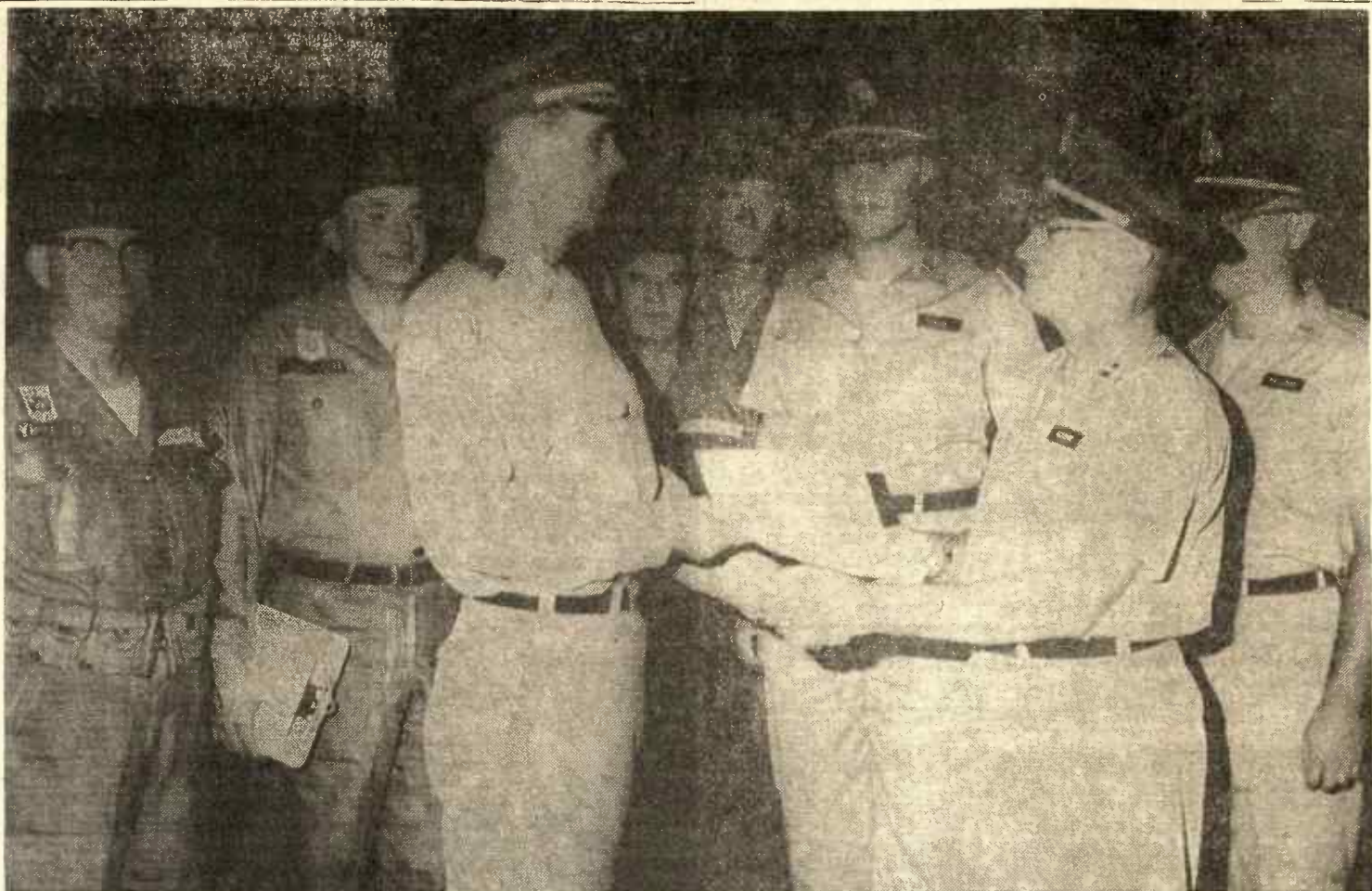

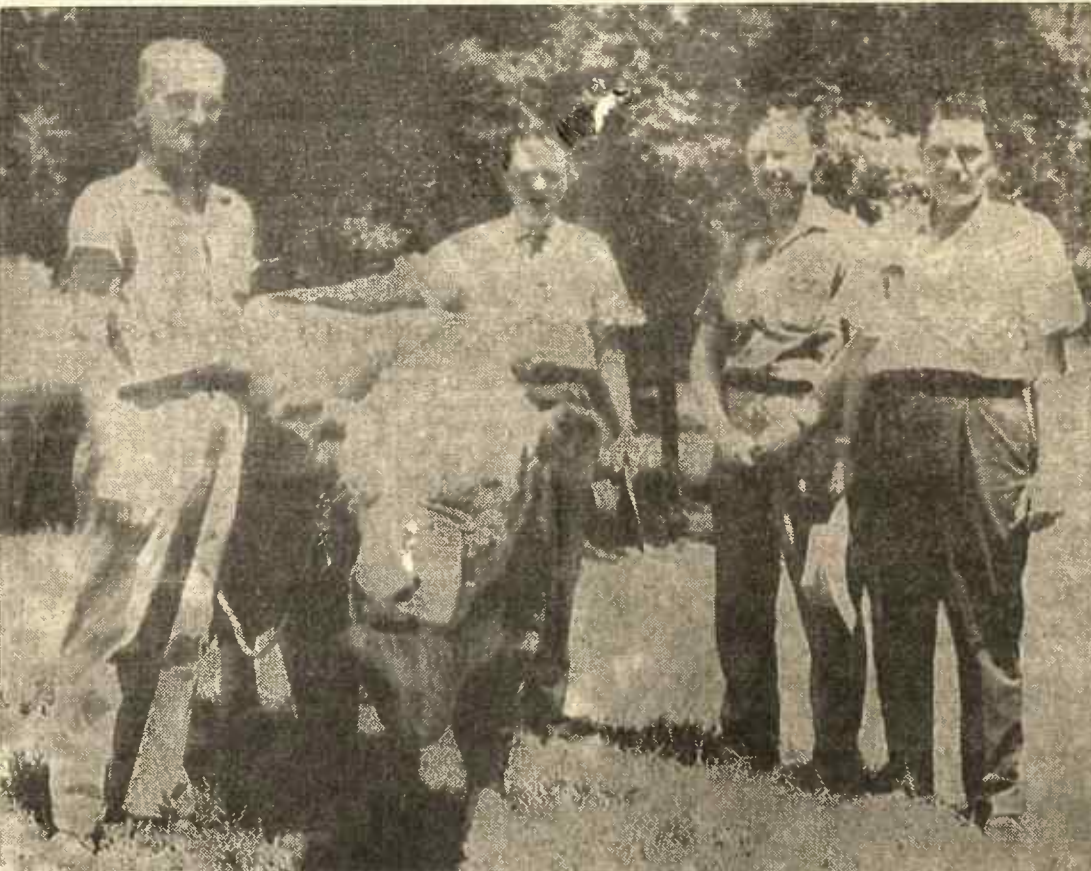

Local Judge Attends Nat'l. Conference

Judge N. S. Sweat, Jr. of the Circuit Court in 1st District of Miss. attended the annual meeting of the National Conference of State Trial Judges last week at the Conrad Hilton Hotel in Chicago. Approximately 200 judges from all over the country attended the sessions held from August 9 to August 12 in conjunction with the annual meeting of the American Bar Association.

Foremost among the action taken by the judges was the adoption of a resolution favoring establishment of a college for newly selected trial judges. Sessions would be held during the summer and the faculty would be made up of experienced judges.

Panel discussions were held on a variety of topics of interest to trial judges, including the collection and use of court statistics, insanity as a defense in criminal cases, and methods for the obtaining of able judges.

Farmers Will Receive Payment

Under 1963 Feed
Grain Program;
Requirements List

Approximately 615 Tishomingo County Farmers will receive around \$65,000.00 under the 1963 Feed Grain Payments beginning Tuesday, September 3. These payments are being computed now in your local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office in Iuka, according to E. N. Allen, Office Manager.

Before payment may be earned, the farmer must meet certain requirements. First, the designated acreage that is in native volunteer cover must be mowed or clipped during the months of June, July, or August; and second, the designated acreage can be seeded this fall to a cover crop, which will take the place of mowing or clipping. If the farmer indicates that a cover crop will be planted, payment will be withheld until it is sowed and compliance is checked.

"Each producer will need to certify that the above requirements have been met before payment is made," Mr. Allen said. Spot checks at this time indicate that a large number of farmers have not as yet met these requirements. "Approximately three weeks remain to get the job completed for the producer to be eligible to draw their money on September 3 or soon thereafter," Mr. Allen concluded.

Congressional Backers Hopeful For Tennessee-Tombigbee Funds

Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway supporters remain hopeful that Congress will appropriate \$225,000 this year for final planning on the already-authorized waterway.

Members of Congress from the four-state waterway area are pushing hard for the project although it was not included in the President's budget. Despite the prevailing budget-cutting mood, congressional backers are reported to be "somewhat optimistic" over chances for an appropriation in this session.

Congress is not expected to act on public works appropriations for about another month. In the continuing drive to obtain funds this year, two members of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority — administrator Glover Wilkins and member Louis Eckl of Florence, Ala. — called on a number of governmental officials, senators and congress-

men here last week.

"We definitely face a handicap in the fact that Tennessee-Tombigbee is not included in the current budget," Mr. Wilkins said. "With the continued solid support of our congressional delegations, I believe we can overcome this obstacle, however, and obtain planning funds in this session."

At the congressional hearings on June 19-20, a total of 25 senators and congressmen from Alabama, Kentucky, Mississippi and Tennessee appeared in behalf of the Tennessee-Tombigbee project. The four states are members of an interstate compact promoting construction of the waterway.

Eight senators and congressmen from the waterway area sit on the congressional committees now considering funds for the project. All have pledged their assistance.

These are Sen. Lister Hill and Congr. George W. Andrews of Alabama; Sen. John Sherman Cooper and Congr. William H. Natcher of Ky.; Sen. John Stennis and Congr. Jamie L. Whitten of Mississippi and Sen. Estes Kefauver and Congr. Joe L. Ewins of Tennessee.

Sought in this session are funds to complete planning on the waterways' first project—a lock and dam at Gainesville, Ala. The U. S. Corps of Engineers, which completed a five-year restudy of the waterway last year, has already given its final approval.

In the recent congressional hearings, Tennessee-Tombigbee had the support of Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace, Kentucky Gov. Bert T. Combs, Mississippi Gov. Ross R. Barnett and Tennessee Gov. Frank G. Clement. All sent personal representatives to the hearings.

A number of industrial witnesses were also heard, including representatives of American Potash and Chemical Co., Stauffer Chemical Co., and the Standard Oil Co. American Potash, which has plants at Hamilton, Miss., has just published its statement, entitled "Tennessee - Tombigbee Waterway — Spur to Increase Prosperity," in leaflet form.

Also joining in urging Congress to approve funds for Tennessee-Tombigbee were representatives of a number of other waterway organizations, including the Mississippi Valley Assn., Ohio Valley Improvement Assn. and The Tennessee River and Tributaries Assn.

Legumes In Bermuda Sod Are Important

Coastal Bermuda grass and Louisiana S-1 White Clover produced three times as much beef as coastal bermuda grass alone at the Delta Branch Experiment Station.

Louisiana S-1 white clover ap-

pears to be a near perfect companion for coastal bermuda grass. It is simple to establish on two-year-old sods. Sow 1 to 3 pounds of inoculated clover seed per acre in early October after the coastal has been cut or grazed closely.

Wild winter peas is also a good legume to plant with coastal bermuda, but requires more careful management than does Louisiana S-1 clover.

The things to remember is: cattle gain faster and profits are greater from a combination of grass and legumes. Too, legumes add nitrogen to the soil which increases the growth of the grass.

The per acre cost of sowing 1 to 3 pounds of Louisiana S-1 white clover on your well established coastal bermuda grass sod will be very little. The cost will be little; however the profit might be relatively big. It is certainly worth considering. If you are interested, it is time to think about where you can get Louisiana S-1 white clover seed.

Records Show Milk Production May Be Increased

About 10 years ago, 36 grade Jersey heifers were bought from dairymen in the area to establish a dairy herd at the Black Belt Branch Experiment Station near Brooksville. Thru good management and careful breeding this herd has reached a high level of production and is serving as a source of information for dairy producers throughout the area.

In 1957, the first year of record keeping, average production was 4,881 pounds per cow. In recent years, it has been increasing about 1,000 pounds per year. In 1962, average production per cow was 8,252 and current records indicate it will exceed 9,000 pounds this year. Annual gross income from the herd of 48 cows is computed at \$17,938, of which returns to labor and investment are placed at \$7,170.

Louie Walton, superintendent of the station, and Hershel Johnson, in charge of the dairy project, have consistently culled out the low producers and bred the remaining cows to bulls whose records indicate they will improve production. No replacements have been bought and most of the herd is now made up of descendants of 10 of the original heifers. Facilities and rations used at the Station are similar to those

found on many dairy farms. Corn, oats and cottonseed make up the simple ration used.

These concentrates, along with the forage, are all produced at the Station. Oat silage is put up in the spring for summer feeding and corn is ensiled for winter use. Temporary summer and winter grazing crops supplement the permanent pasture.

In management, Mr. Johnson emphasizes good growing own replacement records, culling money, and maintaining regularity of schedule which lets production go on.

try washing all the in-

water. Then go over them with
a cloth wrung from clear water.
Wipe dry.
If this doesn't get rid of the
odor, wash the freezer with
soda water, using 1 teaspoon
baking soda to each quart of
warm water. If the odor per-
sists, try vinegar, using about
1 cup to a gallon of warm wa-
ter, or household ammonia in
the same proportions.
Don't give up, if none of
these do the job. Try using
heat to bring out the odor part-

icles and get them into the air.
To do this, put something like
a toaster or electric heater in-
side the freezer to heat it up.
Then use an electric fan a
couple of hours to blow the air
out.
Activated charcoal put into
the warm freezer will absorb
odors released by the heat. Or
you may put a commercial,
wick-type tir freshener into the
warm freezer for the same pur-
pose.

If any traces of the smell re-
main, this is not likely to af-
fect food frozen and stored in
the freezer, if you are careful
to wrap the food securely.
When you take a package from
the freezer, remove the wrap-
pings as soon as possible and
dispose of them at once.
When the odor has been re-
moved or reduced to where it
is of no consequence, give the
freezer a final washing on the
inside with soda water. If you
leave activated charcoal in for
a while, it will pick up any
odor that is left.

Whenever you're going to be
away on vacation, you can help
avoid such an odor problem, by
arranging with a neighbor to
check on your freezer every
now and then, and especially if
there should be a power fail-
ure when you are gone. The
freezer itself might break down,
too.

These suggestions for com-
bating freezer odor problems
come from Dr. Earl McCracken,
physicist in household equip-
ment laboratories of the Bu-
reau of Human Nutrition and
Home Economics of the Depart-
ment of Agriculture.

**Keep Milk Cold, Clean, Cover-
ed.** Follow the rule of the 3 C's
for milk and all other dairy
foods: Keep them cold, keep
them clean and keep them cov-
ered.

Put your clean, closed car-
tons of fresh milk in the col-
dest part 40 degrees F. of the
refrigerator. When using milk,
protect its flavor. Keep the con-
tainer out of the refrigerator
just long enough to pour the
amount you plan to use. Then
use the poured milk immedi-
ately.

Quality Cotton
On a lot of that rank cotton,
looks like some bottom defolia-
tion will be in order this year.

Here are a few of the advan-
tages of such defoliation: It
can prevent or reduce loss of
the bottom crop to boll rot. It
speeds up opening of the bot-
tom bolls. It helps maintain the
quality of the bottom lint and
seed. It allows early harvesting
and simplifies complete defolia-
tion.

But there are a few cautions
to observe if planning to use
bottom defoliation: Time the
application very carefully. Make
sure that you have a good bot-
tom crop that could be lost to

boll rot. And make sure that
you do not apply the defoliant
to portions of the plant that
has immature bolls.

Bottom crop harvesting
should follow bottom defolia-
tion.

Relatively low rates of defol-
iation should be used for bot-
tom defoliation. Use a pint or
a pint and a half of organic
phosphate defoliants like Def-
or Folex per acre; on most
chlorate defoliants use a gallon
to the acre.

When using these or any other
agricultural chemical, be
sure to read and follow direc-
tions on the label.

Timber Tips

It is time now to make applica-
tion for seedling trees to be
planted next winter. Each land-
owner is entitled to receive
1,000 free seedlings for which
there is a transportation cost
of 35 cents a thousand.

Additional seedlings can be
obtained for \$4.50 per thous-
and, plus the 35 cents a thous-
and transportation cost.

Make your application for
the number and kind you will

need now to the local forester
or the local county agent.

It is also a good time now
to provide some adequate fire
protection for your timber area.
In areas especially where heavy
rainfall has occurred, grass is
likely to be plentiful this fall
and will present a real fire haz-
ard.

Provide fire lanes if needed;
disk firelanes between pastures
and roads and timber land;
make sure fire fighting equip-
ment is available. Make some
arrangements with your neigh-
bor to help fight fire if need-
ed.

Cotton Plants Now Defoliated At Bottom First

Defoliating the bottom of the
cotton plant early is one of the
newer steps in cotton growing
technology. Irrigation and heavy
use of fertilizer have resulted
in larger cotton plants with
longer fruiting periods.

Some of the 1st bolls to open
may remain on the plant two
months or longer before they
are picked, losing quality
throughout this long period of
field exposure.

Research on bottom-defolia-
tion followed by bottom-picking
was conducted at the Delta

Branch Experiment Station at
Stoneville, Mississippi, in 1961
and 1962. A phosphate defoliant
was applied to the lower section
of the plants with a high clear-
ance sprayer in early Septem-
ber. Removal of the lower
leaves allowed sunshine and air
to enter, hastening boll opening
and reducing boll rot. Bottom
picking, which followed a few
weeks later, was accomplished
by adjusting the mechanical
picker so that it harvested the
bottom of the crop only.

The work was done by a
USDA research team consisting
Williamson, agricultural engi-
neers, and C. D. Ranney, plant
pathologist. Based on their
findings, they have drawn the
following conclusions:

"At present, bottom-defolia-
tion and bottom-picking look
promising, especially for a year
similar to 1961 when much of
the cotton was lost because of
frequent fall rains. The cost can
probably be justified for most
years, especially in fields of
rank growing plants. It is diffi-
cult to measure the beneficial
effects of spreading the har-

vesting and ginning operations
over a longer period to avoid
overcrowding the gins; how-
ever, this aspect of earlier pick-
ing is also too important to be
overlooked."

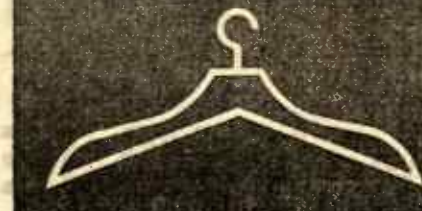

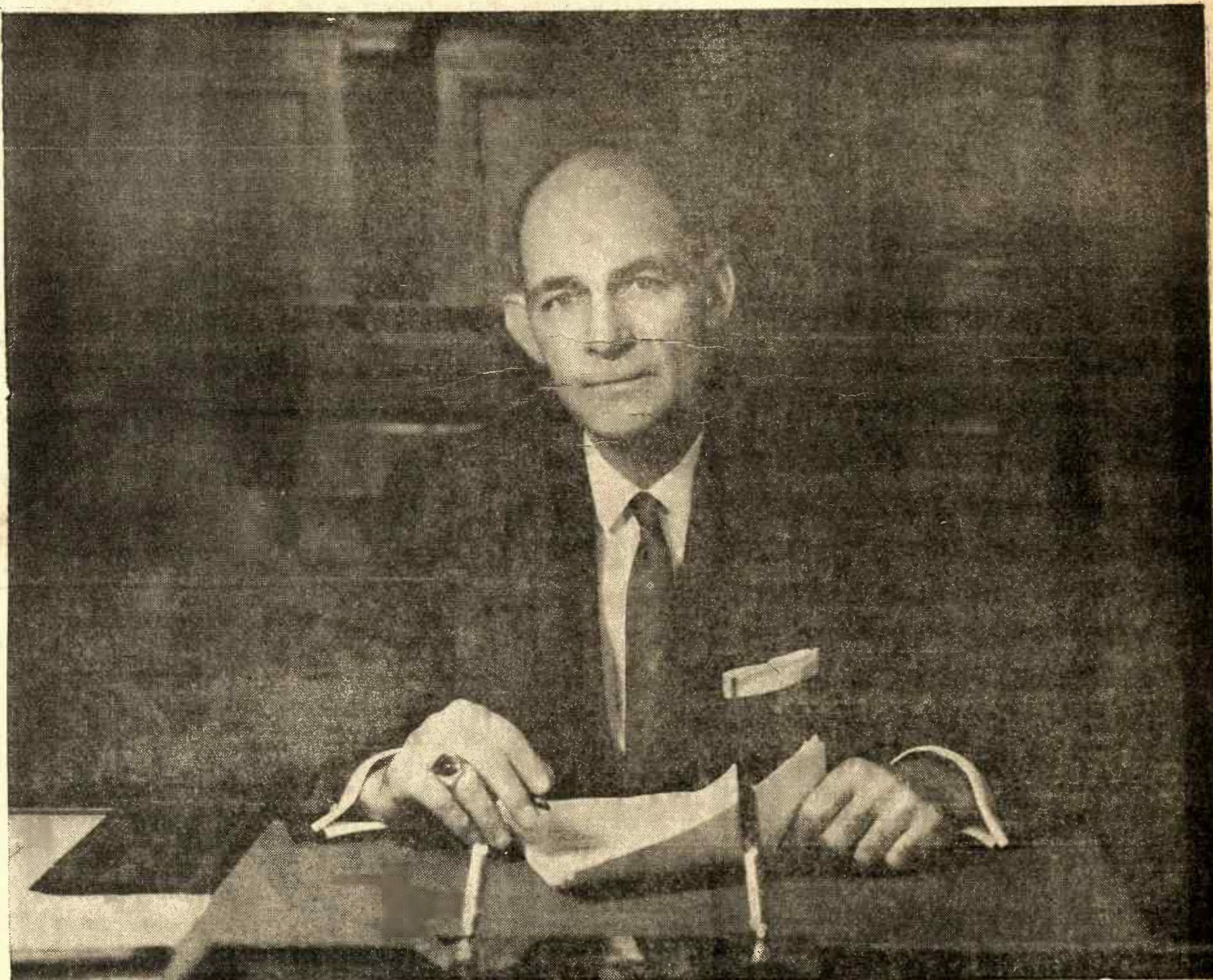

Research Shows Effects Of Using Worn Spray

Brass nozzles are cheaper than steel or chrome but a recent study shows it may be better to buy the more expensive kind.

The wettable powder form of diuron, a chemical used to control weeds, has been found to increase the wear on sprayer parts. Nozzle wear affects the rate of chemical applied per acre unless speed or pressure are varied. An increase in the amount of herbicide applied not only increases the cost of the weed control operation but may increase the chemical residue in the soil, particularly when applications are sprayed broadcast.

R. E. Parker, O. B. Wooten and J. T. Holstun, Jr., a team of USDA research men at the Delta Branch Experiment Station at Stoneville, Mississippi, have measured the wear on various types of orifices.

With 4-row equipment, the research men figure that after brass nozzles have been worn by use on 200 acres, their continued use would add 45 cents per acre to the cost of material applied. Nozzle tips made of brass cost about 50 cents each, stainless steel \$1.50, hardened plated brass \$3.50. Thus, the added cost of chemicals would soon offset the differences in price.

If it is desirable to use brass nozzles, Mr. Parker suggests that careful consideration be given to their application, especially when applying the wettable powder form of diuron, which is slightly more abrasive than the liquid suspension form. If no regular adjustment is made to allow for the wear of brass nozzles, he says one may expect a corresponding increase in the rate of herbicide applied per acre.

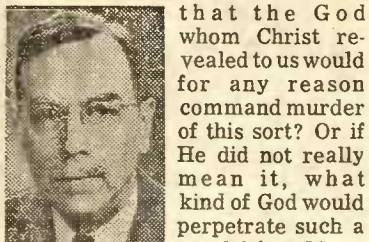


Test of Faith

ber): Deposits in all banks were at a record high level of 1.5 billion dollars. Debits, or checking accounts, which always reflect the fluidity of commercial and industrial operations, reached the \$4 billion mark in Mississippi banks which are members of the Federal Reserve system.

Mississippi farmers collected around \$200 million in the cash market for their products; commercial hatcheries produced 3/4-million baby chicks for broiler and egg purposes. Purchases of goods and services by the federal government for military purposes were valued at over \$100 million. More than half a million beef cattle, calves and hogs were slaughtered in the state. Around 2,500 permits were issued for new residential units costing approximately \$25 million. Southern Bell had some half-million telephones in operation in homes and business establishments to top all previous records. Around 500 new businesses were incorporated; and nearly half-a-million workers were employed in non farm pursuits, with more than 130,000 on manufacturing production lines.

Lumber Company Will Rebuild
The Area Redevelopment Administration in Washington, D. C., has approved an industrial loan for re-building the Molpus Lumber Company at Philadel-

phia, Miss., which was destroyed by fire last January. The A. R. A. approved a loan of \$173,550 to help the company reconstruct and expand sawmill and dry kiln facilities destroyed in the fire. Total investment in the project will be approximately \$270,000. The employment at the mill will be 113 persons after one year's operation. It is estimated that the lumber produced by this plant will exceed 12,000,000 board feet per year.

New Business Locates At Natchez

Arlie C. Warren, president of the Natchez-Adams County Industrial Council, has announced that the Natchez Boat Store, Inc., will locate on a site leased from the board of supervisors and the Natchez-Adams County Port Commission near the port. A Mississippi corporation, Natchez Boat Store is affiliated with Canal Barge Company, Inc., New Orleans, and will begin operations in early September. The company will offer midstream supply and service to river vessels as they move past Natchez.

Southaven Plant Started

Governor Ross Barnett participated in ground-breaking ceremonies for a new \$500,000 manufacturing plant in Southaven in DeSoto county early in August. The plant, American Electric Manufacturing Corporation, makes street lighting equipment and will employ 350. It will occupy 18 acres of the 150-acre Southaven Industrial Park.

First Shirt Produced By New Starkville Plant

Starkville's newest industry, Garan Shirt Manufacturers, completed its first shirt early in August. Presently the company employs 54, but additional workers are being hired. The new factory under construction can accommodate 300 to 350 workers.

Sensing The News

Danger Faces The Dollar
Much more is needed than routine fiscal trimming of U. S. foreign aid and government taxation of international financing if the nation's gold situation is not to worsen into a major crisis. This situation has been developing, of course, for years, but it has now reached a point where it could become critical in just days or even hours, and there would be little time to do anything about it.

The record shows that in the week ended July 17, America suffered a loss of \$50 million in its Treasury gold stock, marking a total loss of \$345 million so far this year. This reduced the country's gold reserves to \$15.6 billion, the lowest amount we have had in reserve in 24 years! It compares with \$16.3 billion just a year ago.

It is required by law that we must have \$12.2 billion in gold as backing for our currency, and it is apparent from this that we now only have \$3.4 billion of free gold. But foreign holdings of short-term dollar credits total some \$25.3 billion at the present time, all of which the holders could demand in gold if they so desired. In other words, we hold the \$15.6 billion in gold we do hold only by the sufferance of foreign nations that hold dollar claims against it; not one ounce of it is ours if these nations decide to buy it.

With so many pressing problems this summer, including the basic one of law and order in the nation, the depletion of the U. S. gold reserve may seem to many citizens as a matter of minor consequence. But a nation's credit, like an individual's credit, is never of little significance.

What the drop in gold reserves means is that the value of the U. S. dollar again is being questioned in world money markets.

kets. This, in time, could have serious effects on the lives of the American people. It means that the republic is in the position of a leading institution whose soundness is doubted by the public.

The reason the U. S. is in trouble today with respect to foreign withdrawals of gold is that we have lived by deficit financing for years. Another way of saying this is that we have lived beyond our means, engaging in profligate spending and lending money we didn't possess. Our trade balance has been good, for we have sold more abroad than we have imported. But this trade balance has been undermined by the outpouring of U. S. funds in foreign aid. This foreign aid has cancelled the healthy effects of U. S. trade and enabled other nations to lay claim to the gold that we need to support our paper money.

Despite the bright outlook of the Kennedy administration, it is generally believed that the deficit in balance of payments for the first half of 1963 has been running at an annual rate of \$3.8 billion or more.

One encouraging development is the decision of the De Gaulle government of France to make an advance payment of \$200 million on its debt to the U. S. This action will be helpful in stemming the gold outflow. But in characteristic New Frontier fashion, the Kennedy administration never misses an opportunity to slight France, our old ally. One can be sure that if a country follows sound policies and wishes to aid the U. S., the New Frontiersmen will oppose that country. The New Frontier prefers friendship with neutralist countries with long records of wasteful financial practices. Thus, the Kennedy administration is not only antagonizing France but is urging the Congress to spend hundreds of millions on assistance to India, including the construction of a socialist-run steel mill. Just consider what such aid to India will do to the gold outflow situation!

Today all major global financial transactions are conducted in dollars because people in the post-war period have had faith in the U. S. dollar. But the increasing foreign prefer-

ence for gold means that they are losing faith in the dollar. This, in turn, means they are losing faith in America as the bastion of the free world. The U. S. cannot afford to be regarded as weak. For our own financial soundness and national security, we must eliminate the staggering gold outflow in foreign aid that is like a bleeding wound for the republic. That is the best and most sensible way of meeting the danger that faces the dollar.
