Automobile Accident Claims Life

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at Snowdown Methodist Church for Mrs. Milton Carmack of Memphis, the former Miss Nella Dean Yarbrough of Iuka. Bro. Bobby Burress and Bro. Jodie Morris officiated.

Mrs. Carmack, age 26, was one of two wreck victims who lost their lives early Sunday morning in a two-car, head-on collision occurring in the Army Depot area in Memphis. Mrs. Carmack, traveling East on Dwight, was killed when her car was hit by a automobile traveling West, driven by Elmer Mack Jolly of Memphis. Mr. Jolly died later at Methodist Hospital. Witnesses estimated Mr. Jolly was traveling at more than 75 miles an hour when his car crossed over the center line and hit the car driven by Mrs. Carmack. The impact of the wreck knocked her auto backward 24 feet. Mr. Jolly's car left 71 feet of skid marks before the wreck, rammed into the side of a nearby house.

Mrs. Carmack, a native of Iuka, moved to Memphis with her husband in 1960. She had been employed as a waitress at Coletta's Italian Restaurant for the past three weeks. She was graduated from Iuka High School.

Interment was in the Snowdown Church cemetery under the direction of Cuthall Funeral Home.

POLSTERS PREDICT CLOSE VOTE IN MISSISSIPPI GOVERNOR'S RACE

A close primary election has been predicted by political prognosticators in Tuesday's gubernatorial race. Not one of the three leading contenders is expected to gain a majority of votes in statewide balloting which will throw the governor's race into a second primary campaign between the two highest men.

The three leading candidates for Governor, in the chronological order of their announcement for the office, are, Charles L. Sullivan, 38, an attorney and formerly district prosecuting attorney of Clarksdale;

J. P. Coleman, 49, former Governor, State Attorney General, Judge, and representative from Choctaw county;

Paul B. Johnson, 47, currently Lieutenant-Governor and a fourth-time candidate for the office of governor;

And a fourth candidate is Robert Mason, a retired welder who says he is running because he enjoys making political speeches.

Some of the topics used on the stump by the gubernatorial candidates bear different classifications by the different candidates. Johnson and Sullivan have labeled Coleman a "Kennedy man" and have repeatedly attacked him for his 1960 support of the presidential can-

Tuesday Will Be First Primary Election Day

Record Vote Expected In County;
Most All Offices To Be Filled

Tuesday, August 6, will be First Primary Election Day all over Mississippi, and Tishomingo County, along with the rest of the State, will go to the polls to name candidates and nominees for various district, county and state offices ranging all the way from district bailiff (constable) up to governor of the state. The county has a total of 6,170 qualified voters this year.

In county politics, only two offices have a single candidate each. They are for County Prosecuting Attorney: Barry Finch.

Barry has no opponent. Also for County Surveyor: L. S. Honeycutt. Mr. Honeycutt does not have an opponent. Only office without a candidate at this time is County Coroner. All other offices have two or more candidates looking for the job.

Most political observers state that this year's county elections have been comparatively quiet. However, larger crowds have been in attendance at most of the community political speaking. Only three speaking dates remain before the First Primary. They are, tonight at Tishomingo, Friday, all day, at Belmont, and Monday, all day, at Mineral Springs park in Iuka.

As is the usual trend in campaigning, all candidates offer experience (when possible), honesty, integrity, etc. in the performance of their jobs, if elected.

County offices in which Second Primary elections are probable are sheriff which at present has four candidates; State Senator that has three candidates; county representative with 3 candidates; Circuit Clerk with 3; and Tax Assessor with 3.

The offices of Chancery Clerk and Superintendent of Education each seeking those jobs. Therefore a plurality in each office should be obtained in the First Primary. Due to an act passed in the regular session of the Legislature last spring, voters in the First District will not be allowed to cast ballots in the County Superintendent of Education election. Only qualified voters in the Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Districts may vote for candidates for that office.

In the race for Supervisor in the five county districts, the Fifth district has the fewest contenders with only two seeking the job. In the First and Second Districts, 4 candidates are seeking the job in each district, and in the Third and Fourth districts a total of six candidates in each district are seeking election. A possibility of a Second Primary in each of the first four districts is likely. However, the Supervisor's job should be settled in the First Primary for the Fifth District.

In the office for District Justice of the Peace, the First District has drawn the most candidates with a total of four. Three are in the race for Justice of the Peace in the Second and Third Districts, and two are in the race in each of the Fourth and Fifth districts.

The job of bailiff (constable) in the districts has practically gone begging with only three of the districts having two candidates each for that job. In the Fourth and Fifth Districts, no candidates have offered for bailiff.

A list of candidates, as they have announced for office, will be found in the Political Announcements column elsewhere in this issue of your paper.

Voters are reminded that polls will open at all precincts at 7:00 A.M., and will close at 6:00 P.M.

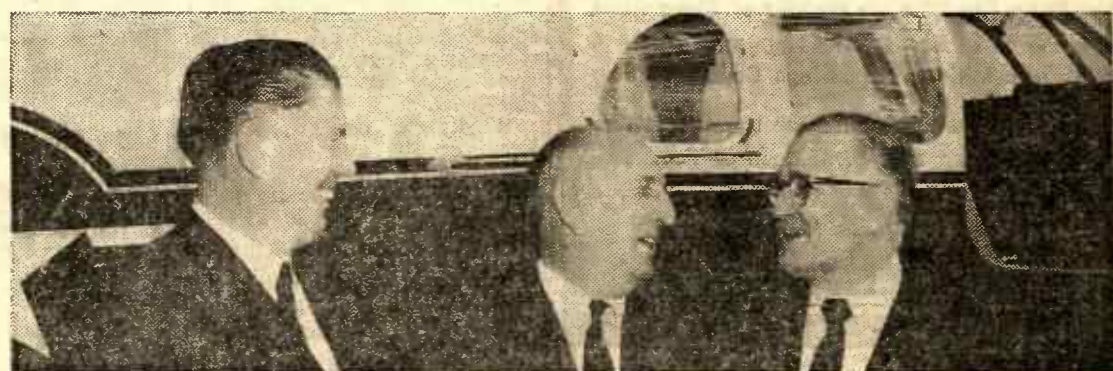

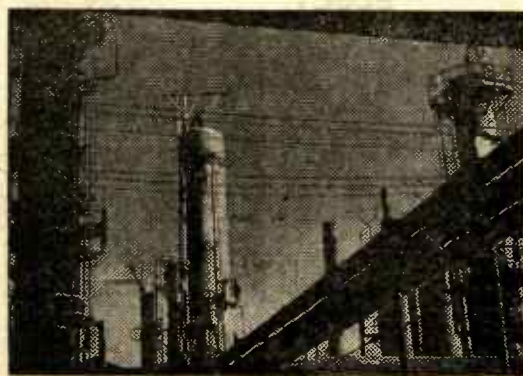

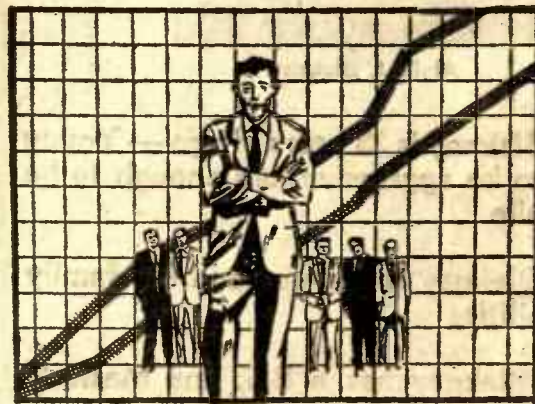

HOME AGENT NOTES

Tishomingo County Home Demonstration Agent
Ten Commandments of Weight Control were recently proposed by two Vanderbilt University doctors:
1. Retain the basic foods which supply the necessary proteins and vitamins.
2. Eliminate unnecessary fats and sweets.
3. Use judgement in preparing foods. For example, use mushroom (virtually no calories) to decorate meat; strawberries or cantaloupe for attractive desserts.
4. Don't skip meals. Overhunger is followed by overeating.
5. Slice foods thinly. An oz. of sliced beef looks and tastes like much more than a one-slice ounce.
6. Eat slowly.

7. Taste your foods as you eat it. The results are more satisfying.
8. Use a smaller-than average plate. Psychologically, the meal looks larger.
9. Include food of high satiety value.
10. Dieting may be forever. As you grow older, caloric demands decrease. Re-educate your eating habits.
August Foods
The August plentiful foods list includes watermelons, canned tuna, fresh summer vegetables, peanut butter and cooking and salad oils. Be on the lookout for supplies of vegetables for fresh use, canning and freezing. Some favorites are field peas, okra, pepper, butterbeans, corn, squash, cucumbers and tomatoes.
Marinated Tomato Slices
Slice firm tomatoes about 1/2 inch thick and arrange in a shallow dish that has a tight-fitting cover. Drizzle tomatoes with french dressing. Sprinkle with chopped parsley, cover the container and refrigerate about an hour.
Serve as a salad or a roast beef entree garnish.

Grab Bars in Bath
For safety every bathroom should have grab bars placed in strategic locations around the bathtub and shower stall. Acting as an extra measure of security, grab bars should be secured to the studs of the back and side walls of the tub or shower.

Mississippi Residents May Obtain Proof Of Age From Census Bureau

Last year, more than 13,000 residents of Mississippi turned to the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, for help in proving where and when they were born, the Bureau reported today. They needed proof of age to collect social security and other retirement

benefits. They needed it to obtain passports. They needed it to qualify for jobs carrying certain age or citizenship requirements. They needed it for some forms of insurance.

These persons who requested assistance from the Census Bureau last year were among an

estimated 20 million United States residents who are without proof of age or birthplace. The historical records of the Census Bureau provide the only acceptable source of this information for many of these people. Since its beginning in 1790, the U. S. Census has recorded identifying data for almost 350 million persons, many of them listed several times in separate censuses. The Bureau has provided copies of these records to about three and one-half million people, as legal proof of

age, place of birth, citizenship, or kinship.

Persons seeking such a record for social security purposes should go to the local Social Security Office, or, for other purposes, write to the Personal Census Service Branch, Bureau of the Census, Pittsburgh, Kansas, for an application form. A fee of \$3.00 is charged for a search of not more than two censuses for one person and for one copy of the information found. Additional copies cost \$1.00 each. An expedited search costs \$4.00. Expedited searches are usually completed within a few days while the routine \$3.00 search may take up to 30 days, depending upon the backlog of requests.

The personal information in the records of the 1900 and later Censuses is confidential by law and may be furnished only upon the written request of the person to whom it relates or, for a proper purpose, a legal representative such as a guardian or administrator of an estate. Information regarding a child who has not reached legal age may be obtained upon the written request of either parent.

Q—My 17 year old son has taken a part-time summer job at a super market. They told him they'd need his social security card so they could turn in social security on him. I thought you had to be 21 to come under social security.

A—There's no age limit up or down. The only time a child under 21 isn't covered by social security is when he works for a business owned by his father or mother.

Q—I've been working under social security. My daughter, who has three young children, has recently been divorced. She wants me to come live with her, keep house, and look after the children while she works. She's offered to pay me a salary for this. Would I get social security credit for the money she pays me?

A—No. Work for your daughter isn't covered by social security unless she owns a business and you work at the business.

Q—I'm 68 years, my wife is 65. I'd planned to retire in January 1964. I checked with the social security office and they said my wife and I would collect \$150 a month total for the two of us. My boss says he'd like to have me stay on a part-time basis. He wants me to work part time for \$150 a month. If I do that can we collect any of our social security?

A—Yes. You can still get all but \$350 of your social security for the year. In other words, you could still get \$1450 from social security for the year even though you earn \$1800 for the year.

Insect Notes

Spider mites are reported from many areas of the state. Poisoning should be done with the recommended insecticides at the recommended rates where needed. Some spot poisoning is underway. Spider mites spread between the major veins of the cotton

leaves and cause a general yellowing of the infested areas. They go through a life cycle in around a week. You may have as many as 10 generations in a single field.

Rains should suppress the spider mites, but keep watch for them and for a general spread. Bidrin has been added to the list of recommended insecticides, using .1 lb. per acre, making two applications a week apart.

Bollworms . . . small ones and eggs are being found again in numbers.

Watch for a build-up. Boll weevils are still low in numbers.

Sevin has been approved for use on beef cattle, horses, sheep, and hogs to control ticks, lice, fleas, and hornflies. It has not been approved for dairy

cattle.

Hay Quality

Most of the poor hay fed to livestock was good hay at one time.

There are a good many reasons why good hay crops when harvested make poor quality hay. Two big reasons are cutting too late and leaving it on the ground too long before it cures.

It sometimes looks like you are losing some hay when you cut it early, but the quality makes up for the lesser amount. All grasses should be cut when the first seedheads show up.

A hay conditioner to cut curving time for coarse hays goes a long way in preserving hay quality.

Coming Events

Plans are being made for a county-wide Beef Cattle Day to be held August 9. This event is being sponsored by the Tishomingo County Coordinating Council and the Tishomingo County Cattlemen's Association. Specialists from Mississippi State University will discuss all phases of beef cattle production. Pastures will also be discussed fully. A free lunch is in the planning also.

The field day will begin on the Oliver Edmondson Farm on the Mill Creek Road east of Iuka.

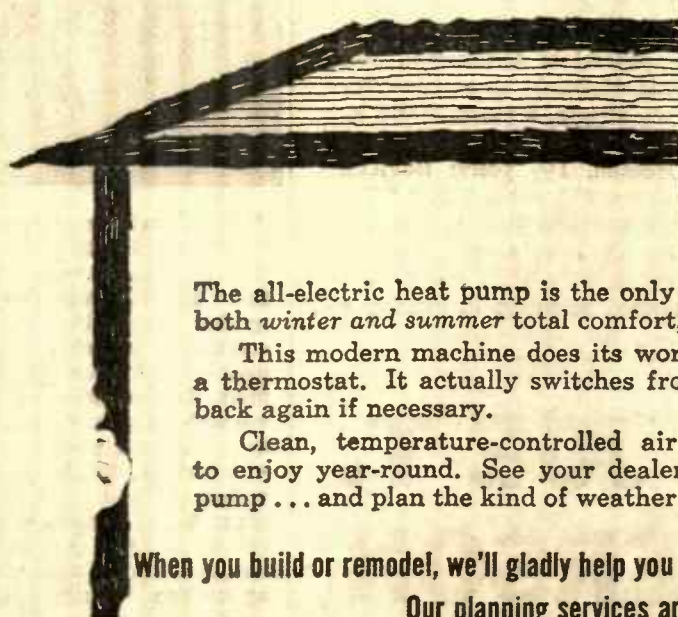

Present other than members of the wedding party were the Dr. Louie Cokers.

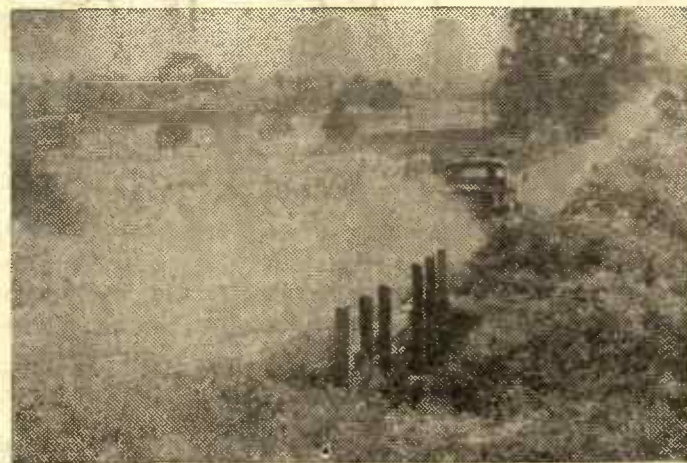

Woodland Weeding

Have you had a good look at your woods lately? If you have not, take the time needed to go over your woodland, acre by acre, and really see what you might do to improve it.

Some of the things you may find that you can do yourself to make your woodland better are:

1. Remove or deaden big topped trees of poor quality (wolf trees) that are shading young pines;

2. Remove or deaden poor quality hardwood trees that are overtopping and shading pines; and

3. In the bottoms, remove weed trees such as Blue Beech. Wolf trees shade a large area. Perhaps the greatest good, with the least work, can be done by deadening or removing the wolf trees first. After this has been done, the low grade hardwood that is overtopping young pines can be cut or deadened along with the landowner wants to do it. The same is true in removing Blue Beech from bottom

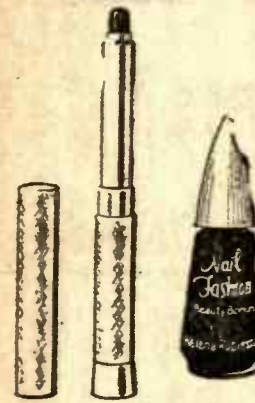

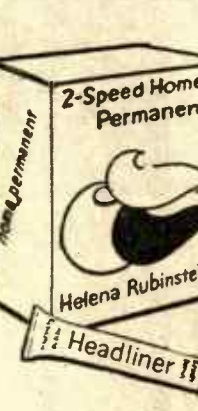
