KOPPERS CO. DEEDS LAND TO IUKA

C. Of C. Negotiates
Transaction That Costs
Only \$1.00 For 22½-A.

DEED DELIVERED TUESDAY

Announcement is made today that the Koppers Company has deeded to the City of Iuka twenty-two and one-half acres of land to be added to the Iuka Chamber of Commerce Industrial Park.

Deed to the tract of land was delivered to Dr. Kelly Segars Tuesday afternoon by Gerald Reynolds of Memphis. Mr. Reynolds is Regional Forester for the Koppers Company.

Delivery of the deed Tuesday culminates several months of negotiations by Dr. Segars and P. O. Beard with officials of the Koppers Company.

The land is a gift to the city, the sum of only

\$1.00 being paid by the Chamber of Commerce to the Koppers Company to make the transaction legal and binding. Addition of this twenty-two and one-half acres of land to the 23 acre tract bought several months ago by the Chamber of Commerce makes a total of forty-five and one-half acres of land in the Chamber of Commerce Industrial Park.

The property lies on the north side of the Southern Railroad west of the Tishomingo County Fair Grounds and extends along the railroad for more than 2,000 feet. Ingress and egress streets will be made available so that any area of the tract will be easily accessible. Valuation of the total acreage has been set in the thousands of dollars.

With the deeding of this land to the City of Iuka through the Chamber of Commerce, the Koppers Company relinquishes the last of its real estate holdings in Tishomingo County. Several years ago the company sold huge tracts of land to what is now the Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company. The Koppers company for many years has owned large tracts of land, most of it being in forests. The Company, over the years, has employed hundreds of Tishomingo countians in the process of logging and sawmilling the timber from its land. Until a few years ago, a number of men were employed by the Koppers Company in the Iuka area.

Citizens of Iuka and especially the Iuka Chamber of Commerce are due the Koppers Company a vote of sincere thanks for the valuable contribution that company has made. This addition of acreage to the Iuka Chamber of Commerce Industrial Park will enhance the attractiveness of Iuka to concerns seeking room for larger manufacturing plants.

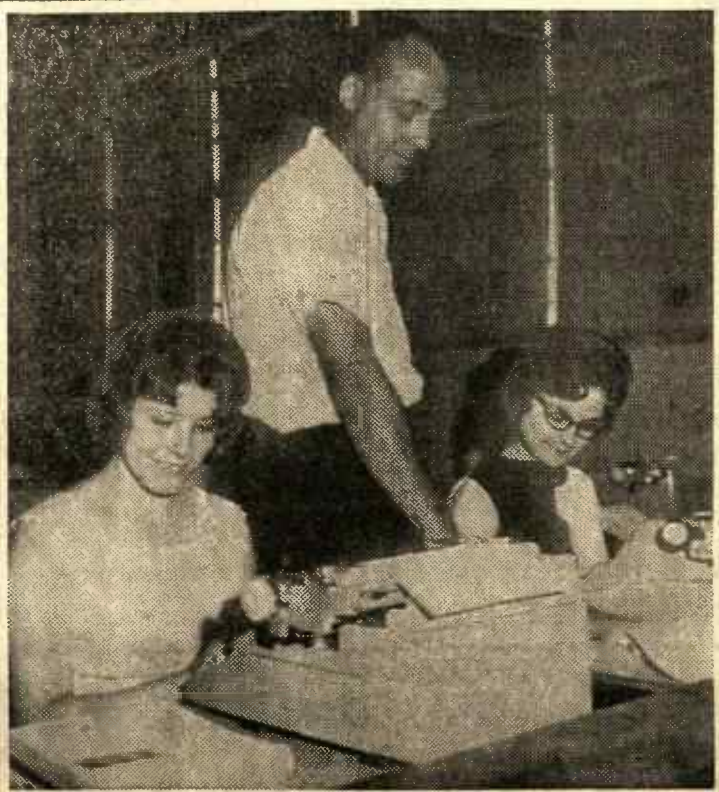

A Summary of Current Events Contributing to the Economic Development of Mississippi

By the MISSISSIPPI AGRICULTURAL & INDUSTRIAL BOARD

A & I Board Announces Mid-Year Totals

Figures compiled by the Agricultural and Industrial Board, based upon estimates made by local sources, lists 32 new industries and 20 expansions of existing industries at mid-year. New industries represent an estimated capital investment of \$15,128,000 and will provide an estimated 4,123 new industrial jobs when they are all in full production. The 20 expansions will provide more than 1,011 new industrial jobs when completed and represent an estimated capital investment of \$16,865,000, including the \$6½ million International Paper

Company expansion at Natchez and a \$3 million expansion of International Paper Company at Moss Point.

MFC To Build A NEW Egg Unit At Collins

Mississippi Federated Cooperatives will build an egg grading plant at Collins which will have a capacity to grade and pack 2,600,000 eggs a week. MFC already has a poultry processing plant employing 330 and a hatchery employing ten at Collins. Employment of 60 at the egg grading plant will bring total employment to 400 at the poultry center. The egg grading plant calls for a \$250,000 BAWI bond issue. Construction

will begin in September and is scheduled for completion early in December.

Mississippi Ranks High In Personal Income Gain

Personal income in Mississippi now stands at \$244,700,000—an increase of 8.6 per cent over a year ago, according to the June 29 issue of Business Week magazine, citing latest available figures as of April. Only four states showed a larger growth rate. Mississippi's increase compared to 4.4 per cent for the country as a whole.

Brick, Tile Company To Expand

The Tri-State Brick and Tile Company of Jackson has announced a \$500,000 expansion of its plant facilities. R. D. Robinson, president, said 25 additional employees will go on the company payroll. The company now employs 75. The addition to the plant will increase daily brick production to 160,000. Plans call for the addition of a new calcine furnace, a new brick tunnel kiln, a new machine room, new driers and additional office space. The company, which began operations in April, 1946, distributes bricks in Mississippi, Alabama, Tennessee, Kentucky, Arkansas and Louisiana.

Vicksburg Firm Gets \$5 Million Contract

A contract "in excess of \$5 million" for a mobile offshore

drilling platform for use in water depths up to 250 feet has been awarded to LeTourneau Offshore, Inc., Vicksburg. The company is a subsidiary of R. G. LeTourneau of Longview, Texas. The announcement was made by G. H. Bush, president of Zapata Offshore Company, purchasers of the drilling platform, and by R. L. LeTourneau, vice president of R. G. LeTourneau, Inc. The unit will be assembled at Vicksburg.

Coast Ports Show Tonnage Gains In 1962

Pascagoula, Gulfport and Biloxi all made appreciable gains in tonnage in 1962, according to official preliminary figures released by the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers. Pascagoula's port handled 2,350,080 tons in 1962 compared to 885,486 tons in 1961—a 165 per cent increase. Principal commodities handled at the port were: corn, 606,578 tons; soy beans, 326,597 tons; wheat, 253,715 tons; grain sorghums, 212,886 tons; phosphate rock, 179,612 tons; inedible animal products, 144,920 tons; and pulpwood, 134,446 tons. Foreign imports were 37,711 tons and foreign exports 1,171,603. Tonnage at Gulfport amounted to 321,834 tons in 1962 compared to 306,994 tons in 1961—a five per cent increase. Fertilizer materials accounted for a large proportion of the Gulfport commerce with 151,020 tons, and fresh bananas added 42,797 tons. At Biloxi, 1962 port tonnage was 162,409 tons—a 13 per cent increase over 1961. Pulpwood, fish and fish products accounted for the bulk of Biloxi's tonnage.

Amory Approves BAWI Bond Issue

Amory voters approved the city's first BAWI bond election, 1,210 to 14, on a \$400,000 bond issue to help finance the construction of a plant for Cramco, Inc. The plant will manufacture die-cast and plated zinc items for plumbing and commercial refrigeration usage. In addition to the BAWI bonds, \$500,000 in industrial revenue bonds will be used for purchase of machinery and equipment for the plant. The plant will employ approximately 150 when in full production.

Alabama Group Visits Corinth's Industrial Park

A group of ten Tuscaloosa, Alabama, businessmen flew into Corinth this month to view the progressive Industrial Park created there. Tuscaloosa, a city of about 100,000, is now planning a similar project. Corinth has received much publicity for the construction of its fine industrial park facilities and the industrialization of its area.

Construction Work Underway On General Cable Corp. Plant

Clearing work has begun for construction of the new million-dollar plant of General Cable Corporation near Brandon. The plant should be completed in early Fall. The plant will employ approximately 100 in the manufacture of "Chore Girl" and "Golden Fleece" kitchen scouring pads. The plant construction will be partially financed from a BAWI bond issue.

Civil Defense

Your family can survive fall-out from a nuclear attack if you have made a family survival plan and carried it out.

Farmers, homemakers, and businessmen set goals, then make plans about how these goals can be carried out. The goal in a possible nuclear attack is to survive! Your family survival plan will help make this goal a reality.

You are probably paying insurance premiums for fire, windstorm, accident, and possibly hospitalization. You hope that you never collect!

Survival insurance is no different. You plan now so that you will have a shelter from radiation, an emergency supply of food, water and feed; a battery radio; knowledge of what to do if an attack does come.

The plans you make now could mean the survival of your

family as well as your country. Such planning will not only prepare you for a nuclear attack, but will be helpful in case of storm or other emergency. Your fallout shelter can also be a storm shelter.

Now is a mighty good time to check upon your survival insurance.

Cotton Quality

The jobs to make quality cotton start with land preparation and must continue through ginning!

Land preparation, fertilization and early season weed control play an important part. But these have already been attended to for this season.

But you can still protect the quality. Late season weed control, cleaning up turn rows, late season insect control and bottom defoliation all contribute to make quality cotton.

The late season weed control may mean some hard work in spot weeding. Turn-row clean-up is best with a rotary clipper or with chemicals. A disk will do the job but may create a dust, or mud bed.

The late season insect control may mean poisoning two or three times more than in the past. Poisoning should continue up until the last boll you want to save is safe from insect damage.

Rank cotton will mean that you will want to think about some bottom defoliation and bottom harvesting to save the

early crops from boll rot.

Hay Saving

Keep close watch on your hay meadows and don't let the grass get too far in to maturity before cutting it.

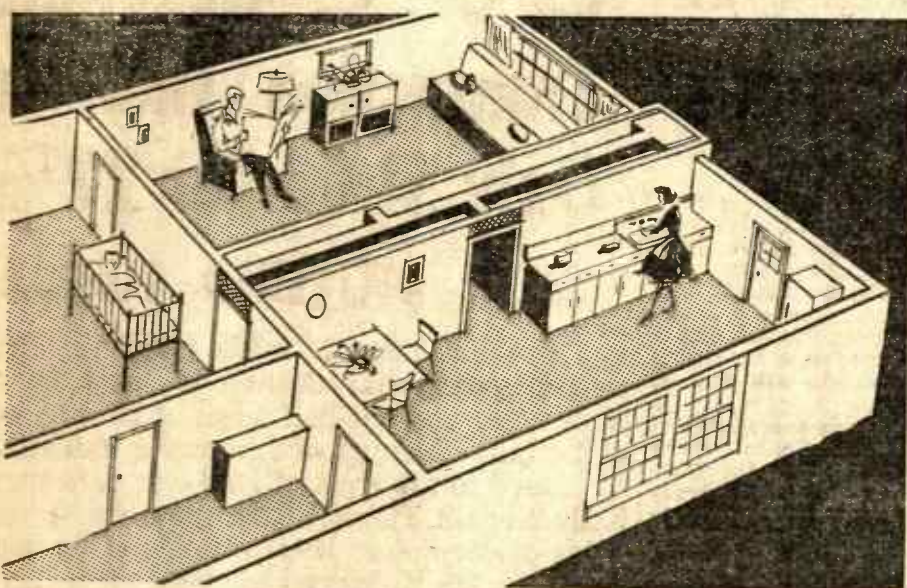
All grasses, and especially Johnsongrass and Sudan and millet should be cut when the first seed heads appear.

Where possible, run the freshly cut hay through a hay conditioner to shorten curing time and preserve hay quality.

food, try to find ways of perking up appetites when it's hot. Use a lot of crisp, cold foods, but get at least one hot food in each meal. Make foods colorful and serve a variety of textures and flavors. Vary temperatures, method of preparation, food shapes and sizes.

You can help appetites by pepping up regular dining room meals with a "new look" in table settings.

Mrs. Homemaker, since you want to spend less time in the kitchen cooking family meals in the summertime, be sure you plan your menus to make the most of shortcuts in preparing meals. Use some prepared foods and mixes. Use your freezer to advantage, by cooking several meals at once and freeze.

Plan outdoor meals to involve the whole family in cooking and serving food or serve meals outside on trays in a cool spot. Take advantage of fresh fruits and vegetables that are in season as you make your summer menus. Serve many uncooked — fresh fruit and raw vegetables.

Better Use Of Storage
Does it seem that you never have enough space to store things in your kitchen? Let's look at ways you might better use the storage areas you have.

First, how about doing some weeding out and sorting of items. Discard, or store in some other place, seldom-used and duplicate items. We all have a tendency to accumulate things, and regular sorting will help release space for more important supplies.

Store the items you use most often within easy reach. Make use first of storage space between eye and hip level as this is the easiest to reach. Store heavy and awkward things at waist level or below.

Stack like articles only. For example, stack plates the same size. Don't put small plates on larger ones or bowls on top of

pie pans or you'll have to shuffle the whole stack to get the one on the bottom. Place only like articles one behind the other.

Store at point of first use. Utensils and foods used together should be stored together rather than rattling around in several cabinets. It is logical to store the coffee pot near the sink where you will fill it with water. But the coffee, measuring spoons and measuring cup should be stored in this area

too. Plan for duplicate that are often used. For example, the range and also at ing center.

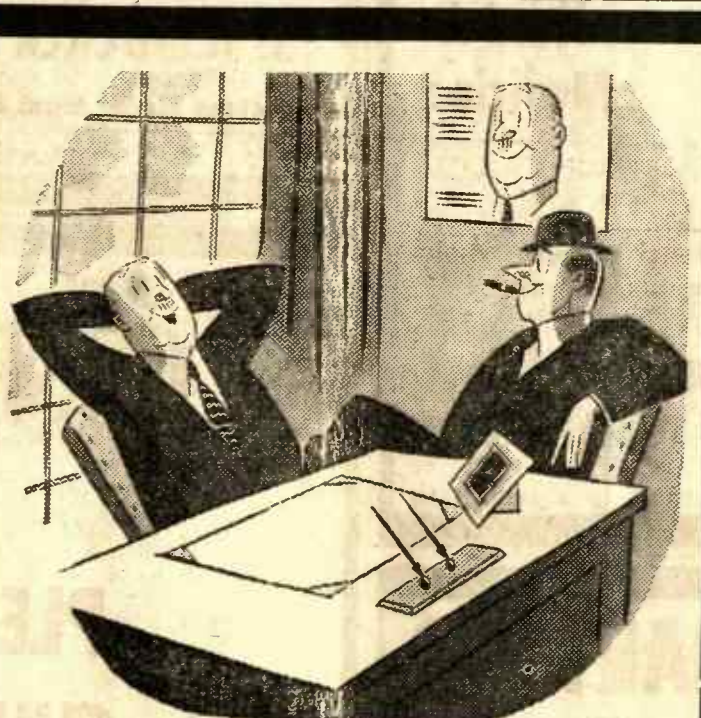

ing. The answer to that question is that it is being under-
mined from within. For de-
cades, the liberal intelligentsia
has scoffed at the idea that
there is an internal menace.
Even those who admit a com-
munist menace usually refuse
to recognize that there are per-
sons who may be accurately
characterized as para-commun-
ist. A para-communist is one
who is not a member of the
Communist Party and who is
not a conscious fellow-traveler

but who, nevertheless, pursues
aims parallel to the communis-
tine.
The para-communists have
our great country in a state of
turmoil this summer. They are
trying to turn a Savannah, Ga.,
and a Newark, N. J., for exam-
ple, into the equivalent of St.
Petersburg, Russia, in 1917.
They are organizing street dis-
orders that are nothing short
of revolutionary. In the Con-
gress and Executive Branch,
their allies are attempting to
destroy the right of private prop-
erty and its free use.

What is being done by the
para-communist is the fanning
of hatred and the spawning of
violence. What started out in
early summer as a movement
of so-called non-violence has
become a movement of maraud-
ers. Demonstrators have used
guns as well as placards. They
have not only held up insulting
signs and blocked passages to
stores, theaters and restaurants
but have used bodily force to
break their way into places
where they are unwelcome.

What difference, one may
ask, is there between the com-
munist riots in Italy in 1948
and 1949 and the riots staged in
Savannah and Cambridge, Md.?
The goal of both communist
and para-communist rioters is
intimidation of legally consti-
tuted authority and terrorization
of private citizens and peaceful
communities. There is no sig-
nificant difference between the
Hitler youth who threw bricks
at the windows of Jewish-owned
shops in the 1930s and the
CORE youth who rampage
through the business sections
of communities north and
south.

The leaders of the movement
of violence and intimidation
only refer to their power drive
as a "Negro revolution." Un-
doubtedly, they do not speak
for great numbers of respon-
sible, law-abiding Negro citizens
who are shocked at what a

power clique in their group is
doing and who are themselves
intimidated into silence.

But the country as a whole
cannot be silent or inactive in
the face of the para-communist
drive to turn this nation into
a land of chaos where street
mobs call the tune. This must
remain a land of law and order.
That is the first and chief na-
tional imperative. The Consti-
tution, after all, was written
and approved in order to pro-
mote "domestic tranquility."
The American people have a
right to domestic tranquility,
if it requires the incarceration
of every law-breaker, street
hoodlum, and conflict manager
in the land. The choice in A-
merica is anarchy or law. The
voice of the American people
must be raised to support the
sternest necessary measures to
halt the hoodlum revolution in
these United States.

Patriots — in any part of
this country — cannot sit ap-
athetically by and watch our
Constitution destroyed by mob
action. Congressman Wm. Jen-
nings Bryan Dorn (D-SC) stated
the situation quite well in his
testimony before the House
Judiciary Subcommittee on the
administration's civil rights bill:

"We are acting under duress.
We have been threatened and
we are acquiescing and bowing
to that threat. Lawlessness is
being rewarded. A new techni-
que in the United States is
emerging for the passage and
consideration of legislation.
When legislation is considered
by the Congress as a result of
highly organized, well-financed
and violent demonstrations,
then we are on the road to an-
archy. Law and order can col-
lapse. The citizen will no long-
er be protected in his property
rights. The law of the jungle
will prevail."

previously studied your claim

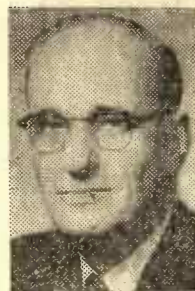
and enclose a statement from

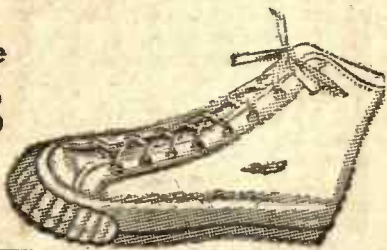
