Click Road Causes Wrecks

Three Crashes Near
Armory On Hwy. 72
Since Resurfacing

Two separate wrecks occurring Saturday morning only 30 yards apart in front of the National Guard Armory on Hwy. 72 East caused extensive damage to two late model Tractor and Trailer trucks, owned by James Trucking Company of Russellville, Ala.

The wrecks happened about 1:30 when a car pulled into the path of a 1963 International Tractor and Trailer Truck, traveling west on Hwy. 72 and being driven by Odas Lee Hughes of Russellville. The driver attempted to apply his brakes, but the extreme slickness of the pavement caused the trailer to jackknife and skid approximately 100 ft., landing in a ditch. Hughes was not injured. Driver of the car was unknown. Damage to the truck was estimated at about \$1500.

Silas Oliver, also of Russellville, driving a 1960 model International Tractor and Trailer truck, saw the wreck occurring and stopped his truck, but failed, according to investigating Highway Patrolmen, the truck turned over, landing on a bank in front of the Armory. Oliver was carried to Tishomingo County Hospital in the Highway Patrol car. He was treated for severe lacerations of the left shoulder and left knee. Approximately \$8,000 damage was done to his truck.

Main cause of the wrecks was believed due to the slippery highway. According to Highway Patrolmen, these are the third trucks to wreck in the area near the Guard Armory building on Hwy. 72 since the resurfacing of the highway.

Roy C. Adams Seeks Re-Election As State Highway Commissioner

Roy C. Adams, who is seeking re-election as Highway Commissioner of the Northern District, makes the following statement to people of the Northern (Third) Highway District:

"In announcing my candidacy for re-election as State Highway Commissioner, I am more aware of the great responsibilities of this office than ever before and it is with deep gratitude that I express to you my sincere appreciation for your support, co-operation and understanding.

"During my campaign for re-election, I shall stand on my record and on the promise that I shall continue to exert my energies, abilities, and experience to the maximum development of our highway system that is so essential to the economic development of Mississippi.

"When I was first elected Highway Commissioner, I realized that our income from agriculture had declined materially. I further realized that to replace this lost income we needed to attract industry to our section of the state. To do this, we needed an adequate highway system which would be an effective inducement for industrialists to locate here since highway transportation of both raw and finished products is most important.

"The traveling convenience of employees to and from their jobs will also be enhanced by better highways. These improved roads will, in turn, be a tangible influence in our area's drive for industrial development. Also, we need better roads to transport our children to and from public schools, training centers, junior and senior colleges.

"In making my campaigns for the office of Highway Commissioner, I pledged to the people of the Northern Highway District a highway organization based upon service and not politics and to give a truthful yes or no answer on matters pertaining to highway development.

"I have kept these promises and I will continue to keep them in the future with your continued co-operation and help.

"Despite limited funds, our administration can point with pride to many accomplishments during our tenure of office. We have constructed and paved more than 1500 miles of new highways as well as reconstructed many sections of old highways.

"Our administration in building highways has insisted upon sound planning and high standards in construction. Poorly constructed highways will lead to a waste of public funds, because such highways will deteriorate early and soon become obsolete.

"We are aware that there are approximately 400 miles of state maintained gravel roads in the Northern Highway District and that many of our old primary highways built in the 1930's are worn out and overburdened with traffic. Also, due to the rapid growth of many of our cities as a result of industrialization and other fac-

tors, highway facilities that were once adequate are now congested and out of date. There is much work to be done in these areas.

"I have worked untiringly to provide the roads needed and although the funds have been limited, we have paved roads in every section of the Northern Highway District. With the funds made available to us, it has not been possible to construct or re-construct all of the needed highways. If we are to improve and pave these much needed highways in a short period of time, it will be necessary that additional finances be made available. Under the existing laws we can only build a comparatively few miles on a year to year basis.

"Whenever there arises a highway problem that affects a community, I have never failed to answer an invitation to visit any group in their particular locality and talk over the matter with them.

"I want everyone to be given an opportunity to discuss openly and frankly the problems that concern them for it is my desire to serve all the people.

"We have not always been able to construct the road under discussion but we have certainly given an honest reason for not doing so.

"I was born and reared in Tishomingo County, graduated from Mississippi State University and served for four years in the Army and Navy during World War II. I am a member of the American Legion, 40 and 8, a Baptist and member of many other civic and fraternal organizations.

"With your continued co-operation, interest, understanding and support, further highway progress can be made. Your continued support and influence would be appreciated. This is the record. The record speaks the truth—Roy C. Adams."

Practical Nurses School

Established At
Burnsville; Classes
To Begin In Sept.

Announcement is made today of a new program which will soon be available at Burnsville High School for the training of License Practical Nurses. The school has been developed for women of this area desiring a profession and is an excellent opportunity to enter the nursing field.

Classes are expected to begin in September. Those who wish to enroll should report to the school on Friday, July 26, at 9:00 a.m. Processing of the applications will be under the direction of the Mississippi State Employment Service.

To qualify for enrollment, an applicant must have a 10th grade education or make an equivalent score on a mental ability G.E.D. test, must be 18 years to 55 years of age, must be a citizen of the United States, and must be physically and emotionally fit.

The new training program was established through the sponsorship of the Yellow Creek Watershed Area Development Program and the Tennessee Valley Authority, along with the cooperative efforts of Burnsville High School, the County School System, State Vocational Education Department, Tishomingo County Hospital and Corinth Community Hospital.

According to a spokesman for the new program, this is the first school of this type established in Mississippi in that it brings the school to the students, thus avoiding a large percentage of expense to the student.

Two Elderly County Men Fatally Injured Tuesday

Residents Of 5th District Killed
Near Jasper, Ala., On Hwy 78

Two elderly residents of the Fifth District were fatally injured Tuesday afternoon when the pickup truck in which they were riding collided with an ice cream truck.

Killed instantly was Rube Ginn, 76, of Belmont Route One. The other fatality was Jay Hale of Golden. Mr. Hale died about 7 o'clock Tuesday night, several hours after the wreck.

The tragedy occurred on highway 78 a few miles south of Jasper, Ala., east of the Warrior River. Mr. Hale, for a number of years has raised and dealt in vegetables and farm produce. He had been to Birmingham to buy a truck load of vegetables and was returning to the Belmont area when the wreck happened. They had pulled into a station for service and were re-entering the highway when the ice cream truck rammed into the Dodge pickup. Mr. Hale was driving his truck. He had invited Mr. Ginn to go with him on the trip.

Mr. Hale died in a Jasper, Alabama, hospital.

Funeral services for Mr. Ginn will be held at 2 o'clock this afternoon at the Patterson Chapel Methodist church.

Funeral services for Mr. Hale will be Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, also at Patterson Chapel. Deaton funeral home is in charge of arrangements for both services.

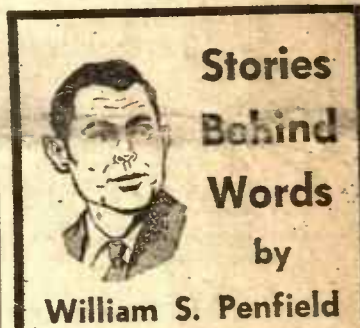

Sensing The News

The Danger From Drones
How much dead weight can our American society support? This is a basic question that every responsible citizen should ask himself when a new social service is proposed or when an additional make-work measure is adopted.

Since the beginning of the New Deal 30 years ago, a highly influential group of Americans have pushed a variety of projects and laws that amount to dead weight on our society. It has been supposed by liberal thinkers and politicians that society should support a large group of drones. This dependent population is growing all the time. The New Frontier wants to expand social services to the dependents, sending slum youths into a national service corps and providing all manner of medicare to the aged

who have not set aside something for a rainy day.

Eugene Davidson, editor of Modern Age, has discussed this dead weight issue in an able article entitled, "The New Poor and the Old Baloney." He warned that we see in this country "constantly escalating demands: for a five and four-hour day, for a built-in system of resetting newspaper advertisements that are already in type—a practice appropriately called bogus—for the extra stage hands who do no work, for the railroad telegraphers who take no messages."

Those who want to work hard and have no work are prevented from taking any job. They are prevented from doing so by the laws and customs created by the social uplift advocates. A man in a documentary film on the unemployed in West Virginia said, for example, that he would take any kind of work, from house painting to ditch digging. "But," said Mr. Davidson, "he won't if the unions can help it; he would undercut the market for the overtime construction workers and for the house painters who with their narrow brush and artificial scales help keep houses unpainted."

Year by year, the dead weight increases on our society. Year by year, the demands from dependents become more insupportable. Take the metropolitan newspapers, for instance. The outrageous demands of strikers on newspapers have the effect of abolishing employment instead of bettering working conditions. By unreasonable requests, they force employers to go out of business. Many a newspaper has failed in the United States because of the skyrocketing demands of labor unions. So it is with other kinds of industry.

There are many aspects to this disturbing situation. Artificial wage requirements hold down private construction below the level of what it should be. Meanwhile, the liberals increase their demands for more public housing for the new poor. The middle class groans under heavy taxation, while the slum dwellers have new palaces constructed for them. And these new apartments become expensive citadels of crime and idleness.

The facts about the dead weight on our society are rarely admitted. They are hidden behind a smokescreen of soft words or crafty management of the news. Only rarely do hard facts get a public airing. One instance came on April 24 when an official of the Illinois Public Aid Commission said: "Let's face it. Seventy-five per cent of the people on relief are Negroes." How hard it is to get such facts before the public, to get officials to admit the nature of dependence in our society!

Every good society aims to be humanitarian in the best

sense, to do good for people who are in need. But today's social welfare philosophy is all wrong because it is hurting the people it is supposed to help. The dependents in our country aren't being aided in learning or relearning self-reliance. Instead, they are being taught to live comfortably as drones on the public expense. The Aid to Dependent Children scheme, for example, becomes a way of life for immoral mothers who profit from illegitimacy.

This kind of social uplift can't make our country strong; it can only ruin it. The strength of a society depends on those who are hard working and self-reliant. They are the salt of the earth. If government does not give primary consideration to their needs, instead of the wants and desires of the drones, then health will depart from the body politic. This is the truth that America needs to discover. A petted class of dependents is a weight on society that can, in time, destroy that society.

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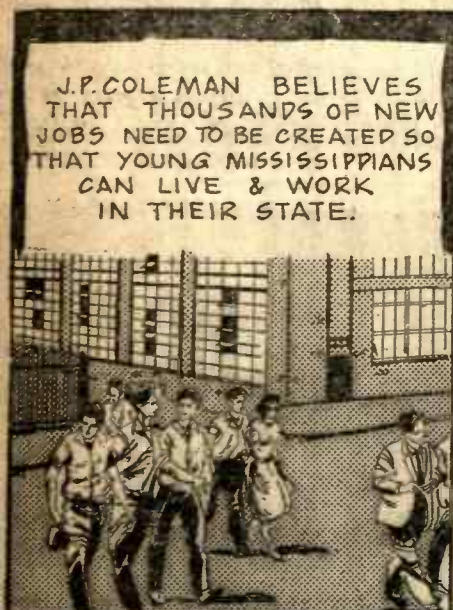
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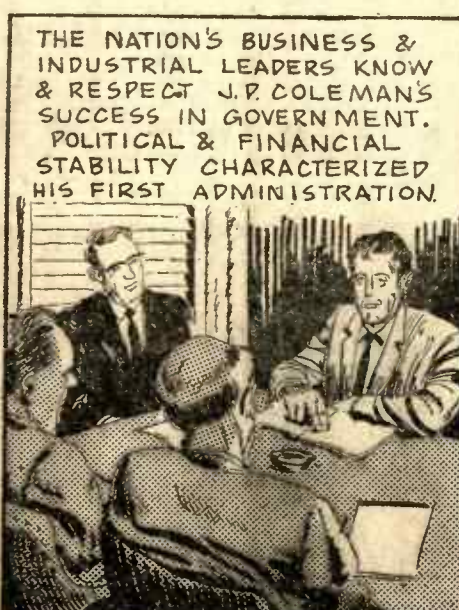
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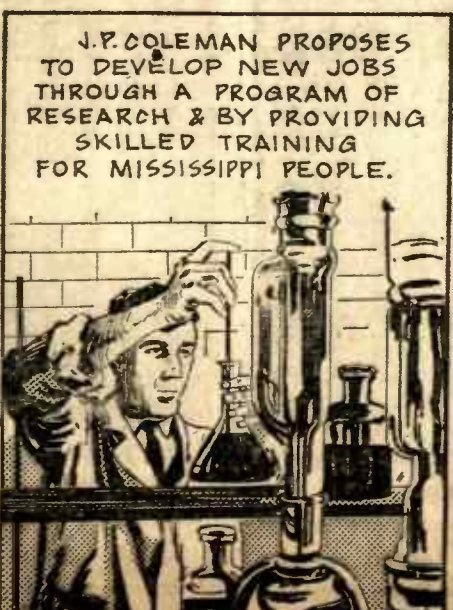

Permanent Vision Damage Can Be Caused By Solar Eclipse July 20

The solar eclipse on Saturday, July 20, can mean permanent vision damage for unsuspecting Mississippians who try to look at the darkened sun.

There is no safe way to look directly into the eclipse without risking incurable burns of the eye from invisible infrared rays of the sun, according to a joint warning issued by the State Board of Health and the Mississippi Society for the Prevention of Blindness.

Sunglasses, colored glass smudged with smoke, photographic film, or welders' goggles do not offer adequate protection for observing the eclipse, today's warning said. Only by indirect methods, such as on television or with home-made projection devices, can this phenomenon be watched without endangering the eyes.

The threat of vision damage is magnified during an eclipse because it can occur without the victim knowing it. Although the dazzling brilliance of the sun is reduced during the eclipse, the invisible infra-red rays are still emitted.

The sunglasses or film will not screen these rays, and when they reach the retina of

the eye, an irreparable burn results, in much the same way a magnifying glass is used to burn a hole in a piece of paper by a youngster.

When the burn is serious enough to scar that small portion of the retina where the rays were focused, no treatment can cure it. The scar then causes a defect of vision which results in a blank spot on whatever the eye is viewing or reading.

Special caution should be taken with children, who are particularly susceptible to eclipse burns, and by photographers who may be risking eye damage if their camera equipment does not afford proper protection in the viewing and focusing systems.

A simple projector for observing the eclipse can be made with two pieces of white cardboard. Punch a pinhole in one cardboard and hold it several feet above the second. The pinhole serves as a tiny lens to focus the image of the eclipse onto the surface of the second cardboard. This image may be watched without danger to the eyes. However, danger can come from looking at the sun through the pinhole itself, or using a mirror to reflect the image; a mirror also reflects the harmful rays of the sun.

The Mississippi Forestry is designated as the enforcing agency for this law and employees of the Commission are authorized to enter upon any and all forest lands to inspect the area for compliance with the law.

The Forest Harvesting Act does not apply to the clearing of and for cultivation or pasture or other purposes such as building sites.

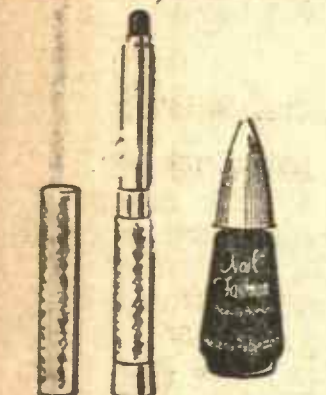

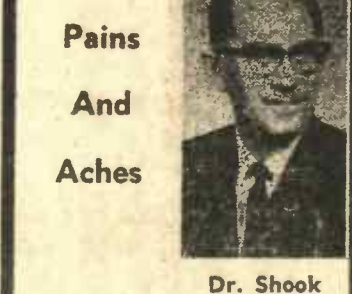

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING A FRANCHISE TO E. E. STUART, DOING BUSINESS AS IUKA TV CABLE COMPANY TO OPERATE, CONSTRUCT, AND MAINTAIN TELEVISION COAXIAL CABLES UPON, ALONG, THROUGH, OVER AND UNDER STREETS, ALLEYS, BRIDGES AND PUBLIC PLACES OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI.

Section 1. BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi, that E. E. Stuart, doing business as Iuka TV Cable Company, his successors and assigns be and the same is hereby granted the right, privileges and authority to construct, operate and maintain lines of television coaxial cable including poles, wires and fixtures where necessary upon, along, through, over and under the streets, alleys, bridges and public places of Iuka, Mississippi.

Section 2. The poles used for the said coaxial cable shall be those erected and maintained by Tishomingo County Electric Power Association and the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company; when and where practical, providing satisfactory rental agreements can be entered into with the said Tishomingo County Electric Power Association and the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company. All streets and sidewalks that may be disturbed or damaged in the construction of said lines shall be promptly repaired by the said Iuka TV Cable Company, at its own expense and to the satisfaction of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Iuka, Mississippi.

Section 3. All coaxial cable erected shall meet with the minimum standards of the City Code as may be provided at any time.

Section 4. Said company shall be subject to all ordinances now in force or that may be hereafter passed relative to the use of highways, streets, alleys, bridges and public places of said city.

Section 5. Said company shall hold the said Town of Iuka, Mississippi, safe and harmless from all damages or claims for damages arising by reason of the negligence in construction or maintenance or operation of said coaxial cable.

machinery could cut the accidental death toll tremendously. National Farm Safety Week, July 21-27, is a good time to get busy and practice safety. And remember safety is now a one week a year chore. It should be a full time job!

Tree Seedlings. It is time again to make applications to the Mississippi Forestry Commission for seedlings that you will plant next winter.

Each landowner can get 1,000 seedlings free, except for a transportation charge of 35 cents. Additional seedlings will cost \$4.50 per 1,000, plus the transportation charge of 35 cents per 1,000.

Seedlings to be available this year include the four common pine varieties, plus some 12 or 15 hardwood species — oaks, ash, gum, poplar, cottonwood, sycamore, cypress, cedar and catalpa.

Now is the time to figure your needs for seedlings and plan where you are going to set them. Place your application with the local county agent or the area forester.

Soil Testing. It is limiting time for the farmer and to know whether or not your soil needs lime and how much, a soil test will give the answer. But do not hurry off to the field to collect samples without supplies and an understanding of how to take a good sample.

The supplies include soil sample boxes, information sheets and mailing cartons. Get these from your local county agent, and at the same time get information from the agent on how to take a good sample.

Remember, the best way to find out if your soil needs lime and how much, is to take a good soil sample. The soils test will also indicate the kinds and amount of fertilizer you need for the area.

Farm Safety Week. July 21 through July 27 is National Farm Safety Week—one of the most important "special" weeks in any year.

The week is sponsored by the National Safety Council in cooperation with the Cooperative Extension Service in the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

This year's theme, "Inspection plus Correction equals Protection," is really meaningful. Did you know that drownings are the leading cause of accidental farm deaths in Mississippi? It is true! Drownings account for 26.7 per cent of all accidental farm deaths in the state, followed by machinery deaths which account for 25.3 per cent.

On Mississippi farms drown-
ings and firearms take the most
lives. But in the home, falls are
at the top of the list of acci-
dent causes.

Here is a finding of a recent
Pennsylvania Health Depart-
ment study: Men and women
between the ages of 25 and 44
are as likely to fall downstairs
as a baby or older person. The
common belief is that falls hap-
pen only to children under five
and persons over 65. Those un-
der 5 and over 65 are likely to
be killed by a fall, whereas the
middle-aged are injured.

Ladies, the report showed too
that more females than males
(except under 5) were treated
in hospitals for fall injuries. So
be careful this week and all
weeks.

Blanching Vegetables
Blanching home frozen veg-
etables is a must to preserve
the top quality in all vegetables

universities. Follow the correct
blanching time for various veg-

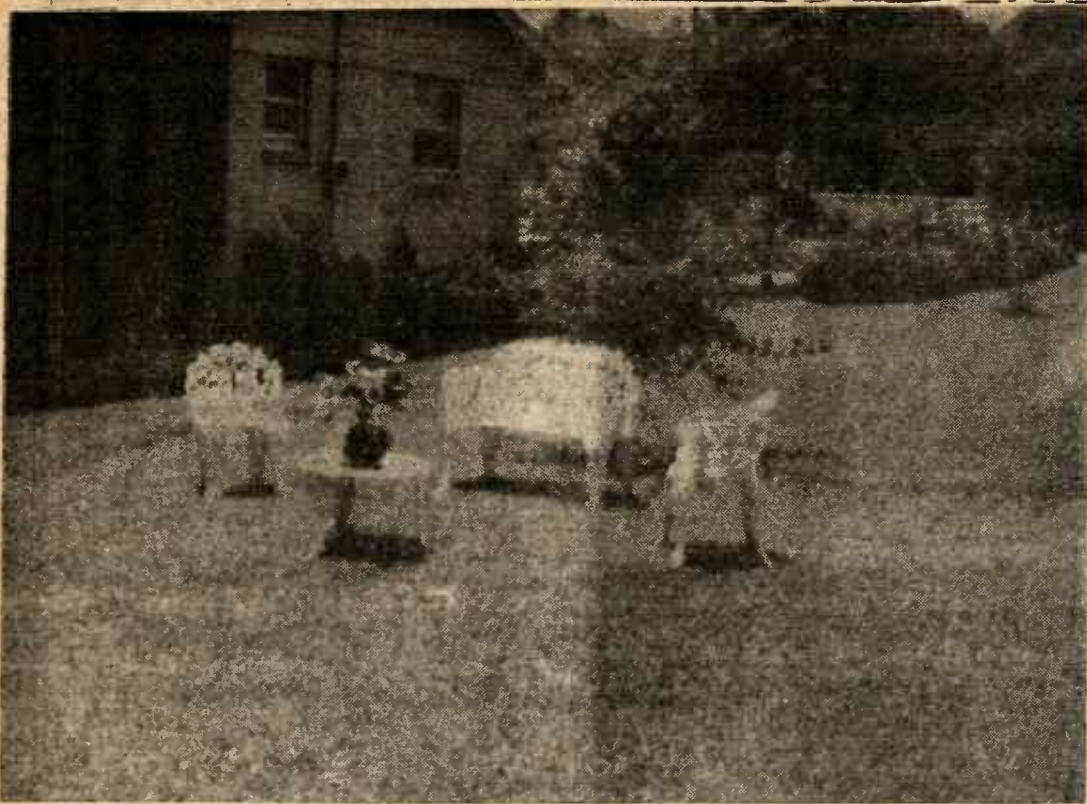
