State Industry In Spotlight

Mississippi's accelerated industrialization has been in the spotlight in recent weeks as a number of agencies and localities have focused their attention on it. The Mississippi Employment Security Commission's "Mississippi Labor Market—Annual Supplement," concerning employment, hours and earnings for 1961, pointed out the trend of the state's industrial development as follows:

"The fabricated metals industry accounted for the largest gain in manufacturing during the year...

Significant increases were reported in machinery, textiles, chemicals, rubber, leather and miscellaneous durable goods."

The Secretary of State's office reported that non-agricultural employment rose to a record high for the month of February in Mississippi and that the state was one of the six states in the Southeast which recorded highs for the month.

Other industrial notations: Greenville celebrated "Industrial Progress Week" in April with the theme, "Greenville Grows With Industry." In Corinth plans were announced for the second industrial exposition in that city, and dates of May 18-19 were set for the display of products manufactured by Corinth industrial plants. Croft Metal Products, Inc., of McComb, held an industrial trade show on April 16-18 for the building trade.

"Hospitality Letters Go Out To All Mayors" Governor Ross Barnett has sent letters to every mayor in Mississippi asking them to name a 1962 "Hospitality Month" committee for their respective towns. The committees will organize programs for welcoming tourists to the community throughout "Hospitality

Month" in June. The groups also are responsible for the election of local "Miss Hospitality" winners who will compete statewide for the state "Miss Hospitality" title now held by Miss Joann Watts, of Poplarville.

"The Hospitality program," wrote Gov. Barnett, "has been most impressive to out-of-state visitors since its beginning in 1949 and has produced much favorable publicity for Mississippi. It is even more important this year because of our Civil War Centennial, which is attracting extra thousands of tourists to our state. Tourists are now spending more than \$380,000,000 a year in Mississippi. Every community and citizen benefits materially, either directly or indirectly, from this added source of income—brand new money brought into the state."

The Hospitality program is a project of the travel department of the Agricultural and Industrial Board.

Greenville Fleet Hub Of \$10 Million Towboat Industry

The towboat industry produces a gross income of more than \$10 million annually for Greenville. Estimates are that towboats operating from Greenville provide employment for around 800 persons. Some 52 towboats and 108 barges are listed as having Greenville as their home port. Twenty-six corporations are engaged in the towing business, and there are 53 separate companies directing the operations of boats with Greenville as headquarters.

Steel Firm Will Locate In Pascagoula Area

An Indiana steel fabricating firm has purchased 28 acres of land in Hurley, near Pascagoula, and may start plant construction in three or four weeks, according to Jackson county supervisor Lum Cumbest. The land was purchased from the Mississippi Export Railroad Company by the Indiana Steel Tank Co. of Gary, Ind. In addition, the company will buy or lease another 2.5 acres from the county. Plans call for erecting a 60-by-200 foot building and employing approximately 75 persons.

Millwork Firm Buys Jackson County Site

A new industry which will build windows and doors and supply other building materials is constructing a building just east of Pascagoula. The five-acre site was sold by Mississippi Export Railroad to Jack Malone, president of Acme Building Supply Co. of Meridian. The Jackson County branch of the company will be known as Acme, the Building Cash & Carry, and will sell to contractors wooden and aluminum windows and doors as well as plywood, sheet rock, ceiling and floor tiles. The building will cover 12,000 square feet initially.

BAWI Election Passes At Aberdeen

Aberdeen and Monroe county fourth district voters gave overwhelming approval to a \$750,000 BAWI bond issue for the expansion of Walker Manufacturing Co. recently. The vote was 1,152-to-55. The expansion will add 200,000 square feet of floor space to the plant, and approximately 125 additional men will be hired. The firm now employs 260.

Pre-emerge at planting time has meant the difference between harvesting a crop or losing it in many cases in Tishomingo County. Over 50 per cent of the cotton planted in the county last year was pre-emerged and 75 or 80 per cent is expected to be pre-emerged this year.

Man-on-the-land remains important in Mississippi and plays an important part in the overall economy. Mississippi farmers continue to diversify their activities in the agricultural picture in the state. It is long since the South and Mississippi, particularly, had a one-crop economy. While cotton remains king in the Delta and timber still plays an important role in the economy, livestock has become increasingly important.

CAPITAL NEWS

State's Abundant Water Supply

Mississippi's abundant water resources are a top economic asset destined to play a vital part in future expansion as part of the nation's most dynamic and promising region. In other words, Mississippi is blessed with an abundant water supply that many other areas of the nation and world do not have available. Water supply can affect future industrial development, economic prosperity and land values, besides determining the population growth of cities and population growth of cities and entire regions. Organizations In Industrial Development

All over the United States, industrial development work is occupying many people on every level; and Mississippi has mobilized for this purpose. Mississippi's organized efforts in this regard began in 1936 with the inauguration of a program (since copied by many other states) in which communities float bond issues to construct manufacturing plants. These plants are then leased to industrialists, but title remains in the hands of the community. Also, many organizations are involved in industrial development.

Expansion Of Chemical Industry

Industry-conscious Mississippi has a definite interest in the fact that the nation's chemical industry is growing at a rate well above that of the economy as a whole. Mindful of the big new oil refinery on the Mississippi Coast, it is especially significant that petroleum is one of the great treasure houses of chemical raw materials. Every American industry depends on the chemical industry for materials vitally important to operations.

Birth Certificate Necessary For License Applicants

Spring's beautiful weather for driving has prompted many teenagers to apply for their drivers license or learners permit. Getting a learners permit is easy enough but there is one step that must be complied with before a permit can be issued.

Mississippi Highway Safety Patrol Chief Drivers License Examiner W. H. Sutherland offered this word of advice about teen-agers applying for a learners permit or drivers license. "Any person under the age of 18 must show a certified birth certificate to the Drivers License Examiner before he will be issued a permit or license. We are sorry to have to do this but law requires that we have proof of age. For a time we accepted other forms of proof but there were many cases of falsification on applications. Some drivers licenses have been lost on this count. The only equitable way to prevent this happening in the future is to require a certified birth

certificate of every applicant. This part of the law was designed for the protection of all drivers. It would be a disservice to all concerned to allow underage drivers to be licensed.

"We want to encourage all young drivers to get their drivers license as soon as they can... but we certainly want them to comply with the drivers license law."

Soil Conservation; Future Generations

Forestry Notes

Landowners who have young pine stands, either as ornamentals or commercial stands, should be

on the lookout for evidence of pine tip moth attack.

This insect, the Nantucket Pine Tip Moth, causes damage to both loblolly and shortleaf pine which are the most widespread species of pine in Tishomingo County. Attacks on slash pine are relatively rare. Trees 15 feet or more in height are usually not attacked.

Infestation may be recognized by the presence of excess resin on or near the tips of the new growth or by the death of the tips.

The moth, which is quite small, lays its eggs on the tips of the branches or main stem. As the eggs hatch, the larvae mine into the buds and new growth. While attacks are seldom fatal to the tree, they result in loss of height growth and excessive forking of the main stem and branches.

There are several complete generations of this insect each year, from early Spring to Fall. While complete control is not practical, spraying of the pines at regular intervals of about two weeks through Spring and Summer with one of the following insecticides will usually give satisfactory results. To make one gallon of spray, use 3 tablespoonsful of 50% DDT

wettable powder or 2 tablespoonsful of 40% chlordane wettable powder in water.

I want to caution you that all insecticides are poisonous to man and the directions and precautions on the labels of the insecticides should be strictly followed.

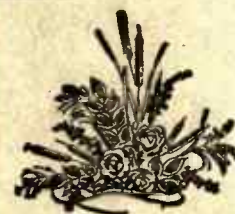

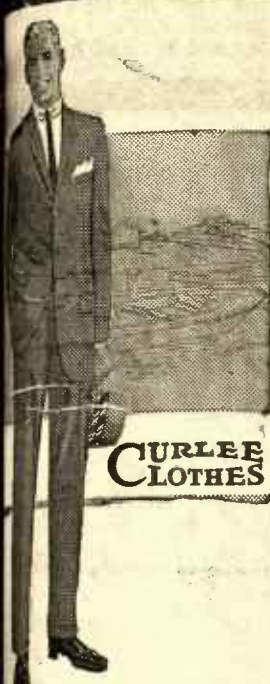

Station Aids In Producing Milk For Manufacture

Research which benefits farmers and sustains a vital Mississippi industry is underway at the Pontotoc Branch Experiment Station where production of milk for manufacturing purposes is being studied. Since this type milk brings less returns than Grade A, it is important that dairymen place it as inexpensively as possible.

B. C. Hurt, Jr., superintendent of the station, says:

"This study shows the necessity of using cows that are capable of producing large quantities of milk. This can be done only by an intensive program of culling and breeding."

"Pastures and stored forage are the cheapest sources of feed for dairy cows. Temporary grazing crops as oats, ryegrass and millet are important to maintain a high level of production."

"Concentrates from corn, oats and high protein meal cost as much as excellent pastures, silage and good hay. Since a greater percent of milk can be produced from a pasture-roughage program, it is their greatest efforts in producing these crops."

In 1959 the Station herd averaged 8,224 pounds of milk per cow and produced it at a cost of \$2.31 per hundred pounds. By 1961, production per cow was up to 8,673 pounds and feed cost was down to \$2.19 per hundred.

Milk price increased during this time, but the effects of increased production per cow and lower feed costs are also reflected in the better returns. In 1961 net returns to labor and capital were \$1.56 per 100 pounds compared to 93 cents two years earlier.

The report is published in the March issue of Mississippi Farm Research available on request from the Experiment Station at State College, Miss.

More Beef Per Acre From Use Of Soft Grain

Soft grain may be the answer to the question of how to produce more beef per acre. Three years of research at the Delta Branch Experiment Station at Stoneville indicate this possibility.

Harvesting grain early—in the soft stage—greatly reduced field losses normally caused by birds, insects, storms, and poor machine efficiency. Too, under favorable weather conditions two crops can be grown in one season on the same land. There is time for a second crop of milo behind an early crop of corn or milo.

James C. Collins and Dr. Peter G. Hogg, Delta Station research men, interpret results of their test as follows:

"Harvesting of grain at a high-moisture content (45-50 percent) offers opportunity to reduce field losses greatly. Where irrigation is available, a good second crop may be produced."

"There were no significant differences in rate of gain or carcass grades between steers fed soft grain, corn or milo, and steers fed dry ground grains. The addition of dry grain to soft grain rations gave only a slight increase in daily gains but improved general appearance at slaughter time."

"Soft corn is more efficient in production of beef than in ground ear corn. Results from this test indicate some method of cracking or grinding of soft milo may improve its feeding efficiency."

Detailed results on feeding tests and production of the forage for the years 1959, 1960 and 1961 have recently been published in the March issue of the Experiment Station periodical Mississippi Farm Research. These results are available on request from the Experiment Station at State College or the Delta Branch Station.

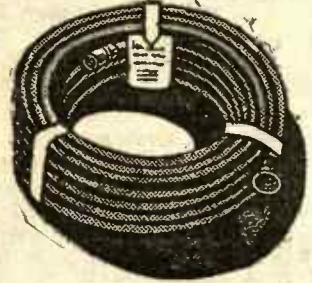

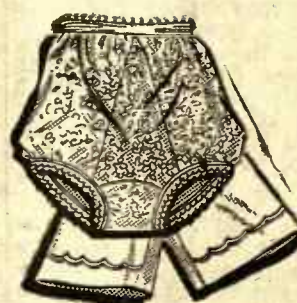

Cutworm Control
Cutworms can play havoc with your young tomatoes, pepper, peas, beans, squash, beets, and other vegetables. In some cases they destroy plants overnight.

Cutworms are fat, shiny caterpillars, one or two inches long. They can be grey, brown, greenish or yellowish with dark markings. They usually hide during the daytime under clods of dirt and come out at night to feed.

Sometimes cutworms cut the young plants off at the base of the stem. They also strip plants of foliage. They may eat into the bud of the plants.

You can control them with several materials—DDT, Sevin, toxaphene. For dusts use 20 per cent toxaphene, 5 to 10 per cent DDT or 5 to 10 per cent sevin.

Or, you can use sprays of these materials. For toxaphene use one tablespoon of six-pound toxaphene emulsifiable concentrate to a gallon of water. DDT can be used as a 50 percent wettable powder at one tablespoon to the gallon. Sevin is generally available as a 50 percent wettable powder. Use three tablespoons to the gallon.

Apply any of these materials in a six or eight inch band on top of the row immediately after planting, or apply to the base of plants after being transplanted.

Do not apply toxaphene or DDT to foliage of cucumbers, squash, or beans. Do not apply to fruit that is to be eaten. There are no restrictions on use of sevin.

Feeder Pig Sale

The next sale will be July 19.

Hog Outlook
Hog production is expected to be up around three percent over last year.

Prices for slaughter barrows and gilts are expected to be around \$1.50 per hundredweight below last year and are expected to continue below the 1961 level throughout the year.

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

Bible Material: Genesis 12:1-9; Exodus 3:1-4; Hebrews 10:19 through 12:29.
Devotional Reading: 2 Corinthians 4:7-15.

Facets of Faith
Lesson for April 29, 1962

THE beauty of a jewel comes from the fact that it has many facets. The light is reflected from each of these facets, or surfaces, at a different angle. If a diamond

were cut flat and square like a tiny window-pane it would not be nearly as beautiful as it is. Now faith is a jewel; and it likewise has many facets, or aspects, and all the more beautiful for this reason. Like all

jewels, also, faith has many imitations.

Accept no substitute
What are some of the imitation faiths being offered the public today? One variety of "paste" or imitation faith, is faith without an object—not faith in anything or any one, just "plain faith." This may even be a circular faith, faith in faith. This is not worth a dime, it is the most perishable of all the imitations. Another substitute is credulity—the habit of believing anything and everything, believing whatever any one asks you to believe. Of such faith suckers are made. Another much-advertised substitute is faith that goes against facts, faith that believes the obviously and undeniably impossible. This is a very deceptive imitation, because true faith does go beyond what average cautious people call "possible." This imitation variety prides itself on absurdity; the more absurd the faith, the more credit the believer claims! If I believe that with God's help I can set aside more money than I ever have done, for His cause and service, that is real faith. But if I believe that after I have spent every cent of my weekly income I will have a ten-dollar bill left to offer God or to use myself, that is not true faith at all.

How faith keeps warm
True Christian faith, as has been said before, is faith about Christ, faith in Christ and faith with Christ. Now there are certain features or facets of this, to which the Bible passages marked for this week direct our eyes. One is that it is easier to have faith when others all around us are men and women of faith, than when one is all alone. A certain missionary was in solitary confinement in China, with no communication permitted between him and any other persons except the police. Friends and relatives of his in America were praying for his release. He also was praying for it. There was true faith in his heart and in the hearts of his friends; but it was harder for him than for them, because they lived (comparatively) in a climate of faith, whereas he was in the midst of people who only derided his religion.

Looking to Jesus
The writer of the letter to the Hebrews says some strange and unexpected things. Once in the twelfth chapter he says "... looking to Jesus ..." Now we should expect him to say, "looking to Jesus, the object of our faith;" but he does not. Instead, he says "looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith." In other words Jesus is the one who begins our faith and the one who completes it. He is, in short, the model for all men and women of faith. This means that Christians should study the gospels over and over again, to learn the qualities, the seeds and the secrets of the faith which the Master held. With him, faith had a new beginning; with him, faith found its perfection.

Faith's discipline
Great poetry and trashy doggerel are both made of words; but the great poems are not mere jumbles of words and noises. They are patterned; that is, the poet cannot put down anything that occurs to him. Some words fit, others don't. Some words ring like bells, others clatter like squeaky wheel-barrows. So it is with art. The artist must exercise control. It is only very cheap "art" that can be produced by throwing words, or paint, on paper or canvas at random. How much more this is true of the most difficult art of life itself! The writer to the Hebrews reminds us that without discipline we never attain to a God-like life. God's commands may sometimes not agree with our own wishes; but to obey him is the way of discipline, the way marked out by faith, that leads to the life that is life indeed.

Gray-Norris Vows To Be Said May 15

The feed grain proposal applied the strictest kind of control and regimentation to a commodity of which 85 percent is produced for feeding on the farm. Only 15 percent moves to market. Many areas, such as our own State, are deficit producers of feed grain. It just is not sound to require a farmer to cut back feed grain production when he uses every bushel of it on the farm for feeding his own livestock. Controls just do not fit into the production of this crop. But this does not mean that Congress should indefinitely continue the current temporary program; nor revert to the 1958 permanent program, a horrible failure.

The dairy program is in a sure enough mess. Price support is not actually made available to the dairy farm milk and butterfat, as many believe. Support is available only to the processors, on the processed product such as dried milk, butter, cheese, etc. In many instances processors buy milk at prices less than the support price, convert it into a marketable product, sell what they can in the market and then dump the remainder on Uncle Sam through the Commodity Credit Corporation at the support price, plus processing costs, plus a marginal profit. For years the dairy program has provided processors with this built-in windfall. Cost to the government is about \$600-million a year, all going to processors, none to farmers. This program must be changed but

a production control program is positively not the answer. Dairy cattle just do not lend themselves to nor cooperate with controlled production.

Following Easter we think an improved program for these three commodities will come out. At least, there will be one with less regimentation and lower cost. Far reaching changes may be made in other respects. Some are again suggesting a ceiling on the quantity any one farmer may place in CCC loan. This and other ideas are being kicked around rather freely.

Although Freeman lost, he came close. If, however, his bill had been reported we do not believe it would have passed. It included just too much regimentation.

New Unloader Reduces Grain Handling Labor

Equipment which saves labor in unloading grain from a truck has been developed by agricultural engineers of the Mississippi Experiment Station.

The unloader consists of an auger in a wooden trough in the bottom of a pick-up truck. It extends lengthwise from the back of the cab, out through a hole cut in the tailgate. A raised false floor, sloping to the center, feeds the grain into the auger so that no shoveling is necessary.

Before loading the truck, the auger is covered with short boards. This prevents the grain from packing in the auger, clogging it and stalling the motor. To unload, the electric motor which drives the auger is started and one of the short boards is removed to allow the grain to feed in. Other boards are removed successively until the grain is unloaded from the entire length of the truck. The grain drops into a container behind the truck, where another auger picks it up and conveys it into the bins.

This equipment will unload 40 bushels of corn in 7 minutes, and 80 bushels of oats in 14 minutes. When the truck is not being used for hauling grain the unloader is easily removed. The opening in the tailgate is covered with a metal plate held in place by four small bolts.

Agricultural Engineer G. Burns Welch, who developed the equipment, estimates the cost of materials at about \$60. A more detailed report of this machinery is published in the April issue of Mississippi Farm Research available on request from the Experiment Station at State College, Mississippi.

find a way to reform the persons convicted, and found it necessary to send them directly to prison for the protection of the community. Some offenses are of such nature as to indicate depravity of the convict, in which cases the Court has sent such convicts to the penitentiary immediately upon conviction.

"Many in the County know that I have spent much time and effort to learn all I could about persons convicted in my Courts to determine whether the one convicted is such person as to risk out on probation, and to find some persons interested enough to give constant attention to the probationer and help him to be employed regularly. This effort was also made in order to get the young person away from the environment and his associates so that he might have a chance to become a better citizen. In order to be informed and to place these young men, I have often worked at night in contacting good people, some of them even in other states than Mississippi.

"I have so conducted my courts that as many convicts on the docks have been finally disposed of, (considering the number of days the Courts have been in session) as the Courts of any District of the State. This is a matter of public record. Anyone can verify this. I have thus saved time and saved the

taxpayers money. But, at the same time, I have given parties and their lawyers time to try their cases in an atmosphere of relaxation in which they can think and make progress. They must be given their fair day in Court.

"I have not given the attention to my financial matters that all people should give to such affairs. Many of my fine friends have made sacrifices and saved and had money with which to help me and others. I salute them. Without them the others of us would suffer at times. But whatever the job I have had to do, I have devoted full time to it—day and night. That was true when I was a teacher and principal, and also as legislator, prosecuting attorney, attorney for the Board of Supervisors, and as your Circuit Judge. All of my adult life I have given to the public service. As so many know, I have always been found trying to help people. Not having given the attention to my private financial affairs, I have not accumulated a "back log" sufficient to tide us over the periods of expensive illnesses, and found ourselves in debt. I desire very much to remain in position that I can pay all obligations and expect to do so regardless of the sacrifices I must make temporarily.

"And then, if I should retire at this time, I would not receive any benefit from Social Security funds, and the amount I would receive from the Public Officers and Employees Retirement funds would

be quite inadequate to provide for my good wife and me a livelihood, due to the deductions which would be made on account of my age. But three to four years from now, such payments would be sufficient to support us. We need the position very much at this time.

"The work of the courts has kept me busy for some time, either in regular term of the courts or in hearings and studying causes and writing opinions and judgments on appeals on the records, which I hear and determine at times when the courts are not in session. I shall have only two weeks free from terms of courts between now and the election. Although I should like to see and talk to each of you, time will not permit. Time and lack of money prohibits me from writing to you as I have often done in the past. This being true, will you please consider this as my letter to you and my plea for your help in this election.

"As the majority of the good people of this District wish that I serve them another term as their judge, only failure of friends to go to the election on Tuesday, June 5, 1962, and vote for me and insist upon their neighbors doing the same, can defeat me in this election.

"If you will give me your help this one and last time, I shall ever be very grateful, and I shall give to you the service as your judge that my training, interest in my fellows, and my lengthy experience in helping people enables me to give."
