Grand Jury In Session; 23 True Bills Returned By Grand Jury; Veniremen For Second Week Named

Three true bills were returned by the Grand Jury in Tishomingo County Circuit Court which is in session this morning. The indictments include charges of burglary, arson, armed robbery, and assault with intent to kill. Numerous other felo-

was charged with armed robbery, entered a plea of not guilty. In the case of Vester Lee Brown, also charged with armed robbery, the defendant entered a plea of not guilty and was remanded to jail to await trial.

The trial date in the case of Nellie Sue Jourdan, charged with murder in the shooting of her husband, Bonnie Jourdan, has not been set; however, the case is expected to be heard during this term of Court.

Date for the trial of Dessie Boatwright, charged with forgery, has not been set but will also be heard before Court is concluded.

The trial of Richard Pride, charged with assault with intent to kill, has been set for Friday. He has already been arraigned but entered a plea of not guilty.

Paul Earl Hill, charged with violation of parole, was tried and sentenced to a term of 3 years in the Mississippi State Penitentiary.

In the case of Bobby Gene Voyles on charges of grand lar-

ceny, the defendant entered a plea of not guilty. Trial date in this case has not been set.

A number of criminal cases held over from the last court have been scheduled for hearing.

Thus far, only two civil cases have been disposed of.

Circuit Judge N. S. Sweat, Jr. of Corinth is presiding over the two weeks of court. Noel N. Gray was named foreman of the Grand Jury that held session for almost two and one-half days, examining witnesses, inspecting public buildings and county offices.

A text of the report made by the Grand Jury to the court follows:

"NOW comes your grand jury for the August 1963 term of Circuit Court of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and begs leave to submit its final report.

"We have been in session three days, have examined 23 witnesses, and have returned into open court 23 true bills.

"We have examined by committee the county home, county jail, all the factories of the

county, the movie theatres, the hotel of more than two stories, the tax collector's books and the county auditor's books.

"We find the county home to be in good condition, there is however, a dire need for a new kitchen stove. The grand jury finds that in the inspection of the county home there is substantial evidence that a former custodian has removed four beds, three clothes racks, mirrors, blankets, and sheets, cooking vessels, vacuum cleaner, and an electric coffee pot which was and is the property of Tishomingo County, Mississippi.

The grand jury recommends that the appropriate officer endeavor to recover the possession of this property and in the event such effort should be unsuccessful that this matter be presented to the next grand jury for further consideration.

"The grand jury is pleased to report that the patrons of the county home are provided with ample provisions which are wholesome and properly prepared, and that they seem to be particularly well cared for at

this time.

"We find the county jail to be in good condition, and the prisoners properly supervised.

"We find all the factories of the county to be in good, safe condition, equipped properly with exit doors opening outwardly as required by law and properly marked.

"We find that the tax collector's books and the county auditor's books appear to be neat, well-kept and in balance.

"We find the hotel to be in safe condition.

"The grand jury would also like to especially commend those who may be responsible for the pride and care with which the grounds surrounding the courthouse have been cared for, and the building itself has been maintained. It is the opinion of the grand jury that this reflects credit upon our county.

"AND NOW having concluded our labors, we respectfully request to be finally discharged."

Coleman, Johnson Meet Tuesday In 2nd Primary

Four County Offices And Some In Four Districts Are At Stake

History repeats itself Tuesday when J. P. Coleman and Paul Johnson meet in a Second Primary runoff. This same condition existed in 1955 when these two were opponents for the top job as Governor of the State of Mississippi. As to whether or not the repetition is made complete with another Coleman victory will be determined by the voters.

Since 1955, J. P. Coleman has served a term as governor, and John F. Kennedy has been elected president. Also, since 1955, Paul Johnson has been elected Lt.-Gov. of Mississippi, the job he now holds.

Only four other state offices will be involved in the election Tuesday, all others having been settled in the August 6 First Primary. Other officers on which voters will cast ballots Tuesday will be Lieutenant Governor with Carrol Gartin and Evelyn Gandy being the candidates; State Superintendent of Education with E. B. (Boyd) Golding and J. M. (Jack) Tubb as candidates; Public Service commissioner with D. W. Snyder and Evan E. Tumlinson as candidates; and State Senator, with Clovis Crane and Cecil L. Summers being the candidates. Mr. Summers and Mr. Crane are both Tishomingo Countians each seeking to be Senator from the newly organized 24th Senatorial district created by the legislature earlier this year. These two candidates eliminated R. C. McCarver from Itawamba county in the First Primary. Tishomingo and Itawamba counties comprise the Miss. 24th Senatorial District.

County Offices
County offices and the candidates on which voters will cast ballots in Tuesday's election are for County Representative, L. E. Deaton and Cleston Scruggs; for Circuit Clerk, Mrs. Arah W. Ivy and L. E. (Gene) Robinson; and for Tax Assessor, Alvia J. Blakney and Walter R. Wynn, Jr.

District Offices
In the First Supervisor District, a runoff is on between, Herbert Biggs, incumbent, and W. H. (Billy) Gardner, Jr. for Supervisor, and C. D. (Doan) Davis and W. A. (Albert) Rhodes, for Justice of the Peace.

In the Second district, only one office is involved in Tuesday's election. John W. Bonds is opposed by Sherman Lambert in the race for Justice of the Peace. This particular race was unique in the First Primary in that a tie resulted for second place. Mr. Bonds led the ticket and was followed by Mr. Lambert and Joe W. Meyers each with 224 votes. Mr. Meyers withdrew from the race leaving Mr. Lambert as second place man.

Two offices are at stake in the Third District. In the race for Supervisor, A. C. Ryan and Clint Wigginton are the candidates and in the race for Justice of the Peace, Bill Davis and J. B. Underwood are seeking the job.

Supervisor is the only job to be voted on in the Fourth district. Candidates in this race are Luneford Stormont, seeking re-election, and J. R. (Robert) Buchanan.

Only county and state offices will be voted on in the Fifth district, winners in all district offices having been determined in the First Primary.

Election polls open at 7:00 a. m. and will close at 6:00 p. m.

New Church Being Built

Iuka Church Of Christ Erecting New Building On Highway 25-South

Construction is underway on the Iuka Church of Christ new building on highway 25 south. Ground breaking ceremonies were held Tuesday afternoon with several members of the congregation taking part.

The new church building will afford 5600 square foot of space and will be constructed of frame and brick veneer. There will be 14 classrooms, a minister's study, a nursery, a fellowship hall, and an auditorium that will seat in excess of 300 people. There will be a large foyer and stained glass windows will serve as decorations back of the baptistry.

Indirect lighting will be a feature in the auditorium and all rooms will be completely air conditioned. The floor will be of asphalt tile with carpeting being installed over exposed areas.

A. A. Moss of Danville, Illinois, is the contractor and church consultant Architects are Shadden, Sheehan and King. The building is expected to be ready for occupancy by November.

The expansion program of the Iuka Church of Christ is being financed with a \$70,000 bond issue. The bonds are offered by prospectus and draw interest at the rate of 6%, payable semi-annually. The bond issue will pay for the expansion program and will retire all indebtedness for which the congregation is currently obligated.

Fire Ants Discovered In County

Damaging Insect Found On Farm In Golden Area

County Agent Percie B. Stricklen announces that a colony of "Imported Fire Ants" has been found on the Mink farm in the Golden community in this county.

Mr. Stricklen says the USDA Pest control experts have visited the infected area and that an effort has been made to eradicate this damaging insect. Farmers of the county are warned of the possible presence of these ants and are urged to keep a sharp lookout for them. If any are suspected, farmers are asked to contact the county agent's office immediately and steps will be made to eliminate the ants before they get a start.

Some of the ill effects of the ants is the hills or mounds of earth they pile up in pastures and fields. This creates rough spots and is difficult for tractors and farm equipment to go over. Imported Fire Ants have been known to kill livestock, especially younger calves and smaller animals.

The USDA Pest Control service offers free extermination of the pests, and, according to Mr. Stricklen, any farmer will certainly be acting wisely to notify the county agent's office if signs of the fire ants are found.

Burnsville Church Of Christ Begins Revival Meeting

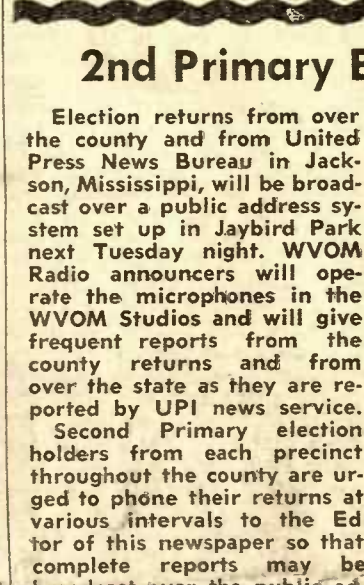

Clover For Winter Grazing

The following information on "Wintering Beef Cattle" has been published by the Mississippi State University. "For 3 consecutive years brood cows carrying calves were wintered at the Black Belt Branch Station, Brooksville, Miss., as follows:

Fescue alone cost \$13.00 per cow, November 1 to April 1. Silage and protein with frost-dried grass pastures cost \$18.00. Hay plus Cottonseed meal cost \$24.00." With the increase of beef cattle in Tishomingo County, it is imperative that more attention be paid to the cost of wintering the brood cows. Fescue and ladino clover appears to be by far the cheapest method of wintering brood cows.

On most of the farms in Tishomingo County, there is land that will produce good fescue. Actually the growing of fescue is the proper use for this land. Now is the time to begin preparing your land to plant to fescue and ladino clover early this fall. Plant as soon as you can after September 1st. Fence fescue in a separate pasture so as to control the grazing. Graze from November 1st till May 15th. Do not cut hay off it in the summer. Let it grow so as to have a heavy growth to turn cattle in on by November 1st. Better begin now to look for fescue seed.

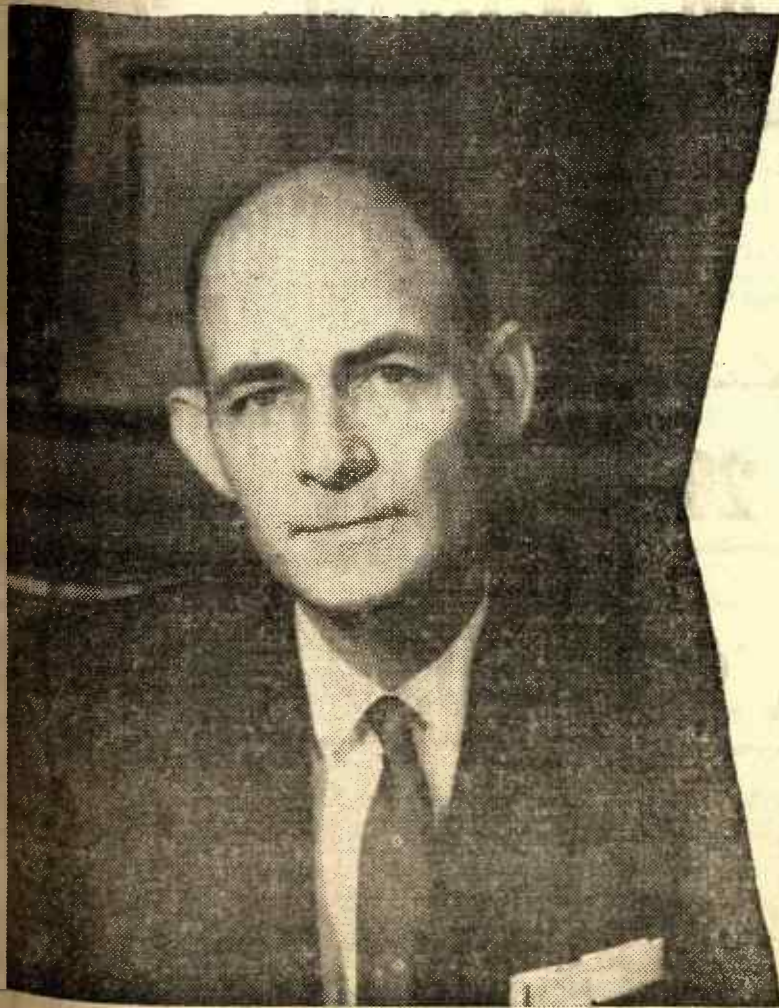

Schedule Of Beginning Activities Given; Faculty Members Listed

The Board of Trustees of the Iuka Separate School District has officially set Thursday, August 29, as the opening date of the 1963-64 session of school and Superintendent and Principals announce in detail the beginning activities of the oncoming school year.

On Wednesday, August 28, at 2:00 o'clock, the faculty will assemble for a general meeting, after which principals Joe E. Brown and Mrs. Louise Johnston will meet their respective groups for detailed planning and organizing preliminary to beginning class work.

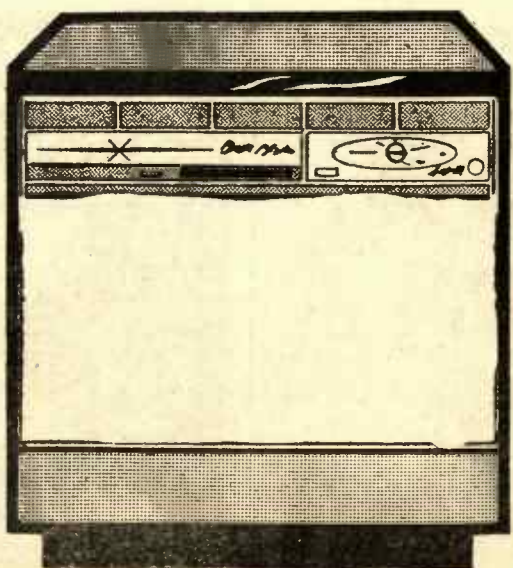

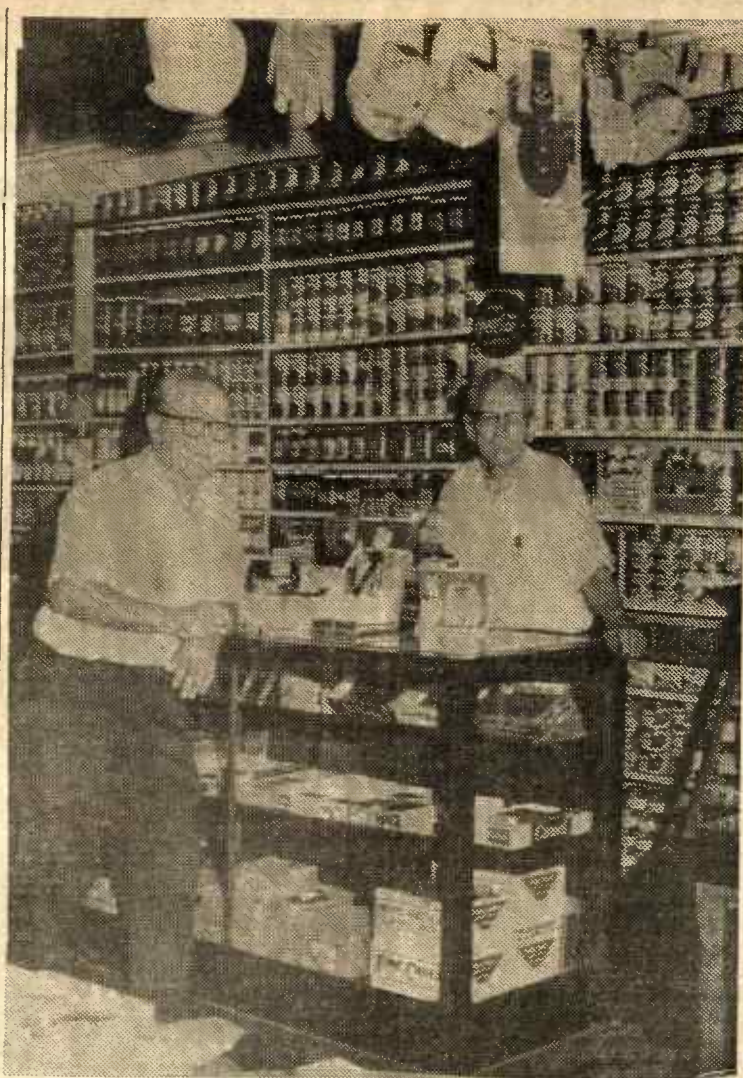
