The phrase "to tantalize"
comes from the punishment of
Tantalus.

Tantalus, according to Greek
mythology, was a king who
committed an atrocious sin a-
gainst the gods. Accounts dif-
fer as to the sin. One story
says he revealed the gods' se-
crets, while another says he
murdered his son and served
him up as a meal to the gods.
At any rate, the gods were out-
raged.

As punishment, Tantalus was
placed in a pool whose waters
came to his chin, and over his
head hung bunches of fruit.
Whenever he lowered his head
to quench his thirst, the water
receded, and when he reached
for the fruit, the wind wafted
it away.

From this myth came the
phrase "to tantalize," mean-
ing to tease by keeping something
desirable in view but out of
reach.

Tishomingo Sewerage Bonds Pass

\$124,000 Voted To
Build New System;
Work To Start Soon

Hon. John R. Trimm, mayor
of the Town of Tishomingo, an-
nounces that the bond issue
voted on Tuesday, passed by a
big majority. Ninety-six voted
for the issue while only 21 vot-
ed against it.

Also in Tuesday's election
in Tishomingo, L. E. Crawley
was elected to serve out the
unexpired term of B. M. Hill.
The new alderman will take of-
fice immediately. Mr. Hill mov-
ed out of the state. Mr. Crawley
got 104 votes.

Mayor Trimm states that all

PRE-STRESSED CONCRETE UTILITY POLE DEVELOPED WILBUR M. DENT DEVICES METHOD TO MANUFACTURE POWER AND TELEPHONE DISTRIBUTION LINE POLES

A lightweight limestone pre-
stressed concrete utility pole
has been developed and pro-
duced in Iuka. The pole, in
lengths up to 40 feet, is of a
new type concrete manufactur-
ed out of materials obtainable
and supplied in this area. In
tests, it has proven to be un-
usually strong and is expected to
replace the wooden poles that
are now in use.

Inventor and developer of the
pre-stressed concrete utility
pole is Wilbur M. Dent. Mr.
Dent is a former local citizen
but now resides in Memphis.
He formerly worked for the
Tishomingo County Electric
Power Association, being asso-
ciated with Bill Brinkley, cur-
rent manager of the local asso-
ciation. Mr. Dent's experience
in power transmission and dis-
tribution lines is extensive, his
life having been spent in this
type work.

The new type pre-stressed
concrete pole was developed
and the first model manufactur-
ed in a sparsely wooded
area on the Bill Brinkley farm
here in Iuka. Mr. Dent has spent
three years in developing the

mechanical process for manu-
facturing the pole, plus an ad-
ditional two years in laborato-
ry work.

Centrifugal force is the key
to the manufacturing process.
The developer has devised a
machine included in which is a
container of approximately 18
inches in diameter and 40 feet
long. The container is round
and is divided into two equal
parts. To fill, the entire length
of the top portion is lifted up
leaving the bottom half that
looks like a long half-pipe. Into
the bottom half is poured the
concrete mix with the reinforcing
steel being laid in place. The
top half is placed into position
on the bottom half and the
two are bolted tightly to-
gether, sealing the concrete mix
and steel inside. This long tube,
filled with concrete is put into
a spin of speeds up to 450 re-
volutions per minute. The speed
of the spin forces the concrete
to the outer walls and in a mat-
ter of a few minutes is solidified
so that the top portion of the
container may be removed.
The concrete pole is then "cur-
ed" and is ready for use.

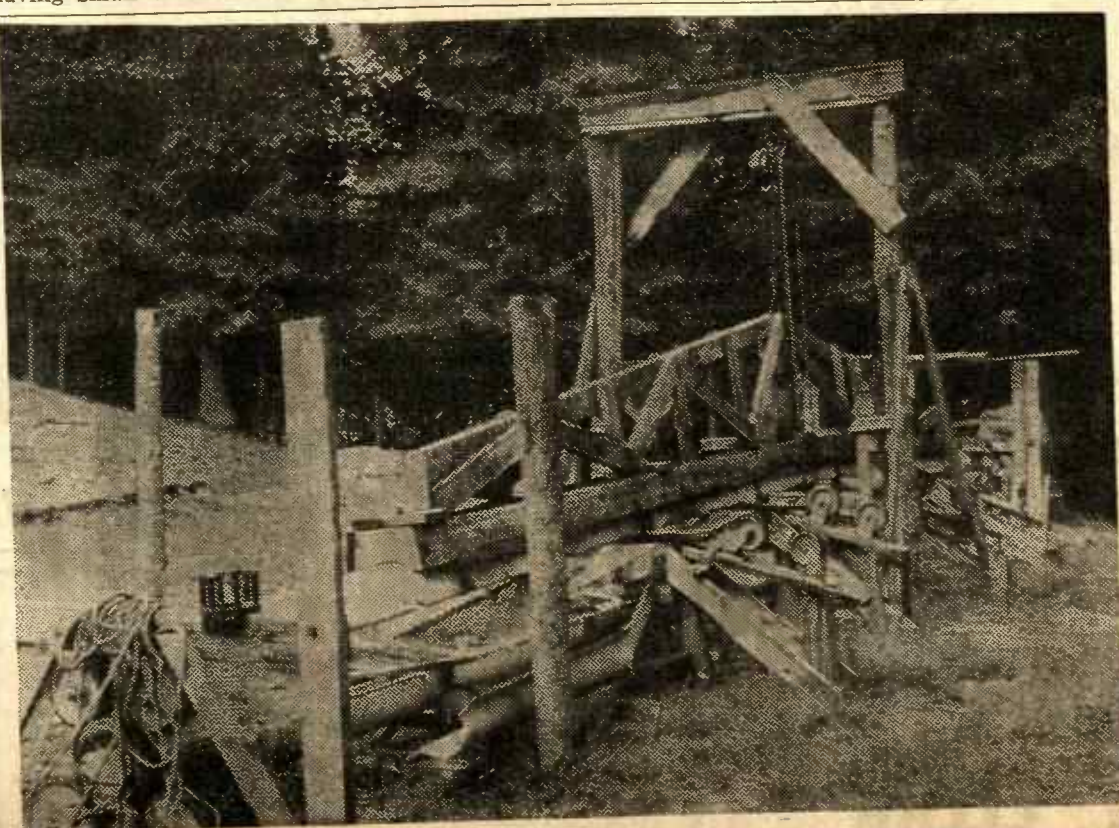
Mr. Dent states that "the for-

mula for the concrete mix is
critical, the speed of the spin
is critical and the duration of
the spin is critical."

With further development of
the spinning mechanism, Mr.
Dent states that he can pro-
duce a pre-stressed concrete u-
tility pole every ten minutes,
using steam as a curing agent.
A number of concerns
throughout the United States
are attempting to develop a
concrete pole similar to the one
Mr. Dent has attained. He has
applied for a patent on his
product and it is hoped that he
is first.

A need to replace the old
wood poles that are now in use
is becoming more apparent
every year. Some claim that
timber grown this day and
time is of a faster growth and
therefore is not as hard as the
virgin timber found in this
area. Because of the fast
growth, the wood poles will not
last as long, therefore demand-
ing more frequent replace-
ments.

Developers of the pre-stressed
concrete utility pole feel
that a ready market exists for
their product.

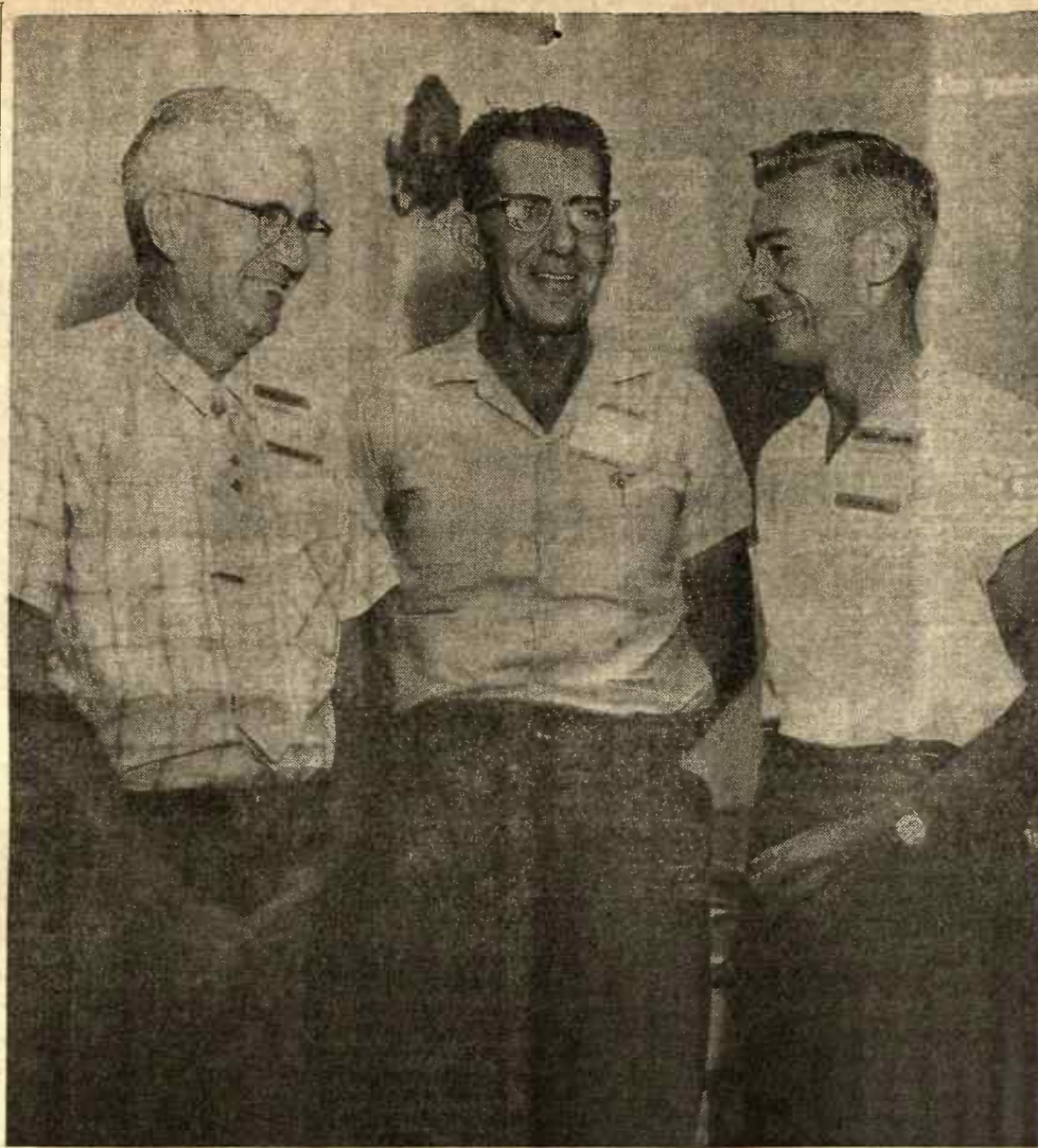

ing storage. R. E. Parker, and other U. S. Department of Agriculture engineers working at Delta Station, recently reported on several years of study during which time they stored cotton under varying temperature and humidity conditions.

Mr. Parker summarized his research report as follows. "Based on research, the following recommendations are suggested to insure the preservation of cotton's quality from the time it is harvested to the time it is ginned:

"1. Producers should make every effort to harvest only dry cotton. Cotton can be stored reasonably safe if it is picked after morning dews have dried off and before dark.

"2. Ginners should attempt to gin immediately any cotton that arrives at the gin in an extremely wet condition. Ginning of 'borderline' loads of cotton may be delayed. However, if these bales of cotton begin to 'heat,' they should be ginned as soon as possible.

"3. Tramping damp seed cotton on trailers should be avoided. Poor air circulation will permit the bale to hold the heat which is generated within. Open walled or wire mesh trailers are a definite advantage in this respect.

"4. Defoliation is desirable especially if fields are rank, plants are lodged, and boll rot is excessive. Defoliation serves also as a means of minimizing the amount of green trash in mechanically harvested seed cotton."

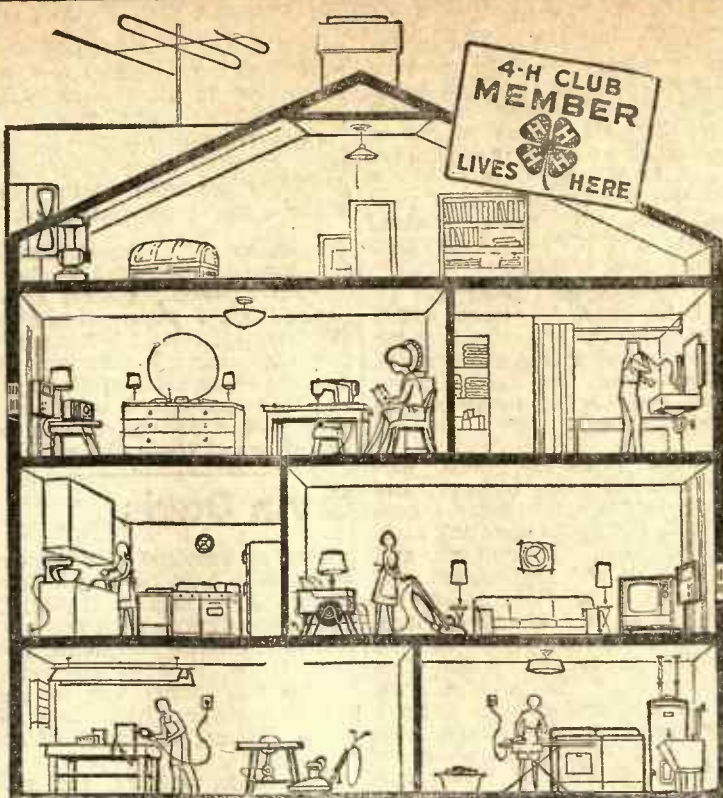

Has Your Fescue Been Fertilized?

Have you fertilized your fescue pasture? If you haven't, now is the time to do it. Proper fertilization and good management will bring out old fescue sods that are poor.

It is cheaper to graze fescue than it is to feed hay. Why work every day tugging at hay and scattering it out for your cows to eat when all you may need to do is open a gate to your fescue pasture, where your cows can get all the roughage they need to eat.

Some fescue and white clover pastures will carry two (2) cows per acre for most of the time from October until May. Everyone knows that the better the fescue and white clover, the more cows it will carry per acre. It takes fertilizer and moisture to make good pastures.

It is a good practice to apply 400 pounds of 14-14-14 or its equivalent per acre plus 100 pounds of ammonium nitrate per acre on all your fescue and white clover pasture every September. Lime should be applied every three years on all pastures.

Good cattle on good pastures will return a good profit to the landowner. Too, his land will become richer as the years go by. The soil we save now will produce food for future generations. Now is the time to fertilize your fescue.

Fire Prevention Week

Most farm fires don't just happen. It is estimated that 95 per cent of all fires are due to carelessness or neglect.

The time to fight a fire is before it starts! During National Fire Prevention Week, October 6-12, is a good time to take stock of your situation. How do you stack up in regard to fire hazards?

Here are a few tips that may keep fire from costing you money or even lives:

Proper storage of gasoline and other flammable liquids can cut farm fires as much as 20 percent. Above ground gasoline and kerosene containers should be located at least 40 feet from any building. Keep containers in clean, leak-free condition. Store small amounts in metal safety cans, clearly marked and a safe distance from heat.

Do all re-fueling out of doors so dangerous vapors cannot accumulate. Wipe up all spilled gasoline before starting a motor. Never use flammable liquids like gasoline or kerosene for cleaning clothes or starting fires.

Do not put wet hay in barns. Keep roof and walls of your barn repaired to prevent leaks. Keep combustible materials like hay off floors and out of areas where motor vehicles are used or stored.

Disc fire lanes between your pastures and woods, around barns and between your land and public roads.

Soybean - Insects
Late planted, young succulent soybeans are attracting the heaviest infestations of insects. Older beans are infested, but not generally as heavy as the young beans.

Major pests are corn earworms, cabbage loopers and bean leaf beetles. Some others also in the beans are stink bugs, velvet bean caterpillars and yellow striped armyworms.

Check your fields. Examine 10 feet of row in several locations. Grab about three feet of drilled beans and shake vigorously over the middle. Pull beans back and examine ground for worms or stink bugs. Also note amount of pod damage.

When to Poison? When one

or more corn earworms are found per three feet of row, or when one or more stink bugs are found per foot of row.

In poisoning for leaf-feeding control, apply insecticide when 35 to 40 per cent of the leaf surface has been consumed.

Insecticides recommended for use on soybeans include DDT at 1 pound per acre; Toxaphene-DDT, 1 gallon of 4-2 on two acres; Sevin, 1-1/2 pounds per acre; methyl parathion .5 pound per acre for stink bugs; and methoxychlor, 1 pound per acre. Follow all restrictions on use of any of these materials.

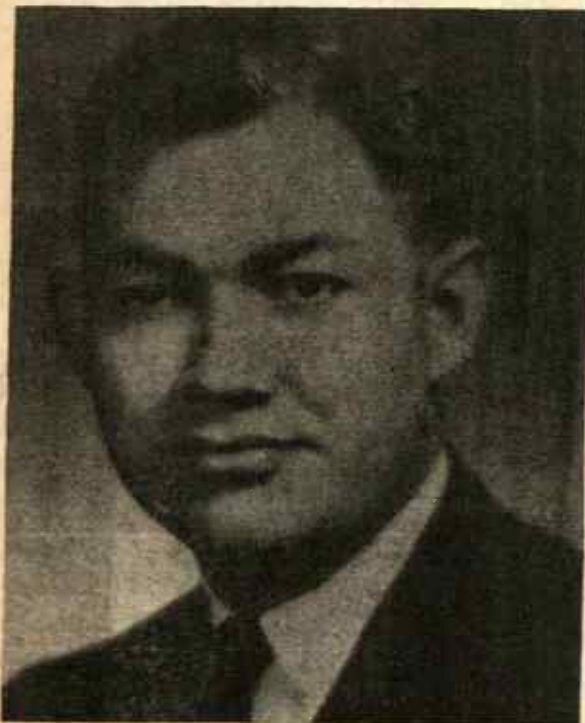

In the fall you may find appliances advertised for sale. The sales are promoted to move this year's merchandise and to make space for new models. If you are sure you need and want an item, are sure it is a bargain and know the original price, this may be the time for you to buy a new appliance.

Beware of the bogus bargain. Some unscrupulous manufacturers and dealers use tricks to hoodwink the public. Some of them use the phony price tag, which shows a great reduction, while the product may not be worth the so-called reduced price.

You aren't likely to find misbranded merchandise in stores, but watch door-to-door salesmen. Buy dependable brands. Don't be duped by counterfeit labels, such as for a cashmere coat that has little or no cashmere in it. Other promotional gimmicks for false bargains are discounts on false regular prices and limited time sales (which last all year long.)

Be wary of wholesale or lower than wholesale prices. Some of these prices are as much as you have to pay at regular e-tail outlets. Shop around. Check prices before you buy what might turn out to be a bogus bargain.

Be A Wise Buyer
The wise and skillful buyer uses a mental or actual check list before she makes a purchase. On her list are these items:
—Know your needs
—Buy with a purpose in mind
—Shop around before buying
—Know how much money you have to spend
—Keep within a set price range
—Compare values in various

qualities
—Shop in non rush hours
—Handle goods carefully
—Look for informative labels
—Avoid shopping for important items when tired or rushed.

Feed Chrysanthemums
Feed your chrysanthemums with fertilizer solution made by dissolving a heaping tablespoon of complete fertilizer in each gallon of water. Shrivelled yellow leaves on the lower part of plants show that they have run out of plant food.

The plants need plenty of water to during this budding and blooming period.
A little sulphur dusted on the stems and leaves will help ward off insects and diseases.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Union Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Life of Faith
Lesson for September 29, 1963
Bible Material: Genesis; Psalm 105: 1-24; Galatians 3; Hebrews 11:1-22.
Devotional Reading: Psalm 105:1-11.

FAITH is despised by people who don't have it and don't understand it. Faith is caricatured as an attitude of ignorance. It is compared to taking a chance or going on an errand that is bound to fail. Faith is said (by people who have none) to be like a man buying medicines and swallowing them with out looking at the labels or reading the directions. Faith has been compared to a blind man going down into the cellar at midnight, without a light, looking for a black cat that isn't there.

Faith's uncertainties
Nobody who has long lived the life of faith is bothered by such misunderstandings. For one thing, he knows very well that the man who tells you he believes only what he can test with his own five senses does not really mean it, because if you believe only what you can personally test, you will have an unhappy time of it. Suppose you try eating breakfast without faith some morning. The label on the cereal box says it has riboflavin and vitamin B and a lot of other things. Do you know that none of these is poisonous? Do you know they're all there? You know nothing of the sort; you believe it. You go to the hospital for an operation; do you know the surgeon's hand won't slip? No, but you trust yourself to him all the same. There can't be any more certainty than the certainty of faith, in most circumstances of life.

The men whose lives have been briefly before us in these past few weeks, Abraham, Jacob and Joseph, knew what the uncertainties of faith can be. Abraham went "not knowing whither he went." Jacob had no assurance that his God would prosper him. He hoped so, to be sure; but to the end of his days there were question marks in his future. So with Joseph; for long years, though the word is not written large in the stories of him, the fact of his faith is there. If Joseph had yielded to the tyranny of the obvious, he would have stayed a slave. He lived by what he did not see.

The certainties of faith
Did you ever fly, as a passenger, in a little plane just big enough for two? Just for a joke, while you were fastening your seat belt, you may have sung a verse or two of "Dig my grave with a silver spade." But you buckled that belt and up you rose into the scary sky. Now you believed in a lot of things. You believed the engine would not "conk out," you believed the wings were fastened with something stronger than glue, you believed the tail assembly would hang together, that the direction-finder and the altimeter and the dozen or so other gadgets on the instrument board were accurate, you believed in all the radio control towers and beacons you overflew; but when you come right down to it, what you really put faith in was not a what, it was a who. You trusted the pilot. You (not being a pilot, and not used to flying perhaps) could not predict what he would do next. If you never studied aerodynamics, the chances are that you didn't even know exactly how the plane stays aloft. You certainly could not read the inside of the pilot's mind. But you trusted him all the same.

God is the pilot
You see there are a lot of things to trust in even a small airplane. But you don't really trust the things, but the pilot, a person. You trust him (among other things) to check everything about the plane, you put your faith in his knowledge and in his skills. If you couldn't trust him, you couldn't very well trust the plane.

The life of faith in God is like that. There are many things we have to believe in, on our flight through this life. But essentially, religious faith is faith in a person, our Father in heaven. We can't see what He is doing, we can't understand all He does even when we see Him do it, we don't know why this or that happens. There's a great deal more that we don't know than we do know. But we trust Him. The great difference between God and any airline pilot is that even the boldest and most skillful pilots know there are kinds of clouds they dare not enter, weather conditions they cannot control. The best of them can be grounded. But the true God is never grounded, for no cloud is too dark and storm-swept for Him.
