Tish. County ASCS Program Offers
Assistance To Farmers In This Area

The Tishomingo Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Program is now offering assistance to all farmers in planting fall pastures, sowing grazing crops (such as oats, rye grass and crimson clover), hairy vetch, and Austrian winter peas on the cropland of their farm.

E. N. Allen, Office Manager, states that there is approximately \$12,000.00 of 1963 funds available to be used by Tishomingo County Farmers in carrying out some type practice on their farm. A small amount of 1964 program funds are also available for use at this time.

"The above funds are limited and will not go very far in assisting farmers. We urge you to check your needs and hurry to the ASCS Office and sign up for what you need while the money is available," Mr. Allen said.

Some of the things that are available to farmers of the county are:

1. The practice of sowing new permanent pasture (approximately 65% of the cost will be paid);
2. Sowing winter cover crops or temporary grazing consisting of Oats, Rye Grass, Crimson Clover, Hairy Vetch and Austrian Winter Peas. These crops must be sowed on your cropland. If you rented some of your corn land under the Feed Grain Program, some oats or rye grass can be sowed on that

Tishomingo County Fair Opens Mon.;
Exhibits, Entertainment On Program

Bigger, Better Displays; King, Queen, Youth Talent Contests; Gospel Singing, Country Music Jamboree; Big Midway For 6 Days

The eleventh annual event of the Tishomingo County Fair and Livestock Show will open Monday at the fair grounds for a full week of entertainment for fair goers throughout the area.

A new and different carnival with a greater variety and much larger rides than ever before has been set up on the midway, will be available to those who like extra thrills and excitement. There will also be plenty of concessions, cotton candy, peanuts and popcorn.

County Agent Percie Stricklin states that those visiting the fair this year will see one of the largest and finest livestock exhibits that has ever been shown in Tishomingo County. Reports from ladies throughout the county indicate the Woman's building will have on display one of the most colorful and unique array of items ever entered in this department before. Here you will find flowers, clothing, food, crops, craft and art exhibits.

All of the livestock, poultry and crop exhibits will be brought in on Tuesday; women's exhibits will be entered on Wednesday; and fresh vegetables, baking and flowers entered on Thursday. All exhibits will remain in place until Saturday morning.

Official judging of the community booths will be held Wednesday; poultry, women's and girl's division, hogs, and beef cattle, Thursday; and dairy cattle, Friday.

King And Queen Contests

The King and Queen of the Fair Contests will be held on Tuesday night, beginning at 7 o'clock. This includes three divisions: Little King and Queen of the Fair (ages 6-12); Junior King and Queen of the Fair (ages 13-15); and Senior King and Queen of the Fair (ages 16-21). Any boy or girl living in Tishomingo County within the above mentioned age groups are eligible to enter these contests.

Each girl that enters the contest must have an escort with in the same age group who will be in the King Contest; however, the couple will not be judged together. Girls will wear evening dresses and boys will be required to wear coats and ties. No entrance fee will be charged.

Each winning King will receive \$5.00 and each winning Queen will receive \$5.00. Last year's winners will not be eligible to compete, but will have the honor of crowning the new Kings and Queens.

Plenty Of Parking Space

County Agent Percie Stricklin states that plenty of parking space will be available to fair goers. A new gate will be opened at the South side of the fair grounds near the spot where the Lions Club Dunking Machine usually stands. Those attending the fair and wishing to save walking distance may park in the East parking lot of the Tishomingo Shoe Company, walk across the railroad tracks, and enter the fair grounds through the South gate.

New Resident Manager Named For Counce Plant

G. W. E. Nicholson, President of Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company, has announced the appointment of Dr. F. B. Schelhorn as Resident Manager of the Company's kraft linerboard mill at Counce, Tennessee.

E. M. Leavitt, Resident Manager of the mill since its construction, has resigned to do pulp and paper-making consultant work.

Before coming with Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company, Dr. Schelhorn was Vice President of Research and Engineering for the Forest Products Division of Owens-Illinois Company. He received his chemical engineering degree from the University of Pennsylvania and the Ph.D. degree from the Institute of Paper Chemistry. He is also a graduate of the Harvard Advanced Management Program.

Dr. Schelhorn has been associated with the pulp and paper industry for twenty years. His work in the South began ten years ago when he became Technical Superintendent of the Owens-Illinois mill at Valdosta, Georgia.

He subsequently was made Mill Manager of the Owens-Illinois plant at Jacksonville, Florida. Later he was placed in charge of the operations of Owens-Illinois mills located at Jacksonville, Florida; Valdosta, Georgia; Big Island, Virginia; Jaite, Ohio; and Tomahawk, Wisconsin.

For the past three years he has served as Vice President of Research and Engineering for the five mills in the Forest Products Division of Owens-Illinois.

Work Begins On Parkway

Bituminous Overlay Will Be Applied To Trace Motor Road

Work is expected to get underway immediately on Accelerated Public Works project for hot bituminous plant mix overlay on approximately 34.7 miles of the Natchez Trace motor road located in Madison and Leake Counties.

The project will extend from a point approximately 10 miles

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Iuka, Mississippi
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south of Kosciusko, Mississippi, at the Leake and Atalla County line to a point approximately 3 miles north of the point where Mississippi State Highway 43 crosses the parkway motor road.

The contractor for this work is C & F Contracting Company of Amory, Mississippi. The work will consist of a bituminous slurry mixture to seal the cracks in the old pavement, spot leveling of the old pavement where needed, and a 1-1/2" bituminous overlay on the 34.7 miles.

For this work the parkway motor road will not be closed. However, it will be necessary to maintain one-way traffic throughout the daily area operation, and flagmen will be on duty to direct traffic where one-way travel will be required. It is expected that this length during the day will not exceed one-half mile and at night two-way traffic will be maintained throughout the area. Parkway Superintendent Malcolm Gardner asked that visitors traveling observe the signs and flagmen and thus expedite the completion of the work.

In the vicinity of Ridgeland, John H. Moon & Sons has a parkway contract which includes a dual-lane grade separation structure at the U.S. 51 Parkway intersection. Since Highway 51 is to be lowered, a detour road is under construction just to the east. This work is under the immediate supervision of engineering personnel of the Bureau of Public Roads. Superintendent Gardner and the Park Rangers urge that motorists exercise caution and observe all warning signs. Men are working in this area and construction equipment is moving back and forth across various roadways.

HOME AGENT NOTES

Good cooking habits can save you time and prevent burns, scalds, spills and other accidents.

Using pot holders and how you use them are part of good cooking habits. Always use a dry pot holder to handle hot pans and to remove hot food from the oven. Use two dry pot holders to handle the broiler pan when it is hot. Always use two hands and two dry pot holders when you handle large, hot pans.

Be sure switches are turned to the "off" position and the range is cool before you clean any part. Don't ever wipe a surface unit while it is hot.

When lifting the cover of a utensil, raise the back part first so the steam escapes away from you.

Do not use a glass cooking utensil on the surface units of your range unless there is a wire rack to put between it and

the unit, or unless it is a specially manufactured glassware that can withstand the quick, intense heat of High speed.

When you fry or brown meat, keep the heat low enough that the fat does not spatter. Be careful not to drip or splash water into hot fat when frying or browning meat as this causes spattering. This sometimes happens when you take the cover off another utensil.

Place oven racks to be sure that they lock when pulled out part way. When cooking on only one oven rack, put the second rack below it in the oven, out of the way. Never reach into a hot oven. Instead, using a dry pot holder, pull the oven rack out to the stop position.

When broiling, do not pre-heat the broiler pan or the oven. Instead, arrange the food on a cold broiler pan, place it in the oven, then turn on the broiling unit.

Most ranges have an appliance outlet that has its own fuse. Make it a point not to plug into this outlet more than one appliance such as a toaster, iron or waffle baker—at one time. Often this outlet is controlled by the automatic clock to turn on the breakfast coffee.

Good Habits Make Work Simpler

Making your work as simple and easy as you can is part of better time management for you and every other busy home-

maker. To save time be sure you:

1. Keep everything within easy reach.
2. Work in a comfortable position.
3. Use the best equipment and tools for the job.
4. Leave out any part of a job you can.
5. Combine jobs or parts of a job.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

If a man had a water bucket that leaked from two holes, one about the size of a half dollar, the other smaller than a dime, it is to be presumed if he wanted to continue using the bucket he would plug up both leaks.

But if this man plugged up the small hole, leaving the larger one unplugged, then announced his bucket was in much better condition than before, his neighbors would look at him with some bewilderment.

This somewhat parallels the curious proposals now before Congress to stop U.S. gold loss.

The biggest drain on U. S. gold has been the exchange of dollars sent abroad in various foreign give away programs for U. S. gold. These various schemes have already cost over \$100 billion.

There also happens to be some American investors, large and small, attracted by the profit possibilities of some foreign enterprises, who have been risking their own money to buy stock in these firms. This outflow is literally peanuts compared to the vast handouts by the foreign give away people.

So now there is before Congress a proposal that Americans who desire to invest in foreign enterprise be charged a 15% tax. In other words, if a man wants to buy \$100 worth in stock in a foreign firm, he will

County Agent's Notes by P. B. Stricklen ASU Extension Service

Harvest Cotton For Quality

Keep the quality in cotton. Do it by proper harvesting. Here are some tips that could net you more money for your cotton crop:

Clean up the turn-rows. This is especially important if you are using mechanical pickers.

Get rid of late season grass and weeds. Cotton that is classified as "grassy" can cost you as much as \$14.75 a bale.

Keep cotton dry and trash-free. Don't pick until the dew has dried each morning nor too soon after a rain. It is best not to start mechanical pickers until the relative humidity is down to 50 percent. Do not operate pickers in the afternoon after dew begins to form.

If you do pick cotton while damp, gin it in less than 24 hours after picking. Do not mix damp and dry cotton. Keep clean and trashy cotton separated.

Use trailers that are big enough. Allowing 250 cubic feet per bale will eliminate need to tramp cotton in the trailer.

Make sure that the mechanical picker is properly adjusted and is operated correctly.

Practice safety with your cotton picker. Never oil, grease or adjust the picker head while it is in gear. Never operate the picker too close to the edge of a ditch or creek. Back down steep grades or ramps.

Do not apply brakes too quickly while traveling down roads. Do not operate without safety shields.

Wintering Beef Cattle

Wintering beef cattle is a much less costly operation when animals go into the winter season in good shape. Too, when cattle are free from lice and other insect problems, they require less feed and fare much better.

In planning your feeding program for the winter, do not forget that the animals need some supplemental protein.

Check with your local county agent for the latest recommendations on how much protein meal to feed each animal during the winter.

Corn Harvesting

As soon as corn is mature

and dry enough, harvest it. Leaving corn in fields after maturity causes a tremendous loss each year from weather, insects, rodents, and birds.

Do not harvest corn at a higher moisture content than 16 percent.

Before storing the new corn crop, be sure to clean all cribs and storage areas of all old corn and residue. After cleaning the storage area spray bins, cribs and surrounding areas with a recommended insecticide. If corn is weevil infested at harvest time, fumigate it with a recommended fumigant.

Eliminate breeding places for rats. Then use a recommended bait for control.

Waterway Could Reduce Costs Of Cattle Feeding

Research on the proposed Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway indicates this project could have a favorable effect on agriculture by reducing transportation costs in 27 Mississippi counties along the state's eastern boundaries.

Results of an Experiment Station study have been reported by Robert G. Brooks of the Agricultural Economics Department. Development of this waterway, Mr. Brooks says, is likely to reduce procurement costs of Midwest grain in some Mississippi points by as much as 6.5 to 14.6 cents per bushel.

These savings on grain could reduce broiler production costs by at least two-thirds of a cent per bird and beef cattle feeding costs by as much as \$1.56 per 100 pounds of gain in the area affected. Opening this waterway would also make possible 5 to 6 cents per bushel savings in transporting soybeans from northeast Mississippi points to Gulf ports for export.

"The extent of the effects of the waterway will depend primarily upon the actual rate structure which develops for it," according to Mr. Brooks.

Services Of The Health Dept.

Immunizations

The following immunizations are given by the local Health Department: Polio, Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Tetanus, Typhoid and Smallpox. Poliomyelitis is given in a series of three at monthly intervals and a booster one year later; Protection from Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, and Tetanus can be combined so that the child has to take only one series of three immunizations at monthly intervals. Booster shots should be given 2 years after the first series.

Smallpox can be prevented by giving the vaccination when the child is 6 weeks old and repeat every five years throughout life. Many suspected cases

The greatest profit from beef cattle and for dairy cattle is made from well-managed herds on good pastures. Good pastures alone are not the answer. It takes good cattle, good management and good pastures to produce the profits that farmers need and have a right to expect.

If you think your herd needs improving, visit your County Agent and ask him to help you. If you have a soil problem and need help in getting the right pasture plants on the right soil, contact the local Soil Conservation Service personnel. "That is gold in them thar Tishomingo County hills," and the way to get this gold is by grazing good cattle on the good pastures these hills will produce.

**Forgiveness**
Lesson for September 15, 1963

Bible Material: Genesis 37 through 44.
Devotional Reading: Matthew 5:38-44.

THE whole story of Joseph in Egypt makes one of the most fascinating tales in the world. There is not a miracle in it and yet it is more wonderful than many a story of magic, white or black. It is the story of a slave boy who rose to a throne all his own. He came just as close to being king as a man could be, and certainly wielded power not second even to that of the Pharaoh.

Dr. Foreman says, is not a name, but a title, like King or Emperor. There is just one point in that story which takes our attention this week: the climax of the plot, we might call it, where Joseph finally confronts his brothers face to face, has those ruthless men in his power... and forgives them!

What might have been a story of vengeance—evil for evil—turns out to be a story of good... good that is beyond most people's imagination even; returning good for evil. Joseph had never read the New Testament, and yet he acted just as if he had been reading the sermon on the mount. He has in his power the men who plotted against his life; and yet he forgives them. Why? The word "love" is not used in this story. Joseph himself may have been a sentimental man, but his biographer was certainly not. Joseph was brave, and chivalrous and loyal, but those adjectives are not used by the inspired story-teller. He doesn't have to use the word. Just try telling the story to people who never heard it before, and ask them: Why did Joseph forgive his brothers? They will probably give the natural reply: He must have loved them very much. That's very clear, isn't it? What other motive could produce such whole-hearted forgiveness? So good for him, and plotted to murder him. Brothers don't come any lower down than that.

"You meant evil!" These men without a conscience did not murder their brother after all. But that was not because they thought better of it. If anything, what they did was worse than killing: they sold him for a slave. Instead of a swift death, their brother would have a long lingering death-in-life, the miserable existence of a slave in those days when a slave's life was worth but little. The only reason they didn't kill Joseph was that they could make a little money (about two dollars each) by selling him. The lie they told their father about it, or rather the lie they acted out, was all of a piece with the rest of it. There wasn't a shred of good in the intentions of those ruffians. Furthermore, there was no good in the Midianite slave traders, and there was no good in the slave trade. When Potiphar bought Joseph, he didn't do so from motives of charity. It was purely a business transaction. Years and years after this, Joseph said to his aging brothers, speaking of these same events, "You meant evil against me." (Gen. 50:20)

But God meant it for good! In the same sentence, hardly stopping for breath, the boy Joseph now a middle-aged experienced man, went on to say, "but God meant it for good." At the time of that wicked sale of Joseph to the wandering traders, it would have been no wonder if Joseph had been "wondering why..." Why didn't God stop this terrible thing? We can imagine that on the way to Egypt (some days' journey at best) a bright 17-year-old like Joseph might have plotted an escape; and if he had tried it (maybe he did, at that) you would have surely been hoping he could manage the break-away. But no, it was not to be. The whole future of the nation of Israel depended on Joseph's being sold into Egypt. Indeed one may say that all history depended on it. If he had broken away, and gone home, there would have been nowhere to go when the big famine struck. The Israelites would never have found stored-up grain in Egypt, they never would have found protection there, there would never have been an Exodus, a Moses, a David... Never a Mary and never the other Joseph. Never a babe in the manger at Bethlehem, never a Cross, a Resurrection, a Good News. What would have happened to the world? It is too dark to think about; but try to imagine what this world would be if there never had been a Christ nor any Christians. Surely "God meant it for good."
