File Disability Claim For Social Security Benefits

Delay in filing a disability claim under the social security program can cause loss of benefits, payments, Hugh Tigrett, District Manager, Social Security Administration, said today. Some people with serious illnesses or injuries fail to insure about disability benefits because they rely on information from friends and neighbors which may be incorrect or incomplete. All of these people risk possible loss of their social security benefits.

Mr. Tigrett suggested that people who have something wrong with them that keeps them from working should check with their social security office immediately. This will speed up any claim for benefits and mean you will receive your first check quicker. He stressed that under no circumstances should a disabled person wait to see if he is going to be able to go back to work. This may be a long time coming out and he could lose some money by waiting.

For more information about the social security disability program, Mr. Tigrett suggested that people get in touch with their local social security representative. The social security representative is at the City Hall in Iuka each Monday morning.

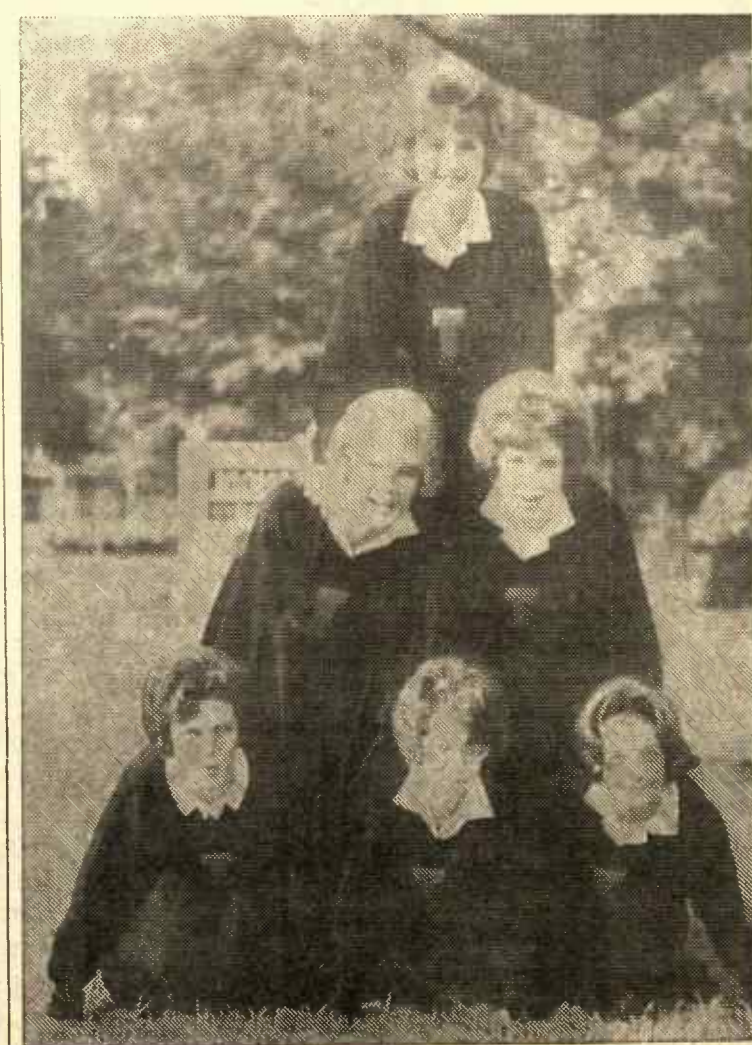

Sentences Handed Down During Court Session

Some Cases Continued Due To
Illness Of Important Witnesses

A murder case and an armed robbery case, scheduled to be heard during this term of Tishomingo County Circuit Court, were continued to the next term of court due to the illness of Sheriff Clarence Pace, a chief witness in both cases.

The two cases involved Nellie Sue Jourdan, indicted for murder in the fatal shooting of her husband in April of this year, and Vester Lee Brown of Tishomingo, charged with a spring armed robbery, for which the maximum penalty is death.

Presiding Judge N. S. Sweat, Jr. of Corinth handed down sentences on 10 cases during the closing hours of the 2-week court session.

The sentences, as prescribed by Judge Sweat, were: William Floyd Wells, armed robbery, 30 years, of which 14 years were suspended; Paul Hill, burglary and larceny, three years; Andy Hill, burglary and larceny, two years (revocation of probation);

Richard Pride, Negro, assault and battery with intent to kill, 10 years, of which five were suspended on his good behavior;

Charles Seay, Negro, burglary, seven years, of which five were suspended;

Harry Mitchell, Negro, burglary and larceny, seven years, five of them suspended;

Paul David English and Dewey Ledlow, burglary and larceny, seven years suspended, five of them probation;

Thurmond Williams, contempt of court (intoxicated in the courtroom), 20 days, 10 of them suspended; and

Pine Tree Seedlings Available

Landowners Urged
To Submit Orders

The Mississippi Forestry Commission is accepting tree seedling orders for the 1963-64 planting season now, announces Area Forester Larry Brewer. Landowners who plan to plant this season should submit their orders at the earliest possible date in order to be assured that they will receive their seedlings.

Available species of trees are: slash, loblolly, longleaf and shortleaf pines and small amounts of bald cypress, cottonwood, green ash, yellow poplar, black locust, sycamore, sweetgum, red cedar, cherrybark oak, Arizona cypress, and tupelo gum.

Each landownership is eligible for 1,000 free seedlings by paying only a thirty-five cent delivery charge. Orders in excess of 1,000 will cost \$4.50 per thousand plus delivery charge. Land owned jointly by two or more persons is eligible for only 1,000 free seedlings. These prices will remain in effect throughout the planting season.

Orders for slash and loblolly pines will be filled on a "first come-first served" basis. Orders for other species will be filled in the full amount provided seedlings supplies have not been depleted.

"Trees planted now, Brewer said, "will be ready for harvest in time to meet the predicted rise in demand for wood and wood products, due to increased population and more rapid industrialization within the state."

Landowners who are engaged in planting activities as a part of their timberland management planning are urged to contact the Area Forester or visit the County Agent's office.

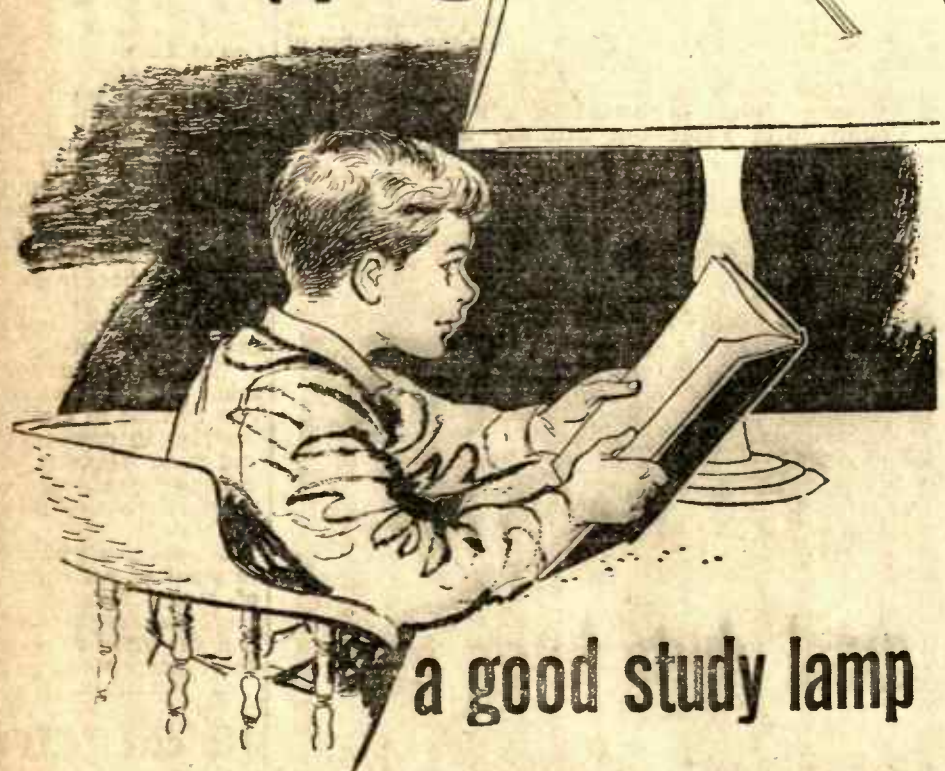

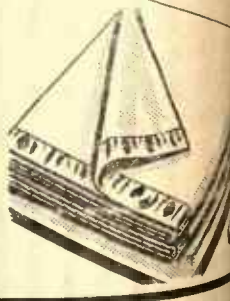

God Knows Why

Lesson for September 8, 1963

Bible Material: Genesis 37 through 50
Devotional Reading: Psalm 37:1-11

WHEN we wonder why something should happen we think ought not to happen; when a burden long borne becomes daily harder to bear; when a good man goes down in defeat or a bad man prospers, in short, when it looks almost as if the devil and not God were in charge here; when we wonder why, we are indirectly expressing our faith in God. All Christians, and some also who have never taken that name, do believe in a God who is both good and almighty. If He were only good but not almighty, or only almighty but not good, we would not wonder at all. It is only those who believe in the true God who wonder why.

The story of Joseph

The story of Joseph in the Old Testament hasn't a miracle in it. Joseph never performed one. He never saw any one else do it. Yet the story of Joseph gives us some of the most important clues to the way God takes care of His own, and brings His purposes to pass even with the help of those who are reckless and wicked. It helps us when we wonder "Why?" to read again this famous story and to think about it.

Joseph's brothers were a bad lot, there is no doubt about that. You cannot blame Jacob for playing favorites when he picked out Joseph for special favors. Joseph was the son of the only wife Jacob ever loved; and besides, he was not only better, he was smarter than the rest of the family. Anybody who is smarter than the people around him doesn't help matters by bragging, and Joseph did brag. Even in his dreams he was the kingpin and he let everybody know it. His brothers might have been expected to resent this and to pick on Joseph, maybe even beat him. But they did worse than that, they thought beating was too called forgiveness, on any other basis, isn't the real thing. Men "forgive" others for show, or because it's demanded of them by society, or to get rid of an unpleasantness... but the result is coldness and aloof suspicion, not true forgiveness.

Repentance the condition

But the day when Joseph forgave his brothers was not the first day he had seen them. Why didn't he forgive his brothers on sight? Why the delay? Why all that business of the state dinner, and the cup in the sack of grain? Couldn't he have forgiven his brothers right away? The reason for his waiting lay in the fact that when the brothers came to Egypt the first time, Joseph had no way of knowing what they were like now. In more than 20 years, much can happen. Had they changed or were they all the same conscienceless devils they used to be? Joseph had to find out. The Judah who so eagerly offered his life for the life of his brother Benjamin was a different man from the Judah who sold his brother Joseph into slavery. Probably the others were different too; Joseph, a good judge of character, may have seen in their faces that they sympathized and agreed with Judah. Something real, something new had entered the picture. This new thing was repentance. The meaning of that word is transformation-of-the-mind, a new way of looking at life. True repentance is not a flash of regret, it is a continuing change of heart. Without it there can be no forgiveness. Readiness to forgive, yes; but not forgiveness. Not even God offers forgiveness to those who will not repent.

Action is the proof

If forgiveness like repentance is an inward thing, an attitude, how can we tell when it is genuine? Well, the New Testament speaks of the "fruits of repentance" and might well speak of the "fruits of forgiveness." We have good reason to believe that Judah had repented because of the way he acted about Benjamin and Jacob. We have equally good reason for being sure that Joseph really forgave his brothers, by what he proceeded to do for them. True forgiveness is not an eraser to wipe off the past and leave the blackboard clean. It is not a disinfectant to destroy the germs of hate. Rather, forgiveness is positive, creative. It draws a fresh new picture of life; it brings health. The forgiver proves himself by serving those he forgives. You can never see a forgiving spirit; but you can see such a spirit in the actions it inspires.

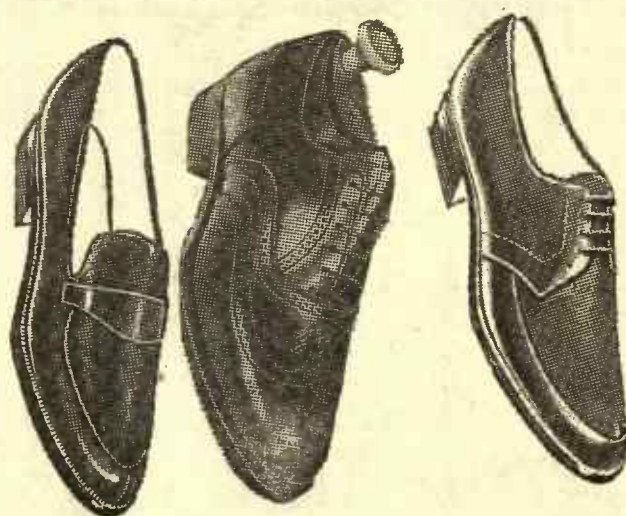
