

## Christ the Center

Lesson for April 1, 1962

JESUS CHRIST is often called the center of the Christian faith, and with good reason. True Christian faith is quite definite, however mysterious some of its aspects may be.

Just "I believe" doesn't make a Christian out of you. Mohammedans believe, so do Pharisees and Jews and Spiritualists and Mormons and Buddhists. So, for that

Dr. Foreman matter, do Voodoo with doctors and devil worshippers. Everybody believes something; but believing in general isn't Christian. It is not even common sense. What can possibly be meant by "believing" or "faith" without faith in something or somebody? A "believer" who isn't in the least sure of what or whom he believes is as pathetic a figure as a "Goer" who has no idea where he is going. Just "going" will get you nowhere; so just "believing" gets you nowhere either.

## Center of grace

Christ is the center of Christian faith, the pole to which faith's compass swings. This is true first of all because Christ is the center of God's grace. As the New Testament writers use that word "grace," they most often mean by it the undeserved but freely given favor of God to men. Paul puts it in a nutshell in I Tim. 1:14: "The grace of our Lord overflowed for me with the faith and love which are in Christ Jesus." Grace—faith—love—Christ Jesus: they all go together, Paul cannot think of one apart from the rest.

The kind of world we have to live in sometimes discourages us about a God of love. If we believe that God is a God of love, there must be a strong reason for our faith, something because of which we believe, to offset all that in spite of which we believe. And this "something" is Jesus Christ. It is because we believe him to be God's gift to us, to each one of us who will take him,—it is because we understand as St. Paul did that Christ's life and even death were for our sakes, that he literally poured himself out in sacrifice for us,—that we find in him the center of God's grace.

## Center of redemption

There are many ways used in the New Testament, by Paul and others, to describe in metaphors what we call Salvation—for Salvation, we must always remember, is the main aim of all religions. Salvation is what God does to rid us of what despoils and ruins us, namely sin; Salvation is the name of all that brings man out of the "far country" and into his Father's home. One of the words, used sometimes in place of "Salvation," is "Redemption," or literally "Buying Back." The picture is of wretched people who are being held for ransom, suddenly set free through the payment of the price demanded. Christ is the ransom, it is he who paid the price, who was the price, of our freedom from sin, our being "alive to God" as Paul put it once. So Christ is the center of redemption. Without him we would be unredeemed. Almost in the same sentence Paul calls Christ the Mediator between God and man. He is the Bridge, the Way. It is he who opens the door to God, it is he who breaks down our opposition, makes us as one with God. Center! How could Christ have any other place?

## Center of hope

Because some Christians have not seen clearly the meaning of Christ and Christianity for this present life and world, and have as good as said that we don't begin to "cash in" in our faith till after we die, other Christians have fled to the opposite extreme, and found the entire meaning of Christianity in this world and time. Today there is a swing of the pendulum back toward where it used to be, though not all the way. We can see that both ideas are true: our religion is for today, tomorrow and always. Christianity is a religion of hope, and that needs to be remembered in dark days like the present. This earth will pass away, and God knew it when he made it. But that does not spell the end for God's people. Christ will come again. The "appearing of our Lord Jesus Christ"—though in ways we may be surprised to see—is a constant hope of the New Testament. So Christ is again the center of faith, for he is the center of our hope.
