29 Criminal Cases Disposed Of During This Term Of Circuit Court

One of the more serious criminal cases docketed for this term of Tishomingo County Circuit Court was disposed of late Wednesday afternoon. The case was that of Walter Selman, charged with assault and battery to kill and murder Clarence Rast, a sawmill operator, who was seriously wounded in a shooting fracas on Crippled Creek in the 3rd District in August of 1961. A verdict of not guilty was returned by the jury after several hours of deliberation.

Johnson Beats Coleman; Gartin Defeats Gandy In Second Primary Runoff

In a runaway election Tuesday, Lt. Gov. Paul B. Johnson won the Democratic nomination for Governor of Mississippi over J. P. Coleman by a wide margin of over 63,000 votes. In the same election, Carroll Gartin defeated Evelyn Gandy for the number two spot in the State—Lieutenant Governor—by over 18,000 votes.

Johnson Beats Coleman; Gartin Defeats Gandy In Second Primary Runoff

Summers, Scruggs Win Seats;
Biggs, Davis Win In 1st; Ryan,
Davis In 3rd; Stormont In 4th

In a runaway election Tuesday, Lt. Gov. Paul B. Johnson won the Democratic nomination for Governor of Mississippi over J. P. Coleman by a wide margin of over 63,000 votes. In the same election, Carroll Gartin defeated Evelyn Gandy for the number two spot in the State—Lieutenant Governor—by over 18,000 votes.

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All farmers in Tishomingo County are urged to take part in the election of committee members. These committeemen will assist in carrying out your county programs, namely: Agricultural Conservation Program, Marketing Quota Program, Feed Grain Program, Loan Program, Price Support and Farm Storage Facility Loan Program, Mr. Allen said.

All farmers who have an interest in any of these programs as land owner, tenant or share interest in any of these programs Remember, the final date for returning your ballot is September 6, 1963.

In local county and district races, Cecil L. Summers was victorious over Clovis Crane in the race for the 24th Senatorial seat. Mr. Summers got 3085 votes in the county to Mr. Crane's 1630. Returns from Itawamba county were not available in this race, however, it is understood that Mr. Summers was easy winner in that county.

One of the tightest races was that for the county legislative seat. Cleston Scruggs, a school teacher and former county superintendent of education, nosed out L. E. Deaton with a vote of 2378 to 2309—a difference of only 69 votes. J. O. (Click) Clark is the retiring representative.

In other county races, Alvia Blakney defeated Walter Wynn, Jr. for Tax Assessor by a vote of 2669 to 2089, and L. E. (Gene) Robinson was re-elected over Mrs. Arah Ivy by a score of 2732 to 2042.

In the race for Northern District Public Service Commissioner, D. W. Snyder carried Tishomingo county by a wide margin, the vote being for Mr. Snyder, 2663, and for Mr. Tumlinson, 1886. Mr. Snyder was elected over the district by a big majority. Also, in statewide campaigns, J. M. (Jack) Tubbs was re-elected State Superintendent of Education over E. B. (Boyd) Golding. Locally, this was a close race with Mr. Tubbs holding a slight edge all the way through tabulations. The county vote in this race was, for Mr. Tubbs, 2388, and for Mr. Golding, 2250.

In county Supervisor Districts, Herbert Biggs was an easy winner over W. H. (Billy) Gardner, Jr., for re-election as First District Supervisor, Mr. Biggs' vote being 819 to Mr. Gardner's 607. C. D. (Doan) Davis edged out W. A. (Albert) Rhodes for First District Justice of the Peace. Mr. Davis got 729 votes and Mr. Rhodes got 690—a difference of 39 votes.

In the Second District, John W. Bonds defeated Sherman Lambert for re-election to the office of Justice of the Peace. Mr. Bonds got 421 votes to Mr. Lambert's 325.

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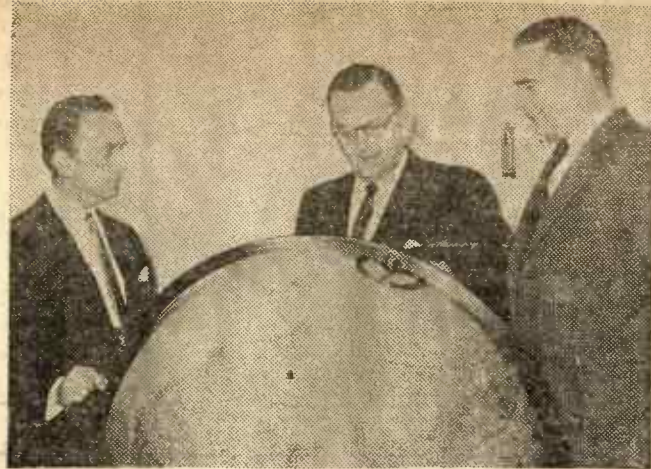

'UGLY AMERICAN' IMAGE ABROAD CAN BE ELIMINATED, SAYS H. W. HOOVER, JR.

"Americans don't have to present an 'Ugly American' image abroad."

So says one of the United States leading international businessmen, H. W. Hoover, Jr., whose extensive interests overseas as an electrical appliance manufacturer bring him in frequent contact with businessmen of more than 100 countries.

"Most Americans traveling or living abroad are not the 'fatheads' so sweepingly indicted by authors Lederer and Burdick in their best selling novel 'The Ugly American'," Hoover advised. "However, it is high time America realized it cannot buy friendship with money alone."

"Understanding and humility is a better approach to foreign friendships. Every representative that visits outside the U. S. should consider himself a salesman of American goodwill. Business firms should insist that their agents study and understand their foreign contacts as well as they understand the products they have to sell," Hoover urged.

Citing "cocky attitudes" of some American tourists of a decade ago, Hoover said he found through extensive travel—talking with workers as well as businessmen—that it was a self-centered, unthinking few and not the majority of American tourists abroad that fostered a poor image of the U. S.

"True, too many Americans stick to themselves while touring," Hoover admitted, "and, worse, too few bother to learn the other fellow's language, even enough to 'get by.'"

"We need a 'people-to-people' diplomacy when visiting foreign lands. This should be practiced on all levels—the State Department, business and tourism. When European businessmen learn we both have common interests and problems there will be less chance for misunderstanding. When tourists learn to play the role of guests in foreign countries and not high lords from across the big water looking down on their poor subjects, a bond of friendship will develop that no amount of foreign dollar-aid will buy."

Hoover contended the "sell America abroad" program must be initiated here by Americans. "We are our brothers' keepers and some of our American brothers made mistakes overseas that today we must correct," he stated.

"Personal contact, good will and tact, a sincere effort to understand foreign customs and outlooks, along with efforts to learn foreign languages will do much to blot out the 'Ugly American' picture," Hoover proposed. "Finally, we must remember that a gracious welcome and a helping hand to the increasing number of tourists visiting our own country also will do much to replace this false face."

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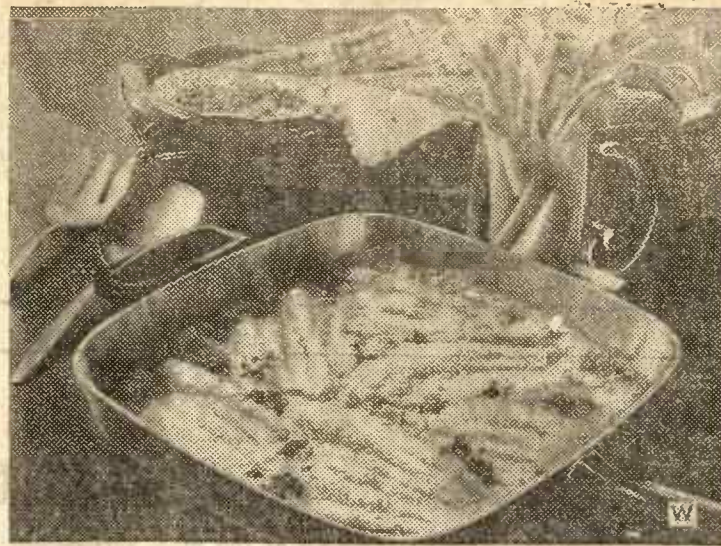

Poached Fish Fillets, Italiano— definitely gourmet



Fish fillets are born tender. So they are cooked mainly for flavor... gently, to preserve their own delicate succulence, and just long enough to gain from a patchy blend of seasonings. This is certainly true with these Poached Fish Fillets, Italiano. They are marinated ahead of time in a little white wine and real Italian dressing. They take unto themselves the bouquet of the wine, and a lightly pungent touch of the garlic and marjoram and other herbs from the dressing. Then the fillets are quietly poached in the very same marinade. Finally, in the serving, what remains of the sauce is spooned over them. It all adds up to a dish so delicately distinctive in flavor it could well become one of your prideful "specialties of the house". Nice accompaniments would be crusty French bread and chilled celery stalks.

1 pound fillet of flounder	1½ teaspoons cornstarch
½ cup Wish-Bone Real	½ cup milk
Italian Dressing	1 hard-cooked egg, finely
½ cup white wine	chopped
	1 tablespoon chopped parsley

Wash and dry fillets; marinate in salad dressing and wine for ½ hour. Pour off marinade into fry pan; heat at 250 degrees for 2 to 3 minutes. Carefully lay fillets in pan and poach for about 6 minutes or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork. Stir cornstarch into milk. Then, tilting fry pan slightly, add to cooking liquid on lower side of pan. Stir to thicken. Level pan so that sauce flows back over fillets. Sprinkle with chopped egg and parsley. Makes 4 servings.

*Or remove fillets to warm platter and make sauce in the fry pan. Pour over fillets and garnish.

Note: If you do not have an electric skillet, use regular skillet on top of the range, over low heat.

Prevent Mastitis

One of the biggest dairy problems today is fighting and controlling mastitis. Some authorities say that mastitis costs the American dairymen more than \$400 million a year.

Here are some pointers that will be helpful in preventing and controlling mastitis in your herd: Use proper milking procedure; adjust milking machine to proper vacuum level and pulsation rate.

Do not try to operate too many units per man. Two units in a stanchion barn is about all one man can handle. Keep barn in sanitary condition and cows free from mud, manure, wire and equipment that may cause injury. Fence off ponds and mud holes. Water from ponds should be siphoned into troughs.

Establish a milking order if practical. Milk heifers first and known infested cows last. Withhold abnormal milk from market. Wash and rinse milker after use and sanitize before the next milking.

Diagnose and treat infested cows as necessary and hold

milk from market for six milkings following treatment, or until completely cleared from. Raise your own replacement young heifers. Do mastitis. Provide calf pens during first calving suckling the other calves can cause mastitis-infested an early age.

When mastitis is diagnosed it is advisable to consult a veterinarian. But emphasize rather than treatment.

Gasoline Tax Refund Mississippi farmers ranchers wanting to line tax refunds must proper papers before ber 30, 1963.

The refund is for a tax paid on gasoline for agricultural purposes July 1, 1962 and June 1, 1963. Amount of the refund for each gallon the federal tax was paid.

A simple card report is used. Service is free. Cards already been mailed to farmers last year. New cards can get forms from the Internal Revenue Service or County Agents Office.

If a custom operator on your farm and boiler tax gasoline job, you are entitled to a refund on this fuel.

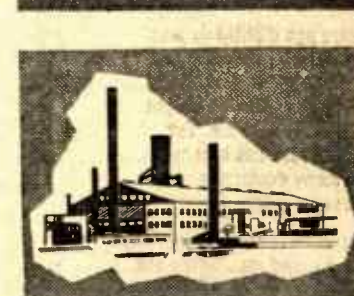

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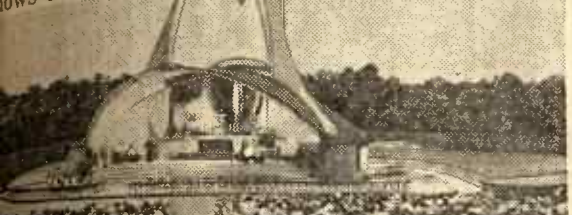

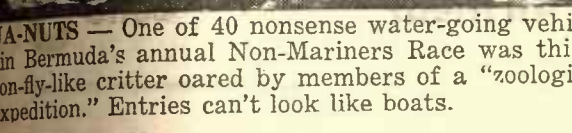

Ripley Shoe Products Holds Open House

An estimated 3000 persons attended an open house at the Ripley Shoe Products Company plant at Ripley in mid-August. The company, which began production in late October, 1961, now employs 350 and occupies a 225,000 sq. ft. plant. Approximately 550 items are produced at the plant, including a wide variety of heels and soles. Henry Robbins, plans manager, said all of the plant's employees, with the exception of six persons, are native Mississippians. "We are very proud of our employees," he said, "and feel that both the quantity and quality of the products they produce is equal to anything in the industry."

New Industry In Production At Greenville

One of Greenville's newest industries, the Greenville Head and Block Co., Inc., has already begun operations, according to a news story from the Delta port city. The company, which rebuilds diesel cylinder heads, blocks, transmission cases and allied castings, now employs eight people but will expand to about 25 in the near future, according to owner Robert Wilson Jr. It serves areas of Mississippi, Arkansas, Louisiana, Tennessee, Alabama and Georgia and services mainly heavy diesel industry such as earth moving, oil drilling and marine equipment users. "We chose Greenville because it is a central location for our work throughout the South," Wilson said. The company also has an operation at McPherson, Kansas.

Dedication Set For New West Point Plant

Initial plans have been made for the formal dedication of the new Rempel Manufacturing Co. plant at West Point. Tentative date for the dedication is September 15. The company manufactures toys and has recently begun full production.

New Supply House Locates In Jackson

Further recognition of Jack-

son as a growing distribution and service center is noted in the announcement that the Federal Mogul Service Division of the Federal Mogul-Bower Bearings, Inc., is opening a factory branch operation in the capital city. The company is headquartered in Detroit. The supply house will handle Bower Roller Bearings, FM engine bearings, BCA ball bearings and National Oil Seals. It will occupy 3000 sq. ft. of floor space.

Walker Payroll Passes \$4 Million

Walker Manufacturing Company has announced that its Mississippi Division, located at Aberdeen, has now paid out over \$4,000,000 in payrolls since beginning operations in late 1958. Plant manager R. H. Curry said that in 1959, the first full year of operation at Aberdeen, payrolls were about \$500,000. In 1960, this increased to about \$750,000 and nearly reached \$900,000 in 1961. In 1962, total local payroll for Walker crossed the \$1,000,000 mark. Company produces mufflers, automotive exhaust systems.

Shipbuilding In News (Again) At Pascagoula

"Big John," a 2400 horsepower thin-screw tug built by F. B. Walker and Sons shipyard at Pascagoula, was christened earlier this month. The ship, 100 feet long, 28 feet wide, with a 13-foot draft, is equipped with radar, depth recorder, ship-to-shore and citizen band radio, and has fuel and water capacity for a 30-day operation. Shipyard officials said the ship may be used as a sea-going tug for ship moving or in inland waterways. At Ingalls Shipbuilding, division of Litton Industries, official shipyard construction began on the third of six big cargo liners being built for Moore-McCormack Line of New York and the submarine tender Holland was prepared for movement to the Charleston, S. C. naval shipyard for commissioning. The Holland will support the Polar ice submarine fleet and is one of the most complex ships ever built by Ingalls.

Election Set For GEM, Expansion

The Marshall county Board of Supervisors has called for an election to be held on September 10, 1963, in District 3, to vote on the issuance of \$200,000 in BAWL bonds for the expansion of the Gem, plant at Byhalia. Gem is a manufacturer of household mops and ironing pads and covers. The planned expansion will enable the company to expand its operations and products and to double its present employment of 130. This will be the third expansion which Gem has had in 12 years of operation in Byhalia.

\$13.5 Million Plant Planned For State

Peter Colefax, American Potash & Chemical Corporation chairman, has announced that the company will locate a new titanium dioxide pigment plant at Hamilton adjacent to its Aberdeen sodium chlorate and manganese metal plants. Colefax said, "We have successfully produced pigments in a large semi-commercial plant in England by a chloride process developed by our company in conjunction with Laporte Industries, Ltd., and have now finalized our plans for the site and construction of the plant. American Potash will market its product on a nationwide basis. Various cost advantages and more favorable operating conditions led to the selection of the Aberdeen plant at Hamilton as site for the project instead of Mojave, California as originally planned. Among the cost factors influencing the decision are lower construction costs and reduced operating expenses, together with a favorable tax climate." Plant investment is estimated at \$13.5 million.

Q—I'm a widow but my husband never worked under social security. In 1960, when I was 62, I filed an application for social security on the work I'd done. They turned me down because I only had 2-1/2 years of social security work credit. They said I need credit for 3 years. Has there been any change in social security that would help me to get checks? I sure do need it.

A—Yes. The law has been changed and a woman who was 62 in 1960 now needs only 2-1/4 years of social security work credit to get retirement payments. Come to our office right away and sign a new application, bringing a document with you that will prove your age, if you have not already done so.

Q—I didn't think anyone who made over \$1200 a year could get social security retirement checks. There's a man down the street from me who retired, started getting his so-



New Design In Girl Scout Program Scheduled To Begin September 9

One of the busiest weeks in the history of the Girl Scout Organization will start on September 9th, for more than 4138 Girl Scouts of the Tennessee Valley Girl Scout Council. The reason is the "new design" in the Girl Scout Program.

The week following the 9th will mark the first meetings of Girl Scout troops in four new levels. New Girl Scout Handbooks, developed to correspond to the new age levels, will go on sale for the first time. Two official Girl Scout equipment agencies for the Council will make the handbooks available for purchase in the Girl Scout Shops.

While the age range for girl members remains seven through seventeen, Girl Scout troops are

beginning to operate in four age levels. Brownies will be girls from seven to eight. The Junior Girl Scouts will be nine through eleven. The ages of Cadette Girl Scouts will be twelve, thirteen, and fourteen. The fifteen, sixteen, and seventeen year olds will be Senior Scouts. This is in contrast to three age levels—Brownies, Intermediates, Seniors—which were formerly the basis of Girl Scout Troop organization.

Girls are growing up faster today than they did when Girl Scouting started. These new groupings make it possible for Girl Scout troop activities to correspond more closely than ever to their changing needs and interests.

cial security, and then went back to work part-time. He makes about \$2,000 a year, but he still gets some of his social security checks. At least, that's what he says. It makes me wonder if I could get part of mine. I'm 65 in January and was planning to retire. My boss doesn't want me to quit altogether, and has offered me \$150 a month to come in a few hours every day. That will come to over \$1200 a year. Can I still get some of my social security?

A—Yes, you can. From what you say, you'd earn only \$1800 next year, if you work part-time for \$150 a month. If you do, you can get all but \$350 of your social security for the year. Come to the social security office in October and we'll help you get it all fixed up ahead of time.

Q—Some of the older teachers in the school where I teach get social security payments every summer. They aren't retired yet and plan to continue

teaching when school starts again. How can they get payments if they haven't retired?

A—Any teacher who's worked long enough under social security to be insured can get social security for any month in which she doesn't earn over \$100 or isn't active in a business. Most older teachers can get benefits for July and Aug. Some school boards pay teachers their salary over 12 months. This won't keep the average teacher from getting social security in the summer, however, since their salary isn't earned in the summer months, it's just paid then.
