Larry Bonds Is Winner

In Annual County 4-H
Club Tractor Driving
Contest Held Saturday

Larry Bonds of Burnsville was named first place winner in the annual Tishomingo County 4-H Club Tractor Driving Contest held Saturday, according to Roy Doss, Assistant County Agent. Other winners were Charles South of Tishomingo, second place; and Jerry Stephens, also of Tishomingo, third place.

Half of the contest consisted of driving the tractor, whereby the boy had to pull an implement which was a minimum of one foot wider than the tractor. He then had to drive through a set of stakes which were curving and had a 3 inch clearance on each side. The boy had to back the tractor through the stakes with a 6 inch clearance on each side.

The boys were graded on how they handled the tractor when hooked to the implement, how they dismounted and mounted the tractor, whether they set the brakes before getting off the tractor, whether they unlocked both brakes before restarting the tractor, traveling too fast or too slow, riding the clutch while backing or driving forward, stalling the engine, excessive slipping of the clutch or using it as a foot rest, and unnecessary grinding of the gears.

The boys were graded off 5 points each time they had to pull up when trying to back through the stakes and also each time they hit the stakes.

The first place winner, Larry Bonds, will compete in the North east District Contest, which will be held May 4th in Tupelo.

Dr. Harry Cosby Guest Speaker Of Tishomingo PTA At Meeting Mon. Night

Dr. Harry Cosby was guest speaker of the Tishomingo PTA at their regular meeting held in the school cafeteria on Monday night. Dr. Cosby led a very interesting discussion on the role of adolescence and the importance of home guidance.

In discussing the mental hygiene needs of an adolescent, Dr. Cosby asked the question, "What happens if a child is subjected to an environment of poor mental hygiene?" In answer to this question, he pointed out that several courses were open to the child but the one chosen is usually determined by his innate tendency, the type of stress to which he is subjected, or the pattern of reaction that he sees demonstrated by his parents, siblings, or others in his environment.

"The vast majority of youth pass through this period either with or without special help and emerge with a relatively healthy attitude towards life. The adolescent period is a time of special stress. Almost all adolescents rebel to some extent against the restrictions of family and society. Most youngsters are anxious and insecure when given too much freedom too soon. They become confused and uncertain when the regulations of childhood are abruptly removed and they are left without rules to follow, or a parent to obey," Dr. Cosby said.

"The teenager is extremely changeable. One minute he is able to think clearly and logically as an adult, and the next minute he may lapse into the confused thinking of a child," Dr. Cosby continued.

"Adults would prevent much heartache if they would only expect more of children and give them an opportunity to assume responsibility early in life, in order that adolescents would have more confidence in their own judgment and ability to take care of themselves. The parental lament that is heard most often is, 'We just can't understand; we have given that boy everything he wanted,

tended to his every need, and now he does us this way.' Guidance in the home can certainly lighten the paths of our youth," Dr. Cosby concluded.

Following the discussion, officers were elected for the new year. David Robinson was re-elected as president and other officers are: Kenneth Orick, vice-president; Miss LuVera Blissit, secretary; and Mrs. Montez Trimm, treasurer. Refreshments were served by Mrs. Maxine Timbes and Mrs. Hubert Day.

Community Begins Work On Merit Award Program

Beautification Is First Project; Effort
Will Be Made In Ten Categories

With Iuka officially entered in the Mississippi Merit Community Program, Mrs. J. C. Byrd, Jr., general chairman of the local program sponsored by the Iuka Chamber of Commerce, states that the community is now ready to get to work on improving the city's standards in the various categories. "It is our desire to obtain a Merit Award plaque in each of the following categories in community development: Beautification, Education, Fire Protection, Health and Sanitation, Housing and Construction, Long-range Planning, Municipal Finance, Police and Traffic, Recreation and Streets."

Beginning this week, one category will be discussed each week in this newspaper to inform the public as to how Iuka rates according to the standards set up for a community of its size. Efforts will be made to attain these standards

through local volunteer action and through cooperation with civic clubs and public officials.

Beautification
In the category of beautification, a town the size of Iuka must score a maximum of 710 points over the following items to win a Merit Award. Iuka's score in this particular category is as follows:

Refuse Collection, maximum score, 200, Iuka score, 110;
Refuse Containers, maximum score, 40, Iuka score, 40;
Refuse Disposal, maximum score, 50, Iuka score, 0;
Waste Receptacles, maximum score, 40, Iuka score, 20;
Street Cleaning, maximum score, 160, Iuka score, 30;
Junk Yards, maximum score, 50, Iuka score, 0;
Anti-Litter, maximum score, 80, Iuka score, 0;
Care of City Parks, Parkways, Neutral Strips and City Owned Cemeteries, maximum score, 80, Iuka score, 0;
Street trees, maximum score, 50, Iuka score, 0;
Weed Cutting, maximum score, 50, Iuka score, 0;
Approaches to City, maximum score, 50, Iuka score, 20;
City beautiful (entire city clean and attractive) maximum score, 170, Iuka score, 80. Total Iuka score, 300.

Both Hospitalized
In Tupelo In
Serious Condition

Roy Lindsey and Claude Jones, both of the Golden community, shot it out in front of Claude McAnally's store at Golden Sunday night about 7:45. Both men were carried to Community Hospital in Tupelo in serious condition.

Jones was wounded six times with a .22 calibre pistol, three wounds being in the chest, right hip and shoulder. His condition is listed as very serious.

Lindsey sustained wounds in the right chest, right arm and left shoulder. He was shot by Jones who was using a .25 calibre automatic revolver. Hospital authorities listed his condition as poor.

Tishomingo County Sheriff Clarence Pace reports that the trouble came up over a personal matter that has been brewing for over a year.

Highway Patrolman Zeke Clark and Tishomingo County Deputy Sheriff Henry Holcomb of Belmont investigated the shooting. They said there were no eye witnesses to the shooting but that both men walked out of the store and into the street where the incident occurred.

Sheriff Pace's office reports that no charges have been filed.

Project Classified As Active And Eligible For Federal Money; Committee Hearings Set

Governor John Patterson of Alabama, Chairman of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority, announced today that an appropriation would be sought from Congress this year to begin planning for construction of the long sought and often delayed Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway.

"Only a small amount of money will be requested this year," Patterson stated, "due to the fact that the Corps of Engineers only last week reclassified the project as 'active' and 'eligible' to receive federal funds. This, of course, was too late to be included in the President's Budget and we are most desirous of not upsetting in any way the President's fiscal program."

Patterson stated that appearances before the Public Works Subcommittee of the Appropriations Committee of the House and Senate have been arranged by members of the Committee from Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee and are scheduled during the next thirty days.

Members of the House Appropriations Committee from the three-state area are Representatives George Andrews of Alabama, Jamie Whitten of Mississippi, and Joe Ewins of Tennessee, with Whitten and Ewins being members of the Sub-Committee. In the Senate, Committee members are Senators Lister Hill of Alabama, Estes Kefauver of Tennessee and John Stennis of Mississippi. . . . all 3 being sub-committee members.

"Although an appropriation is being sought for this year," Governor Patterson said, "we are at the same time making plans to contact President Kennedy and administration officials to appraise their feeling in this matter. Kennedy endorsed the project as a candidate for president in 1960."

Inclusion of construction funds in the Administration's budget would be equivalent to an Administration recommendation and this would carry great weight with Congress—much more than an independent request to Congress by the project's boosters.

"Governor Ellington of Tennessee, accompanied by members of the Authority, was in Washington early this month contacting administration leaders in preparation for the Waterway to be included in the president's Budget for next year," Patterson said. "I am deeply grateful to Governor Ellington and the Authority members accompanying him for taking the time from their busy schedules to make the trip, which I understand was most fruitful and timely."

Glover Wilkins of the Authority's staff in Columbus, Mississippi, stated that plans were already underway for preparing testimony to be presented to the Committees. Economists from Universities in Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee are compiling data to show the tremendous industrial development in the direct tributary area of the Waterway. Wilkins stated, "and also Dr. Joseph R. Hartley, a transportation expert from the University of Indiana, is preparing the principal testimony, which he will present in person before the Committee."

Endorses Moving Of City Dump

Iuka Lions Take Lead
In Getting Eyesore
Off 72-E Highway

Among other action taken by the Iuka Lions Club at its regular meeting Monday night was a motion to urge the moving of the Iuka City dump that is located on highway 72 east.

After much discussion, Lion President Reuben Grisham appointed a committee of two to work with the city administration in locating another area that will be more suitable and less noticeable than the place now used.

It was pointed out at the meeting Monday night that the city dump caused a bad impression for the community because motorists passing on the highway as they enter or leave the city were sometimes forced to drive through black smoke that came from the burning rubbish in the dump. The foul odor and smoke naturally are unsightly and therefore passersby and visitors get a bad opinion of Iuka. Lion members feel that among the greatest needs in the community is the moving of the city dump.

Jim Bradford, area forester for the Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company, and W. C. Hamilton, executive director of the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority, were named to the committee on moving the city dump.

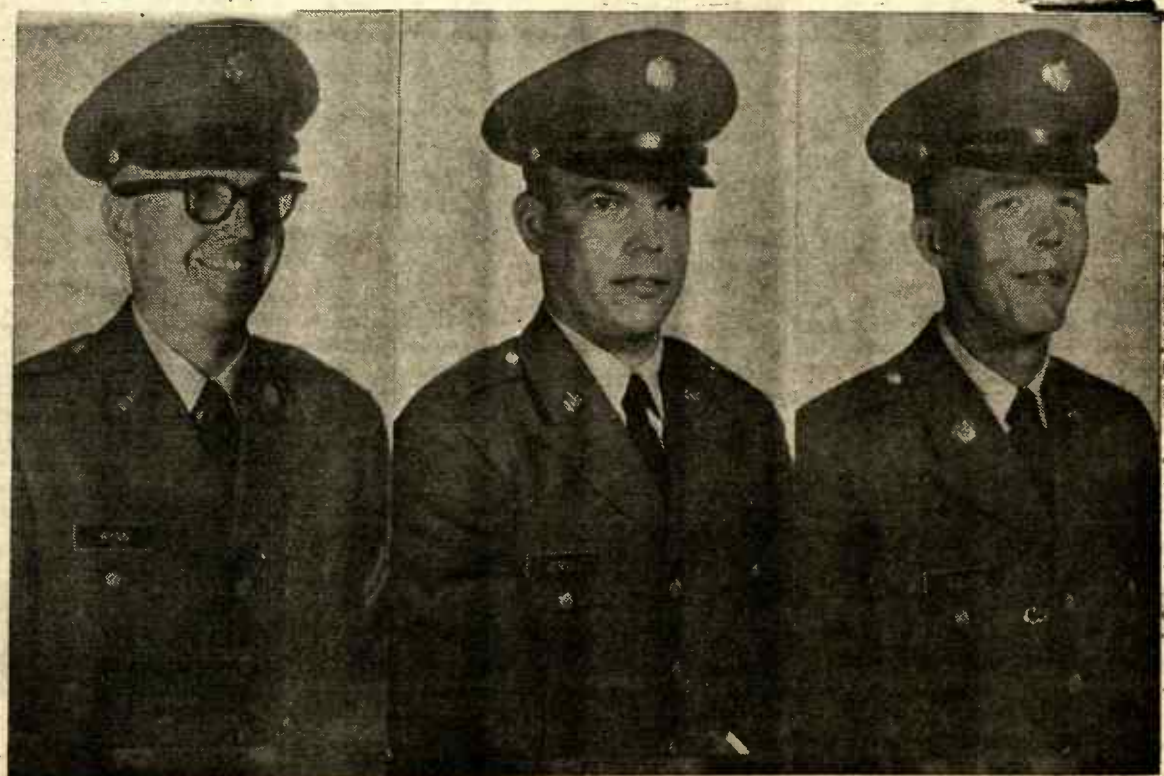
Patterson further stated that Kentucky has just become a member of the compact and that he plans to call Governor Bert T. Combs asking that he join in this request to his delegation.

County Agent's Notes

Fertilizers

Farmers have asked about using mixed fertilizer containing boron on crops other than cotton. You will notice on some of the fertilizer sacks that it says "contains boron, for cotton only." This means the amount of boron mixed in the fertilizer is sufficient for cotton and no other crops. The same fertilizer containing boron can be used under corn and other crops without any ill effects. The boron is applied in the mixed fertilizer for cotton on the basis of the farmer using 48 units of phosphate and 48 units of potash per acre. This would mean using 600 lb. of 6-8-8

or 8-8-8 per acre or 400 lb. of 9-12-12 or 12-12-12 per acre. Using the above rates, you would have .3 to .5 lb. of available boron per acre which is the experiment station recommendations.

Broomedge

Got a broomedge area where you want something else to grow? Here is a plan that will help replace the almost useless broomedge with good grazing.

Clip the area closely. Fertilize with 500 to 600 pounds of high analysis fertilizer. During April and May graze the area heavily. Cattle will eat broomedge in its early stage. In late April or early May spray the area with 2,4-D. Use one pound in 10 to 20 gallons of water to the acre.

Then from May to October graze the area a week or 10 days. Then rest for two or three weeks. In October, use a good seeder and plant 100 pounds of oats or wheat to the acre. Apply 500 pounds of mixed fertilizer to the acre.

Plant all kinds of beans in your home gardens—bush butter beans, pole butter beans, speckled butter beans, bush and pole snapbeans. Plant them at different times so that you will have a supply coming along all the time. Protect the beans from bugs! Pick them closely to prevent overmaturity. You'll be glad you did. They are mighty good eating!

Some other April jobs include planting corn, field peas, cucumbers, squash and the setting of tomatoes and peppers. Plant asparagus seed for crowns next year.

Clover Grazing

Graze crimson and white clover heavily. It will pay you to cross fence and graze one field down, then move to another field and let the grazed down one come back.

Ryegrass in clover or alone gives excellent grazing. Handle it just like you do clover grazing—graze it down and give it a rest.

Veterans Corner

Q—Is it true that VA hospitals welcome volunteer workers and what do they do?

A—Volunteers are welcome.

They serve the veteran-patients in many ways—reading to or writing letters for the bedridden; pushing wheelchair patients to and from libraries, chapel, etc., doing errands or just improving patient morale by chatting with lonely individuals. See the directors of any VA hospital for further information.

Q—Is legal help necessary to obtain benefits from the VA?

A—It is not necessary to obtain legal help in seeking VA benefits. Any VA office will furnish the necessary forms and instruction and will explain what constitutes eligibility.

Q—Although I was only married to a veteran for two years, we had twins shortly before he died. Is it true that I cannot be considered his "widow" for VA benefit purposes unless I had been married to him for at least five years?

A—When one or more children result from a marriage, there is no time limit requirement in order for the wife of the deceased veteran to qualify as his "widow" for VA benefit purposes.

Be very cautious about setting fires any place. There is no one who really wants to burn the woods and destroy valuable timber these days, yet we still have hundreds of acres of our woodland burned every year.

Not only does fire destroy trees, but it indirectly causes erosion and silting with flooding of lower acres.

When you burn trash or set fire to a ditch bank this spring, be sure to keep the fire under control.

Remember that everybody loses when the woods burn!

Livestock Owners Reminded Of Loose Cattle On Hi-ways

Commissioner of Public Safety T. B. Birdsong reports he has received numerous complaints over the past few weeks of cattle loose on the highways of the state. According to Birdsong, "We have appealed to the public and to livestock owners to keep their cattle fenced. Some few, apparently are unwilling to cooperate. This necessitates our 'bearing down' on these infractions."

"It is unlawful for livestock to roam at large on federal or state designated highways. Any cattle so found may be picked up, impounded, and the owner held responsible for the charges. There

is a \$5.00 fee per head for picking the cattle up, a \$2.50 fee for impounding them, and a \$1.00 per day charge for feeding them. At the rate of \$7.50 per head plus \$1.00 per day this can very well become expensive to the owner of stock picked up on the highway.

"The above facts are incidental compared to the danger to drivers on our state roads. The Patrol will no longer tolerate this flagrant threat to life and property. It is imperative that the Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol take immediate drastic action to prevent the loss of any more lives due to this cause. There is no way to justify cattle on our roads when a fatal accident results.

"The owner of the cattle is not only responsible for keeping his cattle off the highways but he is also liable for any damage caused by the stock.

"We earnestly solicit the cooperation of the livestock owners

throughout the state but if it is not forthcoming we must solve the problem with the means at hand and the authority we have by law.

lunch and fellowship hour at noon, the group drove over to the First Methodist Church for a rehearsal and planning session for the district meeting in May.

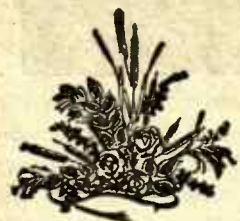

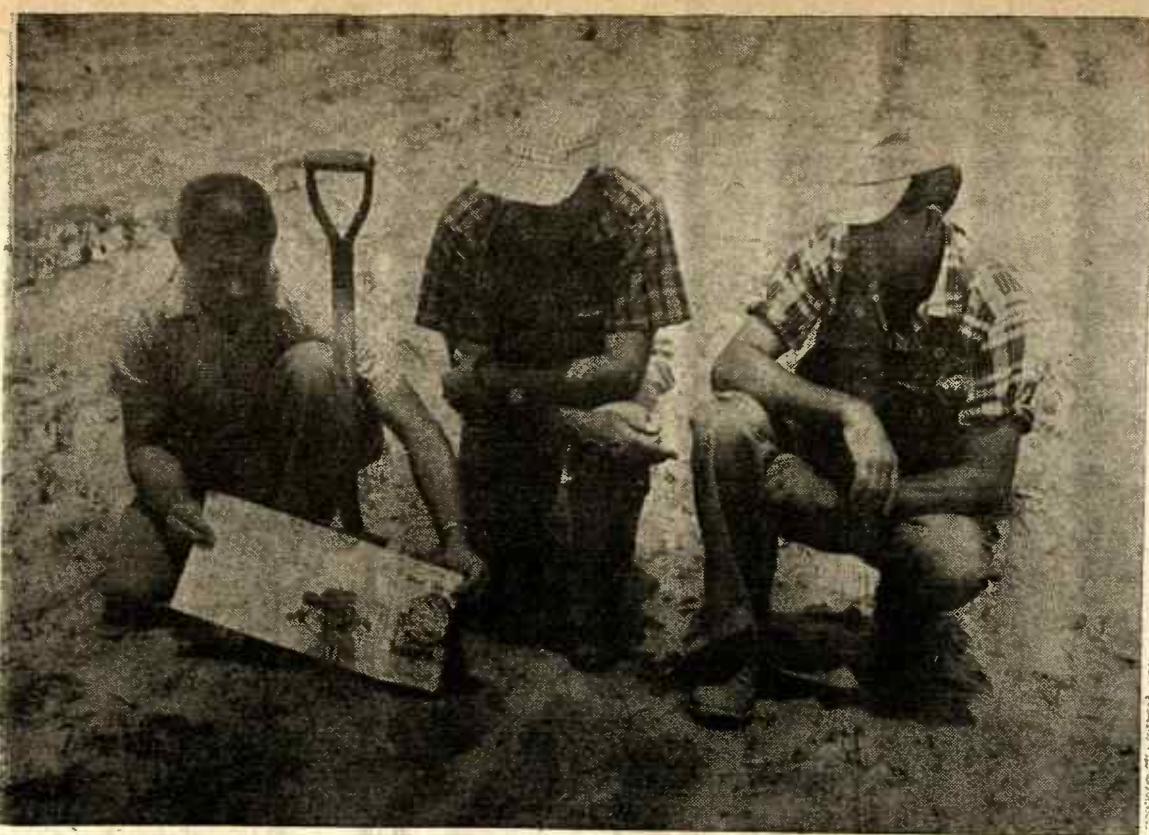

County Oil Dealers Oppose Increasing The Gasoline Tax

The proposed increase in Mississippi's state gasoline tax "would be like a millstone around the neck of every business in the state," according to L. E. Griffin, Chairman, Tishomingo County Petroleum Committee.

In a statement urging defeat of House Bill 727, now pending in the Mississippi Legislature, Griffin charged that raising the gasoline tax "would penalize every industry business, and motorist in the state and would increase the cost of living for every consumer."

"Transportation expenses already form a large share of the cost of doing business in Mississippi," he pointed out. "Virtually every company makes use of motor vehicles in some way. The state tax, federal tax, and retail sales tax on gasoline adds up to more than \$1.20 on every 10 gallons of gasoline. This high rate of taxation—exceeded by no other state in the nation—is inevitably reflected in the cost of all consumer goods."

"We have accomplished a lot in attracting tourists to Mississippi and in bringing in new businesses and industrial plants to provide jobs for our people," he commented. "Skyrocketing our gasoline tax to a higher level would certainly slow down our progress in those fields and would have an adverse effect on the state's entire economy."

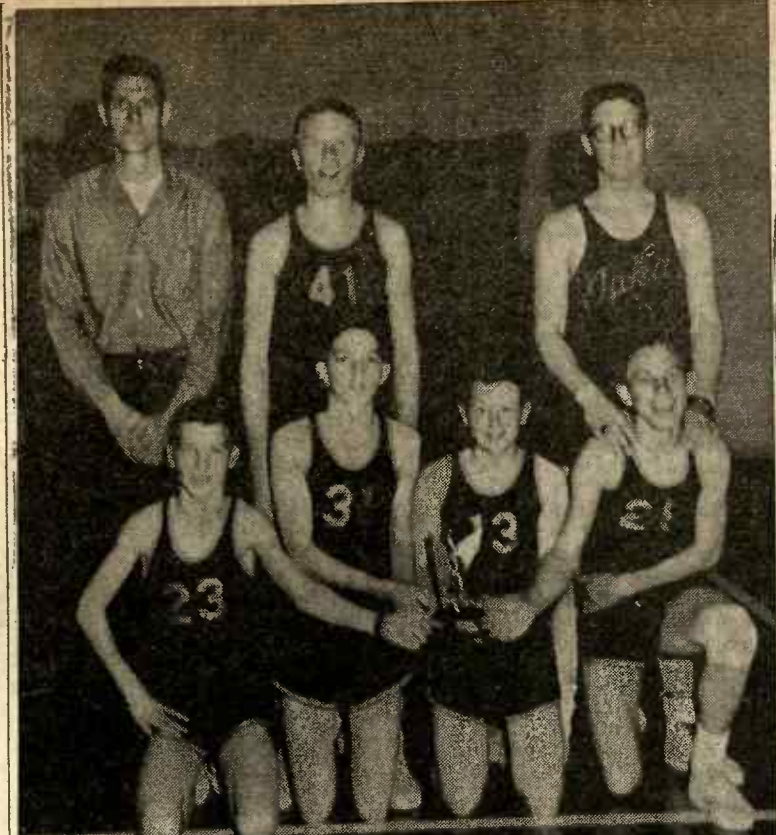

Miss. Library Association Offers \$300 Scholarship

A \$300 scholarship is now being offered to any qualified man or woman interested in becoming a librarian, according to Miss Glida Bethea, president, Mississippi Li-

brary Association.

The scholarship is offered annually to a college student in the senior year or to a graduate student who is seriously interested in Library Science and in becoming a librarian. The student must be able to establish financial need for assistance and is expected to work in the state of Mississippi as a librarian for a minimum of two years after becoming a professional librarian.

The scholarship fund was established several years ago to encourage alert young people to consider the profession of librarianship. Mississippi needs qualified librarians and the benefits are as high if not higher than in many other professions.

Applications for the 1962-63 award must be filed with the Scholarship Committee before May 1, 1962. A letter of application should be sent to the Committee Chairman: Miss Mattie Mae Viverette, librarian, Jones County Junior College, Ellisville.

The Mississippi Library Association has a membership of approximately 750 and is the 13th largest library association in the United States. Its membership has more than doubled in the past four years. This tremendous increase in Library Association activity and membership is due to the interest of the librarians in furthering professional development and the enthusiastic support of the trustees who work in the association.

Hybri Melons Produce Well In Field Test

Hybrid watermelons have yielded well in preliminary tests by the Mississippi Agricultural Experiment Station.

Dr. S. S. Ivanoff, head of the Experiment Station Plant Pathology Department, tested eight different hybrids in 1961. He had 8 replications of five plants each at three locations. From these studies he is convinced that use of hybrid melons has a promising future.

Crossing large varieties with small prolific ones seems to offer most promise. One such combination, a Spaulding-Cobb Gem hybrid, produced at the rate of 33 tons of good melons per acre. These melons averaged 30 pounds each.

Dr. Ivanoff has observed a trend toward earliness in his hybrid watermelon. Since early melons bring best prices, this could be an important factor. Through hybrids, he hopes to improve flavor, gain disease resistance and produce more uniform crops of melons.

Producing hybrid melons by hand pollination will be expensive, but use of male sterile plants is a possibility seen in the future. Also, less than 500 plants per acre are required for a good watermelon crop, therefore more expensive seed could be used, especially when transplanting to the field avoids early losses.

R. C. Abbrington, superintendent of the Northeast Mississippi Branch Experiment Station at Verona, assisted Dr. Ivanoff in the hybrid watermelon research.

MISSISSIPPI PROGRESS REPORT
A Summary of Current Events Contributing to the Economic Development of Mississippi by the MISSISSIPPI AGRICULTURAL & INDUSTRIAL BOARD

Exports Bring \$215 Million Annual Income Into State

Mississippi's share of the nation's expanding export trade brings more than \$215 million a year into the state. Of this export total, \$136.9 million came from agriculture; \$77 million from manufactured goods, and \$12 million from the state's fishery catch in 1960. Mississippi's largest agricultural export was cotton, which constituted 85 per cent of the state's agricultural export. Other farm exports were \$7.6 million for livestock and livestock products and \$900,000 for fruit and nuts. Mississippi's key exporting industries are paper and allied products (27.4 million in 1960); food and kindred products (\$13.2 million); chemical and related items (\$11.4 million); transportation equipment (estimated at between \$5 and \$9.9 million);

lumber and wood products (\$4.2 million); and non-electrical machinery (\$4.1 million). Other important export industries include apparel and related products (\$3.1 million); stone, clay and glass products (\$1.5 million); textile mill products (\$1.4 million); electrical machinery (\$1.3 million); and miscellaneous manufacturing. Leading companies in the export field located in Mississippi include International Paper Co., Quaker Oats Co., Swift & Co., Pet Milk Co., Superior Coach Corp., R. G. LeTourneau Inc., McQuay Inc. and Stephens-Adamson Mfg. Co.

Wiggins Has Most Wood-Using Industry

Wiggins probably has more wood-using industries than any other town its size (population is 2,332) in the South. Eight different types of wood-using industries are represented in the Wiggins area. Companies located there include Wiggins Veneer Co., Wiggins Lumber Co., International Paper Co., woodyard, Neely Lumber Co., Gulfport Creosote Co., Matthews Tie and Timber Co., Crown Zellerbach woodyard, Miller Lumber Co., Rider's Sawmill, Fairly and Worthy Dogwood Mill, Bond Treating Plant, Newton Naval Stores and Southern Paper Co., Inc. These industries employ more than 300 persons with an annual payroll approaching \$1 million for wages alone. Newton Naval Stores is the oldest wood-using industry in the area, having been established in 1902.

Forestry Notes

By Larry Brewer
Area Forester

There are approximately 226,000 acres of timbered and uncultivable land in Tishomingo County under organized fire protection by the Mississippi Forestry Commission. To assist in the support of a forestry program, a fire protection tax in the amount of two cents per acre is assessed on timbered and uncultivable lands.

This contribution by the landowners represents about 19 percent of the total amount expended for organized fire protection. This is fairly comparable to the number of fires caused by landowners largely through burning ditch banks, fields, and leaves. The remaining 81 percent of fire control costs is paid by the general public through state and federal funds. This is also comparable to the percentage of fires caused by the general public.

Everyone benefits from productive forests. Actually, the landowner receives only a small portion of the total value in his forest land through the stumpage paid to him from the sale of timber. The general public is the greatest benefactor of our forests. Protected woodlands are productive and they are playing a major role in the state's rapid economic growth by furnishing jobs, payrolls and purchases which are so vital and basic in improving our standard of living. Soil and water conservation, wildlife habitat, and recreational facilities also benefit.

High costs are involved in initiating a fire protection program. This includes the purchase of tractors, plows, trucks, steel lookout towers, two radios, and other items of fire control equipment.
