Reduced Association In Effect On % Savings

740 consumers. Their average annual residential use of electricity is more than 6,703 kwh. The average cost per kwh under the old rate was 1.14 cents. Under the new, lower rates, this cost will drop seven lower.

In comparison, the average cost per kwh for electricity in the home in the United States is 2.43 cents, and the national average residential usage is 4,138 kwh a year.

R. "Our area has certainly grown electrically since Tishomingo County EPA first began distributing TVA electricity on August 15, 1935," Mr. Brinkley asserted. "Our record of progress and growth has been astounding, and our future looks even brighter."

Rate History
This new rate is the fourth rate change adopted by the Association Board of Directors since 1935.

On June 30, 1947, amortization was removed from members who had been buying power from the Association for ten years, a \$6,100 savings. Amortization is a charge to the Association to repay the investment in lines, poles and materials needed to distribute power to members. On January 1, 1956, the BG and B-5.1 rates were adopted, which resulted in savings of \$8,000 to the commercial and industrial consumers.

In February 27, 1961, the charge was removed from commercial and industrial consumers, a \$10,500 savings. A surcharge was an additional percent added to the bills for these consumers.

Power Contract
Tishomingo County is currently operating under a 20-year power contract with TVA. The contract assures our members a plentiful supply of sale electricity," Brinkley said. "Also, it makes available to our 5,740 members ending and special services they are needed. The contract continues a beneficial relationship for progress. As we reach the Association's 28th anniversary, it gives us a chance to pause and reflect on the tremendous growth of our power system. And we're confident that our area's progress and electricity will continue to come."

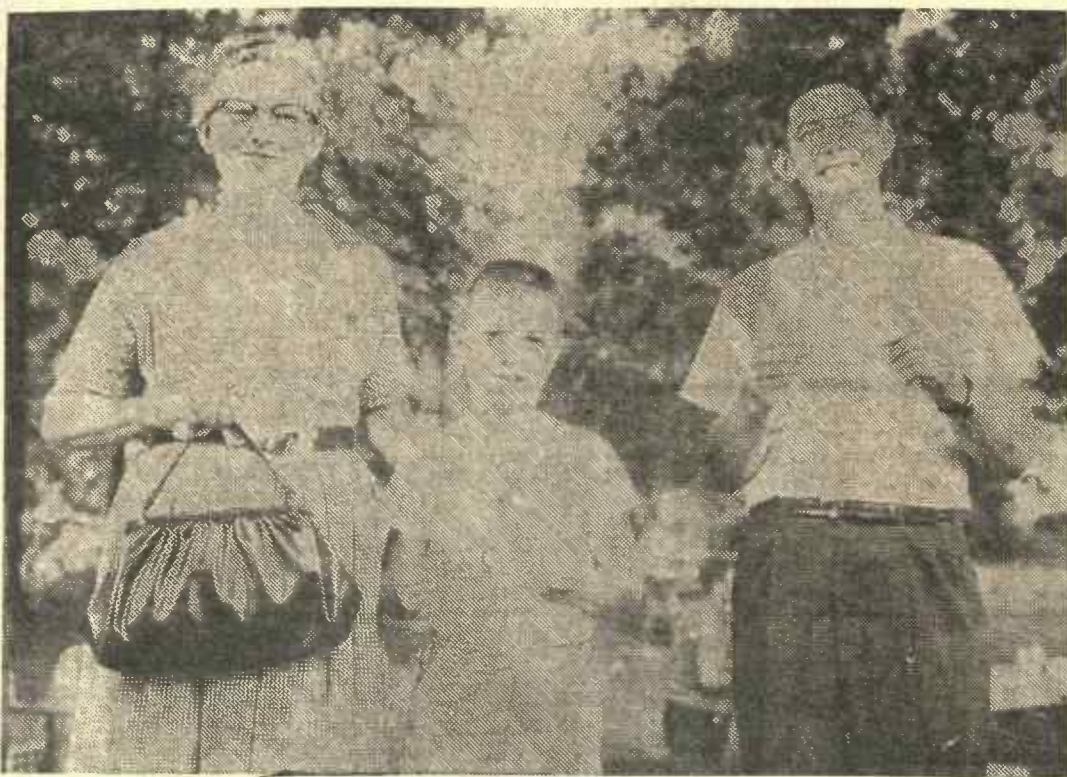

Veterans' Corner

Q—A veteran has asked me as his personal physician to get a report of the VA x-ray and laboratory studies made at a recent examination. How can I get this information from the VA?

A—You may secure Form 3288 from the Veterans Administration which will authorize the release of information from the veteran's records. Or the veteran concerned may send to the VA a written statement granting permission to release information to the doctor.

Q—Are members of my immediate family eligible for VA hospitalization?

A—Veterans only are eligible to receive care in a VA hospital. First priority goes to veterans with service-connected disabilities; after that service men without service-connected disabilities are unable to pay for hospital care.

Q—Can I make a reservation for burial plot in a national cemetery?

A—Burial plots are assigned at the time of the funeral. No advance reservations are made. Once the plot has been assigned it is understood that the wife (or the veteran if the wife is already buried there) will be buried there when the later death takes place. In certain cases a child may also be buried there.

County Agent's Notes

Bitterweed Control
Want to keep the cow's milk from being bitter? Milk flavored with bitterweed costs you money, and it hurts the consumption of milk.

By spraying dairy pastures with three-fourths pound of 2, 4-D per acre, you can keep the bitterweed out of the way of your cows.

While controlling bitterweeds, think about the other weeds. Weed control on pastures can mean a 20 to 50 percent increase in good grazing.

Clip to control goat weeds, horsenettle and cypress weed. Be sure to raise the clipper blade around six inches to keep from destroying good grass.

Soil Sampling

Don't wait too late to send in soil samples for late summer and early fall planted crops.

If you take the samples now and send them to the State Soils Testing Laboratory now, you should get return information back in plenty time to buy needed fertilizer and lime. But if you wait until the last minute to send in the samples, you are likely to run into a delay.

Remember, farmers who take soil samples take the guess work out of their fertilizer programs. It could mean more money at harvest time.

Cotton Insects

Keep a close watch on your cotton fields as a hatchout of both boll weevils and boll worms should come in around

a week or so.
Make sure that the equipment you use for insect control is properly adjusted and in good working order.

Remember, if you drag the nozzle down in the cotton plant, you are not getting good coverage of the terminal... this is where the young bollworms first show up.

Check with your county agent for information on insecticides to use, when and how to apply them for controlling these two (2) pests and any other insect that may be damaging your cotton.

Beef Cattle Meeting

Forestry Notes

Littleleaf of pine is a disease that causes considerable economic losses throughout this area. Shortleaf pine is the species most seriously affected.

Littleleaf is usually difficult to recognize in the early stages because the symptoms closely resemble those arising from

mineral deficiencies of the soil, particularly a low nitrogen supply. The advanced or typical stage is, however, readily recognized. The crown of the affected tree is sparse and ragged in appearance, and the branches, lacking the normal foliage, often assumes an ascending habit. The foliage appears in tufts at the twig tips as a result of reduction in needle and shoot length. Needle length decreases from a normal 3 to 5 inches to only 1/2 to 3 inches.

Recent studies have shown that littleleaf is caused by a combination of factors. Primary among these is the destruction of the growing tips of the roots by the soil fungus. Adverse soil conditions prevent recovery of the root system. The reduction of absorbing surface of the roots retards the intake of mineral nutrients, particularly nitrogen, causing deficiencies that result in decline of the trees.

There is no practical control, as of yet, for littleleaf in forest stands. All trees that are diseased should be cut as soon as detected. Loblolly pine should be favored in diseased stands as it is resistant to littleleaf.

Burn Attends Institute At Peabody College

Doyce Burney, formerly of Iuka, is attending a National Science Institute for Teachers in Nashville, Tenn.

The institute is designed to provide a program of intensive study in the sciences or in mathematics. Approximately 53 teachers from 24 states are participating.

Burney, who teaches mathematics at the Junior High School in St. Louis, Mo., is participating in the sequential institute plans to complete work on the masters degree at Peabody College.

Custom Work Increasing On Delta Farms

Custom work on farms in the Mississippi Delta amounts to more than 18 million dollars annually and the practice is still growing, according to Morris M. Lindsey, USDA economist working at the Delta Branch Experiment Station.

In his study of custom work, Mr. Lindsey obtained information from 71 operators engaged in the type work for Delta farmers. Plans, first used to apply cotton insecticides, now plant and fertilize small grains, apply weed control chemicals and are used in cotton defoliation.

Mechanical harvesting of cotton and soybeans are other jobs often handled by custom operators because of the expense of the machinery involved.

Costs of equipment rentals, as well as custom work, were investigated in the study. As an illustration, Mr. Lindsey says a national farm equipment group suggests a formula under which a new \$12,100 one-row cotton picker would rent for \$121 if used for 1 day only, the weekly rate would be \$605 and monthly rate \$1,815.

"Farmers, concerned over the trend toward higher machinery investment, are investigating the possibilities of custom work as an alternative for certain jobs," Mr. Lindsey said. "A procedure for evaluating this alternative in specific farm situations is presented in the report of this study (being published as Experiment Station Bulletin 667).

"Some machinery dealers feel

that the high cost of farm machinery and equipment is hurting sales, and will probably consider the newer practice of equipment rental if sales remain relatively slow.

"Custom work is increasing in the Delta and will probably continue to expand if custom operators can adapt their services to the changing farm situation."



Underfed Row Crops

When an automobile runs out of gas, it stops. When cotton or corn runs out of plant food, these crops stop producing.

Like the car that runs out of gas halfway to town, the cotton or corn may produce just half a crop, and perhaps about one-fourth the profit that they would have made if properly fertilized.

You can drive down the road and see the corn that has run out of plant food. It is firing from the bottom up. Farmers once thought dry weather was the sole reason for the lower leaves of corn to turn yellow or brown (fire-up). Now it is known that this is a sign that the corn did not receive enough of the right kind of fertilizer. Of course, dry weather hurts corn, particularly at the silk and tassel stage, but properly

fertilized corn suffers less dry weather than does poorly fertilized corn.

Row crops, properly fertilized, grow rapidly and soon give good cover and protection to the soil. The best way to conserve the soil and protect it from erosion is to cover it quickly with some form of vegetation.

Now is a good time to check your fields to see if your crops are running out of plant food. If they are, make your plans to have your soil tested and to get the right kind and amount of fertilizer for your row crops next year.

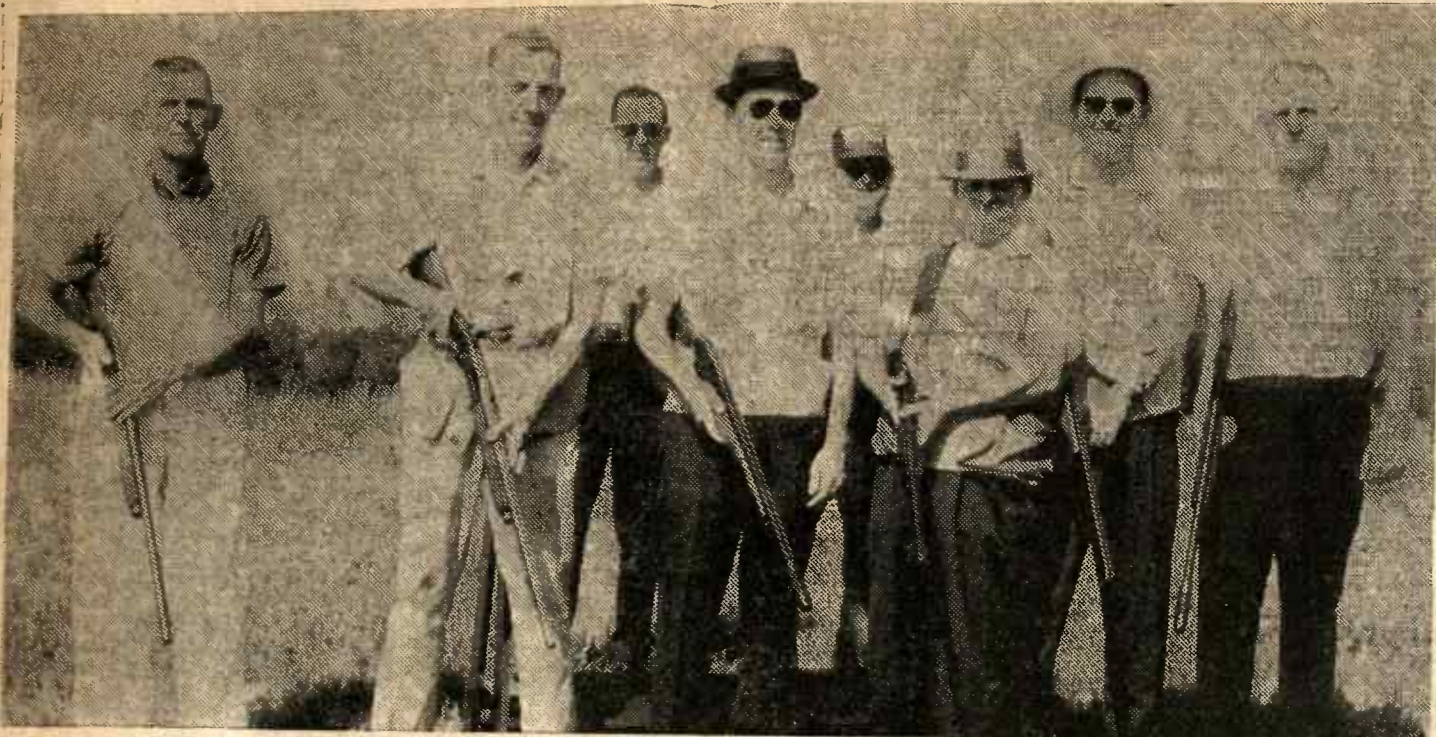
