great-grandchildren.

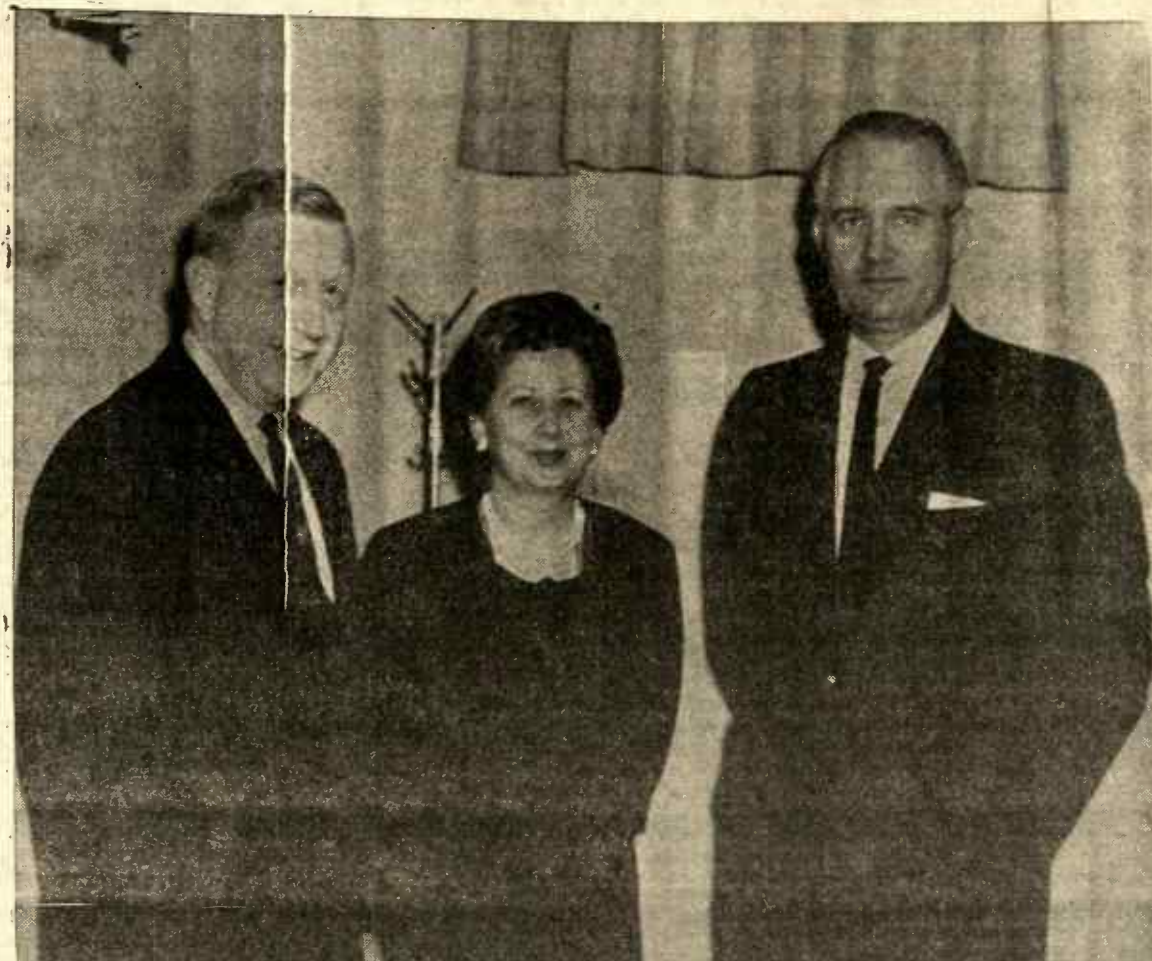
Funeral services were held Wed-

## Congressional Hearing Set For May 17 Tenn.-Tombigbee Waterway Funds

Authority Members Will Meet With  
Public Works Committee In D. C.

Governor John Patterson of Alabama, chairman,  
other members of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Water-  
way Authority, are scheduled to attend a hearing on  
May 17 in Washington concerning funds for the Tennes-  
see-Tombigbee Canal. The House Public Works Sub-  
committee hearing will be on an appropriation of about  
\$500,000 for completion of pre-construction  
work and the start of work on the first dam to  
be built on the waterway at  
Tombigbee, Ala.

The Tennessee-Tombigbee Wa-  
terway is a proposed canal that  
will be built from the mouth of Yel-  
low Creek in Tishomingo County  
to the Gulf of Mexico at Mobile,  
a distance of 253 miles. The  
waterway (or canal) will go up  
Yellow Creek to the dividing ridge  
of Holcut. The canal will go  
from Mackey's Creek and into the

Mr. Adams said Worsham Brothers  
of Corinth was low bidder on  
the project with an amount of  
\$66,540.23 at the contract letting  
held March 27 by the State High-  
way Commission.

The work will consist of incident-  
al grading, base preparation and  
double bituminous surface treat-  
ment.

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## VOTERS URGED TO QUALIFY FOR JUNE 5 PRIMARY ELECTIONS

### Circuit Clerk Robinson States That Some Should Check Registrations

Circuit Clerk L. E. (Gene) Robinson issues a state-  
ment this week to the effect that a number of citizens  
of the county are not eligible to vote because they are  
not properly registered.

The possession of two poll tax receipts is a require-  
ment, Mr. Robinson says, but the tax receipts are use-  
less unless the person is properly registered on the poll  
books to vote in the precinct in which he lives. Missis-  
sippi law requires that voters be registered at least a  
month before the First Primary election, or at least four months  
before a general election.

First election this year in Mis-  
sissippi will be the First Primary  
on June 5, at which time, members  
of the county board of education,  
congressman, circuit judge and  
chancery judge will be voted on.  
Since the election will be held on  
June 5, the deadline date for regis-  
tering will therefore be May 5,  
which is Saturday of this week.

Residents are asked to go to the  
Circuit Clerk's office to check  
their registrations to be certain  
that they are qualified to vote.

In his statement, Mr. Robinson  
says, "The First Primary Election  
this year is Tuesday, June 5. The  
law states that a voter must be re-  
gistered at least a month before  
the First Primary. Therefore, if  
you are not properly registered,  
then you must do so by Saturday,  
May 5. That is the final date on  
which a voter may register so that  
he or she can qualify to vote in the  
June 5 primary," Mr. Rob-  
inson said.

"A check of our records show  
that a great number of citizens in  
the county have the required num-  
ber of poll tax receipts but are  
not eligible to vote because they  
are not properly registered. So, let  
us urge you to attend to this mat-  
ter at once. Remember, the last  
day to register is Saturday, May  
5, if you wish to qualify to vote  
in the June 5 primary," Mr. Rob-  
inson said.

**Just a Reminder:** Don't try to stake your tomato plants with 3-ft. stakes. Use a stake at least 5 feet above the ground.

#### Reason For Poor Laundering Results

One reason you aren't satisfied with the looks of your clothes when they come out of the washer may be related to the temperature of your water. You want to use water of at least 140 degrees for durable colorfast materials.

Poor sorting of garments can also contribute to poor laundering results. So can incorrect use of detergents. The ideal solution of water and detergent in 1/3 oz. of detergent (by weight) to each gallon of water. This water-detergent recipe came from the 1961 American Home Laundry Manufacturing Association Conference.

Overloading your washing machine is a major factor in poor laundering results.

#### May Plentiful Foods

Milk, butter, ice cream and other dairy products are the headlines on the plentiful foods list for May. Broiler-fryers, canned freestone peaches, vegetable fats and oils, eggs and potatoes are other foods on the list.

#### Does Your Car Have Seat Belts?

One study showed that seat belts cut the number of serious injuries and deaths in automobile accidents by one-third.

The recommendation is to fasten your seat belt before you turn on the ignition of your car and keep in fastened whenever your car is in motion.

Many folks believe that if they drive mostly around their own home town and at moderate speeds, they won't need seat belts. Before you adopt the beliefs of this group, remember:

• More than half of the accidents causing injury or death involve speeds of less than 40 miles an hour.

• Three out of four traffic deaths occur within 25 miles of home.

You can unfasten a seat belt in an instant with one hand. It can increase your chances of remaining conscious so you can get clear of

a submerged or burning car. Your chances of being killed in an accident are five times greater if you are thrown from the car.

### Man, Land And Conservation

Man, the most important inhabitant of the earth, needs land to survive. The land must be conserved if future generations are to have all they physically need for a healthy abundant and happy life. The land must be used to meet the needs of the present generation, the way it is used now will, in a large measure, determine the kind of land future generations will have.

Misuse of the land now can mean only one thing, poor eroded land in the future!

For this reason, Soil Conservation districts were formed by the legislative bodies of the states that make up our union. These Soil Conservation Districts are geographic subdivisions. Some of these Districts are smaller than counties and some are so large they embrace parts of several

counties. A governing body of five men is charged with the responsibility of the affairs of the district, the objectives of which are soil and water conservation.

The Tennessee River Soil Conservation District was organized in 1951, and has been in operation since that time. More and more factories are being built in this area and many landowners and their families have found employment in these factories. Because of this, the agricultural trend for the District has been toward forestry, pastures and livestock. Row crops are gradually being moved from the steep hillsides and planted on the more level and more fertile soils. This, along with higher fertilization, and better cultural practices of improved varieties of row crops has resulted in greatly increased yields.

The local technicians of the Soil Conservation Service cooperating with all the other agricultural agencies of this county, have assisted farmers in making needed landuse adjustments on their farm. They have also assisted the land-

owners in establishing needed soil and water conservation practices on their land. But the big job of better land use has been, and is continuing to be, done by the landowners themselves.

The job is being done and praise is long overdue for the landowners who are doing such an excellent job in using their land now, yet conserving it for generations yet unborn.

# Tishomingo County Farmers Make Use Of ACP Program

## ASCS Committee Calls Attention To Farm Storage Facility Loan Program

Farmers of Tishomingo County are making use of the Agricultural Conservation Program on their farms. According to E. N. Allen, ASCS office manager, 519 farms in Tishomingo County have participated in the ACP Program during the first four months of 1962. The above farms have taken advantage of the government cost-sharing offered to improve their farms.

The following are some of the practices carried out by these farmers:

- (1) Preparing and sowing new pasture. For example, Dan and William Murphy in the Providence Community sowed 5.0 acres of Fescue and White Dutch Clover, also, 5.0 acres of Bahia Grass and Secrecia Lespedeza.
- (2) Improvement of vegetative cover. This practice is adding fertilizer to old pasture sod. Mr. Robert L. Parrish of R-2, Belmont has just finished applying nitrogen, potash, and phosphate to ten acres of old pasture.
- (3) Liming pasture and cropland. Harold Blunt of Tishomingo applied 21 tons of lime to 15.0 acres of cropland.
- (4) Secondary drainage ditches. Mr. John R. Adams of R-2, Iuka

and Mr. Archie Hardin of Tishomingo have just completed drainage ditches on their farms.

(5) Planting pine tree seedlings. We estimate approximately one million seedlings were set on old eroded hill land in January, February and March of this year.

(6) Timber Stand Improvement. Mr. Otho Ivy and Mr. Grover Ivy of Belmont and Golden have recently received approvals to deaden old hardwood on several acres of land that pine seedlings had been planted.

(7) Mr. C. W. (Neb) Wilson in the Midway Community signed, this week, for a Stock Pond to be built in his pasture.

"The above examples indicate to you what your County ASCS program can do for you," the office manager said, "so why not take inventory of your farm needs and see if you could use some of the government cost-sharing offered on your farm."

At this season of the year you can still sign for fertilizer for your old pasture, apply agricultural limestone on your land, construct stock ponds, dig secondary drainage ditches or V and W ditches. Spring time is a fine time to carry

out these practices.

**Farm Storage Facility Loans.** How many farmers in Tishomingo County know that they could buy and build round metal bins on their farms to store farm products? Did you know that your ASCS program would loan you 95% of the cost of these bins, giving you four full years to repay the loan at a low rate of interest of 4%? You can get this service under the Farm Storage Facility Loan Program. Leonard F. Clark of near Tishomingo and B. E. Wright, Jr. of Belmont took advantage of this program and have constructed metal bins on their farms.

Mack Sanders, Chairman of the ASCS Committee, is making application for a 2200 bu. bin to store ear corn this fall.

"Come by the ASCS Office and let me explain the Farm Storage Facility Loan Program to you. I can assure you that you can not afford to pass up this opportunity if you need storage on your farm," stated Mr. Allen.

**Soybean Support Price.** "During the planting season this spring, a number of farmers in Tishomingo County are planting soybeans. The national average support price on 1962 soybeans will

be \$2.25 per bu. The Tishomingo ASCS County Committee calls your attention to the Farm Storage Loan Program that is offered. If you are planning to grow soybeans, don't market your crop at oil mill prices, check with your ASCS Office and place those beans in the loan program. You can be advanced \$2.25 per bu. This gives you an opportunity to hold the beans and sell them at a higher price the next spring," Mr. Allen said.

Soybean growers are reminded of the conservation requirements which must be met if they want to take out price support on their 1962 crop. This is the same requirement that was in effect in 1961 and simply means that it is intended to assure that an increase in soybean production will come from acreage used for crops that are in abundant supply rather than from land that is in conserving uses or idle. To be specific the requirement is that soybeans eligible for 1962 price support must be grown on a farm where the 1959-60 average acreage of conserving and idle land has been maintained. Support price of \$2.25 per bushel will be made available through Farm Storage Facility Loans.

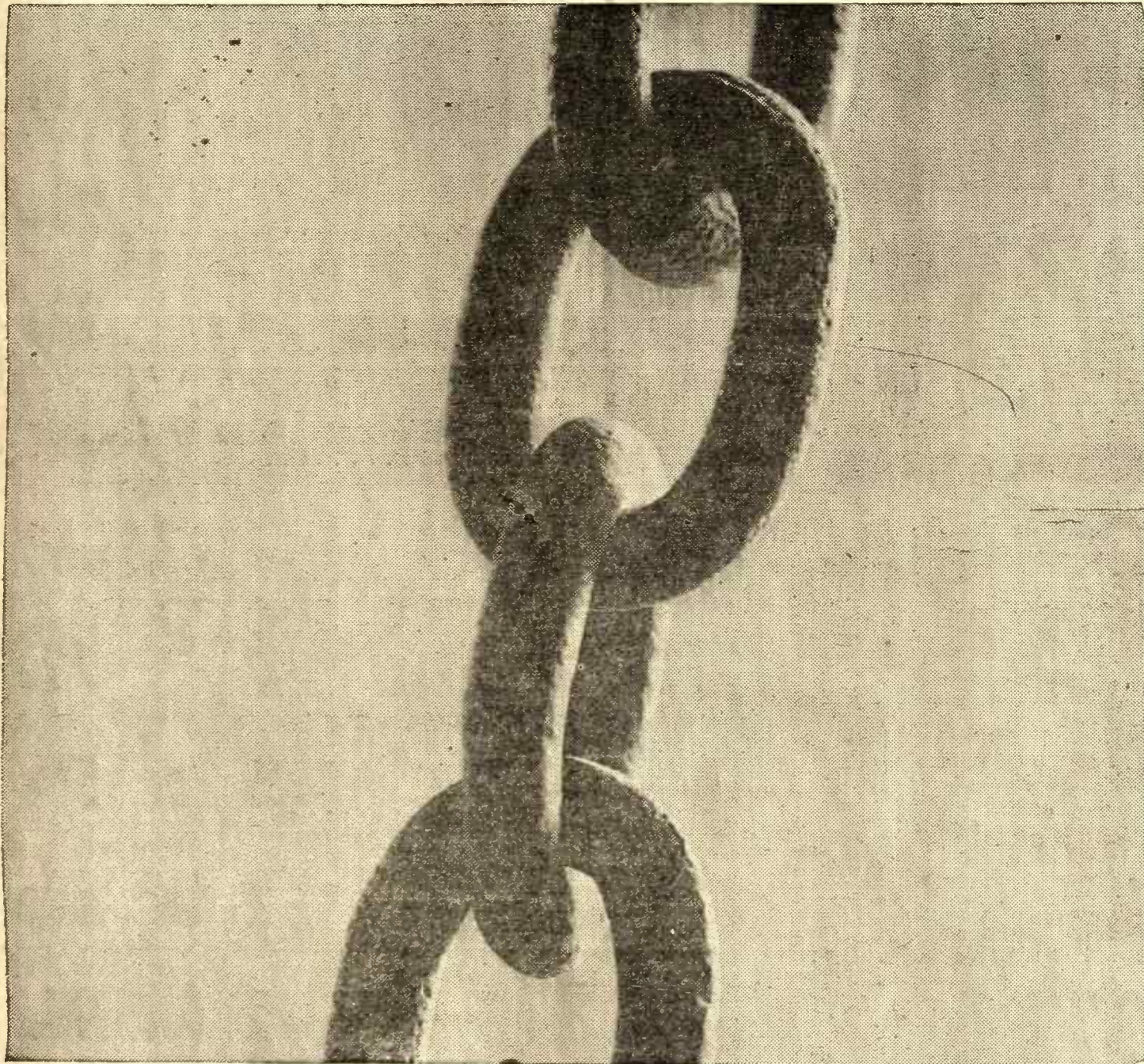

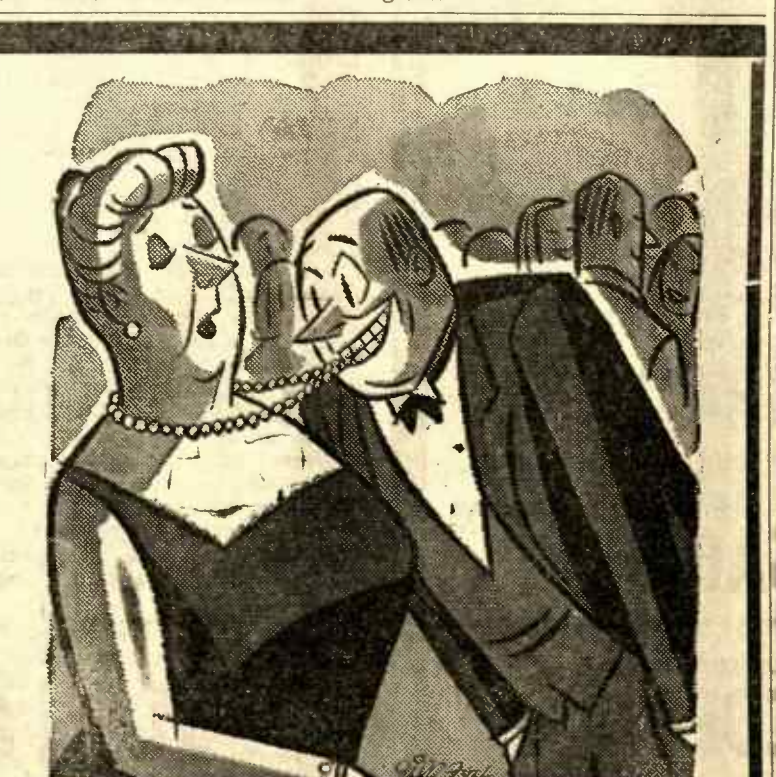
## "Under The Magnolia" Theme Of Tishomingo Junior-Senior Banquet

## Forestry Notes

By Larry Brewer  
Area Forester

We have been receiving quite a few inquiries concerning a disease that attacks pine trees which is especially noticeable at this time of the year. Land owners who have planted loblolly pine are usually the most concerned.

The visible evidence of this disease is a pronounced swelling on the branches or stems, which at this time of the year usually exhibit orange or yellow powder or dust.

This disease, which is caused by a fungus, Cronium fusiform, is commonly known as fusiform rust. The orange or yellow powder-like material is one of the spore stages of the disease.

The effects of this fungus causes abnormal development of the cells and usually results in the death of the branch on which it is located. When the disease is located on the main stem of smaller trees, it is usually fatal. Larger trees, if not killed outright, are often so weakened that they are subject to windthrow.

There is no known effective chemical or fungicidal control for this disease. If the infection is located near the main stem on a branch, it is recommended that the branch be removed from the tree.

This disease does not spread from pine to pine. The spores that are so evident on the pines at this time infect the leaves of oaks. Subsequently, spores are produced from the infection on the oak leaves which carry the disease back

to the pines. The oaks apparently do not suffer important ill effects from the disease.

Landowners who have stands infested with this disease should, in factually all instances, remove the infected trees in thinning or harvesting operations.

## Health Officer Lists Rules To Observe Preventing Lawn Mower Accidents

Lawn mower accidents injured 100 Mississippians last year and caused the death of at least one child, Dr. A. L. Gray, State Health Officer, said today.

Dr. Gray said the medical profession has broken them into two main groups.

One includes those caused by the blades being thrown by the mower. About 65 per cent of all lawn mower injuries fall in this group. Objects thrown by the blades, such as stones, pieces of metal, wire, glass, and nails—and even by broken blades of the machine itself—frequently results in blindness, total disability or death. The number of injuries to the eyes is extremely high.

In the second group of injuries are those caused by direct contact with the mower. About 35 per cent of all lawn mower injuries are caused in this way. Most of these

are due to the negligence or carelessness of the operator. The most common are burns and injuries to the toes, feet, fingers and hands.

About 20 percent of lawn mower injuries develop complications.

And the tragedy of it, said the State Health Officer, is that some type of permanent disability results from 14 per cent of the injuries.

"Like all other accidents, those with lawn mowers need not happen—they can be prevented," declared Dr. Gray.

For safe lawn mowing, Dr. Gray advises people to observe the following rules:

—Inspect your lawn before you start mowing. Clear the area of all rocks, nails, stones, bones, wires, sticks and other debris.

—When you start the mower, make sure your feet are in a safe position. Keep them away from the blades.

—Bystanders and pets shouldn't be in the immediate area of mow-

ing.

—Know how to disengage the clutch or how to stop the engine quickly. Practice this in case of emergency.

—Don't let the mower pull you. Slow it down to maintain control. And never leave the mower unattended when the motor is running.

—Store gasoline in an approved, tightly-sealed container and keep the container in a safe place.

—Don't cut up and down on hills. If you slip, the machine may slide down over your toes. Always cut sideways.

—Never attempt removal of any object from the mower until you are certain the blades have stopped turning.

—Don't refuel the engine when it is hot—it may burst into flame.

—When mowing on rough terrain, set the blades high to prevent debris from being ejected from the mower.

—If you're using an electric mower, don't cut the grass when it is wet or when it's raining. Also, the metal frame of the mower should be grounded.

### Planting Time is Here

Weather permitting, a large percent of the cotton in Tishomingo County will be planted this week. Let's make sure we prepare a good seedbed and take our time and do a good job of planting. A good seedbed and a good job of planting will save time later on when we go to cultivate. In case the soil crusts over and the cotton seed can't break through, plan to run a ro-

tary hoe over the field lightly and break the crust. This operation will not effect the pre-emerge and will help get a stand. We have a lot of fields replanted each year that could be saved by using a rotary hoe and waiting until the weather warms up. As long as the seed does not rot in the soil, they will germinate and come up when the weather gets right.

To me this is one of the most beautiful seasons of the year. We prepare our soil, plant the tiny seeds, and with the help of God, see them germinate and grow into the large producing products to be harvested to supply our needs.

### Dairy Notes

Are all your heifers vaccinated? Perhaps it is time for you to let your veterinarian know that you have some calves to be vaccinated against brucellosis. Six months is the preferred age to vaccinate. Calves should be at least four months old and not more than eight months of age.

It is also a good idea to register purebred calves as soon after birth as possible. It is much easier to tattoo calves' ears if the job is done before the calves are a week old. Right now is a good time to check the salt supply for your

calves and heifers.

### Dog Mange

Nothing is much more pitiful looking than for a youngster's dog to be all mangy. This is especially true when big scabs form and the hair starts falling out.

This mange can be cured. It is caused by the same mite that causes the so called "seven-year itch" in humans. Mange is contagious. It can be spread from dogs to other livestock and even to humans.

Control by spraying with lindane. Thoroughly wet the dog down to the skin and repeat the treatment in one week. The treatment will also control fleas and ticks.

Use 20 percent emulsifiable concentrate at three tablespoons to three gallons of water. Or use 25 percent lindane wettable powder at six tablespoons to the three gallons.

Animals can be dipped using the same dosage. Or dusts of one percent lindane can be used. The dust is not as effective as the spray or dip.

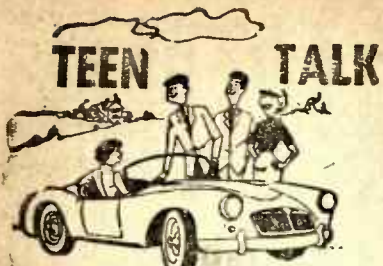

The First Primary Election This Year Is Tuesday, June 5. The law states that a voter must be registered in his precinct at least a month before the First Primary.
