Gen. Vogel, TVA Director, Visits Iuka

**Officials Meet With
TCEPA Directors And
Other County Citizens**

General Herbert D. Vogel, chairman of the board of directors of TVA, was a visitor in Iuka Tuesday morning. Gen. Vogel and a group of three other TVA officials met with the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association Board of Directors and a number of other citizens of the county in the power office on Eastport Street.

In a short talk, Gen. Vogel stressed the importance of the people of the area using the tools they now have to better themselves economically. "TVA has put low cost electricity in the valley," General Vogel said, "but unless the people use it, it is of no benefit. We have to use the tools we have," the general said.

The TVA chairman said that people are our greatest natural resource and that more time and thought should be devoted to education and training of citizens for more and greater jobs in industry. The general said, among other things, that he was vitally interested in the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority and the Bear Creek Watershed Association and other similar watershed districts in the valley. He said these were the grass roots of TVA and that greater benefits could be derived in these areas with the development of their natural resources.

Announcement is made today that a pulpwood producers conference will be held Wednesday, April 11, in Red Bay, Alabama. Sponsors of the conference are the TVA Division of Forestry Development, the Alabama Division of Forestry, the Alabama Forest Products Association and the Keeton Land and Timber Company of Red Bay which will serve as host for the event.

Sixty Adults Sign Up For Classes In Education Organizational Meet

County Superintendent of Education Julian R. Long reports that sixty adults from Tishomingo and Prentiss counties signed up during the organizational meeting held on Tuesday night for adult education. REPORT GIVEN ON IUKA'S ENTRY IN STATE MERIT COMMUNITY PROGRAM

**City Is Ranked High In Finance,
Lowest In Housing And Construction**

Iuka has scored itself in the ten general categories of development, and is now officially entered in the Mississippi Merit Community Program, according to information received here from headquarters of the program.

The Iuka entry is being sponsored by the Iuka Chamber of Commerce.

Francis J. Lundy, Hattiesburg, chairman of the statewide local self-improvement project, said the community is now ready to claim the attractive Merit Award plaque in the categories in which it meets pre-determined standards. Inspections are made before plaques are awarded. In addition, an attractive two-color sign has been shipped to Iuka for erection at a prominent location.

Mrs. J. C. Byrd, Jr., general chairman of the local program, said committees have been assigned to carry out projects to improve the city's standings in phases selected for first attention.

"We challenge everyone to give his support to this worthwhile project," Mrs. Byrd said. "It is going to take the help of many people to attain our goals; but with co-operation, our goals can and will be met. This program is to improve the overall welfare of our area, and everyone will benefit as goals are reached."

She complimented those working to score the community in the ten general classifications of: beautification, education, fire protection, health and sanitation, housing and construction, long range planning, municipal finance, police and traffic, recreation, and streets.

High and Low Scores
Iuka scored highest in the category of municipal finance. The scoring committee said the minimum qualifying score in the category is 785 points, while Iuka scored 855 points.

The lowest score was in the category of Housing and Construction. The minimum qualifying score in the category is 780 points, with the Iuka community scoring only 270 points.

"We will be foolish not to recognize our weak points," the chairman said. "The real value of this program is pinpointing our weaknesses and striving to improve them."

186 Gallon Haul Of Moonshine

**County Officers Capture
Loaded 1955 Plymouth
Traveling North**

Tishomingo County Sheriff's office reports the capture of 186 gallons of moonshine whiskey early last Friday. The capture was made about five miles north of Iuka on highway 25 about 3 a. m.

Charles Shackelford, driver of the 1955 Plymouth, is being held in Federal jail in Aberdeen in default of a \$1,000.00 bond for a Federal liquor law violation. Shackelford, 19, of Nettleton, was captured by Tishomingo County Sheriff Clarence Pace, Deputy Sheriff Pat Patterson and Billy Pace, Alcohol Tax Unit Agent for Mississippi.

Shackelford was arraigned before Federal Commissioner Ruth West in Aberdeen and entered a plea of guilty to the whiskey charge. He told officers he was a hired driver but refused to reveal those for whom he was working.

The 186 gallon haul was the largest to ever have been captured in transit in Tishomingo county, the officers reported. Shackelford's trail was picked up in Iuka and officers chased him about five miles north on highway 25 before he was brought to a halt.

"Jobs For Youth" Drive Now In Progress In Miss.

John E. Aldridge, Administrator of the State Employment Service, said today that all 31 State public employment offices are engaged in a massive effort to find jobs for young people in Mississippi who are out of school and out of work.

Mississippi's "Jobs for Youth" drive is part of a nationwide campaign to find jobs for unemployed youth under 21 and bears the slogan, "Put Youth on a Job Today's Investment, Tomorrow's Profit."

"All of our local offices are geared to conduct an active and continuing campaign in cooperation with management and labor groups, educators, PTA's, civic and religious organizations, fraternal and veterans organizations at both the State and local levels," Mr. Aldridge said.

Mr. Aldridge said the seriousness of a growing shortage of qualified workers in many occupations makes it imperative that employable young men and women under 21 be considered today to fill the predicted gaps in the work force.

"Hiring young trainees now will provide a more capable and skilled work force so that our State and Nation can capitalize on their abilities in the years ahead," he said.

"These young people are quick to adapt to an employer's pattern and quick to acquire work habits that will result in higher efficiency and maintain future production and profits."

Mr. Aldridge advised employers who are seeking young workers and young job seekers themselves to go to their local public employment offices for employment assistance.

What Kind Of Fertilizer And How Much To Apply

Be wise and get a soil test made of your land. See your County Agent and he will supply you the needed information and soil containers to put soil samples in. Then you can follow the instructions and take your own soil samples and mail them to the State Soil Testing Laboratory at Mississippi State University.

If you do a good job of taking your soil samples, you should get good results from the fertilizer recommended based on this test.

It is very important that you do a good job taking your soil samples to send to the laboratory if good results from recommended fertilizer is to be obtained.

As Work Unit Conservationist, I am interested in every farmer sav-

ing his land while he uses it. The better nourished crops are, the faster they will grow, and the better protection they will give the land.

The way for you to know what kind and how much fertilizer to apply under cotton, corn or on pasture is to have your soil tested.

Get your soil samples and send them in to the Soil Testing Laboratory at once, so you can get back the report before crop planting time.

Forest Service Bill Introduced By Senator Stennis

Senator John Stennis today introduced a bill to provide for a nationwide forest survey.

He was joined in the bill by Senator James O. Eastland and Senator George Aiken of Vermont, both members of the Senate Agriculture and Forestry Committee.

Stennis said his bill "would provide more adequate authorization for nationwide forest surveys conducted by the U. S. Forest Service."

Stennis said forest surveys pro-

vide inventories of the nation's forestlands and timber resources, listing the number of acres added each year through tree planting and removal agriculture.

He cited forests and forest products as the largest single industry in Mississippi, and for that reason alone the proposed forest survey has particular significance to Mississippi industry, Stennis said.

The survey would also provide information on the rate at which land is taken out of forest production by reservoirs, highways and agriculture.

"Of even greater importance," Stennis said, "the survey provides the facts on the volume and quality of timber and the rate at which timber is growing or being depleted by industrial use."

He said the survey would also provide essential information for the forest products industry, fourth largest in the nation.

"The present law does not provide for adequate appropriations," Stennis said.

"Our proposed bill would authorize appropriation of funds as needed to keep the Forest Survey up to date."

Veterans' Corner

Q—As a Korean Conflict veteran, I have a \$10,000 non-participating, term GI insurance policy. A special dividend is being paid to those who convert this type policy to a non-participating permanent plan before September 14, 1963. If I convert half my policy now, will I get some dividend payment?

A—You will get half the dividend if you convert half your policy. You will receive the remainder of the dividend if you convert the remainder of your policy before the deadline, September 14, 1963.

Q—Does a publication exist explaining the benefits available to veterans and their dependents?

A—Yes. It is called "Federal Benefits for Veterans and Dependents" and may be purchased from the U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C. The price is 20 cents per copy. Veterans organizations or others desiring copies in quantity may obtain discount rates.

Q—Does the VA maintain an active-service history of each veteran in its files, battles he has been in, honors he has won, etc.?

A—No. Such information should be sought from the branch of the service in which the veteran served. The VA records will show the VA benefits the veteran has received and other information pertaining to him since he left the armed service.

Q—Are those who fought in the Mexican Border campaign against Villa in 1916 eligible for veterans benefits?

A—They are eligible to receive a burial flag at the time of death. Although other benefits have been proposed in Congress, no legislation for benefits has resulted.

Q—Must an eligible orphan attend college to take advantage of the War Orphans Education Assistance act?

A—No. Vocational training and other subjects that will help toward a career are permitted. All subjects must be above the high school level, however.

Q—Can inductees and draftees entering service now secure GI life insurance?

A—No. GI Insurance in any form is no longer available.

Q—What is the maximum length of pre-bed care for patients at VA hospitals?

A—This has just been increased from 7 to 14 days. The VA hopes the step will enable its hospitals to treat even more patients, without increase in number of beds or staff members.

Mississippi's Travel Exhibits
Tour Milwaukee, Los Angeles
Reporting from the Milwaukee Sentinel Sports and Vacation Show, Ned O'Brien, manager of the Agricultural and Industrial Board's travel department, writes that "Some 60,000 persons attended the first week-end, and Joann Watts, our Miss Hospitality, was introduced from the stage and extended an invitation to the audience to visit it." O'Brien and "Miss Hospitality" are in Los Angeles today (March 29) for the opening of the 17th annual Los Angeles Sportsmen's Vacation, Boat and Trailer Show at that City's Pan-Pacific Auditorium. Mississippi's travel exhibits will be on display there thru April 8.

Growth Of Heavy Industry
Noted By Employment Commission
The Mississippi Employment Security Commission, in its current monthly review of manufacturing employment in the state, notes that "It is particularly encouraging to see the heavy goods industries expanding" in Mississippi, "since they generally employ the higher-paid skills." The commission reported payroll expansions in almost every manufacturing industry, "with substantial gains in metals, machinery, transportation equip-

ment, textiles, apparel, rubber and miscellaneous durable goods." Some 120,000 Mississippians are currently on manufacturing pay-rolls.

State's Industrial Story
On Nationwide Radio Show
Governor Ross Barnett will have an opportunity to tell the nation about Mississippi's growth and its opportunities tomorrow (March 30), when he will be interviewed in Jackson by commentator Fulton Lewis, Jr. on his Mutual radio network program, through Station WJQS, Mutual, in Jackson. More than 400 stations will carry the program. Mr. Lewis said: "I consider Mississippi the keystone to have this progress and its many opportunities. Few people in other parts of the country realize that Mississippi is one of the fastest growing states, industrially, in the Nation."

Agricultural Industry
Booming In Mississippi
Bryan Brothers Packing Company, West Point, is another example of Mississippi-founded business enterprise growing and expanding through the years. Starting operations in 1936, the company had 15 employees in 1937. They now employ 565 and process some 1,500,000 pounds of meat each week. The plant occupies a 70-acre site, and the company uses 40 trucks in its operations. Last year the plant paid out over \$18,000,000 for

cattle and hogs.

New Grenada Industry
Will Employ 45 Men
The Memphis Hardwood Flooring Company has located in Grenada and will employ 45 men. Kilns have been constructed, and production of 30,000 board-feet per day is scheduled. The mill will be supplied with oak timber from the Grenada area.

Wiggins-Made Paper Products
To Be On The Market Soon
Stone County-produced facial tissue is going on sale in Wiggins, according to Tom L. Murphy, president of the Southern Paper Co., Inc., in Wiggins. The plant is still under construction, but the first roll of paper will be produced about May 1, says Murphy. At full operation, the plant will employ 158. It will occupy 54,512 square feet and will cost approximately \$1,600,000. The company manufactures facial tissues, toilet tissue, paper towels and napkins.

Museum Now Open
Although formal opening ceremonies have not taken place, Brice's Cross Roads Museum is now open to the public each day. A wide variety of relics of Civil War battlefields, Indian artifacts and documents is on display in the area.

McCary Appointed As Dean Of NEMJC

A. D. McCary has been appointed as Dean of Northeast Mississippi Junior College. President E. A. Knight made the appointment endorsed by the Board of Trustees at the regular monthly meeting held Tuesday, March 12.

Mr. McCary has been at Northeast since 1954 as head of the Pre-Engineering Department and as an instructor in mathematics. Prior to coming to Northeast, he was a Mathematics teacher at Marietta.

Mr. McCary holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in mathematics from the University of Southern Mississippi at Hattiesburg with a minor in economics. He has a Master of Education Degree in Industrial Education and Guidance from Mississippi State University and has done advance graduate work at the University of Mississippi and Mississippi State University. His work in pre-engineering is well known throughout the state.

In Civil Defense, Mr. McCary has qualified as a civil defense fallout monitor instructor, having received training in New York.

In 1959 and 1960, he received a National Science Foundation fellowship for summer study. He is a member of the Kappa Mu Epsilon Honorary Mathematics Fraternity. From 1942 until 1945, he served in the Navy in administrative and personnel assignments.

Mr. McCary is married to the former Miss Barbara Fugitt and they have one small son, Tim. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. McCary of Baldwin.

1962 Designated As "Cancer Progress Year"

The American Cancer Society and the National Cancer Institute have designated 1962 as "Cancer

Progress Year" in an effort to point up the advances made against cancer in the last 25 years.

"Twenty-five years ago more than 160,000 persons were alive, cured of cancer. Today, there are more than 1,100,000. The number is increasing each day," reminds Ralph W. Godwin, State Crusade chairman.

"The best way to observe 'Cancer Progress Year' is to have a health checkup and to make a contribution to the American Cancer Society's April Crusade," Godwin said.

The cure rate for cancer climbed from one out of seven in the late 1930's to one out of three in the late 1950's. Today, according to the American Cancer Society, it could be one out of two if all cancers were diagnosed early and treated promptly.

Progress against cancer is attributed to two major factors. First, developments in research which have resulted in new diagnostic techniques and improved methods of treatment. Second, response to public and professional education which have resulted in earlier detection, prompt treatment and better, more available facilities.

"There are many thousands who die of cancer needlessly. About 87,000 men, women and children will probably die in 1962 who might have been saved by earlier and better treatment. A much greater effort must be made to urge people to see their doctors in time," Chairman Godwin said.
