## Iuka Woman In Hospital

**With Three-Inch  
Gash In Throat;  
Husband In Jail**

Mrs. Elmer Junior (Bonnie) Gravette is in Tishomingo County hospital recuperating from a severely cut throat. Her husband, Elmer Junior Gravette, is in Tishomingo county jail pending investigation.

Mrs. Gravette was found in her home Monday afternoon lying in a pool of blood with her throat cut. She reportedly was found by her husband and a colored woman at about the same time. Mr. Gravette called doctors and an ambulance.

Police report that the extent of the wound is serious, however, at last reports, she is apparently improving. A gash in excess of three inches was cut on the left side of her throat. She lost approximately half the body's content of blood and several transfusions were given through Tuesday. No additional blood had been given at press time Wednesday.

Mr. Gravette is held in jail for further questioning. No charges have been filed, police report, but there are some questions to which they have not yet got the answers.

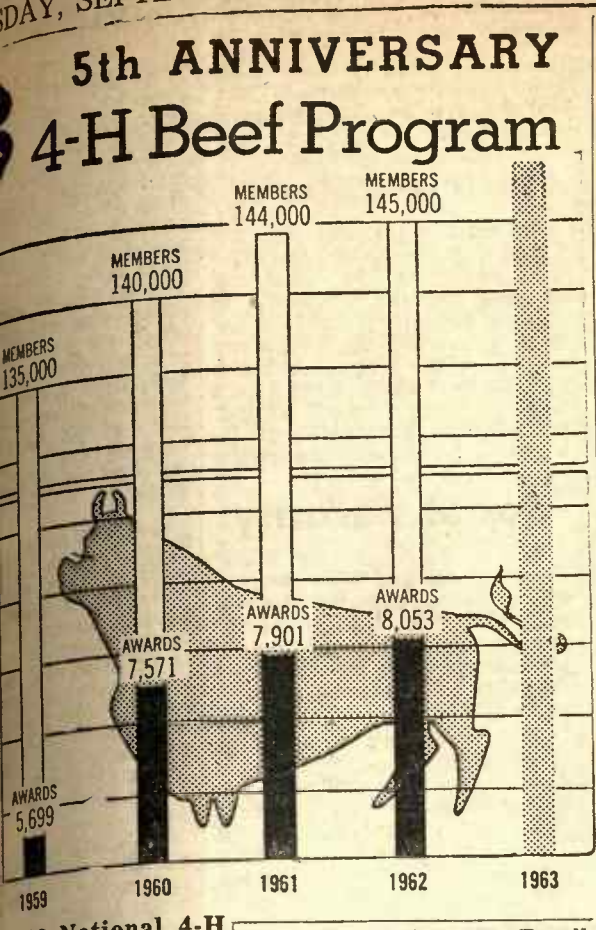

### No Hunting Allowed On Trace Parkway

Malcolm Gardner, Superintendent of Natchez Trace Parkway, stated today that hunting is not permitted on parkway lands. Mr. Gardner indicated that, during past hunting seasons, Park Rangers have found numerous individuals and groups with loaded guns on these lands.

Mr. Gardner also pointed out that, in addition to prohibiting hunting, the rules and regulations of the National Park Service prohibit the carrying of loaded weapons in vehicles, and the using of park lands as a base for hunting. To avoid the inconvenience and embarrassment of appearing in court, Mr. Gardner suggests that hunters using the Natchez Trace Parkway have their guns unloaded and out of sight in the car, and that they park off the Parkway land while hunting.

**Livestock Insects**

## Sensing The News

The NCC In Politics

The most sacred thing in the lives of millions of people in this country is their religion. Indeed the ancestors of many of us came to this land in order to enjoy religious liberty. By this, our fore fathers meant not merely the right to worship but also the right to have one's religion kept free of politics.

For this reason it is profoundly disturbing to many Protestants that the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA (NCC) should have in the 13 years of its existence grown into a ambitious political organization that runs counter to the deepest beliefs of numerous persons in the member denominations.

The most recent cause for dismay among concerned churchmen was the role of the NCC's Commission on Religion and Race in organizing the Aug. 28th march on Washington and in demanding that Congress take specific legislative action. Many members of the denominations that belong to the NCC were shocked to discover that the Commission placed newspaper ads in co-operation with the Freedom House organization in New York City. They discovered, many of them for the first time, that members of this NCC Commission included Harry S. Ashmore, formerly of the Fund For The Republic; Ralph McGill, ultra-liberal newspaper editor, and Victor G. Reuther, brother of the United Auto Workers chief. They were equally shocked to discover that the NCC had affiliated itself in the advertisements for the Washington rally with such individuals as Roy Wilkins, head of the NAACP, and Paul G. Hoffman, director of the U. N. Special Fund, which is currently aiding Fidel Castro's government with American funds contributed through the United Nations.

Other Protestants were startled to discover that the NCC had gone on record as favoring "a massive federal public works program." They were amazed to find that the NCC published statements in the language of leftwing radical extremists, repeating baseless charges about "police brutality" and people working "at slave wages."

What has all this to do with religion? asked many concerned churchmen. This is the same question that other citizens asked in 1959 when the World Order Study Conference, sponsored by the NCC, proposed recognition of Red China and its admission to the United Nations.

Other churchmen bore in mind the fact that the NCC's Department of Church and Economic Life had been helped in existence by funds provided by the United Auto Workers Union, of which Walter Reuther is president. In addition, the NCC received funds from the Philip Murray Foundation and the Sidney Hillman Foundation, organizations established in memory of former leaders of the CIO. The NCC's consistent record of favoring the same political objectives as Big Unionism has to be thought of in connection with these gifts.

There is a strong wave of protest within Protestant churches that is directed against the NCC. Many individual churches have registered a dissent from NCC stands. But local churches often are unable, because of complicated organizational arrangements, to individually remove financial support from the NCC. Within the NCC itself, a small group of leaders holds great power.

The record of NCC officials becoming involved in radical causes is a continuing insult to responsible church members whose churches are, willy nilly, caught up in membership.

Dr. Edwin T. Dahlberg, for instance — former head of the NCC — has been a signer of innumerable radical petitions. For example, he lent his name in 1961 to the Conference of Greater New York Peace Groups which opposed nuclear defenses for America's allies. Other signers included Cyrus Eaton, the industrialist who boasts of his friendship with Nikita Khrushchev; W. E. DuBois, the late founder of the NAACP, who openly joined the Communist Party a year ago; Owen Lattimore, an advocate of appeasement in Asia; and Norman Thomas, longtime socialist leader.

The average Protestant churchmen believe that the NCC's role should be restricted to missionary and other related charitable work. Deeply feared and resented is the development of the NCC into an organization that not only calls on Congress to pass radical legislation but that becomes militantly involved in the organization and direction of mass movements that many citizens and churchmen regarded destructive of law and order and the intelligent conduct of the public business.

The current partisan role of

the NCC is a reminder that church leaders mixing in politics betrays the real character of religion.

make payments to your wife too, she's under 62.

Q—I can retire my company pension at 62, also take reduced payments. I should like to know if I should retire at 62 or 65. If I retire at 62, I can get office we can find out your payments whether or not you retire at 62, how much you would have to decide to tell you what you would be.

Q—Does social security pay a lump-sum when a worker dies? A—Yes. It is paid to the surviving spouse or to the worker when he is no widow or widower. If you are paid to the person the funeral bill, conditions it can be to the funeral home it can be \$225.

Sunday School Lessons  
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

**God in History**  
Lesson for September 22, 1963

Bible Material: Genesis 37 through 50.

Devotional Reading: Psalm 47.

THE story of Joseph is strikingly modern. It is updated in every century. It is true, the actual events of this strange history—this success story to end all success stories—never repeat themselves, for no two lives are just alike. Joseph rose not only to the chance of his lifetime, but to the big chance of all time. There never was another historic moment just like any moment in Joseph's life, never another opportunity like his. The thing that links Joseph with all of us is the way his life-history illustrates what every man's life also pictures, namely what Christians call the "providence" of God.

The Christian doctrine of Providence, which is believed in every church in Christendom, is a name for the belief that God is in constant touch with this world, and that He so controls and guides the affairs of not only this planet but of the universe so that His purposes do come to pass. The universe is vast and complicated beyond our understanding; but God is in charge. That is the heart of what "providence" means. It is more than foresight. It is more than "taking care of His own." It is more than God's occasionally reaching a hand into the machinery of the world to give it a little shove. The thing that makes this not the easiest Christian doctrine to believe is that there is so much in the world which, so far as we can see, doesn't fit in with God at all. There is a lot of anti-God loose on earth. How can we square that with the idea that God is in control? One way of solving the difficulty is to deny that there is any evil. This won't wash. . . . Evil of one kind or another, and specially sin, is too tall and terrible to be laughed off or ignored. Talk about God being hard to believe in! It is less of a strain, by far, to believe in a God more powerful than evil, than to believe that evil is no more than a kind of illusion, something done with mirrors so to speak. An old couplet written for children says, "The world is so full of a number of things, I'm sure we should all be as happy as kings." That's not the doctrine of providence. This world is full of a number of things that make anybody with a heart most unhappy. We have to believe in God through our tears, not pretend there's nothing to cry about.

Freedom is real!

Some people push the doctrine of Providence too hard. They are afraid that if God allows the tiniest bit of freedom to mankind, something is bound to go haywire sooner or later, and God will find things have gone out of control. They make the history of mankind look like a puppet-show with God working the strings. This isn't the doctrine or the truth about Providence; it's a kind of caricature of it, something first cousin to fatalism. The story of Joseph is an illustration of what we are driving at. Joseph's brothers knew what they were doing when they plotted against their brother. They didn't have to do what they did. They were not puppets, they were free men. This isn't saying they could have done good just as easily as they could have done wicked acts. It came a lot easier to do evil, but they didn't have to. Joseph never pretended they couldn't help it! And neither did they.

God the weaver

God may be compared to a master weaver who stands at the loom of time and weaves the fabric of history. Not all the threads in the loom are beautiful. There is the black thread of ignorance and the crooked thread of pain and the blood-red strand of sin. The pattern might be more beautiful if it were not for the tangled ugly threads of perverted human wills. But God does not throw anything away. He makes use of the evil. He keeps the freedom within bounds. Some will ask, How does God do this? If we knew, we would know as much as God knows,—and this is beyond us forever. But that God does this, every believing heart is assured. Here our own story blends with that of Joseph and all the saints. Who cannot tell his own story of how God's hand has been felt in his own life? What Christian has not been led to say, after some painful experience, God knew best?

## ASCS Program Designed To Aid Farmers

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Program of Tishomingo County is encouraging farmers to take advantage of the assistance offered by the Federal Government to improve conservation on their farms.

E. N. Allen, ASCS Office Manager, states that all land in the county needs lime and that this is a good time of the year to have it applied to pasture, hay land, and crop

land. The maximum cost per ton to the farmer, including spreading, would be \$2.05 per ton.

According to Mr. Allen, the first requirement in getting lime applied to your cropland is to sow a cover crop, such as hairy vetch or Austrian winter peas, or to sow new pasture on this land either this fall or next fall. This requirement does not apply to pasture sod, lespedeza sod, or sericea sod. Farmers over the county are urged to check over their needs for lime and place their orders at once.

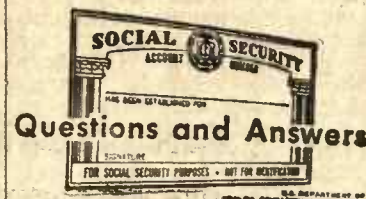

### Questions and Answers

Q—Are veterans of World War I entitled to a pension? If they are, is there a required age and do they have to be retired?

A—A pension may be payable to a wartime veteran, regardless of age, if he is totally and permanently disabled not as a result of his military service. The veterans must be unable to pursue a gainful occupation by reason of such disability and his income from all sources must be under certain statutory limits. Details to fit an individual case are available at any VA office.

Q—I have been told that anyone entitled to use the "G.I." is entitled to veterans' benefits. Is the right and what does "G.I." mean?

A—Term "G.I." might be defined as "government issue" and referred to varied supplies, equipment, clothing, etc., issued to individuals or units in the service. In time it became a slang term referring to the servicemen themselves. It has no standing as an entitlement to Federal benefits.

Q—Why are widows of World War II or of Korean Conflict veterans unable to get pensions from the Government on the same grounds that World War I widows can?

A—That is no longer true. Since July 1, 1960, widows of World War II or of Korean Conflict veterans have been eligible to receive pensions on the same basis as World War I widows. In brief, the deceased husband had to have at least 90 days of service of which part was during wartime, he had been discharged under conditions other than dishonorable and the widow's annual income is within statutory limits. Individual details may be received at any VA office.
