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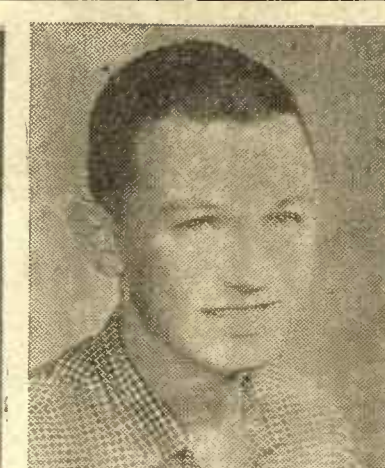

IUKA SHIRT COMPANY ANNOUNCES EXPANSION

**\$35,000.00 Building Will Be
Added To Present Facilities**

Max Glaser, owner, announces that plans are underway to expand the Iuka Shirt Company building and increase the employment by at least 75 people.

Announcement of plans for the expansion were made last week before a called meeting of the Iuka Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Glaser stated before the Chamber that Iuka was now his home and he wanted to do all that he could to help promote the community and the area and to improve the economic conditions of the people. "We now employ about 130 people at the Iuka Shirt Company and with an addition to our building we can increase that number substantially," Mr. Glaser said.

Reason for the meeting of the Chamber of Commerce was to discuss the possibility of the business people in the area subscribing a part of the money that will be necessary to pay for the added building. The opinion expressed by those at the meeting was that the desired amount could and should be raised. Mr. Glaser asks that the business leaders lend \$17,500 with the balance of the \$35,000.00 needed to be borrowed from other sources. R. A. McRee, Jr., president of the Iuka Guaranty Bank, stated that the Iuka Shirt Company and Mr. Glaser were in a good financial condition and that the bank was willing to lend money for the expansion.

"If the Government should withdraw its efforts," Kennedy said, "then there would be a collapse of farm prices as we saw in the Twenties and disaster would follow from the farms to the cities."

J. Hollis Brown Of Itawamba County

Delmus C. Harden, Editor of the Itawamba Times, makes the following comment concerning Mr. Brown's candidacy:

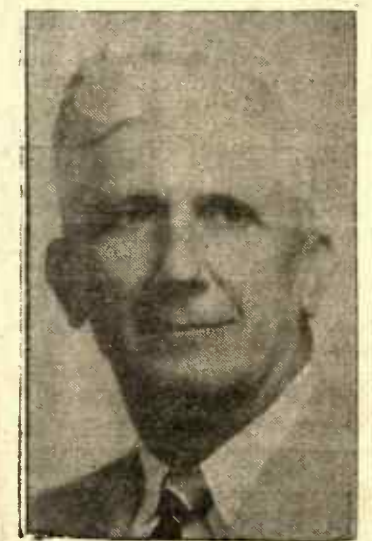
The vote count read 244 for retaining the Board of Aldermen form against just 90 desiring a change to City Commission.

April 16 Is Important Date For Farmers

Hugh Tigrett, Manager of the Tupelo District Office, reminds farmers that payment of social security tax for 1961 is due the Internal Revenue by April 16, 1962. A farmer must pay the self-employment tax if his net income from his farm is \$400 or more. This tax is due even though no income tax may be due.

If a farmer's net income was less than \$400 but his gross was at least \$600, he may elect to pay on 2/3 of his gross and report up to \$1200 for social security purposes.

Mr. Tigrett also stressed that farmers who haven't paid self-employment tax in past years may wish to use this optional method now and pay the back taxes. The last chance to correct and report 1958 income under the optional method is April 15, 1962.

April 16, 1962 is also an important deadline for ministers who want social security credit for their earnings. Ministers who have never requested social security coverage but want to participate in the social security program must file a waiver certificate with the Internal Revenue Service before April 16. Ministers who let the April 16 deadline go by without filing will not have a chance to earn social security coverage.

And as I say, while you are prohibited by custom and law, quite rightly, from involving yourselves in any particular agricultural program, or recommending it, or lobbying it, nevertheless we do value highly the communication which goes from here to you, because you are our most direct link with the farmers themselves—and you are all farmers—and also what comes from you to us."

"Your help last year in the feed grain program was greatly appreciated. It helped insure its success, and we are therefore particularly glad that in the spring—which is the great time of the year for farmers—that you have come to Washington for two days to exchange views with the Secretary. "I hope this will be an exchange, not merely from us to you, but

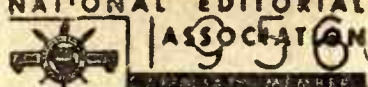
from you to us, because we live in a rather isolated area, it's not a particularly agricultural center here in Washington, and we depend upon you to tell us what farmers are thinking. Not merely what we hear through their organizations and the leaders of their organizations, but what they themselves are thinking. And that's where you serve a most valuable purpose."

"We hope you will also see the Members of Congress and acquaint them and the Senators. We don't want them to be, as the Secretary said, lonesome."

"I want to tell you again how glad we are to welcome you here. I see some familiar faces, and I hope you will go back from Washington and tell the farmers of America that we are genuinely concerned about their progress, that our efforts are genuinely directed towards insuring their welfare—and that the Secretary of Agriculture represents the farmers in this Administration. "Thank you."

Planting Dates

We had many acres of cotton replanted in Tishomingo County the past two springs because of early planting. The weather this spring is running about a month behind normal conditions. I believe we would be better off financially if we would wait until the soil warms up and dries out good before planting. The soil should be around 70 degrees temperature before we plant and we haven't had many days the temperature has been above 70 degrees at the present time. May 1 to May 10 looks like a good date to plan on planting cotton this year.

We should plan on planting good treated delinted seed whenever we do plant. The soil treader you use in your planter does not replace the seed treatment.

Corn on upland should be planted as soon as the soil dries out. Chemical weed control pays on corn if you are planting a field that you would lose to grass should be a wet spring.

Sudan and Millet Planting

If you are going to need extra early grazing, it will pay you to plant Sudan or millet now. How about making at least three plantings. . . . one now, one in May and one in June. Plant one third acre for each cow at each planting.

Farmers who want Sudan and millet in the summer can plant Sudan first and then follow with millet in the second planting. The third planting should also be millet.

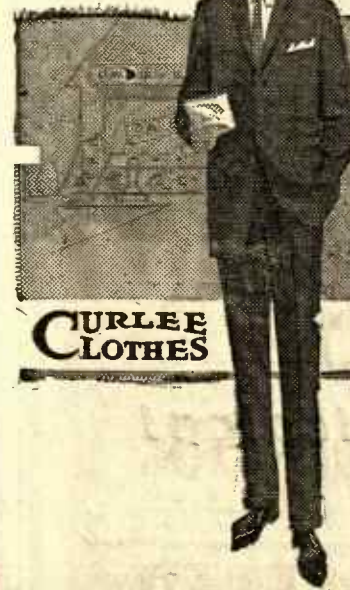
Sudan and millet do poorly under low fertilization, so step up the rates.

In the hills apply 500 pounds per acre of high analysis fertilizer at planting time and follow with a top dressing of 40 to 50 pounds of nitrogen per acre after it is grazed down the first time.
